Grew Called To Give Testimony

Former Ambassador Is Recalled Before Pearl Harbor Investigating Committee For Questioning Concerning Destruction Of Codes In Tokyo Before War

Washington, Nov. 28.—(AP)—Former Ambassador Joseph C. Grew testified today that some codes used by the American embassy in Tokyo were destroyed before war broke out December 7, 1941.

And some were not destroyed until after the Japanese attacked Pearl Harbor on that date, he told the Senate-House committee investigating the disaster. The inquiry also sought these developments today.

(1) Moves within the committee to hear General George C. Marshall before the former Chief of Staff leaves for China as President Truman's special envoy.

(2) A brief flurry over a suggestion by Senator Brewster (R-Maine) that committee could be permitted to go through Grew's personal diary in search of items that perhaps should be studied.

Grew told of the destruction of the codes after Senator Ferguson (R-Mich.) asked him.

"Do you remember when you got word to destroy codes in the embassy at Tokyo?"

"We destroyed some of our codes a few days before Pearl Harbor," Grew replied. "We kept certain others until the last moment; we destroyed them after we had learned that war had begun."

Several members said they wanted to hear Gen. Marshall before his departure.

Chairman Barkley (D-Ky.) told reporters he thought "the committee would expect to hear him before he leaves."

(D-Ga.) assumed Gen. Marshall would be leaving soon and thought it was important to call the former Army Chief of Staff "right away."

Rep. Gearhart (R-Calif.) commented that he would be "inclined to insist upon hearing him before he leaves."

An Army board which investigated the surprise Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor Dec. 7, 1941, took special note of the way a final warning message from Marshall to Gen. Walter C. Short, Hawaii commander, in Hawaii, was handled.

The board said that while Marshall telephoned an alert to General Douglas MacArthur in the Philippines, he sent a similar message to Short by commercial cables. It was not delivered until three hours after the attack.

Former Secretary of State Hull was excused from testifying today because of cold, rainy weather.

At the hearing resumed, Joseph C. Grew, former ambassador to Tokyo, returned to the witness chair.

Rep. Murphy (D-Pa.) said today he plans to ask Cordell Hull specifically whether the former Secretary of State received information from any source Dec. 6 or 7, 1941, that the Japanese were planning the Pearl Harbor attack.

Murphy, a member of the Senate-House committee investigating the attack, told a reporter:

JAP GENERAL OWN WITNESS

Yamashita Declares He Was Subordinate Commander

Manila, Nov. 28.—(AP)—Bluff bullet-headed Lt. Gen. Tomoyuki Yamashita described himself today as a subordinate commander having somewhat of a bystander role in the defense of the Philippines and hence not accountable for the long list of Japanese atrocities detailed by the prosecution in his war crimes trial.

Testifying in his own defense before the U. S. military tribunal, Yamashita declared he always was under orders of Field Marshal Count Hsaiichi Terauchi, supreme Japanese commander of the Southwest Pacific, and never had control of the air force, marine transportation corps, naval men and 30,000 other Japanese troops in the Philippines.

Asked whether he ordered or knew of atrocities, Yamashita gestured with his large, muscular hands and replied through his interpreter: "No, absolutely not."

Further, Yamashita insisted, he had determined that Manila was defensible and had ordered his own troops to last December.

Yamashita contended it was Japanese navy troops that remained there, although he didn't know of it at the time, and that he himself never at any time even had his headquarters in the city.

While the general was testifying, the Philippine Supreme Court denied his counsel's contention that the military tribunal was illegal and that Philippine civil courts should take jurisdiction.

Yamashita said the first he knew of Manila was when he was mistreated and was upon receipt of Spain's protest forwarded via Tokyo on the killing of its nationals. The prosecution (Continued on Page Six)

CHINA'S ARMY ADMITS LOSS

Chinese Government Admits Loss Of Highway Center

Chungking, Nov. 28.—(AP)—The Chinese government admitted today the loss of the important Southern Hopei Province highway center of Feisang to besieging Communists.

But Nationalists, meanwhile reportedly began long-delayed landings at the captured Manchurian seaport of Huludao.

Feisang, described by the Nationalists as one of the insurgents' main objectives, fell after a three-month siege. The deputy commander of the town's garrison was killed in action. The highway center is east of the Peiping-Hankow railroad.

An unconfirmed dispatch in the Chungking Commercial Daily News said government forces had started landing at Huludao recently occupied by government troops after evacuation by Communist forces.

The report did not say whether U. S. transports were used. Huludao provides a strategically valuable landing site for troops to be used in the Nationalist drive on Changchun, capital of the province.

