Witnesses Picture Petain Greatest Of All Traitors

Former Premier Says All Traitors Flocked To Vichy Regime; Hinted That Petain Sent Message Of Congratulations To Hitler For Slaughter Of Canadians At Dieppe

Paris, July 25.—(AP)—Muttering and protests arose from jurors and spectators at the treason trial of Marshal Petain today when the old soldier curtly refused to answer questions about telegrams congratulating the Germans on their success at Dieppe and seeking permission for French troops to participate in defense of Vichy territory alongside the Germans.

Petai stolidly refused to answer questions, adhering to his vow on the first day of the trial. Judge Paul Mongibeaux then read into the record what he said was a telegram from Petain to Hitler asking permission for Vichy troops to help the Germans in defense.

The issue arose during the cross examination of former Premier Edouard Daladier, whose angry testimony was punctuated by chair slamming and shouts.

Daladier was followed to the stand by the last elected president of the Third Republic, Albert Lebrun—dressed in a formal morning coat and striped trousers and wearing a rosette of the Legion of Honor in his lapel.

Lebrun recited a succession of military defeats which preceded the French armistice.

The telegram was read in response to a juror's questioning of former Premier Edouard Daladier, who had testified that "all the traitors of France" flocked to Vichy after the armistice and that France was not unwarmed when the Germans struck in 1940.

The same juror asked Daladier whether he knew of a telegram from Petain to Hitler congratulating the Germans on the bloody repulse of the Canadians at Dieppe.

There was no immediate reply. Daladier agreed during cross examination with testimony yesterday of former Premier Paul Reynaud that "certain concessions in Africa" to Mussolini were considered in 1940 in an effort to keep Italy at peace.

"The true cause of our defeat," Daladier said, "resulted from demoralization of the army and the old conception of the inviolability of the Ardennes—the mountainous gap of Belgium and Northeastern France through which the Germans burst French lines in 1940 and pushed back the Americans last December."

He said the defeat also was due to military "inefficiency" and activities of the Fifth Column.

"On June 25, 1940, we were told a new order was being constituted," Daladier told the court trying the aged soldier for intelligence with the enemy and plotting against the security of France.

"It consisted of destroying republican institutions of France. The republic was destroyed contrary to the wishes of the National Assembly which met at Vichy. As delegates to the National Assembly left Vichy, we saw arriving all the traitors of France. . . . The people of

MEADOWS CASE MOVES ALONG

Five More Defense Witnesses Heard Today

The defense in the trial of Dr. Leon R. Meadows on charges of false pretense and embezzlement, continued an array of witnesses today to substantiate the claim that vast improvements were made at the college during the 10 years that Meadows was president of the institution.

Yesterday afternoon F. C. Harding, member of the board for a long number of years, testified that he recalled when the board in 1924 adopted a resolution empowering the president of the college to handle and expend certain funds for the benefit of the students and the college. He further stated that he was aware that the late E. G. Flanagan, while head of the budget committee of the college board, was authorized to handle a certain fund for the college and that he was present in December, 1943, when Dr. Meadows represented the J. H. Waldrop \$200 representing the unused portion of the fund previously.

Big-Three Parley In Recess During Absence Of Britons; Truman To Review Troops

London, July 25.—(AP)—Prime Minister Churchill arrived in London late today from Potsdam to learn the fate of his Conservative Government in the tabulation tomorrow of the British general election votes.

Potsdam, July 25.—(AP)—President Truman will fly to U. S. Army headquarters at Frankfurt tomorrow and review American troops taking advantage of the off day in the Big Three schedule, officials announced today.

Gen. Eisenhower, commander of the United States forces in the European theater, will meet the President in Frankfurt, where they will inspect the 84th Infantry and Third Armored divisions. The two will have luncheon together.

Mr. Truman will return to Potsdam early Thursday evening for resumption of the Big Three conference, interrupted by the departure for London of the highest British leaders to await election returns.

Potsdam, July 25.—(AP)—A four-engine passenger plane carrying Prime Minister Churchill and his party took off for England from a strongly guarded airport here this afternoon following another meeting of the Big Three.

Churchill, Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden and Clement E. Attlee, Labor Party leader attending the conference as an observer, arranged a recess so they could be in London when results of the British election July 5 are announced on Thursday.

Four arm sedans from the British compound took the passengers to the airport. There was no formal farewell from American and Soviet delegates.

The meeting of the prime ministers, President Truman and Premier Stalin today was the ninth of the Potsdam series. Foreign Office representatives will carry on the conversations tomorrow.

Debate May Delay Vote On Charter

Administration Seeking Three-Point Ratification Program To Emphasize Troop Use Responsibilities

Washington, July 25.—(AP)—Senator Lucas (D-Ill.) challenged any critics of the United Nations charter in the senate today to lay their cards on the table now—"not a year hence."

Speaking on the third day of general debate on the treaty, Lucas forecast the charter "will rank among the greatest documents in history."

No senator, he stressed, should vote for it "because he believes it politically dangerous to do otherwise."

"Let no one vote for this world document," Lucas said, with the belief that some day the implementing statutes and the special agreements come to us for congressional action, then will be the hour to draw the military teeth from this new international agreement.

"If there are those who have reservations or amendments, now is the time to present them."

What the administration wants, as outlined by several Senators, is this:

1. Ratification of the charter with the explicit understanding that the United States thus is committing itself to use its troops to help police future peace.

2. Enactment next fall of a law giving this country's Security Council delegate authority, through the President, to vote for the use of U. S. troops for police work short of actual war.

3. Later approval by both houses of Congress of an agreement with the Security Council on furnishing American troops and equipment.

A half dozen charter supporters, headed by Senator Lucas (D-Ill.), prepared today to drive home the contention that the contemplated military agreement with the council should be submitted in both houses for simple majority approval.

Senator Hatch (D-N.M.) plunged the Senate into an uproar yesterday when he challenged an earlier assertion by John Foster Dulles, chief adviser to the American delegation in San Francisco, that this agreement would come back to the chamber for a two-thirds ratification vote.

Senator Wheeler (D-Mont.), driving through a 15,000-word speech in which he said he would vote for the charter largely because of

British People To Get Election News Tomorrow

London, July 25.—(AP)—Britain counts the votes of her July 5 election tomorrow—and learns what sort of government she will have for possibly five years to come.

Here, under English procedure, is what will happen after the results are tabulated:

Winston Churchill, as prime minister, will submit to King George the name of some political leader whom he (Churchill) believes should be appointed by the King to form a new government, that is, to set up a new cabinet.

Traditionally, the Prime Minister nominates the leader of the political group which has won the most seats in Parliament, and traditionally, his nomination always is accepted. The man appointed by King George becomes the Prime Minister.

With the political scene as it is now, four things can happen:

1. If Churchill's Conservative party wins the largest bloc of Parliament seats, Churchill would nominate himself.

2. If Maj. Clement Attlee's Labor party wins, Churchill would nominate Attlee.

3. If neither of the major parties, Conservative and Labor, win a clear majority, Churchill's Conservatives might bargain for and win the support of the Liberal party. In that case the Conservatives allied with the Liberals would have a majority and Churchill would nominate himself.

