Ickes' Exit Put Truman On Spot

Blistering Resignation By Cabinet Member Places President In Worst Political Position Of His Career; Justice Department Called Upon To Investigate Pauley

Washington, Feb. 14.—(AP)—The explosive exit of Harold Ickes from the Cabinet shored President Truman today onto the toughest political spot of his White House career.

In abrupt language, Ickes declared the President's Cabinet was one in which he could no longer serve and "retain my self-respect."

In even blunter fashion, Ickes called upon the Justice Department to investigate the truth of testimony which Edwin W. Pauley, Mr. Truman's nominee for undersecretary of navy, has given in Senate hearings on his qualifications. Ickes categorically charged that Pauley made statements under oath which were not true.

This slam-bank leave-taking of the man who has directed the Department of Interior since 1933 posed these immediate problems for Mr. Truman:

1. He has to select a new secretary of the interior, and he was reported to be seeking an appointee of such caliber that the nomination would tend to offset the circumstances of Ickes' resignation.

2. He faces the job of repairing whatever damage has been done in party ranks. Congressional elections come up this fall, with a presidential contest ahead in 1948—and Ickes long has had a substantial following in the New Deal wing of the party.

3. He must decide whether to press for Pauley's confirmation to the navy post, despite the fresh handicaps posed by Ickes' bitter attack.

4. He has to neutralize the political dynamite which Ickes created in a post-resignation statement that he did not care to continue in an administration where it is expected to commit perjury for the sake of a party.

The end may not yet. Ickes indicated he may have more to say about his charges that Pauley, California oil man, suggested to him (Continued on page four)

UNO PREPARES TO CLOSE ITS LAST MEETING

Agenda Is Cleared For Adjournment of Fifty-One Nation Assembly Today

London, Feb. 14.—(AP)—The United Nations General Assembly, moving swiftly toward the close of its first session, was expected to clear the way for adjournment today by quick approval of New York City and the nearby New York Connecticut area as the temporary and permanent homes of the UNO.

As the 51 nation assembly was called for what may be its final meeting of the session, informed persons predicted the sites as approved by the headquarters committee would easily get the necessary two-thirds vote required for adoption.

Other questions before the assembly were expected to be disposed of without difficulty. These included a five-power resolution calling for world-wide conservation and equitable distribution of foods and a proposal linking the World Federation of Trade Unions and the American Federation of Labor with the Economic and Social Council in an advisory capacity.

The 11 nation Security Council, which last night disposed of the controversial Indonesian case, was expected to remain in session after the adjournment of the assembly. Officials said it might not finish its business before Friday night, or even later.

The council still was faced with Syrian-Lebanese demands for withdrawal of British and French troops from the Levant.

The French have demanded deletion from the Syrian-Lebanese complaint of a statement that French troops in the Levant constitute a constant menace to peace and security. A Lebanese delegate said direct negotiations with the French were virtually deadlocked.

The council cleared its agenda of all other issues except the Levant dispute last night by voting against intervening in Indonesia and by deferring action on an Albanian application for UNO membership.

The Indonesian issue was marked "closed" by Council President N. J. O. Makin of Australia, after the council refused to send a committee to investigate the Indonesian situation, and declined to adopt a resolution which would have restricted British military activity in the area.

The Soviet Ukraine sought the commission investigation, but only Russia and Poland favored it in a council vote.

DAVENPORT WITNESSES TAKE STAND

Prominent Carolinians Are Character Witnesses For Defendant

Continuing its efforts to prove Roderick Davenport not guilty of charges of conspiracy to defraud and fraud by false pretense, counsel for the former New Bern produce dealer placed on the stand in Pitt County Superior Court today more than a dozen prominent eastern North Carolinians who testified as to the defendant's good character.

Davenport himself took the stand yesterday to tell his version of the "Big Apple" loans brokerage business which operated extensively throughout eastern North Carolina during 1944. Davenport was placed on the stand as the defense's key witness.

Shortly after Solicitor D. M. Clark had rested the state's case yesterday, Judge J. Paul Prizelle denied defense motions to quash the indictment and for a non-suit of the charges against the 49-year-old World War One veteran.

