CLAY PREDICTS RIGID CONTROL OVER GERMANY

Declares Germans Will Know It's Military Rule; SHAEF Explains Status Of Doenitz; Churchill Says Germans Will Operate Under Allied Direction

Supreme Headquarters Allied Expeditionary Force, Paris, May 16.—(AP)—The Allies do not recognize the Doenitz regime as the constitutional government of Germany and are planning a long, strict military occupation of the Reich, it was made plain here today.

Mal. eGn. Lucius D. Clay, Gen. Eisenhower's deputy for the occupation of Germany, said the American aims were to smash all vestiges of Nazism and Germany's war-making potential, and to see that all war criminals are caught and punished. Gen. Clay declared that "The Allied government in Germany is going to be military and the Germans are going to know it's military."

"The United States is going to stay in Germany in all probability for a long time," Gen. Clay said. He explained carefully that supreme headquarters Allied Expeditionary Force still is operative and that he was speaking for the U. S. Group Council which will take over after SHAEF finishes.

Supreme headquarters said formally of the Germans who succeeded the Hitler regime just before the unconditional surrender:

"Admiral Doenitz and certain other selected Germans are being used temporarily to carry out duties in connection with the feeding, disarmament and medical care of German armed forces. These German officers are fully controlled and are there solely to carry out instructions of the Allied Expeditionary Force."

In London, Prime Minister Churchill said that in general it was the Allied intention that "the Germans should administer their country in obedience to Allied direction." He said the Allies have "no intention of undertaking the burden of administering Germany ourselves." There was no immediate explanation of the apparent divergences of views by the British leader and officers at SHAEF.

Sources at supreme headquarters said the German high command would be dissolved and that there would be no national puppet government for the present. Such German administration as there is will be on a very low level, it was said.

Clay said accused war criminals such as Goering were being gathered in prison areas where they would be less comfortable. (A Reuters dispatch quoted Clay as saying Doenitz also was being held as a prisoner of war.) German offenders will be used as laborers in rebuilding devastated European areas. He said food would be scarce in Germany this winter but that none would be imported unless starvation conditions exist. He also stated that exact zones of American, Russian, British and French occupation areas probably would be announced within a (Continued on page six)

TO BEGIN WAR TRIALS SOON

War Crimes Commission To Meet In London May 31

London, May 16.—(AP)—An international conference on German war crimes will start in London May 31, it was announced today by the United Nations War Crimes Commission.

The commission also announced it had arranged for "certain European governments" to send investigation officers into Germany to help military authorities gather evidence of war crimes there.

Washington, May 16.—(AP)—Maj. Gen. William J. Donovan, chief of the highly secret Office of Strategic Services, will help prosecute Europe's war criminals.

Supreme Court Justice Robert H. Jackson, designated by President Truman as this country's chief war crimes prosecutor, today announced the selection of Donovan and two other top assistants:

Sidney S. Alderman, general solicitor for the Southern Railway, and Assistant Attorney General Francis M. Shea, both of Washington. Jackson's announcement, issued by the War Department, referred (Continued on page six)

Hitler's Body Not Yet Found

Moscow, May 16.—(AP)—The Russians continued today to examine closely the bodies of Nazis found in the underground city discovered in Berlin, but there was no official announcement that the corpse of either Hitler or his Propaganda Minister Paul Joseph Goebbels had been identified.

Of six bodies found in the Reich chancellery, four have been declared definitely as not being the fuhrer. A meticulous recheck is taking place on the other two.

The Russians are leaning more and more to the idea that the Nazis might have planned some gigantic hoax in reporting the death of Hitler in Berlin, and all military men have been asked to exercise the greatest diligence in the identification of dead Nazis.

Plan Designed To Give Pan-American Defense System Strong Position

San Francisco, May 16.—(AP)—A United States' plan guaranteeing to any group of United Nations the right to organize for collective defense goes before the world security conference today backed by enough votes to assure its eventual approval.

The plan is designed primarily to give the Pan-American defense system a strong and permanent position within the proposed world security organization.

Secretary of State Stettinius announced, on authority of President Truman, that the United States would invite the other American nations to negotiate a long-term mutual defense treaty following the conference here.

Formulation of the American plan, with the approval of virtually all the Latin American states and most of the big powers—Russia remains to be heard from—puts this conference over one of its biggest hurdles.

The greatest obstacle remaining, in the opinion of United States authorities, is the development of a formula for setting up international trusteeships that will allow the (Continued on page four)

TRUMAN WILL VISIT STATE

Will Address Senate In Statesville In October

Washington, May 16.—(AP)—President Truman will speak to the North Carolina Senate at Statesville sometime in October, Rep. Robert L. Doughton (D-NC), said yesterday.

The President will select his own date for the speech and notify the state group two weeks ahead of the date.

Doughton's invitation was the first President Truman had accepted to speak outside of Washington, since he became chief executive. Truman's address will mark the final day of a State Senate get-together which is to be held at Hendersonville June 25-30, and which will recess to meet again in Statesville on the date elected by the President.