4. Or, in the event of no strong majority, Attlee's Labor party rather than the Conservatives might reach an agreement with the Liberals. In this event, Churchill would nomi-

Ships And Planes Renew Attacks On Japan Today

Okinawa-Based Planes Return To Shanghai Area Battering Three Airports, Smashing Convoy And Sinking Or Damaging 13 Warships Or Freighters

Manila, July 25.—(AP)—The pent-up wrath of more than 350 Okinawa-based American planes thundered on Shanghai Sunday after four days of bombless bad weather. Gen. MacArthur announced today.

His communique also described dispersed air strikes on the same day from Korea to the Dutch East Indies and Malaya.

Before dawn on Sunday, Liberators caught an eight-ship Japanese convoy on its way to Shanghai and broke it up. This was followed by the big daylight strike by 5th and 14th Air Force bombers and fighters which got through the first hole in the weather shield July 18 to blast craters in three airframes, shoot up Shanghai's teeming waterfront, and flay Japanese shipping in the Whangpoo River.

Mitchell bombers attacking from medium altitude, and Thunderbolts and Mustangs streaking in just over the muddy water, got the largest shipping haul in recent weeks.

They listed a destroyer, a 3,000-ton freighter-transport and a small freighter as definitely sunk; a destroyer escort, two sub-chasers, a 10,000-ton freighter-transport and six freighter-transports probably sunk, and many smaller vessels damaged.

Three large fires and several smaller ones blazed at Kiangnan and other parts of the city, after night's of Liberators passed over. Bomber attacks roared in over Shanghai and Tientsin airports to drop fragmentation bombs on buildings and dispersal areas. An estimated 45 Japanese planes on the ground were either destroyed or damaged at the three fields.

Tokyo claimed seven of the attackers were shot down by anti-aircraft fire. There was no aerial interception.

Aussies Extend Gains On Borneo

Manila, July 25.—(AP)—Pushing a general Japanese withdrawal in the Mt. Batac area, Australian troops have moved two miles down the east Borneo coast, Gen. MacArthur reported today.

This placed them within 50 miles of their next big objective, the oil field at Samarinda. Aussie Spitfires supporting the advance, which was followed during the European war, were spotted, a Japanese truck convoy and probably got a truck loaded with enemy troops.

RAAF Liberators meanwhile attacked Celebes Islands to the east and Kittyhawks teamed up with American P-T boats to shoot up Japanese water craft and buildings in Mandar Gulf in the Celebes.

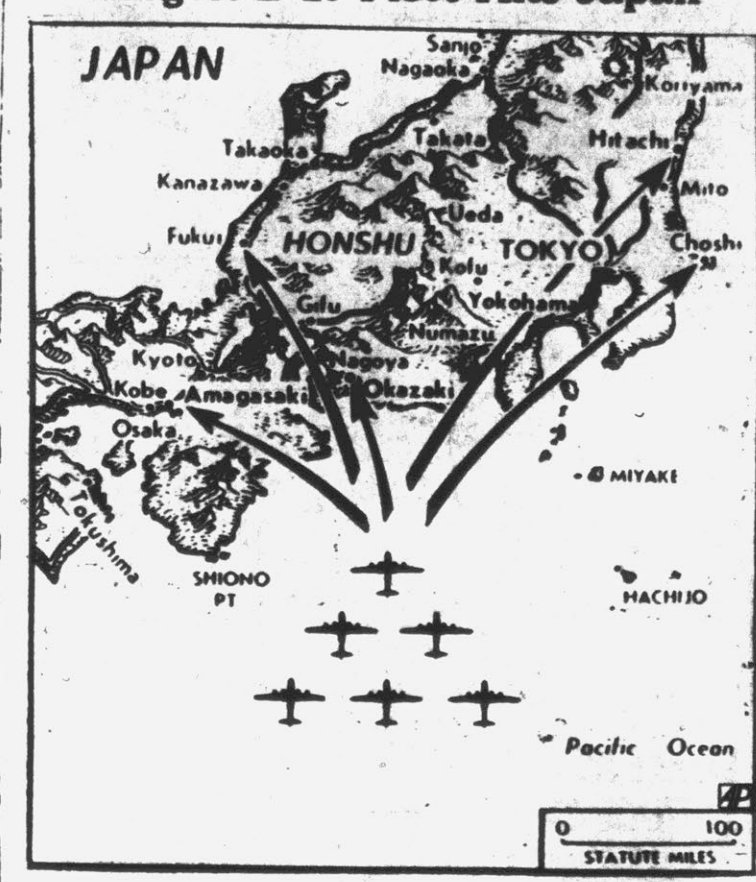

Nationwide Strikes Hit New Peak Today

More Than 58,000 Idle As New Series Of Walkouts Are Reported Today

More than 58,000 workers were idle across the nation today as new work stoppages added thousands to the list of those already involved in labor disputes.

New disputes affecting war production dashed prospects of 24 hours ago that the country's total off jobs through labor dissension would drop below 40,000.

Settlement of old disputes ended work stoppages involving more than 2,000 workers, but new outbreaks more than offset the number affected by agreements and sent the graph of idle to the highest mark in more than a week.

Largest single contributing factor to the upward trend was a labor dispute at the Wright Aeronautical Corporation plants in New Jersey.

An estimated 20,000 employees were out in plants in Woodbridge, Paterson and East Paterson, N. J., and production of B-29 engines were reported virtually at a standstill in five plants.

The strike which started in Wood-Ridge factory Friday and spread to the other two plants resulted, said a union spokesman, over discharge of a steward. John McGrath, president of UAW Local 689, however, termed the walkout unauthorized and said union members were urged to return to work.

Two other large walkouts were added to the list during the last 24 hours. In Savannah, Ga., a walk-out of 400 machinists in a wage dispute at the Southeastern shipbuilding Corp., idled more than 7,500 workers in the building of A-7 ships. Another 750 was idle at the Chevrolet division of General Motors in Cincinnati in a dispute over transfer of a plant manager.

Union officials said his return would end the walkout.

Meat supplies in the St. Louis metropolitan area hit a new low as the strike of AFL butchers spread.

FIND MARINE BADLY HURT

Pvt. Robert Minton Victim Of Vicious Assault Near River

Pvt. Robert Minton, 21, U. S. Marine Corps, stationed at the Greenville air station, who was found with serious head injuries sitting on the side of the highway across Tar River yesterday morning about 6 o'clock, is in a serious condition at Camp Lejeune hospital. He is not expected to live.

A sergeant on the way to the Marine airfield found Minton on the road. He reported it to the base and an ambulance took the wounded Marine there. Shortly afterwards he was taken to a hospital at Cherry Point and later transferred to the Camp Lejeune hospital.

Minton was bleeding profusely from head injuries and was in such a dazed condition he could not tell his rescuers what had happened to him. His clothes were soaking wet and it believed that he had been in the river.

Today On The Home Front

Washington, July 25.—(AP)—President Truman is a cinch to be asked what he meant by saying: "There is not one piece of territory we want out of this war."

The statement—made at an American flag-raising ceremony in Berlin—has caused much speculation here.

Almost certainly reporters will ask him to explain before he leaves Europe or when he resumes his White House news conferences here. He could have meant one or both of two things:

1. We want no territory our troops took in Europe.

2. We want no territory taken from Japan in the Pacific.

If he was talking of Europe only, he was saying nothing new. We've never figured on keeping European territory.

