

Lewis Calls For UMW Policy Meet

Head Of United Mine Workers No. 12 To Announce Intentions; Lancaster Transit Workers Ending 16 Day Walkout; CIO-UAW Make No Progress In GMC Dispute

John L. Lewis today called a meeting March 11 of the United Mine Workers Policy Committee, the body which has authority to reopen the union's contract with soft coal operators—and transit workers voted to end their 16 day walkout at Lancaster, Pa., which had snowballed into a general AFL sympathy strike call.

These were the day's major developments along the labor front:
1. Lewis made no announcement of his intentions after a day and a half of conferences with his district presidents. The present UMW contract expires April 11 provided either side gives notice to that effect within 30 days prior to that time.

2. Bus and trolley operators at Lancaster ratified a union-management agreement which they said provided a 12 cent an hour wage increase. The strikers originally had demanded 20 cents.

3. Edgar L. Warren, director of the federal conciliation service, agreed to intervene in an effort to avert a threatened nationwide telephone strike. Joseph A. Beirne, president of the National Federation of Telephone Workers, had requested government intervention in the federation's wage dispute, promising no strike would be called "until after we have talked with you."

4. The CIO United Auto Workers in Detroit reported the union was "as far apart as we were 10 days ago" in reaching agreement with the General Motors Corporation on the issues of wages and promotion preference on a seniority basis.

5. Resumption of a power strike in the vital Pittsburgh industrial area was set for 12:01 a.m. February 25 but negotiations for a settlement of a wage dispute will continue until the deadline. The independent employees of the Duquesne Light Company conducted a 19 hour work stoppage earlier this month, affecting 1,500,000 consumers.

Union and management representatives reached an agreement in Lancaster early today to end the 16-day transit strike which had seriously interfered with business in the Pennsylvania community of 60,000, but the agreement was to be submitted to the AFL union membership for ratification.

Terms of the settlement in the dispute involving wages and other issues were not immediately disclosed. (Continued on Page Eight)

Joseph Daniels Is Given Gold Medal

Charlotte, Feb. 21.—(AP)—Joseph Daniels, Raleigh publisher, will be awarded a Gold Medal for distinguished service in furthering interfaith relations, at a public meeting, tonight.

Dr. E. L. Hillman of Rocky Mount, president of the North Carolina Council of Churches, will present the award, and Bernard Baruch, financier and intimate of statesmen, will make the principal address.

The medal is awarded annually by the Carolina Israelite, and the presentation will be a feature of the observance of Brotherhood Week, sponsored by the National Conference of Christians and Jews.

BAN OF DRAFT ARMIES GAINS NEW SUPPORT

Plan For Worldwide Agreement Outlawing Peacetime Conscription Before Board

Washington, Feb. 21.—(AP)—A proposed international ban on peacetime draft armies developed strong support today in the House Military Committee.

Growing favor for the idea came to light as the committee neared the end of three months of hearings on legislation for a universal military training program for the United States.

Chairman May (D-Ky.) told reporters the committee would take no action on universal training bills until it has considered a separate proposal urging the President to use his influence to bring about an international agreement outlawing peacetime conscription.

This proposal was introduced last year by Rep. Joseph W. Martin, Jr., House Republican leader, and will be the subject of committee hearings tentatively set for next Wednesday.

Martin said at the time he introduced his resolution that he did not believe the United States should adopt universal training until every effort had been made to outlaw it throughout the world.

TRUMAN STILL BACKS PAULEY

Oil Man Confident; Disregards Demand Of Withdrawal

Washington, Feb. 21.—(AP)—President Truman said today he intended to back Edwin W. Pauley to the limit in his fight for confirmation as navy undersecretary.

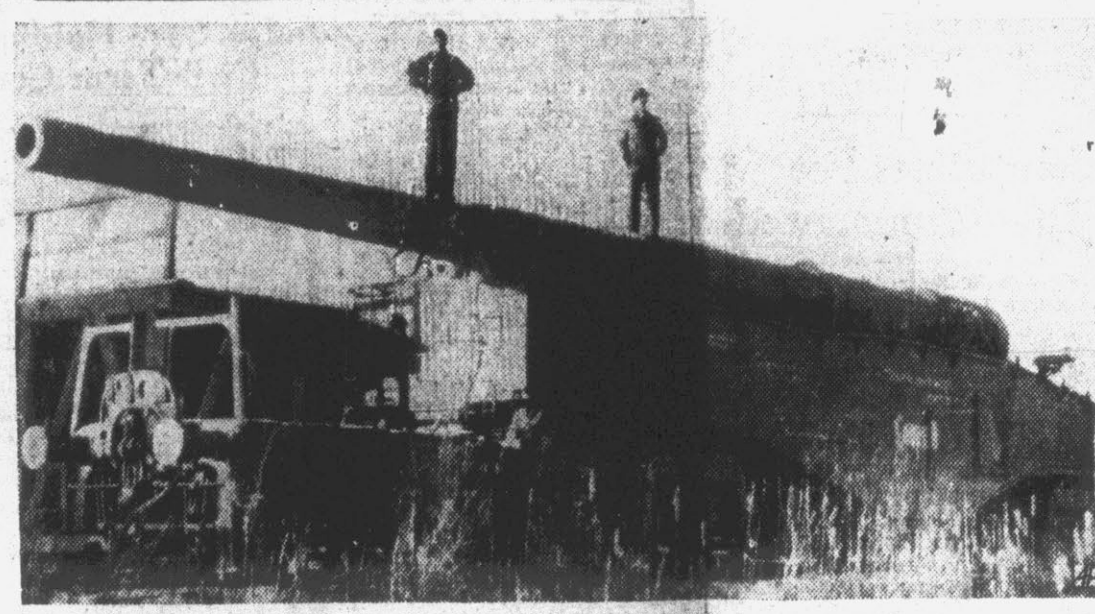
The President told his news conference he usually backed any man he was for, when asked whether the suggestion of Senator Stewart (D-Tenn.) that Pauley should withdraw would change his attitude.