Vinson, director of the Office of War Mobilization and Reconstruction; Speaker of the House Sam Rayburn of Texas; James P. McGrath, assistant to the U. S. Attorney General; U. S. Inside Germany

With American Occupation Forces on the Rhine, May 16.—(AP)—Nazi small fry still are swimming comfortably outside the dragnet of Allied justice in Germany.

This is an extremely sensitive subject for statesmen and generals alike. A number of censorship taboos are in force. Until now the Allied powers have not furnished the world with an exact definition of "war criminal."

The first few tentative gestures have been made at eradication of the Nazi hierarchy and militarists in Allied occupied Germany.

American junior officers who actually are attempting to clean out the centers of Nazi cult complain that legal technicalities tie their hands in many instances.

The Nazis themselves can hardly be otherwise than pleased. For a closeup of the Nazi problem, here is the view of a young lieutenant who became public safety officer of a Rhineland town and found out that "what we need is a policy with teeth in it."

He told his men, "I don't care if the Germans have to wait awhile before they get their water and lights turned on again—I think our first aim ought to be to round up the people who will try to start another war if they go free."

"But what happens?" he asked. "Counter-intelligence corps is authorized to make mandatory arrests only on the higher levels of Nazi officials. If you rank just below a

Marines Repulse Bloody Jap Attack On Okinawa

Japs Fight Savage Hand-To-Hand Battle West Of Davao City On Mindanao; American Forces Make New Gains On Luzon Island

Manila, May 16.—(AP)—Trapped Japanese troops fought a savage hand-to-hand battle today with Americans of the 24th Infantry west of Davao city on Mindanao.

Maj. Gen. Roscoe B. Woodruff's battle-seasoned veterans attacked with knives, bayonets and even flailing fists as the struggle mounted in savage fury. The battle raged in 12-foot Cogon Pass in foothills between the Talomo and Davao rivers.

To the northwest, the 31st and 40th Infantry divisions were pinning a large enemy garrison in Bukidnon province, where the bulk of an estimated 50,000 Mindanao Japanese were believed fortifying hill positions.

Gen. Douglas MacArthur announced in today's communique that 90 per cent of Mindanao, second largest island in the Philippines, had been liberated. He also said 85 per cent of the population, probably exceeding 400,000, was freed from Japanese domination.

But the Japanese salient west of Davao resisted fiercely. Their retreat cut off, the Nipponese resorted to suicide attacks. Yanks and Japanese fought with bayonets and knives, slugged with helmets and grappled like wrestlers, some combatants rolled into a river, where at least two Yanks held the heads of adversaries under water until they were drowned.

Five times in one night a group of crazed Japanese—75 at the start—rushed a vehicle concentration. Capt. Victor Bazzinotti directed the defense. After the last charge, only a dazed handful was left to flee into the hills.

One Japanese ran beneath a cub plane in the center of an American position and blew up himself and the plane. Another, wearing a grille of dynamite, was detonated by carbine and pistol fire.

Even land mines, disarmed by Yanks, were recaptured, reset and replanted by Japanese who stole through American lines.

To the northwest, 40th division infantry attacked an enemy force in the Mangima river area east of captured Del Monte air center. The division is driving south along the nine-foot wide gravelled Sayre highway toward the 31st division about 60 miles away. The 31st won an airfield one mile north of Marana. 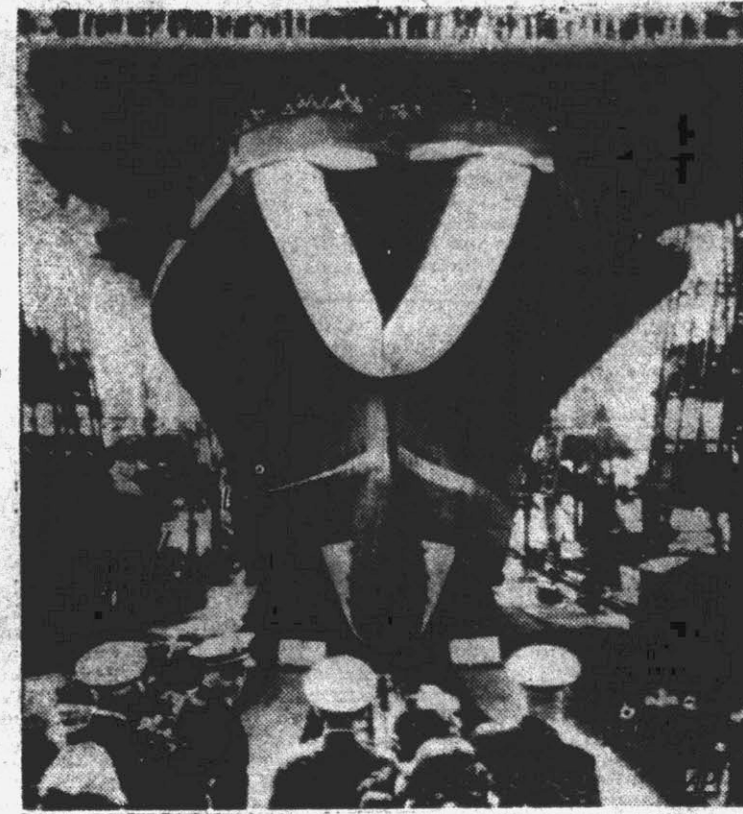
Accidents Take Forty Five Lives

Raleigh, May 16.—(AP)—Forty-five persons were killed and 301 injured last month on streets and highways in the state, the Department of Motor Vehicles reported yesterday.

