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Showdown Seen In Near Future

Fight By CIO Automobile Workers For 30 Per Cent Increase Seems Headed For Showdown as Group In "Big Three" Vote Stoppage

By The Associated Press. The fight by CIO-United Automobile Workers to obtain 30 per cent wage increases for the nation's auto workers appeared headed for a showdown today as the last group of employees in motor's "big three" voted in favor of a work stoppage to support the union's demands. The union yesterday flatly rejected a compromise wage adjustment program offered by General Motors Corporation at the renewal of negotiations in Detroit. Earlier GMC had formally turned down as "excessive" the union's demand for a 30 per cent wage rate hike in the motor industry.

Meanwhile, early returns from yesterday's National Labor Relations Board election among 80,000 Ford Company workers disclosed a heavy majority approved a work stoppage to support the union's wage proposal. Previously employees at General Motors and Chrysler Corporation sanctioned the possible strike action.

The newest flareup in the motor industry labor fight came as the United States Steel Corporation declined Secretary of Labor Schwelmbach's proposal to reopen wage negotiations with CIO steelworkers under a special arbitrator. CIO President Philip Murray earlier had accepted the Labor Secretary's suggestion that the collective bargaining conference be resumed "in the spirit" of President Truman's recent wage-price speech. The union had asked a \$2 a day wage increase. A strike vote among some 500,000 steel company employees is scheduled today.

The automobile and steel disputes have become the center of attention along the nation's labor front. Work stoppages across the country kept idle some 275,000 workers. Street car and bus service in Washington, tied up for nearly two days because of a walkout of 4,000 AFL employees of the Capital Transit Co. was back to normal today as negotiators on wages got under way. Picketing at one of the two plants of Goodrich Tire & Rubber Co. in Akron, O., was resumed today and some of the 10,000 workers made idle by a work stoppage yesterday returned to their jobs.

On the Pacific coast, an AFL unionist, criticizing CIO lumber workers for compromise wage demands with operators, said the firm (Continued on page four)

CHINA'S CIVIL WAR GOES ON

Chiang Kai-Shek's Government Admits Severe Set-Back

Chungking, Nov. 8.—(AP)—Chiang Kai-Shek's Kuomintang government admitted today it had suffered its first severe setback in the flourishing, undeclared North Chinese civil war, losing two of its top field commanders in the process, while Washington announced that American Marines would be withdrawn from the trouble zone.

Chinese Communists demanded today that Lt. Gen. Albert C. Wedemeyer, U. S. commander in China, apologize and that compensation be paid for alleged American "interference" in China's internal struggle. The Reds also demanded that Chinese government troops withdraw from all Red-dominated areas, as the price for peace, but asserted that the government, instead, was planning an all-out offensive for which 90 divisions already were being massed in the north.

The demand for Wedemeyer's apology was contained in one of four protesting letters sent to the American commander by the Communists' Nana headquarters. Spokesman at the Communist headquarters at Yenan called "a complete lie" government claims that the Nationalists have been and would remain strictly on the defensive. More than 70 government divisions have massed around "liberated areas" of Honan Province, and Hopei Province is surrounded by more than 20 government divisions, the Communists asserted.

Chou En-Lai, Yenan negotiator here and No. 2 Chinese Communist, announced the Yenan answer to Guomintang peace proposals shortly after reports that the Russians had withdrawn from the Manchurian ports of Huludao and Ying-kow (Newchwang) leaving the Chinese Reds in command, heightened the already tense atmosphere.

Chou said the Communists demanded that the Kuomintang withdraw to positions outside the "liberated" areas before the civil fighting began and order all Nationalist troops to cease firing. The WORLD TODAY

An Analysis Of The News. By DEWITT MACKENZIE, AP Foreign Affairs Analyst. A fellow communitist this morning turned from the headlines in his newspaper and read me in pre-dawn, sepulchral tones: "Well, when will the next war come—in about five years?" I wasn't feeling so good myself, because the train was late, but that pessimistic query put me on the alert. One doesn't talk about world wars in these atomic-bomb days without pausing to think. Anyway, my reply was that while there are very real dangers to be overcome, there is no sound reason why these shouldn't be met successfully. I believe that, too. Certainly there is cause for anxiety, but there's nothing to cause surprise. The international difficulties are mild compared with what might have developed from such a cataclysm as that through which our poor old globe has just passed. Not only is the world physically torn in many places, but its whole politico-economic structure is undergoing vast change. British Foreign Secretary Bevin, speaking in the House of Commons yesterday, declared that the great difficulty in achieving international cooperation rests in "whether or not you can entirely obliterate what are called spheres of influence and power politics."

