

British Empire In Dire Straits

England Faces World
Wide Turmoil; Im-
perial Forces Gather
To Quell Indian Mu-
tiny And Rioting;
Bloodshed In Pales-
tine, Indonesia And
Egypt; Crisis In Ja-
maica

British imperial forces acted to quell mutiny and rioting in India today as fresh trouble flared in other territories where Britain is involved.

Order was restored in Egypt after violent attacks yesterday against British military and civil institutions.

Indian civilians sympathizing with almost 12,000 mutinous Royal Indian Navy seamen rioted in Bombay, drawing fire from troops and police.

Unofficial figures indicated the death toll in today's street fighting might total 50 or more, with upwards of 250 wounded. One hospital alone had a list of 30 dead, most of whom were listed as dead on arrival.

A mutinous crew aboard the sloop Hindustan was disarmed at Karachi, 800 miles up the coast, in the fighting reported to have cost four killed and 25 injured.

Shooting flared again in Palestine. The British said that three mobile police camps were attacked in the night by Jews bearing arms and explosives and that some installations were damaged. Three Jews were killed.

In Hong Kong one Chinese was killed and five were wounded when police fired on a crowd of 300 persons, apparently formed as a result of a fight between two Chinese gangs, which wrecked a Kowloon tea house. Several policemen were wounded.

British Indian troops repulsed an organized Indonesian attack at Bandung and fought on in the industrial and railway sections in an effort to clear all opposition from the Java city.

Diplomatic relations of Britain and Russia were touched upon in the Soviet press. Tassvita charged that Canadian Prime Minister W. L. Mackenzie King and British Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin were trying to undermine the growing international authority of the Soviet Union through the Canadian espionage case.

An Analysis Of The News

Herford, Germany, Feb. 22—One of the difficult problems of the Allied forces of occupation in Germany has been the position of the large number of displaced persons from other countries.

These "DPs," as the British soldiers call them, were mostly Hitler's slave labor and prisoners of war. In this zone there originally were 2,450,000 who had to be housed, clothed, fed and kept warm. A million of these were Russians and another half million were Poles, the rest being mainly Italians, Dutch and French.

British authorities have repatriated all but 450,000 of these unfortunate folk and would repatriate the rest gladly.

But most of these displaced persons don't want to go home at this time. The majority of them are Poles and they are holding back mainly for economic reasons, although some say they are fearful of political groups.

The authorities expect most of them will be ready to go back in the spring when the weather is good, but in the meantime they represent a half million mouths to feed in a Germany which already is strug-

GMC-CIO PACT IS EXPECTED VERY SOON

Mediator J. F. Dewey
Expects Agreement
On All Issues Before
Midnight

Detroit, Feb. 22.—(AP)—Special Mediator James F. Dewey said today that an agreement between General Motors and the CIO United Auto Workers in their prolonged strike dispute probably will be reached some time between now and midnight.

"I expect the company and the union to reach an agreement on all issues, including wages, today," he said.

Dewey made his statement as representatives of the union and management began another meeting looking to an end of the strike that has kept 175,000 production workers idle for 92 days.

A Washington dispatch to the Detroit News today asserted that high level government action may be brought into the strike parleys if an agreement is not reached promptly.

The news dispatch quoted an unnamed Washington official as saying Detroit reports were to the effect that they weren't half trying to settle the dispute.

This brought from Dewey the comment:

"They are trying contrary to the report. If they were not I wouldn't be in there."

Dewey and UAW Vice President Walter P. Reuther agreed that the wage question still was a troublesome issue as today's negotiations began.

Dewey, who declared after yesterday's seven and a half hour session that "but for a few technicalities, we brought to a conclusion arguments over maintenance of membership," added:

"There are still several more things to be settled. One of these is the matter of wages."

