

WRECK OF AIR LINER WORST IN HISTORY

Rescue Parties Work To Recover Bodies Of 27 Victims

San Diego, Calif., March 4—(AP)—Bulldozers cut through forest and brush on the steep slopes of Thimble Mountain today, clearing a path to effect the recovery of 27 bodies from a wrecked and burned American Airlines passenger plane.

Indications were that stretcher bearers would not be able to get the bodies, all but six of them charred, until late in the day.

Westbound from New York to Los Angeles, the plane yesterday rammed into the side of the fog-shrouded mountain, 60 miles east of San Diego, less than an hour before its scheduled landing in Los Angeles. It was last reported over El Centro, Calif., at 7:53 a. m. and is believed to have crashed and exploded a few minutes later.

The crash was the worst in commercial airlines history. On Jan. 10, 1945, 24 were killed in an American Airlines plane near Los Angeles.

Hill and snowstorms hampered the rescue parties and the path-clearing crew. Progress up the 6,000-foot peak was slow. A sheriff's party reached the crash scene, 1,500 feet from the summit, yesterday afternoon. They found all but the tail section and a part of the wing had been destroyed by flames.

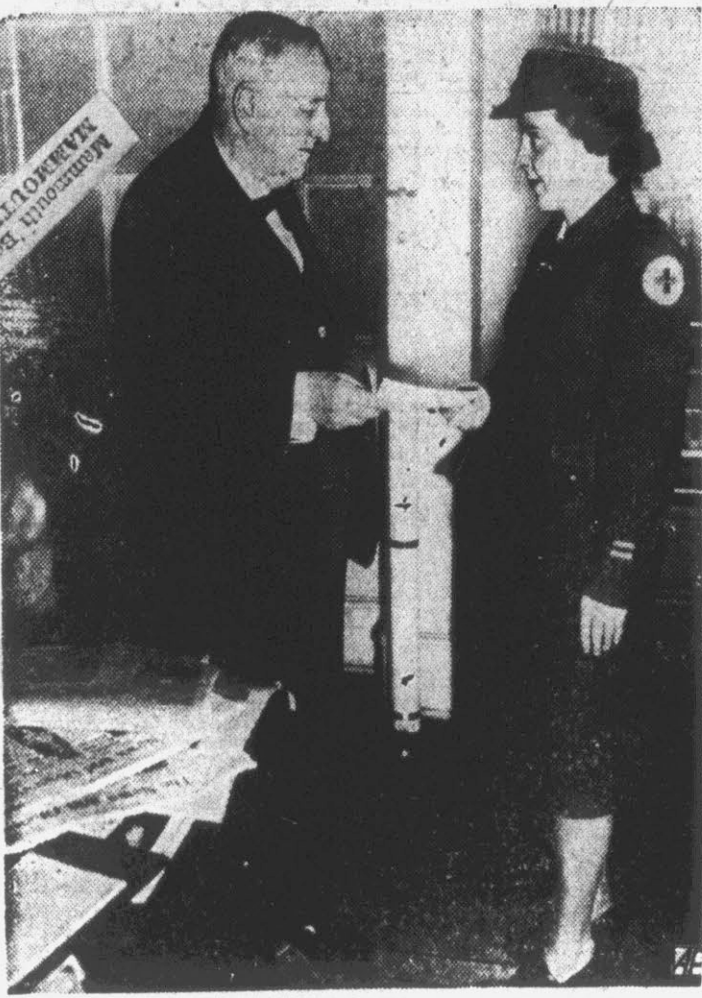
A newspaper reporter who reached the scene said the big airlines appeared to have bonded several hundred feet after striking the mountain. The plane struck near a road leading through the Manzanita Indian Reservation.

The bodies of 23 adults and two infants were found by searchers before the hunt was abandoned to await the dawn. Bodies of the other two passengers are believed to be in the charred wreckage.

Eight navy planes that attempted to fly over the mountain were forced back yesterday by strong winds and fog, but a coast guard plane later discovered the wreckage from the air and started the search.

The flight originated in New York at 12:02 p. m. Eastern Standard Time. Saturday. Sixteen passengers boarded the plane at Dallas, Tex., at 1:41 a. m. Central Standard Time. Sunday. Capt. S. L. Shiner. (Continued on Page Eight)

PARTY STAKES PRESTIGE ON HOUSING BILL

Hannegan Assumes Personal Leadership In Backing Housing Program

Washington, March 4—(AP)—The democratic party staked its congressional prestige today on a desperate bid to salvage the administration's imperiled housing program.

Simultaneously, Chester Bowles who marshaled his entire economic high command for a blistering weekend blast at price control setbacks on Capitol Hill ran into a republican demand that he resign as stabilization boss.

Robert Hannegan, assumed personal leadership of the eleven-hour campaign to save President Truman's homes-for-veterans program by wiring each of the 239 democrats in the House.

"Your action today may advance or delay the solution to the nation's housing problem. Your presence and support of the administration's housing program is imperative."

