

President Issues Report On Pearl Harbor Disaster

Army Board Of Inquiry Places Part Of Blame On Chief Of Staff Marshall; Truman And Secretary Of War Stimson Say Criticism "Unjustified"

Washington, Aug. 29.—(AP)—High officials in Washington were criticized today for the Pearl Harbor disaster by President Truman today of army and navy investigations of the disaster that plunged the United States into World War II.

The President reserved decision on whether court martials will be asked. He said in releasing the reports that if the convening of courts martial is indicated, prompt and fair trials will be held.

But the army and navy reports clearly indicated that the service investigators do not feel that any court martial proceedings are at all warranted.

Secretary of War Stimson reaffirmed a statement made last year that the evidence "does not warrant the institution of any further proceedings against any officer of the army."

The navy's court of inquiry similarly concluded that the record "would not support the trial by general court martial of any person or persons in the naval service."

The army's Pearl Harbor board held Gen. George C. Marshall, chief of staff, at least partially responsible for the blow at Pearl Harbor. But President Truman and Secretary of War Stimson sharply rejected such a conclusion, the President stating "I have the fullest confidence in the skill, energy and efficiency of all our war leaders, both army and navy."

The navy's court of inquiry directed criticism at Admiral Harold R. Stark, chief of naval operations in November, 1941, and who has just returned from wartime command of the fleet in European waters.

The reports received sharply criticized analyses of the actions of Rear Admiral Husband E. Kimmel and Maj. Gen. Walter C. Short, the navy and army commanders in Hawaii at the time of the Japanese strike. Both the men have repeatedly asked for public trials.

Secretary of the Navy Forrestal directed in the case of both Admiral Stark and Admiral Kimmel that they should not hereafter "hold any position in the United States navy which requires the exercise of superior judgment."

The army board made no recommendation as to General Short.

Secretary Stimson in a statement coinciding with the release of the reports flatly rejected a suggestion of criticism on former Secretary of State Hull in the peace negotiations with Japan.

President Truman called a special news conference to hand to reporters the approximately 37,000 words of material involved in the army and navy reports and separate statements by himself and the secretary of war.

Mr. Truman told this conference that in his judgment, criticism of General Marshall was "entirely unjustified."

Begin Evacuation Of Houston's Survivors

MARINE ACE STILL ALIVE

Major Boyington Had Been Missing For 20 Months

Aboard USS Ancon, Tokyo Bay, Aug. 29.—(AP)—Maj. Gregory Boyington, 32-year-old irrepressible Marine ace of the South Pacific who was convinced no Japanese airman could kill him, was reported alive today nearly 20 months after he vanished in a cloud during an air battle over still unconquered Rabaul.

The report was tenuous. It was flashed to this communications ship from the American cruiser San Juan.

Details were lacking. The report was believed to have come from a Japanese pilot guiding the cruiser into Tokyo Bay or from Yankee airmen on Atsugi airdrome near Tokyo. Boyington won the congressional medal of honor for his exploits which began with the Flying Tigers in China and, so far as official records of this war go, over the enemy's mighty bastion on New Britain Island.

Typical of Boyington's confidence in his ability to come through was his promise to members of his "Black Sheep" squadron in the South Pacific that he would see

Around 300 Men From Lost Cruiser Reported In Jap Prison Camps In Thailand

Kandy, Ceylon, Aug. 29.—(AP)—The evacuation of 300 prisoners of war from Japanese war camps in Thailand, some of them survivors of the U. S. Cruiser Houston, began today by plane from Bangkok.

The Cruiser Houston had not been heard from since the battle of the Java Sea in 1942 until the prisoners were found in Thailand.

The first group was composed of approximately 122 former prisoners. Starting tomorrow, men released from Peituri camp near Bangkok will be flown out.

Released prisoners were described as "generally in pretty good condition."

Evacuation planes will fly the men to Calcutta.

Washington, Aug. 29.—(AP)—Another group of World War II survivors of the old heavy Cruiser Houston—has been accounted for after three and a half years of mystery.

Two emaciated enlisted men of the Houston's crew carried the word to a guerrilla training station in Thailand that several hundred of their mates were held by the Japanese in jungle prison camps.

The news was brought to the United States by Lt. Col. Nicol Smith, an underground operator for the Office of Strategic Services. Smith had it from Maj. Robert Bartlett of Los Angeles, commander of the station. Smith told the story at a news conference yesterday.

The Houston was hit by two eight-inch shells in the battle of the Java Sea on Feb. 27, 1942. The next night she started out from Tanjong Priok to try to run the Sunda Strait.

With her was the Australian cruiser Perth and trailing them the last word from any of the three came from the Eversten, which reported she had been caught by two enemy cruisers and was beaching in sinking condition.

Smith said the two enlisted men escaped from one of the prison camps, and aided by Thais, made

Gen. Wainwright Gets Decoration

Chungking, Aug. 29.—(AP)—Lt. Gen. Jonathan M. Wainwright, who will leave Chungking for Manila tomorrow on the way to witness Japan's formal surrender, was awarded the Distinguished Service Cross today for extraordinary heroism in action in the Philippines in 1942.

Wainwright, who led the American and Filipino stand on Corregidor, arrived here yesterday from Manchuria where he had been released from a Japanese prisoner of war camp after three years and three months internment.

Distinguished Service Crosses also were awarded today to Maj. Gen. Albert M. Jones of San Francisco and Maj. Gen. George F. Moore of Austin, Tex. T-Sgt. Hubert Carroll of Paris, Tex., was awarded the Silver Star.

NAZI TRIALS WILL BEGIN IN OCTOBER

Allies Name 24 Major War Criminals Whose Hearings Will Get Under Way At That Time

London, Aug. 29.—(AP)—The four major Western Allies today named 24 Nazi leaders and Prussian military chiefs among them Hermann Goering, Rudolf Hess, Wilhelm Keitel and Adm. Karl Doenitz—as defendants in the first mass trial of Germany's arch criminals early in October.

