Reinforcements Converging On Mukden Scene Of Heavy Fighting

Chungking, March 11 (AP)—Chinese Nationalist and Communist reinforcements today were reported moving to Mukden, where the Central News Agency said the rival forces were battling after sudden withdrawal of Soviet troops.

Other reports said the Central government had proclaimed martial law in the skeleton city, whose once-great industrial plants had been picked clean by the Russians.

The press reports declared that elements of four Nationalist armies were marching to Mukden and that Communist reinforcements were moving in from the north. Government elements were identified as from the 13th, 52nd, 1st and 6th armies.

The Central Daily News said the Nationalist 14th division entered Mukden Saturday.

The suddenness of the Soviet withdrawal was blamed for the "serious" street-fighting in Mukden. Dispatches said the Nationalist did not have sufficient troops to cope with the situation.

They said that for the past few days Soviet authorities in Manchuria from Marshal Rodion Y. Malinovsky, Soviet commander, to junior officers, had been inaccessible to Nationalist officials.

The Central News Agency did not interpret the withdrawal from Mukden as a general Russian evacuation of Manchuria. The agency declared that six trains from Mukden had unloaded tanks, artillery and automobiles at Changchun, Manchuria capital.

Police Hold Thieves For Jewel Robberies

New York, March 11 (AP)—Four persons said by police to be members of a "snatch-and-run" gang which had stolen jewels valued at \$400,000, were being held by authorities today while search continued for another.

Detective Lt. John Flynn said three of the persons, one a 31-year-old woman, were arrested here last week. The fourth, he said, is in a federal penitentiary.

Among the shops victimized by the group, were the Cartier, Inc. and Lambert Brothers firms in midtown New York, police said.

Trieste Quiet Under General Strike Call

Trieste, March 11 (AP)—A general strike started today in the whole zone of the allied military government in the Venezia Giulia district at the head of the Adriatic where an allied boundary commission continued its secret hearings.

The strike was called in protest to the slaying of two persons in Sevelia, a suburb of Trieste, while police were removing a Slovene flag from a church. The strikers blamed the police.

Newspaper reporters were barred from sources of information on the activities of the experts of the United States, Russia, Great Britain and France, who are investigating the Italian-Yugoslav boundary dispute.

Trieste was quiet with a Sunday-like atmosphere. All shops and businesses were closed by the strike.

Washington, March 11 (AP)—Winston Churchill undertook another talk today in an answer-to-questions talk at a luncheon given by newsmen.

It was to be an "off-the-record" affair so what he said could not be printed.

For that reason many were going in the hope he might say more fully what is in his mind than he'd say for print.

Some were going because this might be their last chance to see the Englishman who helped his country through its "finest hour."

Churchill is an old man now, 72. He may not be back this way again. He wants to see the Empire preserved. He said he would not liquidate it.

There is great power in Churchill's language and great charm in his husky voice but—

If he came to America hoping his oldtime magic would swing this country into an alliance with Britain, as a block to Russia, he failed.

His Fulton, Mo., speech, where he made the proposal, was received cool. Some Senators called it "shocking." It had small approval.

There is a strange similarity in Churchill's language through the years, but there are contradictions in his career.

PLAIN TALK GIVEN TROOPS

Wuerzburg, Germany, March 11 (AP)—American troops in Wuerzburg were warned by their commanding officer today to refrain from criticizing the Soviet Union to the German people.

Lt. Col. Frank Ebeby of Venice, Calif., issued this order to his command, the 263rd antiaircraft battalion.

"It has been brought to my attention that the morale of the civilian population of Wuerzburg has been raised as the result of a speech in the United States by a British politician, relative to our ally, the Russian people.

"I have heard certain military personnel express agreement with these policies in the presence of German civilians.

"This practice must stop immediately. The Soviet Government is an ally of the U. S. A. and you are individually and collectively representatives of our Government. I will not tolerate such conduct."

Big Anti-Trust Suit To Re-Open

Trenton, N. J., March 11 (AP)—One of the largest anti-trust suits ever prosecuted by the United States government was scheduled to re-open here this afternoon after a war postponement of more than three years.

