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France Requests Allies To Seek Means To Put End To Franco Regime

French Foreign Affairs Committee Recommends Immediate Break With Spain; Return Of Laval To France Demanded: Rome Says Spain Harboring Fascist Officials

Paris, May 25—(AP)—The French Foreign Affairs Committee recommended today that the government break relations with Spain and that France propose to other Allied governments means to be taken to force the resignation of Generalissimo Franco.

The committee is composed of members of the Assembly and it corresponds roughly to the United States Foreign Relations Committee.

The recommendation to Gen. De Gaulle's government asserted that the Franco regime was no different from the erstwhile Fascist government of Italy before its surrender.

The Spanish regime was termed a menace to world democracy.

The committee also demanded that the government lose no further time in forcing Spain to hand over Pierre Laval to France. Laval, chief of government in the Vichy regime, is under death sentence in France as a traitor and is in custody in Spain after fleeing Germany by air.

The committee said the Allies should take joint action to remove Franco, head of the Spanish government since the old republic was overthrown in civil war, and provide the Spanish people with the means of holding an immediate consultative election.

The committee said the Franco regime was forcibly imposed and that throughout the European war its neutrality was a fiction. The pronouncement said the security of France demanded the resignation of Franco and the substitution of a republican form of government.

The Laval case has been developing over the past three weeks into a serious dispute. He landed at Barcelona early this month.

France asked Spain to deliver him to the frontier and the Spaniards refused.

Both the United States and Great Britain were reported to have urged Spain to surrender him. The attitude of both governments, however, was said to have been that the Laval affair should be settled directly between France and Spain.

The suggestion that a British warship take him to a French port was said to have been accepted by the British foreign office, but it was reported here that Britain later balked. Laval may eventually be flown back to France.

Even as the French committee spoke out, the Communist party publication, *L'Unité*, in Rome called on the Italian government to break off diplomatic relations with Spain, charging that Franco was giving refuge to high ranking Fascists.

The newspaper asserted that Filippo Anfuso, Italian Fascist ambassador to Berlin, had arrived in Barcelona late in April aboard a "Croc" plane and was using the name of Count Monti di Monsassino. The publication said:

"Pending application by the democratic governments of the Yalta decisions, which provide for complete destruction of all remnants of Fascism, let us for once set the example by breaking with Franco."

AIRMEN POUND TOKYO AGAIN

Superforts Today Added New Fires To Those Already Raging From Wednesday's Attack

Washington, May 25—(AP)—Another big fleet of Superfortresses rained fire on Tokyo today as 20th Airforce headquarters announced the loss of 12 B-29s in Wednesday's record attack.

It was the heaviest loss yet suffered by a B-29 mission.

The 12 Superfortresses were shot down out of a 550-plane fleet, the biggest thus far sent against the Japanese capital.

A "heavy concentration of anti-aircraft fire" was primarily responsible, headquarters here reported, adding that fighter plane opposition was less severe.

The highest previous loss was in mid-April when 11 planes went down under enemy action during a Tokyo attack. In that instance, however, the percentage of loss was higher because the size of the force was smaller.

Today's raid on the still-flaming capital was carried out by perhaps as many as 500 of the big warplanes.

The B-29s roared up from bases in the Marianas to heap new destruction on the Japanese capital, already deeply scarred from previous incendiary attacks.

Announcement of the latest blow at Japan was made by 20th air force headquarters here. Details of the strike will be released, headquarters said, when the big bombers have returned to their bases.

Wednesday's attack (U. S. time) was carried out by more than 550 Superfortresses which dropped 4,500 tons of incendiaries in what was described as the biggest single air blow of the Pacific war.

Fires, visible for 200 miles, spread through the waterfront railroad yards and aircraft production plants near the imperial palace.

AN ANALYSIS OF THE NEWS

The early meeting of the big three, which Washington announces is "in the works," is calculated to pour oil on the troubled international waters, and consequently can't be held too soon.

This is the hurricane season for the United Nations, and is an especially trying time for the big three upon whom falls the brunt of the task of keeping the Allied ship on a fairly even keel. The end of the Hitlerian war has intensified cross-currents which had been developing. The Polish question, the Yugoslav claims to Italian and Austrian territory, the problems attendant on the occupation of Germany, the generally disturbed condition of the Balkans, the activities of the Communist cells throughout Europe.

It's no exaggeration to say that the next few months will represent the most dangerous period which the Allies are likely to encounter. We must deal with these cross-currents promptly.

