To Cut Billions In Expenditures

House Committee Proposes Reductions Totalling Over 52 Billions, Mostly In Army And Navy Departments; More Speed In Discharges Urged

Washington, Oct. 17.—(AP)—Cancellation of \$52,453,535,278 in government spending authorized for the current fiscal year was recommended today by the House Appropriations Committee.

A direct result of the war's end, the legislation which the committee sent to the House for consideration provides for:

- Cancellation of \$48,264,441,439 in direct appropriations already made for the year ending next June 30.
- Wiping out \$4,187,903,339 in contractual authority for the same period. If used, this would have required additional appropriations of that amount.

Chairman Cannon (D-Mo.) cautioned against any over optimism on the part of taxpayers.

This means that there will be just that much less deficit spending for the current year and the national debt increase will be slowed down a little. Cannon said in an interview, "I see no prospects for substantial tax reductions as a result of this legislation."

As applied to the various agencies, the proposed cuts were:

- Military establishment \$30,933,090,564.
- Naval establishment \$17,662,163,961.
- Miscellaneous executive agencies \$3,687,090,253.

Previous cancellations already approved by Congress bring the total to \$56,810,654,278 of an estimated original available spending of \$170,000,000,000 for the fiscal period.

However, the committee pointed out, approximately \$80,000,000,000 of this year's original total already has been spent or obligated.

"The biggest cut in the army's funds was \$12,163,313,000 for the air corps. On August 23 of this year, the committee said, the army air corps had 62,045 planes, with plans to dispose of 44,224 while acquiring 1238 new ships.

To start the fiscal year, the army had a total of \$47,129,605,501 available to spend. The budget bureau and the President recommended cancellation of \$28,692,772,000. The committee raised this by \$2,210,318,564, a practice it followed generally in other budget and presidential recommendations.

The committee called for more rapid demobilization of army and navy personnel, urging both services to "immediately adopt the policy of releasing officer or enlisted personnel as and when they become surplus."

AMNESTY FOR MILLION JAPS

Emperor Orders Political Prisoners Freed

Tokyo, Oct. 17.—(AP)—Emperor Hirohito, whose future has been a burning topic of speculation ever since the American occupation, today granted amnesty to nearly 1,000,000 Japanese as an openly avowed move to unite Nippon "in meeting a great change in history."

Domestic agency noted that one effect of the rescript, honoring the day when the first rice crop is offered to the gods, would be to enable as many people as possible to take part in the coming elections.

"We, in meeting a great change in history, are indeed concerned to conquer the difficulties of the times with the country united as one and will trust in the cooperation and assistance of all the people," said the rescript. "Therefore, we have ordered our officials to carry out an amnesty. All our officials and people embody our will."

The rescript, unprecedented in scope, pardoned 320,000 Japanese, reduced the sentence of 37,000 and ordered restoration of civil rights to 600,000.

Domestic pointed out the rescript provides that persons recovering their rights must have lost them five years prior to Sept. 2, 1945. Previous rescripts had pushed the date back 10 years.

The emperor's appeal for unity was made at a time when Japanese Communists celebrating the release of some of their leaders from prison on orders of General MacArthur, were working openly for an end to imperialism.

In another announcement, headquarters reversed a previous decision which would have established quotas of news correspondents in Japan, the Philippines and Korea. The lifting of the quotas, which had been announced last Friday, followed protests by the press in the U. S. and by the Correspondents' Club in Tokyo.

Tobacco Prices Reach New High

The Greenville tobacco market made the highest average since 1913 yesterday when more than 1,300,000 pounds of leaf were sold for an average of \$46.53 per hundred.

Common and medium grades four 1 their way into higher price brackets yesterday and tobacco that brought \$48 and \$49 a few days ago were selling for \$50.

The market's gross sales for the season to date have passed the 47 million pound mark and warehousemen expressed the belief that the 50 million mark would be reached before the end of the week's operations.

CALL STRIKE IN ARGENTINA

Protest Against "Government Of Oligarchs"

Buenos Aires, Oct. 17.—(AP)—Argentina's largest labor organization, the General Confederation of Workers, announced today it had called a general nation-wide strike for a 24-hour period, beginning at 12:01 a. m. tomorrow.

Spokesmen for the union, which has a membership estimated at 1,500,000, said the strike was called in protest against "any government of oligarchs" and against "delivery of the government to the supreme court."