Two hundred and twenty-six accidents were in cities and towns and included 12 deaths and 108 injured. Rural areas reported 76 accidents resulting in 33 deaths and 193 injured.

Records for the first three months of this year show 1,491 accidents resulted in 135 deaths and 870 persons injured.

Democrats See Victory For Tariff Legislation

Measure Would Permit President to Cut Levies By Fifty Per Cent

Washington, May 16.—(AP)—The House Ways and Means committee voted today to give the President new authority to reduce tariffs in trade agreements with other nations.

The administration victory in the first major congressional test on postwar international legislation was by a 14 to 11 vote. Committee members reported all 10 Republican members voted solidly against the legislation and were joined by one Democrat, Rep. West of Texas.

The legislation, which has lined the two parties up on an ancient dueling ground, will go to the House floor for debate next Tuesday.

The measure would extend the 1934 reciprocal trade act for three years with an amendment giving the President authority to trim tariffs up to 50 per cent of January 1, 1945, rates.

Under present legislation, which expires June 12, the executive can cut duties 50 per cent below the rates of the last Republican tariff law, the Hawley-Smoot act of 1930. The new authority would allow (Continued on page four)

To Hunt Down Fugitive Subs

With four German submarines now in American hands, the Navy today awaited word from an estimated 10 to 20 more fugitive or missing Nazi undersea raiders still sailing in Atlantic waters.

Naval officials predicted a deadline would be set for the U-boats to give up and that those failing to run up the black flag of surrender would be hunted as pirates.

Allied patrols, the navy said, will shoot at sight if they encounter any submarine not flying the surrender flag.

Two Nazi submarines already are in United States ports, the crews have been interned. The navy said its estimate of unaccounted submarines was based on the assumption that between 50 and 60 were prowling the Atlantic when Germany fell.

Eighteen U-boats have been brought into British ports and two into Canadian harbors. Others have surrendered to British warships and are enroute to ports.

To Confer With Roosevelt's Son

Washington, May 16.—(AP)—President Truman arranged a conference today with Brig. Gen. Elliott Roosevelt to discuss big three meetings the latter attended with his father, the late President Roosevelt.

Press Secretary Charles G. Ross told reporters General Roosevelt would call at 3 p. m. at the President's invitation. He will be accompanied by his sister, Mrs. Anna Boettinger, who also was present at the Yalta conference.

SEEKS CHANGE IN SUCCESSION

Wants House Speaker To Be Eligible For Presidency

Washington, May 16.—(AP)—Congress was urged by one of its members today to pass a law making the Speaker of the House third man in the order of presidential succession.

Under the present law the chief executive office passes to the Secretary of State in the event both the President and Vice President should die or become unable to serve.

Destroyer Escort Sunk By Submarine

Washington, May 16.—(AP)—The recent sinking of the destroyer escort Frederick C. Davis by an enemy submarine in the Atlantic was announced by the Navy today.

While the announcement did not disclose the exact date of the sinking, a navy spokesman said it occurred "some days" prior to Germany's surrender last week.

Casualties among the ship's complement of about 200 were "heavy," he said. Next of kin of all casualties have been notified.

The vessel's skipper, Lt. James R. Crosby, son of Irving E. Crosby, Seattle, Wash., was reported missing in action.

Today On The Home Front

San Francisco, May 16.—(AP)—We may be after fumbling with the idea for generations—on the brink of setting up a real world court.

But it is not certain how good and strong that court will be when it finally comes out of the oven at the United Nations conference here. This is the whole purpose of such a court.

It would be one more means of settling international disputes—like arguments over treaties or boundaries or fishing rights—peacefully. Here's a simplified explanation of what has been done to create a true world court and of what remains to be done.

Americans were talking about the need for a world court more than 100 years ago. The first definite step in that direction came in 1899 when the Czar of Russia called the first Hague conference in Holland.

Out of this came the so-called permanent court of arbitration. It was not really a court. It was a panel of people who could be called upon to settle an argument. The various participating nations

Heavy Losses on Both Sides In Day And Night Battle; Carrier Plane Raids On Jap Homeland Airfields Destroy Or Damage 357 Planes

Guam, May 16.—(AP)—United States marines battled furiously on the edge of Naha, capital of Okinawa island, today, after retaking ground lost in the bloodiest Japanese counterattack of the offensive.

(A British broadcast of a Reuters dispatch heard by CBS in New York said Naha had fallen to the Americans. There was no confirmation from U. S. headquarters.)

The Japanese launched their counter-attack around midnight Monday after a heavy artillery barrage, said Al Hopkins, AP war correspondent.

At dawn one 22nd marine regiment officer said "we've been fighting like maniacs since midnight." Hopkins reported that before the battle was over one American company had only two men left out of 240. Another company had only eight survivors.

American headquarters said the marines not only beat back the Japanese but also drove the enemy into the interior of Takamotji town with heavy losses.

