Japan's Postwar Cabinet Resigns

Prince Higashi-Kuni Tells Emperor Cabinet Was Unable To Comply With MacArthur's Directive For Greater Freedom For Japs; Yoshida May Be Premier

Tokyo, Oct. 5.—(AP)—Japan's cabinet, unable to bow to General MacArthur's decrees for a new birth of freedom in the fallen empire, quit today and aides of former Foreign Minister Shigeru Yoshida said an announcement on a new cabinet would be made tomorrow.

The day ended without official indication that a new premier had been named, and reports persisted that the moderate Yoshida himself would take the helm of government, despite his own denials.

Emperor Hirohito accepted the resignations of Prince Higashi-Kuni and his entire cabinet with the comment "that is good," and made it clear that he would ask MacArthur's prior approval of the next premier.

Yoshida, a career diplomat, told Japanese interviewers that "it is not I," but they pointed out that he "is always foxy and wouldn't admit it beforehand anyway."

He added that two visits he said he made to the imperial palace today—and two calls at MacArthur's headquarters—indicated his selection and approval.

They reported this itinerary for Yoshida:

Visited Marquis Kocho Kido, who with Baron Kichiro Haranuma is reportedly advising Hirohito on the new appointment, at 6 p. m. Tokyo Time (4 a. m. EST), going a half hour later directly to Allied headquarters.

Returned to the palace at 6:55 for a second conference with Kido, and 20 minutes later visited the foreign minister's official residence, Prince Fumimaro Konoye, reportedly also a possible choice as new premier, visited Yoshida at 7:30 p. m.

Kido left his office immediately after Yoshida's second call. Yoshida earlier in the day had conferred at length with MacArthur's chief of staff.

Headquarters explained in a press release tonight that Yoshida's first call had been to inform the Allied command officially of the resignation of the cabinet and that a new cabinet was being formed.

MORE NATIONS APPROVE PACT

Stettinius Says World Charter Ratified By 31 Countries

London, Oct. 5.—(AP)—Edward R. Stettinius, American delegate to the United Nations preparatory commission announced today that 30 countries had ratified the organization's charter—one more than necessary to bring it into existence.

Stettinius, who made the announcement at an open meeting of the league's executive committee, said 11 countries already had deposited their ratification in Washington and that the other countries had sent word that ratifications were on the way.

Meanwhile, an argument developed within the league's executive committee over the question of postponing the first formal assembly of the league until after Christmas. With it came a hint that the executive committee was leaning in to the same sort of difficulty that caused the collapse of the meeting of foreign ministers—questions of procedure.

Prof. C. K. Webster, alternate British delegate, frankly warned his colleagues that unless the arrangements on procedure "are well done, it might well wreck the whole assembly."

But Stettinius stood firm for convening the league assembly early in December.

"I do not believe the quality of the work will suffer," he said.

"The important thing is to bring into being the organs of the league."

He said the world was waiting for the world security council, the social-economic council and the world court to start functioning.

Washington, Oct. 5.—(AP)—You have a stake in what President Truman has just done. Things like these are involved:

Whether you get low-priced clothing, two pairs of pants with a suit, a vest with a double-breasted coat, or puffy sleeves on your dress.

Mr. Truman yesterday ordered the War Production Board scrapped November 3.

For it he is substituting the Civilian Production Administration, a brand new agency, it's new in name. But that's about all.

It will carry on WPB's work, keep all its powers and controls. Since this is so, why this change at all?

WPB officials say this:

WPB was a wartime agency and as such, its job is done. The war's over. So is war production. So an agency controlling civilian production should take over. It's really the same agency under another name.

At its peak WPB had about 25,000 employees. That's been cut. CPA will have about 2,500. Here's an example of WPB-CPA work:

Until goods are more plentiful WPB has forbidden two pairs of pants with one suit, or a vest sold with a double-breasted coat.

000 yards of rayon 30,000,000 yards of woolens.

Manufacturers of low-priced clothing can go to the government and get a priority—first claim—on those set aside materials.

Manufacturers of higher-priced stuff will have to take their chances in buying from the mills what they make above the amounts mentioned above. They can't get priority help from the government.

But WPB has been doing—and CPA will be doing—more than this. Take rubber, for instance. Because natural rubber is so short, WPB has been allowing each manufacturer only a limited amount.