But it was new and startling if he meant we want no Japanese islands as naval outposts to guard against future attacks from Asia. The Navy is not likely to be ignored.

It's possible—although Mr. Truman himself will have to clear up the point—that we do not intend to hold Japanese islands and say outright to the world: "These belong henceforth to the United States."

There is a way in which the United States could keep possession of seized Jap territory for generations to come and yet not claim full possession.

This could be done under the trusteeship system of the United

Tidal Wave Of Halsey's Third Fleet Planes Sweeps Over Dying Japanese Navy For Second Successive Day; Battleships, Carriers And Cruisers Damaged Yesterday

Guam, Thursday, July 26.—(AP) American Superforts struck three Japanese oil refineries near Tokyo at midnight last night within a few hours after Third Fleet carrier planes and warships pounded coastal defenses on the enemy homeland.

Between 75 and 100 big B-29s hit the Mitsubishi, Hyams and Agalshi refineries, all within a few hundred yards of each other, at Kawasaki on Tokyo Bay, about 11 miles from Tokyo city. It was the second Superfortress raid on Nippon in 36 hours.

Carrier planes smashed for the second consecutive day at smoking remnants of Japan's dead navy in the huge Kure naval base after heavily damaging seven warships yesterday.

Adm. Nimitz did not reveal the strength of today's assault but it was presumed equal to yesterday's 1,200 plane strike.

Airfields and other military installations on the main home island of Honshu also were hit. Returning pilots reported destruction of Japanese planes on the ground. Associated Press Correspondent Richard O'Malley, aboard the carrier flagship, said a thick blanket of fog closed in late in the day.

Fifteen cruisers and destroyers moved boldly inshore early today and shelled another Japanese fighting lair—the sea plane base and airfield at Kushimoto on the southern tip of Honshu.

Tokyo news heard in London reported that still other warships hammered Kanagawa prefecture on Honshu, just south of Tokyo Bay. Kanagawa is across the mouth of the bay from Cape Notojima, which was shelled by warships July 18.

(A Tokyo report that 200 American carrier-borne planes ranged north and were striking airfields and transportation facilities on Hokkaido Island, north of Honshu, was monitored by the American Broadcasting Company.)

Planes and warships went into action again as tabulation showed this toll of Japanese fighting ships collected yesterday:

Two battleships, two carriers and three cruisers damaged. (British carrier planes accounted for one of the carriers at a Shikoku port.)

The incomplete score also included 64 enemy planes destroyed or damaged. These results, plus other damage inflicted by British carrier planes and land-based navy bombers, increased to 563 the number of ships, and to 635 the number of planes, destroyed or heavily damaged by forces under Admiral Nimitz's command in the 15 days beginning July 10.

AN ANALYSIS OF THE NEWS

The mystery of the moment—whether Russia is coming into the war against Japan—has brought me the intriguing suggestion that if Moscow should make this move, or even threaten to do so, it might give Nippon exactly the excuse she needs for surrendering without too much loss of face.

This thought comes from my colleague Victor Eubank, now an Associated Press financial columnist but formerly AP chief of bureau in Tokyo, and incidentally also one-time chief of bureau in Moscow. He points out that with the Soviet Union's entrance into the conflict the Japs would manufacture the excuse:

"We could have beaten America and Britain all right. But no nation in the world could stand up against the American-British-Russian combination. So we are surrendering rather than subject our country to this effort."

Face-saving is an item of moment in the life not only of Japan but of the whole Orient. It is an obsession of all ranks, from the noble to the sordid, from the emperor to the Japanese general and admiral, to commit hara-kiri to "save face," after they have "dishonored" their honor by failing to achieve the task to which they are assigned. Guards are maintained about the crater of the extinct volcano of Fuji to prevent Japs from jump-

ing into the bowels of this sacred mountain to save face.

It all adds up to the certainty that the Mikado's government and the military chiefs will strain every nerve to find a face-saving expedient before surrendering. On that basis it may be that a Russian threat, or declaration of war, would indeed provide the necessary incident.

We ought to know soon what Marshal Stalin has decided. We learn through an Associated Press dispatch from Potsdam that the belief prevails in sources close to President Truman that he has achieved a substantial accord with the Russians on impending developments in the Japanese war. What that accord may be, is left to the imagination, but the dispatch added:

"Among Allied sources with the long enjoyed cordial contacts with the Soviet government it has not been doubted that the Russians, after their own fashion, will play a role in defeating Japan. These sources have sharply rejected the possibility of the Soviet Union indefinitely sitting back while the United States and Japan fought on."

Appropos of this, there's another highly interesting event signaled from Moscow. An AP dispatch reports an informed source as saying the conference between Stalin and Chinese Premier T. V. Soong in the Russian capital paved the way for an understanding never be-

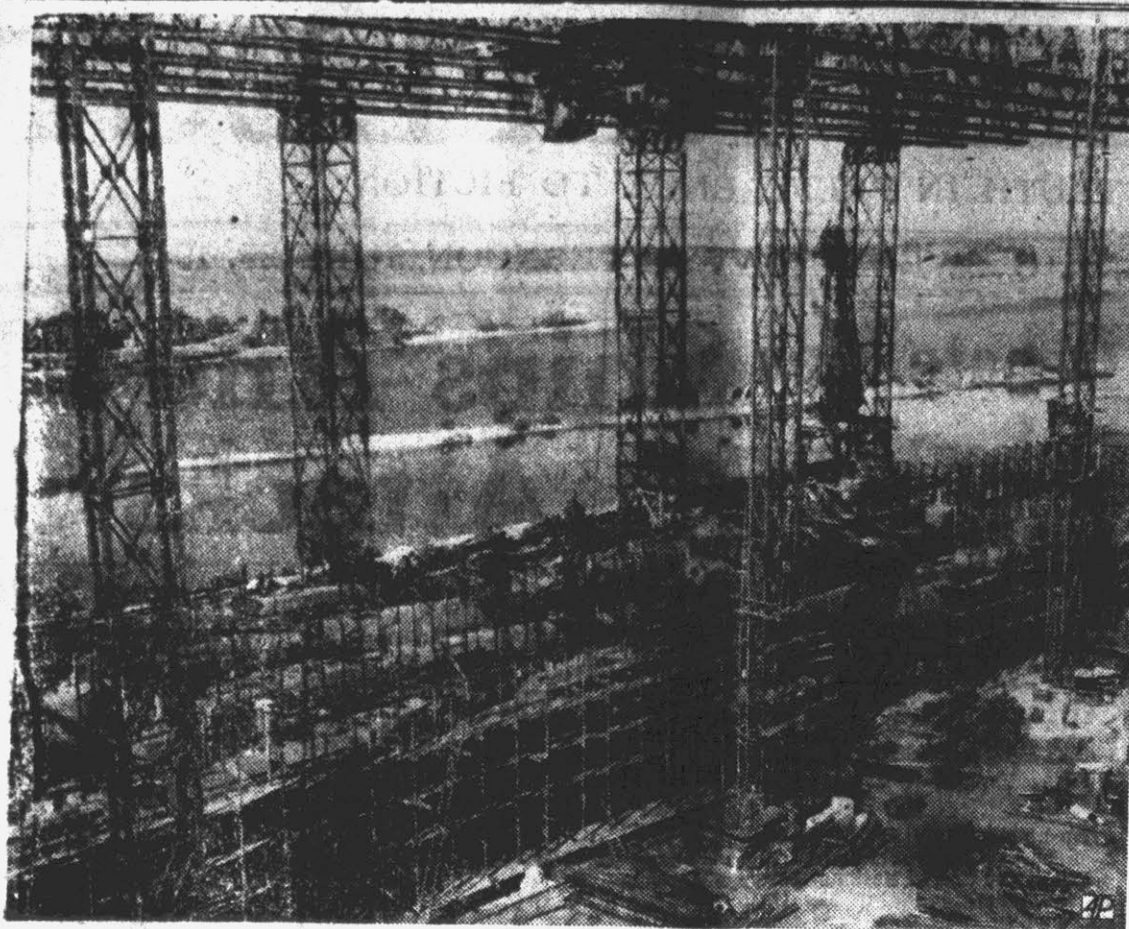
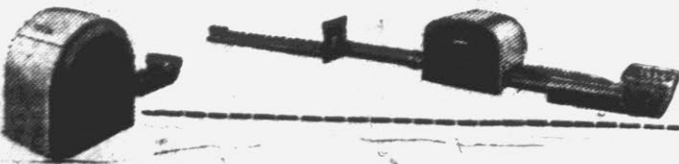