Simultaneously, Fleet Adm. Chester W. Nimitz announced carrier plane raids destroyed or damaged 357 enemy aircraft and pounded 18 enemy airfields on the Japanese home islands of Honshu and Kyushu. Nimitz listed 176 aircraft destroyed, 108 either destroyed or damaged, and 73 machinegunned without observed results.

Japanese artillery shells shrieked overhead as a prelude to the enemy's desperate attempt to drive Marines out of the Naha sector, and a night and day battle raged wildly. Marines of the veteran 22nd Regiment were shoved back 300 yards twice in valleys to the left of Naha before they rallied and turned the assault.

As the Japanese attack mounted in fury, Marine cooks, bakers and other rear echelon troops were thrown into the battle. Hand grenades flew about like baseballs, and the dead were strewn on both sides of the valley.

It was perhaps the most determined enemy attacks of the Okinawa campaign and the emperor's soldiers for a time rode a bloody crest. Then the 22nd—veterans of Eniwetok and Saipan—literally mowed the shock and literally made a step-by-step advance. At least 400 enemy dead were counted by noon.

Brig. Gen. William T. Clement of Richmond, Va., assistant commander of the Sixth Marine Division, of which the 22nd is a part, said grimly:

"We are well bled but we'll crush those damned buzzards before it's over."

By afternoon following the night assault the Marines had regained lost ground, but fighting still was a furious around Sugar Loaf Hill, a strategic mound guarding approach. (Continued on page four)

Speaks To AAUW.

Miss Elizabeth Brown, secretary and treasurer of the Lenoir County Mental Hygiene Society and a member of the staff at Caswell Training School, discussed last night, as the speaker at the AAUW dinner meeting the need for better understanding of mental health and mental hygiene, and pointed out the need of a mental health society in Greenville and Pitt county. To be ready to join neighboring counties in a plan to set up a definite organization for work in the field is important, she declared, if funds are to be secured from the federal government upon passage of a bill now before Congress.

As this was the last meeting of the year for the organization, the president, Mrs. Ethel R. Waters, after expressing her appreciation of the work of committee and individuals, called for reports from various committees following the program. During the dinner, Mrs. R. L. Humber and Miss Agnes Pulllove reported the highlights of the meeting of the state executive board of the AAUW at Chapel Hill in April, which they and the president attended.

Miss Brown, introduced by Miss Louise Swann, chairman of the committee sponsoring the program, began by defining mental health as a mental condition that makes for healthy social relationships. She then pointed out how easily such "health" can be undermined, and described many ways, some good and some harmful, in which people try to escape from trouble and failure. Certain of these, she said, even led to insanity where there is no real brain defect or injury.

The speaker described the sort of center that would be needed for any real work in the field, and added that the trained workers needed are so expensive that only by joining with others could a county hope to finance the work. This she thinks can be provided for in this section of the state by an organization including her own county of Lenoir, Pitt, and three neighboring counties, as this would allow the trained workers one day a week in each county.

A number of visitors from other Greenville organizations were present to hear Miss Brown.

women everywhere to furnish the

We can reverse Arnold's words
and say: "Can all of Matthew Ar-
nold's poetry, his culture, his re-
fined tastes, compensate for a spirit
which causes a man to look down
upon his fellows with disdain?"

AMERICA IN WARTIME

By JACK STINNETT

Washington—In one way or an-
other, this story has been explored
half a dozen times, but it never has
been told.

It is the story of what is going
on in the thousands of cemeteries
of boys buried in our cemeteries
all over the world. So far, that
answer is simply: Nothing.

For more than 25 years, in seven
cemeteries in France, Belgium and
England, our dead of World War I
have reposed in little replicas of
Arlington cemetery just across Mem-
orial bridge in Virginia.

These cemeteries are now becom-
ing numberless. In Hawaii there
are men who died at Pearl Harbor.
There are cemeteries on Wake,
Guam, the Philippines, Guadalcanal,
New Guinea, Iwo Jima and a
score of other places in the Pacific.
American soldiers are buried in
North Africa from the Gold Coast
to Cairo; and across the Mediter-
ranean from Sicily to Northern Italy
and Southern France. From the
Normandy beachhead to the Rhine
and far beyond, the land is dotted
with the graves of our fighting men.

So far, there has been no more
than suggestions that these bodies
be returned to the United States for
final burial after this war. There
already have been bills introduced
to permit Gold Star parents and
wives to visit these graves once the
war is at peace again.

The final decision will be up to
Congress. The War Department will
have no authority to do anything
about it until Congress takes action.
Apparently this is something the
public generally doesn't understand.
For the office of the Quartermaster
General, which has charge of our
military cemeteries, is becoming
daily a greater and greater catch-
all for complaints from the relatives
of men buried overseas.

On the home front, it's a dif-
ferent story. In the last several
congresses there have been bills
introduced to establish military cem-
eteries in almost every state, territory
and possession.

The latest of these is the inclusive
bill offered by Rep. Chester E. Mer-
row (R-NH), which ties up all those
that have gone before into a mea-
sure which would permit the sec-
retary of war to establish military
cemeteries in every state, territory,
or possession with more than half
a million population. It would per-
mit the secretary to take over any

sary lands by purchase, condemna-
tion or gift. The U. S. Commission
of Fine Arts would be called in to
approve plans. After that, the
cemeteries would revert to the Of-
fice of Quartermaster General for
maintenance.

