BARUCH URGES INFLATIONARY CONTROL PLAN

Statesman Of Two World Wars Emphasizes Speed Up In Production

Washington, March 25.—(AP)—Bernard M. Baruch called today for a "high court of commerce" to repair the inflationary damage he said has been done by hiking wages and prices while cutting taxes.

Cautioning that "the race of selfishness is on," the elder statesman of two world wars pleaded for another year of price control coupled with a firm grip on wages. But he said there must be one overriding objective—greater production.

In testimony prepared for the House Banking Committee, the 75-year-old Baruch lashed out at the government's new wage-price policy pegged to the recent 18½ cent an hour steel workers' pay boost.

"This will be followed by increases all along the line," he told the committee considering an administration request to keep OPA alive a year beyond its present June 30 expiration date. "Call it a bulge but it is really a break—and a grave one. This was inflationary."

Baruch laid down a 14-point program capped by his emphasis on the necessity for greater industrial output. Without increased production "the rest of my suggestions are meaningless," the witness declared as he listed these other recommendations:

1. Stop increasing the money supply.
2. Stop decreasing taxes until the budget is balanced. "There may be wisdom in reinstating the \$500,000,000 tax reduction."
3. "Stop balking the public by saying wage increases can be made without increase in price levels."
4. "Do not fear to increase prices or wages where necessary to get and stimulate production." No raise in prices should be permitted without OPA approval. Baruch said, "and no increase in wage scales without approval of the Office of Economic Stabilization."
5. "Continue price controls, including principal speakers will include Dr. Paul S. Henshaw, director at fact to indicated modifications for a year. Allow profit but no profit."

Guerrilla Hero In The War Against Nazis Is Arrested

Gen. Mihailovic, once hailed as a guerrilla hero in the fight against the Nazis, was officially reported under arrest as a traitor and war criminal today following his capture by Yugoslav authorities.

Alexander Rankovic, Minister of the Interior, announced to a cheering Parliament yesterday that the war-time leader of the Chetniks, who had been hunted for nearly two years in the Yugoslav hills by Marshal Tito's forces, had been seized March 13.

Rankovic did not say where the capture occurred, but it was rumored that Mihailovic, King Peter's former War Minister, was trapped near Visegrad, near the Serbian-Bosnian border.

An official radio broadcast said the general was captured in a mountain cave guarded by only 11 men of his forces, which once were estimated to total as many as 200,000.

The radio account quoted Rankovic as saying:

"These (11) men were all that was left after his disastrous defeat of May, 1945. There is no doubt"

Mihailovic was the last hope of all reactionaries x x x working, openly or secretly, against the Yugoslav federal republic."

The 49-year-old, bespectacled Serbian guerrilla leader organized the first Yugoslav resistance bands in the hills after the Germans streamed into Yugoslavia in April, 1941. He was promoted to general in December, 1941 and a month later, King Peter appointed him Minister of War, Navy and Air Force.

The Soviet Union accused him in February, 1943, of collaborating with the Axis. Later, Tito, leftist partisan and now Yugoslav premier, accused him of collaboration and of inciting Bulgarians to fight the partisans.

His wife died in a concentration camp. A son and daughter joined the partisans; and the son accused his father of treachery.

The remnants of his tattered army disintegrated in May, 1945, streaming across the Serbian border into an Italian concentration camp in the British Eighth Army lines.

GOP Criticizes Wallace Speech

Cabinet Member's Statement That A Republican Congressional Victory Next Fall Would Be Harmful To International Situation Comes Under Guns Of Opposition

Washington, March 25.—(AP)—Republicans lashed out today at Alexander H. Wallace, Secretary of the Interior, for what one of them described as "an effort to tamper American foreign policy in partisan politics."

Wallace's declaration that a GOP congressional victory next fall may have a "disturbing effect" on the whole international situation was regarded by minority party lawmakers as setting the pattern of probable Democratic attack in the approaching election campaign.

Senator Ball (R-Minn.) struck back at the cabinet member's remark, prefacing the annual Jackson Day dinner speech by President Truman here Saturday night—that if the Republicans win in November the traditional isolationist policies would inevitably lead to world disaster.

