Policy Favored

New Era In Diplomacy Foreseen In British-Russian Clash On Greece; Observers Anticipate Settling of Case Without Loss Of Face To Either Side

London, Feb. 2.—(AP)—United Nations delegates envisioned a new era of frankness in international diplomacy today after Soviet Russia and Great Britain clashed openly on the Greek dispute before the World Security Council.

Most of the statesmen said an amicable solution of the dispute itself was probable and that its most significant aspect was the way it was handled, with cards-on-the-table replacing the traditional secret diplomacy.

Although there was no immediate indication as to what course the debate would take when the council meets Monday, some delegates expressed the belief that the case could be settled satisfactorily, without either party losing face, by sending a UNO commission to Greece to investigate.

British Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin has indicated he would welcome any inquiry into Russia's charges that the maintenance of British troops in Greece was endangering the peace.

Britain is committed to withdraw from Greece anyway after the Greek national elections and the urgency of the situation, in the Russian view, might thus be eased before a commission could make a detailed investigation and prepare a report.

Despite the warmth of yesterday's debate some delegates saw the frank discussion as a "good omen" for future peace.

"We're succeeding where the League of Nations failed," Dr. H. Frisch, veteran Danish statesman and a leading Scandinavian delegate, told a reporter.

"The exhibition yesterday afternoon was true international collaboration. It proved that distrust could be aired in frankness. It is a new era."

His comments summarized those made by many other delegates after listening to Bevin counter Russian charges by asserting that the "real danger to peace lay in what he termed Soviet anti-British propaganda and by demanding a yes-or-no verdict by the council as to whether Britain was jeopardizing the peace.

Senator Connally (D-Tex.), a member of the United States delegation, said:

"That's what this organization is for—to get all these problems out in the open and air them so everybody can understand them and see what's going on. We can't leave all these diplomatic things bottled up the way they've been in the past."

Prime Minister Tito
Announces Cabinet

Belgrade, Feb. 2.—(AP)—Marshal Tito, prime minister of the new Yugoslav federated republic, announced his cabinet today and told Parliament that all parties in the peoples front "agreed with my choice."

Tito, who was prime minister and minister of national defense in the old Liberation government, retained the defense portfolio.

Stanoje Simic, ambassador to the United States, was named foreign minister.

Madrid, Feb. 2.—(AP)—Crystal gazers who try to divine the political future of Spain find the glass clouded but this much is clear: There is a major change in the making and this is an anxious moment.

The outlawing of the Franco regime by the Big Three in the Potsdam Declaration has put the generalissimo on a tough spot. As I see it he has his choice of three separate courses:

1. He can bare his head to the Allied sun in defiance.

2. He can retire from the picture altogether.

3. He can try to find a solution which would give Spain a new regime but would at the same time permit him to turn over the reins of government without too much loss of personal dignity.

The monarchists have chosen this critical time to intensify their new drive for a restoration of the kingship, with Pretender Don Juan on the throne. The Republicans, defeated physically but not in the spirit, are straining every nerve through their organizations outside the country to bring about overthrow of Franco.

Rumors Of Split Followed Presidential Interview On Argentine Policy

Washington, Feb. 2.—(AP)—President Truman and Secretary of State Byrnes presented a united front today against talk that they had fallen out over foreign policy matters.

In the record was Byrnes' statement at a press conference: "No man as Secretary of State could ever have more complete support than I have had from the President."

Byrnes' declaration came only a few minutes after he attended an afternoon cabinet meeting yesterday at the White House.

A reporter asked him to comment on reports of a rift with the Chief Executive, some of which stemmed from Mr. Truman's remark at his Thursday news conference that the President, not the State Department, determines foreign policy.

Byrnes' reply came with a rush: "He knew of no such rift. The President hadn't meant his Thursday remarks to be interpreted as a slap at the Secretary of State and the President greatly regretted his interpretation."

A reporter broke in to say that some had interpreted Mr. Truman's statements as constituting complete support for the record of Byrnes as Secretary of State. He asked whether Byrnes believed this to be correct.

