Health Department Issues Statement

The following statement was issued by the Pitt County Board of Health today:

"For the past four years, or during the war, community sanitation or privy building was practically at a standstill. Since the close of the war there has been an increase in demand throughout the county for privies. Now that spring is approaching, the demand is getting greater week by week.

"New lumber for privies is extremely scarce. This means that wherever second hand lumber is available on the premises, it should be used.

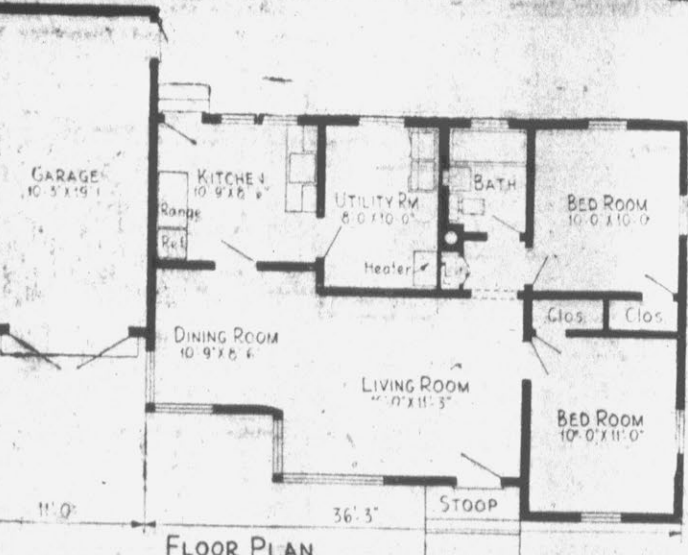
"The Pitt County Health Department is anxious that the rural citizens either have a septic tank or sanitary privies. Of course the department recommends septic tanks in preference to privies, and right now the materials for septic tanks are readily available.

"The Pitt County Health Department through its sanitarian, H. A. Hendrix, is ready to give free service in the supervision and planning of the septic tank system, or in the construction and placing of privies.

"Last year Pitt County had an increase in typhoid fever, and unless we can get better sanitation throughout the county, the health officer warns that we may have a further increase in typhoid fever this summer.

"Mr. Hendrix will be available at the health department offices in Greenville, Phone 3225, every week day morning from 8 to 9:15, and at other hours by appointment."

A.A.U.W. To Help Foreign Students

When the local chapter of the American Association of University Women makes its annual contribution to Fellowships this month, it will be giving immediate assistance through International Study Grants to young women from other countries eager to train themselves to help with the most urgent problems of their countries.

Each of the twenty-four Fellowship Units in the United States which has reached its \$40,000 goal, a part of the national goal of a million-dollar endowment for A.A.U.W. fellowships, will contribute this year to the International Study Grants.

The endowment for the Elizabeth Avery Colton Fellowship, raised by the South Atlantic Region, was completed in 1943, placing all A.A.U.W. branches in this region on the list of those eligible to divert their fellowship contributions to the new study grants.

These grants, in contrast with the regular fellowships, are in the main going to younger women whose opportunities for study were curtailed by the war.

Six of the grants have been made this year: two to young students from Norway, two others to young women from Holland, and the other two to students from Belgium and France.

The National Awards Committee of the A.A.U.W. has just met, February 8-10, to award all the funds sent in by that date. They also chose a list of "runner-up" to be given grants as funds are received later.

The Greenville branch hopes, through individual contributions and a branch contribution, to do its part to help some college student "to study in the United States, to know Americans better and to find out what has been going on in the world while they were shut off by the German occupation," as the present study grant holders report the young people of their countries are so eager to do.

Doctor Speaks On Nucleonic Energy

The dropping of the atomic bomb over Hiroshima, Japan, has ushered in a new era, the life of which has probably not been seen

since man first learned how to use fire," said Dr. W. S. DeLoach of the Science Department at East Carolina Teachers College in a talk made before the Literature Department of the Greenville Woman's Club on Tuesday, Feb. 12. Dr. DeLoach discussed before the club the principles involved in the fission of the atom and the releasing of nucleonic energy. The conversion of matter into energy by the splitting of the atom, he stated, not only brought the war to a speedy close but presents possibilities of great changes in our present way of life.

