ed thousands to Meiji shrine on Tokyo's outskirts to worship the spirit of Hirohito's grandfather, founder of the modern Japanese empire, and to enjoy its gardens and famous pine groves, only four Japanese were seen in the shrine's broad approaches, two obviously demobilized army officers and two giggling school girls.

Attendance at Yasukuni shrine, where are enshrined the souls of all Japan's fallen warriors, was not much greater. Before and during the war this chief temple of the militarist cult drew huge crowds daily. Similar neglect was found at the shrine to General Nogi, hero of Port Arthur, and other Shinto temples.

On the same day, Asakusa Park and Playground at the other end of Tokyo draw scores of thousands. Long queues waited for admittance to theaters and movie houses, most of which escaped the fires which razed surrounding blocks.

Shinto's manifest decline may have far reaching developments in Japan's political as well as religious life. An American State Department spokesman recently announced that American policy is to make it possible for Shinto to continue its pre-war role in the national scheme. To this end the Japanese government will be required to cease all financial support. But Shinto's eclipse may be achieved without any allied action. Shinto and its great shrines always have been supported by the State, not the people. What will rush into the vacuum left by Shinto's decline

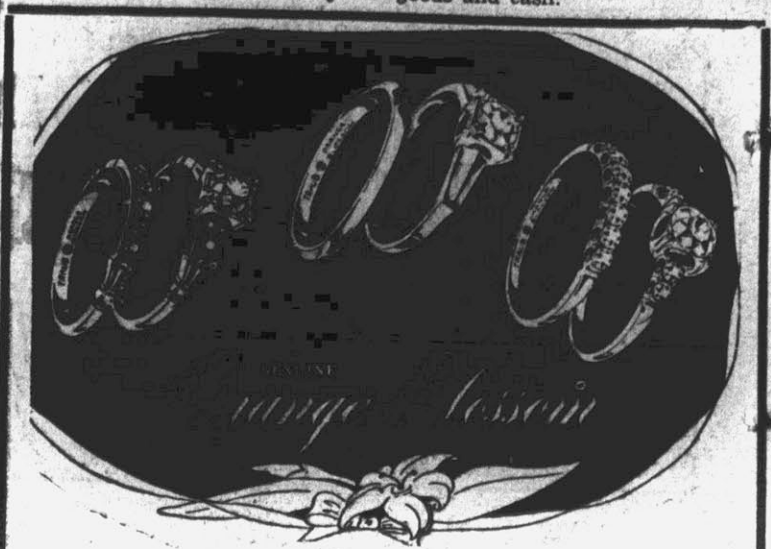
Commissioner Going To Visit Japan Now

San Francisco, Nov. 9.—(AP)—Edwin W. Pauley, U. S. representative on the War Reparations commission, is en route by plane to Tokyo today, convinced of two things—that Japanese economy must be reduced to a bare minimum, and Russia is entitled to little if any indemnity for its part in the Pacific war.

Pauley said he is anxious to get to Manchuria "as fast as I can" to investigate reports that Russia had been removing industrial machinery from that area.

The United States policy, he asserted, is to leave Japanese assets intact in Manchuria and China, where they will be considered part of the reparation payment to the Chinese.

He declined to estimate the amount of indemnity to be set for Japan, but said it would be in both goods and cash.

