

KIMMEL TAKES STAND TODAY BEFORE BOARD

Kimmel's Statement Is In Direct Opposition To Much Of Admiral Stark's Testimony

Washington, Jan. 15.—(AP)—Rear Admiral Husband E. Kimmel, today contended Washington naval officials denied him information he said might have made Pearl Harbor an ambush for the Japanese.

In a 25,000-word statement submitted to the Senate House inquiry committee, the retired commanding officer of the fleet called "misleading" the "war warning" message sent to him by Admiral Harold R. Stark, then chief of naval operations, 10 days before the attack of Dec. 7, 1941.

Kimmel also contended:

1. He was not supplied information available in Washington from intercepted messages "which told when and where Japan would probably strike."

2. That, withholding this information, the Navy should have instructed him specifically to "be on the alert against a hostile overseas raid."

3. If he had had Washington's knowledge of intercepted Japanese messages, he would have considered revising war plans to provide "an opportunity to ambush the Japanese striking force as it ventured to Hawaii."

4. Orders he received the same day he got the Nov. 27 "war warning" message to transport Army planes and troops to Midway and Wake, "indicated to me that responsible authorities in Washington did not consider an air raid on Pearl Harbor either imminent or probable."

5. The War and Navy departments knew that long range reconnaissance from Oahu was to be flown "only when a carrier strike against the islands was probable within narrow time limits."

6. He would have ordered the fleet to sea if he had known what Washington knew on successive dates from Nov. 27 to Dec. 7, but without this information he kept his battleships in harbor where he thought them safer against air attack than at sea without carrier support.

Kimmel's testimony placed him in direct opposition to much of the committee heard from Admiral Stark, the last witness before it recessed January 5 until today. Stark said he considered the "war warning" message sufficient to alert the fleet to a war basis.

Batavian Head Hopes For UNO Mediation

Batavia, Jan. 15.—(AP)—Prime Minister Sutan A. Sjahrir of the unrecognized Indonesian Republic expressed hope today that Java's troubles, marked by new outbreaks of violence, would be settled by the United Nations Organization.

His declaration coincided with a Dutch announcement that Netherlands army and naval personnel had been landed at Kowal, on the south coast of Borneo, to investigate the reported arrival of Japanese nationalists.

A British announcement said a newly organized civil police force, consisting of 300 Indonesians, 300 Dutch and 20 Chinese, and attired in "American army type" uniforms, would take office in Batavia this week.

Madrid, Jan. 15.—This is a crucial moment in the frequently turbulent history of Spain, for the signs are that the question of restoration of the monarchy is coming to a head.

Now, that's no light matter, since the country is sharply divided politically, as the world learned from the bloody civil war of 1936-39. Things are quiet now, and have been for a considerable time, but so has Vesuvius.

This offers an ample explanation for the mystery which surrounds the reported negotiations between Don Juan, pretender to the throne, and Generalissimo Franco. Extreme caution is necessary.

As I pointed out yesterday, a fresh indication that the monarchists and Franco are maneuvering into position for a decision lies in the official admission that Don Juan and his wife are to meet her parents for a visit to neutral Portuguese soil. This, could be just a family affair, but the consensus here is that Don Juan's father-in-law, Don Carlos, is to act as an intermediary between the pretender and the generalissimo.

It stands out like a sore thumb that the Spanish government should confirm this to the foreign press representatives in Madrid. This idea is strengthened by the fact that the Spanish ambassador to Lisbon, Nicholas Franco, the generalissimo's brother, also confirmed Don Juan's

Wage Dispute Brings Out 200,000 Electrical Workers; Gov't Offers Additional Price Relief In Peace Bids

A strike of 200,000 CIO electrical workers got started today and the ranks of the nation's idle were added to the largest single one in effect since before the war.

Currently the largest work stoppage against an industry is against General Motors, involving 175,000 CIO United Auto Workers who struck last November 21 in support of demands for a 30 per cent wage increase.

Effects of the electrical workers' walkout, which involved a major part of the country's production of home and industrial electrical appliances, were not immediately determined. The strike came one day after the scheduled work stoppage by 800,000 CIO steelworkers, which has been delayed one week. Another major walkout, by some 328,000 packinghouse workers, is set for midnight tonight.