The General Workers Confederation includes among its members the Railroad and Tramways Unions, Telephone Employees and Construction Syndicates, the Waiters' Union, meat industry workers and other affiliated groups.

A spokesman stated that the Confederation was demanding the liberation of all political prisoners, although Gen. Eduardo Avelar, in his capacity of Minister of the Interior, announced Monday that all such prisoners had been freed.

Police used tear gas today in an unsuccessful attempt to disperse approximately 2,000 strikers who demonstrated in the central part of Buenos Aires, urging the election as president of Col. Juan Peron, who was ousted by the army as vice president.

The demonstrators were only momentarily quieted, and soon continued their protest.

East Indies Seething With Political Unrest

Indonesian Council Awaits Allied Reply To Four-Point Demand As Basis For Peace

Batavia, Java, Oct. 17.—(AP)—Political unrest seethed throughout Java today as the Indonesian National Council awaited a reply from the Allied command in the Netherlands East Indies to a set of four major nationalist demands which council vice-president Mohammed Hattion said represented "the only way to bring peace to this troubled land."

"In Amsterdam Dr. H. A. Logemann, minister of overseas territory, said the government was ready to offer Indonesians self government within the Dutch Commonwealth and would deal with Indonesian leaders "who merit consideration," but not with Soekarno, president of the "Indonesian Republic."

The National Council met yesterday in a bid to present itself as a national government. Soekarno was not present. He was touring western Java to restrain sections of his followers bent on violence.

In his absence Hattion promised the 187 council delegates that there would be a national election within six months and that in the interim Soekarno and his cabinet will be assisted by a working committee of the council in representing the people.

The four-point program submitted to Lt. Gen. A. F. Christison, Allied commander in the Netherlands East Indies, called for removal of all Japanese, deportation of all of the Dutch troops and prevention of the arrival of additional Dutch soldiers, a quiescent role for the Netherlands Indies civil administration.

Today In Congress

Washington, Oct. 17.—(AP)—A heavy load of postwar problems linked faithfully to the future of America and the world—fell on Congress today.

1. Congressional leaders said President Truman would address the lawmakers in person next Tuesday on peace-time universal training. He is expected to ask for it—even though Congress isn't anxious to tackle this problem now.

2. Secretary of War Patterson urged merging the Army and Navy to maintain American security and "the continuation of world peace."

3. Scientists who helped make atomic bombs warned solemnly, "One false move in international diplomacy might mean the virtual destruction of this country."

4. The House Appropriations Committee proposed cancellation of \$52,000,000,000 in government spending by June 30. Mostly Army and Navy spending.

5. The President asked Congress to appropriate \$221,842,000—to get some postponed public works projects going.

6. The Senate Foreign Relations Committee finally—and unanimously—approved the appointment of Spruille Braden to be an assistant Secretary of State. Braden used to be ambassador to Argentina. Senators may talk about Argentine affairs when the nomination comes before the Senate.

RADIOS NOT TO BE AVAILABLE

Smaller Supply For Christmas Than Expected

Chicago, Oct. 17.—(AP)—Reconversion difficulties have been slowing down essential parts of the radio industry and it appeared probable today that far fewer sets than anticipated will be available for the nation's Christmas trade.

The hopes of some prospective buyers that new models would incorporate a lot of the war-born radio advances also seemed likely to be dashed.

Frank A. Hiter, senior vice president of the Stewart-Warner Corporation, told newsmen on a nationwide survey of reconversion problems that manufacturers were aiming at a set considerably improved over the 1941 model, but not a wonder machine. "It would reach the public at 1941 prices."

"I am afraid the public has been led to believe it could get a radio that would do everything but cut the lawn," Hiter said. "That just isn't so. It has to be a matter of evolution. When the supply pipelines are full again, then we can make improvements in a big way."

The chief headache of the radio makers has been in getting essential parts. The OPA first granted parts makers price increases of from 5 to 15 per cent, and more recently gave them increases from 9 to 26 per cent. But Hiter said he had been informed that not all of the component manufacturers were willing to go ahead full blast even on this basis.

"Only if we could get an immediate full and continuing supply of parts could the industry hope to produce 3,000,000 radios by Christmas," he said.