If fate projects a split among the big three—which heaven forbid—it probably will come in this early

danger period. If we can pass through that safely, then the sailing should be increasingly good.

There are numerous factors entering into this danger period but the most important are these: (1) Mutual suspicions of political and economic intentions, and (2) the fact that the Russian and British sphere of influence are undergoing radical changes as the Red tide advances westward and covers zones over which John Bull and France heretofore have held sway.

The Yugoslav difficulty illustrates the point very well. Yugoslavia comes within Russia's new zone of influence and it's a fair assumption that this fiery Balkan state's politico-military leader, Marshal Tito, in making his claims would act in a manner which he thought would be acceptable to Moscow. If this assumption is correct, then it's logical to conclude that Tito was inspired by Moscow to adopt a conciliatory attitude in France of the Anglo-American opposition to his occupation of the disputed territory.

Anyway, one hopes that this is what happened, for it would be a (Continued on Page Four)

JAPS FALLING BACK IN CHINA

Chinese High Command Reports New Advances

Chungking, May 25—(AP)—Chinese troops sweeping down the Kweichow-Kwangsi railroad last night captured Kweichow, an important Kweichow stronghold, 50 miles northwest of Luichow, a Chinese army spokesman announced today.

The Japanese have been reported by the Chinese high command to be falling back toward Ishan, 43 miles northwest of Luichow. The Chinese drive evidently was aimed at Luichow itself, a former American air base in Kwangsi which now is a strategic rail junction stronghold along the enemy lifeline corridor between Manchuria and Indo-China.

Capture of Hwaiyuanchen was effected after a 23-mile gain from Szengzen (Seenhsein), which the Chinese reported earlier to have been encircled.

On the East China coast the Japanese, swept from positions which they had fortified against possible American landings, have hurried fresh troops into an attempt to stem their own retreat northeast of Chinese-held Poochow.

A special Chinese communique said last night that warship-borne enemy troops were rushed into the sector where the Japanese have fallen back to a point near Loyuan, 31 miles northeast of Poochow. Landings were made Tuesday north of Loyuan from "several warships," but the enemy was being checked with the air of local militia, the communique said.

Cigarettes To Be Rationed By Navy

Beginning June 3, the 6th naval district will ration cigarettes, cigars, and smoking tobacco to all navy marines, and coast guard personnel in its territory. The district embraces Georgia, South Carolina, and part of North Carolina.

Headquarters said today ration cards were being issued on which each holder will be permitted to buy six packs of cigarettes per week. The army announced adoption of a similar system several days ago.

Distillers Get Another Holiday

Washington, May 25—(AP)—The situation is looking up for the thirsty.

Distillers have been released from turning out industrial alcohol during July. This will mean more than 50,000,000 proof gallons of beverage spirits for warehousing, thus releasing existing stocks for retail shelves.

The liquor "holiday" will be the third since the industry converted to industrial alcohol production in October, 1942. Production in each of the first two—in August, 1944, and January, 1945—exceeded 50,000,000 proof gallons.

Still unsettled is whether the respite means anything for bourbon drinkers.

The War Food Administration has yet to decide whether there is enough corn to permit using some of it for bourbon. None was made in August, only limited quantities in January.

Conference To Seek To Keep Yalta Agreement

Stettinius Returns to San Francisco to Speed Settlement of Critical Veto Issue

San Francisco, May 25—(AP)—The big powers are reported today to have lined up enough votes in the United Nations conference to block any change in their absolute control of world machinery designed to preserve peace.

This issue—the veto power of any of the Big Five over settling international disputes or using force to smash an aggressor—is the most critical remaining for this assembly of 49 nations. The decision hour comes as the conference enters its second month and Secretary of State Stettinius returns from talks in Washington with President Truman.

Many committees are striving to wind up their work by this weekend in order to allow public discussion of their reports to begin in the four big conference commissions early next week.

Among their latest accomplishments are agreements on provisions designed to strengthen the economic and social work of the new league, and to outlaw secret treaties, once the world organization is functioning.

In the veto dispute many small nations are demanding that the authority of the big powers in a projected world organization be restricted sharply so that an 11-nation security council could try by peaceful means to settle troubles between nations even over big-power objections.

The British delegation has proposed a compromise to meet that demand. Some United States dele-

gates like the compromise idea, but say that in view of commitments already made to Russia at Yalta they can not press it. Russia has been standing firm on the Yalta formula which provides that any one of the big powers can "veto" a council decision to take action.