He hoped so, Byrnes said, adding: "I never have had any evidence to the contrary at any time."

The Secretary also unloaded a statement about Argentina's military government and its "strong man," Col. Juan D. Peron.

It was a question about Argentina which prompted President Truman's press conference assertion about foreign policy.

Byrnes disclosed that the United States has called on Argentina to repudiate publicly a charge by Peron in an interview Wednesday that the American embassy in Buenos Aires was involved in smuggling arms into the South American country.

PLANE WRECK
NOW LOCATED

Rescue Parties Gather To Bring Back Bodies Of Victims

Elk Mountain, Wyo., Feb. 2.—(AP)—Two parties prepared to scale Elk Mountain today to bring down on dog sleds and toboggans the bodies of 21 persons killed when a United Air Lines plane crashed on the snow-covered peak early on Thursday.

The bodies and wreckage of the Seattle to New York plane were found 10,000 feet up on the slopes of the 11,622-foot mountain by a ground party late yesterday. Members of the party found the bodies scattered over a wide area and the plane disintegrated, but found no indications that the plane burned.

Weather permitting, the first of the party was scheduled to leave to blaze a trail to the wreckage and investigate the crash.

The bodies were located by two Hanna, Wyo., coal miners, Edward and Joe Hicks, who made their way up the mountain by "weasel," an army vehicle that travels over snow, snowshoes and skis. They later met another group which had fought its way 1,000 feet above the wreckage without seeing it.

Stewart England of Cheyenne, Allen Garbutt of Elmo, Wyo., and Ray Lefforge of Elmo, told of a hazardous climb through snow whipped up by winds that reached 100 miles an hour and over crust.

Atomic Bomb Toll Is
Given By Japanese

Tokyo, Feb. 2.—(AP)—The atomic bombing of Hiroshima last Aug. 6 caused 306,545 casualties, including 78,150 killed, the Japanese central liaison office reported to Allied headquarters today.

The report said 13,983 were missing, 9,428 seriously injured, 27,997 slightly injured, and 176,987 "general sufferers" which included all those who suffered from sickness or minor hurts after the bombing and persons made homeless.

Unions Ready For
Chilean Showdown

Santiago, Chile, Feb. 2.—(AP)—The Chilean Confederation of Labor, preparing for a showdown on the government's labor policies, called a crippling strike today to enforce demands for recognition of nitrate unions and the formation of farm workers unions.

A partial strike, affecting railroad, electric, metallurgical and construction workers, was scheduled to start at 6 a. m. (a. m. EST).

A general strike of all of the Federations 300,000 workers was ordered to start Monday and continue until the government rescinds a decree dissolving the striking nitrate unions.

The Confederation's action ended a virtual truce between labor and the government, declared following bloody rioting in Santiago Monday night which resulted in the fatal shooting by police of at least five and possibly eight workers.

Under the decree, the government had lifted a 60-day state of siege, proclaimed Monday, in return for cancellation of the general strike by the Federation, whose one-day stoppage Wednesday paralyzed industry.

Uncovers New Leads

Officer Testifies Navy Dept. Made Effort To Make Him Say No "Winds" Message Wae Intercepted

Washington, Feb. 2.—(AP)—Navy Capt. L. F. Safford testified today that a representative of the Secretary of the Navy had made a "determined effort" in 1945 to get him to tell a Pearl Harbor inquiry court that no Japanese "winds" message had been intercepted.

Testifying before the Senate-House Pearl Harbor Committee, Safford named this representative as Lt. Comdr. John Sonnett.

He said Sonnett was a special representative of the Secretary of the Navy and legal adviser to Adm. H. Kent Hewitt, who conducted a special inquiry into the Pearl Harbor disaster in mid-1945 at the direction of Secretary Forrest.

"In 1945 there was a determined effort made to have me reverse my testimony and say that I had never seen the winds execute message," Safford told the committee.

