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BIG NATIONS PUSHING FOR UNO WIND UP

British, Russian And American Delegates Hope For Early Dismissal

London, Jan. 26.—(AP)—Big power leaders of the United Nations were reported today to be trying to wind up the London session of the general assembly in 10 days and move the new security organization to a site in the United States as soon as possible.

This probably means that the security council would have to carry some of its pressing political problems to America, depending on whether and to what extent it decides to investigate disputes involving Iran, Greece and Indonesia.

New confidence in the ability of the United Nations to keep peace developed among general assembly delegates as the result of the security council's decision to consider promptly the Greek, Indonesian and Iranian disputes.

Representatives of both large and small nations said the council by voting to discuss the disputes—involving two of the five permanent members of the 11-nation agency, Great Britain and Russia—had shown a capacity for coming to grips with pressing world problems.

None would be quoted directly, but many expressed satisfaction with what they termed the "easy" atmosphere of the council's first "issue meeting" in the face of the delicate diplomatic controversies at hand.

With the three cases set for council consideration Monday, the general assembly met to receive communications, and committees concerned with organizational work arranged to meet this afternoon.

The Greek delegation announced, meanwhile, that it had been instructed by its government to be present when the council takes up Russia's charge that British military actions in Greece endangered world peace.

An advisor said the delegation expected further instructions from Athens on the exact line to take in the discussions. Greek Premier Themistokles Sophoulis already has stated that British troops are in Greece with the full consent of the Greek government.

Iran and the Ukraine, invited along with Greece to attend the council meeting as nations concerned in the disputes, also were expected to be represented at Monday's meeting.

MacArthur Lauds 6th Army's Gen.

Tokyo, Jan. 26.—(AP)—General MacArthur today decorated Gen. Walter Krueger, retiring commander of the Sixth Army, with the Distinguished Service Cross and an Oak Leaf Cluster to his Distinguished Service Medal.

It was MacArthur's 66th birthday and Krueger's 65th.

MacArthur recalled that they had been comrades in arms many years and said:

"No army in military history ever had a greater leader than General Krueger and no army had a record of accomplishment greater than that of the Sixth Army."

The Sixth Army led the long drive from Australia to the Philippines and is being inactivated today at Kyoto.

Marshall Accused

Washington, Jan. 26.—(AP)—Sen. Walter C. Short, to-named General George C. Marshall, L. T. Gerow and Sherman Miles as individual members of the general staff he said tried to shift to him the blame for the Pearl Harbor disaster.

They were the ones, the witness said, who should have sent him information that he did not get and which he contended would have caused him to place in effect an all-out alert that might have caused the Japanese task force to turn back.

Memory Of Greenville Pilot To Be Honored

In a special service of memorial the members of the Immanuel Baptist Church will honor the memory of Captain C. Wayland Tucker, Sunday, January 27, at 11:00 a. m.

A feature of the service will include remarks by Supt. June Rose of the Greenville city schools who knew Mr. Tucker as a teacher and friend. Special music has been prepared by the choir, and the pastor will make appropriate comments.

Mr. Tucker was the son of Mr. and Mrs. E. F. Tucker of this city. In September 1942, he was married to Miss Gay Dupree of this city, and was the father of one daughter, Miss Judy Tucker.