Judge Prizelle, who is presiding over the special term of court which began here February 4, gave the defense permission to place their character witnesses on the stand out of order, a policy he followed yesterday when several witnesses testified to Davenport's good character before he began his own operations.

Taking the stand to testify as to Davenport's character were the following witnesses:

Nimitz Tells Congress Plans For The Future

EXPERIMENTAL TREK DELAYED
Below-Freezing Gales Prevent Departure Of Observers

Washington, Feb. 14.—(AP)—Adm. Chester W. Nimitz told Congress today the Navy's carrier fleet may make any atomic air attack on this country "very difficult."

At the same time, the Chief of Naval Operations said submarines hold promise of becoming "the most successful vehicle for carrying atomic weapons to within short distances of coastal targets."

Appearing before the Senate Naval Committee to present the Navy's recommendations for the postwar fleet, Nimitz brought with him charts which showed plans for:

A system of 53 overseas bases for ships and planes—33 in the Pacific and 20 in the Atlantic-Caribbean area.

A navy manned, afloat and ashore, by 500,000 enlisted men and 58,000 officers.

An active fleet of 319 combatant vessels, part of a total fleet of 1,679 active, ready reserve and laid-up ships distributed in the two oceans.

An aerial striking force of 3,731 aircraft, 2,180 based on carriers.

In his prepared testimony Nimitz said "There is no doubt that the use of atomic explosives and other new weapons will have a profound effect on the composition and employment of armies, navies and air forces in the future."

Declaring that while the ships, together with armies and cities, are vulnerable, the admiral added "ships are difficult and unprofitable targets for atomic bombing" and almost impossible targets for super rockets.

"The ability of our carrier task forces to prevent penetration by hostile aircraft may make atomic bombing very difficult."

"The submarine may be expected to have continued and increased employment in the future. At sea it is relatively immune to atomic bombing and also to radar detection." (Continued on page four)

Seeds Of Nazism Still Live In Our Homeland

Frankfurt, Germany, Feb. 14.—(AP)—U. S. headquarters disclosed today that Americans in the United States had written letters to Germans criticizing the Allies praising the Germans, attacking the U. S. government and lamenting the bombing of German cities.

The army said the letters were intercepted as clandestine correspondence and added that while only a small portion of the mail was critical, that part was violently so. Correspondence in or out of Germany for Germans is forbidden at the present time.

"The end of this cursed war brought us very little joy," a resident of Buffalo, N. Y., wrote. "It began with lies and crime and ended the same way. I wonder how long this fool party of a Hitler trial will go. When that is over the honorable judges can start to cut each others' throats with atomic bombs."

A U. S. finance office employee in Los Angeles wrote: "There is no point in going into the political angle of the war. We Americans are aware of much intrigues and corrupt deceit toward our people by our government but we are helpless just as most people in any country are."

A Pennsylvanian, writing to a friend in Mannheim, said: "We are England's slaves, so we helped England in the first World War to protect her 1,500 lords through American blood and four billion dollars. Thus England won the war."

Union Officials Agree To Arbitrate Dispute That Paralyzed N.Y.C.

New York, Feb. 14.—(AP)—New York City's staggering tugboat strike felt by millions because of disrupted fuel lifelines, ended officially at 8 a. m. (EST) today but the city was snapping back to normalcy even before that hour.

Union officials last night ordered the 3,500 men who run the harbor's tugs back to work following agreement with their 91 employers to arbitrate a wage dispute which precipitated the 10-day, city-paralyzing strike.

Schools, shut down for lack of heat, reopened today—but the brownout of electric lighting was slated to end at 6 p. m. tonight. Heating of subways was resumed last night.

There were some lingering effects of the strike, however. Fuel oil rationing controls were left in force until adequate stocks could be built up, and other emergency regulations were continued until activities generally could be restored to a pre-strike basis.

Mayor William O'Dwyer announced that differences in the dispute would be arbitrated by a three-man board headed by Edward F. McGarry, former assistant secretary of Labor.