The list furnished the first evidence that Hess, Deputy Fuehrer for all Nazi Party affairs until 1941, when he made his sensational flight to England, was considered mentally able to stand trial with his one-time associates. Hess once was successor-designate to Hitler.

The list also included the name of Martin Bormann, Hitler's secretary. There had been no evidence previously of Bormann's whereabouts, despite unconfirmed reports that he and Hitler had perished together. Bormann was Hess' successor as deputy party leader.

The full list follows: Hermann Wilhelm Goering, who was designated successor to Hitler in September, 1939, and directed the Nazi air offensive.

Joachim Von Ribbentrop, former German ambassador to the United States, who directed Nazi intrigue in half a dozen European capitals as Germany's foreign minister.

Robert Ley, chief of the Nazi Party organization, commissioner for national housing, and chief of the German Labor Front.

Alfred Rosenberg, reich leader for ideology and foreign policy and propagandist, who took a leading role in anti-Semitism in Germany.

Hans Frank, who was governor general of Poland and an SS general.

Ernst Kaltenbrunner, Hitler's right hand man, chief of the Reich Security Department and chief of Criminal Police.

Wilhelm Frick, minister of interior and ruler of Bohemia and Moravia.

Julius Streicher, gauleiter of Franconia, editor of Der Sturmer, vicious anti-Semitic and schoolmaster by profession.

Field Marshal Wilhelm Keitel, chief of the Wehrmacht.

Dr. Walter Funk, president of the Reichsbank.

Hjalmar Schacht, minister of economics, commissioner of the four-year plan, and former president of the Reichsbank.

Today's Highlights Of Reconversion Program

Washington, Aug. 29.—(AP)—Congress loomed bigger in the reconversion scene today.

Full sessions won't start for another week, but committees of lawmakers were sweating it out.

They worked hard to catch up with the vast forces of change that were turned loose two weeks ago while they were on vacation.

And there was other news for Americans—about butter and leather, films and cameras, typewriters, home-building, army discharges and the financial condition of industry.

This was the picture in Congress. Two main proposals are being considered by committees. One is about unemployment—the other about "full employment." Both are favored by President Truman.

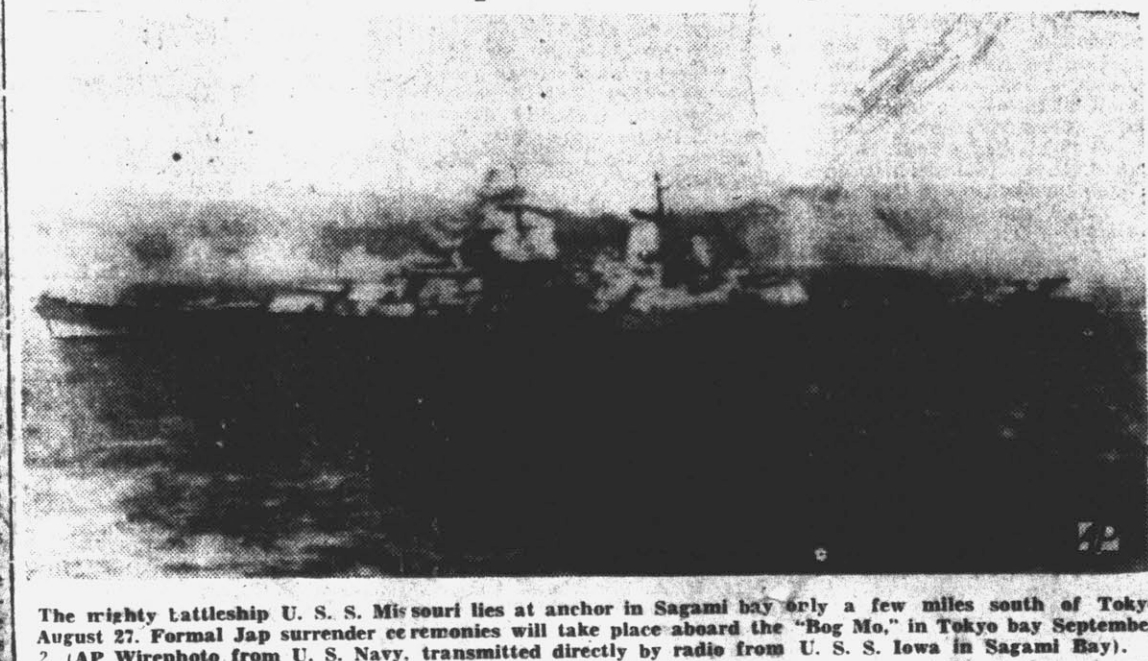
1. The unemployment bill would increase the help that states give their jobless citizens. If the bill is passed, the federal government will shell out enough money to allow each state to pay up to \$25 a week for 26 weeks. Most states pay less than that now.

2. The so-called "full employment bill" would do this: Every year the government would study industry's employment prospects and make recommendations for improving them. If this still seemed insufficient, the government could ask Congress to create jobs at federal expense. However, the pending bill by itself involves no federal spending.

COURT MOVES AT FAST PACE

Several Defendants Given Long Prison Terms

In Superior Court this week Sam Moore, Negro farm laborer of the Bell County community, faced Judge Charles Everett Thompson of Elizabeth City three times to be sentenced to prison and he was given a total of thirteen years—five of them to be served on the Pitt County roads and eight in the penitentiary. Incidentally, the grand jury has since returned a true bill against Moore, charging him with another robbery.

Three separate juries returned the verdicts.

In the first case Moore was convicted of breaking into J. B. Worthington's store near the County Home and the larceny of a quantity of gasoline rationing coupons. For this he received two years on the roads.

Another jury convicted Moore of breaking into and robbing Clifton Evans' home in the Bell County community. The court gave him three years on the roads on this charge, sentence to begin at expiration of previous sentence.

When Sam Moore's name was called the third time on charges of breaking into and robbing Clifton Evans' store Judge Thompson "looked high and far above his glasses," and ordered Clerk Dave T. House to make an entry of eight years in State Prison, sentence to begin at expiration of two previous sentences.