A reporter, repeating a question that has been asked of the President at two previous news conferences, wanted to know whether Mr. Truman intended to withdraw Pauley's nomination. The President gave a flat No.

Pauley, meanwhile brushed aside demands that he ask Mr. Truman to withdraw his nomination.

With the Senate Naval Committee's investigation of his qualifications in recess until next Tuesday, Pauley told a reporter he wants his name to go to a Senate vote because he is confident he will be confirmed.

The President also has predicted the California oil man and former treasurer of the Democratic National Committee will be approved, but Democratic leaders have yet to. (Continued on Page Two)

Indian Mutiny And Cairo Rioteers Become Serious

Naval Vessels Seized By Mutinous Seamen, British Troops In Pitched Battle In Bombay; Egyptians Attack Army Barracks: Britain's Empire Out-Posts Face Crises

Washington, Feb. 21.—(AP)—The government is ready to restore some wartime production controls—and grant higher prices—to ease the acute shortage of cotton clothing.

OPA and the Civilian Production Administration believe this double barreled program eventually will boost by about 50 per cent the output of shirts, shorts, pajamas, dresses, work clothing and other scarce garments.

Officials of the two agencies told reporters late yesterday that despite price increases to be authorized, the program will not cost the public more for clothing in general.

They contended the plan will increase the supply of inexpensive garments, and that in the long run this will save money or many families.

To assure greater output of cheaper clothing, the Civilian Production Administration plans soon to re-invoke a wartime regulation which required textile mills to turn out certain types of cotton fabrics needed for essential garments.

This is the kind of measure Chester Bowles, the new stabilization administrator, had in mind when he said a few days ago that price increases will be coupled with production controls to meet demands for scarce products.

The price increase for cotton fabrics will be in two parts:

1. A general increase of about three and one-half cents a pound in recognition of higher party prices for raw cotton and to offset recent wage increases. Mills that did not hike wages will get only about one cent of this.

2. An additional incentive increase of five per cent to apply on selected fabrics urgently needed for clothing and for certain industrial and agricultural purposes. (Continued on Page Eight)

Admiral Drowns In Auto Accident

Norfolk, Va., Feb. 21.—(AP)—Vice Admiral Theodore S. Wilkinson, attached to the Joint Chiefs of Staff in Washington, D. C., drowned today when his automobile plunged overboard from a Norfolk-Portsmouth ferryboat on the orfolk side of Elizabeth River.

His wife, Mrs. Catherine Wilkinson, escaped from the sinking car by breaking a window and was taken to General Hospital where she was being treated for shock and exposure.

Coast Guard divers recovered the admiral's body shortly before 10 a. m.

Mrs. Wilkinson was rescued by ferry company employees. Employees of the ferry company said the admiral's car was first to board the ferry at the terminal here and that it ran the entire length of the boat and plunged through the safety gates and into the water without stopping.

Mrs. Wilkinson told police she believed the brakes on the car failed to hold. The automobile was owned by a friend and the admiral was the only other passenger, she said.

Clothing Shortage To Be Eased Says Govm't

Relaxing Of Controls And Slightly Higher Prices Will Boost Production Of Scarce Commodities By 50%

Bombay, India, Feb. 21.—(AP)—Striking Indian naval seamen trained the guns of a flotilla of warcraft on Bombay tonight after a day of fighting between troops and seamen on short which one navy enlisted man said cost the strikers 210 casualties.

Naval enlisted men barricaded in castle barracks, a naval establishment in the castle section in the heart of the downtown area, were besieged by British Tommies and Indian troops. The troops had orders to quell what the Indian navy's flag officer called a state of open mutiny.

Nine warcraft held by the strikers maneuvered into battle position in the harbor as the troops and barricaded seamen exchanged rifle and machinegun fire.

Vice Admiral Sir John Godfrey proclaimed the existence of a state of open mutiny. He promised to use every force at his command to crush the revolt of the seamen, who have protested that they were discriminated against under British regulations of the fleet.

Godfrey's warning to use extreme force to quell the mutiny was carried to the seamen barricaded in castle barracks by an officer who entered under a flag of truce.

Godfrey, flag officer of the Royal Indian navy, also broadcast this morning over the Bombay radio.

TODAY IN CONGRESS

A Review Of Your Government In Action

Washington, Feb. 21.—(AP)—The Senate approved today:

Paul Porter for Price Administrator. A bill authorizing appointment of three more assistant secretaries of Commerce—for international trade, small business, and domestic commerce. The bill went to the House for action.

The Banking Committee approved Porter's shift from the Federal Communications Commission to OPA and the Senate itself quickly followed suit.

Then from the RFC, the Banking Committee received a request to approve an additional payment of \$125,000,000 in meat subsidies and \$25,000,000 in flour subsidies between now and June 30. The committee took no immediate action on that.

This happened in Congress, too. Under Secretary Kenneth C. Royall said the War Department was ready to meet "head-on" any charges of wanton destruction of property by the Army although there had been some cases of improper destruction of surplus war goods. He appeared before the House Expenditures Committee.

