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Labor Remains In The Spotlight

Labor Spotlight Rests On Capitol Hill Today As Many Legislators Feel They Can Contribute To The Reduction Of Industrial Disputes

Washington, Dec. 3.—(AP)—President Truman today set up fact-finding boards to deal with the General Motors strike and threatened steel walkout, and asked Congress for permanent machinery to handle labor disputes in "important nationwide industries."

The President appealed publicly for 225,000 CIO-United Automobile Workers to return to their jobs in the big General Motors Corporation and urged the approximately 700,000 who might be involved in a steel strike to remain at work.

Truman acted in a special message, fast on the heels of the Labor-Management Conference which could not agree upon a fact-finding recommendation.

He proposed:
A law for setting up machinery for naming fact-finding boards to prevent work stoppages in important, nationwide labor disputes.

A ban on strikes or lockouts for at least 30 days—five after certification of a dispute by the secretary of labor, 20 for the fact-finding board to deliberate and five more.

The President cited such widespread industries as steel, automobile, aviation, mining, oil, utilities and communications, as those to which the act should apply.

This list, however, was not conclusive, although Mr. Truman said the legislation should not cover any small and local labor troubles. The President said he was appointing such a board on his own authority to deal with the General Motors-CIO-United Automobile Workers dispute.

While this board will not have the statutory powers which I hope the Congress will soon authorize, Mr. Truman said, "I am sure that the American people will expect the employer and the employees to cooperate with the board as fully as if appropriate legislation had already been passed."

"In the meantime, I am asking both parties to the dispute to display the same kind of patriotism as they displayed during the war. I am asking all the workers to return to work immediately, and I am asking the employers to proceed energetically with full production. I make this appeal on behalf of the American people to their fellow citizens who are now responsible for this major obstacle holding up our reconversion program."

"In connection with the threatened strike involving the U. S. Steel Corporation and the United Steel Workers, I am appointing a similar board. The public will expect full cooperation with the board by both sides. I am making the same appeal to the United Steel workers to remain at work pending the report of the board's findings and recommendations."

Mr. Truman's outline of the fact-finding legislation said it was "not applicable to small industries or to local disputes in large industries." He added:

CHINA TROOPS ROLL ONWARD

Chiang Kai-Shek Forces Moving Rapidly To North

Chungking, Dec. 3.—(AP)—The rich industrial city of Mukden in Manchuria lies only 30 miles ahead of advancing Nationalist spearheads, Chinese Central News Agency reported today.

As Chiang Kai-shek's forces rolled northward without reported opposition, Central News said the first government troops would be flown into Manchuria next week.

Today's report indicates an advance of 35 miles. The Nationalists had reached Tachuan, 65 miles from Mukden. Central News did not specify if Tachuan had been passed or the Communists had withdrawn.

Press dispatches stated negotiations are "proceeding satisfactorily" on a new Chinese-Russian agreement on Manchuria.

The Russians recently agreed to defer for a month withdrawal of Red troops from Manchuria, thus enabling Nationalist forces to take over.

The generalissimo's son, Chiang Chung-kuo, has departed for Changchun, Manchurian capital.

Reports of the Nationalist approach to Mukden followed a China Times assertion that troops of the free lance general, Chang Hsueh-shih, had entered the city. It was uncertain whether he favored the Nationalists or the Communists.

There were reports the long-delayed peace talks between Nationalists and Chinese Communists would be resumed December 10.

In Shanghai, Lt. Gen. George Stratemeyer, commanding United States air forces in China, announced headquarters of the 10th and 14th Air Forces are on a non-operational basis and were processing personnel for return home. Three squadrons and a troop carrier headquarters, containing low personnel and volunteers, are scheduled to remain in China.

The 14th AAF has been in China since July 2, 1942. It was activated by Maj. Gen. Claire L. Chennault as the China Air Task Force, built on veterans of the famed "Flying Tigers" of the American volunteer group which fought the Japanese before America entered the war.

Last Defender
Madrid, Dec. 3.—(AP)—Brig. Gen. Saturnino Martin Cerezo, 79, last defender of the Philippines against American forces in 1898, died Sunday. General Saturnino, disbelieving the surrender announcement continued resistance for a year after the end of the Spanish-American war. He finally surrendered with 34 men.

JAP SAYS HE WAS HELPLESS

Yamashita Declares One Group Had Power Of Life Or Death

Manila, Dec. 3.—(AP)—Lt. Gen. Tomoyuki Yamashita declared today that his war crimes trial today that one of his army groups had the power of life or death over prisoners and he was helpless to intervene.

