Major Strike Threatens Textile Industry Adding To Nation's Labor Strife

**New Controversy
Centers About Pat-
erson, N. J., Work-
ers; Labor Secretary
Schwellenbach To
Make Effort To Pre-
vent Further Spread
In Oil Strikes; Two
Million Idle**

Labor troubles multiplied across the Nation today, with nearly 2,000,000 away from work for one reason or another.

Actual strikes and shutdowns kept 400,000 off the job and there were 1,500,000 more affected in New York directly or indirectly because of the elevator operators and building service employees strike there.

Among latest developments were these:
A union spokesman estimated 62,000 walked out in 284 textile printing and dyeing plants in nine eastern states, despite a back-to-work order by their CIO union. The workers demanded a 15 cents an hour wage increase.

The General Executive Board of the CIO United Retail, Wholesale and Department Store Employees of America authorized its Montgomery Ward & Co. organizing committee to call a strike "if negotiations fail."

The CIO United Packinghouse Workers Union said it would demand a general wage increase of 25 cents an hour from the industry. John L. Lewis, United Mine workers chief, asked the bituminous coal management negotiators to meet him Monday on the mine foreman's dispute which has made 30,000 idle in Pennsylvania and West Virginia. The dispute revolves about unionization of foremen.

Massive strike of 250,000 CIO oil workers was delayed. After meeting three days in Chicago, principals in the consultation conference moved to Washington to resume efforts tomorrow to effect a settlement in the dispute over wage demands and of the 13-day-old strike of some 35,000 workers in eight states.

The move to Washington was suggested by Secretary of Labor Schwellenbach. The union is asking for a 30 per cent wage rate increase and in three days of negotiations in Chicago the conference was deadlocked.

The 6,000 workers who walked out in the textile printing and dyeing plants in the Paterson area, members of the CIO Federation of Dyers, Finishers and Bleachers of America, are demanding, said a union spokesman, a 15 cents an hour increase to make up for loss.

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MAKE PLANS TO FEED GERMANY

**Japanese People May
Also Get Help This
Winter**

Washington, Sept. 28.—(AP)—With Allied help, the United States is planning on a large scale feeding program in Germany this winter. It may have to do the same for Japan.

This developed today in response to inquiries about the food shortage situation in both countries and this government's policy for handling them.

Basic army policy in the administration of both Germany and Japan is for the defeated enemy peoples to "work or starve." Military officials say frankly this has two limitations:

1. There will not be jobs for many people.

2. There will not be enough food actually in hand to feed all of them.

Beyond this the Army's policy is reported to be to take any measures necessary to prevent political unrest or incidents which would jeopardize the health or safety of occupation troops.

What may occur in Japan is not yet known here. Virtually every Japanese official from Emperor Hirohito down has insisted on the threat of food shortage and danger of starvation.

Probably, according to experts here, Japan can be largely if not entirely fed from nearby areas. Presumably, too, the Japanese will foot the bill.

The case of Germany already has developed to an advanced degree. Sometime ago the Army began furnishing wheat to miners in order to lift their calorie intake above 1800 units a day. On that starvation level they could not dig enough coal and coal is needed not only for Germany but also for liberated countries.

DEADLOCK IN BIG FIVE MEET

**Disagreement Over
French-Chinese
Share In Treaties**

London, Sept. 28.—(AP)—Despite Russian insistence that France and China be excluded from discussions of Balkan peace treaties, informed observers said today the question might revert to the full conference of foreign ministers unless an American-British-Russian procedural deadlock could be broken.

The foreign ministers of the Big Three powers, U. S. Secretary of State James F. Byrnes, Soviet Foreign Commissar Molotov and British foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin, have been conferring on the procedure for drafting treaties with Romania, Hungary and Bulgaria in an attempt to reach some measure of agreement before the council is adjourned.

Some officials acknowledged that the procedural impasse arose when the Russians felt they were fighting a four-to-one battle for Balkan influence, and wanted to reduce the number of adversaries.

Some delegates said the Russian argument, based on the decision at Potsdam that armistice signatories should draw up the treaties, was a good one, but added that the others were reluctant to abandon the five-nation principle.

Supported by the British and Americans, the French bitterly protested the Russian attitude.

