

Big Three Conference Nears End

Keynote Of Harmony Still Prevails; President Truman Pleas- ed With Almost Un- unanimous Adoption Of United Nations Charter; Joint State- ment Expected

Potsdam, July 30.—(AP)—Pres- ident Truman, Prime Minister At- tlee and Premier Stalin worked on the final language of tentative agreement reached in 11 days of topflight deliberations at the Big Three conference entered the home stretch today on a keynote of har- mony.

Observers here believed the har- monious resumption of the con- ference following the defeat of Winston Churchill's government by the British Labor Party augured well for a successful conclusion.

There has been no notable break in the continuity of the discussions and prospects were for an early conclusion, perhaps within the next two or three days.

The conference was described of- ficially as making progress on the final communiqué which will reveal plans for the future of Europe.

While President Truman's con- tinuing primary international in- terest is an early end to the war with Japan, there was no author- itative information whether the Pacific would be mentioned specifically in the final statement.

The U. S. Senate's ratification of the United Nations charter with only two opposition votes armed the president with a trump card as the deliberations entered the final stage.

He now is able to tell Rus- sian and British that the United States' abandonment of traditional isolationism has the overwhelming support of the American people.

Comment was withheld here on the Australian refusal to subscribe to the Truman-Churchill-Chiang Kai Shek ultimatum to Japan. The Australian statement said the ul- timatum was too lenient and Aus- tralia was not consulted.

Meanwhile, President Truman disclosed some of his views regard- ing American soldiers to a Stars and Stripes correspondent.

He said he did not favor bringing American soldiers' wives and fam- ilies overseas because he did not want Americans to settle in Europe. The problem of soldiers separated from their families can be solved best by getting the men home, he said.

He confessed that when he was a soldier in the last war he wanted to get home as soon as possible. (Continued on Page Six)

No Proof That Hitler Is Dead

Berlin, July 30.—(AP)—Col. Gen. Alexander Gorbatov, Russian chair- man of the Allied Kommandatur for Berlin, said today "there is no de- mite proof that Hitler is dead" and he did not rule out the possibility that the former fuhrer was alive and in hiding.

Gorbatov said he had heard that Hitler's dentist had identified a jaw- bone as that of the former leader, but added that he knew nothing be- yond the rumor.

PETAIN TRIAL MOVES ALONG

Mysterious Major De- fends Aged Marshal

Paris, July 30.—(AP)—Mysteri- ous Maj. Jean Lottanau-Lacau tes- tified at the treason trial of Mar- shal Petain today that "I am hor- rified to see man of nearly 100 years of age blamed by others for their own errors."

The "mystery man" of the trial was hustled into the court room at the request of the presiding judge only a short while after police had announced their search for him had been unsuccessful.

He followed to the stand Edouard Herriot, three-time premier be- tween wars, who said that President Roosevelt "placed at our disposal material which we needed in the days before the collapse of France. When Herriot concluded, the State announced it had finished its list of witnesses.

Herriot accused Petain of thwarting the government's effort to escape to North Africa.

Alice Mandel, 15-year-old daugh- ter of the slain Georges Mandel, former French minister of interior and of colonies, was excused from testifying. She wrote a letter say- ing, "I could only weep in the pres- ence of the man who made my fa- ther suffer so much."

Lottanau-Lacau limped into the courtroom on a cane and at once enquired for the Newark, N. J. air- port.

The WAR TODAY

An Analysis Of The News

The London Times (known both as the Thunder and as the Eng- lishman's Bible) remarks of British Labor's great victory that there's no reason "why the world should look for any revolutionary change in foreign—or indeed—in domestic policy."

Having lived in England many years your columnist accepts that as a fair appraisal. The land of Cedric the Saxon—aristocracy, middle-class and labor—rarely has leaped without taking a good look.

However, we shall make a mistake if we don't recognize this political turn-over as epochal, not only for Britain but for the world. What might be regarded as a passing storm in one of the more influen- tial countries of the continent cannot be dismissed lightly in staid England.