Sea-Going Giant May End As Apartment

Bremenhaven, Germany, March 25.—(AP)—The 56,000-ton Europa, may end her career as an "apartment house."

The United States navy rejected the great liner, third largest in the world, because its fire safety standards were below minimum. The ship is being considered for use as a dwelling for Germans.

Several Allied nations have expressed interest in the Europa, but it is estimated that several million dollars would be required to refit the ship for peacetime use. It cost \$16,000,000 when built.

COAL PARLEY ENTERS INTO FINAL WEEK

Lewis Expected To Terminate Contract Midnight Next Sunday

Washington, March 25.—(AP)—Bituminous operators and John L. Lewis entered the critical week of their negotiations today with the threat of a nationwide coal strike dead ahead.

Lewis has indicated he will give notice Tuesday or Wednesday that he intends to terminate the present contract at midnight next Sunday, March 31.

Before he gives that notice, the operators hope to submit a list of counter proposals for a new contract. They ran into trouble over the weekend, however, in reaching agreement on how to meet Lewis' nine generalized proposals, including his big one for a health and welfare fund.

The United Mine Workers leader has asked for increased wages for a shorter work week, hinting that he wants to return to a 7-hour day. But he has not been specific in the brief negotiations to date.

The operators were represented by associates who declined to be identified by name as willing to grant the \$400,000 bituminous miners a pay increase equal to that given in other basic industries. In steel and autos this averaged 18½ cents an hour.

Some operators were said, however, to fear that this tentative concession on wages would fail to satisfy Lewis because he has completely subordinated the wage and hour demand to his health and welfare fund proposal.

Madrid, March 25.—(AP)—Informants said today a new Spanish note to the United States and Britain accuses France of engaging in peace. The morning newspaper, ABC, yesterday accused French Communists of mobilizing against Spain while organizing a war that would turn over the southwestern part of the continent to Moscow.

Nazi Scientist Gave Aid On Atom Bomb

Washington, March 25.—(AP)—German scientists helped the Allies win the war. They even chipped in with helpful hints on the atomic bomb.

They didn't mean to, of course. But they did. These scientists published their theories and discoveries in books and magazines intended only for German eyes. But even with a war on, hundreds of valuable treatises were slipped out of the Fatherland and published here.

This story is being told by an exhibit in the Library of Congress. It isn't, however, a very exciting exhibit for the layman.

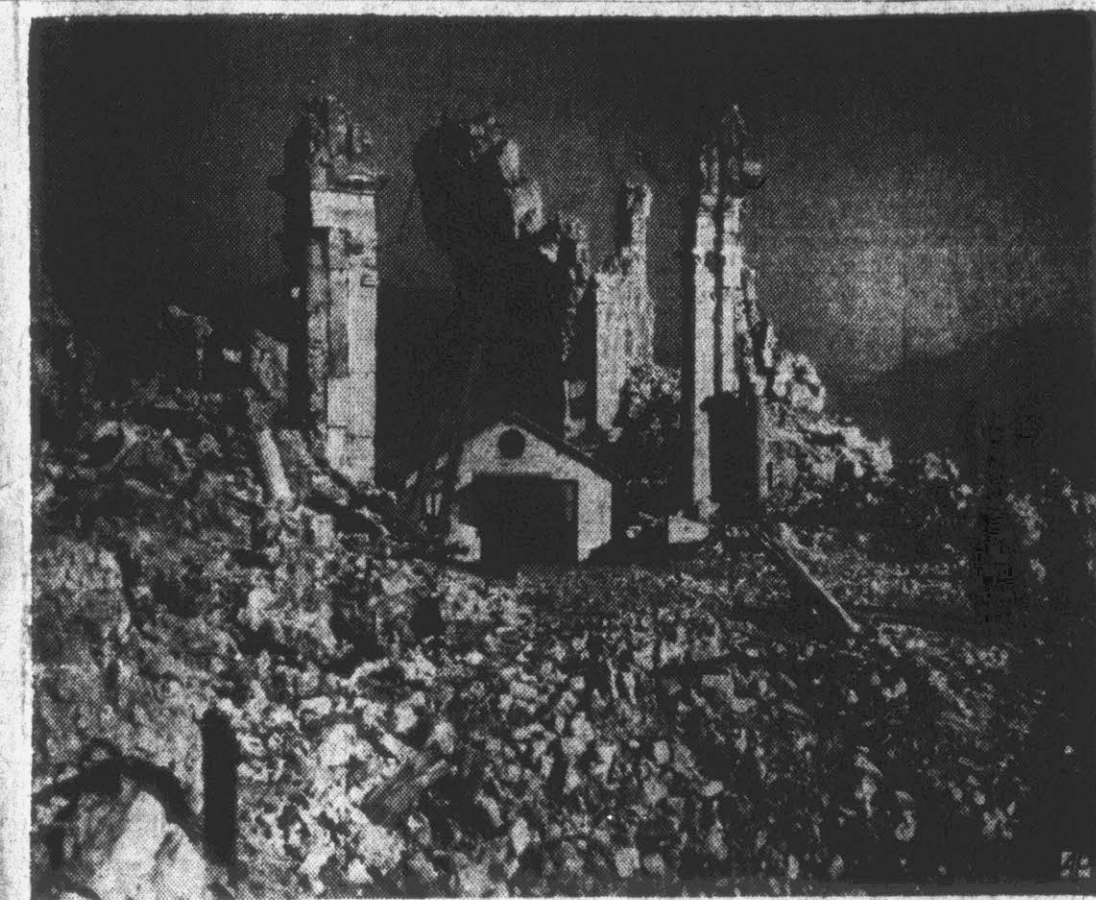
For example, take a book by a scientist named Peter which bears this title: "Eight page table of trigonometric functions for every sexagesimal second of the quadrant."

