House Committee Passes OPA

Price Controls in Approval For One Year's Extension By House Banking Committee; Group Votes Several Restrictions On Agency's Former Powers

Washington, April 5.—(AP)—The House Banking Committee today approved a year's extension of price control, as recommended by President Truman. It defeated 13 to 9 a Republican effort to limit OPA's new lease on life to nine months.

However, the committee aimed a blow at OPA pricing policy, voting 15 to 6 to prohibit the agency from requiring retailers for a period of six months to absorb larger cost of manufactured products, such as automobiles, refrigerators and radios.

Moreover, the group by a 15 to 5 ballot, approved—subject to House and Senate action—a gradual termination of the government's \$2,000,000,000 annual subsidy program. The latter amendment would require the government to reduce subsidy payments by 25 per cent over the year beginning July 1 and get out of the subsidy business by June 30, 1947. The subsidies include payments to hold down food costs.

A proposal by Rep. Wolcott (R-Mich.) to give manufacturers prices reflecting production cost and a reasonable profit on each item, was defeated on a 11 to 11 tie vote.

The committee approved, however, an amendment by Rep. Barry (D-N.Y.) establishing a policy that OPA should allow upward price adjustments for transient hotels, making a distinction between a transient and an apartment or residential hotel. No percentage of increase was specified.

The proposal to hold the pricing agency's new life span to nine months beyond June 30 also was offered by Wolcott, senior Republican on the committee. Its defeat left proposed OPA termination date at June 30, 1947.

Rep. Crawford (R-Mich.) offered the amendment to alter OPA's retail cost absorption policy. It stipulates that OPA cannot interfere for a period of six months with normal retail percentage markups on items where government restrictions during wartime forced a 75 per cent or more reduction in production rates.

Deadly Rocket Is No Longer Secret

Dover, Del., April 5.—(AP)—The War Department today removed the veil of secrecy around "Tiny Tim," a powerful rocket which an army spokesman said is "by far the deadliest thing ever fired from an airplane."

Col. Donald B. Diehl, commanding officer of the 446th army air force base unit at the Dover Army Air Field, said the rocket "can sink almost anything that floats."

"It has driven holes all the way through a light cruiser from side to side," the colonel reported. "It goes through a destroyer as if it were a piece of paper."

The new weapon, which can be fired from any present type American fighter plane or medium bomber, was described by Col. Diehl as a "huge rocket 11.75 inches in diameter and 12 feet long."

"Several Tiny Tims were used against Japanese shipping and reinforced pillboxes before the end of the war," he added, "and it was found that few targets could withstand a direct hit from the rocket traveling in excess of 1,500 miles an hour."

Congressman Warns That United States Should Not Be Santa Claus

Washington, April 5.—(AP)—Rep. Hargis (D-S.C.) told the House today that the United States should not assume "the role of a Santa Claus" to other nations.

"I know some will say," he said in a prepared speech, "that we should be generous in order to command friendships of these nations. The situation is very appealing, but we should remember that some nations are like individuals, the more you do for them the more you will be called upon to do or else you lose their friendship."

MacArthur Launches Jap Control Council

Russians Chary At Pacific Death Toll Placed Around 166

First Advisory Council Meeting Over "General Situation" In Japan, Propose Policy Changes

Tokyo, April 5.—(AP)—General MacArthur launched a four-point advisory council on Japan today, hoping to advise him while he retains his belated command. The council, which will meet tomorrow, will have four members, all offered by Russia, whose delegate warned of "increasing activity of reactionary forces among Japanese."

Mr. Gen. Kuzeva Derevyanko, Soviet representative, spoke up as soon as MacArthur's opening address, a stirring plea for all nations to renounce their right to wage war, was finished.

Excluding the press, examining MacArthur's decrees seven days and unaltered transcripts 10 days in advance of their issuance to Japanese, internationalizing the council secretary (U. S. Brig. Gen. Bonner F. Fellers now is secretary-general) and holding new Japanese elections if next Wednesday's balloting elects "unsuitable" Diet members.