"Solid partisan Republican opposition to essential parts of this program, especially premium (subsidy) payments, threatens to torpedo the measure. The democratic party will be held responsible by the country for failure to solve the housing crisis. Not the Republicans. We cannot let this happen. Am counting on you to go all out for administration housing program Monday afternoon."

In a barrage of Sunday statements—some angry and some pleading—the five top generals of the economic front sought to change the mind of Congress on homes for veterans and funds for the wage-price program.

Bowles led off by declaring that actions of Congress last week "represented good news only for the black marketers, for the gougers and the speculators, for all the selfish pressure groups who think that somehow, in an inflationary rough-and-tumble, they can get theirs and get out."

The newly designated stabilizer noted bitterly that the House Appropriations Committee had recommended withdrawal of \$2,250,000 in operating funds of the wage stabilization board and that the Senate had cut in half house-approved allotments to permit the OPA and the civilian production administration to expand their activities.

Housing Chief Wilson W. Wyatt, lashing out at what he described as "one of the biggest lobbies that has ever operated against essential legislation," declared that if Congress defeats the housing bill the goal of 2,700,000 homes for veterans in two years cannot be reached.

Auto Union Set For Long Strike

CIO-UAW Heads Prepare To Intensify 104-Day-Old Strike; Call GMC Secret Back-To-Work Ballot A Probable Infraction Of National Labor Relations Act; Both Sides Stand Firm On Wage Issues Following Corporation's Refusal To Agree To Arbitration

Detroit, March 4—(AP)—The CIO United Auto Workers, faced with a refusal by General Motors Corp. to arbitrate, prepared today to intensify the 104-day-old strike.

The corporation turned thumbs down on a union proposal to leave to an arbitrator the settlement of the longest and costliest strike in automotive history.

Instead, the corporation suggested that the UAW-CIO let its 175,000 idle members vote in secret on whether they wish to accept an 18 1-2 cents hourly wage increase and return to work.

The union is demanding 19 1-2 cents as recommended by a presidential fact finding board.

Prior to the turn down of the arbitration plan, the union had warned that rejection by GM would force the UAW-CIO "to intensify strike action and to carry on until the strike is won."

Special Federal Mediator James F. Dewey, who has struggled vainly for several weeks to resolve the dispute, called both sides to another negotiating session (at 10:30 a.m.) today.

The UAW-CIO had said Saturday that it was willing to send its members back into the nearly 100 struck GM plants under the corporation's 18 1-2 cent wage increase offer if GM would submit that issue and others in the dispute to an arbitrator.

In a lengthy reply to this proposal, the corporation said it would not arbitrate the wage issue, which it called the "only one."

"General Motors" offer, the statement read, "is within the wage policy of the country. It conforms to the wage pattern of the automotive industry."

"That leaves only one issue, namely, the question of whether General Motors should grant a greater general wage increase than its competitors or more than the pattern for the country. We don't need arbitration to decide this point. 'What, then, are we to arbitrate?'"

The union, through statements by its top leaders, said GM did not "dare" to arbitrate and termed the proposal for the secret back-to-work ballot an "unwarranted interference." (Continued on Page Eight)

RUSSIANS ARE POURING INTO MANCHURIA

Witness Says Red Army Holding Man- euvers: Dairen Call- ed Soviet Camp

Chungking, March 4—(AP)—Chinese sources who requested anonymity asserted today that Russian troops are continuing to pour into Manchuria in an unceasing flow.

These sources declared that Soviet occupation forces in the big territory to the north numbered 300,000 six months ago, and now were almost double that figure.

A delayed dispatch from Associated Press Correspondent Richard Cushing yesterday described the port of Dairen as an armed Russian camp. Non-Russians there told him Japanese prisoners were forced to dismantle Manchurian industries for the Russians.

Cushing reported that he and two other American correspondents were given "the bum's rush" out of Dairen after making their way there from Mukden, Manchurian industrial metropolis. They received a cool reception, possibly because "we must have seen all of the Red Army maneuvers being staged along at least 30 miles of railroad."

Reaching Set Liao Wilson of the army newspaper Stars and Stripes and AP photographer Julian Wilson were the first American correspondents to visit Dairen. Their 25-hour visit ended abruptly and under virtual arrest.

Cushing said they were given no opportunity to see the city of 900,000 which, under the Chinese-Russian treaty, is supposed to be jointly operated by those two nations.

Upon returning to Mukden Feb. 28, the newsmen were told by Maj. Gen. Andrei Kovtoun-Stankievich that Japanese prisoners of war were sent to Siberia after being disarmed. Where they were sent, for what purpose, the Russian commandant professed ignorance.