Last night a committee of United States, Russian, British and Chinese officials drafted a statement in reply to small nation questions about this formula. This statement promises that any nation, great or small, may bring a dispute before the security council and that the council may discuss it without taking a vote. Thus the veto could not be used to prevent the airing of charges and counter-charges.

Beyond that point — when the council was deciding whether to investigate the dispute or what other action to take — a vote would be required and any one of the big powers—Russia, Britain, the United States, France or China—could prevent council action by voting "no."

The only limitation under the Yalta formula is that if one of the Big Five, or any other of the 11 members on the council, was itself involved in a dispute, it could not vote as long as only (1) investigation and (2) peaceful settlement decisions were being made. Once it came to a question of using force, however, each of the powers would have a vote, accused or not.

The statement worked out by the Big four technicians now goes before Stettinius, Britain's Earl of Halifax, Ambassador Andrei Gromyko of Russia, and Foreign Minister (Continued on page four)

Closing Pincers On Japs; Mindanao Split By Yanks

Junction of American Forces On Mindanao Sets Stage For Mop Up Fights With Survivors Of Jap Garrison Of 50,000

Manila, May 25—(AP)—Fighting on Mindanao island was officially termed in the "mopping-up stage" today but thousands of Japanese troops remain to be dug out of mountain positions before the big southern Philippine island can be considered won.

The enemy's Mindanao garrison, once estimated at 50,000 troops, was bisected Wednesday when the 31st infantry division, sweeping north along the Sayre highway, met the 40th and American divisions which came down from Macajalar Bay.

Associated Press Correspondent Richard Bergholz reported that advance elements met near Impulatao village, recent headquarters of the Japanese 35th army. The junction was lightly opposed.

Splitting the island from north to south was largely a victory for the Engineers. Scores of enemy-blasted bridges were rebuilt hastily to keep the swift columns rolling.

The campaign forced the Japanese from the central plateau into mountains where the inevitable cave by cave cleanout now confronts the doughboys.

The heaviest fighting on Mindanao was north of Davao, where the 24th division still was routing out last-stand Nipponese between the Davao and Thaloibo rivers. Licanan airbase nearby still was in Japanese hands, although 24th division doughboys were approaching it against moderate resistance.

One regiment of the 24th, meantime, moved up the Davao gulf coast and joined a guerrilla force driving south.

Gen. Douglas MacArthur said today the junction in northern Mindanao completed the Yank hold on the central road net of the island.

Fernosa took another heavy aerial pasting. Escorted heavy and medium bombers dropped 235 tons of bombs on air bases, railway yards, barracks and industrial plants.

Two 5th air force Liberators flying up China's Yangtze river sank or damaged five freighters, the largest of 5,000 tons.

A navy Privateer set nine Japanese landing craft afire 60 miles northwest of Poochow. An ocean-going tug was sunk by another Privateer. (Continued on Page Four)

Lt. Wilbur Brown Coming Back Home

Jesse W. Brown of Greenville has received a letter from his grandson, Lieut. Wilbur H. Brown, U. S. Army, who is in France, stating that he had been liberated by the Russians from Stalag Luft 1, a German prisoner of war camp, and expects to start for home shortly. He was taken prisoner by the Germans on November 13, 1943, and held 18 months.

Lieut. Brown stated in his letter that he and other prisoners were taken in planes to Reims, France, and from there by railroad to the French coast. He was liberated on May 13, Mothers' Day. He said when he and other prisoners saw Allied planes flying over it was a great sight. Brown said he was in good health, receiving good treatment in Allied hands, but that there was much confusion.

Jaycees Ready For Scrap Paper Drive

Put out all your waste paper Sunday—no matter whether you have only one newspaper or five hundred pounds. Every single bit of paper will help the Greenville Junior Chamber of Commerce to reach its goal of 50,000 lbs. of waste paper in one afternoon's collection.

"The calls from the War Production Board's Salvage Division for the collection of scrap paper," Alton Barrett who heads the collection said today, "have become increasingly numerous and it has been pointed out to us that there have been numerous uses for paper that just isn't there and won't be there unless every available piece of scrap paper is collected and turned into the proper channels." Some paper mills have been forced to shut down temporarily because of the scarcity of waste paper.

All merchants who have too much paper or cardboard to place in front of their stores are urged to contact the Junior Chamber and efforts will be made to have this paper removed. Residents of the city are asked to tie their papers and magazines in bundles and place them in front of their homes before two o'clock on Sunday afternoon. A Jaycee truck will collect all bundles during the afternoon.