MacArthur in his speech said it was advisable that all council meetings be open to public and press, to avoid any suspicion of "secret devices, undertakings, or commitments."

At the suggestion of British Commonwealth representative W. MacManon B.J.L. Russia withdrew her request to bar the press from all meetings, and the council agreed to admit newsmen to "major meetings." They will be barred from "unofficial meetings" whenever the council sees fit.

The council's next session, formally scheduled for April 17, presumably will be classified as major. Among other business, Russia's proposal to internationalize the council secretariat will be discussed at that time.

The conference room across from Emperor Hirohito's palace glared with photographers' floodlights as MacArthur, speaking distinctly above the whirring movie cameras, made his plea for peace.

GOVERNOR OF NEW JERSEY USES NEW LAW

Seizes Gas Works In First Application Of Utilities Strike Law

A state-wide strike of New Jersey utility workers which had threatened to cut off gas service to most of the state's 4,000,000 residents was averted today as state officials took over operation of nine gas works of the Public Service Electric & Gas Co.

In another major development on the labor front, one of the country's newest and most bitter post-war labor disputes was settled as AFL machinist union and company negotiators reached an agreement ending the five months old strike at the Yale and Towne Manufacturing Company's lock factory in Stamford, Conn. Ratification of the settlement of the wage dispute which kept idle more than 3,000 employees was to be voted on later today.

The action of Governor Walter E. Edge of New Jersey in signing an order authorizing the seizure and operation of the gas works kept the 1200 workers involved at their posts (Continued on Page Six)

HOUSE PASSES PAY INCREASE

Federal Employees May Get Hike Of \$400 Per Year

Washington, April 5.—(AP)—The House held out the promise of a \$400-a-year pay raise to thousands of federal employees, but there was a big catch to it.

The catch is that enough federal workers be fired to make the necessary funds available, so that no increase in salary appropriations will be required.

The bill is not yet law and it may give way to a compromise measure for the Senate already has voted to raise the pay of federal workers about 11 per cent.

The provision making the pay raise of some workers contingent on the firing of others was introduced yesterday by Rep. Dirksen (R-Ill.), and quickly approved. He (Continued on Page Six)

Iceland Occupation Worries Soviet Paper

Moscow, April 5.—(AP)—Izvestia said today the United States command in Iceland is concluding leases and agreements with Icelandic farmers concerning air and naval bases on condition the agreements will not be made public.

"Iceland's public is quite disturbed over the prospect of formation in Iceland of permanent American bases," the government newspaper's commentator said, "inasmuch as they feel as the Danish newspaper Politiken wrote that their neutrality will not be built at a low price."

"The American troops do not intend to leave Iceland soon may be seen in the fact that the American command is concluding agreements about leaving the necessary land directly with the farmers at high prices on condition the question of rent will not be made public," the article said.

TODAY IN CONGRESS

A Review Of Your Government In Action

Washington, April 5.—(AP)—A one year extension of price controls was approved by the House Banking Committee today.

Administration forces overrode, 12 to 9, a Republican attempt to limit the extension to nine months. The action is still subject to House and Senate action.

Foreign affairs continued to occupy the Senate, with Senator Myers (D-Pa.), contending Great Britain violated a treaty with this country in granting independence to Transjordan, formerly a part of the Palestine mandate.

The U. S. Chamber of Commerce urged the House Ways and Means Committee to extend Social Security benefits to millions of workers not now covered.

A protest against the drafting of young farm workers was voiced by Fred Bailey of the National Grange in Senate Military Committee hearings on extending Selective Service, said Congress must decide whether it is going to "police the world or help feed it."

Congress convened one top administration bill to the legislative branch today, and buckled down to work on setting draft and OPA measures ready for the rough reception awaiting them on the floor.

"BLUEBEARD" FOUND GUILTY OF MURDERS

Dr. Marcel Petiot Condemned To Death For Multiple Killings

Paris, April 5.—(AP)—Dr. Marcel Petiot, accused of operating a Bluebeard murder mill within the forbidding walls of his residence on the Rue Le Sueur, was condemned to death late last night after a three-week trial had ended in his conviction for more than a score of killings.