The OPA has informed manufacturers that they could hike their prices by 15 per cent on models selling wholesale for less than \$11 and by 10 per cent for models costing over \$30. This increase will have to be absorbed by distributors and dealers so that the retail prices will be the same as in 1941.

Stewart-Warner has cleared out a plant that produced 63 million shell and bomb fuses during the war and has a pilot assembly line going on radio sets. The company wants more information on its costs before trying to reach its anticipated capacity of 5,000 sets a day.

Pitt County Service Officer Arthur B. Corey explained briefly certain phases of the GI bill of rights for the benefit of the new members and advised that his office was ready at all times to take care of inquiries of service men and aid them in procuring such benefits as they are entitled to.

The post voted to defray the expenses of a bus to carry the high school band to the football game in Kinston Friday night. It also voted to pay for two radios for use by disabled veterans in government hospitals.

Tokyo Rose Jailed

Tokyo, Oct. 17.—(AP)—Los Angeles-born Iva Toguri, accused of broadcasting propaganda to American troops from Tokyo as "Tokyo Rose," was placed in the Yokohama prefecture jail today, U. S. Eighth Army officials said.

The U. S. Army is reasserting authority in the case because she is an American citizen. When first arrested she had been turned over to Japanese civilian police.

To Ask Increase In Speed Limit

Raleigh, Oct. 17.—(AP)—The State highway speed limit is expected to be raised today from 35 to 50 miles an hour.

Governor Cherry said that he had asked the Council of State to meet later in the week and raise the 35-mile limit, which was set by the governor's wartime proclamation about two years ago.

He said that with the increased limit, patrolmen would be instructed to closely enforce the law. Since the war's end, he added, many persons had been traveling faster than 35 miles an hour and patrolmen generally were not making arrests for speeds of 45 and under.

Indonesian references to "non-violence," similar to those which have accompanied India's sporadic outbursts in her long search for liberation from western domination serve to remind that the present situation in Java is not some new post-war manifestation but rather a continuation of a movement which has become indigenous to Southeast Asia.

Throughout Burma, Malaya and the Indies, long before the war there was a growing restlessness and sometimes openly hostile attitude toward the British, French and Dutch administrators of a rich Western Pacific area where men produced for a few cents a day tremendous wealth which went to swell western standards of living.

Instead of establishing educational and health centers by means of which native populations might prepare themselves for self-government, the ruling powers permitted continuation right up to World War II of a system reminiscent of the earliest days of imperial expansion. Even with the growth of some feeling of moral responsibility after World War I, little had been done to raise the position of the various Malay peoples.

When the new war broke, the British and French found the situation disastrous. While we had little evidence one way or another from Java at the time, it is reasonable to assume that Indonesian leaders there having formed a considerable underground liberation movement

Union Spokesman Says Disputes Not Settled But Back To Work Order Is "In The Public Interest"; Only A Portion Of New York Longshoremen Back On Jobs

Washington, Oct. 17.—(AP)—John L. Lewis today called off the soft coal strikes effective Monday. A United Mine Workers spokesman said the action was taken "in the public interest."

Lewis, in a telegram to officers and members of all local unions said that future efforts to "abate this controversy" over recognition of his foremen's union "will be resumed at a later more appropriate date."

The United Mine Workers' chief said "all negotiations independent of the controversy affecting clerical, technical and supervisory employees of the industry have been discontinued."

The number of persons away from work because of strikes, under the 400,000 mark early this week for the first time this month, expanded to 450,000 today and indications were that more thousands were to be added.

The widespread soft coal strikes, the country's most serious postwar labor dispute, were responsible for about one-half of the idle, including 216,000 miners from more than 1,000 pits in six states. Others forced into idleness indirectly because of strikes were from steel mills and other industries, whose operations have been sharply reduced by a shortage of fuel.

Other front-ranking labor controversies of the more than 135 separate disputes across the country were the Longshoremen's strike at New York's sprawling harbor; the prolonged controversy in Hollywood movie studios, with recent outbreaks for violence and sitdown picketing; a new technique in strike procedure, and the walkout of some 61,000 RFL lumber workers in the Pacific Northwest.

But the coal strike and the threatened mass layoffs in several steel mills, including the world's two largest in the Chicago-Gary, Ind., area, held the center of attention in the general labor picture. Secretary of Interior Ickes in Washington termed the coal situation "bad and getting worse." Continuing, he said, would mean a "quite serious" situation in some parts of the country by next week.