The former Japanese commander in the Philippines made the startling statement when his counsel called him back to the stand to counter damaging testimony by the prosecution's rebuttal witnesses.

Yamashita said the 35th Army group operating east of Manila, where many atrocities for which the prosecution seeks to hold him responsible were committed, had authority to appoint courts martial and try prisoners of war and internees.

The army group was vested with this power at the time of its activation, the general testified, and he was without authority to take it away.

The prosecution in cross examination struck vigorously at some of Yamashita's previous testimony. After much wrangling it was agreed by both sides that some questions asked him in English had a different shade of meaning in Japanese.

Whereupon the military commission trying Yamashita ruled that henceforth the chief interpreter's decision would be final.

Throughout his stay on the stand, Yamashita denied considerable portions of the testimony of the prosecution's star rebuttal witness, who became lost in a maze of defense questions attacking his credibility.

Col. Hideo Nishihara, who had testified a nod from Yamashita sent 600 Filipino guerrillas off to the execution grounds, gave such confused answers that Maj. Gen. Russell B. Reynolds, president of the Mil-

Investigators Strive For Answer To Puzzle

Congressional Investigators Still Trying To Solve Mooted Question Of Pearl Harbor Warning

Washington, Dec. 3.—(AP)—Congressional investigators heard today that Lt. Gen. Walter C. Short's staff was informed before the Pearl Harbor attack that the Japanese consul in Honolulu was burning his important papers.

The question whether Short ever saw a navy message to Pearl Harbor telling of Japanese orders for code destruction by their consuls in Allied countries has been in dispute.

Maj. Gen. Sherman Miles, head of the army intelligence division in 1941, read to a Senate-House committee today an affidavit he said was obtained from Col. George F. Bicknell, then Hawaiian intelligence officer.

Bicknell said in the affidavit that on December 3, 1941, he learned from naval officers about the Japanese message to their consuls. Bicknell added that he had discussed this with and learned from Robert Shivers, FBI head in Honolulu, that the local consul was destroying his papers.

In the affidavit, Bicknell said he had reported this information at a staff meeting held for Short by Colonel Phillips, Short's chief of staff. The affidavit did not make it clear whether Short himself was in attendance.

Bicknell said in the affidavit that he told the staff meeting held on December 6, that "something was like by Japan is likely to happen soon."

Miles testified that the affidavit was obtained by Lt. Col. Henry C. Clausen, who Senators Ferguson (R-Mich.) and Brewster (R-Me.) recently told the Senate former Sec-

retary of War Stimson "sent around the world" getting statements from officials who previously had testified before inquiry boards.

Miles took the stand to correct what he said were some errors in his previous testimony after William D. Mitchell, committee counsel, announced that Gen. George C. Marshall, former army chief of staff, would testify before the committee beginning Thursday.

Mitchell said Gen. Leonard T. Gerow, chief of the war plans division of the War Department at the time of the Pearl Harbor attack, would follow Miles on the stand.

Miles said he had testified last week he did not know if the army had been informed of the note the Navy sent about Japanese burning their codes. He said he meant to say he did not know about it in 1941, but did know about it last week because he had read Bicknell's affidavit.

He also wanted it understood, Miles said, that there had been no "omission" in the intelligence division about the slowness of decoding and translating Japanese messages that had been intercepted.

The committee has been informed that several important messages intercepted before December 7, 1941, were not translated until much later.

"The astonishing thing," he said, was not that the translation of the messages was delayed but that we were able to do it at all."

Gerard Gessell, one of committee counsel, said information soon will be made available to the group about the time the messages were intercepted, by which monitoring (Continued on page four)

Navy Accuses McVay In Formal Charge

Navy Today Formally Charges Capt. Charles McVay With Negligence And Culpable Inefficiency

Washington, Dec. 3.—(AP)—The Navy formally accused Capt. Charles C. McVay III today of negligence and culpable inefficiency in the loss of the 10,000-ton cruiser Indianapolis in the closing days of the war.

The charges were prepared for the opening session of a general court martial convened at the Washington Navy Yard to try the 47-year-old son of a retired admiral.

Every man aboard the Indianapolis was a casualty when enemy aircraft sent her to the bottom of the Philippine Sea last July 30. Dead or missing totalled 880, the wounded 316.

Signed by Secretary of the Navy Forrestal, the charges made public for the first time is the seven-man military tribunal convened, accused McVay of:

1. "Through negligence suffering a vessel of the navy to be hazarded," and

2. "Culpable inefficiency in the performance of duty."