Meanwhile, there was no word from the government, which had seized the tugboat industry, as to when it would give up its control.

The walkout came to an end as the city was shaking off the effects of an 18-hour "shutdown," a fuel conservation measure, which brought commercial, industrial and amusement activity to standstill.

Fewer Veterans Are Returning To Farms

Chattanooga, Tenn., Feb. 14.—(AP)—Assistant Secretary of Agriculture Charles F. Brannan said today he had observed "no evidence of the expected large scale postwar back-to-the-farm movement."

Farms are still short of manpower and there has been very little disposition so far on the part of farm people who were employed in wartime industry to go back to farming," the former Colorado rancher added in an interview.

"There are fewer veterans returning to the farms than we expected," he asserted.

Brannan is visiting demonstration farms in the Tennessee Valley with a group of agricultural specialists from North Carolina and Georgia and officials of the Tennessee Valley Authority.

Safety First

Motor vehicle drivers in all of the 27 northern counties in this patrol district will be urged by patrolmen to drive carefully and help to avoid the numerous wrecks, especially during weekends, in which many persons are killed and numbers are injured.

The police departments are cooperating with the highway patrol and both groups will distribute a wonderful article on safety first, reprinted from the *Safety's Digest*. The Highway Patrol solicits the cooperation of everybody in the campaign to avoid motor vehicle accidents.

F.D.R. Estate Seeks '45 Tax Exemptions

New York, Feb. 14.—(AP)—Attorneys for the estate of Franklin D. Roosevelt today were seeking a state tax department ruling on whether the late President was exempt from 1945 state personal income taxes because he was commander-in-chief of the armed forces when he died.

William F. Snyder, member of the law firm of O'Connor and Furber, said yesterday that the state tax department was asked whether Mr. Roosevelt's position made him a soldier within the meaning of the income tax law. Snyder said the ruling was asked Feb. 5.

The law grants a year's tax exemption to service men who died while in service. Mr. Roosevelt died at Warm Springs, Ga., last April 12.

An Analysis Of The News

The Hague, Feb. 14.—(AP)—Prime Minister Schermerhorn has paid this column the compliment of asking it to perform a friendly mission for Holland by emphasizing to America his assurances that not only his government but the people of the Netherlands as a whole are anxious to see Indonesia gain self government and within a fixed period freedom of choice for its own status.

This is by way of being a historic recognition of the great politico-social tide which is sweeping our world. It isn't often given a reporter of foreign affairs—even if he has been dealing with statesmen for a generation, as has your correspondent—to hear the prime minister of an empire thus emphasize the mother country's desire to see one of her most cherished possessions become a sovereign state.

Here it may be useful to interpolate that Dr. Schermerhorn has a wide reputation for being a humanitarian. He abandoned a college professorship to enter politics. During the war he led a Free Dutch underground movement and the Germans had him in a concentration camp for a couple of years. Recently he joined the Socialists

labor party. Still in his sunny years, he is a man of strong personality and direct speech. More than incidentally, he has a big and captivating smile, which must be a great asset to him in making friends.

The prime minister's request came at the end of an interview on the general welfare of Holland. He was saying goodbye to Mrs. Mack and me in his private office when he reverted to the Indonesian situation, which naturally had been among the subjects of our discussion.

"If you want to perform a good-will mission for Holland," he said, "you can do so by making her position regarding Indonesia clear to America. I am afraid there is a misunderstanding in your country, and the good opinion of our friends in the United States means much to us. I should like to get across the message that not only has the Netherlands government pledged itself to the final independence of Indonesia but that the majority of the people of Holland are being the government in this action."

It was more than a request. The prime minister's earnestness made it a plea for better understanding. Earlier Dr. Schermerhorn had spoken in warm terms of the Indonesian situation. (Continued on page four)

VETERANS GET NEW PRIORITY

House Committee Seeks To Aid Vets Wanting Surplus War Goods

By CLAIR JOHNSON
Washington, Feb. 14 — (AP) — The House Expenditures Committee went to bat today for veterans seeking surplus war goods.