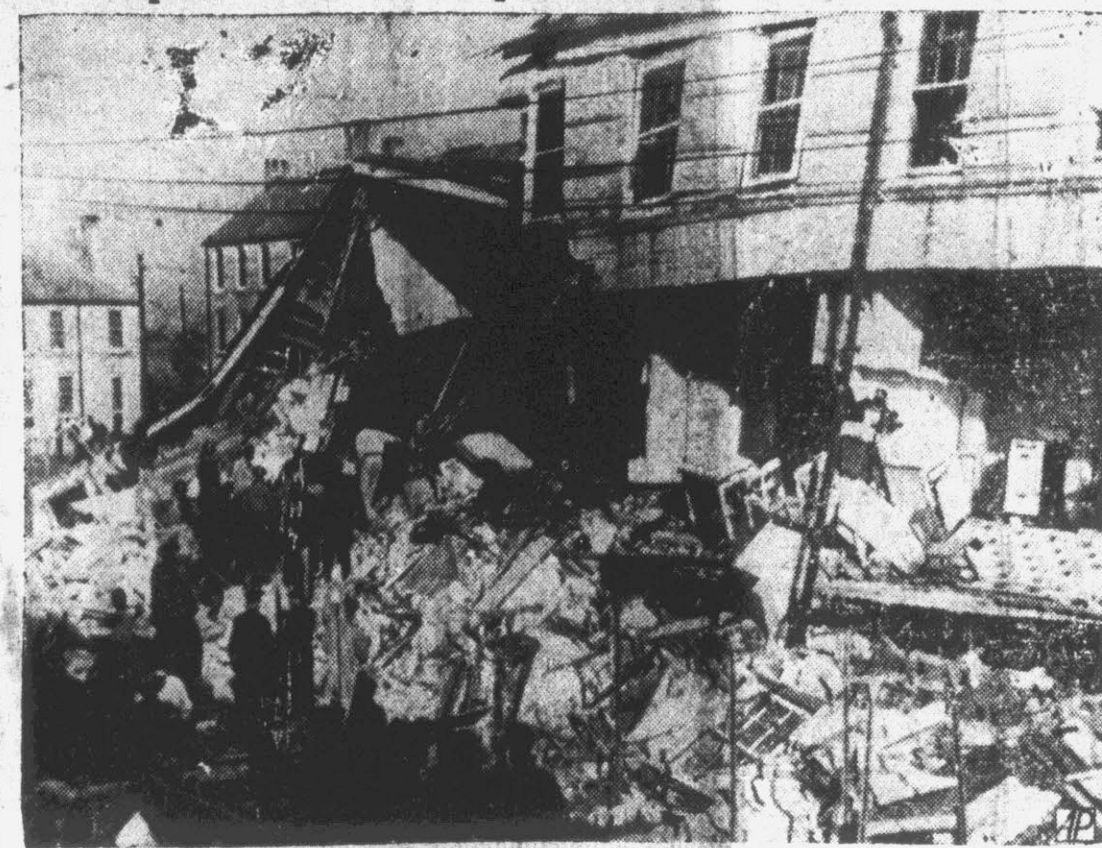

PITTSBURGH FACES A NEW POWER STRIKE

Paralyzing Power
And Light Walkouts
Expected Next Tuesday

Pittsburgh, Feb. 22.—(AP)—The rich Pittsburgh industrial district and its 1,000,000 residents, still feeling effects of a four-week steel walkout, today faced the prospect of another paralyzing power and light strike.

Approximately 3,400 Duquesne Light Co. employees, seeking an immediate 20 percent pay boost, are scheduled to quit work at 12:01 a.m. next Tuesday.

They struck for 19 hours on Feb. 12 forcing schools, stores and industrial plants to close, and darkening homes and streets at intervals during the power blackout.

Mayor David L. Lawrence, however, hoped intervention by President Truman would avert the crippling strike. The mayor, who has sat four days in conference with union leaders and company officials, sent an urgent message last night to the White House.

George L. Mueller, president of the Independent Association of Duquesne Light Company employees, said if no settlement is reached by midnight Monday "the strike will be on," cutting off power in all Duquesne lines serving an 817 square mile area in the heavily populated and industrialized Allegheny and Beaver counties.

Mueller said the union would not alter its demand for an immediate 20 per cent rise with an additional (Continued on Page Four)

London, Feb. 22.—(AP)—The London Star said today Henry Lipp and Marshall Field were bidding for publication rights to a history of the recent war by Winston Churchill and that Field at present is offering the highest figure of \$1,200,000.

Its information came from a source for Lipp, publisher of the magazine Time, Life and Fortune. Field publishes the Chicago Sun and New York Post.

President Plans Week-End Rest

Washington, Feb. 22.—(AP)—President Truman left the White House today for a three-day cruise on the Potomac River aboard the presidential yacht, the Williamsburg.

The Chief Executive, whose departure coincided with an exodus of federal workers from the capital on Washington's birthday holiday, took along several members of his staff.

The party left at 10 a. m. EST. Mr. Truman's aides will return to Washington tomorrow afternoon, but the President will not go back to the executive mansion until Sunday evening.

Mrs. Truman and their daughter, Margaret, will join him aboard the yacht Saturday night.

Aides accompanying Mr. Truman were presidential secretaries Matthew J. Connelly, Charles G. Ross and William D. Hassett; John R. Steelman, presidential adviser; Brig. Gen. Harry H. Vaughan, military aide; Capt. Clark Clifford, assistant naval aide and Col. Wallace Graham, presidential physician.

The President assigned a military aide to place wreaths at the foot of the Washington monument and at Mount Vernon in recognition of Washington's birthday.

