Senator Demands Answers In Hurley Investigation

Bridges Demands Reply To Questions Arising Out Of Senate Foreign Relations Committee Hearing On Resignation Of Maj. Gen. Hurley

By FRANCIS J. KELLY Washington, Dec. 6—(AP)—Senator Bridges (R-NH) demanded answers today to three questions arising out of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee hearing on Maj. Gen. Patrick J. Hurley's resignation as ambassador to China.

Bridges said the debarment diplomat's opening testimony yesterday convinced him that Hurley had been "sabotaged" by his subordinates at Chungking and in Washington. The New Englander added that while President Truman and Secretary of State Byrnes apparently had backed Hurley up privately, they had failed to do so publicly.

Bridges said he wants the answers to these questions: 1. "Why did the subordinates try to undermine his work?" 2. "Why are they still holding responsible posts in the diplomatic service?" 3. "Why did the President and the State Department refuse publicly to support General Hurley?"

Hurley was summoned back for further testimony today. Before the hearings end, Byrnes is expected to advise the committee. The State Department's side in the long-smouldering controversy which flared openly when Hurley resigned last week.

At one point yesterday, after Hurley had complained that Byrnes had declined to issue a public statement upholding his hand as envoy to China Chairman Connally (D-Tex.) contended "You just want something in the newspaper."

The white-mustached diplomat's face reddened as he shouted back "I resent that. It's not true! I don't want my government pussy-footing."

The gist of Hurley's complaint was that he had been sent over to China to keep the Chinese in the war and to attempt to restore harmony in the Chinese government, but that subordinates wanted to arm the Communists.

TRADE BODY IS ON ALERT

Chamber Of Commerce Wide Awake About City's Progress

By CHESTER WALSH

The Greenville Chamber of Commerce always on the alert for developing Greenville, is out there on the front lines, planning and working for the progress of the community. Executive Secretary William T. Kyzer's report of the trade body's activities during November indicates that the wide-awake organization is working for a bigger and better Greenville.

Recommendation to the board of directors included: (1) Retention of bus schedules permitting commuters from Grimesland, Falkland and Farmville to arrive in Greenville by 8:30 a. m.; (2) Accepting an increase of four cents in freight rates from Norfolk to Greenville in lieu of a minimum of 33 cents, a compromise offered by the carriers; (3) Cooperation with the State Utilities Commission to secure reductions in freight rates on coal; (4) Continuation of cooperation with the city and county in efforts to obtain full use of the County-City Airport and complete air franchise service; (5) Appointment of a committee to designate locations for Greenville road markers on State highway maps; (6) Requested the Tar River Port Commission to hold a joint meeting with the committee to consider plans for further development of water transportation; and (7) Presentation of a resolution urging that no further increases be granted in inter-state motor freight rates other than those granted at the September meeting.

The Chamber of Commerce Civic and Public Affairs Committee will work with the city administration to provide public toilets and adequate parking areas for vehicles. The chamber is solidly behind the Farm Bureau's membership campaign; it is planning some advertising for the city; making plans for an annual meeting early in 1946; the trade body was successful in having more sugar diverted to this section; it cooperated with the Greenville fire department in carrying on "Fire Prevention Week;" freed the public to buy tuberculosis Christmas seals; was active in studying plans for rural industries, and passed along the information that pre-fabricated steel warehouses 40 by 100 feet are now available for purchase. Full information about the warehouses may be obtained from Secretary Kyzer.

The Chamber of Commerce is looking after the interests of Greenville in an effective way concerning postwar activities.