INDONESIANS MEET DEFEAT

British Indian Troops And Tanks Beat Off Attack

By RALPH MORTON. Batavia, Nov. 8.—(AP)—A band of 1,000 Indonesians was beaten off by British Indian troops and tanks today near Batavia as tension steadily mounted throughout Java. Almost simultaneously Dutch forces threw back another attack on the Tjilatjil airfield on the south-east outskirts of the capital, scattering a band of 300 Nationalists after a pitched battle which lasted nearly an hour. The British column whose troops beat back the first attack, aimed at a camp for released Allied internees and war prisoners, said that for the first time the Indonesians appeared to be fighting under organized leadership. The Indonesians left 14 dead in the battle at the internee camp. Several Indonesians and two Punjabi troopers were wounded. At the Tjilatjil airfield, one Indonesian was killed, one was captured, and two Dutch soldiers were wounded. At Magelang, near the center of Java, the inhabitants were reported (Continued on page eight)

MacArthur Thinks Officers May Aid

By EDWIN B. HARRISON. Washington, Nov. 8.—(AP)—Gen. Douglas MacArthur has expressed his belief that "the professional heads" of the armed services should sit in as ex-officio members of the President's cabinet. The general's suggestion is included in a transcript taken by the joint chiefs of staff special committee. This group interviewed top army and navy leaders on a proposal to set up a single department of national defense. The transcript, made public by the Senate Military Committee, which is considering army-navy merger plans, quoted MacArthur as saying at Leyte in the Philippines December 3, 1944: "I believe that the professional heads of the services should be ex-officio members of the cabinet. They should be present at all cabinet meetings without power of voting, but permitted to express their opinion, and above all else, to hear the cabinet as they discuss not only external affairs of the United States but internal problems."

Consider Legislation In Regard To Strikes

House Takes Two-Way Approach To Problem Of Easing Nation's Labor Problem

Washington, Nov. 8.—(AP)—The House took a two-way approach today to the problem of easing the nation's labor unrest. The Rules Committee prepared to act on anti-strike legislation already approved by the Military Committee. An expenditures subcommittee began planning a compromise "full employment" bill. The full committee yesterday wound up six weeks of hearings on the measure, which already has passed the Senate in modified form. Most of the military group argued that the best way to halt labor strife is to provide stricter regulation of unions. Generally, those supporting the "full employment" bill oppose such action, urging instead that assurance of jobs for all is the best way to quiet unrest. Acting Chairman Cox (D-Ga.) of the Rules Committee told a reporter it had been planned to await conclusion of the management-labor conference here before acting on the anti-strike legislation, but "things seem to be dragging down there."

Rep. Arends (R-Ill.) said in an interview he would urge speedy action on the measure. He said it would "make unions more responsible of jobs for all."

Today In Congress

By Max Hall. Washington, Nov. 8.—(AP)—Congressmen got into a scrap over universal military training today after Secretary of War Patterson said it is essential to American security and world peace. Patterson testified before the House Military Committee. As he finished, Rep. Short (R-Mo.) popped a surprise motion to delay consideration of a training bill until next year—or at least until the Senate has voted. The move was blocked on a technical rule, however. The Missouri said he's back with his motion tomorrow. He told reporters: "You can say this bill is dead; it would be dead right now if we had been allowed to vote this morning."

Patterson contended that the only justification for requiring every young American to give a year of his life to military training is that: "It is needed to give the United States security and to make it possible for us to underwrite world peace."

On one of the busiest days of the postwar Congress, this also happened: A Senate-House committee investigating the Pearl Harbor disaster was assured of any information it wants. The White House said President Truman had ordered heads of all government agencies to authorize their employees to give the committee "any information of which they may have knowledge."

Speaker Rayburn thinks the House will "get somewhere pretty soon" on a so-called "full employment" bill. He said so after congressional leaders talked with the President.