Communist attacks on Hanchuan, 30 miles north of the rail junction city of Tsuchow on the Peiping-Hankow railroad, were repelled. Nationalist dispatches said.

The World Daily News said today that a Chinese-Russian agreement had been reached on two points:

1. Nationalists may land airborne troops at Changchun and Mukden. Manchuria, and ground crews may proceed immediately to both points.

2. The Russian withdrawal from Manchuria will be completed by mid-January.

There was no indication what China might have promised in return.

An American military leader, Maj. Gen. Keller Rockey, commander of U. S. Marines in North China, was quoted by the Shanghai Central News correspondent as taking a grave view of the situation in North China.

Rockey said that the Marines are not contemplating any drastic measures against the Communists who daily are attacking the rail line between Peiping and Chinwan-tao, but American lives and property would continue to be protected. The railroad is the only supply line for 50,000 Marines in North China.

It would be hard to predict, Rockey said, when the Marines would withdraw, as it depended on completion of disarmament of the Japanese. The majority have been disarmed, but part have taken up arms.

Government Intervenes In Strike Situation

Government Intervenes Today In General Motors Wage Dispute Calling Meeting In Washington

The government takes a hand in settling the General Motors wage dispute at a meeting with CIO and Workers officials in Washington today, but company representatives won't be there.

Vice-President Walter P. Reuther and other top UAW-CIO officials were scheduled to confer with Edgar L. Warren, chief Labor Department conciliator, but GM President Charles E. Wilson said he couldn't leave Detroit "on account of the strike situation."

Last night 400 CIO pickets who for more than 15 hours had "imprisoned" 65 supervisory employees at a GM plant in Saginaw, Mich., disbanded after an appeal by the union's regional director. A dispute over paying the strikers their last week's wages caused the walkout.

The GM strike, which has idled 225,000 employees of the big automobile manufacturer.

Another CIO union came to the support of the auto workers for a 30 per cent wage increase when officials of the CIO Tool and Die Workers voted to assess their 30,000 members each \$5 a month for the GM strike fund. Local tool and die union authorities in 27 Detroit shop areas were given authority to stop work on materials for

BRITISH WARN INDONESIANS

Nationalist Forces Told To Evacuate North Area

Batavia, Java, Nov. 28.—(AP)—The Indonesian governor of West Java asked the British command today to halt military action at Bandung and was told the Nationalist forces must evacuate the residential area north of the East-West Railway Line by noon tomorrow.

In the midst of a tense situation in the summer capital, the Japanese governor approached British headquarters in Bandung under a white flag, an official British statement said.

Earlier, strong Allied patrols had been ordered out in Bandung about 75 miles southeast of Batavia, to disperse Indonesians who were gathering in the city in one area of which some 60,000 former civilian internees of the Japanese were crowded.

A British brigade commander told the Javanese governor that if the area north of the rail line was not evacuated by the fixed deadline, any Indonesians found there after noon tomorrow would be liable to be shot by British patrols. No civilians may approach within 200 yards of any British or Japanese post.

The governor replied, the British said, that he was unable to "assent or make proposals."

Sutan Sjahrir, premier of the unrecognized Indonesian Republic, planned to go into the interior of Java within a week with members of his cabinet, for conferences with local leaders in such trouble spots as Bandung.

Fighting in Ambarawa in Central Java has been reported intensifying, particularly in the area near the civilian internment center there. (Continued on Page Six)

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Hitler's One-Time Deputy, Rudolph Hess, Takes Advantage Of Lack Of Memory In War Trials

Nuernberg, Nov. 23.—(AP)—Rudolf Hess, Hitler's one-time deputy, was described by psychiatrists today as "not insane at the present time in the strict sense of the word" and the international military tribunal announced that arguments would be heard Friday on the Nazi leader's plea to escape the war crimes trial on grounds of amnesia.

The British psychiatrists' report revealed that Hess had tried to commit suicide on several occasions since his sensational and mysterious flight to Scotland in May, 1941.

Declaring that Hess was not insane, the psychiatrists conceded that his loss of memory would "interfere with his ability to make his defense." Hess went on trial on war crime charges last week with 19 other top Nazi leaders but has paid scant attention to proceedings, reading a novel much of the time and giggling occasionally.

Hess, the medical board reported, is suffering from "hysteria" and "in addition, there is conscious exaggeration of his loss of memory and a tendency to exploit to protect himself against examination." Three separate reports of examinations were filed, one by the British, one by the Russians and a third by American, French and Canadian doctors.

As today's session opened, the prosecution presented evidence from an American diplomat that the Nazis schemed for their earliest days of power to absorb Austria.