Brig. Gen. T. M. Osborne informed the committee 4,000 or 5,000 new trucks are standing idle in India but that they now are the property of the Foreign Economic Administration not the Army.

A House committee heard witnesses in opposition to peacetime military training, and a Senate committee listened to opponents of a House-approved bill to return U. S. employment services to state control by June 30.

The atomic bomb, lunches for school kids, the future of the draft, and Army's disposal of surplus equipment gave Capitol Hill a full schedule today.

Atomic-wise, a special Senate committee weighed methods of tightening up existing espionage laws to make spying on the nation's A-bomb secrets a difficult and discouraging proposition.

FBI Chief J. Edgar Hoover was one of three key witnesses called for advice. The other two were Maj. Gen. Leslie Groves, director of the A-bomb project, and James McNulty, chief of the espionage section of the Justice Department's criminal division.

School kids lunches occupied the House where a vote was believed near on legislation to make permanent the present federal-aid school lunch program, and provide \$65,000,000 to keep it going.

Another arm of the House—the Expenditures Committee—called the Army for questioning about reports concerning unwarranted destruction of surplus military property overseas.

Undersecretary of War Kenneth C. Royall was asked to provide information on reports that the Army only this week directed a speedy return of surplus civilian items to this country—a move committee interpreted as a "reversal of policy."

In the rough-and-tumble scrap over the nomination of Edwin W. Pauley time out was called, but without diminishing Capitol Hill's agitation on the subject.

The Senate Naval Committee, which is examining Pauley's qualifications, reversed further hearings on the subject, but Senator Morse (R-Ore.) came out to urge that Pauley request President Truman withdraw his nomination. Morse is the second lawmaker to advance such a proposal.

But it fell on deaf ears. Pauley told a reporter he had no such intentions. He said he wanted his name to go before the Senate because he is confident he will be confirmed.

Pearl Harbor investigators meanwhile contemplated the toughest part of their job—preparing a report of their findings on the "day of infamy" attack from the millions of words of testimony they have heard since mid-November.

Public hearings ended yesterday, but Chairman Barkley (D-Ky.) said numerous closed door sessions would be necessary to lay the groundwork for the report and promised "We'll all be working on it." The report is due to be submitted to Congress by June 1.

NFTW HEADS WORKING ON STRIKE DATE

Nat. Federation Of Telephone Workers Seek To Consolidate Ranks

Memphis, Tenn., Feb. 21.—(AP)—The National Federation of Telephone Workers today sought to consolidate its ranks on the question of setting a strike date.

Joseph A. Beirne, president of the NFTW, asserted he was not in favor of setting a strike date at this time, while a spokesman for the opposition said "there is still strong sentiment in favor of a strike call."

John J. Moran, president of the Federation of Long Line Telephone Workers, appeared as spokesman for 17 of the federation's 50 affiliates urging more direct action.

Moran told newsmen that some of the delegates want to delay strike action while others want a date set definitely—and pretty soon, too.

Meanwhile Beirne has appealed for government intervention in the wage and hour dispute involving a quarter of a million of the nation's telephone workers.

In telegrams to both the Labor Department and management, Mr. Beirne said, "a strike will not be called until after we have talked with you." He added, "a strike appears inevitable unless you intervene with some suggested remedies."

The debate was set off yesterday by the request for a definite strike call date by leaders of 17 unions which have already complied with. (Continued on Page Eight)

FINE SPEECH AT COLLEGE

Dr. Franklin McNutt Addresses Several Hundred Teachers

A distinguished Ohio educator who came to North Carolina on a visit in 1938 and was so much impressed that he came back to the Old North State to become associated with the University of North Carolina and later to be appointed head of the Department of Education at the Women's College, University of North Carolina, warned the hearts and cheered the spirits of more than 350 college and school officials and teachers at a banquet at East Carolina Teachers College last night.

Dr. Franklin H. McNutt of Greensboro delivered the most eloquent and impressive address heard at any public meeting at ECTC since Carl E. Bolte of Washington, D. C., spoke there in 1943. He is a prominent scholar, a great philosopher, an almost psychic student of human nature. (Continued on page eight)

Lunch Funds Will Be Restricted

Washington, Feb. 21.—(AP)—The House voted by more than two-to-one today to bar distribution of any federal school lunch funds to states which discriminate among students because of race, color or creed.

A roll call showed 258 members in favor of retention of an amendment offered to the \$65,000,000 federal-aid school lunch program bill by Rep. Powell (D-NY), a negro. There were 109 negative votes.

Earlier, on a voice vote, the representatives tentatively reduced the total by cutting off \$15,000,000 authorized for the U. S. office of education in connection with the lunch plan.

Chairman Flannagan (D-Va.) of the House Agriculture committee said the U. S. office of education funds would have gone to states to buy lunchroom equipment and supply instruction to pupils on diet improvement.

Not Even Twins

Paris, Feb. 21.—(AP)—Reporters of many nationalities combed the left bank area of the Seine last night and came back to their offices today with the news: There are no septuplets in the Rue Gaiarde. Not even twins.

They started the search on the basis of a report telephoned to a British news agency yesterday by a tipster that a woman in the tiny street had given birth to seven children—four girls and three boys, all living.

Pravda, In Acknowledging Espionage, Blusters Spy Story Was Used To Distract Attention From Alleged Failure Of Bevin At UNO Meet; Moscow Says Canadian Attitude "Is Not Compatible With Friendly Relations Between The Two Countries"

London, Feb. 21.—(AP)—Russia said today its representatives had obtained "insignificant" secret data in Canada and its press accused the Canadian government of using the espionage exposure for "an unbridled anti-Soviet campaign."