The suit, charging 11 of the nation's leading bulb and lamp producers with combining to monopolize and restrain the manufacture and sale of electric lamps, will be heard by Judge Phillip Forman in federal district court.

Opening the case for the government will be Leonard J. Emmert, special assistant to U. S. Attorney General Tom Clark.

General Electric, largest of the companies on trial, and represented by Whitney North Seymour, former U. S. Assistant Solicitor General in the Hoover administration, will be the first to plead its case. The firm has said it will take at least five weeks to present its case.

The Corning Glass Works largely removed itself from the proceedings last Friday by signing a consent decree vacating all agreements, limiting patents, sales and prices.

When the old League of Nations, which failed pitifully, was 10 years old Churchill called it a "granite rock" and "palace" to which the whole world would sooner or later resort in "full trust."

Now Churchill calls the League's successor, the United Nations, a "temple" which must be built upon a "rock."

He has been consistent however. In his distrust of Russia, a distrust he smoothed over during the war years in the common fight against Hitler.

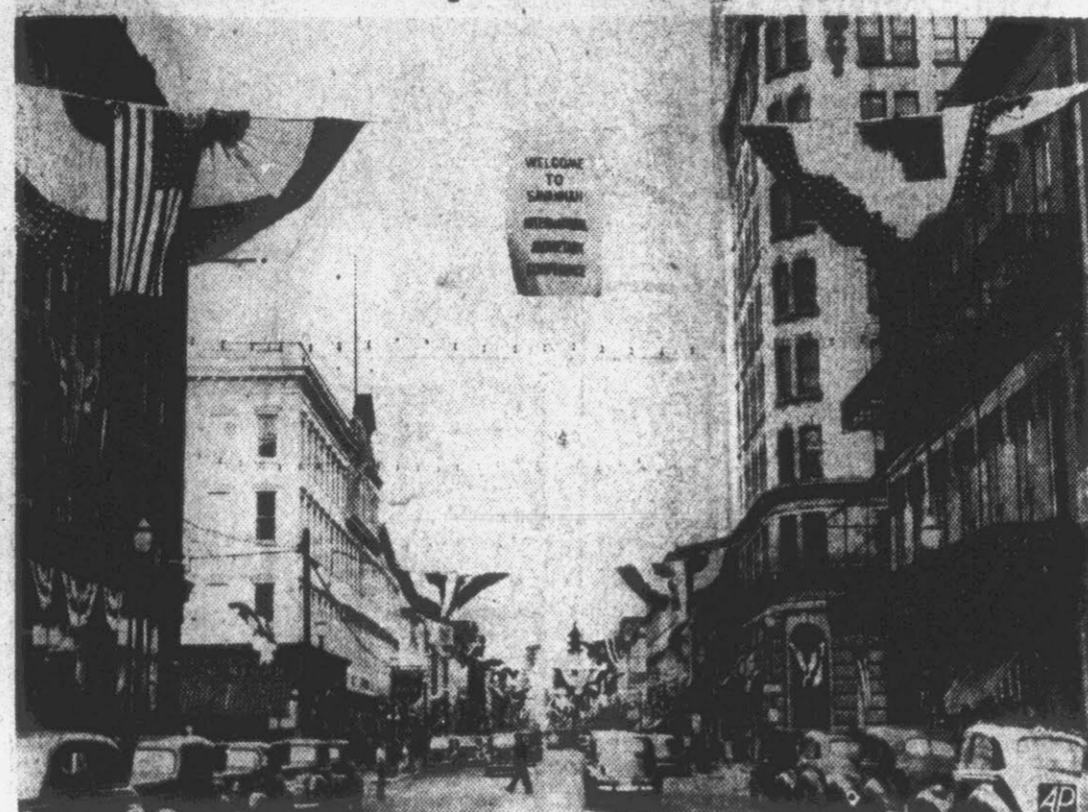
Under his inspiration after the first World War, the British sought to crush the Russian communists. It was a costly, fruitless effort. Now again the Russians worry him.