The voters of this traditionally Conservative country have given a clear mandate to try the experi- ment of Socialistic nationalization. Of course we needn't worry about this affecting John Bull's pledges regarding the war and global reha- bilitation. His word is his bond. Still, this "swing to the left" is likely to affect the outside world both politically and economically.

We may expect, I believe, that Socialism's surge to power in Brit- ain will afford strong encouragement for similar movements on the European continent, which already

is seething with political Leftist fer- ment.

British Labor is dead against what is called Tory imperialism, and therefore there may be some modi- fication in London's attitude to- wards the old zones of influence.

The economic side strikes me as being a potential block-buster un- less handled with extreme care. Any sweeping experiment in state own- ership and the consequent displace- ment of private enterprise, would be bound to produce a big change, and whether it would be for the better or for the worse is one of the imponderables. Certainly it would affect not only England but foreign countries, including the United States. Britain is a mighty cog in world economy.

Precisely because it is an expedi- tion into the unknown, many ob- servers believe that the Laborites will proceed circumspectly. Prob- ably the first changes will include nationalization of the coal mines and transport. So far as the mines are concerned, one feels sure that the majority of English people will welcome the change if for no other reason than to better the plight of the great army of miners who long have suffered terrible poverty.

Wholesale nationalization over- night doesn't seem likely. Prime Minister Attlee's government is making its experiment at one of the most trying times in Britain's his- tory. It faces a tremendous task of

Empire State Build- ing Reopened For Business Today

New York, July 30.—(AP)—Busi- ness was resumed today on 76 floors of the 102-story Empire State build- ing, where Saturday a B-25 bomber crashed into the 79th floor, killing 13 persons and injuring 26 others.

Some confusion was reported in the lobby, because only four of 10 elevators serving the 66th to 102nd floors were operating. Other eleva- tors operated at reduced speed.

Preparations were being made to set up temporary headquarters for those offices closed above the 76th floor. Offices of the National Catho- lic Welfare Council, where the plane struck, were closed, as was the observation tower.

Workers continued to clear away rubble at the scene of the crash.

An Army board of inquiry check- ed the wreckage on the 79th floor of the building—913 feet above Fifth Avenue—for causes of the specta- cular crash.

Army officials made no definite statement regarding damage to the building, which Gen. Drum at first believed would amount to \$500,000 but later said could not yet be ac- curately estimated.

However, Army Public Relations officers said that in similar cases the Army ordinarily has assumed all responsibility.

Gen. Ira Eaker, deputy command- er of the Army Air Forces told Mayor F. H. LaGuardia in a letter made public yesterday of the sym- pathy of the AAF for "all our citi- zens killed, injured or disturbed by the disaster."

Eight of the 13 crash victims had been identified yesterday, including the three aboard the B-25 two- engine "Billy Mitchell" bomber bound for the Newark, N. J. air- port.

The three men were Lt. Col. Wil- liam F. Smith, Jr., 27, Watertown, Mass., the B-25 pilot; T. Sgt. Chris- topher S. Dmitrovich, 31, Granite City, Ill., plane engineer, and avia- tion machinist mate Albert G. Per- na, 19, Brooklyn, who had hitched a ride on the plane.

Most of the remaining victims were women stenographers employ- ed in the 79th floor offices of the National Catholic Welfare Con- ference, caught beneath falling office partitions when the heavy wreck- age of the plane hurtled through the building. Flaming gasoline flooded the 79th and adjoining floors, burning victims and making identifications difficult.

The pilot had been in radio com- munication with LaGuardia Field a few minutes before the crash, and was told by the control tower that it could not "see the top of the Empire State Building." The B-25 continued southward along Fifth Avenue, hitting the huge building squarely just before 10 a. m. Sat- urday.

Invasion Of Japan In Making

American Military Leaders Promise Japan Unprecedent- ed Destruction; Jap Premier Says Ulti- matum To Be Ignor- ed

Guam, July 30.—(AP)—Three American military leaders today promised Japan an unprecedented dosage of destruction to be climaxed by invasion in overwhelming force.

Rear Adm. D. C. Ramsey, chief of staff of the U. S. Fifth Fleet, declared in a broadcast to the United States that the invasion already had begun in effect, with the ever- tightening blockade and ever-in- creasing bombing and shelling of the enemy's home islands.

