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SOVIET PLANS INCREASES IN ARMED FORCES

Five Year Plan Stresses Atom Research, Boost Of Production

Moscow, March 16—(AP)—The new five-year plan for Russia will develop atomic power and boost production to one and one-half times the pre-war level, N. A. Voznesensky, head of the planning department, has informed the Supreme Soviet.

Speaking at a joint session last night of both houses of the Russian Parliament, Voznesensky asserted that monopolistic capitalism can produce a new aggressor, and declared that the Soviet Union would maintain and strengthen its military forces during the five-year period from 1946 to 1950.

The House, by a rising vote, agreed to drop the title of "Commissar" and substitute that of "Minister" for its highest Government leaders, and to change the name of the Council of Peoples' Commissars to Council of Ministers.

Generalissimo Stalin thus becomes chairman of the Council of Ministers, instead of chairman of the Council of Commissars. In this capacity he continues as Premier and head of the Government.

In his outline of the new five-year plan, Voznesensky said prizes would be awarded to scientists to stimulate research on such projects as the development of atomic power.

In addition, the Soviet will expand its technical schools to accommodate 1,200,000 students and will increase its expenditures for education and culture to the equivalent of about \$13,333,000,000, or about two and one-quarter times the pre-war total, he continued.

Other phases of the five-year plan, as outlined by Voznesensky: Reasoning of bread, flour and cereals will end this year. There will be more butter, sugar and shoes in the immediate future.

Heavy industry will be doubled by 1950 and automobile production will be tripled to quadrupled. The annual production by 1950 of iron will be 19,000,000 tons; of steel 25,000,000 tons; coal 250,000,000; oil 35,000,000 tons; electricity 85,000,000 kilowatt hours.

The equivalent of about \$3,333,000,000 will be earmarked for railroad improvements, and about \$3,500,000,000 to finance 72,000,000 square meters of new housing.

The Soviet national income will be boosted to about \$14,750,000,000 by 1950.

Explosions Shatter Buildings In Berlin

Berlin, March 16—(AP)—Three explosions of ammunition today shattered the Alexander Kaserne building in midtown Berlin, occupied as a headquarters of Russian military and German civilian police, causing more than 300 casualties.

At least one person, a German policeman, was known to have been killed and authorities said there probably were more fatalities. A police hospital reported that 100 of the casualties were seriously injured.

Many of the casualties were persons living in the neighborhood or traversing the streets. The explosions spread debris over an area of several blocks.

A German policeman said he believed the explosives were in a Red army ammunition dump.

Labor Disputes Slowly Ending

Strikers Prepare To Vote On Ratification Of General Motors And General Electric Settlements; Number Of Idle Because Of Strikes Is Rapidly Decreasing

All appeared quiet on the country's labor front today.

The calm followed a week of big developments in labor disputes, including settlement of two of the nation's major strikes, with indications that some 275,000 strikers soon would be back to their jobs after months of idleness.

The rank and file members of the two CIO unions involved in the walkouts at General Motors and General Electric prepared to vote on ratification of the terms agreed upon by the unions and companies last Wednesday. Both settlements, in which wage increases of 18 1/2 cents an hour were granted, have been approved by the union's councils.

In the GM dispute, the CIO United Auto Workers 200-NAM GM council authorized the 96 local unions to remain on strike if UAW grievances are not settled. UAW President R. J. Thomas said no local would return to work until a majority of the entire GM membership approves the settlement terms.

GM officials and local officers conferred in efforts to speed settlement of the grievances and insure quick ratification and an early resumption of production at the GM.

OPERATORS TO READY REPLY TO PROPOSALS

Bituminous Coal Men Preparing Answer To Union's List Of Complaints

Washington, March 16—(AP)—Bituminous coal operators made use of a week end recess in the industry's wage conference today to prepare their reply to John L. Lewis' proposals for a new contract with his United Mine Workers.

During the first four days of discussions the UMW dwelt on demands for better health and working conditions without ever making a bid for more money. Lewis did finally suggest yesterday that the operators come forth with their own offer on wages and working time, saying:

The week-end recess was requested by Charles O'Neill, chairman of the operators negotiating committee. Without predicting whether the operators would make the invited wage offer, he said:

"We have been for four straight days listening to the extended presentation of the United Mine Workers and to make answer and prepare a reply will require some time." He made no effort to estimate how much time. The present contract ends April 1.