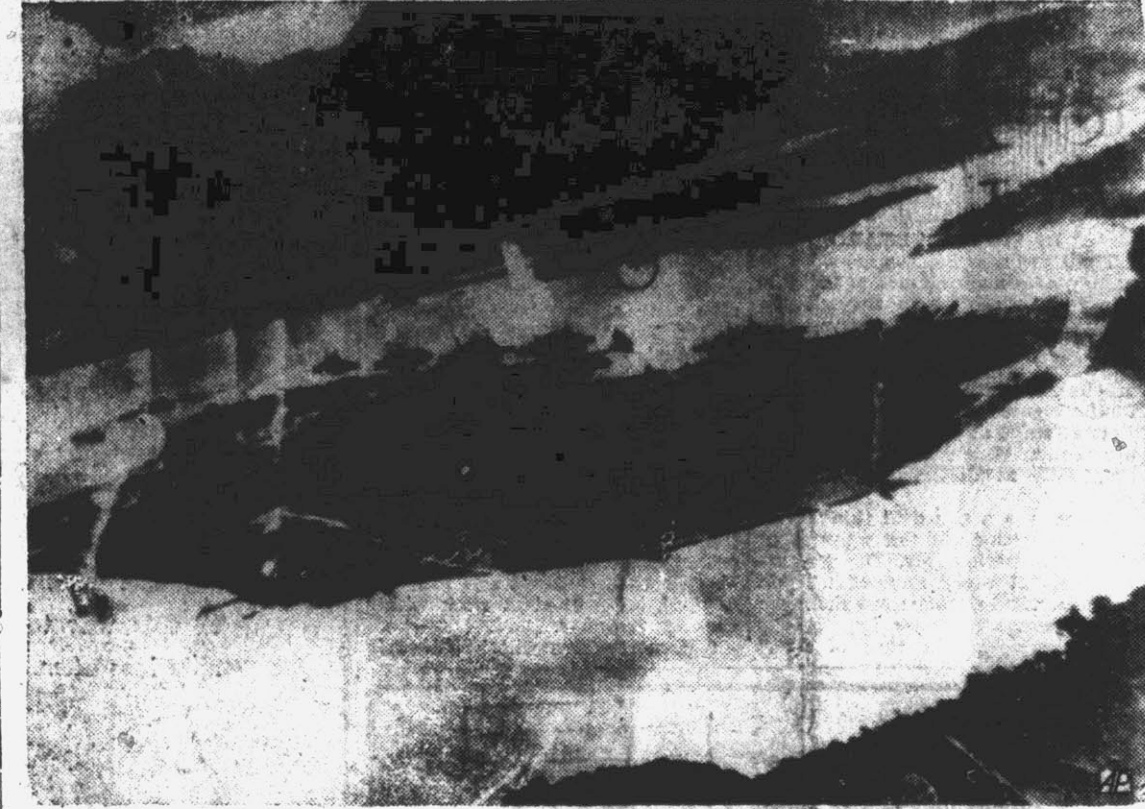
It is using its power to prevent hoarding of material which is still not plentiful, like sheet steel used in refrigerators and automobiles.

When the war ended, war manufacturers didn't have a big supply of sheet steel on hand.

Now—if there were no government controls—a rich firm might try to build up its stock by gobbling up sheet steel.

This would leave a smaller manufacturer unable to work. In turn, it would mean unemployment for his workers.

TO REGULATE TAXIS HERE

Aldermen In Monthly Meeting Pass New Ordinance

The Board of Aldermen at a meeting at the City Hall last night passed an ordinance regulating the operation of taxicabs in Greenville. The ordinance, which is to be charged, requires taxicab operators to have headquarters at some fixed place, not on street corners. At present there are seven or eight groups operating taxicabs here.

The ordinance requires taxicab operators to have safe equipment, insurance and a bond on each car; charge uniform fees and to display their rates in a conspicuous place, and to report to the city any swapping of cars.

The city ordinance, in conformity with the state regulatory law, will require from applicants for licenses to operate taxicabs in the city, a certificate of necessity and that the operators be of good character and without a court record. The city may cancel a taxicab operator's license upon violation of any of the provisions of the taxicab ordinance. The taxicabs are always subjected to inspection by the police.