Failure Of Solicitors To Prosecute Causes Request For New Legislation

Raleigh, Aug. 29.—(AP)—Prosecution of election law violators would become the responsibility of the Department of Justice under terms of legislative measures to be sought of the next General Assembly by the State Election Board.

Board Chairman W. T. Joyner said yesterday that the board would prepare proposed legislation "to be submitted to the next general assembly providing for the placing of the prosecution for violation of the election laws as fully as possible under the Department of Justice."

The announcement was simultaneous with another, in which the board admitted inability to proceed further, under present laws, in legal action in connection with alleged irregularities during the 1944 general election in Davidson county.

The Davidson grand jury last week failed to return a bill of presentment. Joyner said of the Davidson case: "I was not able (in a study of present statutes) to find any legal authority for any further effective action on the part of the board, the governor or the attorney general in connection with the Davidson county prosecutions."

Under the constitution and all statutes, Joyner said, prosecution of election law violations is placed with the solicitor's office in the district concerned.

Joyner also cited two "past violations" of the election laws—one in Polk, the other in Graham county. In both cases, he said, the board called attention of the solicitor concerned to the alleged violations but no prosecution has yet resulted.

The board chairman revealed that, at the invitation of Governor Cherry, he and other state officials attended a meeting last Saturday at which the proposed legislative program affecting election law prosecutions was discussed.

At his press conference yesterday, the governor's only comment on the proposal was "there may be some difficulty in getting the general assembly to pass such an act."

Tobacco Sales Continue Heavy

First hand or producers' sales on the Greenville tobacco market for the season including yesterday were 7,875,529 pounds for \$3,421,003.68, an average of \$43.44 per hundred. Gross sales for the period including resales were 8,336,275 pounds.

Although the offerings so far this season have not been up to the quality of offerings for the same period last season's this year's price for the period is \$2.44 higher. Supervisor R. C. Rankin stated in making the report. Prices today, he said, were about the same as yesterday.

Offerings are still heavy despite warnings to growers that a sales holiday would have to be called unless the farmers held back in order to permit the factories to catch up.

A special meeting of tobacco officials in Raleigh to discuss steps for relieving the situation has been called for Saturday.

ASKS SUPPORT OF WORK BILL

Sen. Wagner Predicts Eventual 30-Hour Week

Washington, Aug. 29.—(AP)—The country cannot afford to "risk the chance" of wide unemployment by a hands-off policy on the part of the government on job controls, Secretary of Labor Lewis B. Schwellenbach said today.

The new Labor Secretary told a Senate banking subcommittee he was in full accord with the principles of the Wagner-Murray job assurance measure, and criticized those groups which, he said, believe it is "economically desirable to have a large pool of unemployed upon which to draw."

"I think those who take this position are mistaken," he asserted. "It may be that during the time when the problem of production was very difficult such arguments were valid. However the problem of production has been licked in this country. Our problem now is one of consumption. We can produce plenty."

Schwellenbach said former New Deal programs of providing work—such as NA, WPA, the Public Works Administration—have been "in the nature of partial approaches to the program," adding:

"They have all been adopted after unemployment became serious and began to threaten the foundations of our social and economic structure."

Every private device to attain full employment should be used first, he said, and only when that fails should public devices be used.

Admiral Nimitz will shift his five-starred flag from the battleship South Dakota to the new USS Missouri early Sunday morning. Allied dignitaries will witness Japan's formal surrender there later Sunday.

Admiral Halsey, whose 16-inch battleship group will cover the simultaneous seaborne landing at Yokosuka naval base steamed into Tokyo Bay aboard the proud battleship, on which the surrender will be signed Sunday with Lt. General Jonathan M. Wainwright, hero of Corregidor, among the witnesses.

The Missouri was followed by a line of other warships including the battleships South Dakota, veteran of South Pacific battles, and flagship of Admiral Nimitz, and the British Duke of York, conqueror in the Atlantic of the German Scharnhorst and now flagship of Adm. Sir Bruce Fraser.

Today On The Home Front

Washington, Aug. 29.—(AP)—The picture on the discharge of people from the armed service is changing. It will change more. Here's the score, up to date.

Will a veteran of the European war—when sent to the Pacific—be discharged if he becomes eligible for discharge?

Yes, the War Department says. He will be returned to the United States as fast as transportation permits.

Further: Once in the United States he will be released unless he has skill in any one of these three critical categories:

Mechanics who fit artificial limbs, radio transmitter attendants and electric cardiac specialists.

Men in those categories may be kept in service an additional six months beyond the time they become eligible for discharge.

Army and Navy have issued figures—since Japan quit—on the number of men they expect to discharge in the months to come. They are, as of now:

Navy—it has about 3,380,000 now. Within 12 months it will discharge about 2,830,000. This will leave it with 500,000 men and 50,000 officers.

Army—it has 8 million now. By July 1 it will discharge 5,500,000, still have 2,500,000, reduce that number further.

Nimitz Arrived In Tokyo Bay Today; MacArthur In Okinawa Ready For Flight To Japan Tomorrow; Gen. Wainwright And Associates To Witness Surrender

Okinawa, Aug. 29.—(AP)—Fleet Admiral Nimitz reached Tokyo Bay by seaplane this afternoon as General MacArthur waited at Okinawa for Thursday's mass occupation of vanquished Japan by 18,150 Allied troops from air and sea.

Naval officials already have inspected the Yokosuka naval base at close range and Tokyo radio said the Yokosuka marine transport board building has been chosen as general headquarters for the occupation forces.

First American ship to dock at Yokosuka, Task Force Commander Rear Adm. Oscar C. Badger said, will be the cruiser San Diego. He gave this tentative schedule of events:

British troops (250 Royal Marines, 200 Royal Navy personnel) ashore on two Tokyo Bay islands guarding Yokosuka at 6:15 a. m. Japan time (5:15 p. m. Wednesday, EWT) and Americans occupy a third island.

Americans (9,000 Marines and 1,200 sailors) land at and near Yokosuka naval base about 10 a. m. Japan time (9 p. m. Wednesday, EWT).