At Dairen, Cushing was told by an engineer that the Russians took possibly 4,000 Japanese war prisoners. (Continued on Page Eight)

Davenport Is Evasive In Cross-Examination

Judge Instructs De- fendant To Give Di- rect Answers; State And Davenport Ar- rive At Different Re- sults On Reading Identical Records

The fifth week of Roderick Davenport's trial on charges of conspiracy to defraud and fraud by false pretense, growing out of his "Big Apple" loan operations, opened in Pitt County Superior Court today, with Davenport continuing under cross examination by Solicitor Dave M. Clark.

With cross-examination of the former loans broker scheduled to be completed today, indications were that the presentation of evidence in the case might be completed by Wednesday and the case given to the jury for deliberation.

Clark said at the opening of this morning's session that he had a few key rebuttal witnesses still to be heard, but indicated they would not take a great deal of time. Judge J. Paul Frizzelle of Snow Hill, who presided over the last Meadows trial here, has charge of the present trial.

Meanwhile, the state continued its efforts to prove that Davenport's "Big Apple" loans business could not have been solvent and that the thousands of dollars he took in deposits on the assurance of five per cent interest weekly, actually were taken in under false pretense and in a fraudulent manner.

Clark, through questioning of Davenport, made the New Bern man admit that he lost money on his small loans operations in Greenville, and in Rocky Mount. Records introduced by the state showed Davenport loaned out only a little over \$1,300 here, and collected. (Continued on Page Eight)

Staff Preparing UNO Police Plan

Washington, March 4—(AP)—The number of men, ships and planes this country may be willing to contribute to UNO's international police force is expected to be decided tentatively within the next two weeks.

Present indications are that the emphasis will be on warships and aircraft, rather than on troops.

The question is in the hands of the Joint Chiefs of Staff. This group of top-Army-Navy leaders is due to come up with some kind of an answer before the March 21 meeting in New York of the Military Staff Committee on UNO's Security Council.

Representatives of the Big Five—the United States, Great Britain, Russia, France and China—the Military Staff Committee will be faced at the outset with the problem of determining the size and makeup of the force with which the United Nations will undertake to "maintain or restore international peace and security."

Persons close to the American members of the committee said they have not yet received any instructions from the Joint Chiefs of Staff but that they expect some word in advance of the New York meeting.

JANITOR HELD FOR MURDERS

Suspect Confesses To Slayings In Aban- doned Stone Mill

Indianapolis, March 4—(AP)—Capt. Robert A. O'Neal of the Indiana State Police said today Joseph L. Woolridge, 29-year-old Negro janitor, had made a signed statement in which he confessed the slayings of Russell Koonitz and Mrs. Phyllis Coleman in an abandoned stone mill near Bloomington, Ind.

Capt. O'Neal said Woolridge made the statement in the presence of several state police officers.

Koonitz, 42, was a Bloomington business man and a former Sunday school superintendent. Mrs. Coleman worked in a Bloomington creamery office and sang in the choir of the church where Koonitz was superintendent.

Capt. O'Neal said Woolridge told of being on a ground hog hunt last Friday and of finding Koonitz and Mrs. Coleman in the stone mill. The bodies were found in the mill. (Continued on page eight)

U. S. Prestige Hurt By Army's Conduct

Seoul, March 4—(AP)—Lt. Gen. John R. Hodge, commander of the Southern Korea occupation zone, expressed concern today over misconduct by his American troops which he said is "surely destroying the good will and trust of liberated Koreans."

"A few outlaws in our ranks together with several careless and thoughtless individuals," he said, "are blocking our ability to accomplish our mission and delaying the day when we can return our forces to the United States as well as destroying the prestige of America in the Orient."

Hodge, in a statement to his troops, cited one slaying, several armed robberies and assaults upon Koreans in the past few days.

Hodge's statement did not elaborate on the reported murder, except to add that it was committed during a holdup.

Report On Russian Espionage Released

Mackenzie King States Russia Sought A- Bomb Data, Information On Radar And Movement Of American Troops

Ottawa, March 4—(AP)—The Canadian Government in a 3,000-word statement today declared the Russian military attaché here had been instructed by Moscow to obtain data on atomic bomb material, radar, American electronic shells and the movements of American troops and that some data had been secured from Canadian and British citizens violating official secret legislation.

Prime Minister W. L. Mackenzie King made the report, which in part was a response to a recent Moscow statement that information obtained in Canada was insignificant and that King was attempting to divert attention from British "failures" in the United Nations Security Council.

The Royal Investigating Commission told King that Miss Kathleen Mary Willsher, who was deputy registrar in the office of Malcolm MacDonald, United Kingdom high commissioner in Canada, "had access to practically all secret documents in that office" and disclosed them. Three other civil servants were named.

"The evidence reveals that these operations were carried out by certain members of the staff of the Soviet Embassy at Ottawa under direct instructions from Moscow," the report said.

Four Children Die In School Bus Wreck

Louisburg, March 4—(AP)—A school bus carrying 30 Negro children and with an inexperienced driver at the wheel crashed through a bridge railing and plunged into Perry's Pond, near here, today and four were killed and at least 14 injured.