Correspondents In Mukden Are Freed

Report On Manchurian Arsenal City Delayed
By Red Army; Jap Prisoners Said To
Be Sent To Siberia For Hard Labor

(Editor's Note: This is the first story received from Mukden since nine Allied correspondents were permitted to enter Manchuria nearly a week ago and were held incommunicado 54 hours by Russian authorities. The story was delayed two days presumably for lack of quick communications. Copy was flown from Mukden and radioed from Shanghai.)

Mukden, Feb. 20.—(Delayed)—(AP)—This scared, disheveled Manchurian arsenal city was thrown open by Russian military authorities today to nine Allied correspondents who previously had been confined 54 hours in a hotel. It was at Mukden that the incident which led to the Sino-Japanese war developed 14 years ago.

For the past six months, rumors emanating from this one time stronghold of Manchu warriors were purple with intimations of banditry, rape, looting, kidnapping, arson and murder as violent as in the days of Genghis Khan.

Correspondents, wishing to check the validity of these accounts and to see what was happening in Manchuria's postwar world, were backed by both Chinese and Russian officials until today, when 46-year-old Maj. Gen. Andrei Kovtoun-Stankovitch announced:

"You may go any place at any time you wish in Mukden, with or without escort."

It was the first time since the war ended that Allied newsmen had been granted the privilege of entering the Soviet-occupied Manchuria city.

TODAY IN CONGRESS

A Review Of Your Government In Action

Washington, Feb. 22.—(AP)—Senate committees approved today extra subsidy money for meat and flour and the appointment of O. Max Gardner, former governor of North Carolina, as undersecretary of the Treasury.

Before okaying an extra \$125,000,000 for meat subsidies and \$25,000,000 for flour subsidies to be spent by June 30, the Senate Banking Committee heard that the price of meat probably will be raised because of a wage raise proposed for pack-meat house workers.

Frank S. Ketcham, assistant general counsel of OPA, said Chester Bowles, the newly designated Stabilization Director, hadn't made up his mind finally but as of now has determined that the price of meat probably should be increased to take care of the wage increase.

Senate and House, as always on the birthday of George Washington, listened to the reading of the first president's farewell address.

Around the Capitol: Senator Pepper (D-Fla.) announced formation of a national committee to get backing in this country for Greek reparations claims arising from the war.

The Senate Labor Committee started hearings on a House-passed strike control bill. It got requests for prompt Senate action on similar legislation from Edward R. Burke, president of the Southern Coal Producers Association; President Edward A. O'Neal of the American Farm Bureau Federation; and P. C. Turner, of the Food Producers Council.

Washington's Birthday was no holiday for Congressmen.

The atomic bomb, the future of the draft, Army reform, James C. Pettillo, school kids' hitches and the Pauley nomination headed the

list of items which vied for attention. Senator Hickenlooper (R-Iowa) told his colleagues they ought to hurry up and do something about forming the nation's future program for atomic energy. Both chambers have had bills pending for several months, but their progress toward the floor has been slow.

Without mentioning the current Russo-Canadian dispute about atomic energy spring, Hickenlooper declared in a statement that he considers it imperative "that atom legislation be put in the law books without delay."

970,000 Idle Due To Work Stoppage

Victory Gardeners Are Called Upon For Help

Washington, Feb. 22.—(AP)—The nation's victory gardeners were called on today to duplicate their peacetime wartime service and help relieve the postwar global food shortages.

The appeal came from President Truman who said urgent needs abroad "for food from this country emphasize the importance of continued effort to add to our total food supply."

The stringent food outlook also was stressed by Secretary of Agriculture Anderson in a simultaneous statement late yesterday. He summed the nation's farmers to increase their 1946 foodstuff planting by more than 3,200,000 acres.

"The situation," he declared, "calls for a continued all-out production effort" even though this "will mean a heavy strain on the soil and a delay in farmers' reconversion toward a peacetime pattern of soil management."

On Congress, meanwhile, price aspect of food products vied for attention, with subsidies and ceilings on the floor.

Senator Murdock (D-Utah) from sugar beet country was not too optimistic that processors would be able to increase the consumer supply of sugar this year, but he noted in an interview that the industry had been able to up beet sugar production in 1945 "and I hope we can increase 1946 over 1945."

Meanwhile, the government put into effect today a ban on the use of cane alcohol for alcoholic beverages. The civil production administration said the reason was to provide additional molasses—the source of cane alcohol—for more essential uses.

Molasses, the agency declared, is "urgently needed" to increase production of industrial alcohol "which has widespread industrial uses and is also in urgent demand for cattle feed."