Envisaging the results of the use of atomic power in peaceful pursuits, Dr. DeLoach pointed out that it is not unreasonable to think that man will eventually—perhaps years from now—be able to utilize nucleonic energy as an everyday thing. "It is possible," he said, "that we will have ships, trains, airplanes and automobiles propelled by nucleonic energy—homes may be heated by nucleonic energy—and electricity may be so generated, if we are still using electricity."

The struggle for the sources of energy, one of the important causes of war, he suggested may be ended if atomic energy becomes generally available; and it may not be advantageous in the future for a country ever to go to war to gain metals, coal, or petroleum.

If there is another war, pointed out Dr. DeLoach, it will probably be different from those of the past, the object being to destroy not sources of supply but a large of the enemy's civilian population. Dr. DeLoach closed his talk by pointing to the dangers to civilization offered by the advancement of scientific knowledge and stressing the idea that through education man must learn to use his new knowledge to gain world peace.

The meeting took place at the home of Mrs. J. C. Galloway. Miss Eunice McGee was in charge of the program for the afternoon.

Date Set For Ending UNO Entertainments

Oakland, Calif., Feb. 13—(AP)—The USO, backer of road shows from Burma to Berlin, plans to pull its final curtain down December 21, 1946.

That is the date Dr. Lindsley F. Kimball, national president, gave a western states conference of USO chairmen yesterday for the organization to pass out of existence.

Kimball said the USO had spent \$200,000,000 to entertain American service men, was now in the process of disbanding and would need \$20,000,000 more to finish its job.

There are 330 troupes, he said, playing before service men in Europe, Asia and Pacific islands.

U. S. Soldiers Hurt In Indian Riots

Calcutta, Feb. 13—(AP)—British troops opened fire on an Indian mob today after rioters put two postoffices to the torch, smashed store fronts and raided the homes of European residents. At least 25 persons were reported injured in the demonstrations.

Unofficial estimates said 17 persons were killed and at least 200 injured in yesterday's street fighting, which resulted from an Indian demonstration protesting conviction and sentencing of a Moslem officer of the Japanese-sponsored "Indian National Army."

Yesterday's injured included 12 U. S. soldiers and 20 policemen.

The city has been turned over to military control, tantamount to martial law, although no formal proclamation of martial law had been made. Troops with tanks were ordered in and assigned the task of restoring order and communications.

Eloquent Talks At Bar Meeting

Judge J. Paul Frizzelle of Snow Hill and Robert Lee Humber of Greenville were guests of honor at the Pitt County Bar Association's monthly supper meeting at Nelson Hopkins' Tavern on the Tar last night.

The Greene county jurist, in presenting Mr. Humber paid fine tribute to the scholarly and distinguished international lawyer for his outstanding service to his community and nation. Judge Frizzelle reminisced for a brief period during which he pointed out some interesting facts and suggested some timely thinking.

Mr. Humber, winner of a Rhodes scholarship and graduate of Oxford University in England, world traveler, statesman and philosopher, was eloquent and impressive in his review of law and its influence through succeeding eras of history. His extensive knowledge of history, his great store of knowledge and experience in a lifetime of study, travel and service to his fellow-men has equipped him with the talents to paint word pictures in such manner as to inspire people to think. It is written somewhere in the realm of poetry that—"If you think two thoughts while I think one, you live twice as much as I do in the same length of time."

Mr. Humber took time out last night to point out the potential possibilities of development of agriculture and industry in Eastern Carolina. Incidentally, he is the author of the World Federation plan for a union of nations similar to the union of the United States for governing the world and securing a permanent peace. Many state legislatures have endorsed the World Federation plan, first published in 1940. And it may be recalled that much of the activi-

ties of the great meetings of nations in San Francisco last summer were along the lines suggested in the Pitt County's World Federation plan.

Judge J. W. H. Roberts, Will Whedbee and others spoke briefly. J. Henry Harrell, president of the association, presided. Ed. Bloom, chairman of the arrangements committee, was informally master of ceremonies and contributed much to the success of the meeting. Barbecued chicken and all of the "trimmings" were served.