Rayburn announced Prime Minister Attlee of Great Britain will be invited to make a speech to Congress next week.

Auto dealers crowded a House committee room to talk about the price of new cars. More than 300 law makers turned up at one time or another to hear them.

President W. L. Mallon of the National Automobile Dealers Association said dealers are "gravely concerned" over a threatened OPA cut in their trade discount. He wanted it left at the present level. Slamming at the government's foreign policy, Communist Leader William Z. Foster said the administration "will precipitate a civil war in China" unless it gets our troops out and stops supporting the Chiang regime. He appeared before the House committee investigating un-American activities.

Backing a bill to raise civil service 20 per cent, Gen. Omar Bradley told Senators he is worried about a possibility the Veterans Administration can't pay good enough salaries to do the job former servicemen need and deserve.

Universal military training has been urged by President Truman. The House Military Committee began hearings today. Secretary of War Patterson and Secretary of the Navy Forrestal were called as the first witnesses. They disagree sharply on whether to merge the War and Navy departments, but on universal training they are alike. They want it.

Another fight, the one inside the Pearl Harbor Investigating Committee, reached the stage today where Democrats and Republicans on the committee were hollering "politics" at each other in interviews with reporters. What's more, they added that politics is threatening the value of the whole inquiry.

The committee met today to try and smooth out its bitter differences over procedure.

Labor - Management Conference Stalled By Steel Corporation

Washington, Nov. 8.—(AP)—President Truman's Labor-Management Conference stalled through a bulging agenda today, but United States Steel Corporation held the Capital's attention with a sharp rebuff to Mr. Truman's wage-price policy.

Through its president, Benjamin F. Fairless, the corporation notified Secretary of Labor Schwelmbach it would not resume wage talks with the CIO Steel Workers until it had the government's answer on steel price increases. Fairless dashed cold water, also, on Mr. Truman's proposal that employers grant wage increases now, then wait six months before seeking a price ceiling adjustment from OPA if profits dwindled too sharply.

Fairless said if wages are boosted, additional steel price increases beyond those already pending—will be needed and the corporation, he added, will insist on assurances from OPA that they would be granted "simultaneously" with any wage hike. Philip Murray, president of the CIO and of the United Steel Workers, had accepted Schwelmbach's proposal that collective bargaining be resumed—in what Murray said was the spirit of Mr. Truman's wage-price speech last Tuesday—under a special conciliator. This new road-block in the administration's drive for labor peace loomed just as a minor but irritating snag was cleared away. The 30-hour tieup of all bus and street car service in Washington. Delegates could again ride the trolleys to the Labor-Management Conference, if they chose, under a 14-day truce arranged between the striking AFL traction workers and the Capital Transit Company. GRIM STORIES OF ATROCITY

Witnesses Describe The Japanese Reign Of Terror

Manila, Nov. 8.—(AP)—The grim story of a Japanese reign of terror in Batangas Province where 25,000 men, women and children were brutally mistreated or murdered in seven months began to unfold today before the military commission hearing war crimes charges against Lt. Gen. Tomoyuki Yamashita. Survivors have said that the death toll of civilians was far greater in Batangas than it was in Manila. Populations of entire villages, these survivors have reported, were held at bay at the point of Japanese guns while the invaders burned down all their homes. A Filipino witness, Pampilo Umali, from the province, who related that he was tied up with "about 700 men and I don't know the number" (Continued on page eight)

Negotiations Between Washington And Moscow Concerning Turkey And Japan Appear Today Much Farther From Success Than Officials Hoped

By JOHN M. HIGHTOWER, Associated Press Diplomatic News Editor. Washington, Nov. 8.—(AP)—Negotiations between Moscow and Washington over a variety of problems ranging from Japan to Turkey appear today to be farther from success than officials here had hoped.