MUSIC'S CZAR HIT BY BILL

Petrillo's Threats and
Powers Curbed By
Congressional Ac-
tion

Washington, Feb. 22.—(AP)—A congressional decision on how far to go in trying to curb James C. Petrillo's powers over radio broadcast, resting largely today with a Senate-House Conference Committee.

The Senate approved a much milder measure on the same subject a year ago. Accordingly, the task of drafting legislation acceptable to both chambers is set to go to a joint committee. Later both the House and Senate will vote on the committee's version.

Rep. Lee (D-Calif.), author of the House-passed bill, predicted the senators would go along with most provisions of his measure.

It would outlaw the use of force, threats or other means to compel radio stations to pay tribute to unions for using phonograph records. It also would prohibit any action to require broadcasters to employ more workers than needed or to halt foreign programs or any type of non-commercial, educational or cultural offering.

Violators would be subject to a year's imprisonment or a \$10,000 fine, or both.

The Senate version, sponsored by Senator Vandenberg (R-Mich.), specified only that any interference with non-commercial, educational or cultural programs would be unlawful. It did not provide penalties. Vandenberg's bill was aimed chiefly at a long-standing controversy between Petrillo's union and the National Music Corp. at Interlochen, Mich.

Petrillo's name is not mentioned in either measure, but a House Commerce Committee report said it was directed at him, and nearly every lawmaker who spoke yesterday linked the bill to the federation leader.

Jap Government Opens New Purge

Tokyo, Feb. 22.—(AP)—The government announced today that political party leaders falling under the ultra-nationalist purge have been asked to resign from party positions and to withdraw from active political activities.

The announcement said this interpretation of General MacArthur's Jan. 4 directive had been relayed to leaders of all parties. It was the first official statement that disqualification for political office also would eliminate those concerned from other political activities.

Simultaneously the government said it would announce soon, possibly Tuesday, the next phase of the purge. Authoritative sources said this would add hundreds of government officials, journalists, bankers, propagandists and linguistic religious leaders to the list of recently barred politicians.

While thousands of wartime leaders thus faced political death, the newly enfranchised women stepped into the picture in the first political campaign broadcast in the nation's history. Eight, including a Geisha, a hotel waitress, a housewife, a medic student and a farmer's wife, said women were very happy to be allowed to vote. They scoffed at the idea that their new rights would cause discord in the house.

FATHER KILLS HIS FAMILY

Wife And Two Children Slain, Man
Then Shoots Self

Chicago, Feb. 22.—(AP)—A coroner's jury was summoned today for an inquest into the deaths of four members of a family, three of whom, police said, were slain by the husband and father who then shot himself.

The bodies of James Roach, 42; his wife, Rachel, 40; their son, James, Jr., 17, and daughter, Patricia, 16, were found last night in their south side apartment.

The shootings occurred some time Wednesday morning and that investigation disclosed Roach had beaten and shot to death his wife and children, both high school students, while they slept.

Sullivan said a 22 caliber rifle was found near Roach's body. Police said they found in the apartment in the south side district a note signed by Roach and addressed to his landlady in which he told of financial troubles. Roach formerly had been employed as a salesman. (Continued on page four)

Buenos Aires, Feb. 22.—(AP)—Argentine police said today that a number of men had been arrested and a large quantity of arms seized in what was described as a terrorist series of uprisings in Buenos Aires.

The police did not immediately identify the group with any political party, but contended that among those held were several to be communists.

The Communist Party has been sponsoring Jose Tamborini, opponent of Col. Juan Peron for the presidency.

The government, however, has decided to lift the state of siege from 12:01 a. m. Saturday until midnight Sunday.

(Editor's Note: This is the fifth of 12 stories explaining who does what about his income tax return.)

Washington, Feb. 22.—(AP)—If you use the 1040 short form you do not have to figure the tax on your 1945 income. You find the tax in the table on the back of the four-page form.

That table shows tax on income up to \$5,000.

If your income was less than \$5,000 from any source and if your deductions—such as for charitable contributions and medical care—were not more than 10 per cent of your income.

If your deductions were more than 10 per cent, don't use the 1040 short form. You'll lose money. Use the 1040 long form. The reason—the difference between the short and long forms—will be explained here.

In filling out the 1040 short form you start at the top of page 1 and work your way down, answering the questions as you go. You need only the simplest kind of arithmetic. Don't hop around.

Most people will need only page 1. Some, such as those with income from pension and annuities,

will have to answer questions on page 2. Then you find your tax in the table on page 4.

You tear off that first page—pages 1 and 2 are back to back—and turn it into the internal revenue collector, personally or by mail. If you have to pay money, turn that in with the return.

If you've already overpaid your tax, there's a place on page 1 where you indicate whether you want the overpayment refunded or credited to your 1946 taxes.

You don't list your deductions—such as for charitable contributions—if they were not more than 10 per cent of your income.