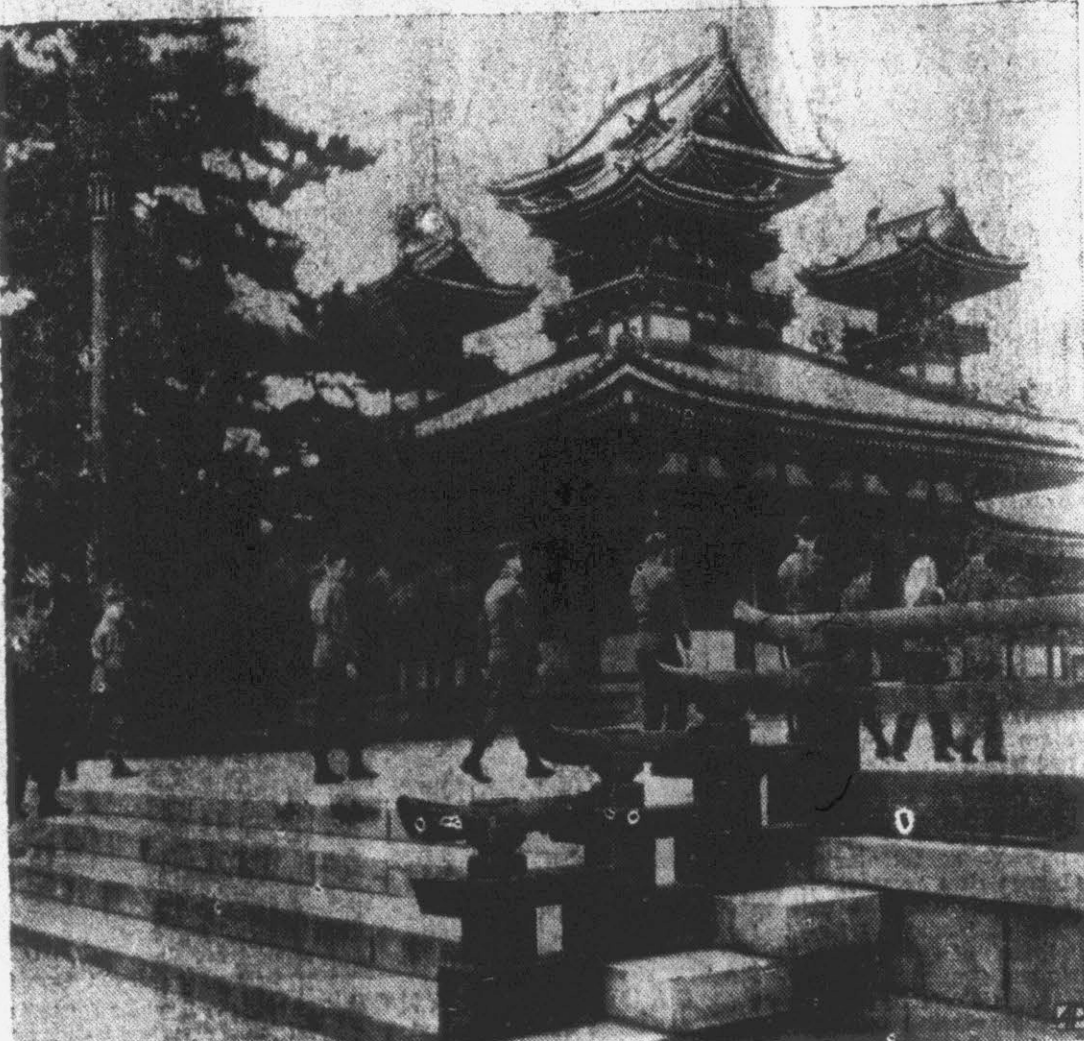

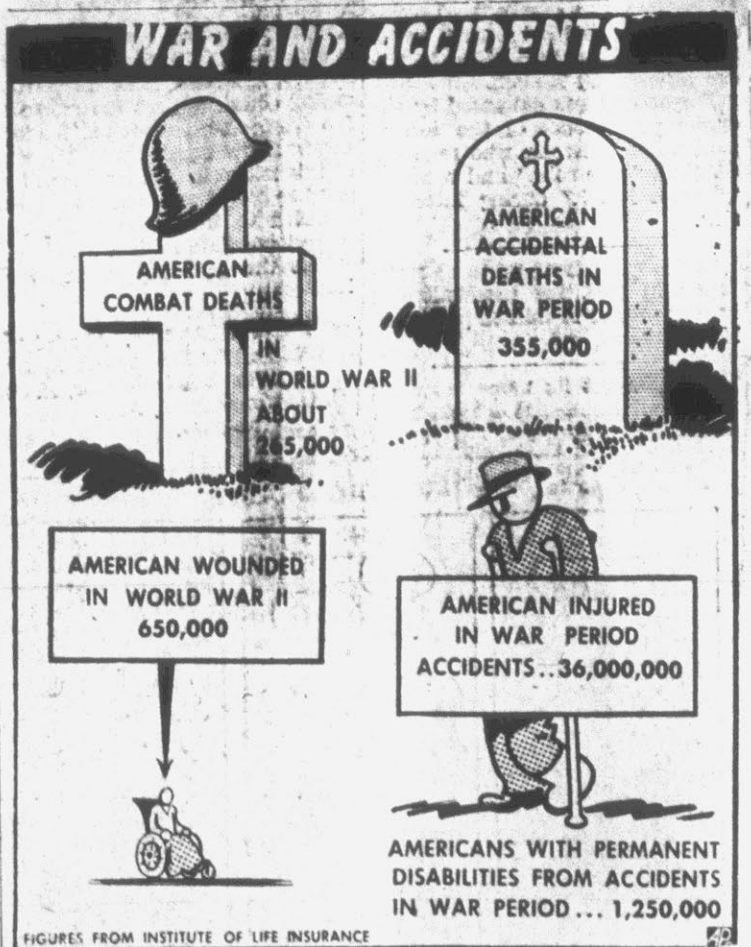

TRUE RELIGION WARMS THE HEART

One evening this past week I attended a religious service in a negro church. In the congregation that evening were two of the most distinguished scientists in this country. As we left the church, I talked with one of these men. He felt as I did that the service had warmed his heart as few services had attended in recent months.

It probably goes without saying that we were particularly impressed by the singing. A choir of negro men and women sang some of the old familiar hymns and added to them a quality with which most of us were unfamiliar. One hymn they sang runs as follows:

"In the furnace God may prove thee,
Thence to bring thee forth more bright;
But can never cease to love thee,
Thou art precious in his sight."

As we looked at those who sang, we realized that many had been proved in the fiery furnace of hard experience. Then as we looked into our own hearts, we knew that the religion which was so perfectly satisfying to these black brethren of ours was likewise the only variety of religion that was satisfying to us. Servants and employers, scientists and manual laborers, met that evening under the hospitable roof of God's house and confessed with joy their allegiance to the same faith.

As we left the church, we all understood better the Biblical declaration that God would have all men come to a knowledge of the truth.

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WASHINGTON DAYBOOK
By JACK STINNETT

Washington—Although acquaintances are beginning to ask Maj. Gen. Lewis B. Hershey, Selective Service director, what he's going to do after May 15 when the draft folds some inakers who think they know that Gen. Hershey and the draft will go right on for the time being anyway.

Here's the way they argue: In order to maintain the barest minimum of men in training for occupation replacements and policing strategic bases, it will be necessary either to continue the draft or set up universal military training. Although men in the latter would not be in the Army, it is believed that enough of them would enlist for additional service to fill the ranks.