General MacArthur and his 7,500 airborne troops are expected at Atsugi airfield 20 miles southwest of Tokyo almost simultaneously.

American Marine or bluejacket units may also board the wrecked Japanese battleship Nagata, at Yokosuka. Admiral Badger said—to make sure her guns won't fire.

Weather permitting, the cruiser San Diego will dock at Yokosuka about 10:30 a. m. (9:30 p. m. Wednesday, EWT).

Rear Adm. Robert B. Carney, Admiral Halsey's chief of staff, will accept occupation papers at Yokosuka on behalf of his commander and Admiral Badger will supervise administration of the new American base.

An Analysis Of The News

The world is fortunate in that the American forces which are occupying Japan are seasoned veterans from Supreme Commander MacArthur down to the ranks, have learned much of Japanese mentality by hard experience.

Our success in reforming the Japs and making good global citizens of them depends heavily on the initial contact between these still medieval people and the first foreign troops ever to set foot on the Mikado's domains as conquerors. It's a great adventure into the unknown, for while Japanese officers were "polite as pie" to the American troops, the very excellent state in which we want it for a starter—but while this is an essential step in the reform of Japan, the real change will come through education and not through manhandling. That's why the relationship established in the early days of the occupation is so vital.

Certainly the qualifications of our

high command leave nothing to be desired. MacArthur has had a long and varied experience in the Orient. Lt. General Robert Eichelberger, commander of the U. S. Eighth Army which will occupy the Tokyo area, is a Far Eastern specialist and has had close contact with the Japanese for nearly a generation. We may be sure that the lesser officers have been selected with extreme care.

It's vastly encouraging to see that while MacArthur is proceeding firmly he also is moving with extreme care. Of course this procedure is being followed in part as a safeguard against possible hostile demonstrations by disgruntled militarists or fanatics, but the indications are that the commander is equally concerned with the first impressions created in Japan by his forces.

As regards the danger of sporadic attacks on our men by misguided Japanese elements, MacArthur is in position to deal with anything and everything through the tremendous Allied striking-power at his disposal. The naval fleet which is lying off Tokyo is the greatest ever assembled, and with a wave of the hand he could unleash far more air strength against Japan than has yet been seen in action anywhere.

prepared to sail for Japan to join the occupation fleet. It will arrive after the landing of the 10,000 American and British Marines and bluejackets at Yokosuka and probably will be assigned to patrol the northern Japanese waters.

Japanese medical officers promised that when occupation forces land, 6,125 prisoners of war and 94 civilian internees would be released in the Tokyo area.

Announcements of new Japanese surrenders trickled in from Pacific islands.

Old Glory flew over Mill Atoll in the Marshalls after the surrender of the surviving 2,400 Nipponese of an original garrison of 4,500.

Eight thousand other Japanese capitulated on Morotai, and nearby, by-passed Halmahera. The surrender to Maj. Gen. Harry Johnson, commander of the 93rd army division, was the first large scale capitulation in the southwest Pacific.

Simultaneously with his arrival on Okinawa, MacArthur was awarded his fourth Distinguished Service Medal, this one by President Truman. It was for his liberation of the Philippines.

The Allied supreme commander saw plane after plane lifting off Okinawa's runways to ferry a few key personnel and much additional equipment to Atsugi to augment that flown in yesterday in 48 transports.

Later in the day, he watched the loading of his combat-equipped airborne troops who will accompany him to Atsugi as the army's first major occupation force. The transports—two-engined C-47s and C-46s and four-engined C-54s—were

scheduled to take off at one-minute intervals and to land at three-minute intervals on Atsugi's two usable airstrips, 5,600 and 5,100 feet long.

The American flag was raised at Atsugi at noon yesterday, shortly after the advance party landed. No Japanese flag was flying.

MacArthur was scheduled to confer here with General Spaatz, commander of the U. S. Army strategic air forces, and with Lt. Gen. Robert L. Eichelberger, commander of the U. S. Eighth Army, who will command ground forces in the Tokyo area.

Wainwright and MacArthur will be reunited in Japan this weekend. Wainwright, liberated dramatically from a Japanese prison camp last week, arrived in Chungking yesterday.

Accepting MacArthur's invitation to accompany him aboard the Missouri Sunday for the surrender signing, he messaged his thanks and said he was taking with him these men:

Brig. Gen. Lewis C. Beebe, his chief of staff; Col. John Pugh and Maj. Thomas Dooley, his aides, and T-Sgt. John Carroll, his orderly chauffeur.

"All of this group were with me on the tragic day when I had to surrender Corregidor (May, 1942) and I'm especially anxious that they be present when we accept the Japanese surrender," he radioed.

Also in the party will be Lt. Gen. Arthur Ernest Percival, governor of Singapore, who was released from a Manchurian prison camp with Wainwright. They will leave Chungking tomorrow morning, fly to Manila and then proceed to Japan. If possible, they will also witness the surrender in Northern Luzon of Japanese Gen. Tomoyuki Yamashita, to whom Percival was forced to yield Singapore in February of 1942.

NO REPORT YET ON ROOSEVELT

Study Of His Financial Transactions Incomplete

Washington, Aug. 29.—(AP)—The House Ways and Means Committee informed Brig. Gen. Elliott Roosevelt today it is prohibited at this time by law from making public the Treasury study of his financial affairs.

The committee said it will decide when the record is complete whether to publish the whole record in a formal report to the House.

Chairman Doughton (D-N.C.) telegraphed the committee's statement to Roosevelt at Beverly Hills, Calif. Roosevelt, who recently went on the Army inactive list by his own request, wired the committee yesterday requesting that the full report of the study of his business affairs be made public immediately, saying that "continued speculation and erroneous stories can only further distort the facts."

"In response to your telegram x x you are advised that the Committee on Ways and Means is prohibited under Section 55 (D) and (F) of the Internal Revenue Code from making the report on this and other loans public, unless through a report to the Congress.

"As soon as we complete our studies, including the matter of your tax liabilities, the committee will take such further action as it deems warranted by the facts and circumstances."