You don't list them because an allowance of about 10 per cent for deductions already has been figured into the taxes in the table of the pack of page 4. The government thus automatically gives you 10 per cent deduction.

But if your deductions are more than 10 per cent of your income, use the 1040 long form.

Form 1040 is called the short and the long form, depending how you use it. As a short form you handle already explained.

Using it as a long form—U for people with income of \$5,000 or more. (Continued on page four)

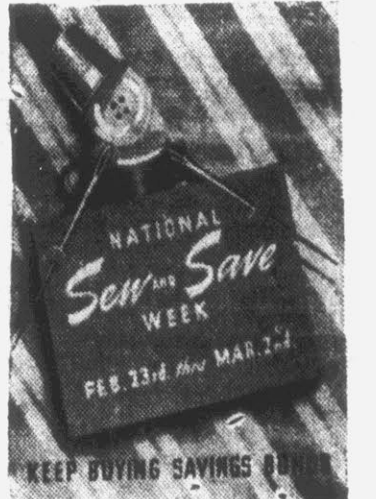

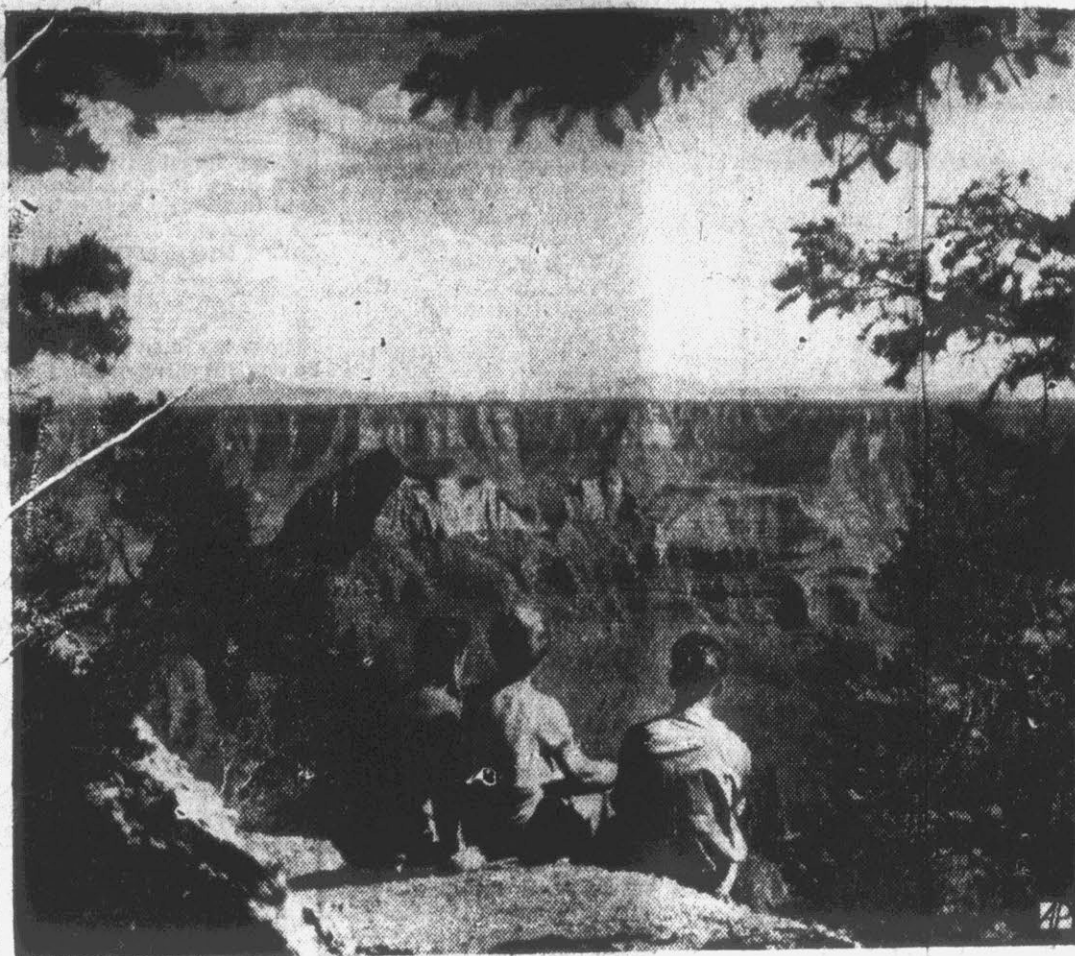

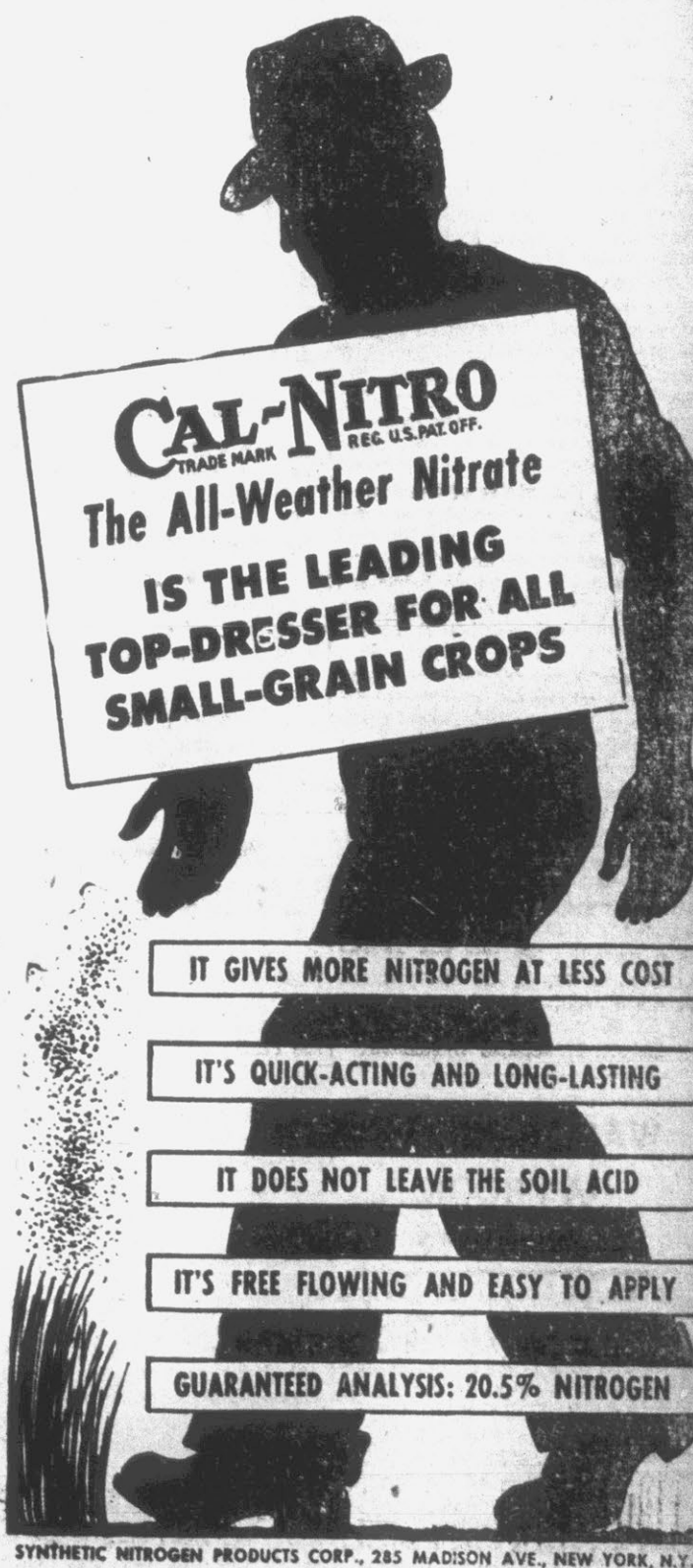

His crowning achievement, however, was his two terms as President. By every standard he seems to measure up as the greatest President our country has had. He confronted many fundamental problems which could be solved only by a man truly great. And this Washington was. He was one of the few individuals of all time who has turned the stream of history. The oblivion into which his memory has largely sunk is a tragedy. He was one of the greatest figures in the vast pageant of world events.

WASHINGTON DAYBOOK

Washington — You can now file the Fair Employment Practice Commission bill along with anti-lynch legislation and anti-poll tax proposals as a lost cause, so far as its chances in the United States Senate are concerned.

The 24-day filibuster put the FEPC bill off the shelf forever. It probably will be dusted off, drawn out in subsequent Congresses. The House may pass it again, but if the Senate takes any action at all, the law will be off the shelf.

Basically, the FEPC bill was nothing more than what the labor writers call a "switch" on one of the fundamentals of the Constitution—that no man can be deprived of his rights because of race, religion or previous servitude. FEPC would have placed the responsibility for the rights of holding a job under any of these conditions on most employers.

Unless the Senate, in the proposed reorganization of our legislative branch of government, votes itself radical changes in rules, FEPC, regardless of merits or demerits, will always stumble over the filibuster block.

At this point, it was apparent that the FEPC filibuster, from a public standpoint, was to be a dud. There are few filibusters which have lasted longer, but there are even fewer which have been duller or attracted smaller galleries.