Safford testified yesterday that such a message, containing the words, "East wind, rain," which he said "meant war," with the Japanese had been received and decoded in the Navy Department December 4, 1941, 72 hours before the Pearl Harbor attack.

Safford, assistant director of naval communications, said Sonnett called him into a conference May 11, 1945 to discuss testimony that Safford was expected to give before Admiral Hewitt.

"It was apparent to me on the very first meeting that Sonnett was acting as a defense counsel for the late Frank Knox and for Admiral Stark and not as a prosecutor for the Hewitt investigation," Safford said.

"At the time of the Pearl Harbor attack, Knox was secretary of the navy and Adm. Harold R. Stark was chief of naval operations."

Safford said that Sonnett attempted to get him to reverse the testimony that he had given at previous inquiries about the receipt of the so-called winds message.

National Veterans Organizations Back Bradley Against Legion's Charges

Washington, Feb. 2.—(AP)—The American Legion's demand for the ouster of Gen. Omar N. Bradley as Veterans Administrator ran into sharp opposition today from other veterans organizations, and Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower pledged him support "anywhere, any time."

Eisenhower told reporters he was not familiar with the Legion's demand for an investigation of Bradley, but he considered the general one of the greatest living Americans.

"If General Bradley needs any support," he declared, "there is one who will fly anywhere, anytime to support him."

Bradley said he would welcome the congressional investigation which the Legion asked, and claimed definite progress had been made in his "short six months of stewardship."

Members of Congress appeared chary about intervening in the controversy at this time. A few said they thought something was wrong with VA's functioning, but others countered that Bradley should be given a chance to show what he could do.

The American Legion meanwhile modified its demand for Bradley's removal in favor of "a seasoned businessman."

National Commander John Stelle said in New York last night that he did not necessarily seek Bradley's ouster and that the general would have Legion support if he could do the job. He added the problem was a "question of action, not of individuals."

The Legion's blast against Bradley rallied to his defense the National Representatives of Veterans of Foreign Wars, Military Order of the Purple Heart, Disabled American Veterans, American Veterans Committee, American Veterans of World War II, and the CIO Veterans Committee.

These organizations endorsed Bradley for the work he had done in the Veterans Administration since President Truman brought him back from active duty in Europe and put him in charge last August. They called for a full opportunity for him to put his plans into operation.

Special Term Superior Court Begins Monday; Many Witnesses

More than 100 witnesses have been subpoenaed for the trial of Roederick, Davenport of New Bern and 16 other defendants in Superior Court here next week. Fifth Judicial District Solicitor Dave M. Clark said, Judge J. Paul Frizzelle of Snow Hill will preside over the special term.

A special panel of 60 prospective jurors has been summoned. Special attention in the trial will be directed to the charge of false pretense against Davenport. Solicitor Clark said. Other charges against Davenport include conspiracy to defraud and to commit and practice false pretense, conspiracy to violate the State banking laws and the usury laws and violations of those laws.

Davenport is alleged in grand jury indictments to have been the head of an "unlicensed" banking operations through Eastern Carolina.

Washington, Feb. 2.—(AP)—Would you like a nice job in the United Nations when it opens its headquarters in this country?

Sort of stenographer or secretary or something like that?

You won't be the only one. Thousands of Americans undoubtedly will put in their bids for such jobs. Not all will be chosen.

But choosing at all will be a big headache for Trygve Lie (pronounced Lee) Norwegian foreign minister.

He's just been confirmed as secretary general of the United Nations by the General Assembly. Now the assembly is expected to pick some place near New York or Boston as the UNO headquarters.

The decision will be made soon before UNO breaks up its present London meeting, its first.

The next meeting will be held in this country, perhaps before June. And Lie has to make preparations for that.

Truman Calls In OPA
Chief, Chester Bowles, To Confer On
Price Issues; President Said To Be Still
thinking In Terms
Of Settlement, Not
Seizure

Washington, Feb. 2.—(AP)—Swoody White House action to end the steel strike was termed "imperative" today as President Truman called in OPA Chief Chester Bowles on the price issues involved in the crippling dispute.