Mayor Jack Boyd said the ordinance was drawn up after a conference with all taxicab operators several nights ago. City officials realize the need for taxicab transportation here, the mayor added, but the board's definite plan is to require that the vehicles are safe, insured and bonded and that the drivers are of good character.

The board, on petition of property owners, passed a resolution closing a dead-end street in the western part of the city, and naming what is now Washington avenue, near Keel's Warehouse, "Keel Street."

The fire department was granted authority to use the air raid siren as a fire alarm when the fire department's siren is out of order. Chief George Gardner asked that this be publicized to prevent the (Continued on Page Four)

Government Takes Over Nation's Oil Refineries

Telephone Workers Take Four Hours Off This Afternoon For Strike Vote; Other Strikes Unsettled

A telephone workers' stoppage planned on a nationwide scale got under way in New York and Washington today before the set time for the start of the four-hour demonstration.

Oil strikers were ordered to return to work at plants in 15 states seized by the navy after collapse of negotiations for a wage rate increase of 30 per cent demanded by a CIO union. O. A. Knight, union chairman, issued the return to work order at Dallas, Tex.

Employees in two New York Western Electric Company plants left their jobs at 1 p. m. (EWT) and walkouts in some of the other 19 Western Electric plants followed rapidly.

Half an hour before an official of the Chesapeake and Potomac Telephone Company said the walkout in Washington was "just about 100 per cent."

The demonstration, protesting a National Labor Relations board trial examiner's ruling, was to start at 2 p. m. (EST) and continue until 6 p. m.

Violence broke out today in the eight-months-old motion picture strike as pickets set up a blockade about the Warner Brothers studio in Burbank, Calif.

In the CIO oil strike, the government took control of strike-bound properties of 26 companies in 15 states. The Labor Department also took steps aimed at ending serious disputes in the coal industry.

All available Burbank police were rushed to the Warner lot as more than 300 pickets and police and deputy sheriffs became involved. Two automobiles were overturned and one man was stabbed. Help was sought from the Glendale police department and the Los Angeles county sheriff's department.

The motion picture dispute involving 7,000 workers began March 12. AFL screen set designers, illustrators and decorators, Local 1421, struck in protest against recognition of the AFL International Alliance of Theatrical and Stage Employees as collective bargaining representative for 77 set decorators.

A 13-day bread famine ended in Trenton and North New Jersey area when the Federal Conciliation Service announced settlement of a strike by AFL bakery truck drivers. They walked out September 22, closing seven bakeries. Sympathy walkouts spread to four large companies which had agreed to the union demands for a wage increase. Later three more companies were involved. All resumed distribution of bakery goods today.

In Detroit, CIO United Automobile Workers International officers announced a virtual end to a strike (Continued on Page Four).

CONGRESS—WALSH. 5.—(AP)—A cheering congress started off Washington's reception today for Admiral Chester W. Nimitz, then went back to work on:

Government reorganization—The Senate Judiciary committee took a look at a bill just approved by the house Chairman McCarran (D-NeV) liked his own better. It wouldn't exempt any agencies from presidential reorganizing.

Wages—Patrick W. McDonough, Oakland Calif., steel plant owner said 63 cents an hour is "a pittance" and un-American, that high wages mean high production.

TAX REDUCING BILL APPROVED

House To Get Committee - Approved Measure Next Week

Washington, Oct. 5.—(AP)—A \$5,300,000,000 tax-cutting bill goes before the House next week for debate and almost certain quick passage.

Both Democrats and Republicans were pleased with the measure that emerged from the Ways and Means Committee late yesterday.

In a nutshell it:

1. Cuts the income tax next year for each individual by at least 10 per cent, trimming a total of \$2,600,000,000 from levies against personal incomes.

2. Sweeps about 12,000,000 low income persons from the income tax rolls completely—after January 1.

3. Slices corporation burdens next year by \$1,900,000,000. This will be done by reducing the 95 per cent excess profits tax to 60 per cent; cutting four surtax points from the 40 per cent combined normal and surtax rate and killing off next July 1, the corporation declared value stocks tax. The excess profits levy will be repealed January 1, 1947.

4. Cuts back, July 1, the war imposed excise levies on such things as liquor, luggage, furs, jewelry and cosmetics. This will amount to an overall saving of \$550,000,000 to consumers in the last half of 1946.

5. Freezes the Social Security tax in 1946, meaning that employers and employees will continue to pay one per cent each on payrolls not over \$4,800.