No definite action has been taken
yet on the cemeteries on foreign
shores, but an extensive research is
being made and records kept of
every grave. Even in the statisti-
cally-minded U. S. Army and Navy,
there will be many "unknown sol-
diers" in this war. The brutal ex-
plosives of modern warfare make
that inevitable, but neither Army
nor Navy is sparing any effort to
reduce the list of "missing in ac-
tion" to an absolute minimum.

perilous. The German folk will obey
with their hands but not with their
hearts. Our good words will go in
one ear and out the other. It's dur-
ing this transition—which probably
will last for years—that we must
remove subversive influences. If we
don't they will prolong the period,
and might even produce a rebel-
lion, for the Germans won't regard
the Allied regime in the same light
as they would one of their own, to
be obeyed without reservation.

The two most menacing influences
today are the Nazi leaders, big and
little, and those Prussian militarists
who for generations have kept Eu-
rope in turmoil. If they are allowed
their freedom to play on the emo-
tions of a defeated and unhappy
people, grave things can happen.
These leaders must in some way be
"liquidated."

As we survey this uncomfortable
situation, President Truman's state-
ment has the most possible encourage-
ment we could have in his statement
that he and General Eisenhower agree
that a free press should prevail in
Germany in a manner consistent
with military security. The Presi-
dent says this is a reversal of the
position taken last week by Elmer
Davis, chief of the Office of War

Information, who contended infor-
mation reaching the Germans
should be strictly controlled.

The sure way to lead the German
people into the light is to give them
real acquaintance with the outside
world. One of Hitler's chief means
of regimentation was to deprive the
public of honest news of other
countries. He fed them what he
thought was good for them, so that
they came to regard the United
Nations as ogres. A free press will
change that.

progress was made.
But a world court finally was cre-
ated in 1921 when the old League of
Nations was established. It had
headquarters in The Hague in Hol-
land. The first session was held in
1922.

The judges—15 of them—were
elected by the League of Nations to
serve 9-year terms each. They were
chosen for personal ability.
Although several Americans have
sat as judges of the court, the sen-
ate would never ratify participation
by the United States.

It insisted that the court could
not—without the consent of the
United States—even receive a re-
quest for an opinion in any dispute
involving this country. So the United
States stayed out.

Because of the invasion of Hol-
land, the court has not been able to
hold any sessions in The Hague
since 1940.

Now in San Francisco the dele-
gates are working out plans for a
new world court.

So far the delegates seem not to
have been able to make up their
minds on two points:

1. Whether any nation joining the
new league of nations should be
forced—by agreeing beforehand
to take its international disputes in-
to the new court.

2. Whether the court's decisions
will be binding on nations involved
in disputes.

The United Nations must decide
before adjourning this conference.

Doughton Boosts Broughton For Cabinet Job

Washington, May 16 (AP)—J.
Melville Broughton, former North
Carolina governor and now counsel
for tobacco warehousemen, is the
man Rep. Doughton (D-NC) wants
appointed to President Truman's
cabinet.

The Dean of the House acknowl-
edged that he's doing some conceit-
ed thinking about a Southerner
in the cabinet. He said as soon as
he's sure there will be a vacancy
he will get down to organized work.
"I don't want to shove anybody
out," he told a reporter.

The Secretary of Agriculture is
the post the Carolinian Congress-
man most wants to see filled by a
Carolinian—or at least by a South-
erner.

Both Broughton and Rep. Cooley
(D-NC) have been mentioned for
the agriculture job when and if
there's a vacancy. Cooley now is
heading a delegation studying agri-
culture surplus markets in Europe.

Doughton said David F. Houston
is the only man born in the South
who has served as Secretary of
Agriculture. And Houston, he said,
lived at St. Louis at the time of
his cabinet appointment although
he was a native of North Carolina.
Houston was named Secretary of
Agriculture by President Wilson,
and later became Treasury Secre-
tary. Doughton thinks it's time for
a 100 per cent Southerner who has
stayed in the South to take over the
job.

Okla.) introduced legislation to
create a 12-member commission to
study all the problems relating to
the presidential chair and recom-
mend a fixed order of succession.

His bill provides that the Speaker
resign from Congress and be sworn
in as President in the event death
or disability should strike both the
Chief Executive and the Vice Presi-
dent.

"That would keep the Presidency
in the hands of a man elected by
the people," Monroney told a re-
porter.

In the event the House was not in
session at the time the Presidency

became vacant a second time the
President Pro Tem of the Senate
would become Chief Executive only
long enough for the House to con-
vene and elect a Speaker. The lat-
ter would promptly resign and take
over the White House.

Monroney recommended that the
study commission be composed of
four Supreme Court Justices, four
presidential appointees, two Sen-
ators and two Representatives and
that it report to Congress by July 1,
1948.