The Moscow newspaper Pravda, organ of the Communist party, charged editorially that Canada made the statement to distract attention from the "political failure" of British Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin at the United Nations Assembly meeting.

A Canadian spokesman commented in Ottawa:
"The Soviet statement started out as an admission of guilt sufficient to cause the withdrawal of its military attaché, and then proceeded to minimize the whole matter and sought to make political capital by imputing the motives to the Canadian government."

The Canadian government was under increasing pressure to lift the news blackout on the investigation into the alleged spy plot.

While the worst continued across the Arctic wastes, a survey in Washington showed that the top secrets of the atomic bomb remained with the United States exclusively.

These included the industrial process for mass production of the bomb material; the component parts of the completed bombs; and the precise information on pressures, radioactivity, heat and other characteristics of the explosion.

Pravda's lengthy editorial explained the Canadian spy statement with this assertion:

"Someone obviously had to help Bevin to distract attention from his failures at the session of the assembly. It is clear that the Canadian Prime Minister W. L. Mackenzie King decided to aid Bevin. The latter, however, did not dare to defend Bevin directly but took upon himself another task—to distract attention from Bevin's political failure at the session of the assembly."

The Russian government statement acknowledging some data had been obtained first was broadcast last night from Moscow.

"The Soviet military attaché in Canada received from acquaintances among Canadian citizens certain information of a secret character which, however, did not present a special interest to Soviet authorities," the Russian government said in a statement broadcast last night over the Moscow radio.

The statement indicated the information concerned radar and atomic energy.

At the same time, the statement said, Russia deemed it "necessary to call attention to the campaign. (Continued on Page Two)

JUDGE ORDERS NEW RECESS

Two-Day Recess Granted Defendant; Trial May Last Two More Weeks

Judge Paul Frizzelle today ordered another two-day recess in the trial of Rogerick Davenport, former New Bern producer dealer and loans broker, saying he believed such a move was "in the interest of justice to all concerned."

He granted the recess at the request of defense attorneys shortly after court was reconvened this morning following a recess taken Monday to allow Davenport to examine records kept in the six branch offices of his "Big Apple" loans business.

The 49-year-old Davenport is being tried at a special term of Pitt County Superior Court on charges of conspiracy to defraud and fraud by false pretense growing out of his alleged loan operations in 1944.

The trial will get underway again Monday at 10 a. m., and Judge Frizzelle said no further recess would be allowed after that date.

The records in question were impounded at the request of lawyers and will be introduced as supplementary evidence. They are the hands of J. T. Flythe, a bankrupt for the Davenport firm.

In pleading for further time to study the books, Major Scott B. Davenport, defense attorney, said the records "are in such bad shape" that little progress was being made in "putting them into order." He said Davenport had been working on the records "until late at night" and would need several days in which to "complete what he has set out to do."

In granting the second recess, Judge Frizzelle said: "I was thoroughly satisfied in my own mind when we took the first recess that the action was in the interest of saving time. I'm still of that opinion."

"I don't want either the State or the defense to be able to say truthfully after this trial is over that this hearing hasn't been conducted fairly. If the defense says it hasn't. (Continued on Page Eight)

Washington, Feb. 21.—(AP)—Do not send money to the internal revenue collector when you mail him your 1945 income tax return on form W-2.

Form W-2 is the receipt a boss gives a worker to show how much he earned in 1945 and how much tax was withheld from him.

The collector checks your return and if you owe him money, he will tell you. You pay him within 30 days after he notifies you.

If he finds too much tax has been withheld from you, you'll get a refund.

Note to husbands and wives: If you both had income in 1945 and are within the requirements for using form W-2—then—

Don't worry whether to file separate or combined returns on form W-2. The collector, by law, must figure out the cheaper way for you.

So, whether you file separate or combined returns, you can't lose. You will get the benefit of the collector's figuring.

If you worked for more than one boss who withheld taxes from your 1945 wages, get a form W-2 receipt from each.

Without all the receipts, you can't make a return on form W-2. You will have to use form 1040.

If you have them all, attach them to the receipt from your last boss. That's the one you fill out and file. Don't fill out the others.

The withholding receipt, form W-2, which the boss gives you, is in original and duplicate. Fill in the original. Send it to the collector. Keep the duplicate.

On the original the boss already has written your name and address, his name and address, how much money you earned, how much tax he withheld from you.

You answer the other questions on the original, taking them step by step. They're very simple. Here is an example of how form W-2 is filled out.

You, married, with one child, in 1945 earned \$4,500 in wages. Your wife, not working, received \$85 in interest on bonds. Then, following the questions, you write on the right line:

Your income, \$4,500; your wife's \$85 in interest; then the total of the two incomes, \$4,585.

Where it asks which—of the figures already written—is your income (Continued on Page Four)

An Analysis Of The News

Herford, Germany, Feb. 21.—When you get a close view of the rehabilitation and the democratization of Germany under Allied supervision, you wonder whether on the whole this task doesn't present even more problems than the smashing of the mighty Hitlerian military machine.

Here in the British zone, we find the problem being attacked along two main lines. One has as its objective the raising of the standard of living to the level laid down by Allied agreement—a long term job. The other is the re-education of the German people, and this is the bigger of the two for it is to instill democracy.

The administration bears the hall-mark of Field Marshal Montgomery, who only recently relinquished supervision here to become chief of the imperial general staff.

It is noticeable that there is no coddling of the Germans. The toughest spot in the vital educational program is the group of people between the ages of 14 and about 35, for they are the Hitlerized element. The older folk are less of a problem, and of course it is upon the children that lasting peace very largely must be built.