The high government official who said action now had become imperative predicted it might be forthcoming this weekend. Since "Big Steel" showed no signs of joining the current parade of companies settling their reconversion wage disputes.

Another strong hint of government expectations came last night from Nathan P. Feinsinger, chairman of Mr. Truman's steel fact-finding board. The three panel members were called to the White House yesterday afternoon and gave a half hour oral report.

Asked whether the President was consulting them in preparation for a new effort at settlement, Feinsinger said he gathered that Mr. Truman has "some expectation of something happening in the near future"—but Mr. Truman did not tell the board what he had in mind.

Feinsinger said he was sure, however, that the President is still thinking in terms of settlement, not seizure.

The summons of Bowles to the White House was interpreted generally as putting the question of steel price increases once more squarely in the foreground.

The fact that Bowles was called back yesterday from a brief vacation in South Carolina for the conference served to emphasize its potential importance.

Bowles' aides say he still steadfastly opposes more than \$2.50-a-ton increase for steel, although top policy officials—including reconversion Director John W. Snyder—favor a boost of about \$4.

United States Steel Corporation is standing pat on its assertion that "greatly in excess" of \$6.25 would be needed to defray the 18 1/2-cent hourly wage increase which Mr. M. R. Truman has proposed for the CIO United Steelworkers.

Meanwhile wage negotiations sagged in both the General Motors case, where a coast-to-coast strike entered its 74th day, and in the shipbuilding industry.

Federal conciliator James F. Dewey, who suddenly recessed GM negotiations in Detroit yesterday for the weekend, was expected, to (Continued on page three)

Hungary Proclaimed
As A New Republic

Budapest Feb. 2.—(AP)—Hungary was proclaimed a republic today and Premier Zoltan Tildy was sworn in as the president.

The new system "will rebuild the country and make it the home of liberty," said Tildy.

He was the only candidate for the presidency, having been selected in behind-the-scenes trading. Tildy, a stocky man, was about 30 minutes late for the ceremony.

The Hungarian national assembly passed by acclamation a bill creating the republic and then elected Tildy, also by acclamation.

ORIGIN OF THE WORD "MEMBER"

Apparently the first person who ever used the word "member" to designate a person who belongs to a church was the Apostle Paul. The Greek word "members" to describe the people who made up the Christian congregations over which he presided.

HOW THE FILIBUSTER BOYS GRABBED CONTROL OF THE SENATE

(Second of Four Articles)

Washington—Once Sen. Chavez (D-Md.) had explained his fair employment practice act to the Senate, he was willing to turn the show over to the filibuster boys. They didn't waste any time demonstrating that they had a few parliamentary cannon crackers of their own.

With Sen. O'Daniel (D-Tex.) in the chair, Sen. Eastland (D-Miss.) archly told of FEPC. He traded verbal one-liners for minutes in an effort to stall the floor. Sen. O'Daniel gave the decision to his southern colleagues. Eastland edged closer for the day by declaring he wanted to adjournment only if he would have the floor the following morning.

It was another southern senator, Cotton, (D-Las.) who put over the first parliamentary ploy for the filibusters.

When Majority Leader Barkley opened the day's proceedings with the customary request for unanimous consent to dispense with reading of the journal we would call (from the previous session's minutes), Sen. Overton not only made the infrequent request that the journal be read, but moved to amend the request to include the previous day's opening prayer.

The filibuster was officially on.

Sen. Overton's motion opened the way for unlimited debate on a subject that had nothing whatever to do with FEPC.

There are only three ways to end a filibuster: (1) for the winnagers to run out of wind and allow the issue to come to a vote; (2) for the session to come to an end with the adjournment; (3) to adjourn, which is simply a two-thirds majority vote of the Senate to put an end to debate.

Senators are very loath to vote closure. The present closure rule was passed after the long filibuster on the armament of American ships in 1917, but it rarely has been used. Gaining a group of senators or even just one senator can have lasting legislative repercussions. Too much Senate business is done by unanimous consent and gentlemen's agreements to invite the lasting wrath of any members.