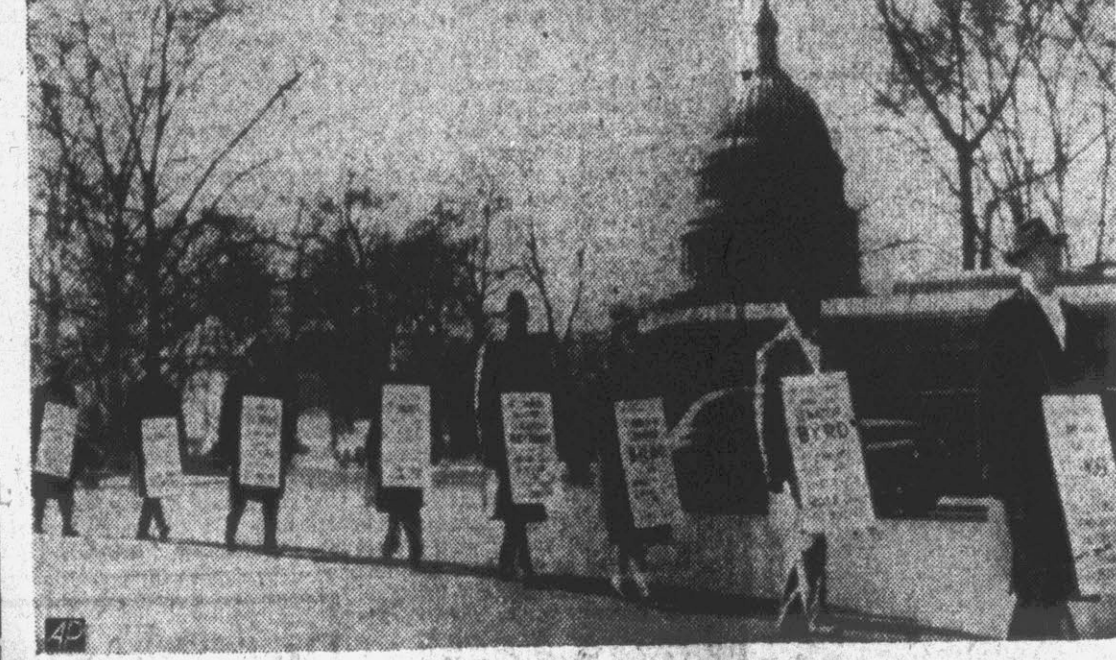
He was educated in the city schools of Greenville, and attended East Carolina Teachers College before entering the service in December, 1940 as a private in the Army. In January 1942 he entered flight school and was graduated as a flying sergeant. He received several promotions and held the commission of captain at the time of his death.

Capt. Tucker was killed in the crash of his cargo plane on July 28, 1945 near the base in the Assam Valley, India, upon a return flight from China. He had completed 38 trips ferrying supplies over "the hump."

Mr. Tucker had been a member of the Immanuel Baptist Church since his baptism on March 31, 1935. He was one of two members of this church to make the supreme sacrifice. He is now buried in a U. S. government cemetery near his base in India.

Surviving are his wife and daughter, his parents, and several brothers who also served in the armed forces during the war.

HEAVY FIRE LOSS 1945

Damage Was Largest Since 1932, Chief Gardner Reports

Losses from fires during 1945 totaled \$134,867.66, the heaviest annual fire loss since 1932, when the fire loss was \$236,555, according to the report of Fire Chief George Gardner, made to the Board of Aldermen recently. The fire loss in 1944 was only \$28,781.45.

The three most disastrous fires last year were the Atlantic Coast Line Railroad depot, New Deal Cleaners and Sunshine Cleaners plants, which was \$109,250, leaving \$25,617.66 for other fires during the year.

The value of buildings damaged by fire last year was \$414,950; insurance carried, \$314,150—damage, \$40,848.43. Value of contents, \$659,150; insurance carried, \$292,550—damage, \$84,019.23. Total value of buildings and contents damaged, \$1,074,100; insurance carried, \$606,702—total damage, \$194,867.66.

Last year the fire department answered 150 calls. There were 75 alarms from boxes, 74 telephone calls, 16 false alarms, 7 calls from out of town, and 43 grass lots burned off by the department.

Fire insurance rates in Greenville were reduced several years ago when new fire fighting equipment was purchased. The fire department is splendidly equipped and efficiently manned, but business men here say that there should be more paid firemen. The volunteer firemen have proved their faithfulness and efficiency time and again, Mayor Jack Boyd said.

Jap Fisheries In Expansion Moves

Tokyo, Jan. 26.—(AP)—General MacArthur's headquarters charged Japanese government and fishery officials today with a systematic campaign to break out of fishing areas assigned Japan since surrender and to regain gradually a semblance of their former dominant fishing empire.