The Greek Government added a complication last night by announcing reparations claims of \$2,677,000,000 against Italy, which it said would be pressed at the peace conference. The United States attitude has been that reparations claims against Italy should be waived.

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Today In Congress

Washington, Sept. 28.—(AP)—Senators talked fast today about jobs for all—and one roared: "There isn't any basis for President Truman to think the Senate 'let him down' on more pay for people who don't have jobs."

That was Senator Donnell (R-Mo.) speaking. He was answering: A White House statement yesterday that Mr. Truman told some congressmen the Senate let him down when it passed a bill that did not provide up to \$25 a week for 30 weeks for the unemployed.

1. Gen. A. A. Vandegrift told the House Naval Committee that Marines will be "Minute Men" for a world organization to keep peace. He bosses the corps.

2. William H. Davis—he used to be War Labor Board chairman and economic stabilizer—said a wage of 40 cents an hour really is worth less than 30 cents. That's because of higher prices. Davis backed a bill before a Senate subcommittee to raise from 40 to 65 cents the minimum wage required of firms in interstate commerce.

3. A couple of hundred determined women descended on the Senate Judiciary Committee. They want the constitution amended to say women have "equal rights." One of them claimed presidential support for the change.

4. Secretary of the Navy Forrestal hopes the navy will be the first armed service to reduce to peace time size. He said so in a letter to the Senate Naval Committee.

This is what Congress did today—and will do later:

Jobs: Senators talked fast, hoping to pass the "full employment bill" before nightfall. A compromise suggested by Senator Carl Hatch (D-NM) might help them do it. Later: The House will debate the bill.

Jobless: Congressmen who want more financial help for unemployed people perked up. They seemed confident Congress will pass part

of the "unemployment compensation bill" after all.

Later: They'll try to bring it up for House debate.

Atoms: Congress heard that President Truman might tell his cabinet today what he thinks ought to be done with the secrets of atomic force.

Later: He'll tell Congress.

Pearl Harbor: Congressional investigators became students. They studied all previous documents on the Pearl Harbor disaster, hunting for unanswered questions.

Later: They'll hunt for the answers.

One thing at a time: The proposal entitled the full employment bill declares:

First, that the federal government has a responsibility to foster private enterprise; and, second, that all Americans who want to work are entitled to an opportunity for employment.

The bill says the government shall work out a broad economic program to help private employers furnish enough jobs to go around.

The Senate fight this week has raged mostly around one sentence of the bill.

The sentence says that, as a last resort, there shall be "such volume of federal investment and expenditure as may be needed . . . to assure continuing full employment."

Opponents leaped on this sentence. They said it paved the way for unlimited federal spending and placed full employment above every other consideration of the government. Senators Radcliffe (D-Md) and Taft (R-Ohio) proposed to change the passage in several ways. Supporters defended it very fiercely, calling it the "guts" of the bill.

One change proposed by Taft and Radcliffe would require that such spending by the government be "consistent with its needs, obligations and the public interest."

WORLD FLIGHT BEGINS TODAY

**Globe-Girdling Plane
Takes Off Late
Today**

Washington, Sept. 28.—(AP)—A giant C-54 thunders eastward over the Atlantic late today, opening the first regular world girdling schedule. It will carry to high adventure seven men and a woman who will be guinea pigs as well as observers on the 23,147-mile flight.

Taking off at 5 p. m. EWT from Washington National Airport, the 40-passenger Douglas Skymaster of the U. S. Army Air Transport Command heads first for Bermuda.

Then, after a one-hour stop, it wings on to the Azores, to North Africa, to Egypt, to India, to China and back home again in 151 hours—by way of the Philippines, Honolulu and tiny Pacific isles made sacred by the blood of American fighting men.

Planes of the ATC have circled the world many times. This schedule, "The Globester," will be the first continuous "round-the-world service." And more than the mere novelty of the effort is wrapped up in the inaugural journey.

Throughout the flight, tests of many kinds will be made among the three ATC headquarters officers, an ATC public relations officer, a photographer and three reporters who of the more than 20 aboard the "Globester" the start will be the only ones to go the entire route.