Maj. Gen. Curtis E. Lemay, com- mander of the 20th Air Force, said in another broadcast that his re- markable advance notice pamphlets on Japanese cities marked for de- struction by Superfortresses were intended "so that all the Japanese people must realize that further resis- tance is senseless and will only lead to the complete destruction of their industries and their urban and in- dustrial areas."

Ramsey spoke on the Mutual Network, Lemay on American Broadcasting facilities.

Gen. Spaatz, commander of the U. S. Strategic Air Forces, said in a press conference that fleets of more than 1,000 B-29s soon would be sent against the enemy with twice the tonnage the American strategic air forces in Europe ever dropped on the Germans in one mission.

Noting that the Japanese had rejected the Allied ultimatum to surrender, he said "it is a harsh fate which the enemy has chosen. In all world history there is no more glaring example of a nation imposing disaster upon itself. For these people, the language of bombs and guns is apparently the only convincing language."

Lemay, discussing his advance notice system, referred to "inaugur- ating this program," implying that it would be used again.

Spaatz, in his brief discussion of the B-29 program, said, "the great- est force you can throw against them (the Japanese) the quicker they are liable to call it quits."

St. Charles, Va., July 30.—(AP)— A cry that their religious freedom had been violated went up from a hill-country cult of snake handlers today after State troopers burst into their rites and killed four of their reptiles.

What are our sons in the army fighting for anyway? shouted cult leaders at yesterday's interruption of their ritual, propounded as a demonstration of faith based on the Scriptures.

Preachers of the cult at the after- noon-long ceremony dwelt at length upon the comment of an unidentified soldier wearing ribbons and medals who before the officers in- tervened walked up to them and asked:

"What are we fighting for? This is dictatorship."

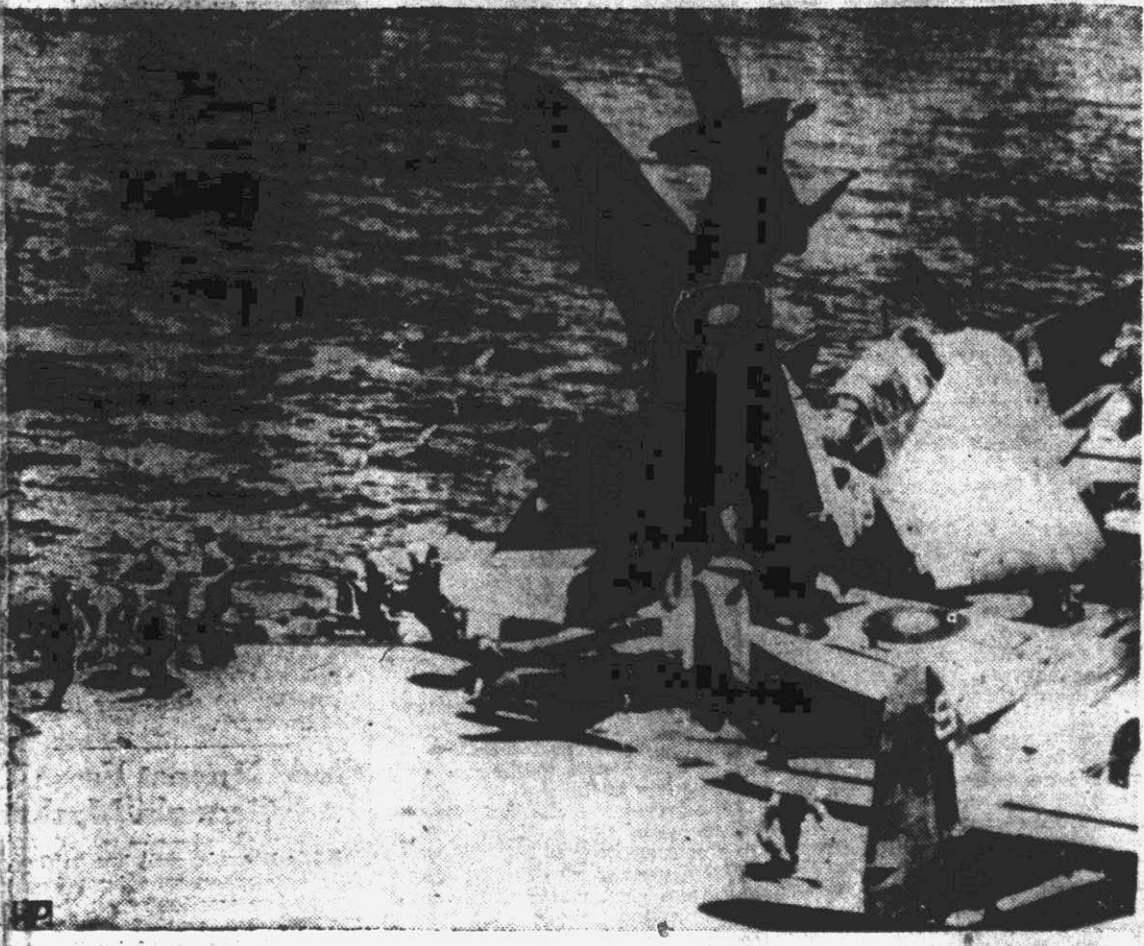
The troops were sent by Gov. Col- atre Darden acting on a ruling of Attorney General A. P. Staples that the snakes were a menace to public safety just as a mad dog might be.