Lt. Col. Hubert G. Schenck, chief of MacArthur's natural resources section, revealed that within the four and a half months since the surrender the Japanese have submitted six requests for revision of fishing areas. Four were denied.

"While the Japanese plead for extensions in order to increase their home food supply of sea products," Schenck said, "some of the requests are so far from the home islands there can be no question that their produce would be used on the world market."

Schenck's report showed that prior to the war, home and overseas fisheries production amounted to five to six million metric tons annually.

British Brides And Babes Sail For U. S.

Southampton, England, Jan. 26.—(AP)—British brides of U. S. service men, helped by white-helmeted military police lugging babies and baggage, trooped today aboard the liner Argentina to begin the long voyage to homes and husbands in America on tonight's tide.

Tired from five days of grappling with their youngsters and filling through customs and immigration lines at the Tidworth processing camp, the women were relieved at the sight of neat staterooms and ranks of baby playpens.

Paper Drive

Everyone Gets Blamed For Industrial Tie-Up

"It Isn't Our Fault," Say Labor Heads, Management Leaders, Democrats, Republicans, And General Public

Washington, Jan. 26.—(AP)—The Republican party, General Motors and striking CIO autoworkers all were charged today with contributing to the troubled labor situation.

Rep. McCormack of Massachusetts, House Democratic leader, claimed the GOP was backing "big business" in a campaign to "break the unions."

Senator Morse (R-Ore) said the GM strike looked to him as if both sides "simply want to slug it out" without any interference from Congress.

The Senate Labor Committee, of which Morse is a member, sought further information on the General Motors deadlock by calling Walter Reuther, youthful boss of the auto workers who walked out nine weeks ago.

McCormack made his attack on the Republican party in a radio address last night, asserting that the people "can already identify the forces that have brought the wheels of industry to a stop."

"Yes, the Republican party has long ago given the nod to big business, has long ago said: 'Go ahead and break the unions as you broke them after World War I. Crush them, fell them and let the consequences descend upon America where they may.'"

Morse used the "slug-it-out" summary in giving a reporter his appraisal of the GM strike situation. He based it on the lengthy testimony given the Labor Committee yesterday by C. E. Wilson, president of General Motors, and R. J. Thomas, president of UAW-CIO. He testified on the proposed fact-finding bill.

"Apparently both sides in this strike are opposed to any labor legislation in Congress," Morse said.

Both witnesses ran into trouble when they told the committee they thought this is no time for Congress to act.

Babson Discusses 'Little Investors'

New York City, January 25.—For the first time in some years I find that the "big boys" of New York are bearish. They believe that stocks are too high and that the market has gone up too fast. This especially applies to those conservative bankers and brokers who are responsible for the funds of colleges, hospitals, trusts and large estates. They are mostly out of stocks and are very long of government bonds.

Will The "Big Boys" Be Fooled? I also learn that many men have even sold stocks in their own companies believing that the prices are too high. They assume that the new purchasers of these stocks are speculators who will throw these stocks overboard when the next crash comes. The big boys then hope to buy these same stocks back again at 20 cents on the dollar as they have in the past. Now, will they be able to do so? Well, this question is the subject of my this week's column.

Stock market conditions are certainly very different today than in 1929. The people have much more money; there are fewer securities to buy; banks are paying almost no interest on deposits; bonds yield very little; and the S.E.C. is giving small investors real protection. As a result, most people are no longer buying stocks on margin or borrowing money; but are paying for their shares outright and putting them in safe deposit boxes.

1946 Investors Unlike Those of 1929 Experience shows that when stocks get into safe deposit boxes it is hard to get them out. So long as stocks pay a dividend investors quickly forget prices paid or even fail to look at current prices. Even some of the big investment trusts consider this.