The hollow-eyed little physician was shocked into silence when the verdict was read but within a few minutes recovered sufficiently to shout to his brother, Maurice, in the crowded Palais de Justice: "I must be avenged!"

Petiot, a legendary figure in Paris and described by the prosecution as "the monster of the Rue Le Sueur," said he would appeal.

After passing the death sentence, the court continued in session and early today awarded civil damages (Continued on Page Eight)

President Drafts Army Day Speech

Washington, April 5.—(AP)—President Truman today drafted a firm Army Day warning to his country to maintain powerful armed forces during the critical experimental years of the United Nations.

The chief executive leaves at 4:25 p. m. (EST) for Chicago where, in famous Soldier Field, he will deliver a 20-minute address re-emphasizing United States foreign policy and his recipe for backing it up.

The address, following talks by Secretary of War Robert P. Patterson and General Dwight D. Eisenhower, chief of staff, is scheduled for delivery at 4 p. m. (EST) tomorrow.

Mr. Truman's address, described by his aides as a major policy pronouncement, is expected to embrace new plans for:

1. Extension of the Selective Service authority to draft men for the armed forces.

2. Passage of legislation to arm the administration with authority to draft the nation's youth for one year of military training to provide a reserve of trained citizens against future emergencies.

3. Early enactment of army-navy merger legislation to create a single department of national defense in which the air forces would have

IRAN MAKES SETTLEMENT WITH RUSSIA

Agreements Reached On Evacuation, Oil, And Status Of Azerbaijan

Tehran, April 5.—(AP)—The Iranian government announced an agreement with Soviet Russia today on withdrawal of Russian soldiers, oil and Azerbaijan.

Prince Firooz, minister of propaganda, told a news conference that, as a result of negotiations here and at Moscow, "all outstanding questions between the two countries now have been settled on a basis of complete reciprocity and good will."

No formal treaty has been signed, Firooz said, but the cabinet met until 1 a. m. today and gave unanimous approval to an official communique outlining the basis of the settlement, reached yesterday. This communique was formally signed (Continued on Page Eight)

The Security Council of our new peace organization has come having studied that complicated affair at first hand in Persia, I venture the guess that it's a long way from being settled to the complete satisfaction of all concerned.

That's not the main point. What has happened is that a tiny country (it happens to be Persia) has been able to get hearing of a grievance against a major power, the competence of the council to deal with the issue has been recognized, and the dispute has been guided onto a highway which may lead to ultimate settlement or which in any event may by-pass the use of force.

One of the most gratifying aspects of the case is that while the authority and dignity of the United Nations were maintained, the council didn't get tough in trying to force a settlement. The harsh question of sanctions didn't arise. Horse sense prevailed.

The position of the Russo-Persian case now is that the Security Council has shelved it temporarily while the two countries negotiate. It (Continued on Page Eight)

Inland Fishing Closes Tomorrow

Raleigh, April 5.—(AP)—Sport fishing for warm water species in the inland waters of the Piedmont and Eastern Carolina will be closed from tomorrow through May 19, Dr. Willis King, State Fish biologist, reminded today.

During that period it will be illegal to fish by any means in any of the creeks and small rivers. Lakes and larger impoundments designated for commercial and year-round fishing will not be affected.

By special concession of the Board of Conservation and Development and the North Carolina Game Committee, fishing for all species will be permitted during the Easter holidays, April 20-22 inclusive, on all areas open to the public.

The trout season will open April 15 and will extend through Aug. 31 in all sections of the western counties except the cooperative wildlife management areas of the national forests which will open after May 1.

POLICE STILL HUNT KILLER

Cab Driver Gives Officers Possible Clue In Search

Washington, April 5.—(AP)—Five carloads of Washington and Maryland police sped to suburban Deanwood early today in response to a cab driver's tip that he saw a man, closely resembling Earl J. McFarland, convicted killer who escaped from the district jail's Death House Wednesday.