There is one primary cause for ending a filibuster outside of parliamentary methods—public opinion. Filibusters, as a rule, are popular only with a very few.

ment—no matter what its complexion—could carry on successfully unless it had full control of the army.

This is equally true whether France tries to hang on, whether the monarchy is restored, or whether the republic is reestablished. There it is easy to see with half an eye that the situation is full of dynamite. Passions of civil war still glow red and if the army became divided in its loyalty there would be a repetition of that upheaval.

One hears no doubt voiced about the loyalty of the army to Franco and in that loyalty there rests a very delicate one. I've pointed out that he likely would be willing to turn the government over to a new monarchical regime if he could do so without loss of dignity. This would mean that he would have to use his full influence to insure that the monarchy had the support of the army.

What would pro quo would he expect? Well, it would be strange if he didn't risk that he be retained as commander of the military forces in exchange for his political title of chief of state.

And what would the alternative be? Nobody knows, and anyone who tries to guess at an effective force a solution is making a heavy gamble.

January H. D. Club Meeting

Three hundred and five members attended the January Home Demonstration Club meetings in Pitt County. "Growing Foods for Health" was the subject.

The home agents began the demonstration by telling the women that in 1946 every farm family should plan and produce and adequate food supply for their families. Using the Basic Seven Foods as a guide the 305 women at the meetings planned their food supply for this year.

Since studies in North Carolina show that far too many children and adults have nutritional anemia "blood building foods" were discussed. Club members were told by home agents that rich red blood is necessary if we are to be strong able to resist disease, and have energy for work and play. To build red blood we must eat foods rich in iron every day.

A foods demonstration was given at every meeting using food rich in iron. The 19 nutrition leaders demonstrated the making of a baked creamy omelet. The hostesses made and served light as a feather gingerbread.