Residents of the county who have paper for the drive are asked to bring their bundles into town and turn them over to some member of the Jaycees or leave them at Bissette's Drug Store for collection.

Scott Dixon Wins In Land Deed Suit

San Francisco, May 25—(AP)—It's one of the amazing things of a lifetime to see the sweat and torture that go into writing a single word at the United Nations conference.

The new world league is being put together one word at a time, then a sentence, then a paragraph. The delegates struggle for hours and days over a single word.

Should it be used in the charter? They put it in, take it out, put it in again. They argue over it in their committee rooms.

That's one of the chief reasons for this conference bumping along so slowly.

Dr. Howard E. Wilson, professor of education at Harvard University and a consultant to the American delegation, says he never before realized so fully the implications in a single word.

For example, take the phrase "full employment." The delegates batted that one around. The Russians wanted the league to say it recognized all men's "right to work." Then Australia and some others said the league should promote full

Foot Soldiers Carry War Against Japs On Okinawa As Bad Weather Stalls The Mechanized Units; Flanking Movement About Shuri Threatens Entrapment Of 30,000 Japs

Guam, May 25—(AP)—The Tenth army's flanking pincers on fortress Shuri in the center of the Okinawa front was pulled tighter today as Seventh infantry troops expanded their bulge below Yonabaru.

The 32nd regiment, pushed ahead to 1,800 yards south of the east coast seaport, while the 184th moved into positions 1,500 yards southwest of the town to maintain the pace. Maj. Gen. Archibald V. Arnold's units have set, despite clinging mud which mired everything on wheels. Japanese movements indicated the enemy would attempt to set up another defense line two miles to the south.

Before Shuri, in the center of the line, 77th infantrymen moved through a small village, meeting only small arms fire, while west and south of the fortress town, fire marines seized Asato village, killing a dozen of 80 some Japanese encountered.

Small counterattacks were beaten back by the 86th infantry east of Shuri, while tough marines fought through the streets of Naha on the extreme west.

The move by Maj. Gen. Lemuel C. Shepherd, Jr., Sixth division of Leathernecks could become a flanking movement to the east for the conquest of the principal stronghold at the fortress city of Shuri.

With grenades, flame throwers and small arms the marines were moving forward, it was said, as a result of weeks of heavy mortar and air bombardment.

Strong points were being reduced by the slugging marines, who crossed Asato river in strength yesterday on bridges their engineers built under heavy artillery fire. One of the bridges appears to be large enough to support mechanized units when weather permits their use.

The weather continued bad, however, and with mechanized units mired in mud the campaign is wholly a foot soldiers' war all the way across the line from northeastern Naha to a point south of Yonabaru on the east coast. Near Yonabaru, Maj. Gen. Archibald V. Arnold's 7th division doughboys—again infantrymen alone—were enlarging the American-held area south and west in a move that may become an encirclement of Shuri fortress in the central sector of the "Little Siegfried" line.

Meanwhile, in the center of the line, units of Maj. Gen. Pedro A. Del Valle's First marine division were mopping up isolated Japanese (Continued on Page Four)

It made the unconfirmed report that the mansions of three imperial princes either were gutted or partially burned along with the French and Italian embassies, the Mexico legation, the official residences of the minister of education and the minister of transport.

Officials of the 21st bomber command here hesitated to estimate results due to difficulties of obtaining clear pictures of the devastation. Clouds of smoke still billowed over the bombed area along Tokyo bay a few miles south of the imperial palace.

Returning pilots, however, declared the raid was highly successful, due to good visibility when they hit their targets just prior to dawn yesterday.

NEW SUGAR CUT LOOMS

Industrial Users To Get Less Next Quarter

By HOWARD FLIEGER

Washington, May 25—(AP)—A congressional food investigator said today OPA is planning a drastic curtailment of industrial sugar which will cut manufacturers to half their 1944 supply, or less.

The new restriction will be announced for the third quarter of the year, effective July 1, said this lawmaker who asked not to be named.

Sugar is rationed to industrial users—bakers, candy makers and the like—in quarterly allotments.

The new cut became necessary because civilian sugar consumption early this year far exceeded the amount originally set aside.

Chairman Anderson (D-NM) of the House Food Committee said that in April alone, when use was supposed to be 60,000 tons under the corresponding month in 1944, consumption actually ran 95,000 tons ahead of last year. This resulted in a deficit of more than 150,000 tons.