It's composed of row after row of figures. These add up to around five pounds, and a document about the size and beauty of a metropolitan telephone book.

"A very important work for a scientist," said Oscar Mollari of the Allen Property Custodian's Office.

Other items are similarly discouraging to anyone who (a) isn't a scientist or (b) can't read German.

BRITON URGES REPUDIATION

UNRRA Asked By Poles To Deny Aid To Political Refugees

Atlantic City, March 25.—(AP)—British Minister of State Philip Noel-Baker called upon the United Nations today to repudiate a Polish demand for denial of UNRRA aid and asylum to political refugees.

He denied the accusation by Polish Minister of Welfare Jan Stankiewicz that generals hostile to the new Polish government had been placed in a position where they could influence the political thinking of UNRRA.

"Nobody desires nor dreams," he told delegates to UNRRA's council meeting here "that UNRRA should maintain political movements attempting to stir up trouble within their homelands."

Meanwhile, UNRRA's inner council of supplies was reported ready to recommend sharp curtailment of the use of grain for making liquor or for fattening hogs and chickens on the grounds that it could better be used to feed the world's hungry.

This was the first major development to emerge from a tightly deadlocked session called to thrash out a demand for money-poor nations dependent upon UNRRA relief for an "equal break" with countries holding financial reserves on the market for available surpluses.

Reuther's Leadership Of General Motors Strike Under Fire; Thomas Tells Of Turning Down Ford Offer To Check Books On "Ability To Pay" Plan

Atlantic City, N. J., March 25.—(AP)—CIO President Philip Murray stepped into a hotbed of United Auto Workers family trouble today and found himself in the middle of the political free-for-all between R. J. Thomas and Walter Reuther for the UAW-CIO presidency.

Murray, who will address the UAW convention here today, found that the campaign had vaulted into the open a bitter cleavage within the union over the strategy and philosophy of the General Motors strike.

Thomas, who is seeking his seventh term as UAW president, said Reuther really was running against the CIO and is opposing CIO policies.

He said the fiery, 38-year-old leader of the General Motors long-drawn out strike was a "dupe" of AFL leaders in a movement to draw the auto union into the AFL.

Reuther, at a news conference of his own, said this was a "contemptible lie." He also denied both any ill feeling between himself and Murray, stating: "I think Philip Murray and I enjoy a very decent friendship."

Reuther said the effort to link him with the AFL is a Communist Party line which Thomas has picked up—and that it is the most fantastic, contemptible piece of forgery ever fastened on this union.

