GENERAL MOTORS STRIKE SETTLED

Strike Ends Following Long Parley

Settlement Reached On Basis Of 18½ Cents An Hour Wage Increase; GM Agrees To Remove "Inequities" As Sought By CIO United Auto Workers

Detroit, March 13.—(AP)—An agreement for an 18½-cent an hour (16.5 per cent) wage rate increase and the creation of an equalization fund, brought an end today to the 113-day-old General Motors strike.

Accepting the 18½-cent an hour offer of the management, the CIO United Auto Workers said in a statement that the union's 1912-cent an hour demand, which was the amount recommended by President Truman's Fact Finding Commission.

Settlement of the strike means an early return to work of 175,000 GM production workers in 192 plants throughout the country. Just when the plants will be reopened was not immediately disclosed. UAW Vice-President Walter P. Reuther said the men could start back some time next week. Management did not comment immediately on this statement.

General Motors said the contract to be signed with the union would run for two years.

Vice President Harry W. Anderson said he assumed this would be two years from the date of ratification.

Of the wages, General Motors said a flat wage increase of 18½-cent an hour would be applied to all wage classification rates effective as of the date of ratification of the agreement.

All employees who worked between Nov. 7, 1945, two weeks before the strike was called, and the date of ratification shall receive an increase of 13½-cent an hour for all hours worked between those dates.

This is the only retroactive feature in the agreement.

The settlement was achieved after an unprecedented negotiation meeting between union and corporation which lasted 17 continuous hours after having begun last night. The union said the peace terms with General Motors surpassed the economic and non-economic terms recommended by President Truman and his fact finding board, and "tops the tremendous wage victories already won throughout the auto industry."

Fighting Flares In Suburbs Of Mukden

Chungking, March 13.—(AP)—The Chinese Central News Agency reported tonight from Mukden that a "ferocious" fight developed in the southern suburbs of Mukden when unidentified forces attacked two troops manned by government troops and police.

The dispatch said the clash started at 1:30 a. m. and lasted for three hours. The attackers were repulsed.

The government is sending troops into the Manchurian metropolis as the Russians move out and Communist forces are reported within one to three miles of the city. Earlier reports of street clashes inside Mukden were not substantiated.