The withdrawal from sugar stockpiles came about, Anderson said, because OPA ration boards issued allotments in excess of the supply set aside for civilian consumption.

The over-draft must be made up beginning with the third quarter.

The investigator said he did not know whether the restriction would be extended to household supplies of sugar.

Industrial users, however, probably will be cut to 40 per cent or less of the amount they used in 1944. There was some indication they might be held to 30 per cent.

Last year industrialists received 80 per cent of their 1941 supply but the planned new restriction would cut them to half that amount.

Anderson said the fact sugar was over-allotted in April was evidence supporting his committee's argument that the government's sugar controls lack the coordination to make them effective. The committee found 20 government agencies with a hand in the sugar program, and strongly recommended that the whole problem be placed under the control of one man to handle production, distribution and marketing.

Anderson shortly will become that man. President Truman has named him agriculture secretary and food czar.

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Navy To Revert To Old System

Washington, May 25—(AP)—President Truman has approved a return to a full four year course at the U. S. Naval Academy, Annapolis, the navy announced today.

Since June, 1941, the academy has been operating on a short three year schedule to meet the urgent need for young officers to fill assignments in combat areas.

The return to normal schedules will become effective at the end of the present spring term in June. The changeover will be accomplished by dividing, according to academic standing, the present fourth class (class of 1946) into two halves, with the upper half of this class to continue the present three year course, graduating in June 1947.

The lower half of the class will become the third class and will graduate in June 1948.

The Chinese were reported advancing close to Luyuan, after driving 9-12 miles beyond captured Lienkung, 20 miles northeast of Poochow. Meanwhile other Chinese bolstered their positions in the Poochow area and mopped up enemy remnants on the north bank of the Min River, the treaty port's outlet to the sea.

The army spokesman said that during the past month the Japanese had replaced three veteran divisions with their west wall in China, moving them either to Manchuria to help meet a "possible emergency" or to strengthen major garrison points on the coast against an American invasion.

"There is a possibility," he said, "that this withdrawal is being continued."

The Japanese also may be withdrawing from isolated pockets on China's east coast such as Swatow, Amoy and Wenchow—and moving to such cities as Shanghai or Canton, where defenses continually are being strengthened.

There has been virtually no reduction in the strength of forces manning the hinterland bulwark of the enemy's defenses, the spokesman said. He said the badly mauled enemy 18th and 54th divisions had been transferred from Burma by way of Indo-China into Kwangsi, where they are being re-formed.

Neiro Executed

Raleigh, May 25—(AP)—Horis Hill, 22-year-old Jones county negro, died today in the state's gas chamber for the slaying of two negro women.

Death occurred nine minutes after the gas started rising.

USO To Continue

Salt Lake City, May 25—(AP)—United Service Organization center will continue to operate for about two years after V-J day, during demobilization according to Mrs. Elizabeth Luce Moore, chairman of the national USO council.

Gen. Clark Enroute Home

Washington, May 25—(AP)—General Mark Clark, commander of the 15th army group in Italy, is expected to arrive in the United States within a few days, a War Department spokesman said today.

No details were given on Clark's visit except that he is scheduled to participate in Memorial Day ceremonies in Chicago.

Christmas Tree Lights

Washington, May 25—(AP)—The War Production Board today revoked its 1942 ban on the manufacture of Christmas tree lights and other decorative electric light bulbs, subject to availability of materials, facilities and manpower.

To Cancel Quotas

Charlotte, May 25—(AP)—The Office of Price Administration announced today that quota bases would not be issued and that existing ones would be cancelled for all class II commercial meat slaughterers who for any three accounting periods, whether consecutive or not, since Jan. 1, 1944, did not surrender any of the required ration points.

New Club Is Doing Effective Community Work

Ayden, May 25—The Ayden Lions Club at its weekly supper meeting last night sponsored the Pitt County Association for the Blind for the good work it is doing for the blind and near blind in the county.

Miss Manning of Bethel, blind case-worker, told the members in an interesting and entertaining manner about her work and the gratifying results achieved. She had her "seeing-eye" dog, Eva, with her, and gave some interesting facts about the dog's loyalty, how the animals are trained and how they can get about so safely.

