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WASHINGTON DAYBOOK

Washington — Your capital in perspective: Maybe this year, certainly next, Hawaii will be on the way to becoming the 49th state. The chief argument against it is the mixed population of the islands. This same argument was put forward 34 years ago when the last two states—Arizona and New Mexico—were brought in. Alaska will have to wait a while, maybe quite a while.

President Truman didn't equivocate in his long state-of-the-union message when he suggested for Hawaii "prompt favorable action" on her statehood application. As for Alaska, he merely suggested that it be granted statehood as soon as it is certain that her people desire it.

These aren't partisan political issues. The President spoke on the basis of reports from both areas.

"So far as I know, it was first pointed out in this column that the area selected for the United Nations headquarters in the United States would find itself with headaches that would make most of the bidders that were passed over glad they hadn't been selected.

"It certainly has happened. The protests of the New York-Connecticut residents in the area given preliminary approval were so vigorous they even reached London, where the UNO was deciding upon a permanent location.

"Sen. Arthur H. Vandenberg (R-Mich.) has a pretty loud voice in the Senate on all UNO matters. He is the recognized leader of the Republicans on United Nations affairs. His suggestion that a comparatively remote campus would be adequate for UNO headquarters rather than the 42 square miles of Manhattan estate land suggested by the site committee took quite a hold in the Senate.

"It may be assumed that the Senators were thinking on this purely in terms of the interests of their states. There are a few states that wouldn't like to have the world capital within their borders, but fewer still that would like to give up 42 square miles of choice tax-paying land owned by some of their 'most influential citizens' just for that historical privilege.

In spite of protests, though, the UNO general assembly finally voted to set up headquarters in Fairleigh County, Connecticut, and Westchester County, New York.

Political observers here are awaiting the answer to one \$64 question: How far will Old Curmudgeon Harold L. Ickes go in fighting President Truman now that he has left the cabinet?

In spite of his 15 years in national government (13 of them in the

but not his descendants; a legally adopted child; a brother, sister, or step-brother, step-sister, your parents, grandparents or other ancestors, your step-father, step-mother, uncle, aunt, nephew, niece by blood—and your in-laws. Father, mother, sister, brother, son or daughter-in-law.

When you list your exemptions on form W-2, the withholding receipt, or on the 1040 short form, you do not do any figuring. With both of those forms you find your tax in a tax table.

Those tables make allowances for each exemption of a person filing a return. So you just look in the table for the tax according to your 1945 income and the number of your exemption.

It's when you tackle the 1040 long form—where you have to figure your own tax and can't use a table—that you must do arithmetic with each of the \$500 exemptions you claim.

How this is done will be explained in a later story showing how a 1040 long form is worked out. This story is intended merely to call your attention to the importance of claiming your rightful exemptions.

Here's a simple example of exemptions:

of coal mined and ready for shipment from the Ruhr with nothing like enough transport available to move this fuel upon which the restoration of the country so largely depends.

In the midst of this hardship there is an almost unbelievably incongruous touch. Mrs. Mack and I immediately noted that the Germans in the British zone—and we understand that the same is true in many other parts of the country—are far better dressed than are the folk of the Allied countries of Britain, Belgium, Holland, and France.

That must seem like a fairly tale to the readers and as a matter of fact my partner and I found it hard to believe at first glance. But it's true and the explanation is simple enough: If you know how to look for it, Britain has been deprived of new clothing by inability either to import or to manufacture it.

The government already is paying subsidies to packers at the rate of \$720,000,000 a year on the theory that the spread between meat ceiling prices and costs are so narrow that the industry must have the payments for a fair return on operations.

Tanker In Distress South Of Aleutians

Ketchikan, Alaska, Feb. 23.—(AP)—Rescue vessels fought the stormy North Pacific today for the second time this month to save persons on board a shattered ship—this time the Russian tanker Donbass in distress south of the Aleutians.

A second Russian tanker, unidentified, removed 23 persons, including five women, from the wallowing after section of the broken Donbass. period for the first time and an increase in fatigue time.

A joint announcement of the agreement was made by Emil Rieve, TWUA president, and Kamp P. Lewis, president of the Erwin Mills.

Governor Cherry issued a statement in which he said, "It is felt that during the conference here in Raleigh, the representatives of the union and management have each manifested a very fine spirit of cooperation."

"I sincerely hope that the rank and file of employees will accept the terms of the settlement now consummated in the same splendid spirit as that manifested by those taking part in the negotiations."

The announcement came at 1 o'clock this morning after a session which continued through most of Thursday and last night. Governor Cherry, who Tuesday called the conference, was present when the agreement was reached.

Cherry remained at his office and home most of the day and night in anticipation of a call to the conference. He personally joined the session at 11:30 last night and the agreement was reported reached in little more than an hour thereafter.