All were given thorough physical examinations. They will undergo further examinations upon their return next Thursday, October 4, at midnight. En route they will observe—and be observed—for fatigue, for airsickness, reaction to altitude. One of the tests and observations may come conclusion leading to more passenger comfort and convenience.

Announcement of the starting crew, and of the other passengers, was delayed with prospects they might not be made known until near takeoff time. Crews will be changed at intervals. Most of the

**Many Troops Will
Return Home Soon**

Tokyo, Sept. 28.—(AP)—General MacArthur's headquarters announced today that shipping space to return 1,400,000 servicemen to the United States from Pacific areas will be available in the next seven months, according to War Department estimates.

Headquarters announced that the tentative or "target" dates have been set for departure of three divisions from the Philippines to the United States:

Thirty-first Division, Oct. 31; 38th Division, Nov. 1; 37th Division, Nov. 15.

The 43rd Division, which will be the first to reach home from the Pacific, now is loading at Yokohama.

Under the presently announced reduction in critical (servicemen's point) scores, shipping available through January will be utilized and as scores are lowered, personnel will be available to meet (all) shipping allocations for February and March," headquarters said it was informed by the War Department.

Monthly estimates for the return of troops are:

October, 120,000; November, 150,000; December, 185,000; January, 270,000; February, 240,000; March, 245,000; and April, 280,000.

STATE OF SIEGE IN ARGENTINA

**News Blackout Com-
plete; Many Edit-
ors Arrested**

Buenos Aires, Sept. 28.—(AP)—The Truman administration officially told the Argentine government today that the state of siege and other measures taken by this country's military regime inevitably would have "a diplomatic effect" on public opinion in the United States.

Full censorship was applied to Buenos Aires newspapers today by the military government which had taken into custody the Argentine's most distinguished editors.

A complete radio censorship was established. The city's 2,500,000 people remained almost completely ignorant of events around them. Police instructions from the Farrell-Peron regime requested newspapers to refrain from printing commentators from outside Argentina on developments within the country under the renewed state of siege. Almost a complete blackout was clamped down on Argentine affairs.

(Montevideo dispatches said six more leading personalities have taken asylum in the Uruguayan embassy, which now harbors 15. These were Mario Guido, leader of the radical party; Eduardo Helguera and Luis Lopez, businessmen; and Profs. Alberto Pawlosky, Luis Rocque Gonda and Abel Housay.

The Uruguayan ambassador requested safe conduct for all, but the Argentine government has not granted permission. Police were (Continued on Page Six)

**Chinese Factions
Reach Agreement**

London, Sept. 28.—(AP)—The Moscow radio reported today that Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek and Communist Leader Mao Tse-Tung, who have been conferring at Chungking in an effort to settle China's internal political differences, had reached an agreement to reform the national government.

The broadcast said the agreement provided for wide political representation in the central government and for the holding of general elections at an early date.

The pact also was said to provide for demobilization of the Communist armed forces.

The broadcast, which opened with the flat statement that "unity in China has been established," credited the treaty which Soviet Russia recently concluded with China and playing "an important part in helping to unify the nation."

The Benediction of True Heroism.
One of the most thrilling char-
acters of history was Joan of Arc,
the humble French maiden who in
the early part of the 15th Century
was the most widely discussed in-
ternational figure. She was of a
highly sensitive and spiritual na-
ture, and from childhood she was
conscious of a supernatural voice
encouraging her to virtue and re-
ligious devotion.

Joan's heart was distressed by the
fact that the English had overrun
her country. She succeeded in
putting courage into the heart of
the weak Dauphin and persuading
him to allow her to lead his troops.
Then with her remarkable powers
of leadership she welded the nation
into an irresistible army, drove the
hated English out of Orleans, and
conducted the trembling Dauphin
to Rheims, tried as a traitor and
heretic, and, at the age of 19, burned
at the stake on the streets of
Rouen and her ashes cast into the
River Seine.

Can we doubt the validity of her
visions? No more, it would seem,
than we can doubt her sincerity
and the purity of her life. She was
one of the world's greatest heroines,
fated to be repudiated by her gen-
eration, betrayed by her people, she
had freed from slavery and brought
to painful death by soldiers whom
she had met on the open field of
battle and conquered.