Lewis climaxed his recital of UMW grievances against conditions in the mines and mining towns yesterday with a hint of a strike, declaring:

"It is my opinion, for what it is worth, that the miners don't want to work for you gentlemen any more unless you remedy these conditions."

GENERAL SAYS THAT HE WAS MIS-QUOTED

Denies Saying Iranian Army Would Fight To Defend Tehran

Tehran, March 16—(AP)—Gen. Ahmed Sepehrood Amir Ahmadi, Minister of War, told newsmen today he "denied categorically" all statements accredited to him by foreign newsmen following a press conference March 13 in which he was reported to have said the Iranian army would defend the capital "to the last man" if Russian troops move toward Tehran.

Ahmadi and Prince Firouz, political Under Secretary of State and Director of Propaganda, who met jointly with newsmen to make the official denial, charged that the Minister's actual responses had been "completely misinterpreted" by a War Department interpreter who sat in at the March 13 press conference.

Firouz added that foreign radio reports that Tehran residents fear Russian invasion "are completely false." He handed out a copy of a paper headed "War Ministers' denial," which he asked newsmen to distribute to "correct false impressions created abroad."

The text of the paper: "The London radio in its daily program Friday March 15 claims that I have been responsible for the following statement:

"First that the new arrival of the Soviet army in Iran would be taken to the Security Council."

Further Statement On Espionage Due Monday

Canadian Prime Minister To Elaborate On Charges Made Against Member Of Parliament Contained In Spy Report

Ottawa, March 16—(AP)—Fred Rose, communist member of Parliament accused of working with a Moscow-directed espionage ring, is expected to return to his seat in the House of Commons Monday when Prime Minister W. L. Mackenzie King has promised to give Parliament a fuller statement on the spy case.

Rose, who was released on \$10,000 bail in Montreal yesterday after being charged with conspiracy and with violating the official Secrets Act, told friends he planned to appear as usual in Parliament when it reconvenes after a week-end recess.

Rose's return might provoke a fight on the floor of the House. It was understood that he would not be barred physically from taking his seat, but that some members might move immediately to have his privileges suspended until he is proved innocent or guilty of the grave charges now pending.

The 38-year-old Polish-born legislator attended the opening of a new session of Parliament Thursday, was arrested in his Ottawa home late Thursday night and whisked away for booking in Montreal where he spent yesterday. Parliament does not meet today.

Prime Minister King has advised members to study carefully the two interim reports which have been

issued by a two-man royal commission investigating the spy network.

Stressing the serious nature of the charges contained in these reports, King reminded Parliament that the two commissioners—Robert St. Laurent and R. L. Kellock—are Justices of the Supreme Court of Canada. Such men, he said, would not approve of the drastic detention measures which have characterized the case unless they felt the circumstances called for such action.

Rose entered no plea when arraigned. He will be given a preliminary hearing March 22. As he left the court he declared he was innocent and that he would "fight this thing through to the end."

The arrangements yesterday brought to nine the total number of persons freed under bond in connection with espionage charges. At least five other persons are being detained incommunicado by the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, and have not been indicted publicly.

Montreal police were ordered last night to arrest any persons attempting to distribute illegal literature regarding the arrest of Rose. The order was issued after a crowd of 500 assembled in the north end of Montreal. Two men, who police said were distributing pamphlets headed, "Why Was Fred Rose Arrested?" were taken into custody.

OPA FIGHTING FOR SURVIVAL

Republicans And Southern Democrats Again Unite On Issue

Washington, March 16—(AP)—The Capitol Hill fight on OPA widened today with a drive to put a nine-month limit on any new lease on life for the agency. Instead of the year's extension asked by President Truman.

House opponents added this new objective to their previously announced goal of seeking sharp curtailment of OPA's existing powers if the agency is continued.