Doughton told newspapermen later that young Roosevelt can make his own testimony public if he desires. He added that he assumed that Roosevelt has a copy of the statement.

The Internal Revenue code prevents release of information in an income tax return.

Doughton emphasized to newspapermen that the report into young Roosevelt's financial transactions is not complete.

A special session of the committee was called today to consider young Roosevelt's request.

The committee ordered the Treasury to make the study after reports were published that young Roosevelt in 1939 borrowed \$200,000 from John Hartford, president of the Great Atlantic & Pacific Tea Co. Those reports said Jesse Jones, then Secretary of Commerce, settled the loan for \$4,000 and that Hartford listed the remaining \$196,000 as a bad debt deduction in his 1942 income tax return.

Biggest problem is releasing the Treasury's study is its volume.

The committee has a single copy and one member estimated it runs 800 typewritten pages. Thus the question appears to be whether to turn over the single copy to newspapermen, have the whole record printed or issue an official committee

summary. The record is complete on the Hartford transaction, but the committee is awaiting a Treasury report on other loans reported to have been made to Roosevelt at the time he was developing a Texas radio chain.

So voluminous is the Hartford-Roosevelt record that the committee was able to go through only a part of it in an all-day session Monday.

In asking that the full report be released, Roosevelt told Doughton: "Naturally I am not cognizant of testimony other than my own, but I feel strongly that the American people have a right to know all the facts and to hear all the evidence in connection with the report."

Ways and Means members said the committee's only interest in the inquiry is to see that federal revenues are protected.

Storm Damage Heavy

Houston, Texas, Aug. 29.—(AP)—A tropical hurricane that blew itself out in East Texas after ravaging the central Texas coast, wrought crop and property damage which may reach \$15,000,000, the Houston Post estimated today.

Meanwhile, work of aiding the homeless went on in stricken areas down the coast from here. The Salvation Army at Houston issued an appeal for clothing for storm sufferers, and the Red Cross put a network of aid facilities in action.

Doesn't Trust Japs

Miami, Fla., Aug. 29.—(AP)—Brig. Gen. Claire L. Chennault looked with satisfaction on the dying war in Asia today but saw danger in what he termed the Japanese "crossed-finger peace."

"The Japs are spiritually undefeated," said the founder of the Flying Tigers and commanding general of the succeeding China Air Task Force and 14th Air Force. "They realize after the atomic bombings that they didn't make proper preparations for the war. They feel they won't be defeated again."

To Hold Elections

London, Aug. 29.—(AP)—Reuters reported today the recording of a Tokyo broadcast saying that general elections would be held in Japan before the end of 1945.

To Aid War Prisoners

Washington, Aug. 29.—(AP)—Eighty-six American Red Cross men will land in Japan with General MacArthur's occupation forces, the Red Cross said today.

They will take with them messages from home, clothing and comfort supplies for liberated American prisoners of war and civilian internees.

Ever since the summer of 1943 the United States has produced each month more than five billion dollars worth of munitions.

Supplies For Prisoners

Guam, Aug. 29.—(AP)—Forty-one Superfortresses today dropped more than 140 tons of supplies to 23 Japanese prisoners of war camps.

These prisoners of war camps. They parachuted their "mercy bombs" over stockades around Tokyo, Yokohama, Osaka, Aichi on Honshu Island and Fukuoka on Kyushu in Japan proper and other camps in Korea. Eight planes made the Korea flight while the others went to Honshu and Kyushu. Other Superfortresses photographed still more prisoner camps for future attention.

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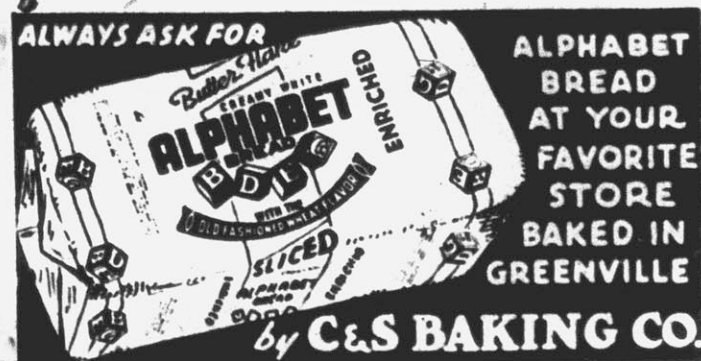

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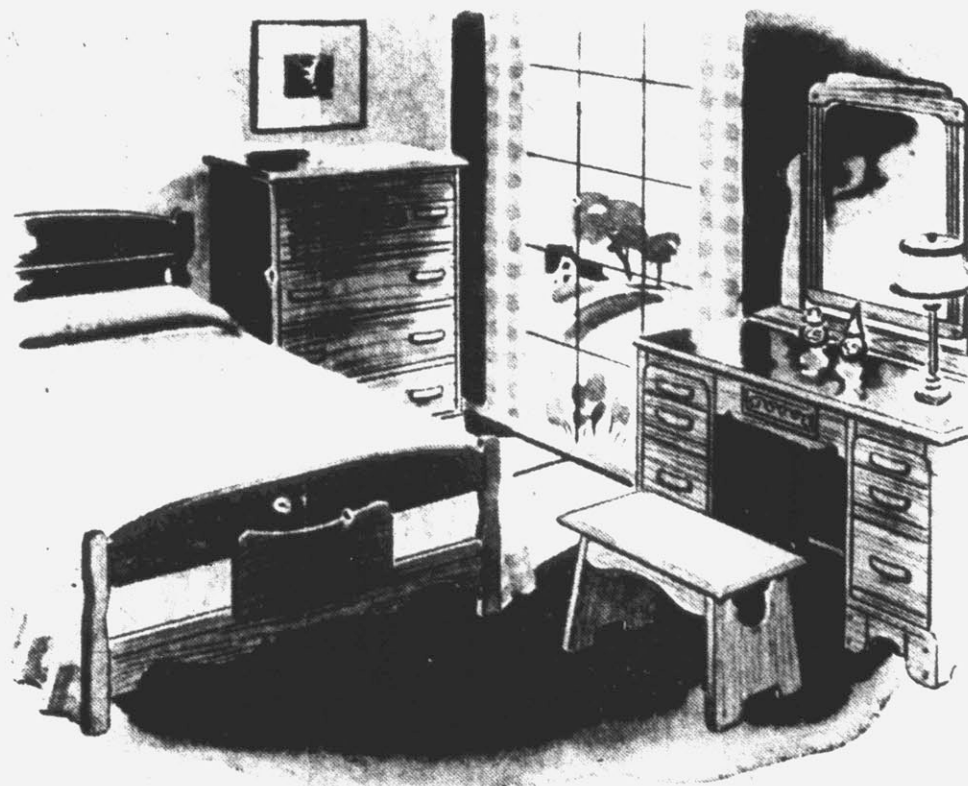