Because of the controversy surrounding universal military service, Congress will dodge the issue as long as possible—at least putting it off until after the Fall elections.

Acceptance of the lesser evil—temporary extension of the draft—will be a necessity, unless our whole postwar military program is to be abandoned.

Gen. Hershey has nothing to say to all this but if he is making any definite plans to leave his job or Washington, he hasn't said anything about that either.

At any rate, you would think the big, red-headed, lumbering Hoosier who has been head of Selective Service since its inception in 1940 would be able to sit back and take things easy in these closing months. Such is far from the case.

Gen. Hershey has been more consistently in hot water than any top flight officer in this war. He's still there.

In spite of the fact that 100,000 boys reach age 18 every month, the inductions are running far short of the Army's required 50,000 a month. About 30,000 of the youngsters enlist in the Navy or Marine Corps before the draft can get at them; about half of the remainder are deferred for physical disabilities or other reasons. The inductions in December dropped to about 30,000.

Regardless of problems ahead or a possible end to the whole business, the tickle-faced general can look back on one of the greatest tasks of the war well done. In spite of criticism, in spite of almost inevitable inequities, the fact remains that Gen. Hershey's Selective Service raised the armed forces from virtually nothing to more than 12-



000,000 men.

A professional soldier since 1911 when he joined the Indiana National Guard, Hershey was "father of Selective Service" in more than name only. A student of the draft from World War I days, he was transferred from Hawaii to Washington in 1936 to head the Joint Army-Navy Selective Service Commission. In the next three years, he laid out the plan for screening the young men of the country into the greatest military machine on record.