Chairman Manasco (D-Ala.) described this as one of the chief aims of the group as it opened hearings on legislation to overhaul completely the Surplus Property Disposal Act.

The committee also will investigate thoroughly, he said, reports of hoarding or destruction of war supplies by the Army or Navy.

Manasco told newsmen he thought the group would approve a change in the law to give veterans a higher priority position than they now have.

At present they are topped in the priority scale by federal, state and local governments and their political subdivisions.

"I feel certain that the committee and the Congress will place veterans directly under the federal government for priority purposes," Manasco asserted.

He also expressed hope that legislation could be written making it unnecessary for veterans to have priority certificates to obtain surplus purchases.

"Their discharge papers ought to be enough," he said.

In overhauling the disposal act, Manasco also said he would seek a change to permit exchange of excess war supplies abroad for trade and aviation concessions.

J. H. Rose Addresses N.C.E.A. & Teachers

Last night the local chapter of the North Carolina Education Association and Classroom Teachers held a joint dinner meeting at the Episcopal Parish House. At the meeting Mr. J. H. Rose, superintendent of city schools, spoke on the system for rating teachers according to merit now being studied. Afterwards new NCEA officers were elected.

In his address Mr. Rose emphasized the fact that as yet no definite system of rating teachers has been presented, the commission appointed by the governor has no authority to propose a system, only to study and recommend. He said the arguments for rating teachers according to merit lies in the belief of the public that teachers salaries are good enough to attract and hold the best teachers, but that they, like others in public service, should be paid according to service rendered. A properly administered merit salary schedule should "stimulate individual improvement and reward

exceptional merit, be flexible and applicable to exceptional teachers, stimulate self-criticism, provide recognition necessary to encourage a teachers to raise his maximum efficiency level."

"Those arguments opposing merit rating lie in the fact that, as yet, a good teacher has not been defined, nor has any agreement on what constitutes a good teacher been established. No reliable means of measuring teaching efficiency has been developed. Merit rating stifles expression of individuality, destroys teacher morale, and endangers relationship between teacher and supervisors, this type of rating tends to unionize teachers and to promote ill feeling toward teachers who receive higher ratings."

The Nominating Committee composed of Mrs. D. M. Clary, chairman, Mrs. Emily Hadley, Mrs. Lois Marshall and Miss Estelle Greene, presented the slate of new officers for the NCEA. Those persons selected by acclamation were: President, Miss Louise Golphing; vice-president, Miss Elizabeth Norman; secretary and treasurer, Miss Laura Foley. Members then cast their ballots for the officers of the state organization.

O. E. Dowd, president of the local chapter of NCEA, presided. Miss Ruth Modlin, president of the local classroom teachers, formally welcomed the teachers. The dinner was prepared and served by members of St. Mary's Auxiliary of the Episcopal Church.

N.C. Businessmen Meet In Raleigh

A meeting of the Board of Directors of the North Carolina Merchants Association held in Raleigh on February 11th, was attended by practically all of the fifty directors from all sections of the state. Included in the business of the meeting were: the election of J. H.

Blount, of Greenville, to the Executive Committee; a resolution urging a change in pricing policies of the OPA to a normal percentage of mark-up for retailers; a resolution urging the Civilian Production Administration to insure tobacco farmers an adequate supply of tobacco twine; a motion petitioning North Carolina congressmen to use their influence to eliminate federal tax discriminations given "cooperatives" over competing tax-paying businesses; that the Association become a sponsor of the "Credit Bureau and Merchants Association Management Institute" which is to be held at the University of North Carolina in August.

ONWARD CHRISTIAN SOLDIERS

When Baring-Gould the great hymn writer wrote these words in 1865, he was giving expression to one of the most valid conceptions of the Christian faith. Christians are often, erroneously thought of as meek, submissive, and rather spineless creatures. Christ himself is often pictured as a weak, yielding, and rather pathetic figure. The cross is held up as a reproach to a wicked world. The ascetic ideal, with its negative virtues, is considered by many the almost perfect expression of Christianity.