The driver said he saw a man slinking along the street clad in a wrinkled gray shirt and dark blue trousers which looked like part of the policeman's uniform of the 24-year-old ex-Marine when he got away.

The taxi man called the police from a patrol box two blocks away and they began an intensive search of the area.

Soon after the police arrived a home owner in the suburbs reported his house had been entered and some food stolen from the kitchen. The marauder left many fingerprints and experts from district headquarters were called to make a comparison with McFarland's record.

Shown an enlarged photograph of the fugitive, the cab driver declared he was positive that he was the man he saw.

Joseph Medley, 44, who accompanied McFarland in the dawn jail break, was dragged from a drain pipe on the Potomac river shore after only seven hours at large.

Both men were sentenced to electrocution on charges of slaying women.

Protest Of Reds Is Taken Lightly

Washington, April 5.—(AP)—American officials took lightly today contentions of Chinese Communist leader Chou En-Lai that the unity program Gen. Marshall helped that country adopt is in jeopardy.

Specifically they said the United States plans no huge lump sum loan to China and will not give any careless assistance which might increase disorder.

Those were among fears Chou voiced yesterday at a Chungking news conference, along with his charge that Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek's Kuomintang Party is not carrying out its end of the unity program, adopted in January.

Marshall, who has been in Washington three weeks, is expected to leave some time next week to resume his duties as President Truman's special envoy to that country.

Russia Softens Her Policy In Austria

Vienna, April 5.—(AP)—Soviet Russia, abruptly softening her policy toward Austria, has withdrawn most of her demands for land in the Russian occupation zone and has indicated a desire to reach an agreement on some other disputed issues, a government spokesman said today.

Instead of the 125,000 acres (195 square miles) of scattered farm land which the Russians claimed and in part occupied, ostensibly for farming purposes, the Red army is now asking only for the 50,000-acre tract which the Germans had used as a military exercise area.

The Austrian government has indicated a willingness to load this ground to the Red army.

Thorium Shipments From India Halted

New Delhi, April 5.—(AP)—Sir C. P. Ramaswami Aiyer, prime minister of the Indian State of Travancore, said today that the shipment annually to America of 250,000 tons of thorium-bearing sand had been discontinued, and that American firms had been informed they must process the sand in Travancore.

Thorium, now considered valuable because of its use in atomic energy research, had been employed heretofore in the United States to make paints for ships and to make plastics.

America Is Credited In Beating V-Bomb

London, April 5.—(AP)—Gen. Sir Frederick Pile, former chief of the British anti-aircraft command, in a letter to the Times today, credited the American made proximity fuse with enabling the British to obtain 100 per cent successes against German V-bombs in the first months of 1945.

"American scientists, together with American production methods, and, above all, American generosity," said Pile, "gave us the final answer to the flying bomb. We could never have designed and produced the fuse in this country in time and in sufficient quantities to meet the menace."