The dead were identified as De Ottho Crudden and Lorraine Kearney, both 17, and James Randall and Furley Davis, both 13. Twelve were given first aid out of the 30 brought to Louisburg. Two others were carried to Rocky Mount for hospitalization.

Sheriff John P. Moore said that 15-year-old William Young, whom he described as inexperienced and uncertified, was driving. Young was injured. Moore and School Superintendent Wiley Mitchell said that Jacob Young, the certified driver, was in the bus.

The bus was headed to Gettysburg School.

It was one of the worst school bus accidents in state history.

Britain Asks Russia To Explain Actions

London, March 4—(AP)—Authoritative sources disclosed today that Great Britain has asked Russia to explain her refusal to withdraw troops from Iran in accordance with the British-Russian-Iranian agreement.

A British note was said to have been dispatched to the British charge d'affaires, Frank Roberts, in Moscow for communications to the Soviet government.

The text of the note also was reported dispatched to the State Department at Washington.

France And Britain To Evacuate Syria

Paris, March 4—(AP)—The French Foreign Office announced today that France and Britain have agreed to withdraw their troops from Syria by April 30.

Joint withdrawal of the troops will begin March 11, the announcement said.

It added that a French-British military commission which negotiated the agreement is now studying plans for the evacuation of Lebanon.

ARMY'S PAPER UNDER FIRE

Staff Of Stars And Stripes Protest Interference

Tokyo, March 4—(AP)—Three more members of the editorial staff of Pacific Stars and Stripes applied for transfer today, bringing to seven the number asking for new assignments as a result of the ouster of two other members on the grounds of questionable integrity and discretion.

The managing editor, T-3 Kenneth L. Pettus of Chicago, and a featured columnist, T-5 Barnard Rubin of Waterbury, Conn., were transferred to Yokohama last week after General MacArthur approved a report from his inspection general that both soldiers belonged to the Communist party, had "flavored" their writings with "Communist thought," and that their "discretion and integrity" was questionable.

Four staff members applied for transfers yesterday and today three others followed suit—T-Set, Henry L. Moore, Jr., Columbus, Miss.; T-4 Francis D. Canavan, Bronx, N. Y., and T-5 John P. Hancock, Joliet, Ill.

The four yesterday were T-3 Arthur R. Davidson of Houston, Tex., editor; T-3 Robert Cornwall of Jacksonville, Fla., staff correspondent in Korea; T-3 Edwin White of Tipton, Mo., staff writer; and T-4 Gordon T. Reynolds, photographer.

Sergeant Moore wrote the officer in charge of the Army newspaper work in the United States that "my professional ethics" forbid working "in a prostituted press." He referred to two years "of the most undemocratic inconsistent treatment to which a man can be subjected." (Continued on Page Eight)

The NATION TODAY

Washington, March 4—(AP)—Do you know what NAM is? It's the National Association of Manufacturers, one of the most powerful and active of all business groups looking out for business interests.

It claims about 14,000 members, whose yearly dues range from a minimum of \$50 up to thousands, depending, NAM says, upon what service the members want.

Recently NAM has come out through full page newspaper advertisements, for an end to price control. This drive begins at a critical time in the life of OPA.

Its price control powers end June 30 unless Congress extends them beyond that date.

NAM's position is that with controls off, prices might go up but only for a short time. When there's full production, NAM insists, will force prices down.

The government sees it differently, believing price controls must be retained for some time to avoid disastrous inflation.

A prime figure in NAM is Walter V. Weisenburger, tall executive vice-president.

One time president of the St. Louis Chamber of Commerce, he left there in 1934 to take his present job. NAM headquarters in New York says that when Weisenburger went to NAM its membership was less than 1,500 but under his drive has reached 14,000.

NAM, organized in 1895, elects a new president every year. The 1946 president is Robert R. Wason. He also is president of Manning, Maxwell and Moore, a New York firm which manufactures cranes and hoists.

NAM is the national organization of manufacturers, but it has close links with state and local associations of manufacturers, although NAM says they are completely independent groups.

NAM is one of the most active of all business groups in making its views known to Congress. It has a large Washington office and nine regional offices.

Although Weisenburger is the only elected vice-president, NAM has four appointed vice-presidents. They head the big divisions of NAM such as public relations, legislation, membership relations and inter-association.

This is the way NAM says its programs are born.

Committees are set up to work out a policy on problems that arise. These committees then make their recommendations to the executive. (Continued on Page Eight)

Draft Law Faces Its First Test Tomorrow

Washington, March 4—(AP)—An initial Senate sentiment toward extending the draft law beyond May 15 is due tomorrow.

The military committee meets then to pass on a bill to transfer veterans' job rights functions from Selective Service to the United States Employment Service.

The measure could have a powerful influence on draft extension legislation because its enactment would remove any argument that Selective Service must be continued if only to safeguard the rights of returned servicemen to their pre-war jobs.

With the draft act due to expire in little more than two months, the Senate committee is expected to be charting a definite course in the next 10 days.