In the Pittsburgh and Chicago steel mill centers, operations were the lowest in several years. Carnegie-Illinois Steel Corporation has furloughed thousands of workers and a spokesman said that unless the coal supply is increased soon at least 25,000 of the company's 36,000 employees in the Chicago and Gary, Ind., districts will be laid off. Most of the other steel mills reported similar conditions.

The magazine Iron Age estimated the steel industry would lose more

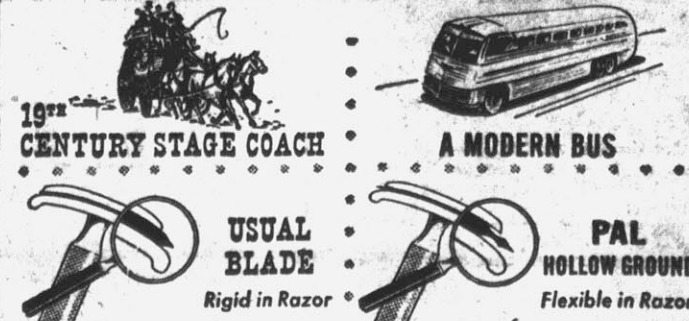

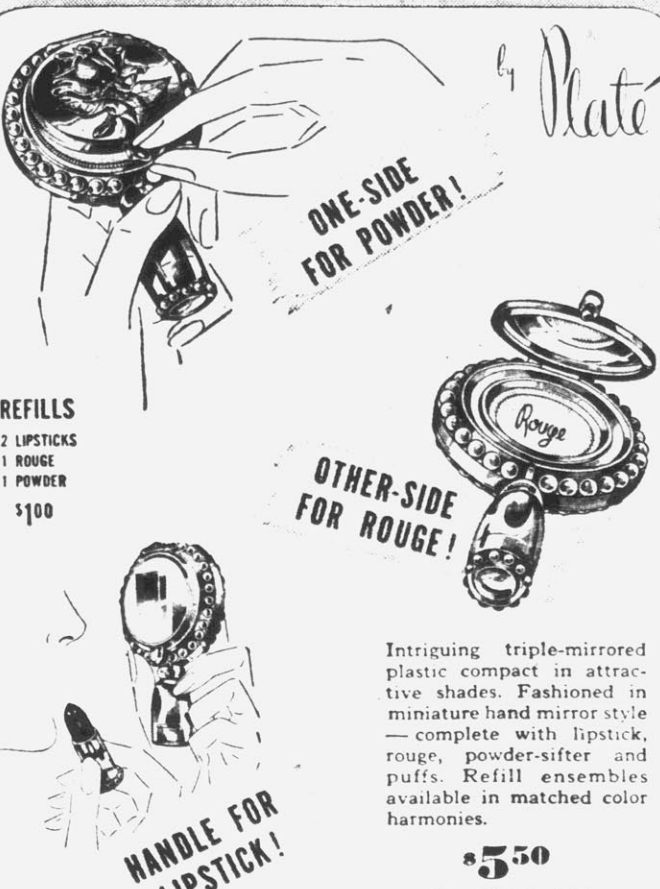

ping Administration said 60 vessels,
including 18 troopships, were being
served.

Recover Bodies Of Crash Victims

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Gatlinburg, Tenn., Oct. 17—(AP)—Bodies of six victims of an army plane crash in the Great Smoky Mountains National Park, near the Tennessee-North Carolina line, were being removed by pack horse today from the tangled wilderness of Mount Sequoyah's eastern slope.

Members of a party composed of army and park service men reached the wreckage yesterday after a two-day search, but had to wait until today to begin removal of the bodies of the plane occupants—five men and a woman.

The craft, an army C-45 transport, disappeared Oct. 5 while on a flight from Lambert Field, St. Louis, to Charlotte, N. C. The wreckage was spotted by another army plane early this week on what was then thought to be Mount Guyot, but the search party located it in a growth of virgin spruce on the North Carolina side of Sequoyah.

The party was unable to immediately report condition of the wreckage, but after a portable radio transmitter was dropped from a plane, the group—headed by an officer from the Greenville, S. C., army air base—was able to report that all occupants were killed and it would be impossible to remove the bodies before this morning.