The walkout by the electrical workers, who had demanded wage increases of \$2 a day, was on schedule, said International headquarters of the CIO United Electrical Workers in New York City. Last minute efforts by federal conciliators to avert the strike were unsuccessful.

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EXPLOSION IN MINING SHAFT

Tremendous Blast In W. Va. Mine; More Than 200 Miners Saved

Washington, Jan. 15.—(AP)—A Bureau of Mines official said this afternoon he had been informed that "more than 200" miners had come out alive after an explosion in a mine near Welch, W. Va.

Seventy-five coal miners miraculously escaped alive today after a tremendous blast in the No. 9 Havaco mine on the outskirts of Welch, but the fate of 192 others was in doubt as rescuers drove into the smoke and dust-filled shaft workings.

COTTON PRICE CEILINGS MAY END THE CPA

Cotton State Senators Will Oppose Price Control If Ceiling Is Set On Cotton

Washington, Jan. 15.—(AP)—Cotton State senators, angry at CPA's notice of proposed price ceilings on the raw fiber, said today this may mean the end of the whole Office of Price Administration.

OPA is due to expire June 30—unless Congress votes its continuance.

"I told them," Senator Johnston (D-SC) related to reporters, "that I doubt very much that OPA will be in existence after June 30 if they put a price ceiling on cotton."

From deep South Louisiana, Senator Ellender (D-La) expressed a similar view, saying:

"Well, OPA expires June 30. The cotton crop is not gathered until August, so it doesn't matter very much."

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Doenitz Admits Sinking Athenia

Nuernberg, Germany, Jan. 15.—(AP)—An affidavit by Grand Adm. Karl Doenitz introduced before the International Military Tribunal today exploded the German myth that the British liner Athenia was sunk by the British themselves in 1939 in a plot to push the United States into the war.

Great Britain demanded the conviction of Doenitz, successor to Hitler as Fuehrer of Germany, as a "murderer" for U-boat attacks on helpless sailors in lifeboats and for ordering the ruthless shooting of commandos.

Col. H. M. J. Phillimore, a British prosecutor, told the tribunal trying Doenitz and 21 other top Nazis as war criminals that Doenitz was "no plain sailor" and was a key cog behind Nazi preparations for aggressive war.

The affidavit, signed by Doenitz on November 17, 1945, said the Athenia was sunk by the German submarine U-30 on the day Britain entered the war. On board were 1,000 passengers, some of them Americans. German propaganda at the time tried to lay the blame on Winston Churchill.

And Civilian Officials Disagree Over Policy For American-Conquered Japanese Islands; May Be Referred To Truman For Settlement

London, Jan. 15.—(AP)—Official sources disclosed today that American civilian and military officials at the United Nations General Assembly were split over whether American conquered Japanese islands should be placed under UNO sovereignty.

The delegates themselves were said to favor a trusteeship plan for the Pacific islands, while their special military advisor, Gen. George C. Kenney, argued that the U. S. should retain any islands of military value.

Delegates said that if Kenney held the disagreement could be considered as tantamount to an issue between the State and War departments and would have to be referred to President Truman for settlement.

Kenney, chief of the Pacific air staff, could not be reached immediately for comment.

Formation of trusteeship policies was one of the major tasks awaiting the assembly, which remained adjourned today until 4 p. m. (11 a. m. EST) to allow time for committee meetings. Under the trusteeship plan, one nation or a group of nations would administer territories placed under UNO control.

A call for quick action on the trusteeship question was expected to be made by British Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin on the floor of the assembly this week during the general policy debate.

There was some disagreement among the American delegation as to exactly how much control the U. S. would lose if it agreed to UNO sovereignty over the Pacific islands. Some sources said it was unlikely that the delegation would propose a trusteeship arrangement without stipulating that the U. S. alone should act as controlling agent for the UNO.

Jap Governors Face Review By Cabinet

New Home Minister Promises Early Compliance With MacArthur Directive

Tokyo, Jan. 15.—(AP)—Chuzo Mitsuuchi, newly appointed home minister, said today in his first press interview that he intended to change Japan's 47 prefectural governors "as early as possible."

The status of the governors was one of several basic problems before the reshuffled cabinet as Premier Kijuro Shidehara, recovered from his 20-day illness, attended its first full meeting today.