Here is the situation:

1. Foreign Commissar Molotov has replied to an American proposal for an Allied control agency in Tokyo which would be subordinate to the Far Eastern Advisory Commission in Washington. There are strong indications that Molotov turned down this proposal and that Secretary of State Byrnes is not inclined to compromise the issue further.
2. The United States has laid a four-point program for reviving control of the Dardanelles before the Turkish Government. This would give Russia some advantages in the use of the straits which she does not now have. But it falls short of Russia's reported desire for military bases on the vital link between the Black Sea and the Mediterranean.
3. A Russian-Turkish treaty of non-aggression and friendship that had run for many years expired yesterday following Soviet denunciation. Diplomatic officials say they fear that Russia may make a few psychological passes at Turkey in order to gain the right to set up territories in northeastern Turkey which the Russians have claimed.
4. The problem of the atomic bomb and peacetime uses of atomic energy becomes more acute between the two countries, in the opinion of diplomatic authorities, as the time approaches for conferences among President Truman, Prime Minister Attlee of Britain and Mackenzie King of Canada. These conversations will open Sunday aboard the presidential yacht Potomac. Byrnes declined at an afternoon news conference yesterday to comment on Molotov's speech in Moscow Tuesday, saying that Russia would have atomic energy and that the secret of the bomb could not be kept. But the subject evidently was very much on Byrnes' mind because he went directly from the (Continued on page four)

Washington, Nov. 8.—(AP)—Prime Minister Clement Attlee of Great Britain will be invited to address a joint session of Congress next week, House Speaker Rayburn said today. Rayburn told reporters of the invitation as he left a White House conference with President Truman and other Congressional leaders. Attlee is coming here Saturday for discussions of atomic energy with President Truman and Prime Minister Mackenzie King of Canada. Rayburn did not give a specific date for Attlee's address but asserted it would not be Monday.

The NATION TODAY

By James Marlow. Washington, Nov. 8.—(AP)—Dealers can sell the new unrationed cars on a first-come-first served basis or any way they please. There'll be no government controls except for the ceiling prices which OPA will announce in a few days. Evasion of price ceilings are a violation of the law. Once the sales start, OPA will keep watch to see that the price ceilings are not being evaded. Assuming that the majority of dealers will play fair, this story will speak of those who might not. Ceilings can be evaded with the connivance of a customer or by a dealer taking advantage of a customer's desire for a new car. It could work like this: 1. By side payments or bonuses. In addition to the regular ceiling price, the customer would pay the dealer for the privilege of getting a new car. 2. Unreasonable trade-in allowances. A dealer could give a customer far too little on a used car traded in for a new one and then sell the used car at a big profit. 3. Upgrading. A dealer could charge a more expensive car price for a cheaper car. For instance: by calling a coupe a cabriolet and charging a cabriolet price. Already a lot of people have made down payments on the new cars which haven't reached the dealers yet. Harvey Diamond, chief of OPA's automotive enforcement branch, says it is useless before sales are completed to try to learn whether these down-payments are really side-payments or bonuses. But Diamond says OPA will move in when the sales start and begin checking on dealers. Asked why anyone should tell OPA he had given a bonus to a dealer for a new car or connived in any other way to evade ceilings, Diamond said: "They do, just the same. If (an) people did it, we'd probably be sure to find one of them who would tell about it because he was sore at being forced to pay extra or for some other reason."

The OPA, Diamond said, is filing charges against 300 to 400 used car dealers a month for violating ceilings on used cars.

The National Automobile Dealers Association says this: Any violations by dealers will be far outnumbered by the violations occurring between individuals in private sales of new cars.

"I should think that was accurate."

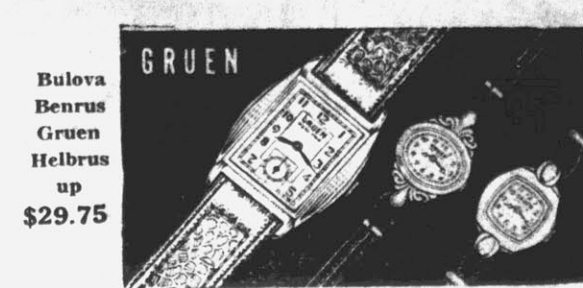

What does it mean to be edu-
cated?

Washington—There's a peculiar wrinkle in the GI Bill of Rights of which a smart veteran might want to take advantage.

As the law is now written, a high school graduate veteran who can lay claim to the full amount of free education can get through four years of college and to within one year or less of a law degree, all within the allowed time limit.

Here's why and how:
Four years is the maximum time any veteran may get free schooling under the GI Bill.

Four years is four years . . . or is it? A school year is only eight or nine months. But the four years allowed under the law are calendar years.