WARNING LEFT BY YAMASHITA

Dead General Cautions U. S. To Ignore Traditional Strategy

Washington, March 25.—(AP)—Japanese General Tomoyuki Yamashita advised the nation that he hanged him as a war criminal to ignore traditional ideas of military strategy in preparing against the possibility of another conflict.

In an article dictated from his Manila death cell and published today in the semi-official Infantry Journal Yamashita told his conquerors that the atomic bomb and long range planes mean that the textbooks of West Point and Annapolis must be rewritten.

The ill-fated "Tiger of Malaya," predicting that any future major war will be settled by a single blow from the air, argued therefore that the infantry has lost its once vital role.

Secretary Byrnes Reads Presidential Message Of Welcome; Today's Meeting Devoted To Formalities; Reported Russian Evacuation Of Iran Eases Tension Among Members

New York, March 25.—(AP)—President Truman pledged to the United Nations Security Council today America's "wholehearted cooperation" in the cause of peace, and Secretary of State Byrnes warned that from now on no nation must be allowed "to take the law into its own hands."

In a brief speech prepared for the Council's first session at its temporary American headquarters at Hunter College in the Bronx, Byrnes presented the President's message of welcome and added on his own behalf this admonition:

"Nations like individuals should do their best to adjust their disputes without resort to litigation. No nation has the right to take the law into its own hands. If disputes cannot be settled by friendly negotiations, they must be brought before the Security Council."

That is why the Security Council must at all times be prepared to act promptly. That is why the Security Council must be prepared to function continuously. If the United Nations is to endure, there must be no excuse or need for any nation to take the law into its own hands."

A few hours before the Council met in the newly converted gymnasium of Hunter College, leaders had agreed that today's session should be held to formalities of welcome and speech-making and that discussion of the Iranian issue, which has been eased considerably by the reported Russian agreement to withdraw its troops from Iran, would be delayed until tomorrow.

Mr. Truman declared that "we are greatly honored that the United Nations has chosen the site of our country for our home," and promised that the American people would do their best to make the United Nations' representatives feel entirely at home here.

He stressed the need for all the member nations to "remain united and continue to work together, as they have fought together, for peace and for freedom."

The American people, the President said, pledge "their wholehearted co-operation to give to the United Nations the strength and the will to maintain peace and freedom in this interdependent world."

A Review Of Your Government In Action

Washington, March 25.—(AP)—The House Military Committee plans to hold the controversial universal military bill over until next January and let the new Congress wrestle with it.

Committee members said privately that a general, informal agreement had been reached to take no action until next year.

Among considerations in reaching such an agreement were these: The Army is fighting for a one-year extension of the war-time draft and does not want both Selective Service and universal training at the same time; if the draft is extended, as indicated, but for less than a year, the committee wants to review the entire military picture just before expiration of the renewed draft act; it is election year, and constituents generally seem split over the issue.

We couldn't get a bill out now if we tried," one committee member said. It's just the wrong time."

Before the Senate sub-banking committee, Frank E. Williams, an attorney, testified today that two former employees of James K. Vardaman, Jr., voluntarily signed affidavits that they "paid" an inventory under the command and coercion of Mr. Vardaman.

Both Reburn and De Coster have testified that they signed statements in Williams' office but they insisted these were given under pressure from Frank O. Bittner, Jr. De Coster said they contained some statements that were not true.

Bittner testified he was "defrauded" in purchase of 7,375 shares of stock in the Vardaman Shoe Company from Vardaman less than a month before the company was reorganized in bankruptcy early in 1942.

Paris, March 25.—Whenever two or more serious-minded folk get together these days the conversation almost inevitably arrives at a discussion of whether this war-torn Europe is headed for another war.

That's a question which unhappily can't be dismissed as absurd. The answer as I see it is this:

The danger of a further upheaval does exist. However, war not only isn't inevitable but the balance is on the side of peace at this writing.

And what has created such a threat as exists? Well, there's no great mystery about that. It's due to differences among the major powers in connection with the realignment of the zones of influence both in Europe and in Asia. Power politics is another designation for it.

The newborn might of Russia is pouring into much of the vacuum created by the disappearance of Germany, Italy and Japan as first class powers, and by the disability of France and Britain to defend their place in the sun.