A GREAT GENIUS

One of the great figures of history was Hildebrand, chosen Pope in the year 1073. Napoleon later said: "If I were not Napoleon, I should wish to have been Hildebrand."

He was a genius in every sense of the term. Born of humble Italian parents, he made himself a power in Europe at a time when society was in a state of chaos. Few men in history have seen more clearly than he just what he wanted to do and pursued their aims with more unwavering persistency. The time came when he treated kings with scorn.

Genius is a strange quality possessed by a few men, generally to the blessing of their fellows. Once in a while a genius enlists in an evil cause and brings irreparable damage on his generation. This was true in the case of Napoleon. But Hildebrand's soul burned with a great desire to make the things of God dominant in the life of the world. It was his conviction that men could find happiness only by their complete submission to the will of God. In his endeavor to carry out his ideal, he used a genius for planning and administering with which God seemed definitely to have endowed him. This son of humble parents rose to a place where, without a rival, he dominated the life of Europe. His genius, consecrated to God, bore abundant fruit.

WASHINGTON DAYBOOK

Washington — The Mead Committee, or more correctly the Senate Special Committee to Investigate the National Defense Program, made its reputation in wartime but it has its peacetime work cut out for it.

Under provisions of the resolution which gave it birth four years ago, there isn't anything in reconversion, surplus property disposal or national defense which won't be subject to the committee's scrutiny, says Rudolph Halley, chief counsel. Under the last category, the committee can and will hold hearings on future use of the atomic bomb.

The future of the Army and Navy,

and the acquisition of bases in the Pacific, the Caribbean and North Atlantic are other phases of national defense the committee intends to explore.

Operating free from the wraps of military secrecy and the screen of wartime censorship, the committee is gleefully taping its fists for a few Sunday punches that the taxpayers may see, hear, and properly appraise.

Certain to come before the committee and thus before the public before very long will be that delayed debate on whether to blend the War and Navy departments into a three-pronged unified military department, with divisions of Army, Navy and Air. A subcommittee already has been appointed to study this.

In the realm of surplus property disposal and reconversion, the committee already is well grounded. Cutbacks and contract terminations will be given a thorough shakedown.

If there are any war frauds or postwar frauds in the making, this committee is far better prepared to handle them than any that existed in World War I. It was June, 1919, before Congress got around to setting up a special committee to investigate war expenditures then.

The Mead committee (it originally was the Truman committee) has been hard at this business for more than four years. Such members as Homer Ferguson (R-Mich.) and Harley M. Kilgore (D-Mich.) as well as Chairman James M. Mead, of New York, are listed among the Hill's veteran investigators.

Sen. Owen Brewster (R-Me.) another committee member, dropped into the White House not long ago. He returned to tell his colleagues that President Truman "invited the committee to watch and criticize his administration" just as "thoroughly as it had the Roosevelt administration when he (Truman) was chairman."

Any one who has kept pace with the Mead Committee since President Truman took office knows that's one invitation that wasn't necessary.

ni chief of the navy, director of U-boat warfare and the man who took over the rule of Germany after Hitler was reported dead.

Baldur von Schirach, chief of the Reich Youth Movement and ruler of Vienna.

Fritz Sauwke, manpower commissioner.

Albert Speer, chief of the Todt organization, which used slave-labor.

Martin Bormann, Hitler's secretary, deputy party leader, a general in the SS and SA.

Franz von Papen, former ambassador to Austria and Turkey.

Col. Gen. Alfred Gustav Jodl, chief of staff of the Wehrmacht.

Constantin von Neurath, Reichminister of foreign affairs until 1938, "protector" of Bohemia and Moravia for two years, and president of the Secret Cabinet Council.

The list was drawn up by the chief war crimes prosecutors for the United States, Britain, France and Russia. The United States representative is Justice Robert H. Jackson.

The trial probably will get under way early in October in a little courtroom at Nuernberg. A number of leading Nazis already have been lodged in the jail courthouse, where they will be joined soon by Tessa. A spokesman for Jackson said some of the group were in Russian hands. Presumably these include Bormann.

A statement of the four prosecutors said that "investigations are going forward of cases of other war criminals who have not been included in this list."

Copies of the formal indictments

have not yet been handed to the 24 Germans. The four-power agreement for the trial before an international military tribunal provides that they be given "reasonable" time to study the charges and prepare their defense.

government is showing every evidence of anxiety to cooperate wholly, the danger of trouble does exist. This in itself is a good answer to critics who are demanding why the Allies haven't already started cracking down on the Japanese militarists, some of whom appear to be in the government.

If these critics don't rock the boat we shall reach shore much quicker and in greater comfort. We may be quite sure that Japanese militarism is to be utterly crushed, as is being done in Germany, and that many war criminals will be walking their last mile before long. And Japan as a whole will be punished for her aggression.

These things are easy of achievement as compared with the task of reformation. Dealing with this aspect of the situation the London News Chronicle points out that for all the modernization of Japan, the nation in the main still remains feudal. Despite her limitation of what appears great in other countries, such as parliamentary institutions from Britain and technological ideas from America, Nippon is a country of 90,000,000 people who don't know what real liberty means. That, says the Chronicle, is our greatest problem.

go beyond May 12 of this year.