U. S. Subs Shell Chichi Island

San Francisco, July 24—(AP)—Three U. S. submarines bombed Chichi Island in the Bonin Islands, 550 miles southeast of Tokyo for 30 minutes early today, Japanese broadcasts reported.

The submarines shelled Chichi after a Japanese submarine-chaser had attacked them earlier, the English language broadcast said.

Chichi was shelled by U. S. surface craft Monday, Fleet Adm. Chester W. Nimitz reported from Guam.

More Japs Killed In Burma Fighting

Calcutta, July 25—(AP)—Allied troops have killed more than 2,000 Japanese in a three-day battle with enemy forces seeking to escape from a trap in southern Burma and reach the Sittoung River. Southeast Asia Command headquarters announced today.

These casualties coupled with 252 prisoners and an uncounted number killed by artillery and by planes, have reduced by more than one-half a Japanese force estimated at 5,000 in the Pegu pocket.

A communique said heavy fighting continued today along a 77-mile stretch of road between Toungoo and Nyaunglebin.

Two villages, five miles northeast of Pyu, were occupied by Allied troops following a successful strike. Advancing eastwards from Heho, a 2,000-foot high trading center in the Shan state, the Allies occupied Taunggyi and patrolled east of the town.

High Point, July 25—(AP)—Four High Point negroes, arrested in connection with the death of 11 negroes last week from poison alcohol, were bound over to Superior Court today on manslaughter charges after a hearing before Judge Don MacRae.

Washington, July 24—(AP)—The War Labor Board, following up its decision that it was not bound by Florida's "right to work" amendment, today upheld the closed shop at Miami radio station WFTL.

The national board affirmed the decision of its Atlanta regional board, directing continuation of a closed shop agreement which the AFL radio broadcast technicians had negotiated with the previous owner. The union represents nine technicians.

NO PRICE CUT ON CLOTHING

Hope For Reductions Not Possible This Year

Washington, July 25—(AP)—The government's plans for rolling back clothing prices appeared today to be side-tracked indefinitely.

Chances for a six to seven percent cut in retail prices—the goal set early this year—received another jolt as the OPA granted further price concessions to fabric manufacturers.

The agency announced last night that for the rest of this year producers of woolen and worsted fabrics can turn out about the same price lines of merchandise they did before the rollback was ordered.

Beginning in 1946 they will be required to trim their average prices some, but not as much as originally planned. The revised order will be based on prices slightly less than those which prevailed in 1944, rather than on 1943 prices.

This is being done, OPA said, because military requirements and restrictions on the use of virgin wool in 1943 made that period "unrepresentative of normal civilian operations."

While only fabrics are affected at present, it was learned that OPA soon will make similar adjustments for garment manufacturers. This means that at least part of the projected retail output will be wiped out for such apparel as men's suits and overcoats, children's snowsuits, girls' skirts, women's coats and a wide variety of other items.

OPA acknowledged that adjustments granted to fabric producers had just about eliminated any hope of price cuts for such garments this year.

The adjustments for woolens and worsteds came close on the heels of retail increases for cotton garments. These also cancelled part of planned reductions. They were allowed, OPA explained last week, because expansion of the inexpensive clothing program left merchants with too narrow profit margins for most of their garments.

Upward adjustments for manufacturers of rayon fabrics also have been allowed, and probably will be passed on in the retail cost of rayon clothing.

Clothing prices have climbed 12 per cent in the last 22 months. OPA officials have described the rise as the most serious inflation threat at present.

Poison Liquor Kills Soldiers
Paris, July 23—(AP)—Alcohol poisoning in bootleg liquor killed 188 American soldiers in France and Germany from Feb. 1 to July 10, the Army Chief Surgeon's Office said today. Troops were warned to be careful of their liquor sources.