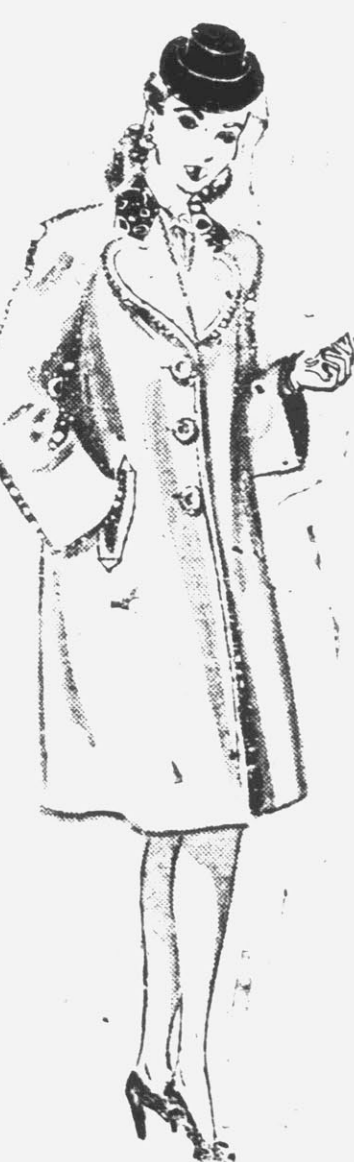

Council of English Teachers

Miss Elizabeth Walker of the East Carolina Teachers College Library staff talked last night on "Supplementary Reading in the High School" at a meeting of the Pitt County Council of English Teachers at the home of Dr. Meredith N. Posey.

Miss Walker stated that the most progressive teachers of English are breaking away from the idea of requiring students to read books selected from a prepared list and are trying to encourage a freer and more varied choice of reading by the student himself. She presented a list of about twenty books, which she thought would appeal to students of various ages and interests. Making entertaining and instructive comments as she displayed the volumes, she told how pupil-interest can be aroused in biographies, poetry, history, folklore, and works on science, travel, international affairs, current events, racial relationships, and religion. From her experience as a teacher and a librarian, Miss Walker drew illustrations of methods of arousing interest in literature.

PHANTOMS TO PLAY QUAKES

Game In Guy Smith Stadium Here Tonight

Tonight's game between the Greenville High School Phantoms and the East Carolina Quakes, looks as the local severest test of the season. When the kick-off gets underway in Guy Smith Stadium at eight it will be the tenth opponent the G-Men have lined up against this season. As to a choice of the winner, it will probably be a toss-up.

Everything was in readiness around the Phantom camp today and the spirits of the G-Men were probably as high as at any time of this season. With the exception of Xenophon Sideris, who has a broken blood vessel in his leg, J. T. Williams and Stump Garrett, victims of minor injuries, the Phantom squad as a whole is in the peak of condition.

The Farley men have played nine games since being defeated by the Quakes in the locals' initial test of the season. That first meeting exhibited two very evenly matched outfits although the Goldsboro eleven cashed in on a third period pass-lateral and sent the Greens back home with a 7-0 defeat chalked up in the score book.

The Quakes came to Greenville tonight with a very fine passer in the person of Robert Hallow. Hallow throws from the port side and his short flank passes are what spilled the beans for the Phantoms in the first affair. The Quakes have a very stubborn forward wall and the G-Men backs will really have to buck the line tonight if they expect to pick up very much yardage. Billy Harrington, Spooky Morgan, Mac Batchelor and Jimmy Futrell will share most of the offensive duties for the locals tonight. Harrington's passing should be a big gun in the Phantom attack.

The line of the G-Men tonight will be expected to play their usual fine game. Jimmy Ward and Julian White, lanky receivers, will most likely handle the flank positions tonight. Coach Farley will rely on Jack Whitehead and Bobby Clark, two of the best linemen on the squad at guards. Holding down the tackles are expected to be capable Lewis Lawrence and Bud Whitehurst, a very hard charging line-man.

J. T. Williams, the Phantoms' best place-kicker 13 years, will be in the pivot slot.

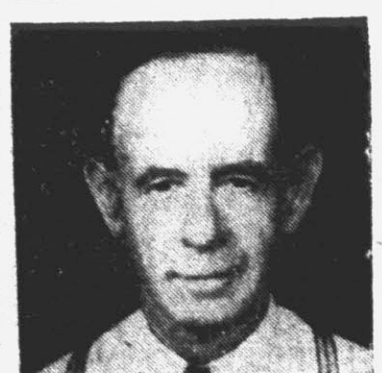

INTEREST IN ART EXHIBIT

William Fields' Paintings At Library Are Outstanding

By LUCY CHERRY CRISP
The show of paintings by William Fields now on exhibit at the Community Art Gallery is of special interest in this community in several counts. First, William Fields is a young North Carolinian who seems destined to add another name to the much-too-brief list of North Carolina artists of enduring note. Second, following his graduation from Chapel Hill, he was officially connected with the Federal Art program in this State through which the local Art Center had its origins and early growth.