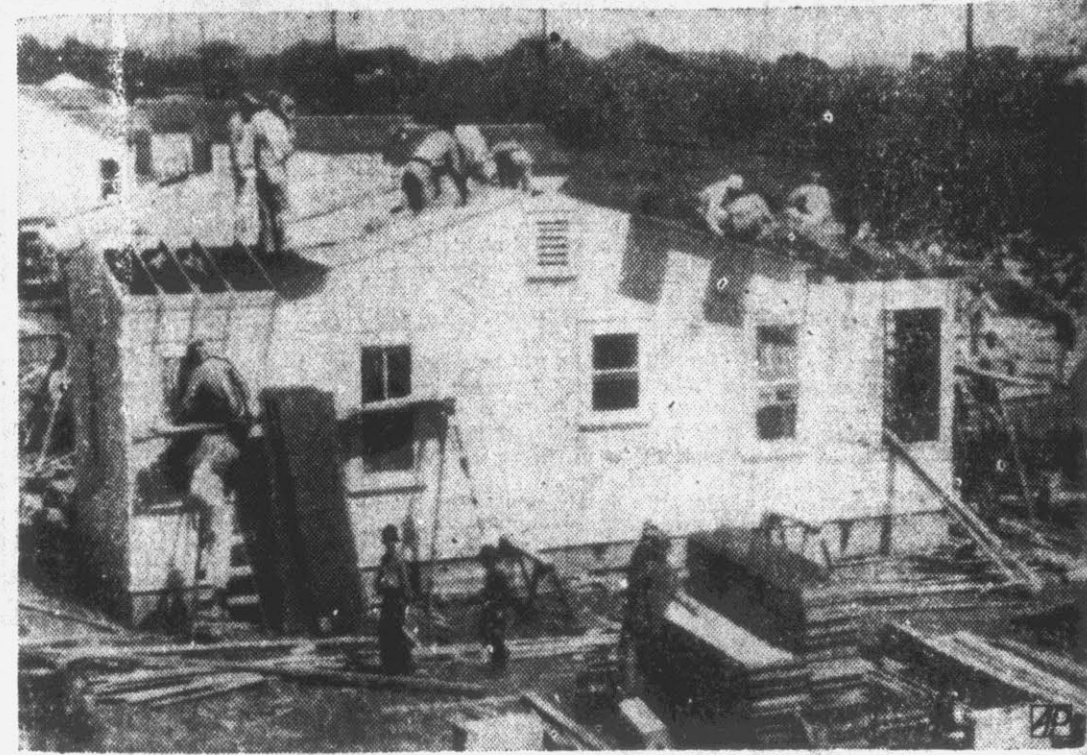

Lehman Resigning UNRRA Post Soon

Washington, March 13.—(AP)—Herbert H. Lehman is resigning, because of his health, from the post of UNRRA director general which he has held since the relief agency's birth.

"I had hoped to remain with the work through the life of UNRRA and until the continuing part of the program had been entrusted to some other more permanent organization," he said in a letter to the UNRRA central committee.

"Unfortunately, however, I feel I must finally accept the advice of my physician who, for many months, has urged me to take a much needed rest."

Lehman's letter, which he made public last night, noted that he resigned as governor of New York in 1942 three weeks before the end of his term, to take the helm of relief activities at the request of President Roosevelt.

John L. Lewis Surprises Operators In Omitting Verbal Fireworks In Wage Demands; States It Is To The Interest Of The Industry To Halt Movement Of Workers Away From Mines

Washington, March 13.—(AP)—John L. Lewis left for the coal industry to puzzle over today a wage demand which specified only the highest pay and shortest hours his 100,000 soft coal miners can get.

Firm, but far from his usual dramatic self, Lewis caught operators by surprise at yesterday's opening session of the bituminous coal wage conference at which the industry had expected to hear a concrete pay boost proposal.

Instead, Lewis laid down nine generalized demands, in which he said the United Mine Workers want a new peacetime contract adjusting a variety of problems, including "an increase of wages and reduction of daily and weekly working hours."

A UMW spokesman said the union's bargaining committee will meet industry negotiators to base the wage issue on shorter hours and job classification differentials—"and bargain the best increase they can get."

Actual negotiations may not get underway until next week. Another session of the wage conference was set for today, but it was to be devoted to union arguments in support of the general demands.

Later in the week the operators will reply formally to Lewis, and the sessions then may be recessed until Monday.

Other major demands in the one-paragraph proposals Lewis handed the industry include:

1. A health and welfare fund for mine workers.

2. "Adjustments of the contractors' regarding unionization of supervisory, technical and clerical employees—an issue which may end up in the Supreme Court."

3. Adjustment of vacation, severance, and holiday pay.

On none of the points was Lewis specific. All he said, were "sub-

Indonesian Head To Reject Dutch Offer

New York, March 13.—(AP)—An Aneta dispatch from Batavia today said that Premier Sutan Sjahrir of the unrecognized Indonesian Republic would inform Dutch representatives this afternoon that their government's proposals for settlement of Indonesian independence demands are unacceptable.

The dispatch said that Sjahrir would submit counter proposals at a conference he is scheduled to have with Hubertus J. Van Mook, acting governor general of the Netherlands East Indies, and Sir Archibald Clerk Kerr, special British emissary.

The Dutch have offered the Indonesians commonwealth status with the promise of ultimate independence.

National Safety Issue Decides Atomic Future

Senate Atomic Committee Votes Six-To-One To Give Armed Forces Control In Interests Of National Defense

Washington, March 13.—(AP)—

The issue of national safety gave the armed forces the decision today in an important preliminary test on postwar control of atomic energy.

The decision was hit immediately by Secretary of Commerce Wallace who saw in it "the potentiality of delivering us into the hands of military fascism in this nation."