Now then, for each "ordinary school year" the government will pay up to \$500 for tuition and other essential fees. That raises the question: How long is an "ordinary school year?"

Veterans Administration has decreed that an ordinary school year is from 30 to 38 weeks.
Before the law, few colleges or universities allowed students to complete more than one school year in one calendar year.

But wartime lack of doctors, engineers and other specialists forced many schools to give year-around training.

The heavy duty curriculum proved a success, and most schools which tried it expect to retain it.

So, instead of using up his four allowable calendar years, the veteran can zoom through a four-year course in about two and a half years by cramming "normal school years" into that time. That leaves him a year and a half to get a start and almost a finish on a post graduate course. Of course he won't get any vacations to speak of.

Only speed-up program expected generally to go back to the pre-war style is medicine.

Another item interesting to school-bound vets is the fact that credit for at least one semester's work will go to the average ex-GI.

ever, until after the House and Senate get together on their exact form.

3. Senator Tom Connally (D-Tex.), chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, expects to introduce formally a bill relating to the use of U. S. troops by the World Security Council in case of an international emergency.

The bill defines the method of determining how large a U. S. force will be available, and it provides that the President can order this force into action when needed, without asking the permission of Congress. The Foreign Relations Committee has approved the bill unanimously. Senator Connally said the Senate will pass it easily. Senator Ewart (D-Mont.), not a member of the committee, criticized the bill today in talking with reporters.

Meanwhile it was learned that Gen. Douglas MacArthur has suggested that the generals and admirals in charge of the armed forces should sit in the President's cabinet as unofficial members—talking, listening, but not voting. MacArthur's statement was made public by the Senate Military Committee, which is still hearing testimony—and may continue for quite a while longer—on the proposal to merge the armed forces into a single department.

Here are some of the home-front matters before Congress today:

Auto prices—Several hundred auto dealers came to town to present to the House Small Business Committee their side of a dispute with the OPA over how much profit they'll make on new cars. The OPA will testify next week.

Labor—The House Rules Committee met to act on an anti-strike bill already approved by the House Military Committee. Rules Committee approval is needed before the bill can be debated by the House.

Jobs—The House Expenditures Committee met to begin writing a compromise version of the "full em-

ployment bill." The committee ended its hearings yesterday.

The ballots will be counted Nov. 21. A strike in the industry would be the first in 10 years of successful collective bargaining.

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ly News said that in a letter addressed to the "Chief of the American Military Mission in Yenan" Chu Teh charged American planes "strafed our populace and soldiers in Antsieh and attacked our liberated areas."

The Communists, Shu asserted, reserve the rights to ask for damages if investigation ascertains actual losses suffered by the people.

About 30 American officers and soldiers, on October 18, surrounded the Communists' Tientsin office and arrested five staff workers, "by this action interfering with China's internal affairs," he said, adding:

"These actions have harmed the traditional friendship of the Americans and Chinese. I seriously request that adequate measures be adopted to assure that there will be no recurrence of them."

No reply from the Americans was reported.

Lean Beef is Plentiful

What a free and easy feeling it gives one to walk up to the meat counter and order a "beef roast" without thinking about points. True, you can't always find cuts that are well marbled with fat but lean beef will be tender and delicious if cooked by moist heat and given extra time.



Lean Rib "Roast" . . . braised to insure tenderness

Wipe meat with clean, damp cloth; season well with salt and pepper.

Heat 2 tbsp. bacon drippings (Certified Bacon drippings are delicious), in heavy iron or aluminum kettle or roaster with tight fitting cover and brown meat well on both sides.

Add 1/2 cup water, cover tight-

ly and simmer over low heat (or put in slow oven, 300° F.), until meat is very tender. Add more hot water in small amounts from time to time as liquid evaporates. The time required will vary with thickness of meat and original tenderness. Allow around 4 hours for a 5 pound "roast".

To Roast or Braise?

Yes, the rib "roast" pictured above is usually roasted (cooked with dry heat in an uncovered pan) and if you can find one that is well marbled with fat, do roast it (allow about 30 min. per lb. at 3

CLOTHES FOR WAR PEOPLE

Senator Corey Heads Local Committee In National Drive

Senator Arthur B. Corey, local chairman of the United National Clothing Collection for overseas relief last spring, has been asked by President Truman and Henry J. Kaiser to serve again as local chairman in a second nationwide clothing collection for overseas relief.