Rep. Wolcott (R-Mich.), spearhead of the Republican-Southern Democrats alignment that recently rewrote the administration housing legislation, announced to reporters he would seek these amendments to the bill continuing OPA and subsidies:

1. The Price Control and Stabilization Acts should be continued for a period not later than April 1, 1947. Mr. Truman recommended extension for a year beyond the June 30 expiration date.
2. No maximum price to be set on any commodity that does not give its producer a reasonable profit.
3. Automatic liquidation of OPA controls. Industry advisory committees would be authorized to certify to OPA when the production of a particular commodity reaches a certain percentage of normal demand—the percentage yet to be determined. Upon such certification, the price controls are removed.

Vienna, March 16—Winston Churchill's Missouri speech and the virulent reaction from Moscow continue to reverberate sharply in central Europe and so it perhaps wasn't surprising—though unexpected—that the president of Austria, Dr. Karl Renner, should refer voluntarily to the affair during an interview which he accorded me at the chancellery.

"The unity of the world is our life and the end of unity would be the end of Austria."

Later I reverted to this subject and asked the president whether he was hopeful for peace or whether he agreed with the pessimists who are saying there must be another war.

"I hope there will be agreement between the western Allies and Russia," he replied. "I hope that in the agreement Austria will not be forgotten."

I insisted laughingly "Do you agree with the pessimists?" Renner smiled broadly. "In the way which is one of the great assets of his friendly personality."

"I find it difficult to be pessimistic," he said, and then added earnestly: "I should prefer not to live to see another war come."

"What are our plans?" said Dr. Renner. "The republic never was involved in war but we want a treaty to clear up our legal position. We are liberated but we are in a worse position than the conquered nations."

"We have a parliament and government which can't govern at all because there are four military governments. Every act of our government needs the permission of the four powers and this is generally too late or not at all."

"In one word the big task of the immediate future is to fix the international and internal problems concerning us by treaty. It can't be done by dictation. It concerns our necessities of life and we must be consulted about these necessities. All the agricultural and industrial means of existence are at the disposal of the Allies. The powers make different use of these means. Nearly all the lands in lower Austria are claimed by the occupying Red army. They are used by the Russians and are not available to Austrians. Austria hasn't enough food, this position is intolerable."

"Big industries are run by the Allies not for their own interest but in such manner that we can't formulate a general reconstruction plan. We hope a treaty will give us back the whole power over industry."

The state's four congressmen who this morning were unopposed for renomination in the May 5 primaries are Graham Barden of the third district, Harold D. Cooley of the fourth, R. L. Doughton of the fifth and A. L. Bulwinkle of the eleventh.

Four new Democratic candidates filed their fees with the Elections Commission yesterday.

W. S. Britt of Lumberton, who will oppose Rep. J. Bayard Clark in the seventh district.

Manley R. Dismaw of Charlotte, who will oppose Hamilton C. Jones, also of Charlotte, for the congressional seat now held by Rep. Sam Ervin, who will not be a candidate.

Robert Lee Humber of Greenville, who will oppose Rep. Herbert Bonner of the first district.

John Taylor of Danbury, who will oppose Thurgood Chatham of Winston-Salem for the seat now held by Rep. John H. Poirer, who has announced that he will not be a candidate.

Clyde R. Greene, a Republican, filed his fee yesterday as a congressional candidate from Rep. Doughton's ninth district.

Babson Discusses Politics

Babson Park, Fla., March 16.—With an "accident" for President, "old chums" for cabinet officers and a Congress looking only for votes, our political situation appears very bad. My Democratic friends say that conditions really are no worse than in the past. They claim our pessimism is due to the radio, with its "news" and commentators, (which serves as a great magnifying glass to make these evils look bigger than they really are.)

American People Are Sound

Many people believe that we are in an unfortunate era of an inevitable social and economic cycle. They believe that to attempt to stop it is like trying to "brush back the ocean with a broom." They believe it is better to wait until the tide naturally turns back to conservatism as it sometimes surely will. I cannot agree with this do-nothing philosophy. I believe we all should fearlessly fight for what is right, however much we may temporarily suffer. I believe that this country and the entire world could be saved from much grief by one simple thing. This would be for the conservative Democrats of the South and the conservative Republicans of the North to combine into one party.