Aside from these considerations, however, the show commands attention on its own merits. It is a very interesting show. Compromised

mainly of portraits — for it is in portrait-painting that Fields' real interest lies—the group includes a few still life and landscape subjects, all like the portraits, done in oil.

In an informal talk that opened the exhibit, the artist said some interesting things about portrait painting in general. It should be said, a definite part of the social life of a community, an accepted part of the historical record of a community's life, and the portrait painter, a definite and essential factor in such recording. Speaking more specifically of what a portrait actually is, Fields gave as his own answer the suggestion that a portrait should be not merely a physical likeness of the subject but a personality likeness—which is a far more difficult thing to achieve. The matter of suitable framing for paintings came in for discussion also. Using as illustrations some of the frames in the show, he spoke of the important role the surrounding frame plays in the completely satisfying appearance of a portrait.

As for the show itself, it evidences a long step ahead taken by Fields during his 3 years of study at the Boston Museum of Fine Arts and painting in Boston and New York—since his last North Carolina show. There are some excellent portraits here—done with an honesty and beauty suggestive of the work of great portrait painters of the past. There are others not so well done, with too little consideration given to such important matters as background, facial modeling, and color choices. Throughout there is a meticulous attention given to the painting of fabric and texture—a velvet dress is really velvet; silk ribbons "shine like silk" and worsted is definitely rough worsted. Altogether, this is a show of both achievement and promise, and his

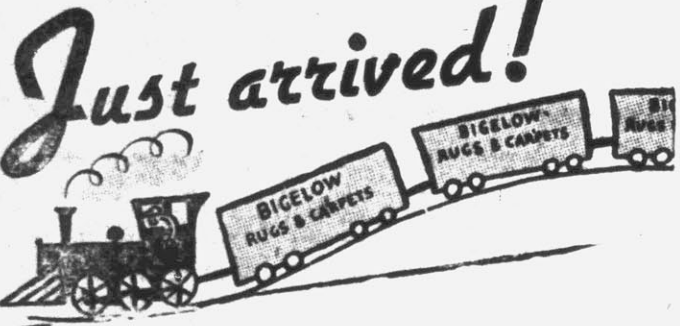

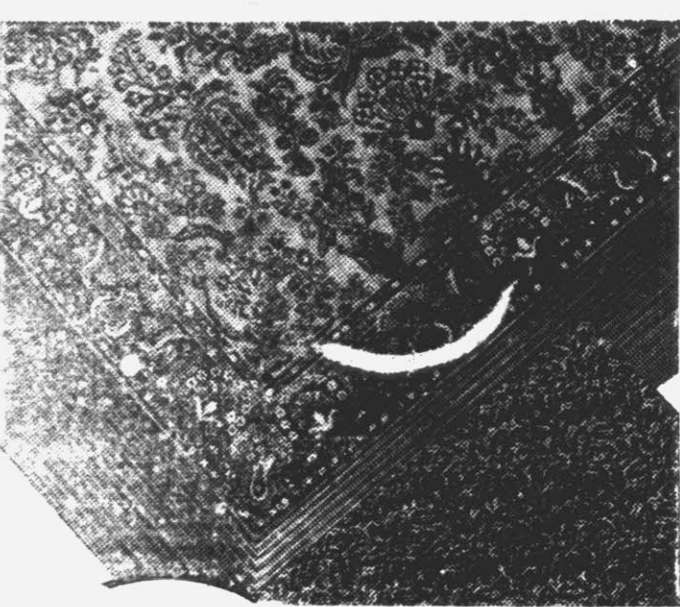
