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Britain Answers Moscow Charges

Vishinsky Opens Russian Charges Against Great Britain; Bevin Declares The Real Danger To World Peace Is Moscow's Propaganda, "With No Sign Of Friendship"

London, Feb. 1.—(AP)—Foreign Secretary Bevin told the United Nations Security Council today that "Moscow and Communist party propaganda" endangered world peace.

This, he said, was "the real danger" to peace. Bevin made this statement in blasting back to Russian charges that Britain imperiled world security by maintaining troops which, the Soviet said, supported Fascist and pro-monarchist elements in Greece.

Bevin demanded a straight yes or no verdict from the council on the Russian charge.

Russia, through Vice Commissar Andrei Vishinsky, argued for an hour before the council that British forces were "contributing to disorder" in Greece. He said a "white terror" existed in that country, and said the Soviet Union demanded quick and unconditional withdrawal of the troops.

Bevin responded that the real "danger to the peace of the world" today was the "incessant propaganda from Moscow with no sign of friendship."

"This incessant suspicion is the danger," Bevin asserted. "I ask for a straight verdict—have we been endangering the peace?"

Opening the council's consideration of Russia's demand for action on the Greek situation, Soviet Vice Commissar Andrei Vishinsky declared: "The horrors perpetrated today in Greece by the white terror, are known to everyone. It is not necessary to prove them here."

Vishinsky outlined four main contentions in Russia's case:

1. "A very tense situation in Greece" is endangering international peace and security.

2. The presence of British troops has become a means of political pressure on the country.

3. The troops serve as a means of support for reactionary elements.

He said he had received a telegram from Athens today reporting "a new outbreak of Fascist terror in Athens and on the plains outside the city during the last few days."

The telegram reported, he said, that bands of bandits broke up workers' meetings and were helped by police henchmen of the Xitos (a monarchist group) with the use of machineguns. Many persons were said to have been wounded and hundreds injured.

Arabs Call Strikes In New Protest Move

Jerusalem, Feb. 1.—(AP)—The Arab Higher Committee today called a 24-hour strike for Saturday for all Arabs throughout Palestine in protest against the British decision to admit 1,500 Jews a month until completion of the inquiry by the joint British-American commission on Palestine.

The committee telegraphed protests to the British government, the Arab League and leaders of all Arab states.

"WINDS" CODE INTERCEPTED BY NAVY DEPT

Capt. Safford Received Message Which "Meant War, And We Knew It"

Washington, Feb. 1.—(AP)—Captain L. F. Safford asserted today that in the week before Pearl Harbor the navy intercepted a Japanese "winds" code message which "meant war—and we knew it meant war."

Safford, 1941 head of the Navy Department of communications intelligence unit, said he believed the message was intercepted December 4.

"I saw the winds message typed in page form on yellow teletype paper, with the translation written below," he said in a statement given to the Senate-House Committee investigating Japan's December 7, 1941, attack.

"I immediately forwarded this message to my commanding officer (Rear Adm. Leigh Noyes) thus fully discharging my responsibility in the matter."

When he first saw it, Safford added, it already had been translated by Lt. Comdr. Alvin Kramer in charge of the translation section of the communications intelligence unit.

"Kramer had underscored all three 'code phrases' on the original incoming teletype sheet," Safford said. "Below the three phrases was written in pencil or colored crayon in Kramer's handwriting, the following free translations: 'War with England (including Nel, etc.).'"

"War with the U. S. 'Peace with Russia.'"

He quoted Kramer as saying, "This is it," as he handed it to him.

Safford's statement continued: "This was the feather in our cap. This was the tip-off which would prevent the U. S. Pacific fleet being surprised at Pearl Harbor the way the Russians had been surprised."