The southern Senators did a masterful but uninspired job. The opposition to the filibuster, with few exceptions, was so half-hearted that commentators were able to say, with practically no comment, that most members of FEPC didn't really have their hearts in it. Frequently, it certainly did seem so.

All of it was rather routine legislative shadowboxing. But, more importantly, the Senate is totally lacking in any outstanding filibuster "gothic" style. Sen. Theodore G. "The Man" Bilbo (D-Miss) occasionally takes the spotlight, but his gallery is a sorry one compared to those that turned out for the Huey P. Long and "Old Bob" La Follette.

The only real gallery the 24-day filibuster had was on the day when the long-advertised cloture vote was taken.

But the fact remains, the FEPC bill is as dead as the fabled dodo. In spite of its failure to be a good show, the Senate filibuster again has proved a deadly legislative weapon.

more or with deductions over 10 per cent—you have to figure your tax and itemize your deductions. By itemizing them—when they're over 10 per cent—you can claim whatever your deductions are.

Husbands and wives: You can file a joint return on the short form if your combined income was under \$5,000.

If your income combined was over \$5,000 but individually less than \$5,000, you can file separate returns on the short form or a combined return on the long form.

But one can't use the short form and the other the long form, if your combined income was over \$5,000 but individually less than \$5,000.

Here's an example of working out the short form:
You, married, one child, had income of \$4,000 from salary and \$200 from interest on bonds. So you'll need only page 1. Line by line steps are unnecessary; page 1 is so simple.

Where it says to list your exemptions, you list yourself, wife and child. Where it says your income, you write down—in the example given here—4,000 in salary and \$200 in interest. Write them separately.

You total the two. The total is \$4,200. In the table on page 4—because you claim three exemptions—yourself, wife and child—you look down the third column.

It shows that the tax on a man whose income is \$4,200 and who had three exemptions, is \$566. You write that tax in the proper place on page 1.

During 1945 full tax was withheld from wages and salaries up to \$5,000. So, since your salary was \$4,000, the full tax was withheld from it. In your case, with three exemptions, it was \$21. The table shows that.

You write that in the proper place on page 1. You find that you have, through tax withheld from your salary, paid \$21 but that your total tax—because of that \$200 bond interest from which no tax was

withheld—is \$566.

So you still owe the collector—in addition to the \$521 taken out of salary in 1945—a balance of \$45. You turn in the money to the internal revenue collector, together with your short form return.

The British are prepared to repatriate all DP's as fast as they ask for it but there is no inclination to force anybody to go home against his will.

We took a look at the site of the Belzen concentration camp and saw the great graves in which are buried thousands of murdered people.

The camp itself has been leveled and about the only thing left standing is the steel incinerator which the Nazis were said to have used to burn Russian prisoners alive. In contemplating this horror one couldn't help recalling that the British now are conducting police schools in which men are being trained in democratic methods to respect the rights of the citizen.

The House last night by a vote of 222 to 43 passed legislation aimed directly at the control of the authority wielded by the president of the American Federation of Musicians. A much milder measure won Senate approval last year.

Although the Senate Naval Committee was in recess until next week, the fight over the nomination of Edwin W. Pauley to be undersecretary of the Navy remained a prime discussion topic in the Capitol's cloak rooms.

A number of Senate Democrats who fear a photo-plugging fight if Pauley's nomination reaches the floor were re-examined pushing strategy to get the California oil man's name withdrawn.

Their prospects looked dubious at the moment, however, for Mr. Truman has reaffirmed his backing of Pauley, and Pauley himself has insisted he wants the issue brought before the Senate for a showdown.

GMC-CIO Pact . . .

General Motors Company announced today that it had agreed to accept the President's recommendation of 19.1-2 cents an hour more, he asserted.

That figure, amounting to a 17.5 per cent raise was the one agreed to by the union after it reduced its original demand for a 30 per cent boost. General Motors has offered an increase of 18.1-2 cents hourly (16.5) per cent.

Auto Accidents Tally 138 Deaths

Raleigh, Feb. 22—(AP)—Motor vehicle accidents on North Carolina highways between January 1 and February 17 resulted in the death of 138 persons. Major H. J. Hatcher of the State Highway Patrol reported today.

There were 104 fatal accidents in that period, with the death toll running as high as five persons in a single mishap. Thirty-seven pedestrians were killed by motor vehicles. Forty-nine lives were lost in collisions involving two vehicles, and 12 persons died in crushing crashes between trains and automobiles. Thirty-two persons were killed when motor vehicles ran off the road, three died when their motor vehicles overturned on the highway, and two bicyclists were killed when struck by cars. Other types of accidents cost three lives.