Instead of yelling "Help the small businessman," if each of these little fellows would buy a few shares of stock in the big companies, they could easily control these companies which they now fear. Well, think this over also! Some day a powerful leader may arise who will get all these small investors together and throw out some of the present managements. They would need no legislation to do this. It is rumored that John L. Lewis has been pondering over this opportunity. One thing is certain. Before you or I sell stocks just because they are "high," we should carefully consider what we will do with our money when we do sell. Also, we should remember that it is purchasing power which we really want. Hence, idle bank accounts do not look too good. Let "little investors" consider this.

OPA WARNS ABOUT PRICES

Kittrell And Others Urge Support Of Price Ceilings

A large crowd, representative of the retail and other business of the community, attended an OPA meeting at the courthouse last night, called by J. B. Kittrell, head of the local Office of Price Control.

The meeting was held to emphasize the importance of adhering to the OPA price ceilings to avoid inflation. It was pointed out that checkups revealed numerous and Kittrell said orders have gone out from Washington and Raleigh to report all dealers who hereafter violate the ceiling price law. Regular checkups will be made and violators will be city to appear before district boards and they may be fined by a board and penalized with three times the overcharge price.

If this fails, then violators will be cited to appear in Federal Court and that will be too bad. Kittrell said he believes the average dealer is really trying to comply with the ceiling price law, but there have been so many violations that state and federal OPA officials have become alarmed.

S. B. Underwood, Jr., chairman of the local Price Control Board, Panel, spoke briefly and explained why it is necessary to hold price ceilings at legal levels and how sharp are the teeth of the ceiling law. J. L. Kilgo of Greenville and Thelbert Worthington of Winterville gave valuable information and advice.

Roy Martin paid tribute to the fine work Kittrell is doing and he praised merchants and other businessmen for cooperation. He stressed the need for enforcing the price ceiling law to avoid inflation.

It was announced that from time to time there will be group meetings of different businesses, with an OPA official from Raleigh here to confer with them.

It now appears that it is up to Mr. and Mrs. John G. Public to report violators of the price ceiling law, if they want to avoid the disaster of inflation.

Italian Anticipates Drafting Of Treaty

Rome, Jan. 26.—(AP)—Vice Premier Pietro Nenni, who has just returned from London conferences with British leaders, expressed the belief today that the final drafting of a peace treaty between Italy and the Allies would begin within a few days.

He was quoted in a Milan dispatch as saying that the Italian people would have every opportunity to be heard during the negotiations, but that "naturally, we must prepare ourselves for sacrifices."

Gen. Arnold Resting In Army's Hospital

Miami, Fla., Jan. 26.—(AP)—Gen. H. H. Arnold, Army Air Forces chief, became "very tired" under the pressure of South American hospitality but is now resting comfortably at the Army's Biltmore Hospital, it was disclosed today.

The round of social activities on Arnold's recent South American tour, which was disrupted at Lima, Peru, tapped the general's strength, and will compel him to take it easy for a time, an aide said.

Gen. Arnold is up and around, however, and yesterday visited Hialeah Race track. He will remain at the hospital for several days before returning to Washington. He is scheduled to retire from active duty in February.

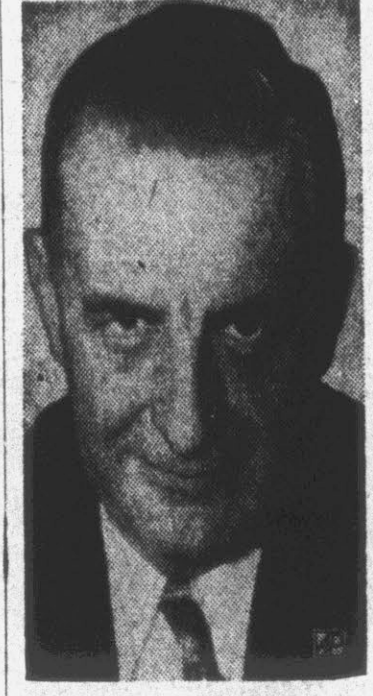
Attend one or more of these dances, in memory of the late Franklin D. Roosevelt or in memory of the past North Carolina polio epidemic. "Dance so they can walk."