In addition to recommending the
order of Presidential succession, the

group also would:
1. Define Presidential disability
and decide who shall say when
a President is unable to serve.
2. Consider changes in the
methods of electing Presidents with
the possible abolition of the elect-
oral college.
3. Decide who would be Presi-
dent should both the President and
Vice President be unable to take
office on Inauguration Day.

to Naha, the capital city.
The counterattack was a full scale
attempt by the enemy to turn the
tide of the campaign, in the opinion
of one officer.

"We've killed so damned many of
them we know they are throwing
a full scale blow at us," he said.

Okinawa ground action was high-
lighted by the seizure, after five
days of hard fighting, of strategic
"Chocolate Dron" Hill in the central
sector by the 7th Infantry Division.
The promontory provides the
Doughboys with a valuable observa-
tion point.

The Japanese again made an a-
bortive counterlanding attempt near
hard-won Machinato airfield behind
Sixth Marine Division lines. Naval
gunfire smashed the landing boats.
In the suburbs of Okinawa's cap-
ital city, Naha, the Japanese coun-
terattack was hurled back to Taka-
motoji village with heavy losses.

A Japanese attempt to drive the
96th Infantry Division off Conical
Hill similarly was repulsed.

Incomplete returns indicated that
10 U. S. planes were lost in the
two days and one night's carrier
operation. Radio Tokyo said more
than 1,000 American planes were in-
volved.