Although the British and American Governments are concerned about Russia's moves—Churchill is no longer a part of the British Government—they have not spoken about an Anglo-American alliance.

In 1927 Churchill was "charmed" by Mussolini's "gentle and simple bearing." He said that if he had been 1/2 Italian he would have been "wholeheartedly" with the Italian dictator in his "struggle against the bestial appetites and passions of Leninism."

Wage-Price Policy Won't Require Revision: Bowles

Stabilization Director Denies Charges That Price Controls Have Hindered Production; States Coal Negotiations Will Be Handled Under Present Formula

Washington, March 11 (AP)—Stabilization Director Chester Bowles said today he is determined that prices will not be allowed to interfere with production.

He told a news conference he believes reports that price controls have slowed the flow of goods are "falsified" but he added that OPA and the Office of Economic Stabilization intend to "investigate every squawk we receive on this matter and to grant relief wherever it is justified."

Bowles said also that: 1. The new wage-price policy can "definitely stand" for the duration of stabilization control; 2. Coal wage and price negotiations can be handled under the formula because we can't make "any exceptions for anybody"; 3. The policy will not increase the general level of prices although there will be some retail increases; 4. The recent price increases for clothing actually may cut garment prices in general by putting a bigger supply of inexpensive clothing on the market.

Bowles expressed belief the wage-price policy will not need further major revision in replying to a reporter's point that there already have been two revisions of the original formula announced last August.

"It will stand," Bowles stated, "if everyone uses a little restraint and doesn't get out a slide rule to see who may have gotten an advantage."

Asked if that went for coal too, Bowles replied affirmatively and added: "The main point to keep in mind is that we can't make exceptions for anybody."

John L. Lewis' United Mine Workers are preparing to negotiate with soft coal mine operators for a new wage contract.

A reporter asked Bowles why the coal operators couldn't be expected to want a price commitment in advance as the steel industry did.

"The coal people," Bowles said, "know where they stand on prices. Their figures are much more precise (Continued on Page Four)

MacArthur Sees Wife Of Masaharu Honma

Tokyo, March 11 (AP)—General MacArthur today received—at her own convenience—Mrs. Masaharu Honma, and promised her that he would consider carefully all the facts in the case before he would permit her husband's execution by an American firing squad.

The Allied commander in a half-hour interview told the wife of his best friend of 1941-42 that he "understood and sympathized" when he informed her it would be a great loss to the world if Lt. Gen. Honmas were executed.

MacArthur now is reviewing the case; and his word will be final. He can uphold—or ease—the sentence.

Marshall To See President Truman

Chungking, March 11 (AP)—General George C. Marshall, presidential envoy to China, left Chungking today for Washington, where he will confer with President Truman on the Chinese military and political situation.

A few hours before Marshall left, General Chang Chin-Chung and Chop En-Lai, representing the government and Communists, agreed that areas in Manchuria not garrisoned by the Russians would come under the jurisdiction of the Peiping executive headquarters. They agreed to allow field troops teams to go there to supervise implementation of the cease fire order.

Marshall's first stop enroute to Washington will be Tokyo, where presumably he will confer with General MacArthur.

The General conferred with Premier T. V. Soong this morning and this afternoon met Nationalist General Chang Chin-Chung, Communist General Chou en-Lai, and fellow members of the military sub-committee.

He visited the downtown residence of Generalissimo and Madame Chiang Kai-Shek.

Administration To Fight For Return Of Subsidies

Churchill's Proposal Attacked By Editorial

Moscow, March 11 (AP)—Pravda declared today that Winston Churchill's proposal for a British-American military alliance would liquidate the United Nations, end the coalition of three big powers and bring a return to power politics.

Breaking the Russian editorial silence on Churchill's March 5 speech the three-column front-page editorial asserted it had been a failure, adding:

"No false speeches about democracy and freedom by convinced reactionaries such as Churchill and British American friends from the Vandenberg camp will succeed in drawing people onto the road to new wars prepared for them."

The Communist Party newspaper said Churchill had "mobilized his whole arsenal of oratorical art" to put over his point but had only succeeded in revealing himself as out of step with the times.