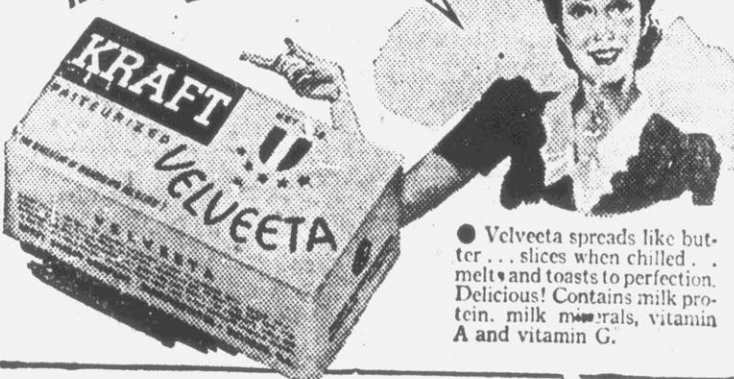

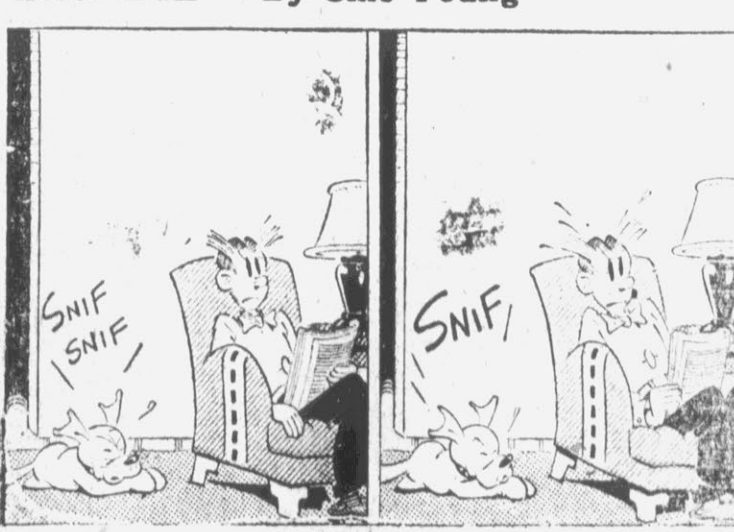

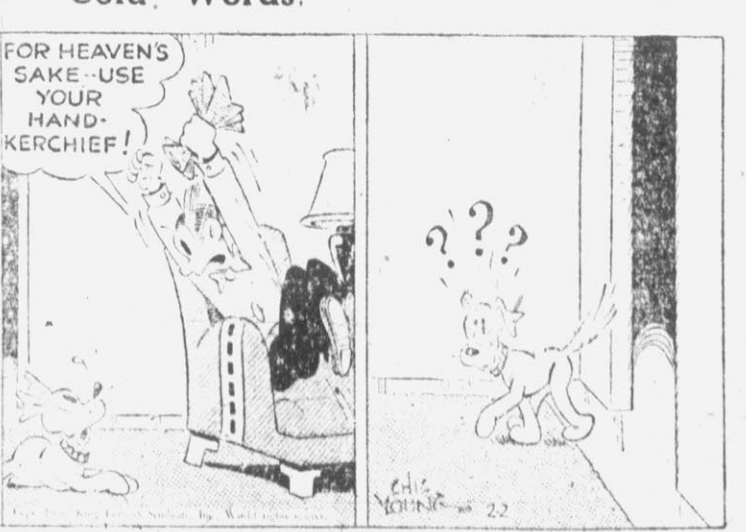

Chicago, Feb. 2—(AP)—A soldier who has been overseas more than 15 months, today identified as his a handkerchief which police said was a clue in the Jan. 7 kidnapping murder of Suzanne Degnan.

Tech. Sgt. Seymour Sherman, 22, New York City, who was en route to the United States from India at the time the child was slain, identified the handkerchief from its markings, "S. Sherman 3168" on one border and "S.S." on the other. The figures, he said, represented the last four digits of his Army serial number.

Sherman told police the handkerchief was one of a dozen GI handkerchiefs he received before entering Army service, all of which he now has lost. He said he must have lost the handkerchief while serving in this country more than 15 months ago, since it bore no overseas laundry markings. He said he had never been in Chicago before, and did not know how it got there. Sherman came through Chicago en route to Fort Dix, N. J., and volunteered to remain a day or so to assist the police in any way he could.

British Join In Occupying Japan

Tokyo, Feb. 2—(AP)—The British have joined with American forces in the task of occupying Japan. Advance elements of an estimated 45,000 Commonwealth troops began landing yesterday at Kure, replacing the deactivated U. S. Army's 10th Corps in the occupational service of southern Honshu.

These forces, ultimately to include British, Indian, Australian and New Zealand troops, will permit General MacArthur to send home more of the American soldiers who controlled Japan since the initial landings last Aug. 30.

Bombay, Feb. 2—(AP)—The Nationalist weekly magazine Blitz said today that tear gas grenades used by the police during recent Bombay riots bore the labels "Tear gas grenade made in U. S. A." for "civil protection London." Police officials were not available for comment.

Sydney, Australia, Feb. 2—(AP)—Group Capt. Oliver "Killer" Caldwell, Australian ace, was reduced three grades today to a flight lieutenant for having sold liquor improperly at Morotai.

Caldwell was credited officially with destroying 27 1-2 planes in combat. He refused comment on his conviction last month.

The department's anti-trust and criminal divisions both were ordered to look into the matter yesterday by Attorney General Tom Clark.

A spokesman for the department, who declined use of his name, told reporters:

"Complaints are being received by the department all the time about the clothing situation. Returning veterans generally cannot get clothes and what they do get is high priced."

The official said the inquiry may seek to determine whether clothing is being withheld from the market by manufacturers, and if so for what purpose. Also if any laws are being violated.

In New York, shirt and underwear manufacturers had said earlier that liberalization of OPA's maximum average price regulations would release about 3,000,000 shirts now being held up because of these regulations.