6. Repeals the \$5 automobile use tax next July 1, for a saving to motorists of \$135,000,000.

The committee kept within \$300,000,000 of the \$5,000,000,000 limit urged by Secretary of the Treasury Fred M. Vinson. But it departed broadly from the shearing methods Vinson proposed. The full House and the Senate may make more changes in the bill before it becomes law.

For individuals the administration asked simply that the three per cent "normal" tax be repealed. Instead the committee in a Republican sponsored compromise, applied the more liberal surtax exemption.

A program to remind the citizens of the major causes of fires and impress upon them the value of safe and sane prevention methods, has been devised by the Civic and Public Affairs Committee of the Chamber of Commerce in cooperation with the Greenville Fire Department, states Secretary Willard T. Kyzer today.

Fire destruction, he stated, is probably man's worst enemy. It strikes impartially rich and poor alike, when fire safety rules are neglected. For this reason every organization and citizens in Greenville is urged to help make this essential program a success.

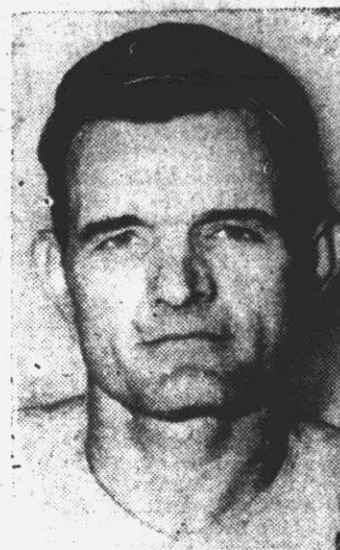
1945 fire losses are steadily increasing over those of 1944, and the danger season is at hand. During the first six months of 1945 the losses by fire in the U. S. had reached the new height of 233 million dollars. It may be expected, according to the National Board of Fire Underwriters to reach 400 million dollars before the year's end, unless Fire Prevention Week is unusually successful.

The program in Greenville during Fire Prevention Week includes newspaper and radio releases designed to remind the citizens of the fire hazards and how to correct them. Fire drills in the schools, inspections of homes for fire hazards by the citizens themselves, inspections of stores and factories by members of the fire department, with suggestions for making them fire-safe. With the cooperation of the schools, clubs, organizations, owners and operators of business and industry, newspaper and radio station, and citizens in the homes.

Greenville should be ready for a fire safe winter season. Clean the attics, closets, basements and garages of rubbish, oily rags, paper and old furniture. The City Street Department will haul these fire starters away.

Inspect, detect and correct fire hazards and practices, should be the slogan of all Greenville during Fire Prevention Week and every week thereafter.

Passenger Plane Falls Into Lake

Lakeland, Fla., Oct. 5.—(AP)—Florida State Senator Harrison E. Barringer of Sarasota is one of two passengers reported missing in the crash of a National Airlines plane which crashed here this morning at 1:03 a. m. as it overshot the Lakeland air field, airline officials stated.

Thirteen other passengers, including pilot and co-pilot, were rescued by boat when they crawled from the wrecked plane, which plummeted into 12 feet of water in the middle of the lake.

The two passengers were pinned in the wreckage underwater. MacDill Field diving equipment was being rushed to the scene from Tampa.

The 13 persons rescued were taken immediately to Morrell Memorial Hospital to be treated for shock, bruises and possible internal injuries.

Civil Aeronautics Board representatives investigating the accident withheld further information.

An Analysis Of The News

It really looks as though we are getting ahead with the colossal task of eliminating despotism, militarism, barbarism and the other isms of evil from Japan and Germany.

Both MacArthur and Eisenhower have made further sensational moves in the reformation of these criminal nations. The two generals, having beaten their swords into plowshares, are digging deep and ripping up the poisonous roots.

Indeed, in the case of medieval Japan, the sudden removal of governmental repression of thought and action from the public has created a situation that may result in rebellion to do away completely with Nippon's ancient autocratic rule.

"The Japanese government," said this statement, "shall remove all obstacles to the revival and strengthening of the Japanese people. Freedom of speech and religion and of thought, as well as respect for the fundamental human rights, shall be established."

This recently was emphasized in a directive from Washington, and MacArthur was told that if the people resorted to the use of force in seeking political reform, he wasn't to interfere any more than necessary to protect United Nations interests. So when the Jap government still clung to repressive measures, the general struck.