But certainly this is a complete distortion of our faith. Christians, as Baring-Gould says, are soldiers. They have before them the greatest battle that ever faced a conqueror. Filled with determination, they are never submissive to evil. Their meekness, far from being a cowardly submission, becomes a terrifying weapon against the forces of evil. The cross, their battle standard, is no reproach to a wicked world but a challenge to evil itself.

Christians spurn the easy escapism of those who would withdraw themselves from life and spend their hours in pious contemplation. Christians worthy of the name are vital human beings, brushing elbows with teeming humanity.

In all this they imitate Christ himself who was a virile man, possessing strength, courage, and magnetism. He created the most effective army the world has ever known, and his recruits were Jewish peasants and fishermen.

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WASHINGTON DAYBOOK

By JACK STINNETT

Washington — Because a Greek business man threatened to picket the Maritime Commission with 30 bearded priests of the Greek Catholic Church, persons in his war-devastated native land are now getting a regular flow of packages from relatives and friends in this country. James A. Booras who, with his brother in Greece, operates the Greek Railway Express, started last June in his efforts to get shipping space for individual packages containing much-needed clothing, medicines and other necessities for the war-stricken people.

Both UNRRA and the State Department were interested in Booras' appeal to aid the Greeks in this manner but no ships were available. Nine days before the Gripsholm sailed in late August, J. E. Saugstad, chief of the shipping division of the State Department, notified Booras that space had been allocated.

Through Greek language newspapers and the church, Booras sent out the good word. In order to facilitate loading, packages were accepted at the Jersey City pier. For nine days, there was an almost unbroken line of persons with packages for friends and relatives on the other side. The space was not all used when the Gripsholm sailed, but a few more days would have done it. Booras went to work immediately to get more space. Through September and October, packages piled up at his New York office, but no ships. He appealed directly to President Truman and was referred to Adm. Emory S. Land, chairman of the Maritime Commission. The federal wheels ground as slowly as they usually do until Booras threatened to picket the commission with Greek priests.

That did it. In November, Booras was allocated 30,000 cubic feet on the John W. Gates and now has a monthly allocation of that amount. Booras is a business man, of course, but his program to get the Greeks back on a self-sustaining basis as quickly as possible not only has won the approval of UNRRA and the State Department but has attracted the attention of other war-ravaged land Representatives of Italy, Yugoslavia, Belgium and Norway already have asked Booras for an outline of his operation.

He is working on a plan now to ship thousands of packages of seeds to Greece this spring and as soon as the freighters come along to ship over 5,000 cows, timed to arrive so

that calves will be born soon after the cows are settled in their new homes.

It is this phase of the plan that has appealed so strongly to UNRRA for every person put on a self-sustaining basis means one less on the relief rolls.

"The Greeks are a proud people," says Booras. "They don't want charity. Give them the tools to work with, seeds and cows and they will be taking care of themselves sooner than you would think possible."

in expressing his liking for them and for their beautiful land. "They are a fine and capable people," he said, "and are just as entitled to sovereignty as art the Philippines."

We spoke of the government's announcement last Sunday, offering to establish a "commonwealth of Indonesia."

The prime minister agreed with my suggestion that this plan appeared to contemplate a structure similar to that of the British commonwealth, in which the dominions are independent but voluntarily remain within the partnership.

I asked him if he thought a settlement would be reached between his government and the Indonesians. He nodded but then qualified his nod in this way: "It certainly provides ground for negotiation. Sjahrir (prime minister of the unrecognized Indonesian Republic) is a clever man and he is reasonable. He will recognize this as the basis for discussions."

We came away with the feeling that Dr. Schermerhorn believed a settlement on the basis of a Dutch commonwealth of nations was on its way.

In 1944 that \$300,000 could be raised from interested oil men for the Democratic campaign fund if the government did not push its suit to establish title to off-shore oil lands. It was President Truman's comment that Ickes could have been mistaken in this testimony that brought the resignation.