When the draft came in 1940, the Hershey plan was ready—perhaps the only division of the armed forces that did have its plans ready for World War II.

The government proposed to do this: Pay the makers of the materials a subsidy. Wilson W. Wyatt, housing expediter, thinks these subsidies may cost the government \$600,000,000—money the government would never get back.

They'd look like this: The government would pay the maker of the materials the difference between the price the OPA allows him to charge and the price he needs to make a normal profit.

Un that way—although it's costing the government money—the price would be kept down and therefore the price of new houses. Congress still has to approve spending \$600,000,000 that way.

The government doesn't have actual price control on new houses but it's trying to keep down the prices this way:

Since many building materials are scarce, the government can allow them to be used only by builders of low-priced houses. Wyatt wants most of the materials to go into homes for veterans costing less than \$6,000.

But the lovely farm houses and the villages with their handsome churches and public buildings largely dissolved in the waters. Even the trees were killed.

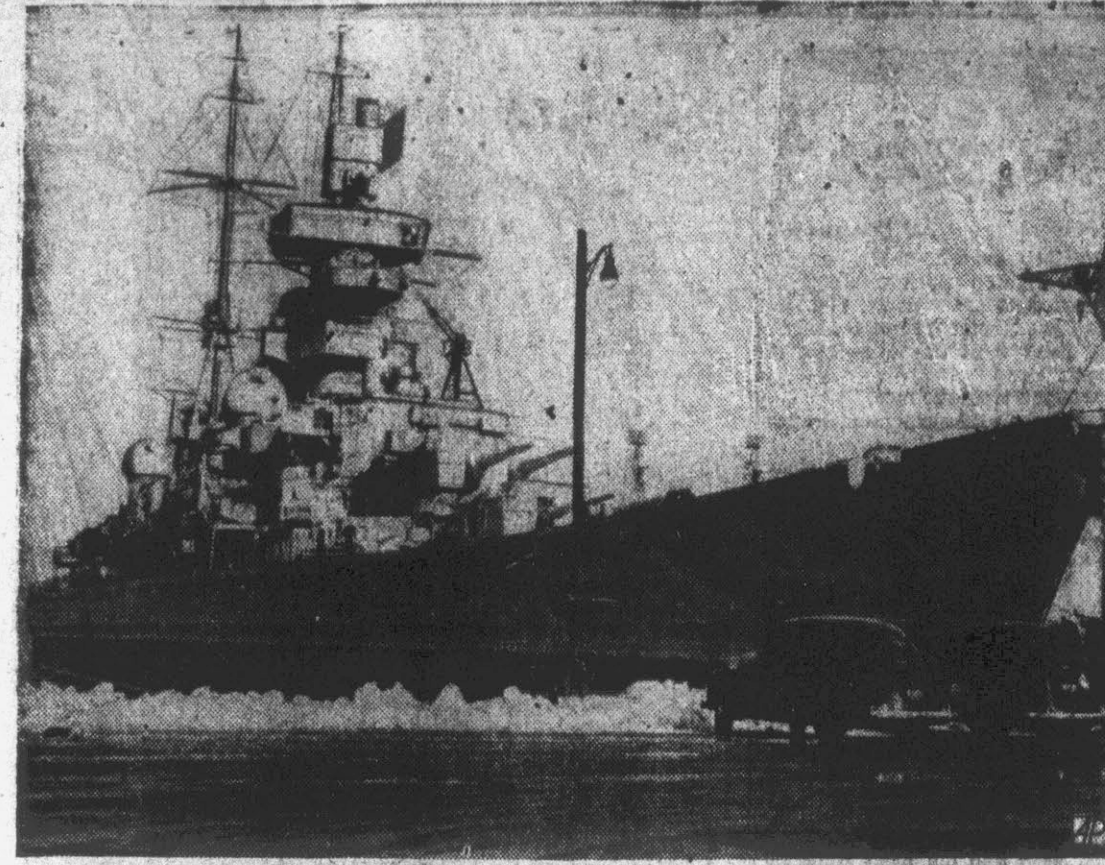

Committee Votes On NYC UNO Site

London, Feb. 13—(AP)—A United Nations assembly committee voted overwhelmingly today to establish temporary United Nations headquarters in New York City.

The committee rejected a proposal that the temporary site should be in San Francisco.

The action puts the site question up to the whole assembly.