"One must unwillingly recall the Churchill of the period after World War I," Pravda said. Then, it said he was the "initiator of an anti-Soviet campaign and the principal organizer of armed intervention against the Soviet Union."

Pravda said Churchill's proposal amounted to a plan for British-American rule of the world "behind the back of the UNO."

The former prime minister realized that he lacked the power to carry out such far-reaching plans Pravda said, and therefore "consciously grabs at the coattails of Uncle Sam," while remembering that his "first postwar experience in speculating on the 'red danger' during the parliamentary elections in England had brought him a severe defeat.

Four GOP Leaders In Republican Limelight

Republican Party Has Four Presidential Prospects Likely To Test Popularity In Coming Elections

Washington, March 11 (AP)—Harold E. Stassen's possible entry this week into the Minnesota senatorial race may raise to four the list of Republican presidential prospects likely to test their popularity in this year's elections.

Stassen, former governor of Minnesota who served as Adm. William F. Halsey's flag secretary during the war, indicated he will make up his mind this week whether to oppose Senator Henrik Shipstead for the Republican senatorial nomination.

John W. Bricker of Ohio, who reportedly hopes he will be promoted from the No. 2 spot he held on the 1944 GOP ticket to the top in 1948, has qualified to seek the Ohio senatorial seat now held by James W. Huffman, a Democratic appointee.

In Michigan, Senator Arthur Vandenberg, who is regarded as a possible presidential candidate despite his protests that he has no ambitions along that line, will be battling for reelection.

In New York, Gov. Thomas E. Dewey, who carried the GOP standard in 1944, is expected to bid for reelection.

If Stassen decides to take on Shipstead for the Minnesota nomination, he is expected to draw a sharp issue on foreign policy. The former governor has been preaching collective security doctrines for years. Shipstead was one of the two senators who voted against Senate ratification of the United Nations Charter.

Friends said Stassen realizes that he must make a vigorous campaign if he hopes to unseat Shipstead, who has been in the Senate since 1922.

Victories by Stassen and Bricker would give the Senate Republican side four possible presidential candidates, for Senator Robert Taft of Ohio is not being counted out of the 1948 race.

Control of the Republican senatorial organization now is split between Vandenberg and Taft, for all practical purposes. The Michigan senator and his Ohio colleague play an important part in shaping such party policies as are apparent in the Chamber.

AP World Traveler

Bern, Switzerland, March 11—Europe's greatest non-political problem continues to be food, but little Switzerland, which depends heavily on imports, has averted a national catastrophe by her manner of handling it.

I refer to food as the biggest non-political problem because the world in general gives first place to the question of whether there will be another war.

If there is one—which your columnist refuses to anticipate—it will be political and likely will grow out of the present dangerous re-vamping of the balance of power.

Whether death by military violence is of more concern than death by starvation may be open to debate. In any event, let's talk about food, because the way Switzerland has dealt with—and is dealing with—this vital subject is a revelation of her character, and an object lesson to a world which is divided against itself and badly needs team work.

Our story starts back before the war, and that's important because it bespeaks foresight on the part of the Swiss. After the Munich conference in 1938 the Government, realizing that Europe faced a crisis, began to help food importers with loans at small interest. In order to buy great food supplies.

Then in May, 1939, months before the war started, each housewife was ordered to buy two months stock of food—and the Government helped those short of money. This supply was held in reserve. When the conflict began the Government froze nonperishable foodstuffs and in that period organized the food rationing which still continues, with everybody happy. Without these precautions, of course, starvation would have swept the country because it isn't self-supporting.

When Hitler struck at Poland on Sept. 1, 1939, the Swiss army was mobilized for defense. There was in the ranks a private by the name of Arnold Muggli, and the Minister of Economics promptly summoned him to Bern. To Muggli's amazement the Minister said: "You're the only one capable of organizing rationing. I want you to undertake it."