They went into action when a cult- ist slipped around to an automobile parked in the roped-off stage arena in a valley between two crazy mountains and pulled out a mass of writhing copperheads and rattlesnakes.

A crowd of 5,000 gathered mainly from Tennessee, Kentucky and Vir- ginia looked on spellbound. Frenzied, shouting cultists stretched up their arms and in a moment a half dozen of them were fondling the snakes and wrapped them around their necks.

Police Charge Bethel Veteran With Hit- And-Run Driving

America May Pro- ceed Alone Unless Early Action Is Taken

London, July 30.—(AP)—An au- thoritative American source said today Justice Robert H. Jackson had told British, Russian and French representatives that an agreement must be reached this week on plans for trial of war criminals.

Jackson is special U. S. prosecu- tor for the war crimes trial.

The source said Jackson took the position that unless talk stops and action starts, the United States will move alone toward bringing the major criminals to action.

The American Supreme Court justice holds a strong hand since a majority of the Germans are likely to stand trial as war crim- inals in American hands. These include Herman Goering, Joachim Von Ribbentrop, Julius Streicher, Robert Ley and high ranking gen- erals in Adolf Hitler's army.

Perhaps the major point still un- settled centered about Jackson's de- termination to incorporate in the plan for trial an agreement de- fining a war of aggression as an international crime. This defini- tion would include such acts as economic aggression and the mass- ing of troops along a border to en- force demands.

Smooth Sailing For New Charter

Washington, July 30.—(AP)— Three senators offer critical of ad- ministration foreign policies today forecast smooth sailing for legisla- tion to carry out American partici- pation in the United Nations peace- keeping organization.

In separate interviews, Senators Wheeler (D-Mont.), La Follette (Progressive-Wis.) and Rovencomb (R-W.Va.) said that if the President's primary authority is limited to the use of armed forces for policing the peace and if the size of military commitments assigned to the league is small, they can see no reason for congressional controversy. All three voted for the United Nations chart- er when it was ratified by the Sen- ate Saturday on an 89 to 2 roll call.

The two "No" votes were cast by Senators Langer (R-ND) and Shipstead (R-Minn.).

Administration leaders have in- dicated clearly they will ask in forth- coming legislation that the Presi- dent control this country's vote in the proposed world security council. They have said the United States' representative would be authorized to vote for the use of force without consulting Congress only in situ- ations short of full scale warfare.

This would not infringe on Con- gress' right to declare war.

In addition, charter sponsors have made it plain they believe only a relatively small American force need be assigned to the new league, since all of the 50 members will contrib- ute.