A. F. L. HAILS JOHN L. LEWIS

Return Of The Prodigal Strengthens Murray's Union

Miami, Fla., Jan. 26.—(AP)—Return of John L. Lewis to the American Federation of Labor was regarded by AFL leaders today as good for them, but bad for the CIO.

Lewis left the AFL 10 years ago in the row over his formation of the Committee for Industrial Organization. In 1942, he quit the CIO, and yesterday he completed the circuit by taking his United Mine Workers back to the parent federation. He paid dues for 600,000 members.

The man with the bristling brows who came up from the Iowa coal pits was welcomed back to the federation at the mid-winter session of the executive council yesterday. He was given the vacancy on the 15-man council and was appointed 13th vice president.

One of the AFL's most influential leaders who was not always a friend of the miners' boss, said his return to the federation probably "is going to be a big help."

Twelve Hundred RAF Personnel On Strike

Calcutta, Jan. 26.—(AP)—Twelve hundred non-commissioned RAF personnel struck today at Lumbard, 12 miles from Calcutta, in the fifth "We-want-to-go-home" demonstration by British airmen this week.

A similar work stoppage entered its third day at the Katunayake airport of Colombo, Ceylon, in defiance of an RAF headquarters announcement that such demonstrations "would not be tolerated in any circumstances."

An Analysis Of The News

(This is the third of three columns on Generalissimo Francisco Franco by DeWitt MacKenzie, to whom the chief of the Spanish state has just given an interview.)

Madrid, Jan. 26.—Generalissimo Franco is quick to combat any suggestion that his government is backward in political reform, as I found during my interview with him in the palace where he resides at El Pardo, near Madrid.

I found the term "backward" relative. Progress which would seem slow in one country might be regarded as good going in another. Apropos of this matter of speed, I had asked Franco if he was headed for absolute democracy, that is, rule by the people, and he had replied:

"Yes. But we must proceed slowly—step by step—until the people are properly prepared."

I introduced the question by saying the impression abroad, right or wrong, is that very little has been done towards political reform in Spain—a purposely blunt approach to the subject. I suggested that it would be very useful if the generalissimo could clear up this matter.

"With 'much pleasure,' he replied.

No Immediate Relief Foreseen In Shortage Of Fresh Meat Supplies; Normal Operation Of Plants Hampered By Refusal Of CIO Workers To Return To Work

Chicago, Jan. 26.—(AP)—The CIO United Packinghouse Workers leadership is ordering 193,600 striking members to return to work Monday but is not calling off the strike in the meat industry, a union official who declined use of his name revealed today.

Without formal ceremony, the government at 12:01 a. m. today seized most of the 134 plants which had been strikebound for 10 days. But refusal of CIO workers to return to work in the federally-operated plants left the government short of necessary manpower to insure normal operation.

As the agents designated by the government posted President Truman's seizure order, the Agriculture Department had a promise that 55,000 AFL union strikers would go back to their jobs. AFL union officials have declared a temporary truce in the walkout, which started January 16 following a breakdown in wage negotiations between the unions and packers.

The government seizure was a token action, and picketing by CIO strikers in many plants continued early today.

Earlier, reports from CIO officials at many of the plants now under federal management, indicated the CIO employees were not returning to work, obeying instructions of international union leaders who refused to heed Mr. Truman's seizure order.

The government's next step in getting the CIO strikers back to the plants operated by 19 companies, including the five major firms, was not disclosed.

In Washington, Secretary of Agriculture Anderson said last night he had telegraphed Lewis J. Clark, president of the CIO United Packinghouse Workers, he favored putting into effect any wage increases a fact-finding pany, now holding hearings in Chicago, might recommend.

Clark said he had received Anderson's telegram. However, he added: "Only our membership can decide when they will go back to work and under what conditions they will work."

The officials said the union earlier had been assured by government authorities the seizure order would contain provisions for making effective any wage boosts the most panel might recommend.

Washington, Jan. 26.—(AP)—Maybe you think, because of the confusing labor picture, that in every case the struggle is over higher wages and higher prices.