Not to make too much of a mystery of the Muggli drama, he had been an organizer of banks. Rationing was an unknown quantity to him by he tackled it, and, finding no guidance in any foreign rationing plan, he created one of his own on the high moral code that "if every- (Continued on Page Four)

President's Housing Legislation Has New Lease On Life In Its Appearance Before Senate; New Order Planned To Restrict Commercial Construction So Homes May Be Built

Washington, March 11 (AP)—Senator Barkley (D-Ky.) said today the administration will fight to restore \$600,000,000 in subsidies when housing legislation is considered by the Senate.

Barkley talked with reporters at the White House after congressional leaders conferred with President Truman. The House rejected subsidies on building materials and another key feature of the President's housing program—ceiling prices on old dwellings.

The government was busy also rushing final touches on a new order designed to slash commercial and industrial construction so that more homes can be built.

Barkley made clear that administration forces would attempt to revive all features of the original housing bill asked by Mr. Truman, but he said the major effort would be behind the subsidy payments.

With the Kentuckian at the White House were Speaker Rayburn, House Democratic Leader McCormack (Mass.) and Senator McKellar (D-Tenn.), president pro tempore of the Senate.

The government's order on commercial type building was described by officials who have seen a preliminary draft as "drastic and far reaching." It is scheduled for announcement soon.

These officials, who asked that their names not be published, said the order will hold up construction of thousands of non-essential stores, office buildings and factories still in the blueprint stage.

But they predicted it will hit the hardest at proposed roadhouses, night clubs, theaters and other amusement projects. These will not be banned entirely, but builders will have to show there is a community need for such recreational facilities.

The new order is being drawn up by the civilian production administration and the National Housing Agency. They figure it will channel well over two-thirds of all building materials to residential construction.

Five-Member Board Has Authority To Lease Or Operate

The Pitt County-City of Greenville Airport Commission members were sworn in today by Superior Court Clerk David T. House. They are: J. Noah Williams, chairman; L. M. (Buck) Buchanan, vice-chairman; G. H. Pittman of Falkland and N. C. Brooks.

The Airport Commission, jointly appointed by the County Commissioners and Board of Aldermen, is authorized to lease or operate the airport, with approval of the county and city boards.

The U. S. Navy, which leased the airfield for an outlying training station for the arines, at a dollar a year, reserved the right to hold its lease until six months after the war ended. At present the Marines are maintaining a guard at the airfield. It is expected, however, that the Navy will give up the field in the near future.

British Protest To Russia On Manchuria

London, March 11 (AP)—United States protests to Russia against the continued presence of Red Army troops in Manchuria and the removal of industrial machinery from that section of China were bolstered today by a similar British complaint.

A British foreign office spokesman disclosed dispatch of a note on Manchuria to Moscow, following by several days the American protest. He added that the British government maintained that all factory installations in Manchuria should be left in the custody of the Chinese until an Allied decision was made for their disposal.

The spokesman also said that the British charge d'affaires in Moscow had been instructed to press for an early reply to a note demanding an explanation of Russia's failure to evacuate Iran in accordance with a Big Three agreement. The U. S. previously had protested to Moscow over the situation in Iran.

No Organized Group Opposed To Big Loan

Washington, March 11 (AP)—Senator Barkley (D-Ky.) said today no organized opposition has developed against the proposed \$3,750,000 loan to Britain and that legislative action looks all right at this time.

Talking with newsmen after a conference with President Truman, the Democratic leader said hearings on the loan probably will continue for about 10 more days.

TODAY IN CONGRESS

A Review Of Your Government In Action

Washington, March 11 (AP)—Congress comes to grips this week with its most embarrassing subject—pensions for its members.

House consideration of the subject—which several years ago precipitated a "bundles for Congress" drive that drove the legislation back to committee—has been set for Wednesday.

In announcing to his colleagues that the measure will be voted on this week, Democratic Leader McCormack of Massachusetts referred to it as "that very just bill that should have been passed long ago."

In view of the recent recommendation of the Joint Committee on Congressional Organization, House leaders expect no trouble passing the bill. The committee recommended, among other things, that members of Congress make themselves eligible for participation in the civil service retirement fund. It said:

"Congress has established social security and made provisions for retirement insurance plans for business and industrial workers, has extended retirement privileges to employees of the executive branch, to the army and navy, and to the federal judiciary, but has been loath to include its own membership in any form of retirement plan.