CLOSING TRAP ON YAMASHITA

Jap General Still Offering Bitter Resistance

With U. S. 14th Army Corps, Northern Luzon, July 30.—(AP)—A personal war between Japanese Gen. Tomoyuki Yamashita and American and Filipino forces, fought in an area so high that clouds often in- terrupt combat, dominates the final three pronged campaign to eliminate 24,000 Japanese on Luzon.

A total of 12,226 counted enemy dead in the first 27 days of July testifies to bitterness of this con- flict. It is characterized by the terrain, which Lt. Gen. Oscar W. Griswold, commander of the 14th Corps termed the most rugged he ever encountered. Stubborn enemy resistance is colored by the fact an unusually high total of 1,543, in- cluding 982 Japanese soldiers and 561 Japanese civilians, have surren- dered this month.

Today On The Home Front

Washington, July 30.—(AP)— Here's an explanation—now that the Senate has approved our join- ing the United Nations—of what the score is.

The organization probably won't be operating for another year. So far only the United States, Costa Rica, El Salvador and Nicaragua have joined.

A nation joins when its govern- ment gives formal approval to the charter—rules and regulations— which 50 nations drew up at San Francisco.

Those 50 included the Big Five United States, Britain, Russia, France, China—and 45 smaller na- tions.

Before the organization can start operating all five of the Big Five and a majority of the smaller na- tions must give formal approval.

Once it starts up in business the organization use when needed to keep peace.

That probably will take a year or more. There may be a stormy fight in Congress over this. It will involve sending our forces into ac- tion abroad.

Then we must decide how far the President can go in telling our re- presentative on the Security Coun- cil when and where to promise use of our forces. (The Security Coun- cil is the big club of the United

Third Fleet Renews Blows Against To- kyo Area; Six Of 11 Forewarned Cities Smashed By Super- fort Raids; Jap Na- vy Written Off As War Potential

Guam, July 30.—(AP)—Mag- made destruction hit the heart of the Japanese empire again today as the U. S. Navy sent its bold Third Fleet in to shell one big in- dustrial city and 1,500 American and British carrier planes ripped up 60 airfields and other military installations from Kyushu to To- kyo itself.

American war power, parading from one momentous week into an- other, piled up triumph after tri- umph in a message of steel and fire that the Allied surrender ult- imatum means what it said—quit or be destroyed.

With action continuing, events recorded were:

Staff officers wrote off the grog- gory Japanese Navy as dead follow- ing the knockout punch at the Ku- re naval base Saturday.

Task force 38 stood close inshore and poured 1,000 tons of shells in- to the important industrial and rail city of Hamamatsu, 120 miles south of Tokyo and three miles inland, leaving targets "burning fiercely" after a one hour assault today.

Carrier aircraft, loaded with rockets and heavy caliber machine- gun shells, rampaged virtually un- molested over the home island of Honshu from Kobe to Tokyo, hunt- ing Japanese airplanes and air- fields, railroad locomotives and anything else of military value.

One returning fighter group roamed at will over a "deserted" Tokyo before hammering a "huge" war plant in the southeast section of the capital. It didn't drop a sin- gle round of anti-aircraft fire.

The mighty Superfortresses com- manded announced "excellent re- sults" in the bombing yesterday of six of the 11 forewarned Japanese industrial target towns, a mission accomplished without the loss of a single plane, and promised to continue its pre-announced cam- paign of devastation.

The Japanese radio acknowledged the surface and air attacks, and said "some 700" carrier planes par- ticipated in attacks in the Tokyo area and adjacent prefectures.

Quoting a communique issued jointly today by the Kanto Army and Yokosuka naval station head- quarters, the Domei agency said targets were "mainly airfields and other military installations and factories."

Domei claimed Japanese "air units" went into action, "intercept- ing" and "gaining war results"—a claim unsubstantiated by American and British airmen.

Domei later reported that two- based Mustang P-51 fighter planes attacked the south central Hon- shu area, bombing and strafing air bases, warships and military estab- lishments in the vicinity of Ise Bay and Osaka.

Admiral Nimitz' headquarters, in the meanwhile, was busy tabulating results.