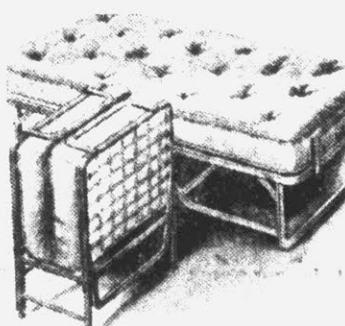

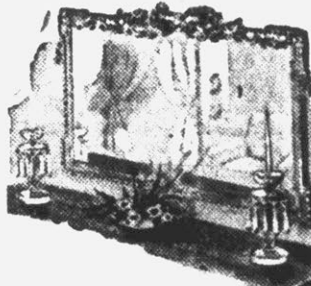

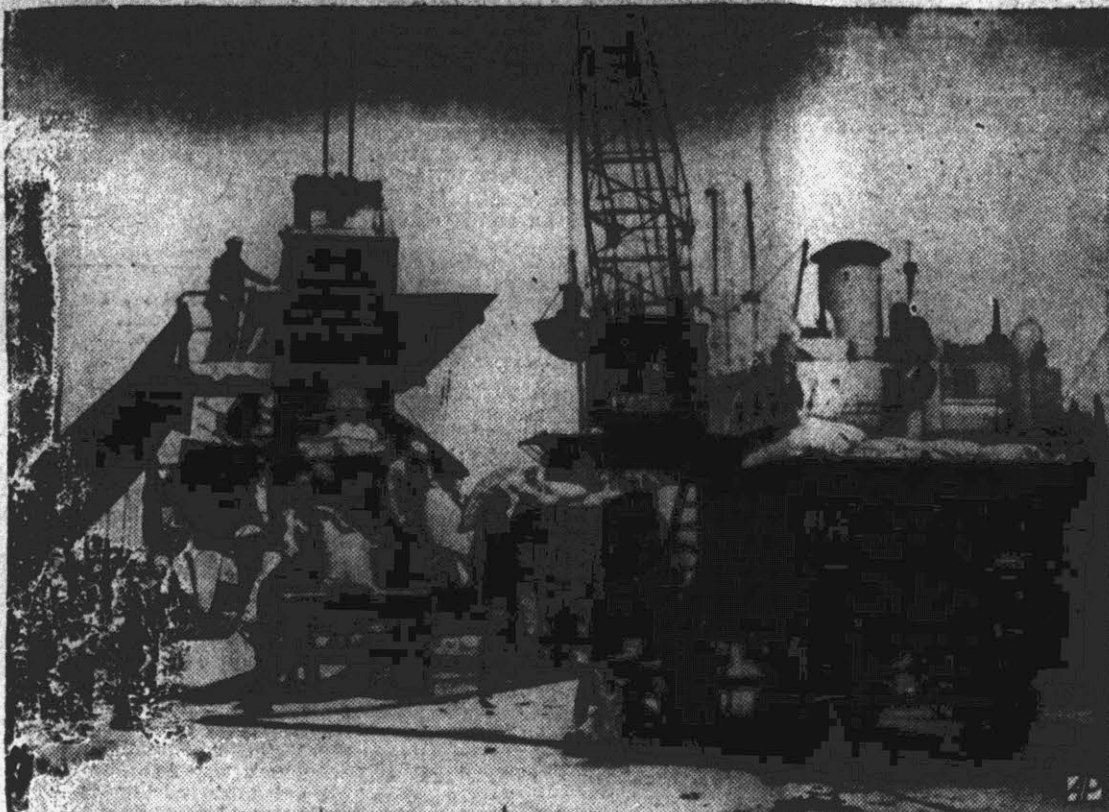
Chapter 9

MEN OF GOOD WILL

Jules Romaine, a highly respected French author who wrote in the earlier part of this century, was deeply interested in finding out what was wrong with our modern civilization. As a European and a citizen of a country invaded three times since 1816, he studied the disease of war in Europe as a doctor studies symptoms in a patient.

After a half-century of thought, during which he familiarized himself with the myriad social, political and economic theories of war—each backed up with a monumental body of historical evidence—he came to the conclusion that the trouble was in mankind, and not with the conditions or environment in which he lived.

What the world needs is a new kind of man, not a new system, said Romaine. It needs "Men of Good Will." And Romaine wrote a mighty series of novels about this theme.

Many of us will agree that Romaine's solution is correct, as far as it goes. Certainly solutions which have involved changing the conditions under which man lives have been found elusive. But even if we could have a world of "men of good will," we would still not solve our problem. Men would need substantive wisdom to back up their good intentions—a wisdom of divine inspiration which is the heritage of devoted Christians. "The road to hell is paved with good intentions," goes the old saying, and to it we might add the intentions of men of good will.

AMERICA IN WARTIME

Washington — When the Senate approves the United Nations charter, and the new feast of the Democrats and Republicans will be over. The Democrats, being the hosts, don't care how long the feast goes on. No party ever ate its way to power dining at the other party's table. But the Republicans are surprised.

Paradoxical as it may seem, the untimely death of President Roosevelt, the greatest political foe of the Republicans ever had, was a greater blow to the GOP than to the Democrats.

After more than 12 years of New Dealism, Republicans felt that the constant drip of their criticism had finally worn away the foundations of Democratic strength. They were counting the seats they would gain in the House in 1946 and already talking about taking over the lower chamber.

They visualized a tired, war-weary Roosevelt moving toward 1948 with no proven political heir and a Democratic party completely confused and befuddled by the loss of his leadership.

When President Truman took office, the Republicans answered the need and the demand to back him with a united front. Our foes had to be shown that the United States was greater than its leaders. The home front had to be held together. And most vital, too, the United States had to retain its leadership in the organization of a lasting peace organization.

Without once wavering, the Republican leaders stepped forward to volunteer their support and the rank and file of the party backed them up.

But those same leaders know, and the rank and file is beginning to realize, that if the party is going to retain its entity and gain back its strength, it will be time, just as soon as the charter is ratified, to say "That's all, Brother, that's all."

He was the first French chief of state to face a court since Louis XVI.

The swarthy Daladier at one point picked up a chair and slammed it to the floor as his face flushed with anger. He was recounting the story of the Riom trials in which the Vichy regime tried unsuccessfully to pin the blame for the French collapse on him, former Premier Paul Reynaud and Leon Blum, and Gen. Maurice Gamelin.

He said he had learned at Bou-rasol that without having been tried or condemned, he had been sentenced to life imprisonment. He recalled that the former attorney general, Gaston Cassagnou, had refused to prosecute the case at Riom and at this point he slammed the chair to the floor.

As Daladier spoke, he shook his fist. His voice frequently rose to a shout. Reynaud listened intently to the man he succeeded at premier.

Daladier told of the voyage of French officials aboard the liner Marseille bound for North Africa and denied that they were "fugitives or cowards," saying they did all possible to organize resistance in North Africa. He said he tried to convince Gen. Auguste Nogues, then commander of French Morocco, to rally French resistance using American planes then being assembled in Casablanca.

Daladier turned to the American invasion of French Africa and said: "If only Petain had given the signal for an uprising of France on the day of the Anglo-American landings in North Africa, what a glorious page in the history of his long life he would have written. I would have knelt in front of him."

Daladier pounded his chest and his voice rang through the crowded courtroom as he added:

"I waited for this and prayed for it. Instead, he, Petain, ordered troops in North Africa to resist our Allies."

Daladier read into the record figures on the increase of French war materials between June 1, 1936, and May, 1940, during which he was premier and minister of war. (The

first figures are for 1936; the second for 1940.) Mortars, 450 and 9,550; heavy tank guns, 1,280 and 6,000; Maginot Line guns, none and 560; armored cars, 700 and 6,000; light tanks, none and 2,900; heavy tanks, 17 and 340; modern machines, none and 955.

"France was not disarmed," Daladier said, and German production was "not greater than ours." This testimony varied with that given earlier by Reynaud.

After the armistice on July 25, 1940, Daladier said there were 4,200 warplanes in the free zones or France of which 1,200 were first line.

He ended his statement at 1:50 and was cross examined.

The defense asked if he believed former Chief of Government Pierre Laval exercised any influence on Petain. Daladier said:

"On November 13, 1940, Petain dismissed Laval but in 1942 he recalled him. Did we need him so badly? I don't know."

The stocky Daladier began his testimony late yesterday when he followed former Premier Paul Reynaud to the witness stand. Reynaud succeeded Daladier as premier in the final days before the French collapse in 1940.

miral Halsey termed it "a new phase of naval warfare."

The final plunge into the heart of Japan.

"If the Nips do not know they are a doomed nation, they're even stupider than I think," he added. "My only regret is that the ships do not have wheels—so we could chase them inland after we drive them from the coast."

Combined with a B-29 plane strike on Osaka and Nagoya—heaviest of the war—and other army air raids, the blows of the past two days were the hardest ever struck against Japan. Some 2,000 planes, in all, participated.

Tokyo's jitters were obvious in its radio broadcasts.

The enemy radio made no effort to minimize seriousness of the threat as Halsey's ships steamed near enough for cruisers and destroyers to shell Honshu's southern shore this morning, hammering at

the Kuremoko airplane base, Shimonaka airfield and other targets. Tokyo radio acknowledged the shelling.