So the British are setting up democratic institutions. These in-

clude universities and schools. The creation of trade unions on craft basis is being encouraged and while there will be federation among them, they will retain their sovereignty.

New text books are being provided throughout the zone. The old arithmetic books instead of presenting problems in the form of how many apples are two and three, substituted SS soldiers, or maybe tanks, for apples.

The British are doing daily broadcasts with a peace theme to the schools. The radio also is telling the students about their countries. There are over two million children in the schools of the British zone but they are short of teachers.

More than incidentally, the scholars are given midday meals with calories, daily beyond the normal ration, of 1550, with added calories for heavy workers.

Another important phase of the democratization is the fostering of youth movements, and there are now some 1000 youth clubs with a membership of about 75,000.

These are social clubs, run by a committee of their members.

The British see that these clubs have proper accommodation, and (Continued on Page Four)

FRUSTRATION

There is an old story, from the Arabian Nights about a genie who was corked up in a bottle by a powerful magician and then thrown into the sea. Desperate in his cramped quarters, the genie at first made solemn vows to confer on whoever would be his liberator everything his heart could desire. But as the centuries rolled on and the genie still lay in his bottle on the bottom of the sea, he became bitter, and swore he would kill his liberator. A poor fisherman one day found the bottle in his net, and opened it. But the genie didn't have a chance to perpetrate his evil intentions. After a series of adventures, he ended up again in his bottle and was recast into the sea.

This faithful tale is a parable on the part of frustration—that ailment which destroys the character and happiness of thousands of people. As their lives progress and problems increase instead of diminish, as they see years of struggle ahead to earn a living with no rest in sight, many become bitter like the genie. Kindness and consideration for their families and associates turns to nervous cruelty. If they can't be happy, they determine that no one else shall be.

And the spiritual disease concomitant with frustration, cynicism and disillusionment, creep over them, their world changes. Life with all its joys, becomes for them "nausea, bristling, and short." Like the genie they finally end up in a sealed bottle, consigned to oblivion.

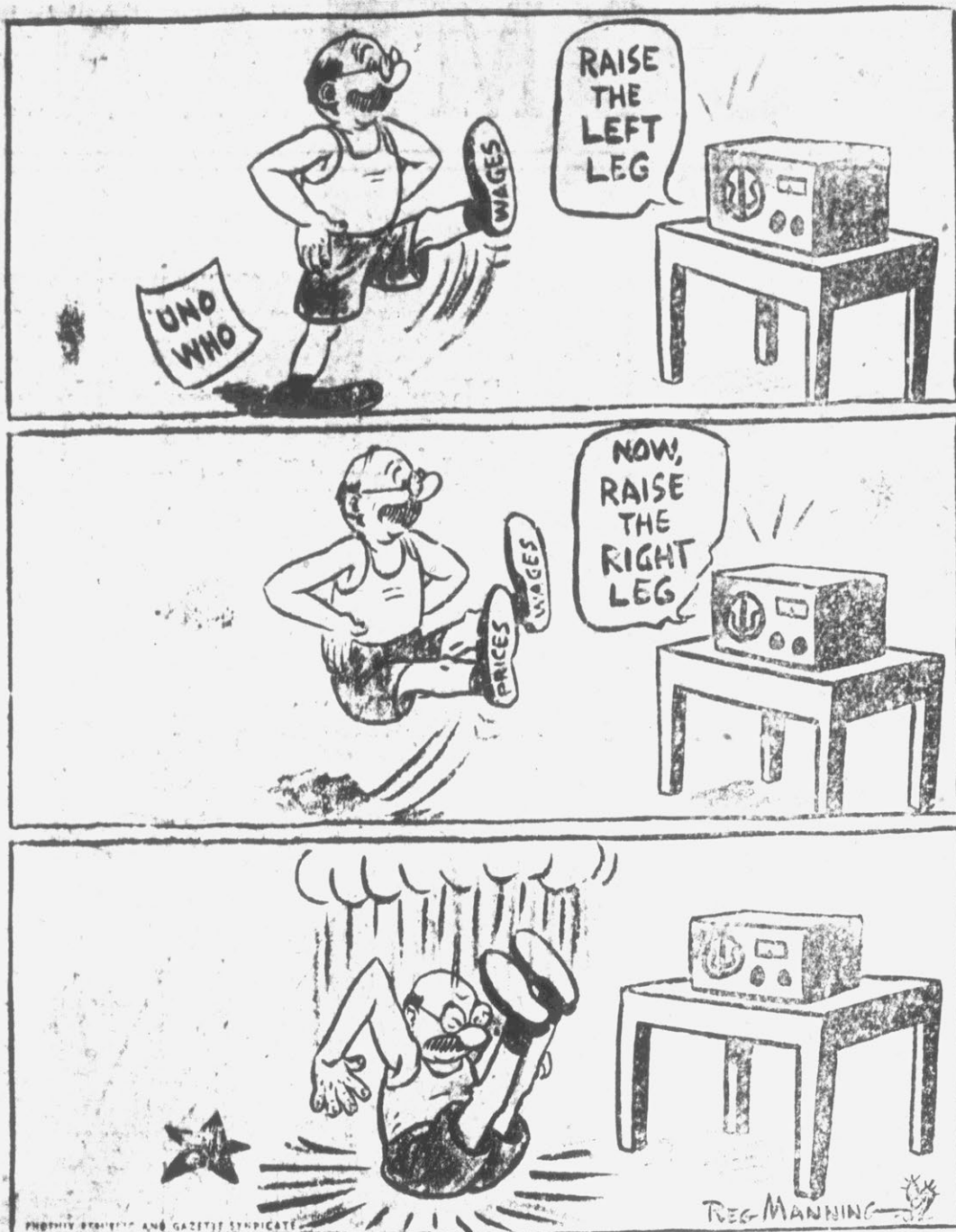

training schools are being set up for youth movement leaders, and the purpose is to produce a large number of leaders.