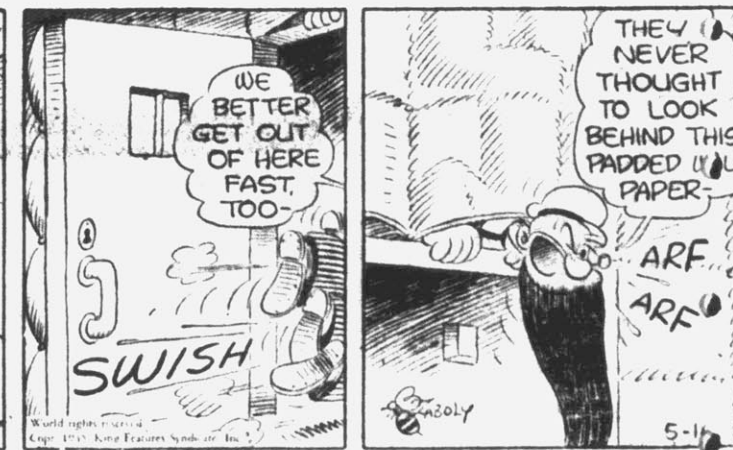

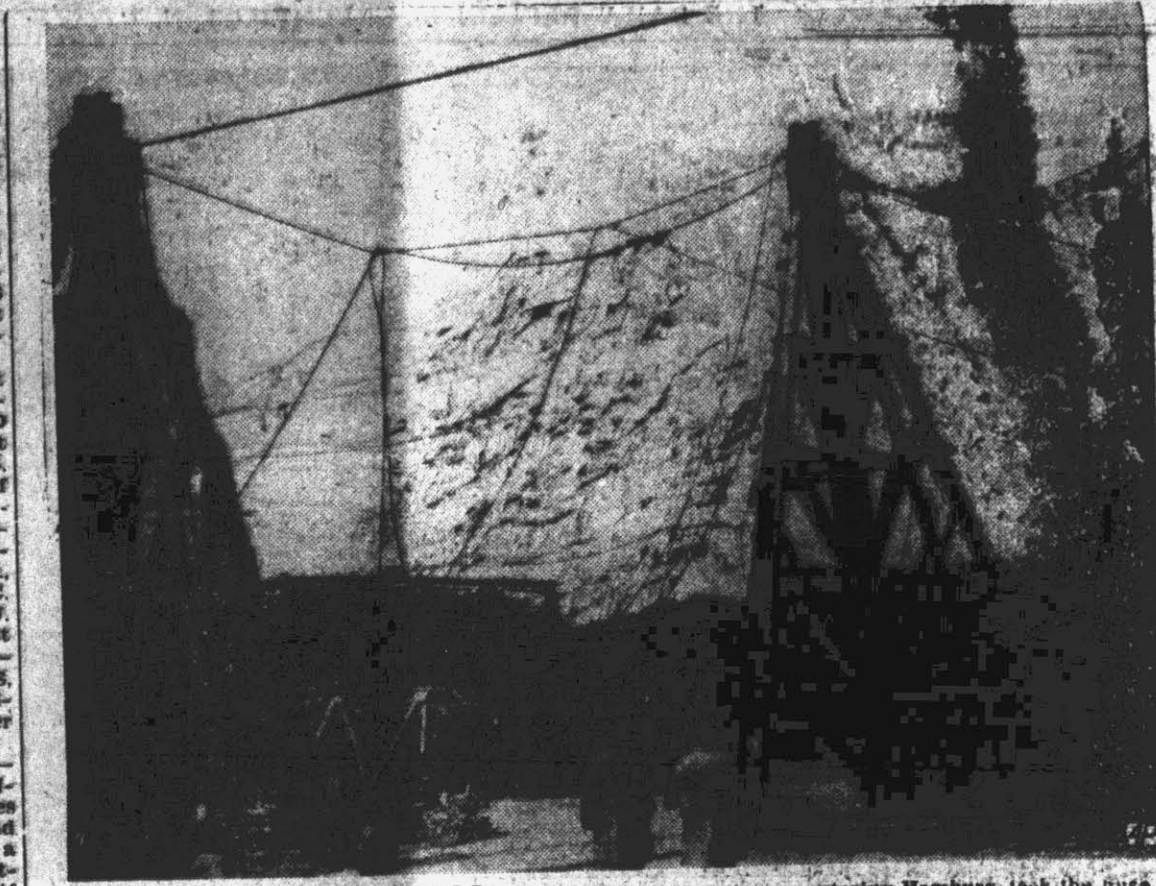

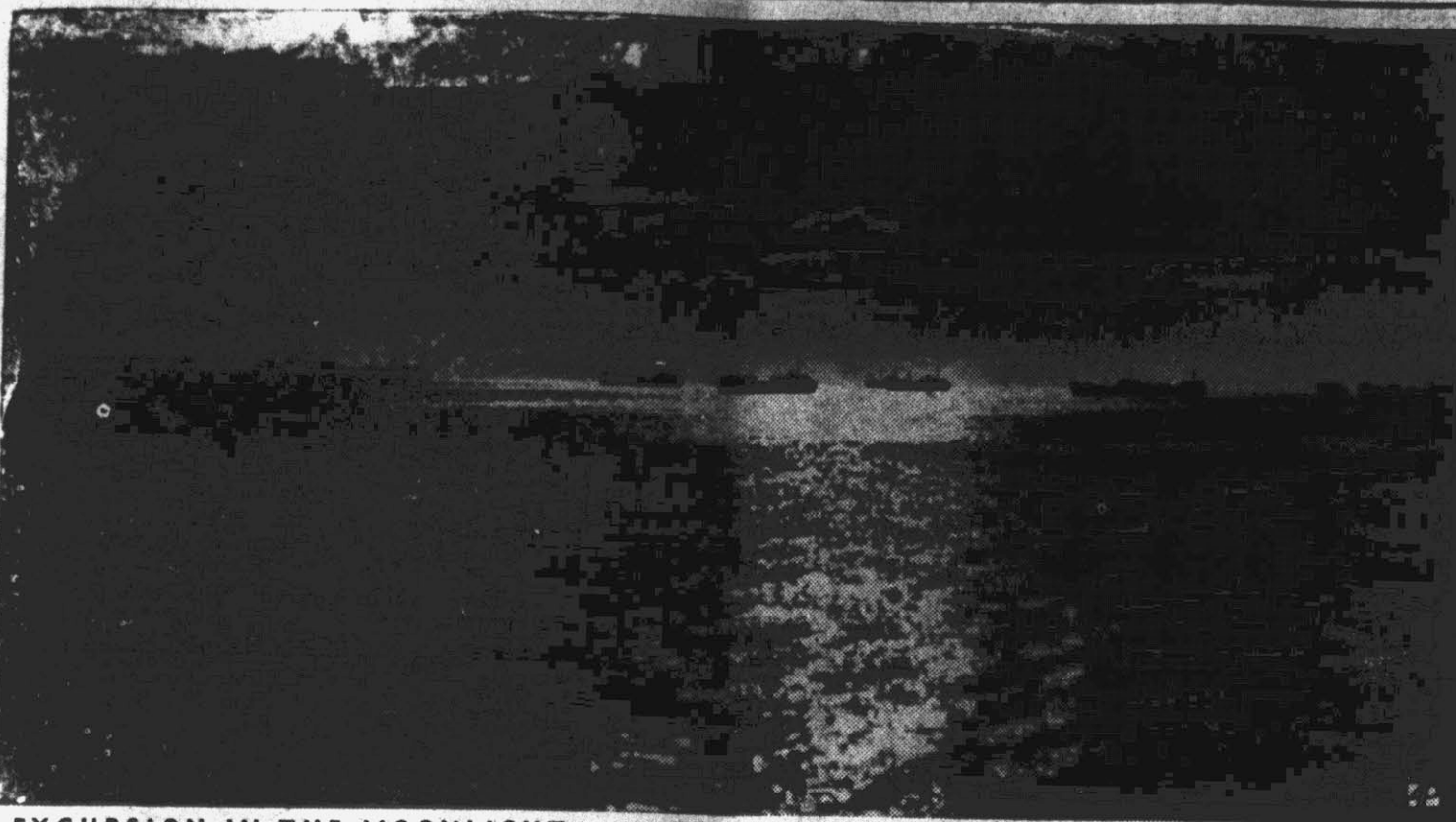

PLACE BAN ON SPORT TRAVEL

Schools And Colleges Asked To Curtail Events

Washington, May 16 (AP)—All post-season events and many high school tournaments were ruled out today by the Office of Defense Transportation's voluntary travel curtailment program for athletes.

College and high school athletic associations pledged their full support and an ODT spokesman stressing the program's voluntary nature, said the agency will not be "hard boiled" about putting it in effect.

"The spirit of the program calls for immediate cancellation of many events already scheduled," he said, "but there will be some cases where that might work a hardship. In those few instances we won't expect compliance."

ODT officials also emphasized that New Year's day events would be permitted if the transportation situation eased sufficiently.