President Truman in his letter said that the need for this collection is "imperative." The campaign, to be known as the Victory Clothing Collection, is scheduled for January 7, 1946 through January 31st. The national goal is 100,000,000 garments with additional shoes and bedding.

The President wrote: "Without adequate clothing and bedding, war on the long road to rehabilitation there can be no peace. I therefore ask you (Mr. Kaiser) and the more than seven thousand local chairmen of the United National Clothing Collection to lead the nation in another clothing collection for the relief of victims of war."

Expressing willingness to accept the local chairmanship, Mr. Corey said, "In view of the President's appeal, Mr. Kaiser's response, and Mr. Kaiser's letter to me, I feel I must accept the responsibility to organize our community to meet this new challenge."

"UNRRA has informed local chairmen that every pound of the clothing contributed in the nationwide collection this past spring will be in the hands of war victims overseas by Christmas. But Mr. Kaiser's letter to me said that total victory has brought many more millions of war victims within range of our assistance. I know our community will again make every effort to do its part. No innocent victim of these years of horror must go naked while clothing hangs unused in the closets of America. We will all of us make our contribution toward a happier New Year for the helpless. Since the task is urgent, let's get ready now to undertake it, all that is asked is whatever used clothing, shoes and bedding we can spare."

"According to Mr. Kaiser's letter to me each contributor will be invited to enclose in the garments a 'good-will' letter to the unknown recipient. I think it is a wonderful idea to have this expression of international friendship."

One Nazi Saboteur Spills Mission Plan

Washington, Nov. 8—(AP)—One of the eight German saboteurs landed by U-boats in 1942 made a belated confession to the FBI and spilled the details of their mission.

This tip resulted in the group being rounded up within 14 days, ruining their plan to wreck TVA—source of power for the atomic bomb project—and other key war and communications projects.

Disclosing this yesterday in a statement, Attorney General Tom C. Clark said arrest of the group caused the Germans to change plans to send over a batch of saboteurs by submarine every six weeks.

President Orders Give Information

Washington, Nov. 8—(AP)—The White House said today that President Truman has ordered that the joint congressional committee investigating Pearl Harbor must be supplied with any information it desires.

His memorandum, to federal department and agency heads, as well as to the joint chiefs of staff, authorizes all employees under them to give the committee "any information of which they may have knowledge."

The President's action came at a time when Republicans and Democrats were contending that political considerations are imperiling the value of the whole inquiry.

Look, O'Reilly! Albany, Calif., Nov. 5—(AP)—Patrolmen reporting to headquarters started an argument at once over a line in the squadroom.

Sgt. Arthur K. Smith explained he had found Ruby Reaves, 20, and Patricia Biney, 21, standing on the sidewalk outside a naval housing project from which they had suddenly been evicted with their wash half done.

He said he had invited them—laundry and all—to take temporary refuge in the police station.

TWENTY-FOUR national organizations are cooperating with the Children's Book Council to make this year's Children's Book Week, November 11-17, a celebration in every community in the country.

According to a pamphlet issued by the Council, twenty-five thousand requests for Book Week display material were answered last year by the Council, which is planning to supply an even greater number of communities this year with book marks, posters, and other material.

A free manual of suggestions concerning Book Week will be sent on request of Book Week Headquarters at 62 W. 15th St., N. Y. C. 19.

Although Book Week material from the headquarters has proved a great help in previous years, the main stimulus comes from each community uniting all forces to bring books to the attention of the children. Exhibits of books that can be freely held and examined, book talks by authors that make the books "come alive," plays and projects built around book themes that the children themselves participate in, all help the child realize what books can mean to his life. In small and large communities all over the country, librarians and teachers have cooperated with civic leaders and mothers to celebrate Book Week.

Popular for many years in this country, Book Week is fast becoming an international celebration. Last year many countries, including Australia, New Zealand, Brazil, Russia, and England held Book Week exhibits despite wartime handicaps. This year these countries and many more will have extensive Book Week displays and projects.