Paris, March 4—Will Generalissimo Francisco Franco capitulate to demands for a democratic form of government in Spain or will it take another terrible civil war to settle the issue?

When I made a survey of the situation in Madrid a month ago it seemed clear that Franco recognized his dictatorship was doomed by Allied opposition and that he was maneuvering for a graceful, face-saving exit from the rank of chief of state. I believe that he had hopes for retaining command of the Spanish army under a restoration of the monarchy, although this obviously would lay him open to a charge of trying to control the new government through his military "strength."

The slans are that the Generalissimo still is maneuvering for a compromise. Be that as it may, this is a tense moment for Europe, because it wouldn't take much to set the civil conflict of 1936-39 in motion again.

Militarily Franco's position is far more powerful than it was when he overthrew the Republican regime in 1939 after three years of horror and established his dictatorship. He has had plenty of time to consoli-

date his ground and he hasn't neglected the military side.

The Spanish standing army is estimated at 700,000 men, and while it is equipped mainly with light arms, that's a lot of strength numerically. Moreover, Franco has been building highways and bridges which may have been designed for peaceful purposes but which would be invaluable for the quick movement of troops and supplies. In the vicinity of Madrid I saw many concrete roadcuts which commanded the highway leading to the capital. Obviously the Generalissimo has anticipated the contingency of further civil war. It is equally clear he has had in mind that he who controls the army controls Spain.

I was in Madrid on the eve of the arrival in Portugal of Don Juan, pretender to the Spanish throne, for further discussions with Franco's representative regarding a possible restoration of the throne. These discussions had been going on quietly for a long time and I have small doubt that the generalissimo hoped an agreement would provide him with an avenue of escape from the dilemma created by the Allied insistence that his totalitarian government must go. May Take Herring, Shad After April 1

The shad and herring season opens in inland water—Tar River above the Grimesland bridge—April 1. District Game and Fish Protector J. O. Teel, said today. The fish may be taken on Thursdays, Fridays and Saturdays through June 15. This includes all tributaries of the river. The shad and herring season opened in Contentnea Creek on March 1 and continues through May 10, the fish being permitted to be taken on Thursdays, Fridays and Saturdays.

The shad and herring season in commercial water—Tar River below Grimesland bridge—is now open.

Line fishing in inland water will close on April 6 and reopen on May 20. Fishermen must have licenses when they use artificial bait, but not when using ordinary worm or grub bait. A county fishing license costs \$1.10; state license, \$3.10; daily fishing permits cost 60c each. Licenses may be procured at hardware stores and from other agents.

Incidentally, the game and fish protectors now cover districts of a number of counties, instead of keeping within their county lines.

Billie Branch Sold 22 Million Pounds

CHRISTIANITY IS PRACTICAL.
Lyman Beecher, father of Henry
Ward Beecher, was a man in many
ways far in advance of his day.
He was a great evangelist, and his
conversions ran into the thousands.

One thing he always maintained
was that one's spiritual life large-
ly depended upon one's physical
state, and he often scandalized peo-
ple by the questions he asked them.
Instead of asking a man who want-
ed to be saved what he believed
about God, he would often ask such
a person by asking about his hab-
its of life—what he ate, how
many hours sleep he got each night.
Beecher believed a deep sense of
sin often had its origin in dyspepsia,
and that what some people needed
to make their spiritual life right was
a little wholesome common sense
about the care of their bodies. Men
who came to Lyman Beecher seek-
ing light on theological matters were
often sent away after being given a
straight talk on physical and men-
tal hygiene. Beecher believed that
stomach-ache and heart-ache often
bore to each other the relationship
of cause and effect.

Such a point of view can, of
course, easily be pushed too far; but
it behooves us all when we begin to
worry about our souls to ask our-
selves whether or not we are giving
our bodies a square deal.

WASHINGTON DAYBOOK

Washington—GIs aren't the only
ones who served in this war who
are having reconversion job troubles.

A lot of industrialists and "big
business men" are going home to
find no job at all or that they
have been passed over while doing
m in and out of foxholes on the
Potomac.

Take the case of Ralph K. Davies,
deputy petroleum administrator for
war.

In June, 1941, Davies was execut-
ive vice president of Standard Oil
of California and considered in the
industry certain successor to acting
President Henry D. Collier. In that
month, on leave of absence he came
to Washington to organize PAW
for then Secretary of Interior Har-
old L. Ickes.

In the almost five years that he
has run that vital agency, Davies,
like a lot of GIs up front, gather-
ing a "mass" of citations and med-
als. He was the only major in-
dustrialist who unlocked the door
of a brand-new wartime agency and
still is around to lock the door when
that agency is no more.

Referring to Davies' work, Sen.
Joseph C. O'Mahoney, (D-Wyo.),
chairman of the senate committee
that investigated PAW, said: "I
have no hesitation in saying that
no achievement in all the history of
commerce and industry ever exceeded
the achievement made by the Petro-
leum Administration for War."
The conservative Oil and Gas
Journal observed: "Davies stands
today as a living symbol of the
petroleum industry's part in this
war and our industry, like that na-
tion, emerges from the war amazed
by its own achievements. But oil
men marvel even more at Davies."