Weather Forecast

Today the Japanese cabinet resigned rather than obey MacArthur's order. The Mikado is said to have remarked upon receiving the resignations, "That is good and I accept." The retiring premier, Higashi-Kuni interpreted this as meaning that a stronger ministry and one more acceptable to the Americans could be formed.

Over in Germany Eisenhower is tearing fiercely at the roots of Nazism. He now is rushing the drafting of a law which will supplement drastically his recent decree which forbade employment of Nazis in business except as "labor" in the U. S. occupation zone. That law is aimed at wiping out the Nazi managerial class.

On Sunday, Bishop Wright will deliver his first sermon as bishop from St. James Church where he was baptized, confirmed and twice ordained prior to his consecration today.

Duke Of Windsor Visits England

London, Oct. 5.—(AP)—The Duke of Windsor, who forsook the British throne for "the woman I love," came back to England today for the first time since early in the war to visit his mother, Dowager Queen Mary.

The Duke last saw his mother when he abdicated in 1936.

An official of the government welcomed him at Hendon airport. He went immediately to Marlborough House to see the queen mother.

Laval Trial Is Resumed Today

Paris, Oct. 5.—(AP)—Pierre Laval returned to the high court of justice which had ousted him from his own treason trial and asserted today that the authoritative powers granted old Marshal Petain after the fall of France "would be useful to the country."

Laval had lawyers today, three of them. They refused to attend the tumultuous opening of the celebrated session yesterday but repented overnight after being warned of disbarment.

"I demand for Pierre Laval the same rights that are being granted the monsters of Belsen in Lueburg," Chief Defense Counsel Albert Naud insisted. He referred to the current trial of 45 Nazi concentration camp functionaries before a British military court.

Much of the session was devoted to Laval's final and futile plea for a postponement. When Judge Paul Moniteux denied this, Laval asked the jury to "reserve your judgment until I have fully explained my case."

Buenos Aires, Oct. 5.—(AP)—Argentina's nation-wide student strike against the Farrell-Peron government ended in defeat today, with one student dead, others injured.

Jack's usual grin disappeared as he watched man after man walk up to President Truman to receive the award.

But by the time he walked up to the President, Jack got a twinkle in his eye to match that in Mr. Truman's as they shook hands.

Out in the third row of spectators, his "little sweetheart," brown-eyed Carolyn Brown, 17, sat demurely in her pale blue suit and navy blue accessories. His pretty mother, Mrs. Margaret Jones, looked like a fashion model in wintertime black.

His folks sat right on the very row with Gen. George C. Marshall but Jack's buddy, Lloyd McNair, merchant seaman of Plymouth, N. C., was so excited he didn't recognize the general.

With the bright blue ribbon dangling the Congressional Medal of Honor against his injured chest, Jack took on his seventeenish swagger again and broke into a great big grin.

Carolyn arrived in Washington late yesterday, driving up with his mother and brother, ending a long day of waiting by Jack, who had come by train a day earlier.

"I love that woman," said the blond ex-Marine as they dined with a reporter last night. "I'm crazy about her."

Many years ago a child sat listening to the religious arguments which went on between her father and a relative who was visiting in the home. The father held one religious point of view and the relative another, and day after day they argued their points. The keen-minded little girl who sat in the corner and listened came to some very decided conclusions. She decided that the relative was right in his arguments and her father wrong. Accordingly, when she came to years of discretion she refused to seek membership in the church in which her family had worshipped for generations but instead became a member of the church to which the relative belonged.

It has been said that children are influenced not by what they hear but by what they overhear. Very often children refuse to heed the counsel of their parents, but when someone else tells them the same thing, they accept it as a marvelous revelation of truth. Frequently it seems to us as if these little ears and minds are obstinately closed to anything we say to them. But their ears and minds are not closed. In fact, they are unbelievably alert. It is not what they hear but what they overhear which has an effect upon their characters and causes them to judge the characters of those round about them.

All this constitutes added evidence that actions speak louder than words and that what we are usually drawn out what we are trying to say.