Until that realignment is finished, peace will be in danger. There remains some highly delicate points to be settled—for example, Moscow's intentions regarding Austria, Turkey, Iran and Manchuria—but it and when they have been ironed

out the danger of trouble will have been reduced to a minimum, unless some power displays ambition to exceed the new zones of influence.

Generalissimo Stalin, in an exchange of letters with the Associated Press the other day, expressed confidence in the United Nations as an instrument for preserving peace. That reflects the views of numerous statesmen with whom I have talked recently in various European countries.

The degree of success of the United Nations organization will be in direct ratio to the degree of agreement among the Big Three—Russia, Britain and America.

Many competent observers here in Europe are greatly encouraged by the more positive stand being taken recently by the Big Three in their dealings with one another. That may seem paradoxical at first reading, but it's based on sound reasoning.

Military leaders and statesmen alike recognize that the moment has arrived—probably arrived some time ago, for that matter—when firmness and two-fisted frankness is necessary. A soft answer still may turn away wrath, but the soft answer doesn't necessarily have to be the "yes" of appeasement.

Life-Saving Medical Gear Flown To Ship

Elizabeth City, March 23.—Less than six hours after the troop transport Sadalia Victory en route to New York with returning servicemen reported that one of them was near death of pneumonia, oxygen equipment, penicillin and other life saving equipment were dropped on board 20 miles off Currituck Light from a Martin Mariner which left here at dawn piloted by Lieut. F. H. Raumer of the U. S. Coast Guard.

Before dawn specialized crews and equipment were brought here by air from the Coast Guard operating base at Norfolk, and from the U. S. Marine Base at Cherry Point. Equipment and medicines were repacked in special parachutes with life rafts attached, and the whole being prepared in quadruplicate to be sure that at least one set of the badly needed equipment would reach the ship.

High winds and rough seas prevented a landing alongside the ship and the Mariner was brought around into the wind for a pass low over the deck of the ship. The first package of equipment missed the ship slightly but the second pass brought a direct landing on the deck, and from the circling plane the crew could see the men on the ship take and begin opening it as they headed toward the section of the ship housing the sick bay.

The air forces announcement tied the projected experiment in with the Canadian Army's current musk ox trek into the icy stretches of the Far North to determine how well troops and mechanized equipment can operate in such barren areas.

The B-29 flights will range from 1,500 to 2,000 miles to the most northerly points reached by the musk ox ground parties, and the air forces said the operation "will be the closest approximation to actual military transport airborne operations under Arctic conditions ever attempted."

Thus the air forces intend to duplicate in its field, the navy experiment which only recently sent the

super-carrier Midway north to sub-Arctic waters to test operations in icy latitudes. The Midway is now en route to New York.

Definite dates for the start of the B-29 operation were not mentioned in the air force announcement but it was reported that planes assigned were specially prepared for Arctic operations.