Senator Vandenberg (R-Mich.), however, held that military regulation "is necessary until stabilized international control is developed effectively to prohibit the use of atomic energy for military purposes by anybody at any time."

The test developed when the special Senate atomic committee voted six to one yesterday to incorporate into pending legislation a provision giving a presidentially-appointed military liaison committee a right to intervene before a civilian atomic

control commission of five.

Wallace declared this was a vote "to place the control of atomic energy, in effect, in the hands of the military." He called it an "exceedingly unfortunate development."

The armed forces have taken the position all along that postwar atomic energy control should be their responsibility because of the importance of atomic weapons to the nation's defense. But numerous scientists and others have argued for complete civilian control to advance research and allay international suspicion.

The decision in favor of the military was on a proposal to revise the bill sponsored by Senator McMahon (D-Conn.), which would entrust postwar atomic development to strictly civilian control. McMahon cast the lone vote against the pro-

Former Nazi Cabinet Member Died Today

Nuernberg, March 13.—(AP)—Field Marshal Werner Von Blomberg, minister of war in the first Hitler cabinet, died of heart failure today at the 116th General Hospital where he was waiting to be summoned as a witness in the Nuernberg trials.

Von Blomberg, 67, a member of an aristocratic Prussian family, started one of the major sessions of Nazi Germany when on January 12, 1938, he defied social conventions of the German military and took as his second wife a stenographer, Erika Gruhn.

As a result of the storm which developed among his fellow officers, Von Blomberg handed his resignation as minister of war and generalissimo of Germany's land, sea and air forces to Hitler, who assumed control of the armed forces himself.

President Acts At Pauley's Request; Asserts Pauley's Defense Of His "Good Name" Has Been Conclusive

Washington, March 14.—(AP)—President Truman today withdrew the nomination of Edwin W. Pauley, California oil man, to be undersecretary of the navy.

The President acted at Pauley's request. He said Pauley's defense of his good name has been valiant and conclusive.

In a letter, Mr. Truman told Mr. Pauley that he "met the challenge" of his nomination "with acts" and added:

"You answered prejudice with a complete and forthright resume of your career and with an amazing patience under continued misrepresentation."

The first announcement of the withdrawal came from Chairman Walsh (D-Mass.) of the Senate Naval Affairs Committee after a 30-minute closed session of the conference.

At the same time, Walsh handed reporters a statement declaring the committee "commends" Pauley "for his patriotic action in requesting the President to withdraw his nomination."

The action wound up six weeks of controversy which boiled up at one point in the explosive resignation of Harold L. Ickes as secretary of interior. Ickes had criticized the nomination.

The White House made public an exchange of letters between the President and Pauley shortly after the note of withdrawal was sent to Leslie Biffle, secretary of the (Continued on Page Four)

Officials Await Security Council

Washington, March 13.—(AP)—Air-clearing statements by American officials promoted confidence in Congress today that there will be no mining of words when the United Nations Security Council tackles pressing world problems on March 25.

Senator George (D-Ga.) told a reporter he expects candid open and above board discussion of international sore spots during the council's New York meeting—a course he said promises the best hope for settlement.

The time has undoubtedly arrived when nations should speak plainly and they won't lose anything by doing it," he declared. "As for ourselves, we are big enough to assert our deeper convictions—not in our selfish interests—but in the interest of the world."

George and other senators praised the tact taken by former secretary of state Hull and Chairman Connally (D-Tex.) of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee in urging that the major Allied powers air their differences fully in the council and cooperate to obtain a decision there.

GOV'T CURBS SPECULATION IN COTTON

Move Designed To Prevent Additional Price Boosts For Clothing

Washington, March 13.—(AP)—Government officials today drafted an order designed to curb speculation in cotton and to prevent additional price boosts for clothing.

They said it will be issued promptly if there is confirmation of reports that cotton exchanges have decided to reject a government proposal that they voluntarily increase margin requirements for trading in cotton futures.

Such an increase would be compulsory under the order being prepared by the Office of Economic Stabilization and OPA. It would require a larger down payment on cotton purchased for future delivery.