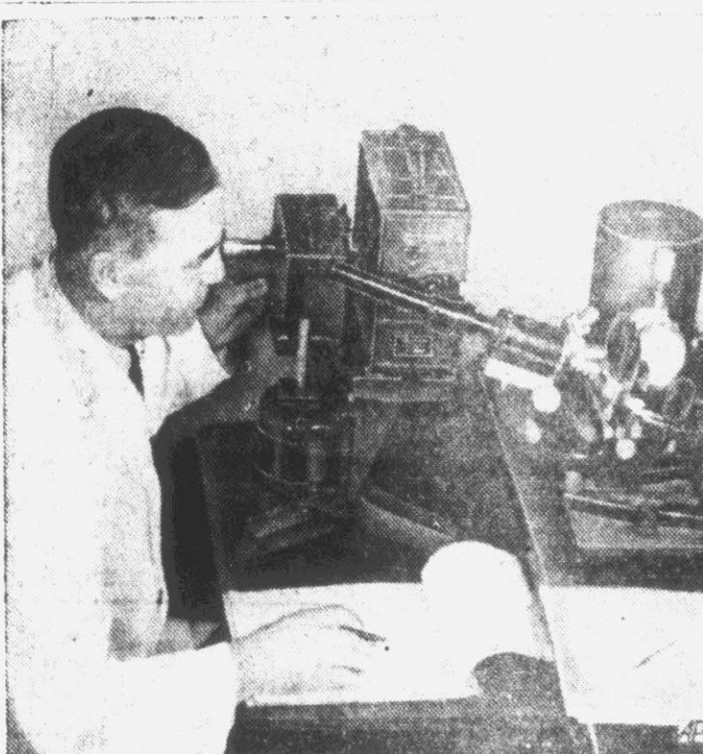

South East's new "Miss North Carolina" will be the first DC-3 to be put into feeder line service in the United States. The plane is a converted C-47, purchased from the Army and reconverted for regular civilian passenger service. It has been in the process of reconversion at Douglas Airport since March 1, and when completed will be flown by South East's eight trained pilots, all of whom served airlines prior to the war and served the war effort in various ferry and fighting commands.

South East began intra-state operations in North Carolina, linking Asheville and Hendersonville with Wilmington and other cities in the Piedmont district, in August 1945. In addition to the new DC-3, South East Airlines also operates several Cessna planes on regularly scheduled service.

Simultaneously with the announcement of the preview flight, W. C. Teague, president of South East, announced the extension of South East's service to five additional North Carolina cities—Lumberton, Greenville, Wilson, Washington, and New Bern.

Already served are Charlotte, Salisbury, Greensboro, High Point, Winston-Salem, Raleigh, Durham, Goldsboro, Wilmington, Fayetteville, Gastonia, Asheville, and Hendersonville.

Greek Regent Turns In His Resignation

Athens, April 5.—(AP)—Usually reliable sources reported today that Regent Archbishop Damaskinos had submitted his resignation to Panagiotis Poulitzas, who was sworn in last night at Greece's new premier. There was no immediate confirmation.

Damaskinos had indicated a desire to resign last November, but was persuaded to continue in office at least until after the general elections, which were held on March 31.

The government was reported to have recommended to King George II that he decline to accept the Regent's resignation at the present time.

Raleigh, April 5.—(AP)—Bids have been asked by the State Highway and Public Works Commission for 58 highway projects which are expected to exceed \$5,000,000 in costs—a record-breaking figure.

Included in the projects for which bids have been asked are the surfacing of 184 miles of county or secondary roads, the general improvement of 67 miles of "primary" roads and the resurfacing of 33.7 miles of primary highway.

Belgrade, April 5.—(AP)—Yugoslavia refused today a United States request to allow American officers to testify at the forthcoming trial of Gen. Draja Mihailovic, recently captured Chetnik chieftain who was among the first resistance leaders in Europe.

Belgrade newspapers devoted almost their entire first pages to publication of the U. S. note and the Yugoslav refusal. The lengthy Yugoslav answer began with a refusal and ended with the assertion that the trial justice will be done at the trial.

MONEY MEASURES A LOT OF THINGS.

Someone wrote a book a few years ago entitled, "Money the Acid Test." It was a book on the Christian use of money. The title was an apt one. The words "acid test" suggest a lot of things about the nature of money, in addition to its being used as a medium of exchange.

For instance, we can usually arrive at a pretty accurate estimate of a man's character by observing the way he conducts himself in a money deal. Also we can gauge the real interest people have in good causes by contributions they make to support them. This is why Jesus uttered so many parables on the subject of money. Watch the way a man reacts to situations in which profit and loss are involved, and we can be quite sure the kind of man he is on the inside of his heart.

There are a lot of people whose idea of friendship is handslapping and gadding about to parties. There are others for whom friendship is a matter of gushing sentiment. The true worth of all friendship is revealed when the bottom drops out of the stock market, or when the mortgage on the house is about to be foreclosed, or when an estate is being settled. The way people behave toward their alleged friends when these friends are in trouble, or toward their relatives when the patrimony is being divided constitutes an acid test of character.