At the outset an effort was made to introduce the Boy Scout movement, but this idea had to be discarded because the Germans took it as being a military organization because of the uniforms.

One of the most interesting projects is the establishment of town councils everywhere. These are rather like the American town meeting. The members are nominated at present because the people are untrained, owing to the dictatorship by the end of June. Education of the general public is of course being carried on intensively through the radio, the press, the cinema, and the theaters and book publishing. The authorities also encourage individual Germans to have personal contact with the outside world from which they had been cut off by the dictatorship since 1933.

The newspapers, by the way, are having difficulty in finding newspapermen because all but Nazis were thrown out under Hitler.

and which is your wife's, you then write \$4,500 for yourself, \$85 for your wife.

Since it's a combined return of yourself and wife, you both sign it. If you were filing just your return alone you would sign it.

Be sure to list your exemptions. Here's a point to remember: but he

don't let it confuse you. Just follow the questions on the form W-2 which you happen to have.

During 1945 the Internal Revenue Department sent out loads of form 2-2 to employers. Later in the year to simplify the form still further, the department sent out slightly different forms.

No matter which one your boss gives you, you can fill your return out but one—under "exemptions"—you list yourself first, then your wife, then your child.

On the other—under "exemptions"—you list only your child (in the example given here).

That's because, on another part of the return, you list your wife's name where the form asks if you're married, to give your wife's name.

On this form—without specifying—listing yourself and wife as exemptions—you automatically are credited with exemptions for yourself and wife.

As noted: Don't let this confuse you. Just follow the directions on the particular form you happen to have.

The difference between the two forms is given here only because some readers may have one kind some the other.

Suppose you worked for two bosses in 1945 and from one got one kind of form and received the other kind from the second boss.

Remember: You fill out and mail to the collector the form W-2 you received from the last boss you worked for in 1945.

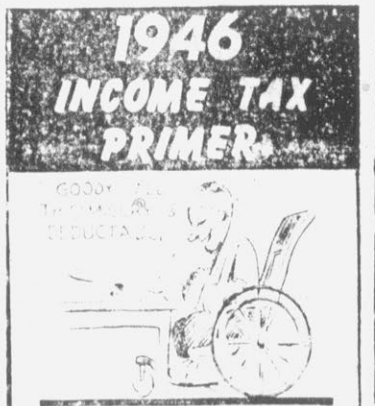

Therefore, they said, it might be best merely to make embarrassing Nazi documents public without any comment. Their opinion was that such a step would keep the record clear and show to the world exactly how Franco aided Hitler at the time he was protesting his admiration for the Allies.

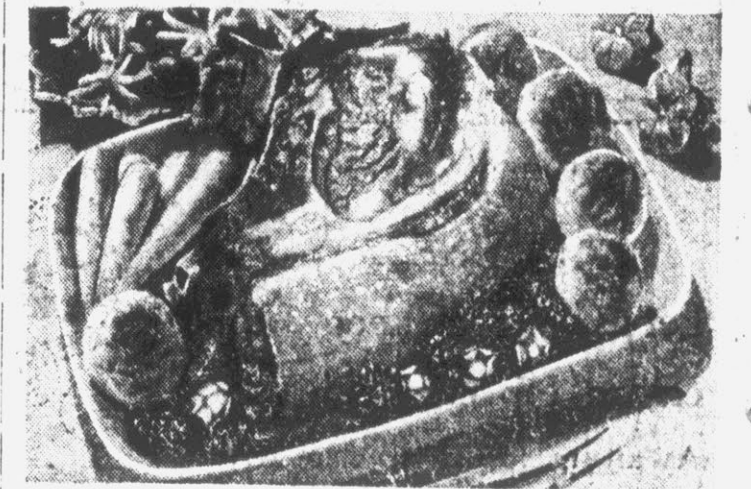

Before you cook that next standing rib roast, you'll be wise to check on the latest method of roasting as given below. You'll get a better flavored, more juicy roast and also a larger number of servings due to less shrinkage if you use these low temperatures.



Standing Rib Roast . . . cooked to perfection

Season meat with salt and pepper, place fat side up in a shallow pan and, for very best results, insert a meat thermometer so the bulb is in the center of the largest muscle.

Place in a slow oven, 300°F., and roast uncovered until the thermometer reading indicates the degree of doneness your family wants. 110°F. for rare beef; 120°F. for medium; 130°F. for well done beef.

If you do not have a thermometer, the table at the right will serve as a guide.

Only Choice or Grade 1 roasts should be roasted. Light or Commercial grade should be broiled, browned and cooked covered.

Over-Cooking Makes Roast Less Juicy

A Choice Grade rib roast cooked to the rare or medium stage is much more juicy and tender than one cooked well done. Similarly, one cooked until

Searing Not Necessary

No searing is necessary. In the process of roasting, the surface of the meat is seared by the heat of the oven. Searing is a waste of time and energy and a large proportion of the meat cooked to the proper degree of doneness.

Browned, what is margarine? Carrots, green beans, peas, and dates are good with a sliced cream are good accompaniments to the roast beef for Sunday dinner.