"If these security measures are proper for regularly employed persons in business and in other government branches, they are likewise necessary in congressional service."

Rep. Carl Vinson (D-Ga.), author of the pension bill, said he doubted whether anyone would vote against it.

"This is fair and just legislation," Vinson said in a statement. "It is not a pension. It is a retirement of a contributory basis, which means members of Congress will have to pay into the fund, just like other government workers, before they get anything back."

## U. S. Declines To Charge Spaniards

Washington, March 11—(AP)—Government officials said today the United States has declined to join France in presenting the Allied case against Spain's Franco government to the United Nations Security Council.

These officials, who asked not to be identified, said this country's views on the matter were delivered to the French government Saturday. Essentially they are:

1. That the U. S. acknowledges the right of France or any other member of the United Nations to lay the matter before the Security Council.
  2. That the government believes that the Franco regime—whatever else it may be—is not a threat to international peace; hence, the U. S. will not join in bringing the Spanish situation before the Council.
- Britain also has declined to join with France in the action, but government officials said the U. S. position on the matter was somewhat different from that of the British government.
- Russia has accepted the French proposal. French officials have indicated they will bring the case against Franco before the Council regardless of the U. S. or British views.

## CONSIDERING RENT CONTROL

### OPA To Investigate Excessive Increases In Greenville

Reports that many increases in rents have been made in Pitt county are being received by the OPA rent division in Raleigh and as a result a rent survey may be made at an early date in Greenville.  
Oliver Crawley, OPA information executive, said here today that the Bureau of Labor Statistics, an independent government fact finding organization, may be called upon to make a survey of rents if rents continue to increase in Pitt county.  
The Greenville Price Control Board has been supplied rent complaint report forms for use of Pitt county citizens whose rent has been increased and who wish to report it to OPA in an effort to make the confidential information available for study only.

Pitt county persons may visit the Price Control Board and report rent increases. All information will be held confidential by OPA and forwarded to Mr. Frank McInnis, rent control executive, in Raleigh.

"The OPA does not want to bring rent control into any area, however when rents increase and continue to climb upward it becomes the duty of OPA to take action toward the control of rents," Crawley said.

The entire United States was made a rent area by law in 1943 and rent control may be declared effective in areas where rents skyrocket, Crawley explained, after surveys to determine the need for such action.

# RIFT RUMORED IN UAW RANKS

## Walter P. Reuther May Succeed President R. J. Thomas

Detroit, March 11—(AP)—The 10-man CIO United Auto Workers General Motors Negotiating Committee met in a closed session with UAW President R. J. Thomas and Vice-President Walter P. Reuther today before resuming parleys with the corporation in the 111-day-old strike.

Both Thomas and Reuther declined to discuss reports of a widening rift between them following an announcement by a group of 17 local UAW-CIO unions that they would support Reuther for the union presidency at the UAW convention in Atlantic City, March 23-31.

Asked whether he had criticized Reuther for the handling of the GM strike negotiations, Thomas said: "No comment." He made a similar reply to inquiries concerning a meeting yesterday of the UAW-CIO Ford Council which he addressed and which is considering a recently negotiated wage contract with the Ford Motor Co.

Earlier Thomas told newsmen he had not mentioned Reuther by name at the council session but said he had asked "Why isn't the GM strike being settled?"

"No comment," he said today when asked whether he thought Reuther was a candidate for the union presidency. Then he added: "I do not believe in fighting out union battles in the press."

Reuther was similarly non-committal. "I am unwilling to talk about the union political situation in the UAW," he said. "That is something for the convention."

Was he a candidate for the presidency?

"My previous statements have made my position very clear on this."

Reuther Saturday said he made "no decision to run or not to run," asserting: "It is not a personal matter but one that must be considered on what is best for the union and its members."

Housing officials estimated that upwards of \$50,000,000 a week in labor and materials is being expended on non-residential building.