Money measures a lot of things, including the character of the people who handle it.

WASHINGTON DAYBOOK

By EARL L. DOUGLAS

Washington—Late last summer, I made an effort to analyze rather thoroughly the streamlining of Congress under consideration by the joint La Follette-McCarran committee.

Recently the committee, after nearly a year of study and hearing everybody from cabinet members, Senators and Representatives down to the crackpots who invariably show up at all important committee hearings, made its report.

Acting on the assumption that everything can't be done at once, the joint committee dodged a few of the more highly controversial issues, but did recommend some drastic changes in the organizational operations of Congress.

Chief among these was the whitening down of standing committees, in which most of our laws are written. The committee would cut House committees from 48 to 13, the Senate's from 23 to 16.

What will happen to the La Follette-McCarran recommendations? Practically nothing. Victim of the very system they seek to correct, most of the recommendations will be ground up and lost in creaky congressional machinery.

Sen. Robert M. La Follette (former Progressive, now Republican of Wisconsin) has been fighting for Congressional reforms for years. Rep. A. S. "Mike" McCarran, Oklahoma Democrat, introduced bills several times for some of the important reorganizations suggested. What has happened? Nothing much. A little dodging and ditching. Congress has worked up its "excess" accounts and provided for a little more committee help. Neither Sen. La Follette nor Rep. McCarran had anything to do with these recommendations.

Congress is interested now on both sides of the Capitol in one of the committee's recommendations—reducing the wages of its now \$10,000-a-year members. Almost every man from President Truman to private industry and union labor has urged that Congress vote itself some raise. If it weren't for the money election, this probably could have been done this session. The same may be said for pensions for members of Congress. This was voted once but repealed when voters started gagging about

that members of Congress would have paid part of their own way to pensions, just as civil service employees do, didn't make any difference.

The move to get better staffs for committees and members already has made some strides. Perhaps another generation can reduce the cumbersome, overlapping committees, force reorganization of the present groups, eliminate duplicate committees, and do a better job of the job. This is why Jesus uttered so many parables on the subject of money. 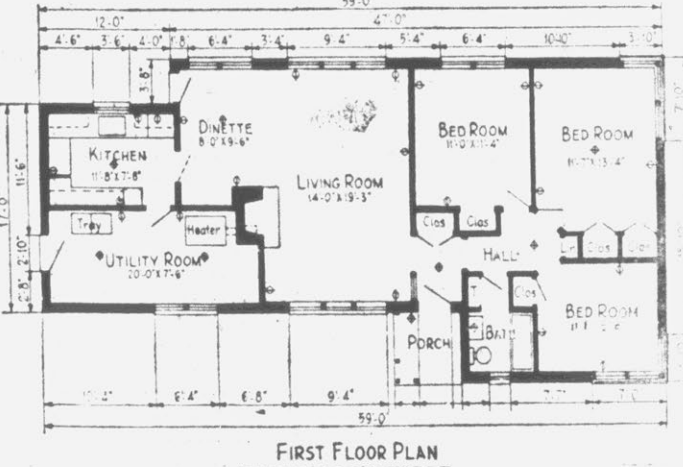

Unexpected Costs
In State Council

Raleigh, April 5 — (AP) — The Council of State had to dig up approximately a quarter of a million dollars yesterday for unexpected expenses.

Biggest item for which the Council went to the Emergency and Contingency Fund was \$216,392 to cover excessive costs in the construction of a new five-story wing to the Revenue Building. An appropriation set up by the General Assembly before the war lacked that much of meeting the amount of a contract awarded recently. Work has started on the addition.

Other items:

- \$1,300 to cover excessive costs of operation of the governor's office.
- \$2,100 to pay the increase in Lieut.-Gov. L. Y. Ballentine's salary, which the 1945 General Assembly authorized but did not finance.
- \$5,000 for installation of a new elevator at the North Carolina Sanatorium.
- \$11,920 to pay salary (\$10,000) and office expense of Dr. David M. Young, state superintendent of mental hygiene. The last legislature created the office, but appropriated no funds for it.
- \$11,422 for pensions of school teachers 65 years of age on March 10, 1943.