All the unions in the big strikes (such as those listed below) want higher wages. But not all the companies in those cases are asking OPA's permission to charge higher prices so higher wages can be paid.

But—and this is important—for everyone—eventually all the companies may come trotting into OPA for such permission after they've given wage increases.

In the following cases all of the strikes have been for higher wages but you'll notice not all the companies have asked for higher prices:

1. The oil industry hasn't asked for higher prices.
2. Nor has the electrical industry yet.
3. Nor has General Motors, formally.
4. The steel industry has asked for higher prices.

So has the meat industry.

So far as the strikers are concerned their general attitude is: They need more money. And the claim the companies are in a good position to give it to them.

NEED OF A NEW INTER- PRETATION

A group of soldiers were return-
ing home from India. As the twi-
light deepened, the pilot started
the word back through the plane that
they were about to pass over Beth-
lehem. The men peered out of the
windows. They could be seen the
little white houses and some
indication of the streets which the
Master of Men trod two thousand
years ago.

Looking at Bethlehem from an
airplane. Looking at Christ and
His teachings from the standpoint
of twentieth century thought. Hard-
ly had the Apostles started to
preach the Gospel before the
thought modes of that age began
to influence the form of the gos-
pel. Christian believers who favor-
ed Greek ways of thinking picked
up the Gospel and, as it were, ran
it through their accustomed forms
of thought. Imperialistic Rome
made a profound impression on
Christian thought, as did the Mid-
dle Ages and Renaissance in later
centuries.

Today we look at the simple Gos-
pel of Jesus from an airplane. We
see His thoughts against the back-
ground of the atomic bomb explo-
sion. We read His Gospel about
neighborliness in terms of a world
that has become a neighborhood.
But still we have not a satisfactory
modern interpretation of the Gos-
pel.

It is to be hoped that great think-
ers will soon arise who will re-in-
terpret for us the immortal Gos-
pel of Christ in terms of the sci-
entific thought patterns which are
so familiar to our daily thinking.

WASHINGTON DAYBOOK

Washington—It's an old story in
the art world, but with the labor
strike and the thunder of GI's who
want to get home, it hasn't had the
circulation it deserves.

It's about those 202 old masters
from Germany which now are nest-
led so comfortably in the air con-
ditioned vaults of the National Gal-
lery. Their value is estimated some-
where around \$80,000,000 which is
a purely arbitrary figure, of course,
since there's no such thing as a re-
placement value on works of art.

They were discovered in salt
mines in what is now the American
occupied zone of Germany. All but
two of them belong to the world-
famous Kaiser Friedrich museum,
which is in the Russian-occupied
zone.

They were loaded on an Army
transport and brought to this coun-
try "for safe keeping" until condi-
tions in Germany assure their
proper care have been re-establish-
ed.

The White House and State De-
partment, as well as the National
Gallery, have never passed up an
opportunity to declare that the
paintings are not "war loot." To
emphasize this it has been stated
several times that the pictures will
not even be exhibited here.

At this point, some influential
leaders in the art world interposed
an objection and I think, a justifi-
able one. Since the government has
undertaken the responsibility of
protecting these paintings for Ger-
man posterity, it is only fair, they
argue, that the people of this coun-
try be given an opportunity to view
them.

Although Gallery officials, being
merely delegated guardians of the
treasures, have nothing to say on
this point, it is understood that
main objections are the costs of
framing and hanging the paintings
for exhibition, as well as the cost of
guarding them.

Art critics argue that this is ridi-
culous since not only could the cost
be defrayed by a comparatively mod-
erate turnstile fee and that profits
from a nation-wide tour of the
pictures could be turned into a fund
for relief in the war-devastated
countries.

When it is understood that the col-
lection includes the art lovers' an-
xiety becomes understandable. There
are, for example, Botticelli's
"Primavera," all of 15 Rembrandts,
Vermeers, Durers, Breughels, Hol-

and the corporations have their
elective representation, and during
this time there have been discussed
and drawn up with important
changes in the original bill—a
great number of important laws.
Some of them, which met with
many difficulties, had to be with-
drawn by the ministers who pre-
sented them.