The Westchester-Fairfield area of New York State and Connecticut had previously been recommended by the committee as permanent United Nations headquarters.

One other top issue, the Indonesian question, remained to be settled by the Security Council before the United Nations could adjourn its current meeting.

Trygve Lie, Secretary-General, was reported to have expressed the opinion the assembly would wind up its business by Friday night.

The Security Council was scheduled to meet at 9 p. m. (4 p. m. EST) to take up the Indonesian problem.

One other issue, the demand of Syria and Lebanon for evacuation of French and British troops from the Levant, appeared likely to come before the council however before it concludes its winter session.

A Lebanese delegate said negotiations for an outside settlement were almost completely deadlocked and "the matter will definitely go to the Security Council."

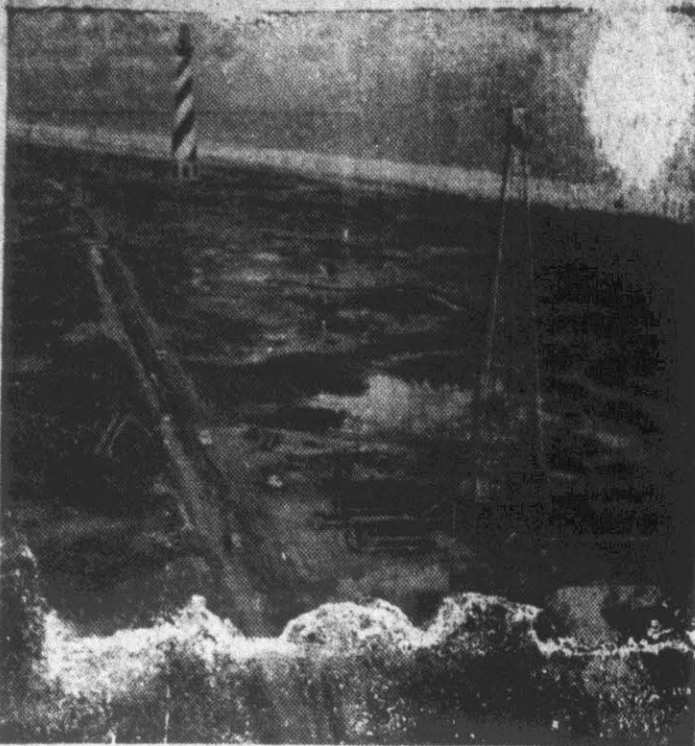
Poultry Feed May Be Cut By Gov't

Shanghai, Feb. 13—(AP)—China is conducting no secret negotiations with Russia regarding Manchuria or any other subject, Chiang Kai-Shek told Chinese and foreign newsmen in a brief press conference today.

He acknowledged "informal discussions" were being held however.

Chiang said that such discussions, concerning economic conditions in Manchuria, are continuing between Russia and China but there is no secret about them. In reply to a question as to when the Russians will withdraw from Manchuria, Chiang said only that they had been scheduled to withdraw Feb. 1. He did not elaborate.

once to Whorton, Clark said he had established to his own satisfaction that Whorton was connected only with Davenport's fruit business and not with the loans operations.

All of the five co-defendants turned State's evidence and told of their connections with Davenport and of the latter's scheme to collect deposits at five per cent interest per week from thousands of investors.

Mrs. Powers testified

that to her own knowledge the firm took in \$1,904,000 in the five months she was employed by the firm.

In arguing for a non-suit today, Attorney Berkley charged that the State had not proven Davenport guilty of conspiracy to defraud, since the checks he issued as security for the deposits made with him were in effect promissory notes and not actually checks.

However, the State has produced evidence to show that all of the depositors who invested money and accepted checks as security were told the checks could be cashed at Davenport's New Bern bank at any time.

Mrs. Davenport, who has occupied a chair beside her husband since the trial began, broke down today and wept silently as counsel for her husband pleaded the motion to quash. Mrs. Davenport was said to have been a patient in a Morganton sanatorium during the entire time of her husband's expanded loans business, being released on the day after he was arrested.

Willard I. Gatling, chief of the State Bureau of Investigation, was the State's final witness, though both Whorton and Boyles were brought back to the stand briefly. Gatling told of the SBI's investigation of the "Big Apple" loans operations and said he warned Davenport on several occasions while the investigation was under way that Davenport was headed for prison unless he liquidated his business entirely.