The charge that Reichsmarshal Hermann Goering and others of the 20 top Nazi leaders on trial openly spoke of annexing Austria to the Reich was made in affidavit by George S. Messersmith, former U. S. minister to Austria and now ambassador to Mexico.

Hitler's lightning invasion of Austria in March, 1938, represented the "flowering of the fifth column," declared Assistant U. S. Prosecutor Sidney S. Alderman, who declared (Continued on page Two)

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President Truman Today Called Highly Praised Wartime Lt. Gen. Marshall To Take Over Post In China Relinquished By Hurley

Washington, Nov. 28.—(AP)—President Truman today called on his most lavishly praised wartime lieutenant general of the army, George C. Marshall, to step into the World's No. 1 postwar trouble spot—China.

Amid signs of increasing American concern over the civil war in that country, Mr. Truman quickly followed Maj. Gen. Patrick J. Hurley's spectacular resignation as ambassador yesterday by calling Marshall from his week-old retirement.

The former army chief of staff will become special envoy to China as a temporary replacement to Hurley, who caught both the President and Secretary of State Byrnes by surprise with his 1,500-word statement that he was quitting.

By selecting a five-star general to succeed one with two stars, rather than choosing a civilian diplomat, Mr. Truman appeared to be emphasizing again the viewpoint that the present top job in China remains the disarming of Japanese troops.

Both the war and state departments have said repeatedly in recent weeks that U. S. troops are in Northern China only to facilitate the surrender of Japanese forces, not as instruments of American foreign policy.

However, American policy toward China had been under critical review before Hurley's resignation because of the danger U. S. troops might become actively involved in the fight between Chinese government and Chinese Communist armies.

In connection with that review, it appeared likely that before Marshall's departure from Washington, Mr. Truman would have fresh information on the Chinese situation from two sources.

Undersecretary of the Navy Artemus Gates is due in Washington momentarily from the Far East. He told reporters at Pearl Harbor on Monday that he would "make specific recommendations which may affect United States policy in China."

Edwin A. Locke, personal representative of the President, also is en route by plane from Chungking after touring China for the last two months on an economic mission.

The President—who has acclaimed Marshall as the greatest military figure the world has ever known—called the general at his Leesburg, Va., home to ask him to take on the chore.

The former chief of staff served several tours of duty in China and attended several Anglo-American-Chinese conferences during the war.

Hurley, meanwhile, scheduled an on-the-record luncheon talk before members of the National Press Club.

At the same time, Byrnes' weekly news conference most assuredly had an opportunity to reply to Hurley's contentions yesterday that American career diplomats had sided with both the Chinese Communists and an "imperialist bloc" to (Continued on page six)

An Analysis Of The News

London, Nov. 28.—England's new Socialist government naturally is being viewed in varying lights, but one finds the opinion widely expressed even among Conservatives that the big Labor majority in the House of Commons is an extremely bright and active body of men and women.

Indeed, I heard it characterized by a conservative parliamentary expert of great experience as the best-informed House ever elected.

I asked Mrs. Mac what her outstanding impression was and she laughingly replied that she was overwhelmed with the Scotch accent. Well, it must be admitted that it was pretty thick, for there are a lot of Scots in the House and we struck a period of questions about Scottish affairs.

Thus far the Conservative opposition, of which former Prime Minister Churchill is leader, has had little to say. Yesterday they sat largely in silence, regarding the Laborites with the tolerant disdain which a Mastiff might direct towards a Mexican hairless pup.

Whether this attitude has been an exhibition of tolerance or of impotence remains to be seen. Having watched the great Churchill in action in Commons for many years at close range, I can hardly believe he won't stage an offensive in due course. There are reports that the Conservatives

are getting set for an attack. In any event, the Socialists (or Laborites, if you wish—they themselves use both designations) are on trial in a big way before not only their Conservative opponents but the entire country. Here it is important to note that the Socialists received a very large vote (especially middle-class) from other political parties, including the Conservatives.

It is significant that the elections for individual vacancies in Commons they call them by-elections have continued to return Laborites. The same has been true of many municipal elections. This means that the result of the general election wasn't a matter of snap judgment, but that the country is determined to find out whether the Labor party program can bring better days to England.

All youth is promising; old age

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WASHINGTON DAYBOOK

Washington—Trying to unfurl the
celebration muddle is like trying
to play jack-straws in the dark.

As this is being written, the Army
is preparing what one press rela-
tions officer laughingly called "an
essay" on the subject. Although it
will do some explaining, there was
no advance indication that it will
ease the legitimate gripes of many
high-point lads who are living in
muddy-floored tents on the cold
mud flats around Le Havre or
toddling their thumbs and their
minds on Okinawa.