There's a point to be noted here and it will be explained later. But meanwhile, this is how the Army credit points are acquired:

1 for each month of service since Sept. 16, 1940.
1 for each month of overseas service.
12 for each dependent child, up to a total of 3. Wives don't count as dependents.

5 points for each campaign served. Examples: the New Guinea and Philippines campaigns would count as two, or a total of ten points.

5 points for various awards, ranging from the Purple Heart for wounds to medals for valor.

The Army's minimum of 85 points—for discharge—will be lowered to 80 when MacArthur needs no more combat troops.

Since the Japanese have surrendered and Japan is being occupied, this should be soon.

The Army based its credit system on points earned up to May 12. But suppose on Sept. 12 it lowered its 85 points for discharge to 80.

Would it also re-figure its credits

to give its men credit for the four months of service between May 12 and Sept. 27?

Apparently, yes. A spokesman talks of "recomputing" credits when MacArthur gives the word.

Maj. Gen. Stephen G. Henry, assistant chief of personnel, said the recomputation would give men more points so that those overseas who "now have approximately 72 points will be eligible for immediate discharge."

That could work like this if—for example—the 85 points were lowered to 80 on Sept. 12 and men were given credit for service between May 12 and Sept. 12.

Joe Jones had 72 points on May 12. He has been serving in the Pacific since that date. So, for the four months added service in the Pacific between May 12 and Sept. 12 he'd have 4 points for the extra 4 months of Army service, plus 4 points for those four months in the Pacific.

That would give him a total of 80 points, enough for discharge. Even now men with 75 points are not being shipped overseas. When the system is changed, men with 60 points will not be shipped over.

The Marine Corps has followed the Army system, requiring a total of 85 points for discharge. There's no indication it will revise its system downward if the Army does.

with the Hawaiian Department in the following particulars:

(A) To keep the commanding general of the Hawaiian Department fully advised of the growing seriousness of the Japanese situation which indicated an increasing necessity for better preparation for war, of which information he had an abundance and Short had little.

(B) To send additional instructions to the commanding general of the Hawaiian Department on November 28, 1941, when evidently he failed to realize the importance of General Short's reply of November 27th, which indicated clearly that General Short had misunderstood and misconstrued the message of November 17 and had not adequately alerted his command for war.

(C) To get to General Short on the evening of December 6th and the early morning of December 7th, the critical information indicating an almost immediate break with Japan, though there was ample time to have accomplished this.

(D) To investigate and determine the state of readiness of the Hawaiian command between November 27 and December 7, 1941, despite the impending threat of war.

Short and Kimmel were the ar-

my and navy commanders at Pearl Harbor when the Japanese struck their surprise blow there. Admiral Stark was chief of naval operations at the time.

In his report Secretary Stimson said that while Admiral Kimmel and General Short "were on very friendly terms and in frequent communication, the exchange of information as well as consultation in other respects at Hawaii between the army and navy was inadequate."

Stimson declared that the underlying cause of the error of judgment which permitted the sneak attack "was General Short's confidence that Japan would not then attack Pearl Harbor."

The secretary asserted that since the war plan division had other activities of the general staff were under the general direction of Gen. Marshall, the army Pearl Harbor Board had been led to criticize Marshall, the army Pearl Harbor some of the shortcomings of the officers of the general staff."

The Pearl Harbor Board attributed the extent of the Pearl Harbor disaster primarily to what it called failure of the commanding general of the Hawaiian Department "adequately to alert his command for war," and to failure of the War Department to direct him to take an adequate alert and to keep him advised on developments

of the United States-Japanese peace talks then under way.

Stimson said his conclusions as to the responsibilities and error of General Short were in general accord with those of both the Roberts Commission and the Army Pearl Harbor Board. The Roberts Commission, a five-man board headed by then Supreme Court Justice Owen J. Roberts, made an on-the-spot investigation early in the war.

On the navy side, Secretary Forrestal directed that Kimmel and Stark, both retired, shall not hold positions in the navy which require "the exercise of superior judgment."

He added that appropriate congressional committees will be "fully acquainted with the navy's investigations into this matter, and public disclosure of the facts concerning the attack on Pearl Harbor obtained in these investigations will be made to the extent they can be taken without injury to current military operations or the national security."

He said that on the basis of the record and the investigations, he had reached the conclusion that Kimmel and Stark "particularly from the period of 27 November to December 7, 1941, failed to demonstrate the superior judgment necessary for exercising command commensurate with their rank and their assigned duties."

St. Louis dreams of another Sportsman's Park World Series appeared faded today with the winning streaks of the Cardinals and Browns broken while the Chicago Cubs and Detroit Tigers resumed their winning ways.
Failure of Billy Southworth's Red Birds to beat the second division club is haunting the defending world champs in their desperate stretch drive to overtake the front-running Bruins from Chicago.
While Charley Grimm's Powerhouse has been able to flatten Cincinnati 17 out of 18 and drub the Phillies 15 out of 19, St. Louis has been held to an even break in 16 starts against the Reds and has just eked out the last-place Phils 18 times in 18 contests. Against the Reds, Braves, Phils and Pirates, Chicago has played 746 ball while the Cards have managed only a .549 pace.

After six straight wins the Champs were halted by Cincinnati last night, 3-2.

Southworth gambled on Rookie Glen Gardner from Rochester to beat Cincinnati, perhaps hoping to conserve talent for the weekend series with Chicago. But Cincy got away in front, fought off the Birds' challenge after the score was tied and beat Billy's ace in the fireman role.

Grimm celebrated his 46th birthday in happy fashion by trimming Pittsburgh, 6-3, with the help of Peanut Lowrey's three-run homer off Fritz Ostermueller. Hank Borowy registered his fifth victory against two losses for the Cubs. By the combination of events Chicago's lead was stretched to 3 1-2 games.

Brooklyn took a firmer grasp on third place by a 7-1 romp over the Phils with Les Webber going to the relief of Art Herring who gave way to a shoulder ailment after two innings.