It is true that our political leadership is very bad. This is why a few labor leaders are able to bully courts, congress and the people into doing what is unjust and unsound. But the majority of the American voters are still wise and unselfish. They lack only the ability to ex-

press themselves due to the queer mix-up of both parties. If voters were able to forget the labels "Republican" and "Democrat" and could choose between "New Deal" and "Anti-New Deal" there is no doubt as to what would happen. Once more we would have a safe representative government as the founders of our country planned.

Let Us Be Prepared

In the meantime, it may be well to be forearmed and to diversify our forms of security. I believe in life insurance, for instance, but a life insurance policy will not give me food, clothing and shelter when none of these things are available. Hence, every large city family, who can afford it, should have a small productive place somewhere outside the city. Moreover, until most city families have such refuges, strikes will continue to grow more severe. They cannot be prevented by law. Only when families become independent of city conveniences, will the labor unions come to their senses.

I am especially interested in the possibilities of home refrigeration of food supplies. If we could be sure that our electric power would never be turned off, I would recommend that every family buy a home freezer and join a community cooperative freezing association. On the other hand, the more we depend on home - freezers, the more we are subject to the control of labor unions and politicians. Hence, those of us who use home freezers should

Washington, March 16—(AP)—The Army's officer caste system with its special privileges and distinctions gripped many a GI during the war. The result has been a lively post-war agitation for what advocates call democratization of the armed forces.

Is that possible in an efficient defense organization? This seems to be a question no one can answer positively today.

The only major test on the subject this century was Russia's experiment in the democratization of its army.

One of the first things Lenin and his fellow revolutionaries did after they got into power in 1917 was to abolish all the distinctions between officers and enlisted men which had existed in the Czarist army.

Proclaiming they sought the "declassing eradication of every inequality in the army," they banned all ranks, titles, insignia, decorations, officers' organizations and signs of distinction.

"The army of the Russian Republic," they decreed "is henceforth to be composed of free and equal citizens bearing the honorable title of soldier of the revolutionary army."

They also issued a decree providing that all officers be elected by the soldiers.

There were no salutes, no uniforms, no separate mess halls, no quarters for officers, insignia except a small mark on sleeve denoting a man's election. Instead of ranks, there were thirteen "categories of service" such as "platoon commander," "assistant company commander," "sergeant," "corporal," "private," "recruit."

But throughout the 1920s and 1930s there was a consistent trend away from that experimental theory concept and toward the professionalization of the personnel were in command. By successive laws and regulations, the top officers became more and more separated from the rank and file.

A decree of September 22, 1925, reestablished individual ranks for officers, provided for the wearing of insignia, and instituted a system of regular promotions for officers.

After the first war with Finland which badly killed Red army troops, many changes were made. Looting was required again on March 1940. On October 12 of that year a "disciplinary code" was promulgated, tightening up discipline along the line and generally vamping the military organization.

In January, 1943, a special restored shoulders straps on officers' uniforms, as an aid to identification. July 24, 1943, a decree established an officer corps, along with

QUIET CHAP IS CHAPMAN

Washington—It's hard to imagine a greater difference between two men than between former Secretary of Interior Harold I. Ickes and the man who stepped into the breach after Ickes' hasty departure, Oscar L. Chapman.

Where the gruff "Old Curmudgeon" stormed about and often Chapman is a quiet, pleasant fellow who doesn't talk much. Where Ickes sought the spotlight, Chapman has avoided public demonstrations so effectively that he is practically unknown outside official circles (and Colorado).

In two respects, however, the men were similar. Both had been around practically ever since the New Deal started. Chapman came into the department in 1933, a protégé of the late liberal Sen. Edward P. Coughlin of Colorado.

Also, it is doubtful if even Ickes knows any more about Interior than Chapman, who has had working contact with almost all the department's multitudinous divisions. Few persons realize the vast powers of Interior. It administers the territories and insular possessions, including Alaska, Hawaii, Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands. It is over the nation's parks and monuments, including everything from Rock Creek Park, which runs through the heart of the nation's capital, to Death Valley.

It manages around 150,000,000 acres of grazing lands; 4,000,000 acres and maybe some about 6,000,000 more of irrigated lands in the West. It operates Grand Coulee and holds the power from that great dam in Bonneville.

Through Petroleum Conservation, the Bureau of Mines and the Geological Survey, it dips deeply into the country's oil and mining industries. It is guardian of the country's Indians and their reservations, and of fish and wildlife.