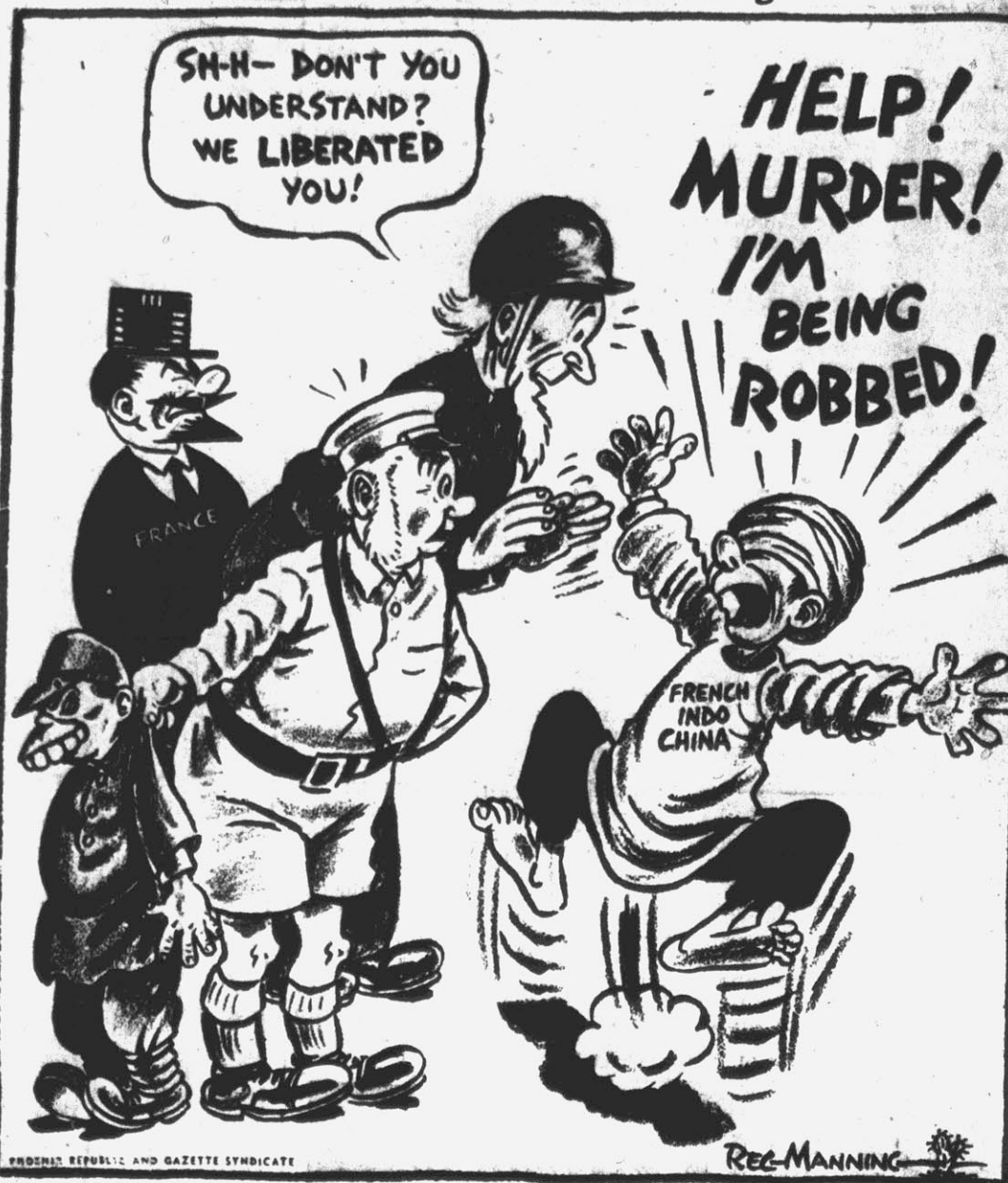

The cabinet to be named by the incoming premier may not have army and navy ministers. Japanese government authorities said these posts have been retained up to the present to carry out demobilization of Japan's armed forces, now expected to be completed by October 15.

The new premier's first job will be to take steps toward alleviating the critical food, fuel and housing shortages throughout Japan. He also may be called on to cope with political agitation stemming from American release of Japanese political prisoners and elimination of feudalistic thought control and other repressive measures.

Premier Prince Naruhiko Higashikuni went to his cousin, Emperor Hirohito, with the resignations this afternoon following a two-hour meeting of the cabinet over MacArthur's demand to oust the home minister in the interests of achieving a free thinking, free speaking Nippon.