POLICE MAKE GOOD RECORD

The October Report Shows Efficiency Under Chief Tanner

By CHESTER WALSH

The Greenville police department made a record during October that reflects credit upon Chief James E. Tanner and every member of the force. Out of 228 arrests made during the month only 14 defendants were adjudged not guilty in Police Court. Incidentally, the police gave warnings to 122 persons, made 115 special investigations, and during the month found 23 doors to business places not locked after closing time; checked on 212 complaints and investigated 15 motor vehicle accidents. That's a splendid record, businessmen who have seen the chief's report said. An attorney pointed out that the police deserve special mention for thoroughly preparing the cases they send to court.

Mayor Jack Boyd called attention to the fact that the State Highway Patrol, the sheriff's office and the police department and the FBI and SBI and other law enforcement agencies are working together harmoniously to prevent law violations and to apprehend law violators by educating the public up to the requirements of the law.

Considerable attention was given to traffic violations. Thirteen arrests were made for crashing red lights, 12 for reckless driving, 18 for speeding, and a number for minor violations. Eighty-five persons were arrested during the month for driving while drunk, and 12 for reckless driving.

The police have a new car that is used for constant "cruising" over the town and it is doing good work. Other cars have been ordered, and short wave radio sets will be installed to permit instant contact

with police headquarters. Some of the radio broadcasting equipment has already arrived at the City Hall. An engineer will shortly install it.

While discussing the report, Chief Tanner expressed appreciation to Judge J. W. H. Roberts and Solicitor Eli Bloom for their cooperation. "We don't like to arrest people—we would rather teach them how not to get arrested," the chief said.

The police department in October turned over to City Clerk J. O. Duval \$2,206.85; to the State treasurer, \$312.00; to Pitt County from fines, \$746.06, and to the county for the Police Protection Fund, \$78—total, \$3,342.91.

Levi M. Manning Is Killed In Virginia

Portsmouth, Va. Nov. 8.—(AP)—The body of Levi Marshall Manning, 40, Broadway service station operator, who was killed late Wednesday afternoon when his car failed to negotiate a turn on the overpass on Route 13 at Bowers Hill, was sent to Greenville, N. C., today for funeral services and burial.

According to a report filed by Norfolk County officers V. R. England and C. W. Hollowell, who investigated the accident, Manning was en route to Suffolk on a hunting trip with Charles E. Karnes, a navy enlisted man. Karnes suffered a sprained shoulder for which he was treated in the Naval Hospital, Portsmouth, and released.

Karnes told police that Manning was testing out a wheel alignment which he made just prior to starting for Suffolk, and that the car turned over several times. Karnes stopped a motorist who called the Craddock ambulance but Manning was dead when it arrived. Manning was the son of William M. Manning of Greenville, and the late Mrs. Penny Byrd Manning.

School Building At Beulaville Burned

Beulaville, Nov. 8.—(AP)—Fire of undetermined origin completely destroyed the two-story brick consolidated school building here Tuesday night.

O. P. Johnson, Duplin County superintendent of schools, said the damage would amount to approximately \$65,000, of which \$55,000 was covered by insurance. Volunteer firemen from nearby towns and military camps saved the adjacent teacherage, Johnson said.

Johnson said classes would be resumed on November 19 in the school's gymnasium and auditorium, which were saved from the blaze. The school has an enrollment of approximately 1,000.

Medal Is Awarded Brig. Gen. Royall

Washington, Nov. 8.—(AP)—The Distinguished Service Medal was presented to Brig. Gen. Kenneth C. Royall of Goldsboro, N. C., newly appointed undersecretary of war, by Secretary of War Robert Patterson at a ceremony in the Pentagon Building yesterday.

The medal was awarded for Gen. Royall's services as deputy fiscal director of the Army Service Forces from May, 1943, to April, 1944, and as special assistant to the secretary of war after the latter date.

In the first World War, Royall, a Goldsboro attorney, served as a field artillery officer. He returned to military duty in June, 1942. The next month President Roosevelt named him as defense attorney for the eight German saboteurs who had been captured just after they entered the United States on Long Island.

ed extremely uneasy as armed Nationalists gathered in threatening hordes from outlying areas, British authorities said.