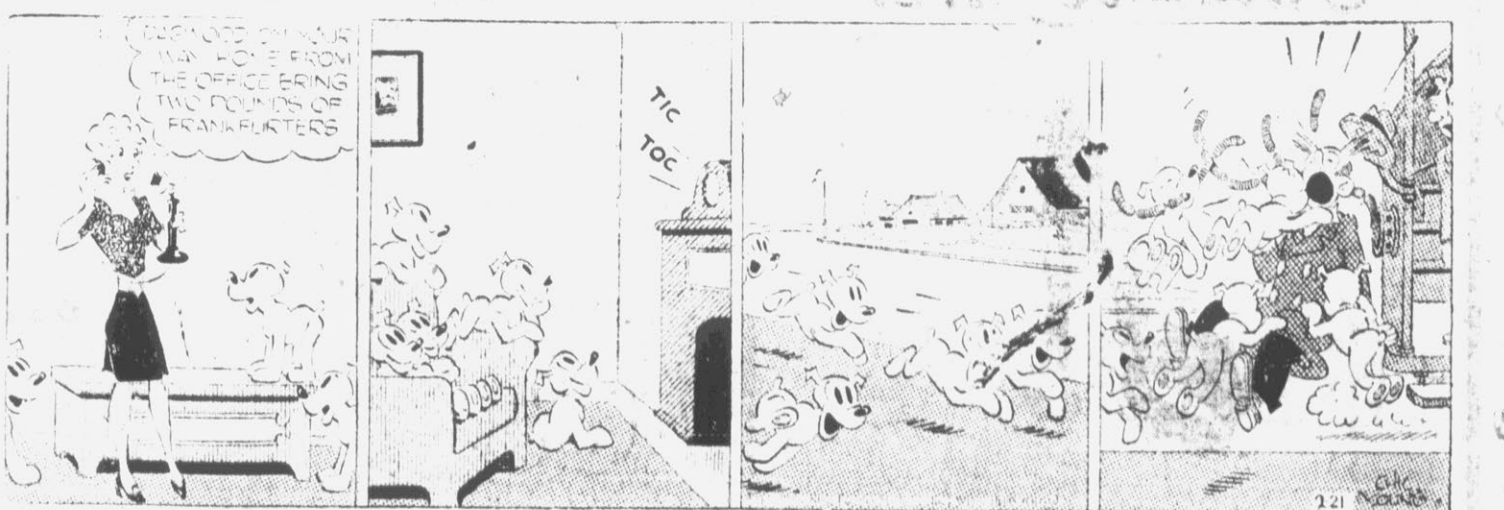

Plant pastures for poultry, start baby chicks now, get brooder in good condition before placing them. Get the garden ready for planting, sow in the garden, peas, beets, lettuce, mustard. Sow in hot beds, tomatoes, cabbage, and plant a few cucumber and watermelon seeds to be transplanted to garden as soon as the danger of frost is passed. Plant white potatoes. Now is a good time to make things look pretty around the home. Paint the home, paint the feed barns and stables if possible. A series of farm meetings are being held in the county. These meetings are to acquaint the farmers with what is ahead of them and how to grow more feed and food with less labor.

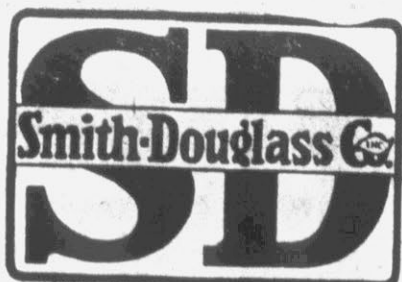

Prominent Carolinian Assumes Vital Office

Washington, Feb. 21.—(AP)—North Carolina's handsome former governor, O. Max Gardner, may become virtually secretary of the treasury when he takes office as undersecretary of that department.

Senator Hoye (D-NC), his brother-in-law, disclosed that when Secretary of the Treasury Vinson called Gardner to Washington from Shelby, N. C., early this week, Vinson told Gardner the world bank would necessitate his being out of this country a great deal and this would mean that Gardner would act in his absence.

Gardner was reluctant to accept the nomination, Hoye said, but was persuaded by President Truman. Gardner has been chairman of the Advisory Committee of the Office of War Mobilization and Reconstruction. His nomination for the treasury post is expected to be confirmed by the Senate without opposition.

A star athlete, Gardner played football at State College at Raleigh and later at the University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill, where he received his law degree. He has been counsel for the Textile Institute for several years.

Gardner is close to several cabinet members and former cabinet members. He has been a life-long friend of Secretary of State James F. Byrnes. Their homes are only about 40 miles apart. He is also a close friend of Edward R. Stettin.

When he took the advisory job with the Office of War Mobilization and Reconstruction, Gardner said he accepted it because it dealt with issues that affect the whole world.

"We are the only country," he commented, "that isn't busted. A glass of milk for everybody isn't enough. We've got to trade with the world. We'll have to do it some way—even barter."

Under the watchful guard of two Egyptian army tanks, 20 armored cars and six truckloads of soldiers stationed in the square as a precautionary measure, the demonstrators shouted "Evacuation of British troops or bloodshed" and "Down with the conqueror."

It will take some time, though. The agencies cautioned that effects of the program probably won't show in stores for about three or more months.

(Continued From Page One) nature, his speech sparkled with wit and humor, and he has that fine talent of speaking the "language Americans understand." Dr. McNutt's address was more of a heart-to-heart talk with the several hundred college and school teachers. His audience understood and appreciated him and his practical philosophy.