Under the first charge, the captain was accused specifically of neglecting to cause zigzag course to be steered "through an area in which enemy submarines might be encountered."

Under the second charge, he was accused of failing, after being informed that the ship was in a sinking condition, "to issue and see effected such timely orders as were necessary to cause said vessel to be abandoned, as it was his duty to do."

As a result, the specifications set forth, "many persons on board perished with the sinking of said vessel."

British Ask For Aviation Rates

London, Dec. 3.—(AP)—Britain's Ministry of Civil Aviation said today it was ready to approve any rate for transatlantic air travel which was jointly acceptable to all competing air lines and said the amount to be charged was not an issue.

A spokesman for the ministry said the British Government would agree to a 10 percent (four cents) for the trip if all operators thought that was economical and reasonable.

The spokesman said Britain desires an agreement on rates by all airlines and observed this was a matter affecting not only America and Britain, but also France and the Scandinavian countries which recently have inaugurated North Atlantic air service.

Secretary Of State Expects To Get This Week A First-Hand Report On Political Conditions In The Soviet - Controlled Balkans

Washington, Dec. 3.—(AP)—Secretary of State Byrnes is slated to receive a first-hand report this week on political conditions in the Soviet-controlled Balkan countries of Bulgaria and Romania.

There is no prospect, according to diplomatic information here, that the information he gets will bring any quick improvement in American-Russian relations.

The report will come from Mark E. Biddle, "Louisville, Ky., publisher whom Byrnes sent to the Balkans about six weeks ago to gather facts for a review of American policy of refusing to recognize the Romanian and Bulgarian governments.

Ethridge is returning by way of Rome, but in his preliminary dispatches to the State Department he has indicated clearly that his full report will support the non-recognition policy—based on the contention that the governments of Bucharest and Sofia are not truly representative of the people.

The Balkan situation thus moves back into the diplomatic spotlight at a time when events in Iran, another point of friction between Russia and the Western Allies, also appear to be getting more complicated.

A Moscow report last night said Russia has turned down the United States proposal of a week ago that Russia and Britain as well as this country withdraw all troops from the little middle eastern country by January 1.

While dispatches from Tehran said 2,000 American troops had arrived as replacements for men going home for discharge, State Department officials said it still is the intention of this country to get all its troops out of Iran by the first of the year.

Final refusal of the Russians to accede to the American suggestion would not bar other moves at finding a solution for the Iranian difficulties, but it would increase the generally expressed suspicion of "diplomatic authorities here that the Russians want conditions in Iran which they have the best chance to get by keeping their troops on hand."

One prevalent theory among American officials is that the Russians would like to get a government in Iran which was either Communist dominated or well within the orbit of Moscow's direct influence.

While the Balkans and Iran are causing trouble and there is considerable expectation that serious disputes also will develop very soon over Turkey and the Dardanelles, there actually are some bright spots in the picture.

One is the agreement by which Russian and American troops are being withdrawn completely from Czechoslovakia.

Another is the high degree of cooperation developed in Austria, in contrast with the confusion among the Allied rulers of Germany.

A third is the progress made in the picture.

MEDICAL PLAN IS PROPOSED

Formation Of Non-Profit Health Care System Suggested

Washington, Dec. 3.—(AP)—The Senate is engaged in long-winded debate on the United Nations Organization (UNO). Some of the main points may have become fuzzy to you. This is an explanation of them.

By joining UNO last summer, with Senate approval, we undertook to carry out the obligations of membership. Now Congress is looking out the details of how we are to fill our obligations.

The Senate is debating a bill which lays down the rules for our part in UNO. When the Senate finishes with it, the House has to approve it before it becomes a law. That will take more time, and more debate.

It seems pretty sure the bill will go through as written despite all the oratory.

In UNO there are several main agencies in which we'll take part: The General Assembly, the Security Council, the Social and Economic Council and the Trusteeship Council. We'll have one vote in each.

At this moment the Security Council is extremely important. Its job is to prevent war in one of two main ways:

1. By Economic Means. The council by shutting off commerce communications with an aggressor can try to discourage the aggression.

2. By using force. The UNO members promise to place a certain military force at the disposal of the Security Council when needed to keep peace.

This is what the present bill would do.

Security Council. The President will appoint our representative. The Senate must approve him. We'll receive \$20,000 a year in salary, be ranked as an ambassador, and will vote only as the President tells him.

The President also would appoint a deputy representative, paid \$12,000 a year and having the rank of minister, to sit on the council when the regular representative is ill or absent. The Senate must approve him, too.