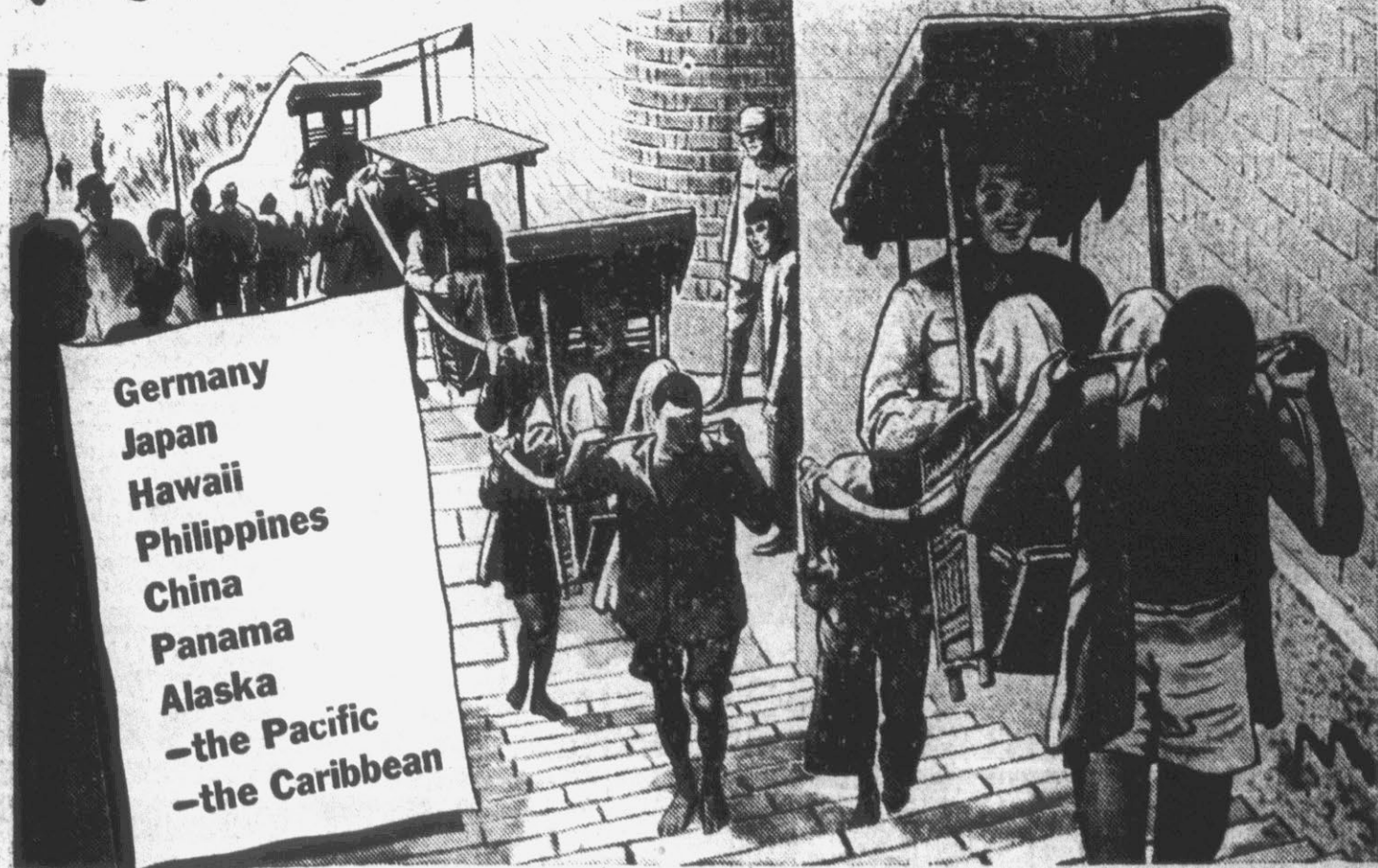

The White Phantoms of Chapel Hill earned the right to meet the Aggies in the east-west playoff by eliminating New York University 37-49, and Ohio State 60-57 in overtime, to capture the Eastern Regional NCAA crown.

While North Carolina had never before won an NCAA contest, let alone a championship, the Aggies last year copped the title in their first attempt. This came about when Coach Hank Iba's boys swept aside Utah, Arkansas and New York University in that order. The Aggies followed up their NCAA triumph by defeating DePaul, National Invitation tournament titlists, for national honors. The Tarheel's only other NCAA experience was in 1941 when they dropped consecutive titles to Pittsburgh and Dartmouth.

The Aggies-Tarheels clash also will represent individual scoring duel between Kurland and North Carolina's John (Hook) Dillon. By pouring in 29 points against California Saturday night, the Aggies' seven-foot center became the leading collegiate scorer in the country with 620 points. Dillon, whose 31 points had much to do with the success of the White Phantoms in the tournament, has accounted for 436 points to win a place among the nation's top ten pointmakers.

Kurland will be backed by forwards Weldon Kern and Sam Aubrey, and guards Blake Williams and J. L. Parks. The Tar-Heel starting five is expected to be Horace (Bones) McKinney, center; Jim White and Dillon, forwards; and Jim Jordan and Bob Paxton, guards.

Ohio State, whose loss to North Carolina Saturday night was its second overtime defeat in the last two Eastern finals, will meet California in a preliminary to the Aggies-Tarheels struggles.