President Truman pinned the Med-
al of Merit on Davies. The Army-
Navy Petroleum board headed by
Admiral F. J. Horne and fourth Gen.
Ehren Somersell cited Davies and
his staff for the "superb contribu-
tion made to the victory."

William R. Boyd, Jr., American
Petroleum Institute president and
chairman of the Oil Industry War
Council, said: "The oil industry
owes Ralph Davies a debt it can
never repay."
So what?

So a few days later, Collier re-
tires as president of Standard Oil
of California and the new presi-
dent becomes R. G. Polli.
In a few weeks, when hearings
on the Anglo-American oil treaty
are over, Davies will lock the door
on the empty offices of PAW and
go home. Sure he can have his
old job back. The same job. The
same money. Maybe he won't go
home. On all points he's absolutely

people are honest."

honesty of Cleveland citizens."

"People running for governor will be
very surprised to know how I ac-

without elaboration.

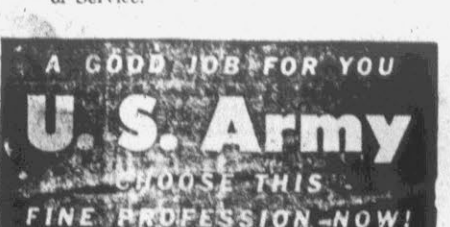

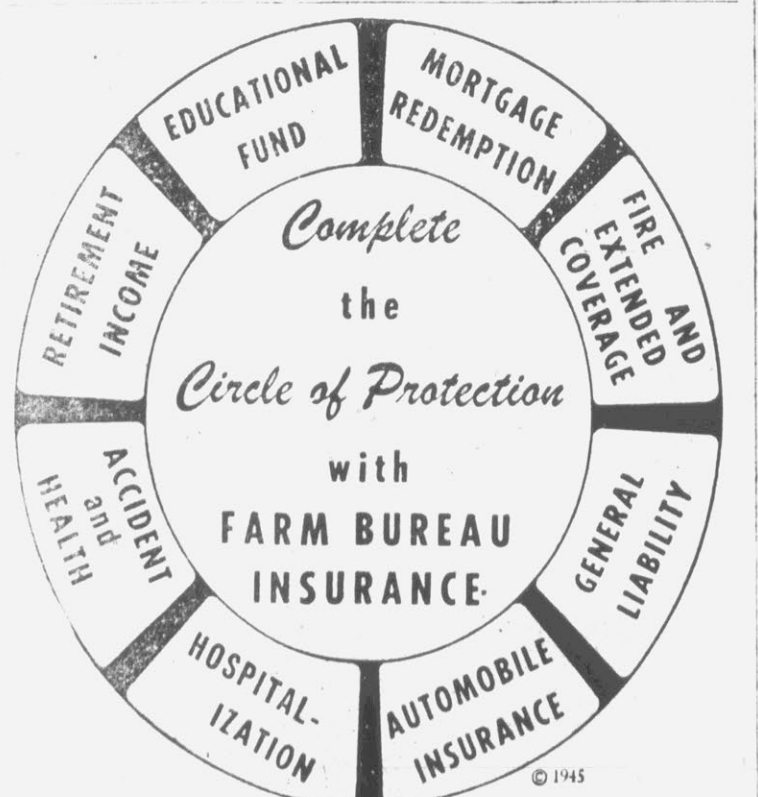

Out In Front

A report from the Collector of Internal Revenue for the District of North Carolina, to the effect that collections for the month of January of this year exceeded by \$20.5 million those of January 1945, may be received with the mixed emotions North Carolinians are apt to exhibit on manifestations of policy. Inevitably, we suppose, there will be some grumbling provoked by this reminder of the current high cost of government. On the other hand, many others may react with pride and satisfaction to this concrete evidence of their state's ability to pay its fiscal way in footing the bill for national existence.

We need not stress the point that our present rate of national expenditure is inflated with the cost of maintaining, for the present, abnormally powerful armed forces as a guarantee of the fruits of victories won on the battlefield, pending the assumption by the United Nations of such function.

The willingness of North Carolina to assume at least its fair share of the bill is also reflected in that state's response to Uncle Sam's appeal for fresh volunteers to fill the ranks of an Army depleted by the demand for the discharge of veterans of long and arduous service. North Carolina is again out in front—conspicuously.

Women IN THE CHURCH

Christian women in more than fifty countries throughout the world and in more than 14,000 communities in the United States will unite on Friday, March 8 in the observance of the World Day of Prayer. Many services will be held interdenominationally and leaders of many races and faiths will participate. Offerings received on that day will support the publication of Christian literature, much of it to people in liberated countries; directors of religious education in eight government Indian schools; the training of Oriental young women in eight Christian colleges in China, Japan, and India, and leadership training for migrants and sharecroppers in the United States. Miss Margaret T. Applegarth is chairman of the World Day of Prayer Committee of the United Council of Church Women, which sponsors the observance.