Thomas E. Tripp In Pacific
Aboard a Destroyer in the Pacific—One of the experienced trained gunners of a secondary battery of this ship is Thomas E. Tripp, 20, seaman, first class, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. B. Tripp, 303 Paris Avenue, Greenville.

Tripp's most recent brush with the enemy was an encounter with Japanese suicide planes off the Ryukyus.

"One of these," he recounted, "dove on a carrier, then apparently decided that his chances there were poor and veered towards us. We poured the slugs into him as he came smoking past our fantail, and splashed him at a safe distance."

Tripp had his introduction to Pacific warfare in the Marianas campaign. His ship fired more than 5,200 rounds in the bombardment of Saipan and Tinian and, during the battle of the Philippine Sea, took part in the chase of Japan's Imperial Fleet and shot down two enemy planes.

Operations off Honshu in February's carrier raid on Tokyo took Tripp less than 100 miles off the Japanese coast, and since then he has participated in extensive offshore operations in support of the two Jima and Okinawa campaigns. In the action his ship shared in the sinking of a Jap submarine.

Tripp also participated in the Palaus campaign, and the landings on Leve and Luzon. Last October 24-25, in the battle of Surigao Strait, his ship attacked Japanese surface forces and gained an assist in the torpedoing of an enemy battleship and destroyer.

Good Report From Georgia Markets
Billie Branch, well-known Greenville auctioneer, who is auctioneering at two warehouses on the Adel, Ga., tobacco market this season, was much impressed by the prices being paid on the Georgia-Florida tobacco markets, he stated in a letter to Rufus V. Keel of Greenville.

When You Are Eligible For New Tires

1. That if you die they may be eligible for monthly old-age and survivors insurance benefits. Tell them that widows with children under 18 in their care get special consideration under the law. If you have neither wife nor child, but your parents are dependent upon you, tell your parents that if you die they may be eligible for monthly benefits at age 65. If you have no children, tell your wife or parents not to wait till they are 65 to file their claim for benefits; they may be eligible for a lump-sum death benefit, and the time for claiming this expires after two years.

2. That you have a social security card. Tell your family where you keep it. Tell them in case of your death to take it to the nearest Social Security Board office and file a claim for benefits. It will save them time in starting the payments if they have your card.

3. That they don't have to pay anybody to get benefits for them. At the nearest office of the Social Security Board they will get—free of charge—all the help they need in filing a claim. If they don't know where the Social Security Board office is, they can ask at the post office.

4. That in case you die they should file their claim promptly. Survivors benefits are retroactive for only three months. If your family file their claim in the fourth month after the month in which you die, they will lose one month's payments. A claim for a lump-sum benefit must be filed within two years of your death.

Mrs. Duffy, also said that the worker who has told his family

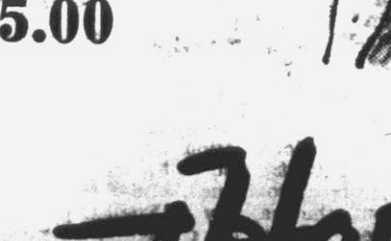
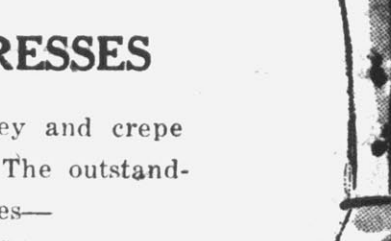
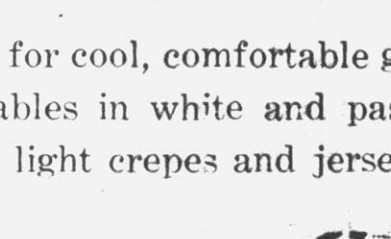

"After all," she changed to a cooing voice, "she could postpone getting one indefinitely couldn't she?"