WASHINGTON DAYBOOK

Washington.—Among the young
foreigners brought into American
industry to learn-by-doing for two
years under supervision of the non-
profit International Training Ad-
ministration, there is no "typical"
student.

The youth may be a Latin Ameri-
can from Mexico, Chile, Honduras
or even politically non-cooperative
Argentina, or he may be from Chi-
na or Turkey or anywhere else in
the world.

The student's 2500 flat throughout
now going through the mill of the
American industry and agriculture as
one of Nelson Rockefeller's good
neighbor projects are as different
as the countries named.

However, they do have some
things in common. They are al-
most invariably serious, shy at
first, hard working, bright as a

our good neighbors will be raised
by the program is illustrated in almost
every report in the files of Elliott
S. Hanson, I.T.A. president, who was
drafted by Rockefeller from U. S.
Steel when "Inter-American Trade
Scholarships" was a one-desk project.

Seventeen young Chinese are now
working with members of the Na-
tional Trucking Association.
Guillermo Wirth is at the Ken-
sington distillery laboratories in Ken-
tucky, learning how to convert corn-
starch and rice into alcohol, which
he hopes to promote as automobile
fuel. His native Uruguay has no
petroleum but plenty of agricultural
products.

If not typical, at least not un-
usual among the foreigners the in-
dustrial sponsored I.T.A. is seeing through
industrial training is Carlos One-
to of Peru. Carlos, interested in
rubber processing, became a trainee
at one of Goodyear's Akron plants.
Carlos was assigned to the "pro-
duction squadron"—picked men who
work at every job in every depart-
ment and at the same time receive
instruction in the "School for Super-
men" as the company-run college
is called.

Carlos was the only non-native
in the group of 56 that started the
course. For five months he work-

off. When the 24-month course
was up, only four starters had sur-
vived the rigorous eliminations.
Carlos was one of the four.

Just how Carlos had time even

age citizen in your country; seeing
him daily and visiting him as a

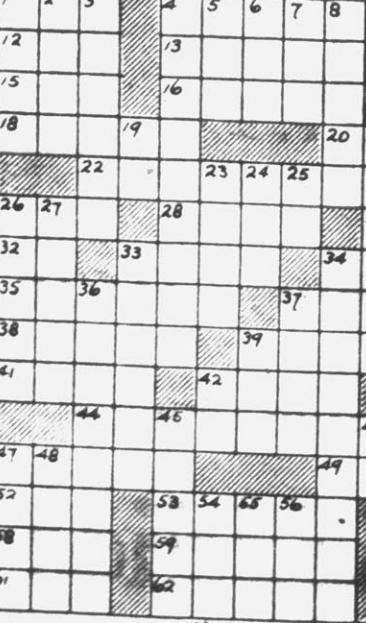

at least until October 3, but the
area's wood fuel supply was steady
shrinking as the strike by 60-
000 AFL workers for wage increas-
es entered its fifth day.

Strikes and layoffs in the Detroit
area idled 80,000 and the oil strike
brought further curtailment of pro-
duction.

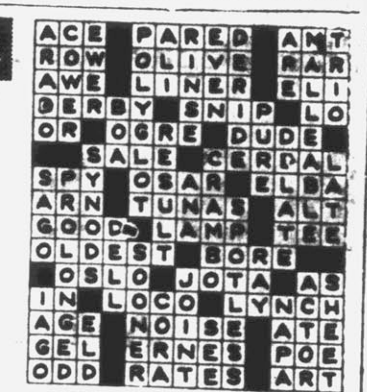
New York City's paralyzing strike
15,000 AFL building service employ-