Hirohito accepted, said "that is good"—and Higashikuni emerged with the disclosure that the emperor personally had adopted the idea of submitting the name of the next premier to MacArthur out of desire to "insure full cooperation with the Americans."

The emperor's readiness in accepting the resignations was interpreted as meaning he thought a stronger cabinet more pleasing to MacArthur could be formed.

The cabinet crisis topped off other developments which included: A Domei report that Japan's once powerful navy, cut to a remnant by Allied air and navy attacks, now has been virtually demobilized, including more than 1,000,000 naval personnel.

The carting off to dreary Omori Prison, set up during the war for Allied prisoners, of 21 suspected Japanese war criminals, including Lt. Gen. Masaharu Homma, held res-

ponsible for the sadistic "Death March on Bataan." They had been held at Yokohama.

The occupation of Sapporo, capital of Hokkaido, northernmost Japanese home island, by the U. S. 77th (Statute of Liberty) Infantry Division.

The administration plan would have given individuals relief of \$2,085,000,000, whereas the committee stipulated \$2,600,000,000.

Vinson proposed outright repeal of the corporation excess profits tax by January 1, an easement of \$2,555,000,000 in burdens. But Mr. Doughton said some relief should be given to all the 450,000 corporations, not just the 19,000 paying excess profits taxes. The committee went along with the chairman's idea.

The committee followed the administration to the letter on excise taxes.

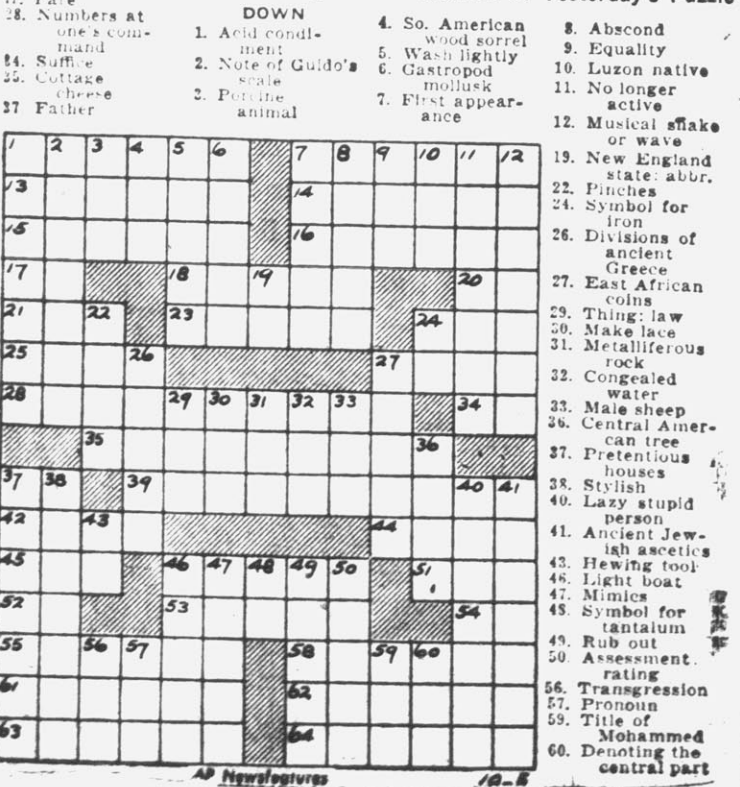

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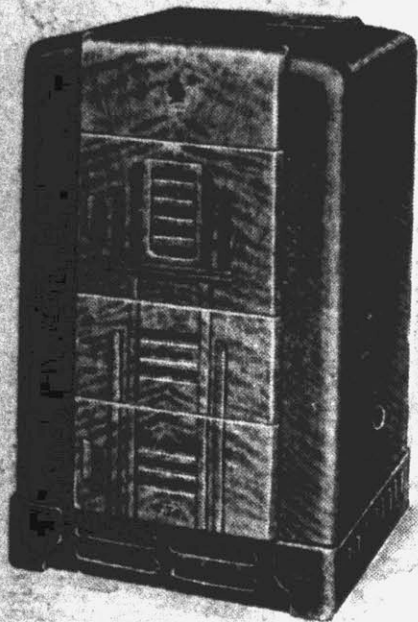
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