Frank M. Brown of Greenville, president of the association, introduced Miss Manning and gave a history of the association. The Greenville Lions Club sponsored the organizing of the association and saw it through to completion and continues to cooperate with it. He explained that through the association, backed by the federal and state governments, Miss Manning was employed as full time worker among the blind and near blind in the county. He enumerated some of her activities in working with those who have lost their eyesight, partially or entirely; how she helps the blind to become self-supporting; making contacts whereby those with defective vision may have proper diagnosis and treatment. It was an interesting story about the good work being done. Assistance for the blind is not only provided for the indigent, but for all who need the service. Eyesight has been restored to five persons in this county with the assistance of the association. Clinics for persons with defective vision are provided from time to time.

Miss Manning impressed the Ayden Lions when she said that at the "Seeing-Eye" Dog Institute in New Jersey a blind person is trained for a month with the dog he or she buys. It requires three months to train the German police and other dogs and three years to train the men who train the dogs.

The Ayden Lions Club, recently organized under sponsorship of the Greenville Club, is composed of a group of progressive men who really do things in the community. They are alive and wide awake and a spirit of good cheer features the club meetings. William Newsome is president, J. B. Hemby, J. D. Cannon and T. D. Caton, vice presidents; Clay Stroud, secretary-treasurer; Mark Dixon, treasurer; Raymond Cox, lion tamer; Radford Holton, J. A. Johnson, Joe D. Tripp and Larry Tripp are directors. The club meets Monday nights at 8 o'clock. It has 25 members.

G. I. Bill Of Rights

Titles III and IV

Title III of this bill has to do with the veteran's right to borrow money under certain conditions for the purchase or construction of a home, a farm or business property. The administration of the rights under this title lies primarily in the hands of the lending agency, that is, the bank, Building and Loan Association, etc., with which the veteran chooses to do business. Complete information can be obtained from any bank or other financial institution designated to handle such.

Under Title IV, "Employment of Veterans," the primary responsibility for this type of service to the discharged veteran has been placed in the hands of the United States Employment Service which is at present under the administration of the War Manpower Commission acting in cooperation with various other federal and state agencies.

In the enactment of the provisions of this Title (IV) Congress declares as its intent and purpose that there shall be "an effective job-counseling and employment placement service" for veterans, to provide for them a maximum of job opportunities in the field of gainful employment.

See the "veterans' employment representative" attached to the local United States Employment Service office.

Beef Production Payment Program

Announcement of the beef production payment program by the War Food Administration, effective May 19, 1945, has been received by J. V. Taylor, chairman, Pitt County AAA Committee.

In explaining the program, the AAA leader pointed out that the payment rate will be 50 cents per hundredweight for good and choice cattle owned and fed by the applicant at least 30 days prior to selling. Cattle are required to weigh 800 pounds (live weight) or more, and to be sold to a licensed slaughterer.

Payments will probably be made similar to payments earned under the Dairy Production Payment Program and cattlemen are urged to keep accurate records of sales, Taylor said.

Cattlemen will be furnished complete information relative to details of the program as soon as it is received by the Pitt County AAA Committee.

Greenville Man In Action On Okinawa

Okinawa, May 23—(Delayed)—(AP)—Three Marine scout teams paved the way for today's mass penetration of Naha, rubble-filled capital of Okinawa.

The first of these scout teams to go into Naha was led by Corp. Fuller Curtis, Hudson, N. Y. Curtis, who killed 27 Japanese on New Britain in the Southwest Pacific, waded waist deep across the muddy stream separating the Marine-held section of Northern Naha from the main part of the city.

Cpl. Gardner C. O'Brien, 21, 1 Bass St., Beverly, Mass., led the second scout team; Cpl. Alexander J. Wizecki, 23, Brooklyn, N. Y., the third.

The Wizecki team climbed the seawall extending up the river bank and penetrated the Naha ruins to the main road.

Pvt. Raymond L. Keel, 20, Greenville, N. C., said: "On the side street

about 200 yards beyond the river, I saw shadows moving in the darkness. It was two Nips trailed by a third. I shot one and the other two took off. Later, down a road we saw two more who didn't see us."

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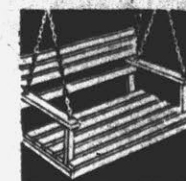

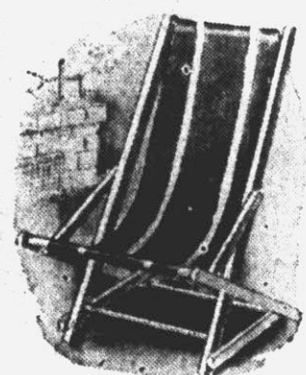