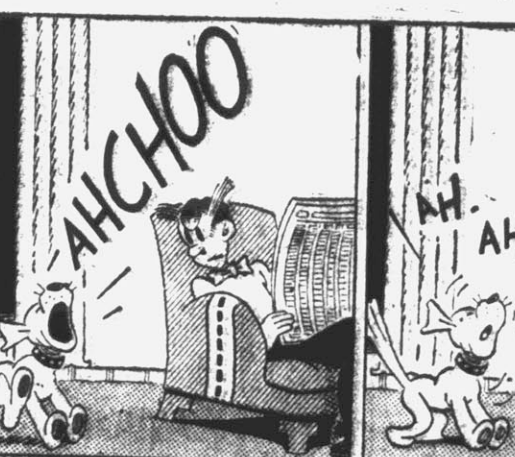

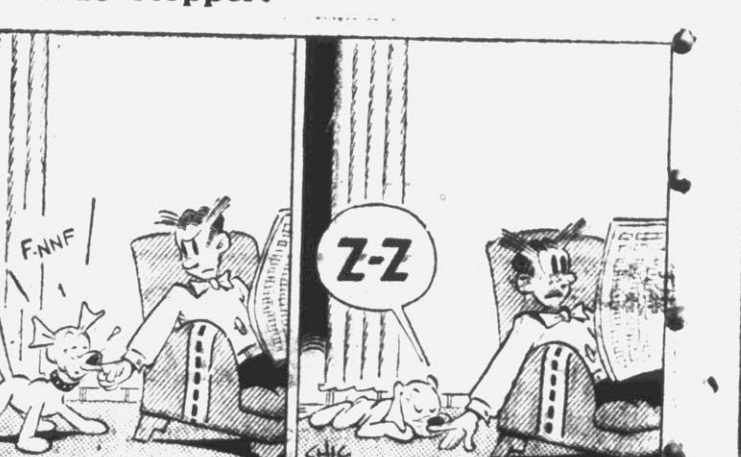

Only the 1909 Cubs against the Boston Braves, the 1927 New York Yankees against the Browns and the 1937 Pirates against the Redlegs, accomplished that feat.

At the same time the sweep completed the 19th time this season the Cincinnati, Columbia over Lafayette, Mississippi over Florida, Penn State over Muhlenberg, Virginia over North Carolina State, South Carolina over Presbyterian, Colgate over Rochester, St. Mary's over Pacific, Texas over Southwestern, Vanderbilt over Tennessee Poly, Yale over Tufts, Texas A & M over Texas Tech, San Diego Navy over UCLA, Virginia Military over Richmond.

United War Fund Still Necessary

The final appeal for the National War Fund will be made this fall, with the budget set at \$115,000,000 in order to finance members agencies to liquidation or for fifteen months, through 1946, according to advices received today by State Chairman Victor S. Bryant, of Durham.

Mr. Bryant stated that the National War Fund had advised him that, with the exception of American Field Service, V-J Day does not signify an immediate end to the work of member agencies of the fund.

USO and USO-Camp Shows must carry on their programs for our service men until demobilization is an actuality. Mr. Bryant said, "While it is expected that there will be shifts in the areas of service and reductions in the USO budgets, the work in the Pacific will have to be maintained at a high level, and USO-Camp Shows will face expanded programs for men who are in forces of occupation."

United Seamen's Service will also have to continue its work while the merchant fleets are engaged in bringing men and material home, Mr. Bryant said.

No immediate change is in sight for the budgets of foreign relief agencies which are members of the National War Fund, Mr. Bryant continued. He pointed out that President Truman, in his report to the people after his return from Potsdam had made it clear that the people of this country have a responsibility to aid the war victims of those nations which fought with us. President Truman said: "Europe today is hungry. As winter comes on the distress will increase. Unless we do what we can to help, we may lose next winter what we won at such terrible cost last spring. Desperate men are liable to destroy the structure of their society to find in the wreckage some substitute for hope. We must help to the limit of our strength. And we will."

Poultry To Add To Meat Supply

Washington, Sept. 28. (AP)—Poultry and turkeys may show the way for further easing—if not the end—of meat rationing by November 1.

A bumper movement of chickens and a record turkey crop will add greatly to supplies of all meats to be available for civilians during November and December.

The total supply of red meats, and of poultry and turkey meat in November will be considerably greater than indicated in October, when lower grades of beef, veal and lamb will be ration-free.