Members of all Congregational Christian churches in the United States are being urged by their leaders to adopt plans of "self-ra-tioning" during Lent so that larger gifts may be sent for the relief of hungry and unclothed millions in Europe and Asia. Dr. Douglas Horton, minister of the General Council of the denomination, asks that church families on Sundays in Lent "sit down to the simplest possible meal that will sustain us and send the very significant savings which will result to provide food, fuel, and hope for the war victims." Other denominations are being asked by the Federal Council of the Churches of Christ to give "in the spirit of true sacrifice."

Field Marshal Sir Bernard L. Montgomery's acquaintance with the Bible is now a tradition. Recently his aged mother said: "I brought up my children to learn a verse from the Bible every morning before breakfast. It may be that General Montgomery's knowledge and love of the Bible starts from this fact. As is well known, the two books that he carries always with him are the Bible and "Pilgrim's Progress." England and America owe their greatness to the Bible. Let us pray that the Bible God's Word to us, may again take its rightful place in our hearts and homes! So I would urge upon all, do your utmost to bring back the Bible to the nation. And the best way to do this is to begin in your own home, and for you and your children to learn a verse of the Bible by heart daily."

Legion Auxiliary Working For Peace

"Women of World War families must unite to help win the peace," said Mrs. James R. Worsley, president of Pitt County unit of the American Legion Auxiliary, urging support for the auxiliary's work for permanent peace.

"We have again won a terrible World War and the women of the auxiliary are determined that we shall not have to fight another," Mrs. Worsley said. "We are working with the American Legion to help establish and maintain policies which will assure a lasting peace. If another war comes there will be no winners, only death and devastation on both sides."

Women whose sons, husbands, fathers and brothers have fought in either of the two World Wars must take the leadership in women's work for peace. They understand what war means to the families at home as well as to the men at the front and can help arouse the women of the world to work for peace. In the American Legion Auxiliary they will find activities in which they can exert their influence for good will and understanding among nations, for the success of the United Nations Charter, and for the maintenance of armed forces to protect the peace. Active interest and endeavor of women is essential if we are not to lose this peace as we did the last one.

The American Legion Auxiliary is now enrolling its membership for 1946, with special invitations going out to women of World War II families. All women of these families are now eligible to auxiliary membership as soon as the service members of the family join the American Legion, Mrs. Worsley explained. Women who themselves have served in the armed forces are also eligible. Mothers, wives, sisters and daughters of those who have died in the service are eligible for Gold Star membership.

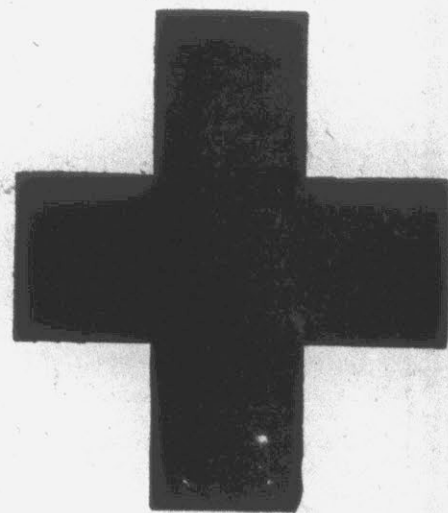

ed back but a little over \$600.
Further consulting the State's records, Clark made Davenport admit that the loans broker called in a total of \$84,111.15 in cash from his four branch offices, and that he himself withdrew a total of \$12,557.15 from the branch stores.
However, Davenport maintained

he loaned out all this money in the New Bern area.

Davenport has consistently refused to identify books presented by the State as evidence as those kept in his branch offices, but has consulted the same records himself in compiling a balanced statement to show that he was solvent at the time he was arrested.

Clark has driven home this fact, and repeatedly has asked Davenport

port questions concerning the books to which Davenport has given evasive answers. Judge Prizzelle on a number of occasions has ordered the former produce dealer to answer Clark's questions directly, instead of taking several minutes of the court's time in evading questions through explanations.

Davenport said under cross examination today that he tried to keep about \$2,500 in banks in towns in which he had branch offices, as considerable money on hand in each office. All told, he said he had approximately \$115,000 in cash on hand in his business to pay out depositors during the height of his loan operations.

The state maintains that had Davenport had this amount on hand he could have paid off the thousands of checks still out against the loans broker and in hands of depositors who can't collect for them.

The state's only rebuttal witness today was Vernon Day of New Bern, a former employee of Davenport. Day testified that he was with Davenport and William J. Gatling, chief SBI agent, when the two had their second conference at New Bern on August 4, 1944. Davenport had denied that any one else was present other than he and Gatling.