"Recently there has been promul-
gated the referendum law, in order
to effect the direct consultation of
the nation in those laws which are
transcendent, and there is now in
preparation the new electoral cen-
sus which will permit us to es-
tablish the natural play of public
consultation.

"The Council of State and the
Supreme Court of Justice—traditional
organs among Spanish institutions—
function today with all regu-
larity, and their decision against
the acts of the government are suc-
cfully executed and respected by it.
Not a month passes without the of-
ficial bulletin printing some de-
cision of the council favorable to the
plaintiffs in their damage suits
against the acts of the government.

"If to these, which constitute in-
stitutions similar to those that other
democratic countries possess—there
is added the rectitude of conscience
which, among Catholic principles,
besides over Spanish life, you will
find perfectly explained this politi-
cal reform which is unknown
abroad. Unfortunately, there is still
a great deal of effort and money
which excites and their associates
wish to use to hide this truth and
to create an erroneous impression
abroad."

have not been increased 33 per cent since January, 1941.

2. Where wages are boosted to adjust inequities in a plant or industry. Inequities is a pretty vague term. It may need some explaining by the government.

Usually, adjusting inequities means something like this: If two men, doing similar work with the same amount of intelligence and energy, get different pay, the lower is brought up equal with the higher-paid one.

3. Where it is necessary to pay higher wages in order to get manpower into an industry essential to reconstruction.

But if there is a general price increase in this country, eventually, it may well wipe out any wage increases the workers can get now through their strikes.

Higher prices for industry's products generally will mean, of course, higher prices for everyone and the people who get no raises will suffer most.

Air Forces Planning Specialists' School

Washington, Jan. 26—(AP)—The Army Air Force is setting up a system of high level schooling for the leaders of any future air war, with the accent on youth.

The unofficial Army and Navy register said today the schools for senior and junior air officers are designed to develop ultimately into an AAP university. Lt. Gen. Carl A. Spaatz, new Air Forces chief, suggested this week an air school of the same calibre as West Point and Annapolis.

Under the new school system, which is headed by Major General Muir S. Fairchild, every officer will complete his specialized education in his first twenty years of service.

P.O.W.'S TO BE KEPT
Manila, Jan. 26—(AP)—Approximately 65,000 Japanese prisoners of war will be retained in Western Pacific army installations as laborers until July 1, Lt. Gen. Wilhelm D. Styer told members of House Agricultural subcommittee today.

The theatre commander said it previously had been planned to repatriate all Japanese in the Philippines and on Okinawa, but that they were needed to help construct permanent installations.

MRS. ROOSEVELT SPEAKS

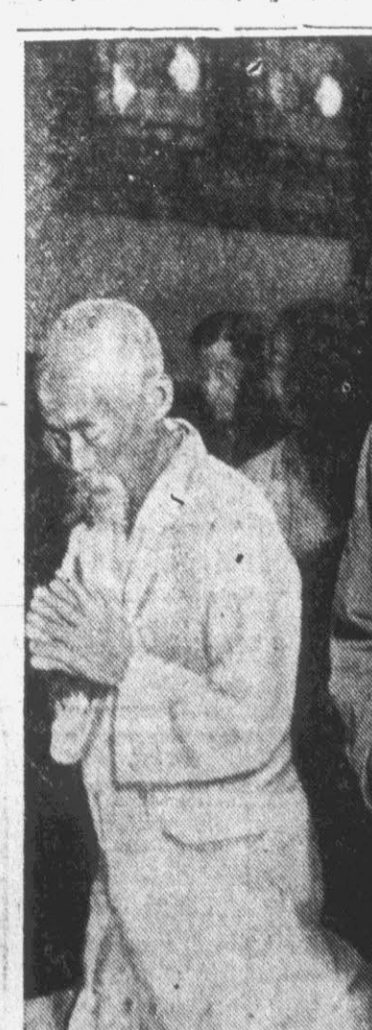

SHAKE-UP DUE AMONG ENVOYS

Harriman And Winant Ready To Quit Their Posts

Washington, Jan. 26—(AP)—The imminent resignation of the two topmost U. S. envoys was forecast today by usually well informed diplomatic officials.
They said that Averell Harriman, ambassador to Russia, and John Winant, ambassador to Britain, are ready to quit their posts.