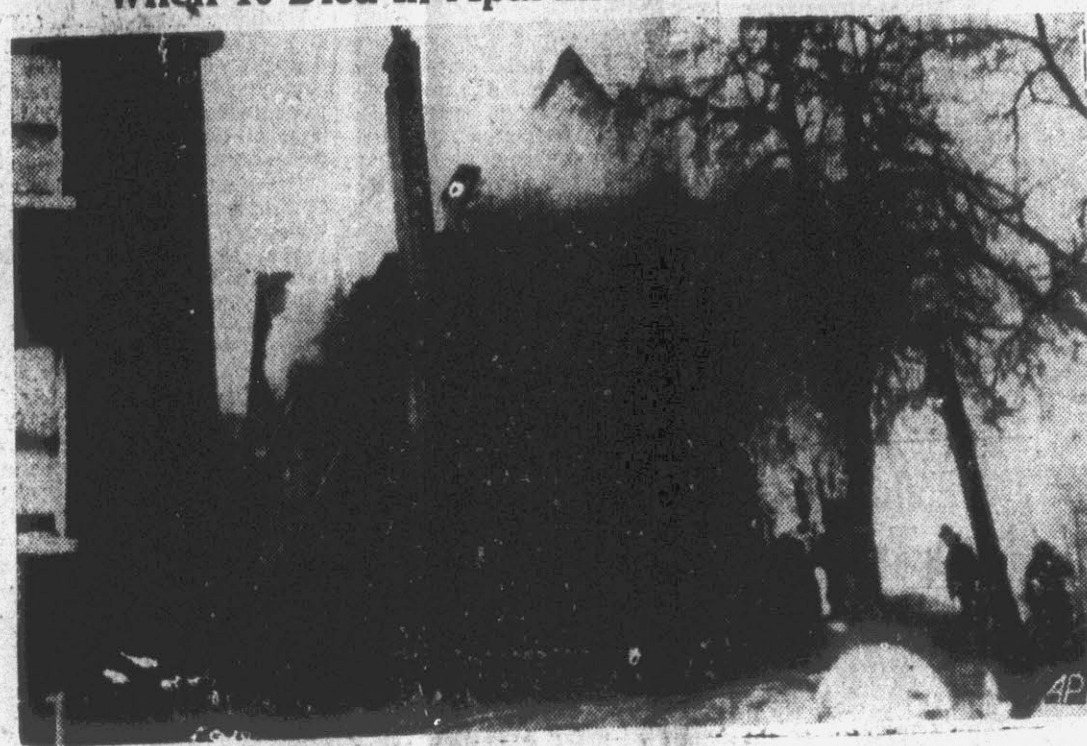
Seventeen-Year-Old Hero Goes To School

Legion Calls For Probe Of Veterans Administration

John Stelle, American Legion National Commander, Demands Congress Investigate "Breakdown" Under Bradley

Washington, Feb. 1.—(AP)—The American Legion called on Congress today for an immediate investigation of a "tragic breakdown" in the Veterans Administration under Gen. Omar N. Bradley, who took over as chief less than six months ago.

John Stelle, the Legion's national commander, made the "demand" for action in letters to all members of Congress and said the law makers should see that their "mandates are no longer ignored by the Veterans Administration."

VA officials reserved comment on the letter, but Stelle's aides said its release was preceded by an acrimonious telephone battle between Stelle and Bradley over major VA policies.

Stelle's letter to Congress claimed delay and inquiry was warranted because:

1. Between 300,000 and 500,000 disability cases cannot receive proper compensation without undergoing physical examinations because of VA's failure to secure adequate medical records from the Army and Navy.

2. The hospitalization applications of more than 7,000 needy veterans await processing.

3. Thousands of Army hospital beds are not being utilized at a time VA hospitals are badly congested.

4. Unprocessed applications for education and training under the GI Bill of Rights total 102,839, in addition to 20,411 pending claims for insurance premium waivers, and

Russians Envision Big Alaskan Tunnel

London, Feb. 1.—(AP)—Robert Magidoff, NBC commentator, said over the Moscow radio today that Russian scientists were "dreaming" of a Bering Straits tunnel to connect the Soviet mainland with Alaska.

The broadcast, recorded by the Soviet Monitor, said the Soviet scientists hope it "will become a reality in the not too distant future." He said the Russians envision "chains of motor cars streaming back and forth."

The commentator said the sponsor of the idea was Vladimir Obratov, an academician whom he listed as Russia's leading railway expert.

Foreign Observers Won't See The Bomb

Secrecy Of Atom Bomb Will Be Kept; Even Measurable Results Against Military Equipment To Be Guarded

Washington, Feb. 1.—(AP)—Foreign observers may go to the Bikini Atoll tests but they won't see the atom bomb.