General MacArthur's Jan. 4 directives ordered a purge from the government of leading officials of local branches of Japan's wartime imperial rule assistance association and similar totalitarian parties. Prefectural governors served as chiefs of local branches of the IRAA.

The cabinet also confronted the problem of deciding the fate of literally hundreds of other government employees possibly embraced by the MacArthur directives. From all evidence, it will proceed with caution, retaining borderline officials unless the Supreme Allied Command specifically orders their removal.

In addition to food, transportation, coal and other pressing problems, Shidehara's interim government also faced this unfinished business.

Final preparations for a national election after March 15; completion of a plan to eliminate military pensions; completion of whatever social security program it intends to present to the Allied command for approval. (Continued on page four)

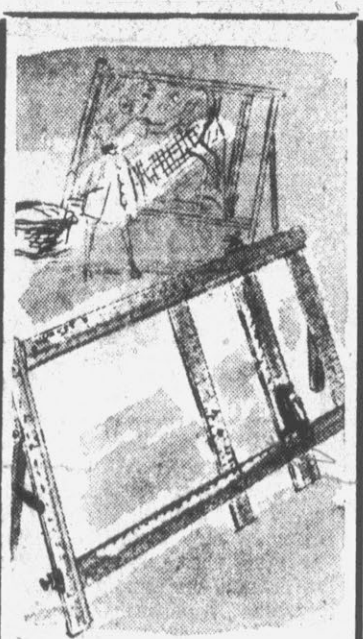
"Gold in the Streets," by Mary Vardoulakis. Story of the migration of a company of Greek peasants from the island of Crete to a Massachusetts mill town.

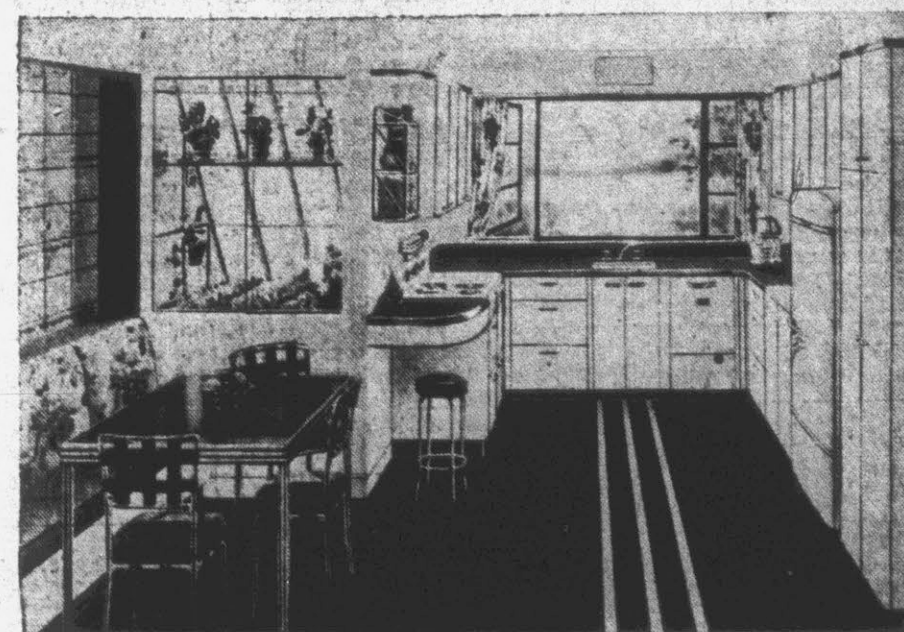

MAN-CENTERED OR GOD-CENTERED?

There have been generations
which were God-centered in their
thinking—others pleasure-centered,
others thought-centered.

The thirteenth through the six-
teenth centuries were God-centered.
Religion was the interest which
laid hold on men's minds with
mighty grasp. In the days of the
Greek philosophers, men were
thought-centered. The decadent
Roman Empire saw generation after
generation roll away in a tur-
bulent stream of sensuality and
pleasure mania.

We live in an age which is man-
centered. For more than 250 years
the emphasis has been on man.
Philosophers in the eighteenth cen-
tury emphasized the importance and
possibilities of men, and out of this
emphasis grew democratic forms of
government. Science for the last
150 years has been revealing the
power of man to control his en-
vironment. Yet we may well ask
ourselves whether or not this sort
of thing is proving of great value.