Dr. Howard J. McGinnis, acting president of the college, was master of ceremonies. He welcomed the Pitt County and Greenville city teachers and the college teachers and college senior student teachers. He said it is a fine thing for the teachers to get together and exchange ideas in a professional and social way.

Supt. June H. Rose led the singing of "America." J. C. Solomon of the Belvoir School said the invocation.

Don H. Conley, superintendent of Pitt County schools, who introduced the speaker, praised the spirit of the meeting and said "We should seek those experiences which enrich our lives and better equip us for greater service in facing the new perspective of education following the war."

Dr. McNutt, facing hundreds of charming women, could not "begin to begin" his message without a tribute to the ladies. They liked it—and him, too.

He said he is mainly interested in developing character in his educational work and added that we have somewhat neglected the making of better men and women of good-will. He believes that each person's destiny is in his own hands.

He described the world in which we live as a place of laws, and because of laws we can plan. He used several very human and practical anecdotes to impress his idea and they clicked with the audience. We can plan and accomplish great things, he asserted, if we remember that law governs everything—not just crime—particularly in the building of character and the achieving of nobler things in life.

Each thought, each act, changes an individual, according to how he plans under the law, he said. One's thoughts and acts are like bricks in a wall—if you put in some bad bricks, they may cause the wall to fall. He deplored the fact that young people do not readily understand this. He recited, among other anecdotes, the story of the unhappy Pittsburgh girl at an Ohio college to impress his point, and declared we make ourselves what we are, and proved that.

Stressing the point that a person's character is written on his face, and that we make ourselves what we are under the law that governs life, Dr. McNutt recited the fairy story of "The Magic Mask." To demonstrate that our daily thoughts and acts—character—are reflected in our faces. He gave a dramatic word picture of the winning king of a nation that proved on other countries, who fell in love with a beautiful princess. Looking into a mirror, the king, whose lawless life's deeds were written in lines on his face, doubted that a princess could fall in love with one so ugly. He ordered his court magician to make him a mask so pleasing and perfect that none would detect it.

The mask was perfect. The princess was entranced. They were married. The court magician warned the king that if the mask was broken another could not be made. He warned that to avoid breaking the mask by a scowl or a gesture of anger, the king must have good thoughts; that when he felt angry or aggressive, he should go out and do someone a good turn—be happy and keep smiling.

After a time the king's conscience bothered him for fooling his bride; he broke the mask into many pieces and decided to tell her the truth. Imagine his surprise when he looked into a mirror and found that by good thoughts and doing kindly deeds all of the ugly lines of wrath and hate in his face had disappeared. The magic mask was no longer needed.

"Your real character is written all over your face and your destiny is in your own hands. We should impress this fact upon the young people," he said in conclusion.

Dr. R. J. Slay, dean of ECTC, City Supt. June H. Rose, County Supt. Don H. Conley and Greenville High School Principal O. E. Dowd were thanked by Dr. McGinnis for arranging the meeting.

ARMY DENIES EXCESS WASTE

"Gross Overstatement" Charged In Investigation Of Complaints

Washington, Feb. 21.—(AP)—Kenneth C. Royall, undersecretary of war, said today the War Department is prepared to meet "head-on" any charge that the army has been guilty of wanton destruction of property.

Instead of destroying surplus materials which might have civilian or military usefulness, he said, "if anything, it is spending too much money and too many man hours to protect property of a doubtful value."

The War Department has authorized General MacArthur to ship back civilian type goods from the Pacific theater now that the shipping situation has eased, Royall disclosed. Until recently, he said, it had been necessary to pursue a policy of bringing the boys back home and leaving the property there.

Royal conceded in a statement prepared for the House Expenditures Committee that naturally there have been cases of improper destruction. There always will be some men in any large organization who will overlook regulations or perhaps, ignore regulations.

He said the War Department investigated all complaints and found "most are grossly exaggerated."

He cited the case of one witness who said he saw a case of typewriters thrown overboard from a ship. The investigation, Royall asserted, showed that what actually went into the water was a packing case stencilled "typewriters" but actually containing only shipboard sweepings.

The army has not heretofore authorized the abandonment of any property that has civilian utility, Royall said, "except in the interest of military security, national defense, or public health and safety."

REALISTIC

Alhambra, Calif., Feb. 21.—(AP)—Police here can personally vouch for the effectiveness of their tear gas.

During a tear gas demonstration in the police station, the trigger jammed and the operator quickly turned the sprayer toward an open window.

But the wind was wrong and the tear gas blew back in, routing every policeman in the building.

POPE CONFERS HATS TODAY

Traditional Ceremony Is Magnificent Religious Spectacle

Vatican City, Feb. 21.—(AP)—Pope Pius XII conferred the traditional red hat upon 28 new cardinals today in a magnificent religious spectacle witnessed by 20,000 persons in the great nave of St. Peter's.

In a long majestic ceremony rich with color and the ancient tradition of the Roman Catholic Church, the pontiff bestowed upon the new princes of the church, the flat, broad brimmed and tasseled symbols of their dignity.

They will receive the final symbol of their rank—their rings—at a secret consistory tomorrow, concluding week-long ceremonies that were marked by the Pope's world broadcast yesterday in which he called upon his church to become a militant leader in preparing a basis upon which society can rest securely.

Four of the 32 new cardinals created by Pope Pius Monday were absent from today's consistory.

They were Jon Cardinal De Jong of The Netherlands and Ues Cardinal Salgado of Rome, who were too ill to come to Rome; Jose Cardinal Caro Rodriguez of Chile, who became ill after reaching Rome and Manual Cardinal Arteaga Y