The Senate Naval Committee resumes hearings on the Pauley nomination next week, with Pauley scheduled to offer a rebuttal to the Ickes testimony. Ickes told reporters his own reappearance before the committee "depends on what Pauley has to say Monday."

It was generally agreed that the capital has seldom seen such a sharp exchange between a cabinet member and his President. Ickes offered his resignation as secretary of interior effective March 31. Mr. Truman pointedly made the effective date February 15, in accepting it, and added "I also consider that this terminates all of your other governmental activities."

To this Ickes fired back in another letter: "I assure you that I have had no secret design, having resigned as secretary of the interior, to hold on to any other office under your jurisdiction."

And finally there was Ickes' parting broadside in a radio speech last night, declaring he could not "retain my self-respect and stay in the Cabinet of President Truman."

tion. It may be the most successful vehicle for carrying atomic weapons to within short distances of coastal targets and for enduring accuracy in the use of guided missiles.

Future warfare, Nimitz said, "may for us resolve itself largely into a struggle for the possession of air bases—bases from which an enemy might bomb us effectively and from which we might effectively bomb an enemy. The fundamental purpose of naval operations will continue to be the defeat of our enemies at the greatest possible distance from our own shores."

Shortly before court recessed yesterday, Davenport asserted he hired J. Faison Thompson, Goldsboro attorney, to represent him in mid-July, 1944 and paid him a \$750 retainer. Then Davenport testified he had not paid the attorney another fee before he was arrested.

Witnesses for the state previously had testified that the Goldsboro branch of the "Big Apple" carried a freight and drayage account which was used only to pay Thompson's "salary" and to pay the Goldsboro police to follow up letters written by Thompson to delinquent loan borrowers.

Again today, Davenport's attorneys introduced articles written by Lynn Nisbett of Raleigh, correspondent for the Association of Afternoon Dailies, which purported to show that an investigation of Davenport's loans activities had failed to show it was illegal, and that both Davenport and his depositors were violating only an usury state.

Mrs. Elizabeth Gold Swindell, manager of the Wilson Daily Times, took the stand for the second time during the current trial to identify the papers in which the articles appeared. C. A. Eury, business manager of the New Bern Sun-Journal, also testified as to Davenport's good character before the loans business started.

When the defense again started placing character witnesses on the stand and while its staff of lawyers were searching for more newspaper articles which are to be introduced, Judge Frizzelle ordered court recessed for noon.

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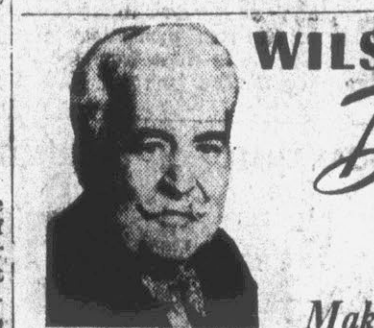