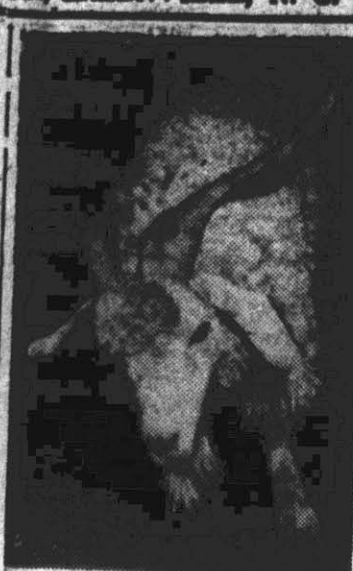
Agriculture Department meat authorities expect at least a third of this year's indicated production of 4,200,000 pounds of chicken and turkey meat to become available during the last eight or nine weeks of the year.

The great bulk of the poultry and turkey will go to civilian markets because the armed services already have obtained most of their needs for the rest of the year.

The supply of red meats—beef, pork, veal, lamb and mutton—allocated to civilians for November and December is about seven per cent larger than the increased October allotment.

Killed by Truck
North Wilkesboro, Sept. 27. (AP)—Sheriff C. G. Poindexter has reported the death near here of Miss Pauline Beamon, 16, who was fatally injured Wednesday when struck by a truck on the Moravian Falls highway.

stationed near all embassies and legations of American countries, a Montevideo dispatch reported, requesting identifications, presumably to prevent more persons from taking refuge.

The military government for the first time detailed leading figures of the two great Argentine morning newspapers, La Nacion and La Prensa.

Of the six morning newspapers, only El Mundo appeared with any news of the mass arrests yesterday and of the outbreak world's reaction. Its report was incomplete.

Foreign Minister Juan Cooke said in a midnight communique last night that the newly-imposed state of siege in Argentina in "no way effects the march towards constitutional normality which the government wants in the shortest possible time."

Cooke said that when the government lifted a wartime state of siege on Aug. 6 after three and one-half years of martial rule it "had no idea the ample liberties provided by our laws would be utilized for conspiracy maneuvers."

The state of siege was reimposed Wednesday after a revolt was reported quelled at Cordoba.

Military police rounding up prominent Argentines opposed to the military regime of President Edelmiro Farrell and Col. Juan Peron, vice-president, have filled the jails with nationally known citizens.

Another Month.
Washington, Sept. 28. (AP)—Shoe production has not increased enough to permit termination of rationing October 1, the OPA and War Production Board announced today. It was learned that officials of both agencies believe it may be possible to make shoes ration-free by November 1.

McGrath Appointed Solicitor General

Press Secretary Charles G. Ross announced today the selection of McGrath to succeed Charles Fahy, who resigned.

Gov. Ellis Arnall of Georgia reportedly had been offered the post. Recent dispatches out of Georgia indicated that Arnall has passed it up because of the peculiar political situation in Georgia.

Ross said he understood McGrath would take over his duties immediately. A former U. S. District Attorney for Rhode Island, McGrath has been a member of the Rhode Island bar since 1929.

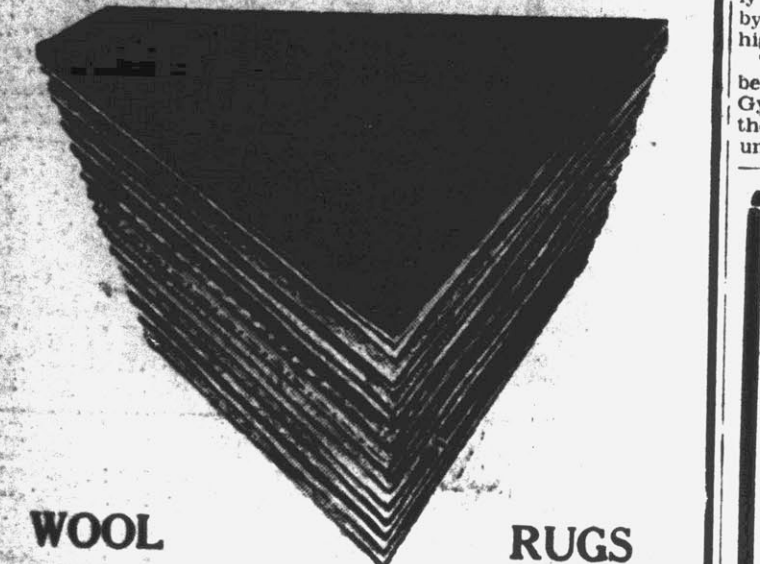