Japanese broadcasts reported carrier aircraft attacking today on concentrated air fields and communications facilities on South Central Honshu, main island of Japan. They reported attacks were broken off in mid-morning after 14 raiders were shot down and 36 damaged in two days.

Land based navy planes added 10 more enemy vessels to the carrier planes' toll of 17 sunk or damaged in Tuesday's sweeps over the Inland Sea.

Admiral Nimitz' 30-word communiqué today announcing resumption of the carrier attacks made it clear that Halsey is pressing in for the kill. "Combatant ships," it said, "were the targets for the second successive day of sweeps over the great Kure naval base and Kure, 150 miles east. Both are on the Inland Sea."

"What's left of the Japanese navy is helpless," snorted Admiral Halsey in his flagship broadcasts, "but just for good luck we will hunt them out of their holes."

First fragmentary reports of Halsey's carrier strikes yesterday showed American pilots heavily damaged the battleships and one Hyuga, left the heavy cruiser Tone, and light cruiser Oyodo in flames, and damaged the heavy cruiser Aoba and a large aircraft carrier. British airmen damaged a Kobe escort carrier.

Rear Adm. Forrest P. Sherman, Nimitz' chief of staff, announced recently in Washington that Japan has two other old battleships not now fit for service, a few carriers including two or three fairly large ones, a few cruisers, and about 30 destroyers. The battleship Haruna may be seaworthy at present; and the battleship Nagato, hit in the current carrier strikes, may be repairable.

These remnants of the imperial navy, which once commanded most of the Pacific, have been tied up at docks under camouflage, avoiding a fight. Admiral Sherman said, "Carrier planes have been seeking them out at their concealed moorings."

Guam that nearly 100 Mustangs based on Iwo Jima yesterday shot up airfields and railways in the Nagoya area on Japan and encountered only light enemy opposition.

FEAF patrol bombers Sunday returned through bad weather to southern Honshu to hit Miho and Yonago airbases.

Search planes bombed the air-drome near the big ferry port of Fusan in Korea, hit an Amoy munitions dump on the south China coast, and sank a river boat near Saigon in French Indo-China.

Bombers and fighters attacked Tanaga and Amami Island in the northern Ryukyus.

A 7th Fleet scout bomber shot

down a Japanese plane and destroyed another on the ground near Kota Bahru in Malaya, while a Navy patrol bomber sank a freighter and lugger off the west Borneo coast.

Australian Liberators in a 3,000-mile roundtrip, bombed Samarang shipyards 150 miles west of Soerabaya on Java, while other Aussie heavy bombers and fighters struck air bases on that island and in the Celebes group.

In the absence of Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden, who is returning to London with Churchill, Britain will be represented by Under-Secretary Sir Alexander Cogan. He will meet with U. S. Secretary of State James F. Byrnes and Soviet Foreign Commissar Vyacheslav Molotov.

While it was not disclosed what special plans Truman and Stalin may have for Thursday, it was said they would not discuss matters on conference agenda between themselves until the top-ranking British delegates return.

If the British election returns tomorrow show the Conservative Party victorious, Churchill and Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden—who is accompanying him to London—may return to Potsdam Friday.

In the event of a Labor Party victory, however, the task of continuing the Big Three talks will devolve upon Clement Attlee, who has been sitting in on the conference at Churchill's invitation.

A change in British leadership is not expected here to result in any marked setback to the Potsdam negotiations. No sharp differences on foreign policy were raised between Churchill and Attlee during the election campaign.

President Truman, Premier Stalin and the British leaders held their eighth meeting yesterday. There was no indication, however, of the direction the talks were taking.

(A Paris dispatch last night said U. S. Ambassador Jefferson Caffery and Soviet Ambassador Alexander E. Bogomolov had been summoned to Potsdam, suggesting that the conference had reached a point where expert assistance on problems involving France was needed.)

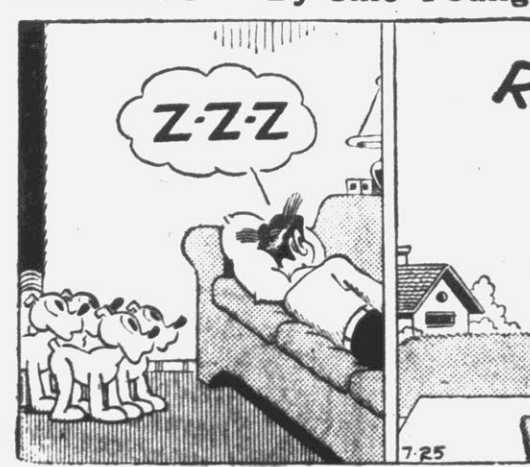

Although both the Senators and Dodgers, the springtime cellar selections, were beaten in last night's tests, they managed to stick within striking distances of the lead after facing their toughest rivals.

Ossie Bluege's Senators came home from the west two weeks ago bubbling over with pennant enthusiasm, pulled to within 2 1-2 games of the top, did a black flip while blowing two straight doubleheaders and then came back to end the home stand in second place, only three lengths behind Detroit.

Allie Reynolds cooled off Washington, 4-0, scattering seven hits for his 10th decision as Dutch Leonard went down for his fourth loss, snapping a five-game win strine.

Cleveland slugged the knuckleball expert for 11 blows in eight frames.

In the only other scheduled American League contest, Boston blanked St. Louis 6-0 on a four-hitter by Emmett O'Neill. Luke Sewell's hurlers had a nightmarish day, walking 12 batters. Starter Sig Jakucki passed five before he retired with two out in the first. The Red Sox took over four place and the Brownies fell to sixth although they cooped seven of 12 in the east.

Leo Durocher got only three complete games in 14 starts from his pitching staff but strong hitting by Goody Rosen, Dixie Walker and Luis Olmo and adroit use of relief hurlers, kept the "Bums" within 5 1-2 lengths of the fast-stepping Chicago Cubs.

The world champion St. Louis Cardinals got an even break in their four-game test with the Dodgers, regaining possession of second position on a 7-6 edge. After the Brooks slugged Charley Barrett for a 6-1 lead in the first three frames, George Dockins came in to stop them dead while the Red Birds rallied with one in the fourth, and four in the fifth to tie. Aurie Bergamo's third straight single in the ninth broke it up, handing Reliever Cy Buker his first setback.

Chicago pulverized the Phillies, 8-3, behind Bob Chipman for the Cubs' 13th verdict in 16 meetings with the cellar club. Chicago's league lead now measures 4 1-2 games.

Pittsburgh is putting on another drive. The Pirates ran their win-

ning streak to five, all over Boston, by taking an 11-inning thriller, 6-5. Kenny Gables, chunky rookie right-hander, earned his sixth successive decision on relief at the expense of freshman Don Hendrickson. Both are former New York Yankee farm system hurlers and a former Yank, Jack Saltgaver socked a decisive triple in the second extra inning.

AUSSIES TAKE CHOISEUL ISLE

Bitter Fighting Still Raging On Bougainville

San Francisco, July 25.—(AP)—Australian troops have invaded and "completely liberated Choiseul, by-passed Solomon Island, the Australian Army broadcast today.