The Social and Economic and Trusteeship Councils. They are separate councils. The former will deal with world economic problems. The latter will handle territory seized in this war.

We'll have a representative on each. Those representatives, get \$12,000 a year and are appointed by the President and approved by the Senate.

General Assembly. The President, without Senate approval, can appoint five representatives, designating one as senior representative. Although we may have five representatives at the assembly, we'll have only one vote.

French Assembly Considers Plans

Paris, Dec. 3.—(AP)—Nationalization of France's electrical industry was forecast today as the next goal of the constituent assembly which passed a sweeping financial reform program at a special session yesterday.

The assembly voted 521 to 35 to take over the shares and management of the Banque De France and four major deposit banks. It was a marked victory for Gen. De Gaulle, interim president, who appeared personally in the chamber of deputies to appeal to the legislature not to press for the nationalization of business or investment banks. He said inclusion of these banks would be harmful to the country's chances for reviving her export trade.

Now He's Sorry
Provo, Utah, Dec. 3.—(AP)—Stephen Bee, 89-year-old sportsman and businessman, went duck hunting on Utah Lake, but all he got was a ducking.

At nightfall, Bee headed his boat to shore when a high wind came up. He was wading ashore when he stepped into a deep hole and was drenched. The elderly sportsman swam in, made his way to a farm and slept in a haystack in a barn where the owner found him at dawn, after a near-freezing night.

Apparently none the worse for his experience, Bee said he was ashamed because he "didn't get any ducks."

Washington, Dec. 3.—(AP)—Congress heard a Democrat's contention today that the Republicans are trying to make political capital out of the future created when Major Gen. Patrick J. Hurley quit as ambassador to China.

Thus, the stage was set for another wordy week on Capitol Hill with Pearl Harbor, the United Nations and labor legislation providing plenty of subjects.

Rep. Sparkman of Alabama brand new in his job as Democratic whip in the House, raised the politics issue with a suggestion that the whole Hurley matter should be left to the Senate Foreign Relations Committee.

A quick Republican rejoinder came from Rep. Mundt of South Dakota, however. He said all his party wants is "the facts" and he doesn't want anything "hushed up."

An Analysis Of The News

London, Dec. 3.—Another monarch will have joined the swelling ranks of the royal unemployed if Albania's general election of yesterday bears out its promise, for the success of Premier Enver Hoxha's democratic front is generally taken to mean the exit of the colorful King Zog, who is now a refugee in England.

When the second World War began there were five kings ruling in the Balkan kingdoms—Greece, Yugoslavia, Bulgaria, Romania and Albania. Now there is only one of his throne—youthful King Mihai of Romania, who has stuck out his stubborn jaw and refused to be budged from his heritage. And one wonders how long Mihai will be able to bare his head to the Leftist storm which is sweeping his kingdom. Of course, the case of King George of Greece hasn't yet been definitely settled, but it will be an amazing thing if he is ever recalled from his exile in England.

It's some 21 years ago that young Ahmed Zogu, sword at side, rode out of the pages of a medieval story book of adventure and headed a revolt which ousted Bishop Nan S. Noli, who had been governing the country through a parliament of sorts. A couple of years later Parliament changed the constitution to permit Zogu to mount the throne as King Zog I, and he reigned along successfully until the exigencies of

the world wage drove him out. The United States will remember his visit in 1930 with his two attractive sisters.

Now Zog, George of Greece and Pete of Yugoslavia—who also has been ousted from his throne—have sanctuary here in England. As a matter of fact they have headquarters in the same hotel.

Your columnist ventures to suggest that the changes may be symptomatic of an awakening of the largely backward Balkans.

I've spent considerable time in that part of Europe, and my observation has been that most—not all—of the thrones were superimposed on a feudal system which has survived through the centuries.

This isn't necessarily a reproach to the king, excepting that he might have used his power to change an evil system of serfdom. The sins of the modern Balkan kings have been largely those of omission rather than commission.

Serfdom is a terrible thing. I've seen peasant girls in the Balkans doing heavy excavation work with shovels for 15 cents a day to enrich one of the landed gentry. Millions of men and women spend their entire lives as serfs.

So if the upsetting of the Balkan thrones means that the feudal system is on its way out, and that a real democracy may in due course be found, then there seems no cause for complaint.

The quartet is "telling it to the world" today—all about the game and its unending thrills; having choice seats and very close to Doc Blanchard's mother and making her acquaintance, while he was playing almost a "one-man football game" out on the gridiron. "It was a big thrill to be in the enormous crowd," Garrison said today. The Army and Navy bands and the maneuvers on the field by West Pointers and Annapolis Midshipmen was worth a thousand-mile trip, the quartet agreed today. The Greenville party drove to Washington D. C., and caught a special football train for Philadelphia. They returned here Sunday night.