On Capitol Hill, meanwhile, Senator Mead (D-NY) said he and other senators "of like mind" will make a vigorous fight to restore price ceilings and subsidies which the House cut out of the administration's emergency housing bill.

Bombay, March 11—(AP)—Ismalite charities will benefit approximately \$2,200,000 as the result of a unique ceremony yesterday at which followers of the Aga Khan matched his weight pound for pound in diamonds.

Approximately 60,000 devotees looked on as the 243 1-2 pound spiritual leader of the Ismalite Moslems was weighed on a specially constructed scale in the great Brabourne Stadium.

While the Aga Khan reclined on a gold brocade chair attached to one arm of the balance, quarters of industrial diamonds and handfuls of polished gems—including a 32-carat stone valued by its owner at \$200,000—were deposited in a hop-

### Indian Troops In Batavia To Leave

Batavia, March 11—(AP)—Approximately 1,000 British Indian troops boarded ships today as the British began to carry out their announced policy of gradually withdrawing their forces from The Netherlands East Indies.

The embarkation followed the arrival here Saturday of 2,400 Dutch troops from Malaya. A communique issued at that time said they would replace the British forces when the latter eventually leave.

Fighting broke out last night when a British convoy was "heavily engaged" by Indonesians between Buitenzorg and Bandung, a British statement said, and Spitfires made five strafing runs on the natives.

This marked the first time in months that British planes had gone into action here.

The statement said fighting continued through the night and the convoy was still halted by roadblocks and landmines. The British placed their casualties at seven killed and 25 wounded as of 8 p. m. yesterday.

### Social Security

On or before midnight, Tuesday, April 30, employers who are subject to insurance provisions of the Social Security Act, will send to the Government their quarterly payroll tax returns, covering the first three months of 1946.

Mrs. Ruth G. Duffy, manager of the office of the Social Security Board today called attention to the fact that an employer can save himself time and trouble, by making certain that the name, account number, and wage earnings of each worker employed by him during January, February, and March, 1946, are shown on this tax report. She said also that most of the employers in this section are very careful to include the name and the Social Security account number, as well as the wages of each employee, in their reports, but there are still a few who do not realize that the law applies to every business or industrial establishment, even though it has only one employee.

Social Security tax returns are the

sent by the employer to the Collector of Internal Revenue. Shortly thereafter, the wage reports are transmitted to the Social Security Board, and there each item of wages is credited to the proper account. Every insured worker has an individual wage record and this record will be used, later, as a means of determining the amount of benefits that may be payable to him when he is old or to his dependents in case he should die.

A representative of this office will be in Greenville at the Employment Office every Thursday at 10:00 a. m.

### Flue-Cured Tobacco Acreage Is Checked

To further strengthen compliance with the marketing quota program, all acreages of flue-cured tobacco grown on all farms in 1946 will be measured by AAA Committeemen or others working under supervision of committeemen. It was announced today by J. V. Taylor, chairman Pitt County AAA Committee.

"Due to the manpower shortage, the AAA found it necessary to discontinue measurement of all flue-cured acreages during the war, and this will be the first year since 1942 when all acreages will be measured," Mr. Taylor said. "The system of reporting their individual acreages by farmers, themselves, and subsequent spot-checking was the best means of acreage determination during the war. However, a return to measurement of all acreages is essential in order to make the marketing quota program fully effective."

Flue-cured producers of Pitt County have been notified of 1946 acreage allotments for their farms. The county's total acreage allotment for 1946 will amount to approximately 45,000 acres.

### Tobacco Plants Are Abundant In Section

W. Z. Morton, head of Morton's Warehouse, and Kinchin W. Cobb, veteran tobacconist and former sales supervisor for the Greenville Tobacco Market, made a trip through the country over several counties at the week-end inspecting tobacco plant beds. They reported uniform stands of plants and a profusion of them in Pitt, Carteret, Craven and Pamlico counties.

Ideal weather conditions favored germination and growth of plants and farmers are cheerful over the prospects of having a bountiful supply when transplanting time comes around, the two tobacconists said.