Washington, March 13.—(AP)—

So you want nylon stockings? Take it easy. You're out of luck.

Enough of them to meet the demand simply are not being made and the manufacture of rayon stockings has dropped to a dribble. Maybe next month a steady flow of nylons will start reaching the stores. But they say:

You can't expect to get all the nylons you want anytime in 1946. Meanwhile, big department stores have adopted this practice:

They sell what nylon stockings they get to their charge-account customers, not to their cash customers.

So some customers, with charge accounts in a number of stores, are getting more than their share of nylon stockings. Others have to do without.

An OPA official, in a position to know what he's talking about, says this:

The stocking industry now is turning out less than 1,000,000 dozen pairs of nylons a month, is shooting for 3,000,000 dozen pairs, may not reach that goal for six months.

The National Hosiery Manufacturers Association says:

"A normal prewar supply of women's hosiery will not be available to the market or the consumer during 1946, even after steady production has been established."

As noted, it hasn't been established yet.

There's no evidence to support rumors that the nylon shortage is due to heavy shipments of the stockings overseas for higher prices.

Here's the story behind all this: Nylonmaking just got under way in 1940. Up to that time silk stockings dominated the market.

Then the war came, shutting off the supply of silk from Japan.

The Government needed all the silk we had on hand and all the nylon which could be produced. So none of it went into stockings. Instead, rayon stockings were made. The war ended. The DuPont Company, which makes nylon, announced it would start turning out nylon for the stocking-makers. During the war the mills which (Continued on page four)

4-H Club Activities
"Eggs and Their Place in Meal Planning" was the topic for discussion at the eight 4-H Club meetings held in Pitt county during the month of February. A total of 215 girls were present. Prior to the demonstration of including eggs in the diet, the temperature used in cooking eggs and the different ways to use them in cooking. She discussed in detail with the 4-H girl and her mother the projects that the club girl will conduct during this club year, and the 4-H club program for the year as a whole, helped to make plans for keeping long time records, and gave complete instructions on how to fill out record books correctly.

and General Eisenhower to a closed door session before voting on such matters as:
Universal military training legislation advocated by President Truman.
Extension of the draft law which expires May 15.

Stockpiling of materials finally needed in time of war.
Increases in pay of all army and navy personnel in an effort to spur enlistments.
After hearing Bernes, Patterson and Eisenhower, the committee is expected to vote on universal training and the draft extension, two matters which many members say they feel must be settled before the committee does anything else.

There is strong committee sentiment for the proposal of House Republican Leader Joseph W. Martin Jr., of Massachusetts to delay training legislation until all efforts to outlaw peacetime conscription throughout the world have been exhausted.

While Chairman May (D-Ky.) is known to be opposed to the Martin proposal and Mr. Truman has called it impractical, it has gathered strength in recent weeks.

There is scant support in the committee for a full year of military training as advocated by the President, although many members are sympathetic to an American Legion proposal for a shorter compulsory training period.

A possible compromise advanced by some committeemen would recommend the Legion's program, to become effective only after the President notifies Congress that efforts to obtain an international ban on conscription have failed.

Pending a final decision on universal training, the committee is expected to approve shortly a six-month extension of the draft law, with exemptions for men with children and for all men over 30 or under 21.

It also is leaning favorably toward an army-navy proposal to raise the pay and allowances of all officers and enlisted men 20 percent in an effort to encourage enlistments so the draft law can be abandoned after six months.

Greenville. He is a graduate of Wake Forest College, Harvard Law School and Oxford University in England. He was a winner of a Rhodes Scholarship, admitting him to Oxford.

Humber left Paris shortly after the Germans overran that country. At Davis Island, on the North Carolina coast, in 1941, he made public his World Federation Plan for a union of the nations of the world for peace and progress, similar to the union of American States. Nearly a score of state legislatures have endorsed it. Much of the structure of the World Security Council at San Francisco last year was based on ideas similar to those put forward by Humber in his World Federation Plan.