St. Petersburg, Fla., March 25—(AP)—As most of the Florida-based clubs went into their final full week of training today before breaking camp and heading north, this question was being asked with increasing interest:

"Can the St. Louis Cardinals do it without Whitey Kurowski?"

Up to a comparatively few days ago, there was an almost unanimity of opinion among baseball men in Florida, at least, that the St. Louis club would romp to the National League title behind its superb pitching. It was not felt that the Chi-

cago Cubs, training in the west, could quite match the all-around strength of the veteran Red Birds. But many of the boys have begun to waver since Kurowski, the star third-baseman who hit 323 and drove in 102 runs last season, has no intention of reporting to the Cards at the salary President Sam Breadon is willing to pay him.

They are saying now that unless Breadon can obtain a runproducer in exchange for Kurowski, one who can come somewhere near matching Whitey at the plate, it is likely to be a very close race, with the Cubs fully capable of winning out if their pitching stands up.

Unless Kurowski finally reports, or a suitable replacement is obtained, the Cards will enter the race with all their real punch wrapped up in their outfield trio of Stan Musial, Terry Moore and Enos Slaughter. All three can powder a ball—Musial hit a resounding 347 in his last season, 1944—but the club could find itself badly in need of another hitter or two.

Greensboro, March 25—(AP)—Professional golfer's touring stars headed for the Charlotte Open tournament today on the next-to-last leg of the winter tour with Sam Snead still hotter than a firecracker.

The slammer finds himself in a position similar to that of a year ago following yesterday's victory in the Greensboro Open.

Twelve months ago he moved into Charlotte on the crest of a victory streak, only to drop a double play-off to Byron Nelson and it was not until a few weeks ago that he regained his form.

The Greensboro victory, coming on the heels of his Jacksonville, Fla., triumph has lifted him into third place among the year's money winners. Yesterday's 270, 10-under par performance over Sedgefield Country Club's 6,720 yard course brought a \$1,500 top prize in the \$7,500 event and boosted his 1946 total to \$6,736.58.

The leaders are Ben Hogan of Hershey, Pa., with \$12,619.25 and Byron Nelson of Toledo, Ohio, with \$7,602.50. Both are resting until the April 4-7 Augusta Masters' final winter event.

Snead came up with 67 and 66 rounds yesterday to equal the tournament record of 270 set by Hogan. His 66 tied the course record. Also shooting 66 on his last round was Herman Keiser, Akron, O., who took second place and \$1,000 with 276. Keiser is ninth on the money list for the year with \$3,476.24.

Third place went to Livid Mangrum, Los Angeles, who had 69-80 yesterday for 279, three strokes ahead of Jimmy Demaret, Houston, Tex., and Jim Ferrier, Chicago. Herman Barron, White Plains, N. Y., leader the first two days, wound up in a four way tie for 12th at 2866 following final rounds of 73 and 77.

Crowds Welcome Hirohito Visits

Tokyo, March 25—(AP)—Crowds shouting "Benzai!" greeted Emperor Hirohito today on his third "meet the people" tour within a month.

He visited a hospital, a silk mill, an industrial plant and a prefectural government office. The tour, which took Hirohito about 40 miles from Tokyo, proceeded smoothly except when a minor official bowed low too close to the emperor's limousine and was smacked in the head by an opening door.

Hirohito's chauffeur and other court attendants quickly rendered first aid and the man recovered sufficiently to show the emperor a reclaimed land project; wheat and potatoes are grown on this former Japanese airfield which still is littered at the edges with ruined planes.

Hirohito traveled by imperial train from Tokyo to Maebashi, where he entered his Mercedes Benz limousine with its imperial golden chrysanthemum. A jeffup of American military police led the way to Takasaki National hospital, where the emperor visited former Japanese servicemen who returned ill from overseas duty.

His left shoulder twitching nervously, Hirohito stood before the soldiers asking them about their treatment, food and hospital conditions.

Police Make 29 Arrests Weekend

Greenville police made 29 arrests during the recent weekend. Chief Jim Tanner said today. Thirteen persons were arrested for being drunk, one on a capias for failure to appear in court, three for assault, four for reckless driving, one for indecent exposure, four for driving a motor vehicle while drunk, one for worthless check, one for disorderly conduct, and one was arrested for speeding.