This became apparent today as the cloak of security was drawn still tighter around this country's No. 1 secret. Officials concerned with the secrecy phase of the test said there are two paramount security points: The nature of the bomb itself and the precise, measurable results obtained against military and naval equipment.

The reasons for the second point are based on the desire to withhold details of the bomb's action as well as to guard against letting out technical information on just how vulnerable American equipment will be shown to be—just in case someone else should build a bomb and decide to use it.

TODAY IN CONGRESS

A Review Of Your Government In Action

Washington, Feb. 1.—(AP)—Congressmen jumped today into a new fuss involving the Veterans Administration and an American Legion demand that the lawmakers investigate what the Legion called a "tragic breakdown" in the agency.

Some sided with the Legion, some with VA.

As the House debated a strike control measure and the Senate went into another round of a filibuster against a permanent Fair Employment Practices Commission, the Pearl Harbor inquiry took a new twist.

From Vice Adm. William W. Smith, an investigating committee got testimony that a secret chart for Dec. 5, 1941, showed an American patrol vessel in the area from which a Japanese task force launched planes two days later for an attack on Pearl Harbor.

Smith said the vessel apparently was not on a ship location map for Dec. 6, adding "It seems to have disappeared." Rep. Murphy (D-Pa.) demanded that the Navy name the ship and supply a report on its movements between Dec. 5 and 7.

In other committees:

The Senate Naval Committee looked into the nomination of Edwin W. Pauley, California oil man and former secretary-treasurer of the Democratic National Committee, to be Undersecretary of the Navy.

Senator Tobey (R-NH) asked Secretary of the Interior Ickes whether Pauley ever told him that the filling of a government suit to obtain title to Tidewater oil lands "would be bad politically and that he could raise several hundred thousand dollars in campaign contributions in California if the suit were not filed."

Ickes said the answer was "Yes." A W. Robertson, chairman of the Board of Westinghouse Electric Corporation, said it was time for Congress to halt union boycotts and "curb the right to strike." He spoke to the Senate Labor Committee, considering President Truman's fact-finding plan for coping with strikes.

Dr. Karl T. Compton, president of Massachusetts Institute of Technology, told the Senate Atomic Committee Congress should separate policy-making and administrative duties of any agency set up for domestic control of atomic power.

In the Senate, Republicans made known a growing impatience with the Southern filibuster against the FEPC bill intended to prevent racial or religious discrimination in

Hope Dead For Immediate End To Labor's Strikes

Congress Plans Strong Labor Legislation In Order To Prevent Future Industrial Tie-Ups; Proposed Bill Would Outlaw Violence, Lay Unions Open To Injunctions

Washington, Feb. 1.—(AP)—Republicans fell out today over just how tough the House should make the sweeping new strike control legislation it hopes to pass in a matter of days.

There was cold comfort for the administration in that, for consideration of the bill represented a sharp setback. The House took it as a preference to an anemic version of the fact-finding measure asked by President Truman.

Republicans lined up almost solidly when the House voted 258 to 114 yesterday to give the case measure immediate right of way. Only 51 Republicans were recorded as against the move.

Later, however, several influential minority members announced that they had supported the case proposal only to insure speedy action to curb and help settle industrial strife.

Backers of the bill remained confident of success, however, and the House leaders speaking privately to newsmen backed them up. The leaders made it clear that some modifications are likely, but said they expected few basic changes in the final version.

The case measure set up a national labor-management board to help settle labor disputes it determined affected the public interest.

It would outlaw violent picketing, provide for civil suits against violators of labor contracts and lay unions open to injunctions. Unions of supervisory employees, such as foremen, would have no status.

Some Democrats still are hopeful of setting Mr. Truman's fact-finding formula through as a compromise. Acting Chairman Randolph (D-WVa.) of the Labor Committee called for such action in a House speech. He said the President is entitled to the machinery he asks to settle labor strife.

Rep. Halleck (R-Ind.) responded, however, that Mr. Truman told Congress if we don't like his plan to draw up ourselves and we have done so," Halleck urged support of the case bill.

Searchers Gather For Plane Rescue

Elk Mountain, Wyo., Feb. 1.—(AP)—Several score searchers, including 50 military policemen, girded themselves today for an attempted ascent up the snow-covered slopes of 11,125-foot Elk Mountain upon whose rough summit a Seattle-to-New York United Air Lines transport plane is believed to have crashed yesterday with 21 persons aboard.