Other business transacted by the Bar Association last night was a recommendation that the County Commissioners furnish and equip the lawyers' conference room in the courthouse and that the board enlarge the vaults in the offices of the register of deeds and clerk of Superior Court. The association went on record as opposing a proposal of the Beaufort County Bar Association to change the spring and fall terms of Federal Court. President J. Henry Harrell presided.

posals which would give the military veto power in matters of national security.

Vandenberg, a member of the committee and author of the proposal, told reporters the revision would give military officials "stop, look and listen power in behalf of national security" and predicted "that the amended bill would get approval this week from the committee."

McMahon expressed great dissatisfaction with the committee action, saying it would give the military the opportunity of "asserting itself on every atomic matter it should care to." He expressed hope, at the same time, that "the military will see its way to standing aside for science where the national defense is not primarily involved."

Wallace made his comments as he opened an atomic energy exhibit in the Commerce Department Building, and there were moments when he appeared much exercised on the subject.

"If the military aspect of atomic energy is played up in the legislation that is finally passed," he said, "other nations will begin to wonder what we're up to. As they wonder, their suspicions will develop."

"I hope we can get the President's program through the Senate. The President (who has said the program should be under civilian control) is everlastingly right on this subject. He deserves the backing of all the people so that his program can go through."

mitted constructively and in good faith" as "negotiable suggestions." On several occasions, such open-ended proposals have been made by the UMW in local negotiations, but never before have such general terms been submitted on an industry-wide basis.

Indicating the possible trend of the union's bargaining, Lewis asserted that a reduction of working hours would eliminate overtime, effect a "vast saving" in labor costs, and provide one source of revenue for higher wages.

Further, Lewis declared that it would be "sound business" for the industry to halt a growing movement of workers away from the mines to other types of employment. A similar trend has produced serious results in England, he observed, as a result of what he termed "stupid management" and "barbaric treatment" of British miners.

American miners are "tired and exhausted" as a result of the wartime 54-hour work week, the UMW chief asserted, and more than 35,000 of the present mine workers are over-age and due to leave their jobs—possibly without replacement.

Lewis discredited sharply with industry contentions that a further increase in coal prices—inventories if mine wages are boosted—would leave coal operators unable to compete with such other fuels as gas and oil. Not since the World War, he declared, has the industry suffered "from the ravages of competitive fuels, and it is not now being threatened 'in any appreciable way'."

Under the UMW's present contract, miners are paid \$4.50 for a 54-hour week and receive 75¢ in lieu

of vacation time-off. The contract calls for a basic work-week of 35 hours.

Other demands presented yesterday were:

"Improved safety and compliance with mining, compensation and occupational disease laws, adjustment of intra-district and inter-district differential and local inequalities affecting classification and compensation; elimination of inequities and abuses of existing fine and penalty provisions of basic and collateral agreements; amendments of rules and practices to promote mutual accord, increased efficiencies and elimination of small tyrannies of management; adjustment of controversy incident to unilateral interpretation of existing agreement by operators."

said an OPA official who asked that his name not be used. "We mean business. If there is no voluntary increase, there will be an order forthwith."

He said price increases authorized last week for cotton textiles and those on the way for shirts, dresses and other garments will be "simply meaningless" to producers unless raw cotton prices are stabilized. The higher prices were authorized to encourage production of inexpensive garments.

Unchecked speculation in cotton could only lead to additional clothing price increases, the official said.

OPA and OES officials said they understood the New York Cotton Exchange had voted against a voluntary increase but would not object to a government order. They predicted that the New Orleans exchange and the Chicago Board of Trade would not hike margins without an order.

Chairman Elmer Thomas (D-Ola.) of the Senate Agriculture Committee has called on leading cotton exchanges to disregard the government request for higher margins. He termed the appeal "dictatorial and unauthorized interference" and said he knew of no law under which an increase could be directed.

OPA and OPA, on the other hand, are convinced they have authority to force an increase under terms of the Price Control Act.