The truth of the matter is that
responsibility rests with the joint
chiefs of staff and if those harried
souls didn't try very hard at first,
they are trying now.

The pressure on them from Con-
gress to speed up the return of the
men overseas is tremendous. In
turn the pressure on Congress is
terrific.

A little better than typical is a
letter and petition received by Rep.
Clare Boothe Luce. It is signed by
61 men in the Headquarters Bat-
tery, 776th AAA Automatic Weapons
Battalion.

They have an average of more
than 80 points and the lowest one
has 71. They've been overseas nearly
two years and now are stuck in
Germany. The battery's predicament
is complicated by the fact that
its personnel is considered neither
a part of the Army nor the Air
Force. Why isn't explained. But
apparently it's an orphan unit with
nobody to look out for it in spite
of its amazing high-point average.
"That letter (and petition)," says
Mrs. Luce, "is only one of literally
hundreds which have come to my
office. All are instantly referred to
the War Department with an
urgent request that the department
act as fast as possible to cut all
red tape and release shipping for
high point men who are awaiting
embarkation."

Some members of Congress seem
determined to do something more
about it than pass their letters
along to the War Department.
There hasn't been a day in weeks
when Congress was in session that
one or more speeches haven't been
made about it—particularly in the
House, for it is the Representatives
(being closer to their constituents)
who get the bulk of the personal
appeals.