As the New York Giants and Boston were not scheduled, the Dodgers now hold third spot by two full games.

Hal Newhouser pooled off the Browns in the American League feature, 10-1, allowing only four hits on his way to his 21st victory. The lean Detroit left-hander struck out nine and coasted home with the help of some heavy home run thumping by Roy Cullenbine, Hank Greenberg and Bobby Maier. The Browns had won five in a row and nine of their last 11 before the Tigers came to town to disappoint 17,621 fans.

Bobby Feller's second start for Cleveland lacked some of the dash of his first appearance but the fireball merchant had little trouble handcuffing Chicago, 8-2. The ex-sailor walked seven and struck out six White Sox.
The New York Yankees continued

to come on, running their new string to five by whipping Boston, 8-7. Walt Dubiel earned his fifth decision over the Red Sox with some late-inning help from Milkman Jim Turner. Despite their fourth place standing, the Yanks only 6 games back of Detroit with a long home schedule ahead, are in a fair strategic position.
Washington stuck on the tail light of the Tigers, 1 1-2 lengths behind, on a 6-5 edge over Philadelphia, made possible by Rick Ferrell's ninth inning homer, his first of the season. The A's had put on an uphill struggle to tie when Ferrell struck the range on Charley Bowles.

Jerry Barnes, Negro, was implicated. He was convicted of participating in the larceny of the gasoline coupons. Judge Thompson gave him 18 months on the roads, suspended sentence on payment of court costs and placed him on probation three years.

In the second case Moore's alleged accomplices in the robbery of Clifton Evans' home were John and Andrew Smith, Negroes, but the Smiths were not guilty. The charge against the Smiths for aiding and abetting in the other robbery was not pressed.

Mack Jones, charged with larceny of W. H. Wood's truck and robbing his home in Avden, and forgery of a check on the Smith Lumber Company of Avden, was convicted in all three cases, and was given a combined maximum total of 16 years in the State Penitentiary. For larceny of the truck he was given from three to five years; robbing the home, two to four years, and for forgery of the

check, from five to seven years.
If the Pasquotank jurist continues to pass out penitentiary sentences a big bus will be necessary to carry the men to prison, a court official said. So far, Judge Thompson has given maximum sentences to defendants totalling 76 years in the penitentiary.
Court officials, attorneys and courtroom observers have been outspoken in their praise of the good work Judge Thompson and Solicitor Dave M. Clark are doing during this one-week criminal term of court and their expeditious disposal of a considerable number of cases on the heavy docket. Eli Bloom has been assisting Solicitor Clark in some of the cases.

Sentencing of four Tarboro men to a combined maximum total of 45 years in the penitentiary for breaking and entering and larceny marked the solution of the Bethel ABC store robbery about a year ago, and what was listed as a baffling series of robberies.

Arrest of the defendants resulted from an accidental clue Sheriff Ruel W. Tyson found a year after the robberies were committed. The sheriff, Police Chief Jim Tanner of Greenville, Lieut. Lester Jones of the Highway Patrol, and Martin and Edgecombe counties teamed up on some clever sleuthing which led to the arrest of the four men and their ultimate conviction.

Woodard Edmundson, Johnnie Gold Jones and Frank Harrell were convicted of robbing the Bethel ABC store in July, 1944, and sentenced to serve from three to five years each in State Prison.

Harrell, Jones and Frank Beech were convicted of the larceny of Mrs. Cammie Moore's car in Greenville a year ago and each was given from two to five years in State Prison.

Harrell, Jones and Beech, convicted of the larceny of Robert E. Phillips, charging seduction, and Perry Cannon, charging assault on a female, were continued.

Robert Stocks, convicted of breaking and entering and larceny, was given 18 months on the roads. Sentence was suspended on payment of court costs and he was placed on probation three years.

Octavius Roberson was given two years on the roads for breaking and entering.

The Williams, charged with driving while drunk, was called and failed to answer. Capias was issued.

Christine Jefferson Price was not guilty of assault.

Judgment was suspended in the case against John Best, charged with assault with a deadly weapon. He paid court costs.

Zeb Carney, assault with a deadly weapon, was given 12 months on the roads. Judgment was suspended on payment of costs and he was placed on probation three years.

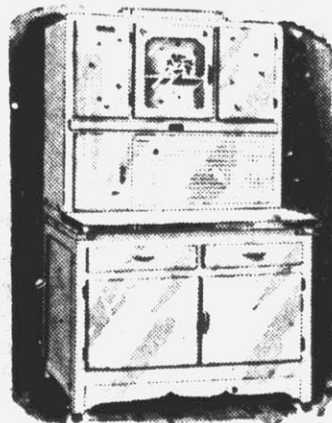

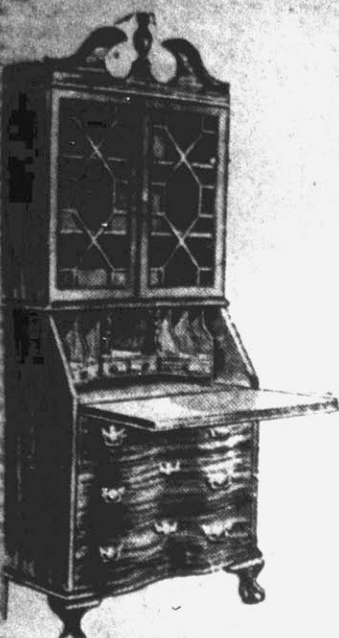

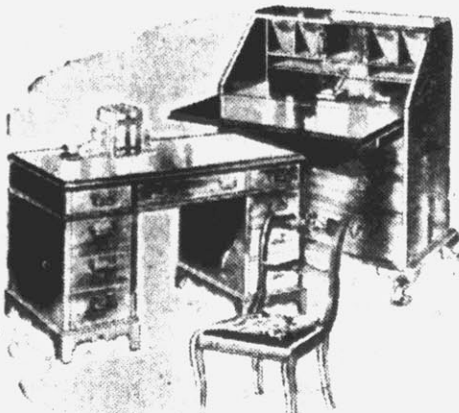