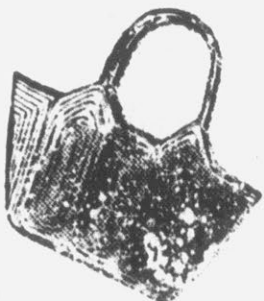

CRUELTY AT HOME

We tend to think of cruelty today
on the gigantic scale of the Nazi
persecutions of the Jews and con-
quered nations. But actually there
are as many sufferers of cruelty in
American homes today as in cen-
tral Europe.

Of course, these do not undergo
the fiendish physical tortures which
the Nazis inflicted on their victims,
but their pangs, although mental,
are none the less real. Over a pe-
riod of years some husbands and
wives fall into a state of mind where
they get enormous pleasure out of
causing pain and distress to each
other. This attitude usually arises
out of repetition of small annoy-
ances. The small fault of one calls
forth retaliation from the other,
and soon the couple has embarked
on a campaign of mutual accusa-
tions and recriminations designed
to cause the most pain possible.

Now couples of this type are
often deeply affectionate and would
resent any imputation of cruelty. But
in effect they torture each other
until a blighted life or a divorce is
the outcome.

Only self-control and a thorough
examination of our own motives
will save us from exercising cruelty
when hot words boil up in us as a
result of minor irritation. We
should ask ourselves first whether
what we want to say is justified,
and second whether we want to
rectify the situation or cause pain
to our partner.

After expressing his full confi-
dence in Pauley, the President
wrote, "I shall reluctantly with-
draw your nomination."

"But I shall do so not without
sorrowful reflections," the President
added.

Neither the President nor Pauley
made personal reference to
leaves or his testimony during the
Senate hearings.

It was testified that Pauley had
told him that he could raise \$300-
000 from old men for the Demo-
cratic campaign if the administration
abandoned efforts to get govern-
ment title to tidelands oil areas.

It was referred to this as the raw-
est proposition he had ever receiv-
ed. Pauley denied he had suggest-
ed it.

In a letter dated today, Pauley
told the President that all charges
made against him have been an-
swered and shown to be false.

Asserting that he had repeatedly
stated he would not consider ask-
ing a withdrawal until he had an
opportunity to answer, Pauley con-
tinued:

"No honest man quits under fire.
That is why I have stood my ground
until the living has ceased."
Pauley added:

"But no matter how complete
the answers to false charges may
be, I do not believe there is any
immediate antidote for the current
hysteria that has been engendered
by these misrepresentations. Under
these circumstances I do not feel
that I would have the opportunity
to render the navy or you the high
order of service both deserve ac-
cordingly. I ask that you withdraw
my nomination."

Mr. Truman replied in his letter
that Pauley's belief that there is
no immediate antidote "to the fac-
ties which have been employed
against you" is "the only reason I
would accept for the action you
now ask me to take."

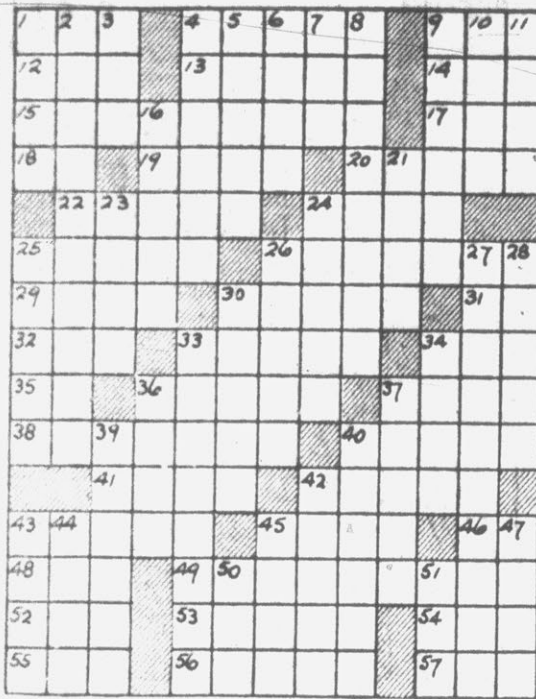

you are in for trouble. The Ameri-
cans took a man and woman off our
train, but whether it was for lack
of permits or for some other reason
wasn't made known.