Seventeen of those arrested "had on too much liquor," police said. The police department plans to rid the streets and public places of prowling drunks as well as from cars and trucks on the streets and highways.

Governor Robert S. Kerr of Oklahoma, who was keynote speaker for the fast national convention of the Democratic party, was speaker for the Jackson Day meeting, one of a series held throughout the country.

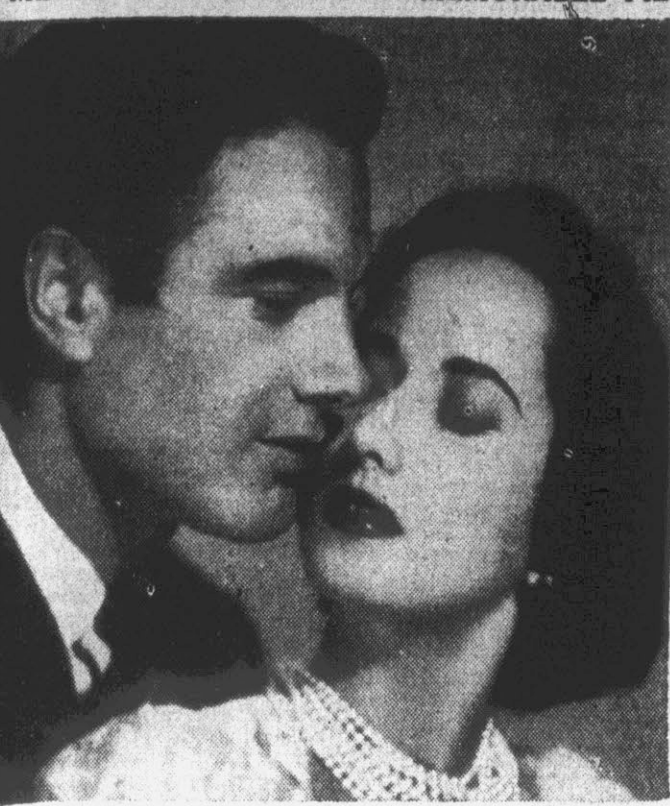

Hoover Says Italian Food Problem Grave

Rome, March 25—(AP)—Herbert Hoover told reporters here today that the food problem in Italy was the same as in other parts of famine-threatened Europe: "to prevent starvation for the next 120 days until the new harvest is gathered."

"That fate, he said, 'will fall on the lower income groups and children soon after arrivals of overseas food stop.'"

Hoover, chairman of an American commission investigating the European food situation, said that if present Italian rations are lowered as the result of the failure to import food stuffs, "it will be a disaster to the white collar and working classes."

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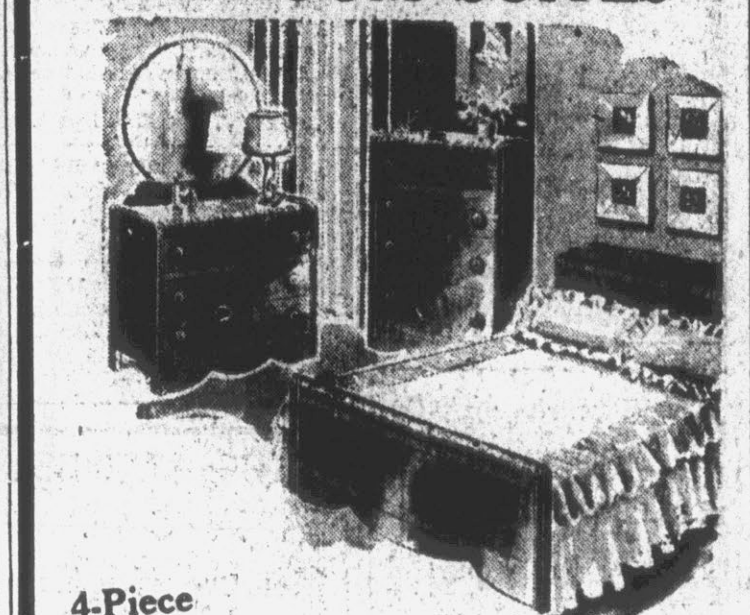