New York, Dec. 3 —(AP)—The football season is finished except for the bowl festivals and east-west, north-south games, but the thousands of fans who saw Army's record-busting array in action probably will be talking about this peerless grid machine until another fall campaign rolls around.

Once a year the police commissioner of New York City publishes a list of persons who have disappeared. This list runs into the thousands. Some fancied wrong, some unhappiness, some deep-seated aversion to a certain member of the family circle keeps thousands of people from the happiness they ought to have. And this happiness they would have if they could only forget themselves and remember that nothing ever gives one such real joy as purposeful living in the place God happens to have put him.

The neighbor's field is not green; the bright lights are not bright; they are tawdry and artificial. The golden windows in the distance are not made of gold; they are simply reflecting the sunlight in which we are standing.

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WASHINGTON DAYBOOK

DAYBOOK
Washington — One of the major gripes of the men who now are out of the services is that they are being given the run-around on purchases of surplus property.

Congress in the Surplus Property Act of 1944, specifically declared that the Surplus Property Administration should do everything possible to aid veterans in establishing and maintaining their own small business, professional or agricultural enterprises by attaining their preferences in the acquisition of surplus property.

Nobody argues least of all Congress itself that Congress didn't have the right idea in mind. But there is a long leap between a law and its execution. As a result of this particular act, Surplus Property Administration, Secretary Symington, St. Louis, Emergency electrical company executives, has been catching it in one neck.

Understand this to start with, neither Symington himself nor his SPA is doing anything to do with actual surplus property sales. His is a policy board. That's why he is a policy board. That's why he has found it so hard to make surplus property sales available to veterans.

1. "Every Veteran A Dealer" is a complicated plan of the future, but one which would be essential to permit veterans dealer preferences on surplus goods disposed through wholesalers.

2. The establishment of Veterans stores all over the United States.

The Symington report leaves no doubt that the Administration would be happier if one or the other of these plans would be adopted.

The No. 2 plan apparently would be a post-war version of the Army and Navy Stores, catering only to veterans. But Symington himself points out that this would involve the expenditure of hundreds of millions of dollars.

At first the Department of Commerce was the disposal agency for consumers' goods, which form the bulk of things veterans want to buy. It had only 11 regional outlets in the whole United States. As Symington points out under this set-up a man in Bismarck, N. D., who wanted to buy a truck, might conceivably have to go all the way

to Atlanta, Ga., to get a look at what he was buying.

Reconstruction Finance Corporation, with 31 regional outlets, now has control over disposal of surplus goods. But, says Symington, we still are far short of any kind of surplus property distribution agency that can give veterans the service they are entitled to under that congressional declaration of intent.

The President without special congressional approval, can appoint economic sanctions against any aggressor when called upon to do so by the Security Council.

Also the President will be able to work out an agreement with the Security Council, and this is a very important provision. Congress approves of the size of the military force we promise to place at the disposal of the Security Council.

When the time comes for Congress to approve this agreement, undoubtedly there'll be a fight.

He recalled that the Lions' Club was instrumental in organizing the association for the blind, and that it now has several thousand members. Brown explained that the institution established here is supported by the State; that it has a staff of trained instructors for teaching the blind—white and Negro—to become self-supporting; and that the greatest dread of blind persons is enforced idleness. At the local center preference will be given to blind veterans and residents of Pitt county. Brown said 85 per cent of the blind in this State became so in adult life. There are now 28 students at the pre-conditioning center now and it is expected that 60 will be enrolled by January.

Brown introduced to the Kiwanians Miss Patty Frase of Akron, O., psychiatric counselor at the Pre-Conditioning Center for the Blind and she turned out to be the best and most popular speaker the Kiwanians had heard in a long time. Secretary David C. Moore, Jr., said, "She is a woman of charming personality, is highly trained for her work, and is in love with it. Her keen personal interest in the work being done for the blind to make them self-supporting enlisted profound interest among the Kiwanians in the pre-conditioning center. Dr. S. M. Crisp had charge of the program. W. J. (Dick) Bundy presided for Dr. J. M. Barrett, who was present the first time since he was taken ill some months ago. The Kiwanians gave President Barrett a warm reception. Master of Ceremonies Bunday, always optimistic always cheerful, made a hit when he said he knew it was going to be a good program when he saw it (Miss Patty Frase) come in the door. She is strikingly handsome.