The announcement, heard by the Federal Communications Commission, said Aussies landed some time ago on the island, across the narrow Bougainville Strait from Bougainville Island, which the Diggers are clearing of Nipponese.

A small Australian landing force has been "harrying the Japanese on Bougainville. "Some hundreds" of the enemy soldiers have been killed.

American Marines landed on Choiseul October 28, 1943, in a diversionary move to the invasion of Bougainville. The Yanks withdrew a week later from Choiseul, one of the larger northern Solomon Islands.

The Bougainville operation was for the purpose of hacking air-dromes out of the jungles from which to neutralize the Japanese Rabaul fortress and other strong points on now by-passed New Britain and New Ireland. Aussies, who took over from the Americans, have expanded the small Allied control of Bougainville to much of the island.

Manila, July 25.—(AP)—On an almost forgotten battlefield far to the south of Okinawa and the Philippines, Australian troops are waging savage warfare against a Japanese enemy trapped (but surprisingly well fed and full of fight).

Men are still dying on dark, brooding Bougainville Island in the Solomons and in the untamed sago swamps of the Sepik River in British New Guinea, just north of Australia.

The war has swept north, and the world waits impatiently for the invasion of Japan itself, but the by-passed Nipponese garrisons of Bougainville and New Guinea fight on. The Australians have killed 12,000 of them in the last eight months.

In the same period, United States Marine and New Zealand Dauntless divebombers and Corsair fighters together with Australian Kittyhawks, Beaufighters and Liberators, have flown 27,000 sorties against Japanese concentrations in the area.

The Japanese plan of conquest called for Bougainville to be the key jump-off base for invasion of New Zealand and Australia by way of the Solomons. They poured huge stockpiles of war supplies into the Buin area before Allied planes, submarines and warships could sever communication lines.

Allied landings on New Britain totaled 50,000 men on the Gazelle Peninsula at the island's northern tip. The mighty enemy base at Rabaul was neutralized. Japanese on Bougainville Island to the east were hopelessly by-passed.

The job of rooting out the foe on Bougainville was turned over to Lt. Gen. S. G. Savage's Second Australian Corps last fall and the first attack was mounted November 23. The Diggers now have knifed into the garden area of Kahili, vital to enemy subsistence and have punched through jungle and swamp to within 18 miles of nearby Buin at Bougainville's southern tip.

An estimated 17,000 Japanese remain under wily Lt. Gen. Kanda, commanding the remnants of the 17th Japanese army. They still have heavy 155 artillery, four-inch defense guns and an abundance of 75 millimeter anti-aircraft dual purpose guns that can be turned against tanks with devastating effect.

Inhabitants of the Commander Islands, situated in the Bering Sea, are descendants of Russians and Aleuts.

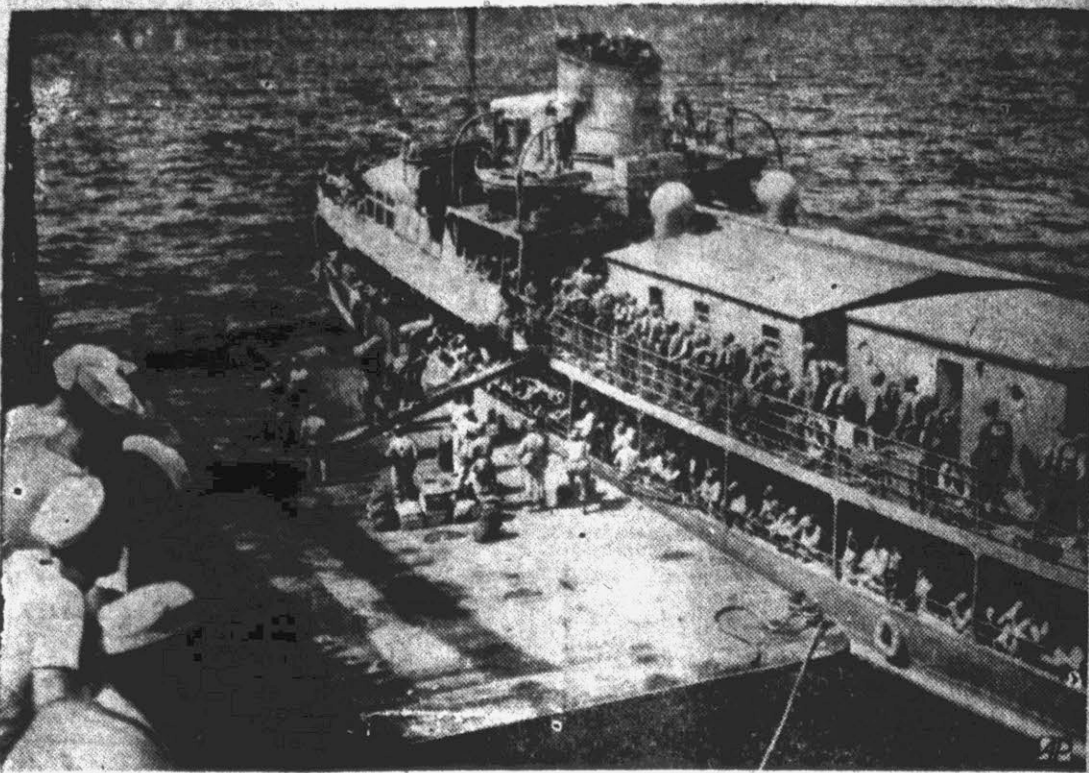

LEAF PRICES OVER CEILING

Georgia Markets Averaged Nearly \$42 Yesterday

By the Associated Press
Georgia tobacco markets reported a firm to stronger trend in prices today as an analysis of opening day sale figures showed prices on most grades up two cents a pound from the opening day last year.

The marketing service of the U. S. Department of Agriculture reported leaf and lug averages up one to two cents a pound from last year with cutters bringing two cents a pound more.

Nondescript tobacco was up five cents at 36 cents a pound. Fair lemon leaf brought 43 cents, low orange leaf 41. Cutters averaged 43 cents, as did fine lemon lugs. Good lemon lugs brought 42 cents, other lugs 41.

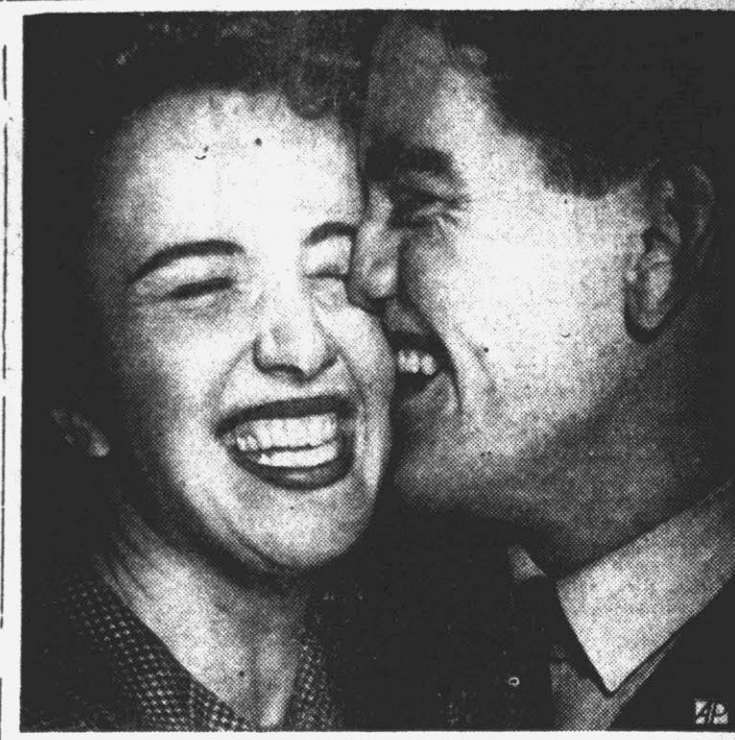
The ceiling this year is 40 cents a pound, a cent more than last year. The ceiling, though applies only to the buyers' weighted season's average. Some top grades on the 17 Georgia markets yesterday brought as high as 50 cents a pound.