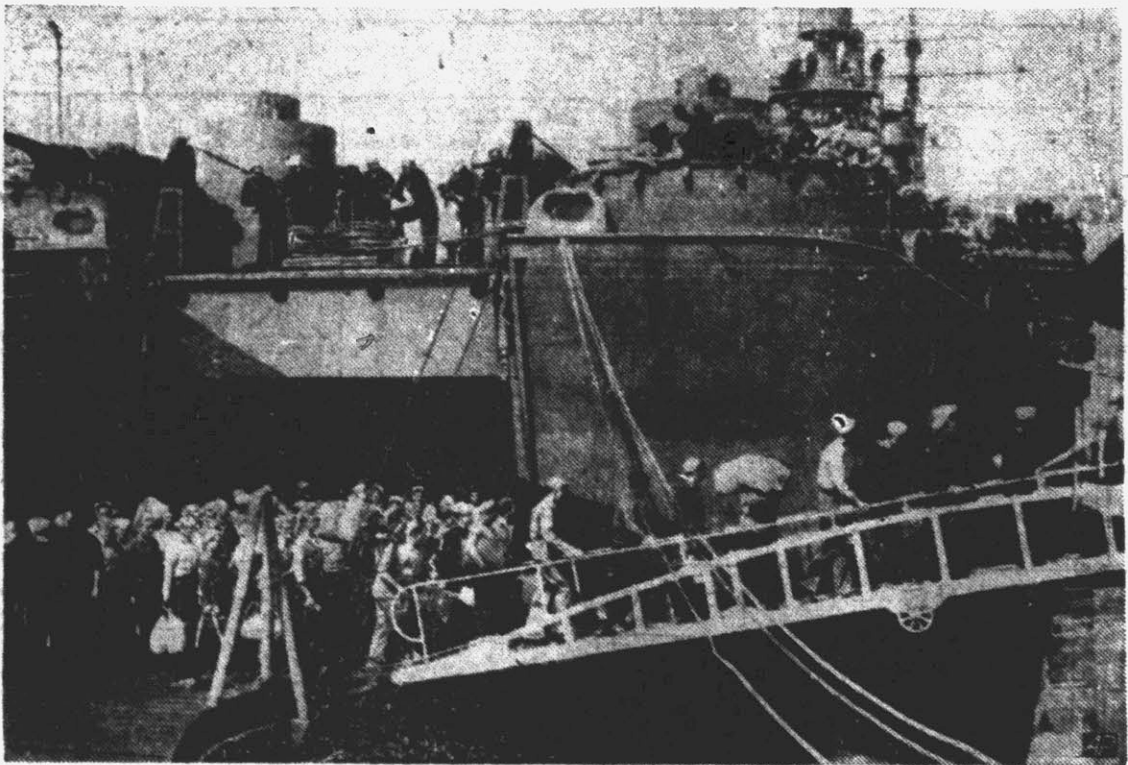
"I suppose so."