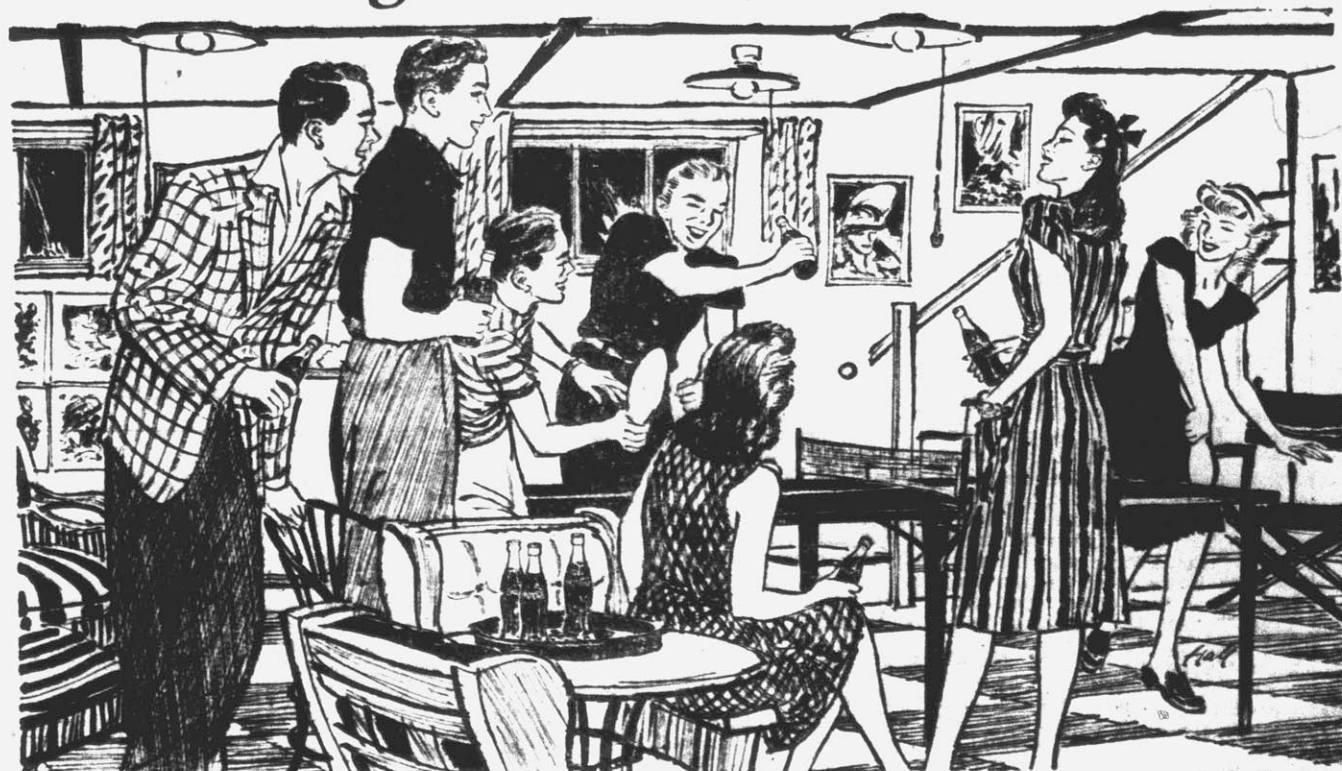

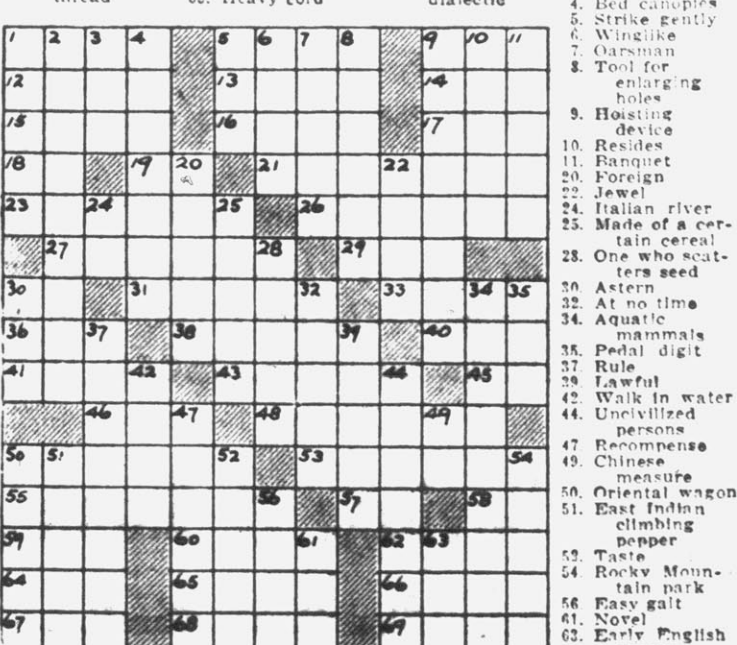

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OPINIONS BY ATTY GENERAL

Rulings on Taxicabs, Court Fines And Other Issues

Raleigh, Oct. 26.—AP.—"The taxicab license or permit issued by one municipal corporation does not authorize the holder of such license or permit to operate in another municipality without first securing a permit there," Attorney General Harry McMillan said today in a digest of opinions.

Further, the attorney general said, "A municipal taxicab license or permit grants a privilege which is limited to the municipality granting it."

Other opinions: "Municipal corporations in North Carolina are not authorized to grant exclusive franchises for the operation of taxicabs within the corporate limits."

"In all criminal cases in the superior court, the clerk of the court is required to collect the solicitor's fees specified by statute and pay them to the school funds of the county."

The two exceptions to this rule are that the counties are not required to pay any solicitor's fees and that no such fees should be taxed where the defendants are assigned to work on the public roads or on county property.

"The individual members of a school board have no authority whatever over the teachers in the schools or the operation of the schools. Their authority is confined to the official acts of the board in its sessions and outside of this the individual board members have no official authority."

"The governing body of a county, city or town may, in its discretion, relieve any member of the armed forces of the United States of the payment of any interest or penalties on delinquent ad valorem tax for any taxable year during service in the armed forces up through the duration of World War Two."

In the absence of a public-local act to the contrary, there is no authority under our law for a municipality to contribute funds for the purpose either of building or operating a community canteen.

"In North Carolina a sheriff has authority to serve civil and criminal processes of the courts of this state although the service involves entering upon property of the United States government within the state, this being a right reserved by the state in ceding jurisdiction to the federal government."

"A new registration ordered for the purpose of holding a special bond election is intended to be used only in particular bond election for which the new registration is authorized and when it has served this purpose it should be discarded and the general registration books should be used in all subsequent primary and general elections in the county."

"When a corporation is required either by law or contract to purchase and retire its own bonds at a premium, for state income tax purposes the premium thus paid represents a deductible loss in the taxable year in which it was sustained."

Washington had any inkling behind the hand of the Japanese plans. Nobody yet has asked the question of Hull.

Murphy, whose turn it was to question Hull next, said he would ask only the single question. The former Secretary testified yesterday he was told of the actual attack in a telephone message from the late President Roosevelt only a few minutes before he was to meet the Japanese "peace" envoys at 1 p. m. Washington time, Dec. 7, 1941.

At that time, Hull said, the President had only an unverified report the attack had been made.
When Murphy is through, Senator Brewster (R-Me.) said he wants to ask Hull what he knows about a previous statement of Adm. J. O. Richardson, then commander in chief of the fleet, that Mr. Roosevelt told Richardson at a White House luncheon in October, 1940, that the United States might not fight if Japan attacked the Philippines.