There has been some speculation that Harriman may be succeeded by Fiorella La Guardia, former mayor of New York, now a columnist and radio commentator. La Guardia left Thursday for South America to represent President Truman at inauguration of Brab's new president.

One group has advocated appointment of a military man to the Moscow post.

Joseph Dacres, former ambassador to Russia, and James Dunn, as assistant secretary of state, have been mentioned as possible successors to Winant.

Harriman left Moscow by plane Thursday for Moscow. His route will take him through Chungking, Tokyo and Korea with stopovers for conferences with General George C. Marshall, now ambassador to China, and Douglas MacArthur.

He has been reported as anxious to return to private business.

Men In Enl. Reserve Corps to Keep Grade

Men who are in the Enlisted Reserve Corps on an inactive status who desire to retain their rank in the Regular Army may do so by requesting call to active duty on or before January 31st, according to information revealed by Sgt. J. M. Crisp, NCO in charge of the Greenville Recruiting Station.

Sgt. Crisp said that a recent War Department telegram stated that those men who requested enlistment on or before January 31st would be enlisted in the regular Army in their present grades, but those members of the Enlisted Reserve Corps on an inactive status who re-

quest enlistment in the regular Army on or after February 1st would be enlisted in the grade of Private, unless higher grades are authorized by War Department instructions, in effect at the time of enlistment, for persons who are not members of the Enlisted Reserve Corps.

The War Department is inviting attention to this regulation so that those men who joined the Enlisted Reserve Corps with the intention of retaining rank in future enlistments will be able to take advantage of this offer before February 1st. Sgt. Crisp offers the assistance of the local recruiting station to any men who desire information concerning regular Army enlistment. Virgil Payne To Pilot Local Club, President Smith Announces

President Guy V. Smith today announced that he had signed a contract with Horace Virgil Payne, 32, to manage the Greenville baseball club in the Coastal Plain League the coming season.

Payne is an infielder and bats and throws right-handed. The new manager, who was a physical instructor in the Navy from early in 1942, until last November, informed club officials while here several days ago to sign a contract that he had eight or 10 good players who were with him in the Navy ready to report to Greenville when spring training starts on April 10.

President Smith is also in touch with a number of players who were with the Greenies when the league suspended at the end of the 1941 season.

The Board of Aldermen has indicated that the city will build a fence at Guy Smith Stadium and put the diamond in good condition. Uniforms have been ordered and they will bear no advertising.

Virgil Payne is a native of Harlan County, Ky. He attended Cumberland Junior College in that State two years. He went to Wake Forest in 1936, was out a year, and graduated in 1938. He played baseball and basketball on the varsity teams.

He played second base for Wake Forest in 1936, and centerfield in 1938 under the late Coach Caddell. He is six feet tall and weighs 160 pounds. After leaving Wake Forest Payne played on the Elizabethton (Tenn.) and Pennington Gap (Va.) clubs in the Appalachian League. After that he was player-manager on the Superior, Wis. club in the Northern League.

While in the Navy Payne was stationed at Norfolk, Va., and at the naval station at Patuxent River, Md. He had taught and coached in Johnston County schools three years and is now principal of a school there. He married Miss Mable Nordan of Selma.

Secretary David C. Moore, Jr., said the Greenville club had received a request from a northern club for permission to train in Greenville and requests from several other clubs to play exhibition games here.

The Coastal Plain League season opens May 2 and closes September 2. The clubs are scheduled to play 126 games—63 at home and 63 away. Receipts of all holiday games will be pooled and divided equally among the eight clubs: Greenville, Kinston, New Bern, Goldsboro, Wilson, Rocky Mount, Tarboro and Fayetteville.