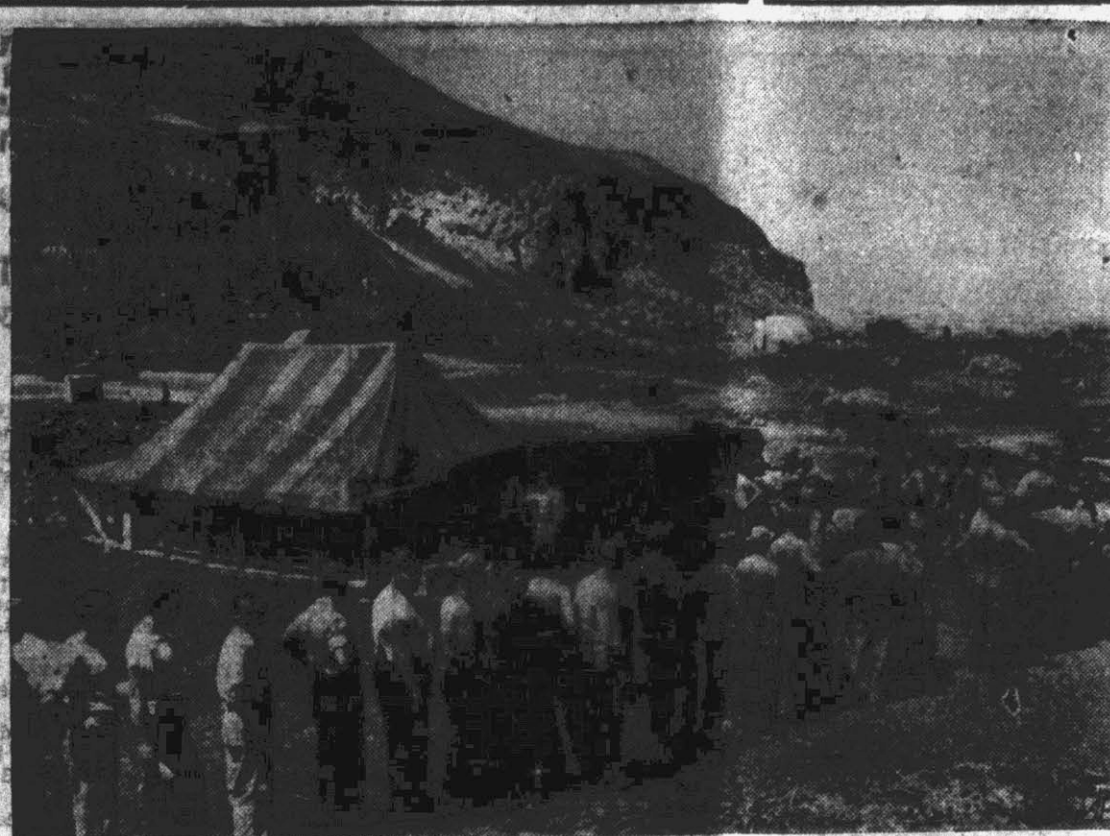

Hank Borowy, whom the pennant-hungry Chicago Cubs purchased from the New York Yankees only last Friday for a reported \$100,000, already has begun to pay dividends on the investment.

The frail-looking righthander, whose departure from the American League via the waiver route caused Owner Clark Griffith of Washington to go up in arms over the waiver clause, made his National League debut a successful one yesterday by pitching a 3-2 victory over Cincinnati. The Cubs scored a double triumph over the Reds. When Hank Wyse won the opener, 4-1, for his 15th win, he tops for National League hurlers.

Pordham Hank limited the Reds to seven safeties, and after yielding single tallies in the second and third frames, held the Redlegs scoreless the remainder of the contest. A home run by Bill Nicholson in the first with one on got Borowy off to a good start, and a pair of singles by Andy Pafko and Lenny Merullo in the sixth, sandwiched around a sacrifice, proved to be the deciding run.

Borowy came close to seeing his game tied in the ninth, but a fine throw by Harry Lowrey cut down Frank McCormick, trying to score from second on Eddie Miller's single, the usually mild-mannered Bill McKechnie and Third Baseman Steve Mesmer of the Reds kicked so strenuously they were ruled off the field.

The double win gave the Bruins a record of 13 victories in 13 starts against the Reds, and increased their first place lead over the St. Louis Cardinals to five and a half games.

If President Larry MacPhail of the Yankees felt any remorse over Borowy's fine showing with the Cubs, he must have been comforted by the Bronx's double win over Connie Mack's Philadelphia Athletics, 2-1 and 11-3. The clean sweep moved the Yanks into second place, one game over Washington's Senators who lost to Boston.

Ernie Bonham outlasted Bob Newson and Steve Gerkin in 10 innings of the opener, with Gerkin, who hasn't won a game this year, charged with his 11th loss. The second was a romp for Bill Zuber.

Brooklyn handed the slumping Boston Braves a double licking, 5-2 and 15-4, to make a clean sweep of its four game series with the Hubmen and handing the losers their ninth straight setback.

The Cardinals divided a double header with Pittsburgh. The Pirates won the opener, 9-6, in 10 innings and the Redbirds, with Lefty George Dockins gaining his first starting victory of the season, winning the second 6-4. A three-run homer by St. Louis' Whitey Kurowski was the winning blow.

A Detroit crowd of 33,789 saw the Tigers come from behind to defeat the Chicago White Sox, 4-2, in a single contest. Al Benton won his ninth for the Tigers.

Tex Shirley of St. Louis and Jim Bagby of Cleveland swapped shutouts as the Browns won the first, 4-0, and the Indians the second, 3-0.