Gatling said he was first ordered to make the investigation by Governor Broughton in April, 1944. His findings resulted in the closing of all "Big Apple" stores late in August on an order from Solicitor D. M. Clark.

Arguments on the non-suit motion will continue this afternoon and Davenport himself is expected to take the stand in his own behalf.

employ who won't stick up for him. "He stuck up for us," they say.

President Roosevelt named him to take over one of the big programs designed to prime business pumps—the Public Works Administration. On the fifth anniversary of the FWA in 1918 Ickes announced that his agency had made allotments for more than 26,000 projects, costing nearly four and a half billion dollars. Few communities failed to get some share.

In this job, Ickes had spent so much federal money, gained the name "Honest Harold."

In his actual work as interior secretary Ickes took care of the country for the nation. He had the problems of reclamation, of development (and later of conservation) of coal and oil, and of the minerals which became so important when war struck.

He built hundreds of dams, from Grand Coulee on down, planned many more, and provided vast tons of electrical power for individual communities.

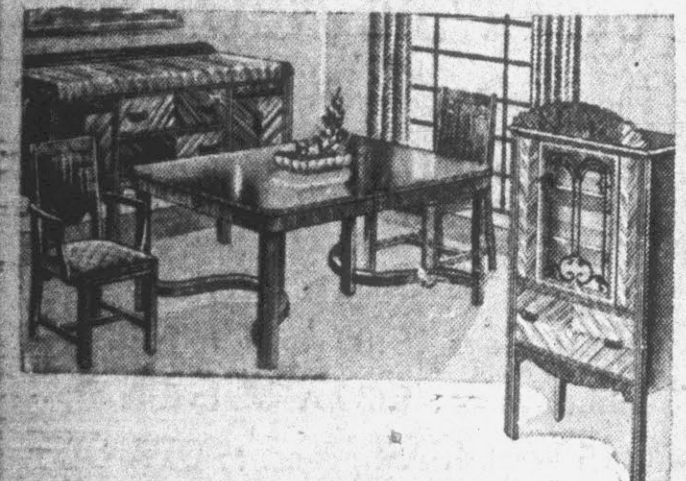

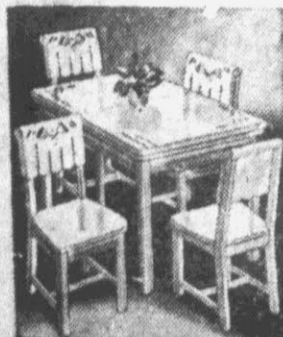

Washington, Feb. 13—(AP)—The number of veterans receiving unemployment payments under the GI Bill of Rights swept upward to 962,890 for the week ending Feb. 2. The previous week the number was 840,743.

The amount paid reached \$23,833,635, up from \$20,828,262.

The Veterans Administration said the figures did not show the actual number without jobs for the period because issuing the checks requires two weeks or more.

The trend has been steadily upward for weeks. One factor has been the volume of discharges.

Under the GI Bill striking veterans are not eligible for payments.

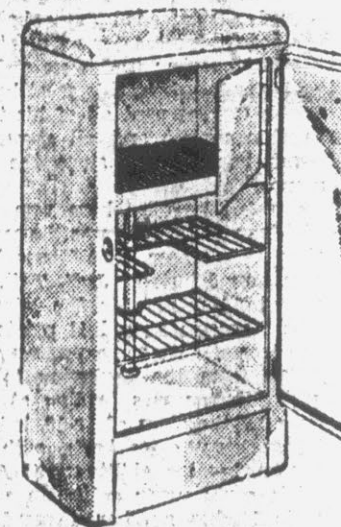

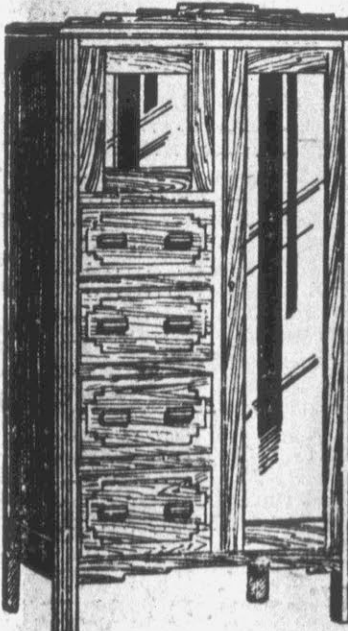