Davenport has testified that Gatling told him he would send a favorable report to Governor Broughton following the SBI investigation of the "Big Apple," on Gatling has denied he told Davenport his business was legal. Instead, Gatling said he told Davenport at a Kingston conference on August 3, that "the business would end him in jail if he kept it up."

STATE FIRE MARSHAL HERE

Sherwood Brockwell Speaks To Builders Tonight At 7:45

By Chester Walsh

State Fire Marshal Sherwood Brockwell of Raleigh will be at a meeting of contractors and builders at the Fire Station, Fifth and Greene streets, tonight at 7:45. Fire Chief George Gardner, official building inspector, called the meeting and invited contractors to attend and be informed of state building code laws. At tonight's meeting those present may ask questions and Fire Marshal will gladly answer them. Fire prevention depends largely upon building construction. The state and local laws require that all persons planning to build shall secure an official permit from the building inspector before the work is started.

The state building code requires that outside walls of commercial buildings shall be not less than 12 inches thick for safety. In case of fire in a store or warehouse with eight-inch outside walls, they will crack and crumble when subjected to excessive heat.

Fire Marshal Brockwell will explain the state building code and answer questions tonight. All builders and contractors are invited to attend. It is important to remember that the state building law requires that permits be procured before work is started on any building.

Fire Chief Gardner, with a lifetime of experience in fire-fighting and a thorough knowledge of the importance of construction with a view to fire hazards, was appointed building inspector to strictly enforce the code. His appointment was approved by the state fire marshal.

Soybean Prices Will Remain At '45 Level

The 1946 grower support price on soybeans will be same as for 1945, according to an announcement by J. V. Taylor, chairman of Pitt County AAA Committee.

This action, Mr. Taylor points out, is a result of the tight situation on protein meals and edible industrial oils.

The base support price for 1946 crop green and yellow soybeans grading U. S. No. 2 will be \$2.04 per bushel, with the same differentials as under the 1945 program for other colors and variations in quality.

Methods of supporting prices, Mr. Taylor said, will be announced later.

President Leaves For Celebration

President Truman leaves for Missouri today and a celebration in which he will yield the spotlight in his home state to Winston Churchill.

The former British prime minister will be the principal speaker at Westminster College tomorrow afternoon a few hours after their arrival in Fulton.

The Chief Executive's only role is to introduce the wartime leader who will speak on foreign policy.

The negotiations came a cropper—or at least that was the announcement—and it is a fair guess that the difficulty may have centered in a demand by Franco that he be allowed to retain command of the army. Don Juan all along has insisted that "control of the army should be in the hands of his government and not subject to Franco's command."

As for an expression of public sentiment in Spain, you could hold your ear to the ground until frost-bitten without hearing very much worth while.

However, there are two things which the people certainly desire.

They want an absolutely free national election at which they may choose their own form of government, and they want to achieve that election without another civil war.

That presents a delicate problem for the Allies, because, while firm hand is needed, obviously a wrong move might precipitate a tragedy.

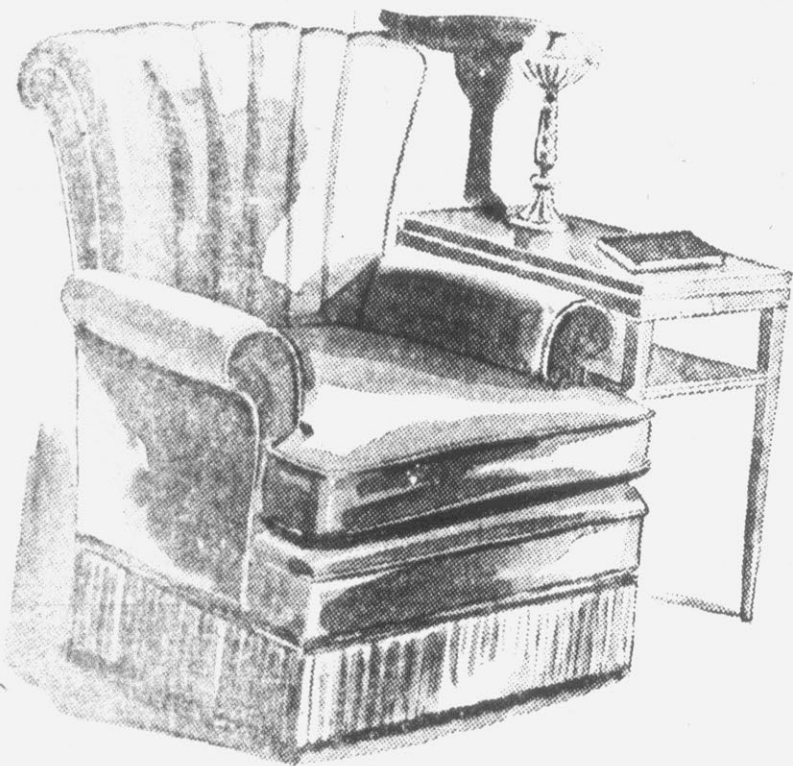