The nineteenth century and the
twentieth so far have been periods
of unprecedented strife. Does the
emphasis on man lead us to such
blood-letting as we have experienced
during the last generation?

It does if the emphasis on man is
not counterbalanced by an empha-
sis on the power and purpose of
God. When man gets to the place
where he thinks he is fully capable
of managing his own destiny, he
finds that there are others who,
without conscience, are willing to
assume the responsibility for man-
aging him. Thus arises tyranny,
and out of tyranny comes war, and
out of war, disillusionment.

One reason homeless veterans
didn't get in on the first sale of
5,000 quonset huts declared surplus
by the Navy was that about half of
them went to the Veterans Adminis-
tration for use at overcrowded hos-
pital centers. The rest went mostly
to government agencies.

Surplus property agencies have
received numerous letters and calls
from housing desperate veterans
seeking to buy the huts for conver-
sion to "homaja" houses. "Homaja"
houses (named by taking the first
two letters of each of the names of
Admirals Horne, Moreel and Jac-
cobs) were a wartime necessity in-
vention of the Bureau of Yards and
Docks. Quonsets were partitioned
and each half converted to a dwell-
ing with two tiny bedrooms, a small
washroom and a big living room
with a kitchen at one end.

Whether veterans can get in on
the next batch of surplus quonsets
still is undetermined. The huts
will go at somewhere around \$1,200
each before reconversion.

Best guess of the Department of

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CHINESE REDS TO COMPLAIN

Communists Will Bring Pact-Viola- tions To General Marshall

By SPENCER MOOSA

Chungking, Jan. 15.—(AP)—Chou
En-Lai, No. 2 Chinese Communist,
today sought a meeting with Gen-
eral Marshall. He was reported to
be ready to complain against al-
leged government violations of the
recent civil strife truce agreement.

Chou's move followed a Commu-
nist charge that on Monday govern-
ment forces "ferociously attacked"
Kwangshan, Communist-held high-
way center in Southeastern Honan
Province. A government spokesman
denied the charge and reported that
federal forces everywhere had halt-
ed military operations at the Sun-
day midnight deadline. "Except
where they were forced to fight in
self-defense."

A few hours earlier, the Commu-
nist Party demanded reorganization
of national and provincial govern-
ments and nationalization of the
armed forces in a sweeping program
submitted to the political consulta-
tion conferences through Tung Pi-
Wu, its elder statesman.

The main proposals were:

1. That Kuomintang (Chiang
shek's Nationalist) Party mem-
bership in the projected reorgan-
ized state council should be limited
to one-third the number of seats.

2. That coalition governments
representing all parties, should
be established in different provin-
ces.

3. That the National Military
Council and its subordinate bu-
reaux should be reorganized to en-
able participation of all parties,
with a view to achieving unifica-
tion of military command and national-
ization of the armed forces.

tempt to settle the wage dispute.

There were reports from Wash-

reportedly had offered additional
price relief as a basis for ending the
controversy. The CIO Union's origi-
nal demands were for a 25 cents
an hour wage hike, but it reduced
that to 17-1/2 cents. The industry
has offered 7-1/2 cents, but the add-

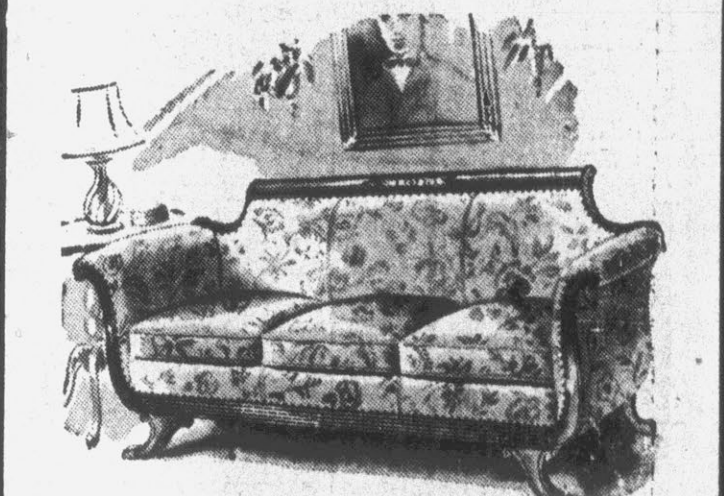