A blizzard last night which forced a search party to turn back within 300 feet of the mountain top had deepened the five feet or more of snow covering the mountain, with 12-foot drifts in places.

United Air Lines officials hoped that a plane could take off from Cheyenne today for a close survey of the peak, 5 miles northwest of Laramie, but they said that uncertain weather might prevent the flight.

The Hamlet of Elk Mountain within the shadow of the peak itself was the scene of unwonted bustle as 50 military policemen from Fort Warren under the command of Lt. Paul L. Farver, equipped themselves to join sheepherders, ranchers and peace officers in the dangerous ascent up the gaunt mountain slopes.

Giant Steel Strike Continues For 12th Day Over 200,000 Workers Mark 73rd Day Of General Motors Strike; No Prospects For End Of Electrical Stoppage

Government officials and legislators continued efforts today to bring peace to the nation's industrial front but there was no hope of immediate settlement in three country-wide strikes involving 1,200,000 workers.

The giant steel strike continued for the 12th day and more than 800,000 workers in steel and related industries remained away from their jobs. A new plan for ending the walkout over a wage dispute reportedly was being readied by White House advisers but federal seizure of the industry was not under consideration.

More than 200,000 workers in 96 General Motors plants marked their 73rd day on strike as a federal mediator in Detroit continued his efforts to effect an agreement between the corporation and leaders of the CIO United Auto Workers union. Wages and the maintenance of union membership were the chief issues under discussion.

The country's third major work stoppage involved 200,000 CIO electrical workers, who left their jobs on Jan. 15 from plants of General Electric, Westinghouse and General Motors—the industry's big three. There are no prospects for early settlement and no conferences are scheduled to discuss the CIO United Electrical Workers union demand for a \$2 a day wage increase.

In addition to the country's three principal strikes, about 90 other labor disputes continued, making idle an additional 200,000 workers. Wages were the principal issue in the majority of the controversies.

New closings of industries because of the work stoppage include nearly 1,300 steel and aluminum mills, oil mines and fabricating plants made idle about 55,000 workers. The number included 20,000 Ford Motor workers.

An Analysis Of The News

Madrid, Feb. 1.—One of the most impressive aspects of this changing Europe is the acceleration in the disappearance of the landed gentry—proprietors of vast estates whose holdings have come to them through inheritance, sometimes through many generations.

This landed aristocracy is for one reason or another being compelled to divest itself of its wealth in the soil. The causes vary in different countries. High taxation is forcing the change in some; cost of maintenance has wiped out revenues in others; and in some there has been expropriation and redistribution among small farmers by the state.

In England high taxation has turned the trick. The position there was well summed up for me recently in London by an economic expert who cracked:

"The idea of a duke in a red coat, riding to hounds across his estate with a cry of 'Tallyho' is an anachronism, old boy. He just doesn't exist."

Well, of course, British still has her gentry, but broadly speaking the gentry no longer is "landed." And on the continent the proprietors of wide acres are going the same way, though perhaps for different reasons.

Spain, which geographically is rather isolated from the rest of Europe and hasn't felt the full fury of two world wars, still has many great haciendas in the hands of her

landed gentry—but she, too, is facing the necessity of change. This necessity would seem to be recognized in a government bill now before the Cortes providing for the expropriation of rural estates, with due indemnity, and their redistribution among small farmers where such a step is necessary to meet social needs.

This expropriation and redistribution would be carried out by the National Colonization Institute, which already is in existence and has been purchasing land for redistribution. For example, a few days ago the Institute purchased some 3,000 acres from Count Dela Puebla Del Maestre in the Badajoz area for redistribution among his 530 tenants.

Some of the big land owners have seen that writing on the wall and have been disposing of portions or all of their country estates. This has been due in part to recognition of the trend of the times to redistribute the land and in part to economic necessity, the working of the big plantation having ceased to be sufficiently profitable.

Spain's landed gentry has less money these days, because rents to tenants haven't risen along with the cost of maintaining the plantations. It's against the law to increase rents unless the property is to be improved.

Then, too, large tracts of many estates have been given over to hunting and not only produce no

Washington, Feb. 1.—(AP)—This is an explanation of the \$3,750,000,000 loan which this government—if Congress approves—will make to Britain.