The Department of Agriculture described the quality of the opening day offerings as "lower than opening day deliveries last year with sales consisting principally of low to good leaf and lug grades." One of the first markets to report its opening day figures was Moultrie. The market sold 614,224 pounds at an average price of 41.84.

Sales Tuesday at Tifton reached 603,422 pounds and the average price was 41.33. Blocked sales resulted and about a million pounds was left over for today's sales. The grades were mostly common. Fitzgerald reported sales of 304,000 pounds at an average price of 41.10. Adel had sales of 344,482 at 42.05.

Valdosta reported an opening day turnover of 556,184 pounds at an average price of 41.44.

Sales from nine of the Georgia markets and the two Florida towns are approximately 2,013,200 pounds, with averages running from 40

cents a pound up to 42 cents. Due to the late rainfalls and acute labor shortage in the tobacco belt was reported. Efforts were being made to secure prisoner of war labor for warehouse work, and the U. S. Employment Service has issued an urgent appeal for part time workers.

In normal years the farmers do the warehouse work after preparing their tobacco for market, but this year many have been forced to remain home to cure the late picked leaves.

NOT ASKED TO RESIGN

Morgenthau Said New York Statement Misunderstood

Washington, July 25.—(AP)—Henry Morgenthau, Jr., said flatly today that President Truman had not asked him to resign as Secretary of the Treasury.

He told a reporter he failed to make himself clear in New York yesterday when he said his leaving was "not of my own choosing."

It had been generally understood in Washington that Morgenthau himself forced the issue, resigning on July 5 when he became convinced that the President was planning to replace him with Wend M. Vinson in a few months.

Morgenthau had told a group of war bond leaders in New York that his leaving was "not of my own choosing," that he would have liked to stay until V-J Day "but it didn't work out that way."

According to Morgenthau's friends, he wanted to remain on the job—just as he urged the war bond leaders to do—but felt he must resign under the circumstances.

The best information here is that the sequence of events went as follows:

Morgenthau had long been disturbed by rumors he would be replaced. Early in July, he read in two different newspapers the flat statement that the President intended to appoint someone else. On July 4, Morgenthau decided to have an understanding with the President.

He saw Mr. Truman on July 5 and asked him for a letter assuring him he would be Treasury Secretary until the end of the war. The President said he couldn't write such a letter and later in the conversation acknowledged he was considering a change.

Morgenthau said that if that were the case he would like to get out at once. The President quickly asked him not to do that because he needed Morgenthau on the job while he was in Europe. Morgenthau said Vinson could take over. Mr. Truman replied he was taking Vinson to Europe with him. That same day, the President announced Morgenthau's resignation and said he had a man in mind for the job.

The next day, the White House announced that Vinson as the man. Vinson, now sworn into office, did not make the trip to Potsdam.

Warns Japs Of Heavier Blows

Manila, P. I., July 25.—(AP)—Japan was warned today by General George C. Kenney that the American air forces are about ready to hit the Japanese homeland with 5,000 ton raids.

This size "is a cinch," said the commander of the Far East Air Forces. "I'm being conservative when I say we could hit them with 5,000 tons in a single attack—something the world never dreamed of."

"In the very near future," he added, "more than 5,000 planes will be available for the concentrated aerial smash at Japan."

Of these, at least 4,000 are capable of carrying bombs and more than half are capable of strafing.

Kenney, who has seen his air forces grow in three years from a few overworked bombers and fighters to its present potent force confidently predicted:

"We'll have enough stuff so that the Japs won't have a bridge or a sizeable road that will help them for future operations. They'll be completely immobilized as regards any mass movement."

"I confidently expect that when we go ashore anywhere we want, we'll find almost a total lack of opposition on the beaches, the same as we've found it all through New Guinea and the Philippines."

This will be "the greatest massing of air power the world has ever heard of," Kenney said.

"We'll be able to control it like water through a hose—turn it on and off and from target to target as we want to."

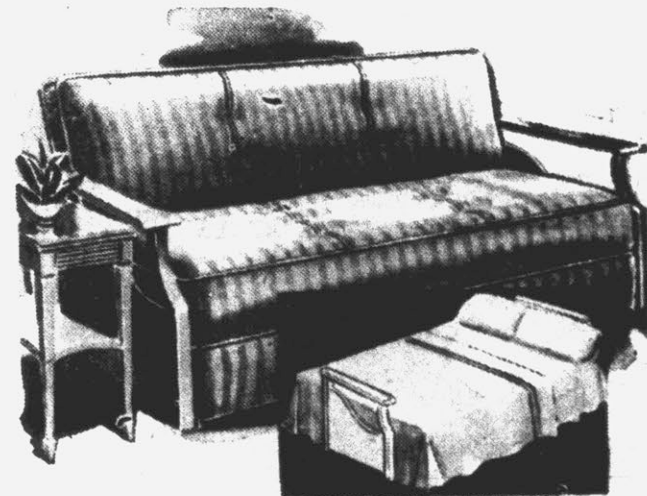

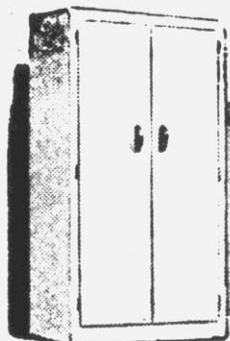

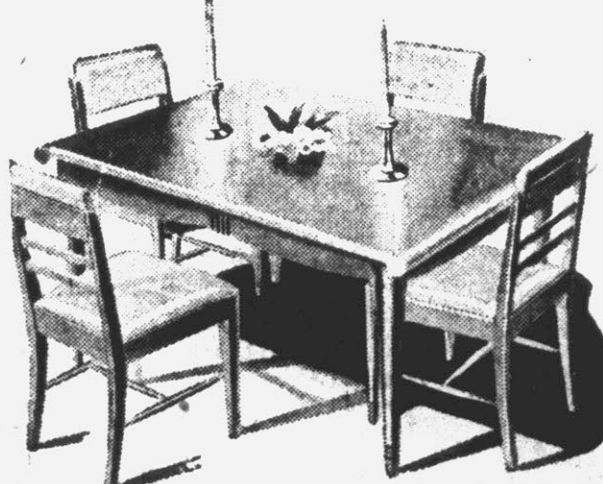