President Soekarno of the unrecognized Indonesian republic prepared to leave tomorrow to confer with other Nationalist leaders at Jogjakarta, ancient capital of the Indies, where the Nationalists are said to have 100,000 troops. Their commander in chief, Gen. Supriyadi, has broadcast a call for all former Netherlands East Indies training instructors to report to the Indonesian training center there. An official report said Bandoeng, the summer capital, was believed to be the headquarters of six divisions of Indonesians now in the process of formation.

For the first time British reports referred to the Indonesian army in military terms. Previously reports referred to the forces as armed ex-tremists or "preservation corps."

Shooting was reported again last night near the Hotel Des Indes in Batavia, where U. S. Consul General Walter A. Foote resides. Several guests in the hotel had narrow escapes.

Troopships which left Holland several weeks ago also are just off shore now.

While the Dutch sailed over the long-range prospect, Soekarno's cabinet met in an emergency session to tackle what one member described as a "grave situation."

A spokesman said the Soekarno government had reason to fear British forces at Soerabaja were about to attempt a deep penetration into Eastern Java for the purpose of disarming Indonesians.

ber of women, but there were many" and "led off to a well about 300 feet wide and 60 feet deep."

One by one they were made to jump into the well, Umali said.

"When my time came, about 200 already had jumped and after I jumped at least another 100 followed me."

Before Japanese soldiers covered the well with native bamboo sheets, Umali said, they threw in some rocks, "dropped a sewing machine" and fired in many shots.

Some time after midnight, the witness continued, some Filipino women sneaked to the well and lowered ropes, up which six men escaped. Many of the women liberators were captured and never seen again.

Another Filipino, Victor Manquil-

at, said he was trussed up and then marched off with 300 to another well. The one Umali had been in was filled with bodies by that time.

En route, Manquil dashed to freedom but was hit by two of seven bullets Japanese soldiers fired after him. He returned to the well a few days later and found the bodies of many men and women with whom he started the march.

Manquil said that none of the marchers was seen alive again.

The defense announced it would attempt to show that the killing of more than 12,000 civilians in the rich old Batangas Province town of Lipa was in retaliation for constant night attacks on Japanese communications lines by Filipino guerrillas.

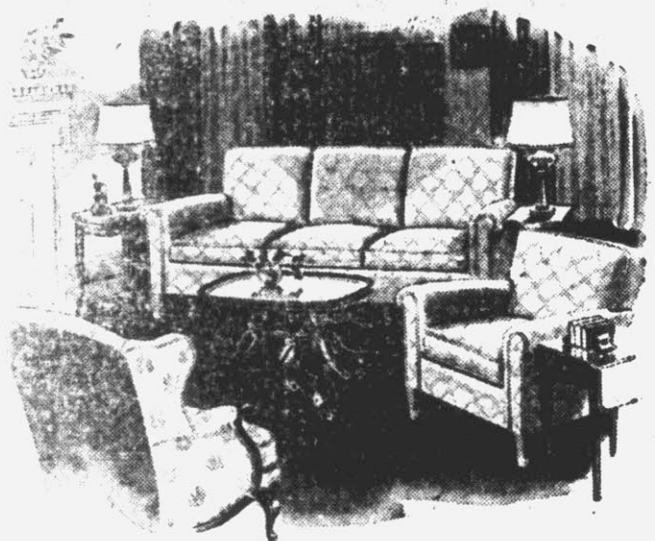

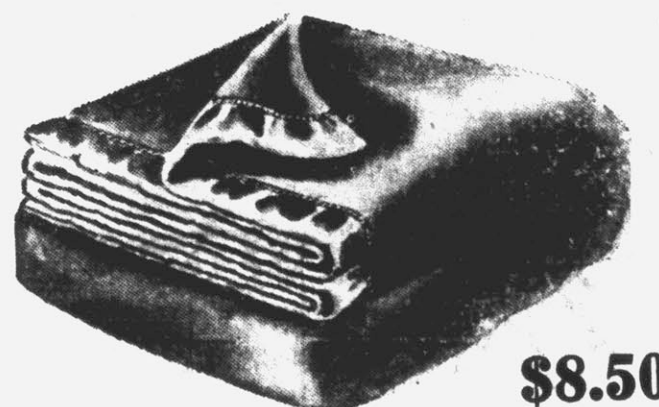

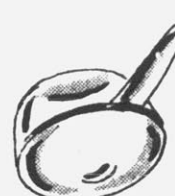