The program includes these points:

1. Elimination of high school tournaments that involve the use of transportation facilities beyond suburban areas.
2. Localize and simplify schedules of athletic contests; exclude contests involving an absence of more than 48 hours from campus; elimi-

nate all unreasonably long trips.

3. Schedule contests only for the home grounds of one or the other of the competing teams, or for fields located in cities between the respective home grounds of the competing teams.
4. Limit ticket sales for all events to the immediate vicinities in which they are played; discourage attendance at away-from-home contests by undergraduates, alumni and other sports followers not living in the vicinity of the contest.
5. Route team trips away from congested transportation centers and away from main travel arteries; reduce to an absolute minimum the number of athletes making trips; limit the number of coaches, cheerleaders and managers making trips, and exclude completely bands, etc., not essential to the competition.
6. Where feasible eliminate transportation of equipment through use by both teams of the home team's equipment; where feasible, replace home-and-home competition by two or more contests at a single location.
7. Eliminate from schedules all events not essential to the conduct of athletic events.

Announcing the program yesterday, ODT Director J. Monroe Johnson said games scheduled at more than home fields might have to be eliminated unless the transportation situation improves before the football season.

Censorship to End

London, May 16 (AP)—Minister of Information Brendan Bracken announced today that all international censorship in Britain now had ceased and that within 30 days censorship of mail to the United States, Canada and Gibraltar would be lifted.

to the three as "experienced trial lawyers."

Donovan, a Congressional Medal of Honor winner in World War I as leader of the famous "Fighting 69th," long was referred to as the "mystery man" of World War II. The title grew out of his extensive European travels in 1940-41 and the hush-hush air surrounding O.S.S.

Returning from one trip abroad in the summer of 1940, he said he had been looking into the technique of the Nazi fifth column. The following spring he visited England, the Balkans and the Near East. In July, 1941, President Roosevelt named Donovan coordinator of information bearing on the defense program. From there he took over O.S.S. Now 62, he was an assistant attorney general in the Coolidge administration.

Jackson said he was setting up only a small staff "because of the work already going on in government departments on the subject of war crimes."

"This staff includes personnel familiar with the problems and the available data, and the selections were made in furtherance of Justice Jackson's determination that the trials of the leading war criminals must be held without delay."

Alderman, 52-year-old native of Greensboro, N. C., served overseas as a captain in the last war and spent four months after the armistice in graduate study at Sorbonne University in Paris. He has been granted leave by the Southern Railway.

The 39-year-old Shea, who was born at Manchester, N. H., has been an assistant attorney general since 1939 in charge of the claims division. He previously served as a specialist in the legal division of the Securities and Exchange Commission.

Brig. Gen. Frank J. McSherry of the SHAEF military government section said the first four grades of German schools would be reopened and that textbooks, purged of militarism, were being printed.

Ambassador Robert Murphy, political advisor to Gen. Eisenhower, said the use of Doenitz and others in no way meant a recognition of the "Flensburg group" as the government of Germany.

Count Ludwig Schwerin von Krosigk, so far as the Allies are concerned, does not exist officially as Doenitz's foreign minister. His recent broadcast was wholly unauthorized and made before the Allies seized the radio station and there will be no repetition of such propaganda, the ambassador said.

The amount of German partici-

pation in administration will be for a long time on low levels, particularly in the rural areas around the cities, it was explained. Further:

There will be no national puppet government for the present. The German high command, which they call the Oberkommando der Wehrmacht, will be dissolved.

Senate Confirms Gilliam As Judge

Washington, May 16 (AP)—The appointment of Solicitor Don Gilliam of Tarboro to be Federal Judge of the Eastern District of North Carolina was confirmed by the Senate yesterday.

Gilliam will succeed Judge I. M. Meekins of Elizabeth City who retired in February upon reaching his 70th birthday.

Word received here said Gilliam planned to take the oath of office Saturday morning at Tarboro.

Negro Woman Drops Dead At Bell Arthur

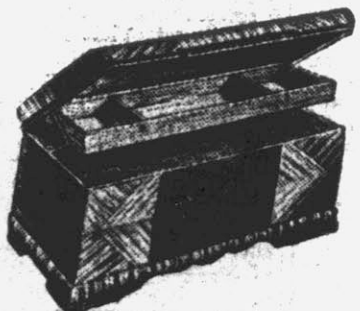
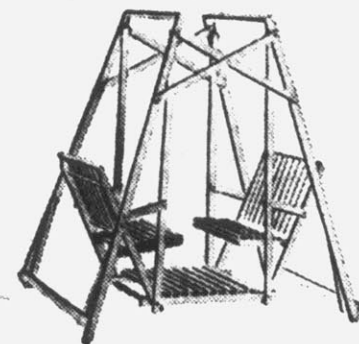

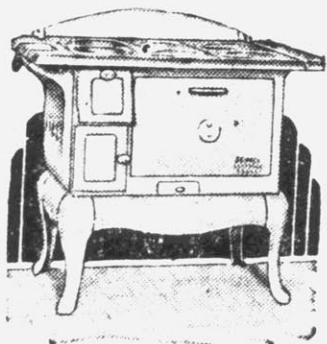