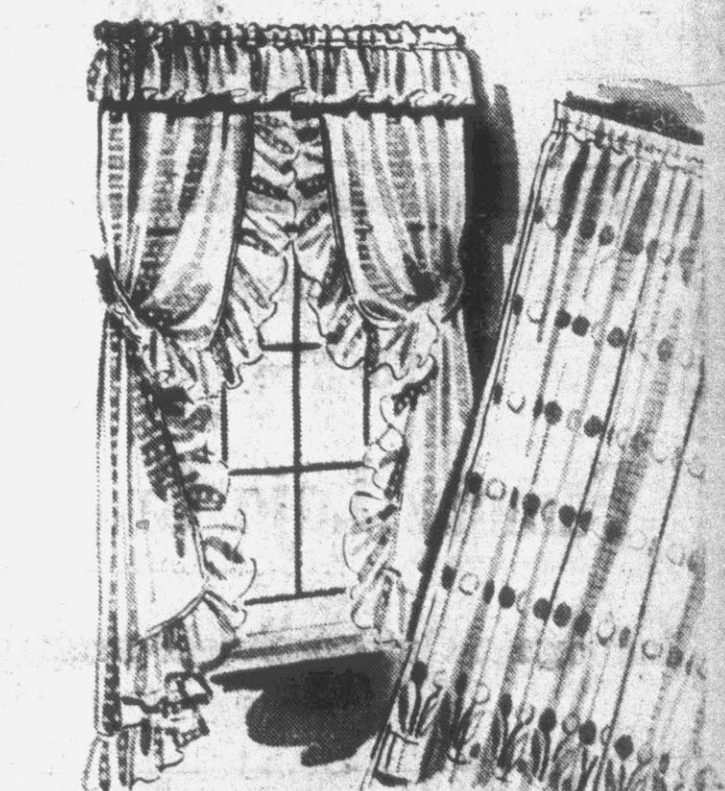

Fellowship's Aid Helped Research

As the Greenville Branch of the American Association of University Women lays plans for its annual contribution to its fund to provide study fellowships for a certain number of outstanding women in research, it shares with other units in the country a particular pride in the work done by former holders of the fellowships in many fields vital to the war effort.

Because of a tendency to say that the subjects chosen for research by AAUW fellows are impractical, it is well to consider the work of just one typical holder of a fellowship. Dr. Gertrude Rand (Research Fellow, 1921-23).

Her work on factors affecting vision is now all over the world, and she has been acting as consultant to the army and navy, particularly on testing the eyesight of pilots.

The delicate instruments which she and her husband, Dr. C. E. Perree, devised for testing reactions of the eye are used by the U. S. Air Force, and by the Canadians and Chinese; and the Russian government sent for a complete set of their scientific papers.

Similar contributions have been made by outstanding women scholars.

It was the Swedish Association of University Women which gave Dr. Lise Meitner, Nazi refugee, the opportunity to continue her research work in Sweden.

During the war many former fellows were asked to put much needed skills at the service of the government. They carried on scientific research, helped develop government programs in public health and nutrition, gave courses useful in military and government service, did translations, supplied information on little known cultures and countries, advised on technical problems, and in numerous other ways made contributions which were possible because of their special training.

Kai-Shek Addresses Enthusiastic Crowd

Shanghai, Feb. 14.—(AP)—Chiang Kai-Shek, in an impassioned address, declared today that with extraterritoriality abolished "we no longer have to live as slaves and beasts of burden."

Nearly half a million persons, jammed into the big Shanghai race course, heard the generalissimo.

"We are free and independent," he shouted, gesticulating with white-gloved hands. "I return to you the responsibility of preserving these sovereign rights forever."

He was flanked by Madame Chiang, Lt. Gen. Albert C. Wedemeyer, commander of American forces in China; Vice Adm. Charles M. Cooke, Jr., commander of the U. S. Seventh Fleet; Maj. Gen. Clair Chennault, Mayor Chien Tai-Chun and dozens of other top military and civil officials.

The crowd, termed by police the largest gathering in the history of this most populous city of China, cheered and waved flags.

POULTRY FEED.

Washington, Feb. 13.—(AP)—Drastic government steps may be taken soon to force a sharp cut in poultry flocks as one means of helping grain hungry people abroad.

One of the reasons the United States suddenly discovered that its stocks of wheat are too low to keep up present domestic consumption and still meet export commitments is that large amounts of the grain have been diverted into poultry feeds.

To stop such feeding of wheat, the Agriculture Department may issue an order forbidding its use in the manufacture of mixed chicken feeds.

Such an order is being considered by Department officials in connection with President Truman's wheat conservation directive last week. At that time the Chief Executive ordered action by government agencies to place Americans on dark flour and bread, to prohibit the use of wheat in making beer and whiskey, and to discourage its use as a livestock feed.

HEAD IN THE CLOUDS

Worland, Wyo., Feb. 14.—(AP)—Any plans Herman Rauchfuss of Worland and Henry Schmidt of Lovell had for raising cattle on the planets of Mars or Pluto have been more or less left in space.

The two war veterans applied to the U. S. Grazing Service for land on Mars and said they were offered instead grazing rights on Pluto.

Now—what with Pluto so far off (and considering other disadvantages) — the two have obtained equipment and will go into the road construction business.

Says Rauchfuss: "We are getting down to earth."