Examination of permits goes on
through the night and it was about
four o'clock when the Russians
went through the train. It was a
tense time, for they accept no ar-
guments in place of correct per-
mits.

You begin your trip amidst the
grandeur of the Alps and for hours
run through country untouched by
force. There is nothing visible to
indicate that this is part of a de-
feated nation. Gradually, however,
you begin to note bridges which
have been destroyed by bombing
and then as you come into the in-
dustrial areas there are towns and
cities which have suffered heavily.

Vienna is in a shocking state
of destruction from bombs and gun-
fire, but the devastation is nothing
like so complete as it is in Berlin
and in many other German cities
we have visited. Many of its fine
buildings can be restored.

Mrs. Mack and I are housed in
what was one of the capital's fore-
most hotels, which is now used by
the American army. Half this hotel
was destroyed but the other half
is still its luxurious self. From the
windows of our quarters we look
across to the city opera house
which is heavily damaged but which
last night was able to provide fa-
cilities for an opera.

Austria and its capital will take

long to recover, but they are on
their way.

Congress Today...

and General Eisenhower, to a closed
session for plain talking on the
world situation as connected with
the country's defense requirements.

Congressional concern over cur-
rent national security also was re-
flected in the decision of a Sen-
ate committee to give the armed
forces virtual control of atomic
energy development where it may
concern national defense.

On the domestic front the law-
makers sounded as if they were
ready to declare war on lobbyists.

The House Military Committee
session evidently held much signi-
ficance. This group has yet to
vote on proposals to extend the
draft law which expires May 15
and to set up a system of peace-
time universal training. Neither
proposal has aroused any enthusi-
asm heretofore.

National security also figured
importantly in the decision of the
Senate atomic energy committee to
amend a pending measure to give
the military a big say-so on post-
war atomic development affecting
the country's defense. Before the
change the bill would have reposed
control in civilian hands.

The committee's action brought
sharp words from Secretary of
Commerce Wallace who said the

decision held the potentiality of
delivering us into the hands of mil-
itary Fascism in this nation.

Senator Vandenberg (R-Mich.)
author of the amendment, said,
however, such a precaution is ne-
cessary until stabilized interna-
tional control is established for at-
omic energy. The House leader-
ship was talking impatiently about
cracking down on lobbyists, but it
was not clear just how far they
were prepared to go. Rep. Sabath
(D-Ill.) wants the chamber to or-
der a thorough inquiry of lobbying
activities.

It was uncertain whether House
leaders would seek an all-out in-
vestigation or seek to obtain their
objectives by a series of public
blasts at lobbyists. What they want
is to ease lobby pressure on con-
gressmen and to force out into the
open all lobbyists operating against
pending legislation.

Franco Question Gaining Interest

Stockholm, March 13—(AP)—Foreign Minister Osten Unden told Parliament today that the Swedish Government would not participate in any "private sanctions" against Franco Spain, nor could there be any question of a separate Swedish position toward the problem.

The term "private sanctions" referred to agitation among union dock workers to boycott Spanish shipping. Unden added that if the United Nations Organization takes up the Spanish question and adopts sanctions against the Franco regime, Sweden would consider taking similar action.

Geneva, March 13—(AP)—Demanding that the Swiss Government break off diplomatic and economic relations with the Franco Government in Spain, 2,000 residents of this city held a demonstration last night and submitted a resolution calling on the Government to tighten the embargo against sending Spain arms manufactured in Switzerland.