Right now, a very important point is whether the department will continue to have the Solid Fuels Administrator for War. It will have to be decided by April 1 whether that war emergency will be continued. It isn't generally considered likely that it will be.

But if it should, the new secretary may find himself right smack in the middle of another of the nation's big industrial rows—maybe one of its biggest strikes. John L. Lewis' United Mine Workers, just back in the AFL, soon will be negotiating for a new contract.

Any time, however, that Oscar Chapman decides he doesn't want any part of the Interior Depart-

CHANGED TYPE WHEAT FLOUR

No Difference In Taste Or Color Of Bread; Loaf Smaller

The only way you can tell the difference between regular white bread and the new Truman Bread, sometimes described as the "Missouri Compromise," is in the smaller size of the loaf. There is no difference in the color. The C. and S. Baking Company here, made some experimental bread recently from the new flour. It tastes just like regular bread—a little better when toasted.

Odel C. Calhoun, head of the bakery, said that all flour milled and shipped out since March 1 will be the new flour. Regular flour contains 72 per cent of the wheat kernel; the new flour contains 83 per cent of the kernel. In other words there is more bran in the new flour. Calhoun called attention to the fact that the new flour cannot be kept in storage as long as the other because of the development of weevils. Any flour stored too long develops weevils, he said, but with the presence of more bran in the new type, weevils will appear earlier. The wheat-saving program inaugurated by the government is expected to permit shipment of more wheat to war-devastated countries, it was stated.

A reporter learned today that a man in the country, anticipated a change in the type of flour, has 12 barrels of flour hoarded in his home. In contrast to the one barrel he usually keeps on hand. The warning has been given that flour—any kind—will develop weevils if kept in storage too long.

Public Must Accept Abandoning Supplies

Manila, March 16—(AP)—The War Department's top-ranking civilian observer of surplus army property today declined to answer questions about the transfer of U. S. military equipment to China, Turkey and other countries.

This matter, Undersecretary of War Kenneth C. Royall told a news conference, involved "high policy" and could best be answered in Washington.

Royall said General MacArthur's Pacific theater has been authorized to return to the United States "reservable civilian-type items" which the foreign liquidation commission does not apply to other overseas theaters.

The American public, he warned, soon must reconcile itself to abandoning unsalable surplus property on several "island bases where the army is leaving no garrison," or only a token force.

During the war, South American oil production increased more than 100,000 barrels daily.

The officers have clubs separate from the enlisted men. There is about as much military custom and pomp as in any other army. Officers and enlisted men must stand at attention and exchange salutes when giving or receiving orders. Military personnel address one another by their rank. And when an officer visits an enlisted man's barracks or other gathering, all troops snap to attention.

Pravda Says U. S. Is Looting Japan

Moscow, March 16—(AP)—Pravda, in a dispatch from Vladivostok, said today the United States was removing highly valuable property from Japan to the United States. A special Tass correspondent said his story was based on reports in Japanese newspapers and in the Tokyo edition of Stars and Stripes. The dispatch in the Communist party organ said the loot reportedly seized by the Americans included platinum, gold, silver, jewelry and other property from a German warehouse, worth \$500,000.

Iran Charged Aiding Oil Monopolization

In Washington and bituminous coal operators prepared their reply to demands submitted by John L. Lewis for a new contract with his AFL United Mine Workers.

Another threat of a strike came from the Pacific coast as three federal conciliators were called in an effort to break the deadlock on wage discussions in San Francisco between Harry Bridges' CIO Longshoremen's Union and Waterfront Employers Association.

The union, demanding 35 cents hourly wage boosts, has been offered 18 cents. Bridges said that if there are no new peace developments by next Thursday, union negotiators will return to their districts to prepare for a strike on or before April 1 of 30,000 longshoremen from Seattle to San Diego.

In Washington, federal conciliators announced settlement of the four and one half months strike of 1,700 CIO farm equipment workers at the South Bend, Ind., plant of the Oliver Corp. Details of the wage hikes were not announced but spokesmen said the terms "follow the general national policy of 18 cents."

Approximately 675,000 workers, including the 275,000 GM and GE strikers, remained idle because of labor disputes.