President Truman, asking for the approval, says the British need the loan to buy things essential to their life.

Congress, where there's some very strong opposition to the loan, won't decide for weeks or months.

An individual Briton—farmer, businessman, manufacturer—would not be able to borrow any money from the loan.

The borrowing would be done by banks. American and British government experts worked out the details of the loan. They explain its chief use as this:

Tenable British banks to build up dollar credit in this country. The British used to have a lot of dollar credit but the war shot it to pieces.

When Americans and Britons sell goods to one another they want to be paid off in their own country's money: Dollars and pounds sterling.

So American banks kept a fund of pounds sterling in British banks. And British banks kept a fund of American dollars in American banks.

A Briton, buying from an American, deposited his check with his British bank which then wired the American bank where it had dollars on tal;

"Pay the American, John Jones, so many dollars out of our dollar fund."

Jones got his American dollars. And the system worked in reverse if Jones wanted to buy something from a Briton.

Because we sold the British far more than they sold us, the British banks always had to have a good supply of dollars in American banks. Here was one of the main ways in which the British banks could do so:

Britons owned lots of American stocks and securities and received their interest and dividends in the form of checks mailed them by American firms. The checks were payable in American dollars.

Since the British security holders wanted pounds sterling, not dollars, they turned their checks into British banks and got pounds sterling.

The British banks then deposited these checks by mail in American banks. The latter set aside the amount of the checks in American dollars for the British banks.

War came. Before lend-lease the British government had to buy planes and tanks here and had to pay for them in American dollars.

So the British government took over the holdings of Britons abroad, paying their own people in pounds sterling and using the stocks and securities in this country to get dollars to buy war goods.

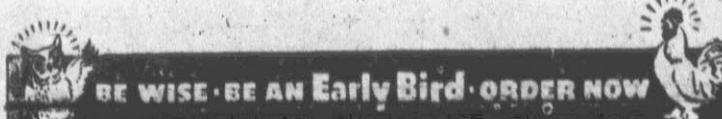

NEW ERA FOR CHINA AHEAD

Chiang Kai-Shek Is Ready For End To His Leadership

By SPENCER MOOSA.
Chungking, Feb. 1.—(AP)—The emergence of China's millions from civil strife into a day of full freedom for all political parties was viewed today by Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek as possible foreshadowing an end to his leadership. The man whose one-party rule has continued for 18 years said frankly that from now on the heavy task of rebuilding the nation rested not alone on the Kuomintang (Nationalist party) "much less on me as an individual."

"Whether in the government or out of it," he told last night's closing session of the historic political consultation conference, he would sincerely work for peace and solidarity.

He pledged that all the far-reaching decisions of the unity conference would be carried out. These included Free and open activities by all political parties, nationalization of the army; nationwide compulsory education; and economic reconstruction. Chou En-Lai, No. 2 Communist who helped reach the unity conference accord, today expressed full confidence that there will be no more civil strife in China. He said that apart from minor clashes in Shantung and the East River district of Kwantung, near Canton, peace prevails throughout the country. He affirmed that the Communist party is prepared to carry out fully all agreements reached at the conference.

Col. Peter Nekrasievitch, Russian member of the Allied Control Commission in Romania, had been assassinated.

The radio said that at funeral services held Wednesday, the Russian ambassador to Romania declared that Nekrasievitch was killed by "Fascist remnants still active in Romania" who were "resorting to terrorist acts."

The radio report gave scant news about the colonel's death, but said only that he "has fallen victim to a base attempt on his life on his return from a mission to Pitesti."

Romanian Prime Minister Petru Groza and members of the American, British and Soviet missions were said to have attended the funeral.

Japanese Prepare New Constitution

Tokyo, Feb. 1.—(AP)—The government has drafted tentatively a new constitution stripping the emperor of his military command but specifying that Japan shall retain the throne, the newspaper *Mainichi* said today.

Chief Cabinet Secretary Wataru arahashi denied, however, that the constitutional revision published by *Mainichi* was the one which the government was considering. *Mainichi*'s report might have been compiled from reference material, he told Kyodo news agency, but "it is

entirely separate from the one being decided by the cabinet now." There was little other change, however, in the first four articles dealing with the throne.