Farm Products May Get Price Increase

Raleigh, Feb. 22—(AP)—Increases in industrial wages "will necessitate a comparable increase in the price of agricultural commodities," Representative Harold D. Cooley (D-NC) said in a telegram received here by State College Extension Service editors.

The message expressed belief that the 65-cents-an-hour minimum wage bill will be passed by congress and approved by the President. "When the wage bill comes before the house," Cooley added, "the Pace parity bill to place price floors under farm commodities will be offered as an amendment." The Pace bill passed two previous tests in the house.

Leon Blum Expected To Arrive In U. S.

Washington, Feb. 22—(AP)—Leon Blum, the former French premier and socialist leader, is expected to arrive here next week on an economic mission.

In diplomatic quarters, it was assumed the visit will be in connection with proposed negotiations by France for a loan of possibly \$2,500,000,000 from this country.

Under the Army program, men who enlist are given the opportunity of studying one or more of 200 skills and trades in Army training schools in this country and in overseas theaters throughout the world.

"We believe," said W. W. Woolard, chairman of Pitt County School Board, "that the Army is giving many hundreds of thousands of young men educational opportunities they would not be able to afford otherwise."

"Far too many young men are unable to complete their high school courses, and a much smaller percentage have the advantage of college education. The Army gives them splendid training while they are in uniform.

"Also, after they leave the Army, under the GI Bill of Rights they may have a year's refresher course in a trade or business school, with tuition paid and a monthly living allowance. Those who enter the Army now may, upon leaving, have a year's college, business or trade school education for each year they serve in the Army."

Jamaica's political and economic crisis.

Bombay, Feb. 22.—(AP)—City-wide civilian riots touched off by a seamen's mutiny flamed in Bombay today amid machinegun fire. British troops, planes, and warships converged on the city of 1,400,000, which A. E. Cuffin, deputy police commissioner, declared to be in a state of absolute rebellion.

The Royal Indian Navy mutiny continued here but at Karachi parachute troopers with artillery fired for 25 minutes on the H. M. I. S. Hindustan, 1,000-ton sloop seized by rebellious seamen, and forced the mutineers to run up the white flag.

In Bombay rifle and machine gun fire crackled in many sections against mobs which beat, stoned and knifed their victims, set fire to many police and military trucks and private cars, smashed store and bank windows and went on a looting spree.

Hundreds of British Tommies poured into the city in trucks and armed cars with orders to fire as occasion demanded. A heavy force of bomber planes arrived at airfields ringing the city. In the harbor munition Indians still in control of a flotilla of 10 small war craft were faced by the advance guard of a strong Royal Navy force ordered here to put down the mutiny. Heavy artillery was being sent to the city.

Prime Minister Attlee in London told the House of Commons that the All-India Congress Party had officially disclaimed participation in the mutiny, but left wing elements and Communists are trying to work up sympathy. The mutineers have been told that only unconditional surrender will be accepted. A British cruiser shortly would arrive on the scene, he added.

Two small British naval vessels HMS Nith, with an escort frigate with a normal complement of 200 men and HMS Seabelle, a yacht type vessel, each with four-gun turrets, steamed into the harbor.

A 9 p. m. curfew was imposed. Advanced headquarters of the Southern Indian Command were set up in Bombay with Lt. Gen. R. M. M. Lockhart in supreme command of all Royal Indian Navy, army and air forces as the British moved to cope with the mutiny.

CHINESE RUIN RED HANG-OUT

Communists' News Plant Wrecked By Nationalist Group

Chungking, Feb. 22.—(AP)—The three-story downtown office and bookstore of the Communist New China Daily News was wrecked today.

Intruders smashed all furniture and tossed it out of windows with fittings, personal belongings of employees and books and papers, that were torn to bits.

Communists charged the intruders were Kuomintang (National) Party secret service men. They said the intruders battled Communist employees from room to room and floor to floor.

Two employees were hospitalized with serious injuries. Meantime, more than 10,000 Chinese students marched through Chungking streets demanding that Russia quit Manchuria and asking that Communists answer five questions, including "who is organizing the puppet regimes in Manchuria?"

Among the spreading "Quit Manchuria" clamor, several newspapers reported that the Chinese taking over process there was at a complete standstill.

They said that government officials were twiddling their thumbs waiting to be in a position to assume assigned posts and that all government troop movements or the purpose of recovering Chinese sovereignty had been halted.

The World Daily News reported that Chiang Kai-shek's elder son, who is a special commissioner for foreign affairs in Manchuria, left Chungking on Feb. 20 on the second visit to Moscow, where he is to open discussions on the Manchurian problem.

Dispatches from Peiping said a seven-man delegation representing the newly established Eastern Mongolian Republic planned to fly to Chungking shortly to seek the Chinese government's recognition as an independent state.