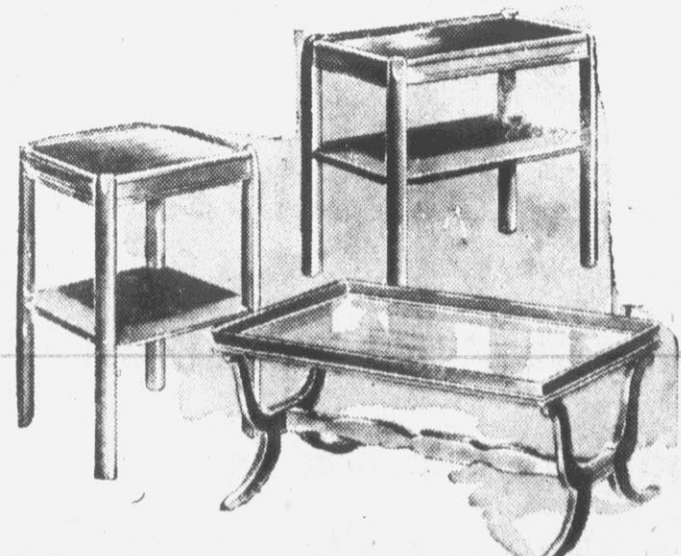

(Continued From Page One) been expressed in at least two phases. Russia has demanded that Turkey cede to Russia the Black Sea provinces of Kars and Ardahan. The Russians also are reported to have demanded bases in the Dardanelles.

Premier Qavam said in an interview with foreign correspondents that no negotiations are now under way with the Russians.

"I have protested in writing to the Soviet Government concerning the continued presence of Russian troops in Iran, and made a similar protest orally to Stalin," the premier said. He spoke in Persian with Prince Firouz, minister of state and propaganda, acting as interpreter.

The premier now is the de facto dictator of Iran since the Parliament adjourned yesterday without extending its life. Left wing demonstrations prevented the deputies from obtaining a quorum. Iranian law prohibits election of a new parliament while foreign troops are on Iranian soil.

Reports from Azerbaijan province indicated that a new Russian cavalry column was fanning into Iran through the border town of Astara on the Caspian Sea.

Combat troops with full campaign kit have entered the towns of Minneh, Maragheh and Miyandub, close to the southern end of Lake Urmia, near the Turkish and Iraq borders, these sources said.

Military observers commented that the Russians last year had dug trenches, constructed roads and conducted large postwar maneuvers along the Turkish-Iranian border.

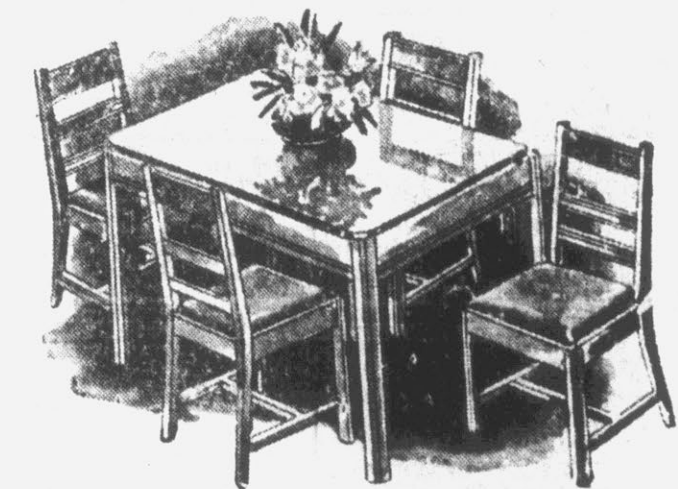

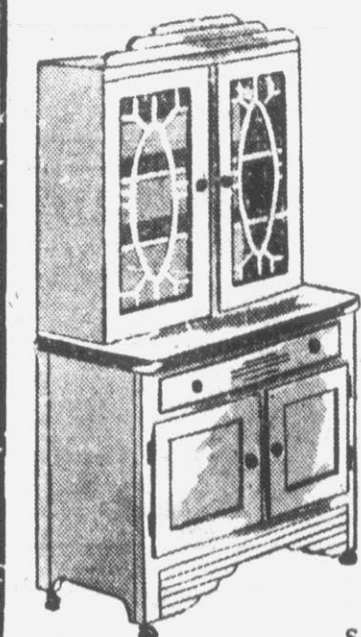