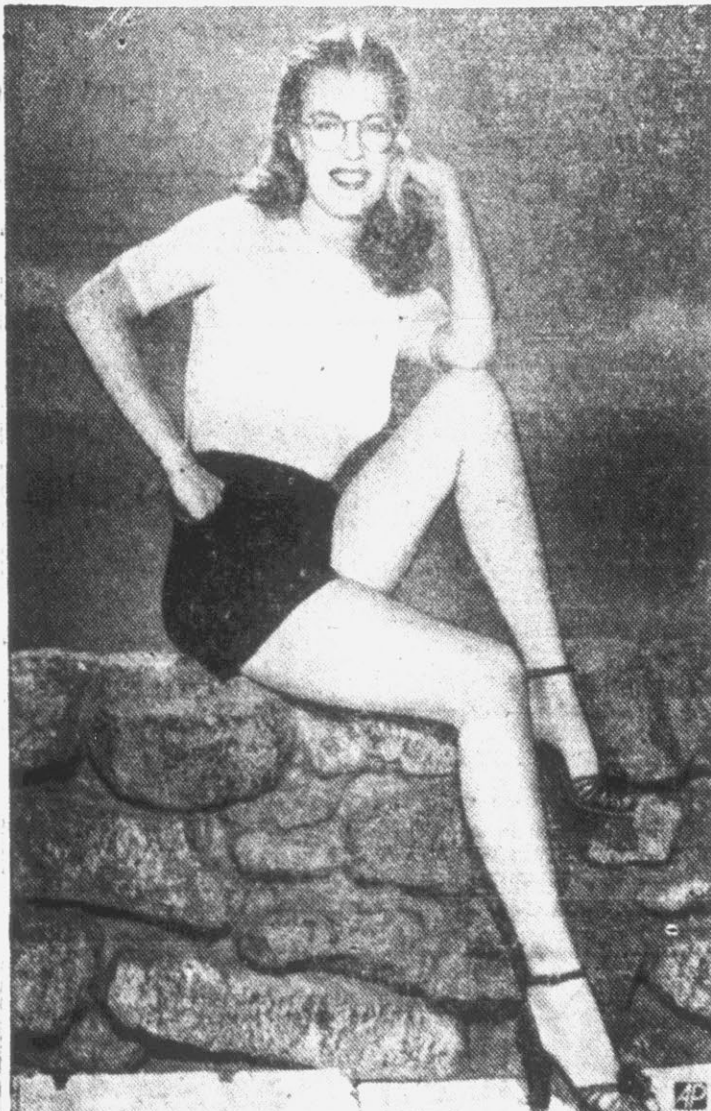

PLAN PARADES ON ARMY DAY

Estimated 100,000 Troops To March In Over A Dozen Cities

Washington, April 5—(AP)—An estimated 100,000 troops moved to more than a dozen cities today for the first Army Day parades since Pearl Harbor.

President Truman's address at Soldiers' Field after a parade of some 14,000 infantrymen and other troops in Chicago, tops tomorrow's program. Other major demonstrations of military might will be given here at San Francisco, San Antonio, Tex., and New York.

"Open house" will be held at all army posts.

President Truman will broadcast at 4 p. m. (EST) after Secretary of War Patterson and General Eisenhower, chief of staff, have spoken. In New York, more than 20,000 soldiers, sailors, Marines, including 2,300 cadets from West Point, will swing along Fifth Avenue in review before Mayor William O'Dwyer and Gen. Omar Bradley, veterans' administrator.

Other Army Day parades are to be held at Gadsden, Ala., Little Rock, Ark., Monterey and Silius Calif., Columbus, Ga., Wichita and Parsons, Kansas, Fort Knox, Ky., New Orleans, Kansas City, Lawton, Okla., and at El Paso, Houston, Wash., Austin and San Angelo, Tex.

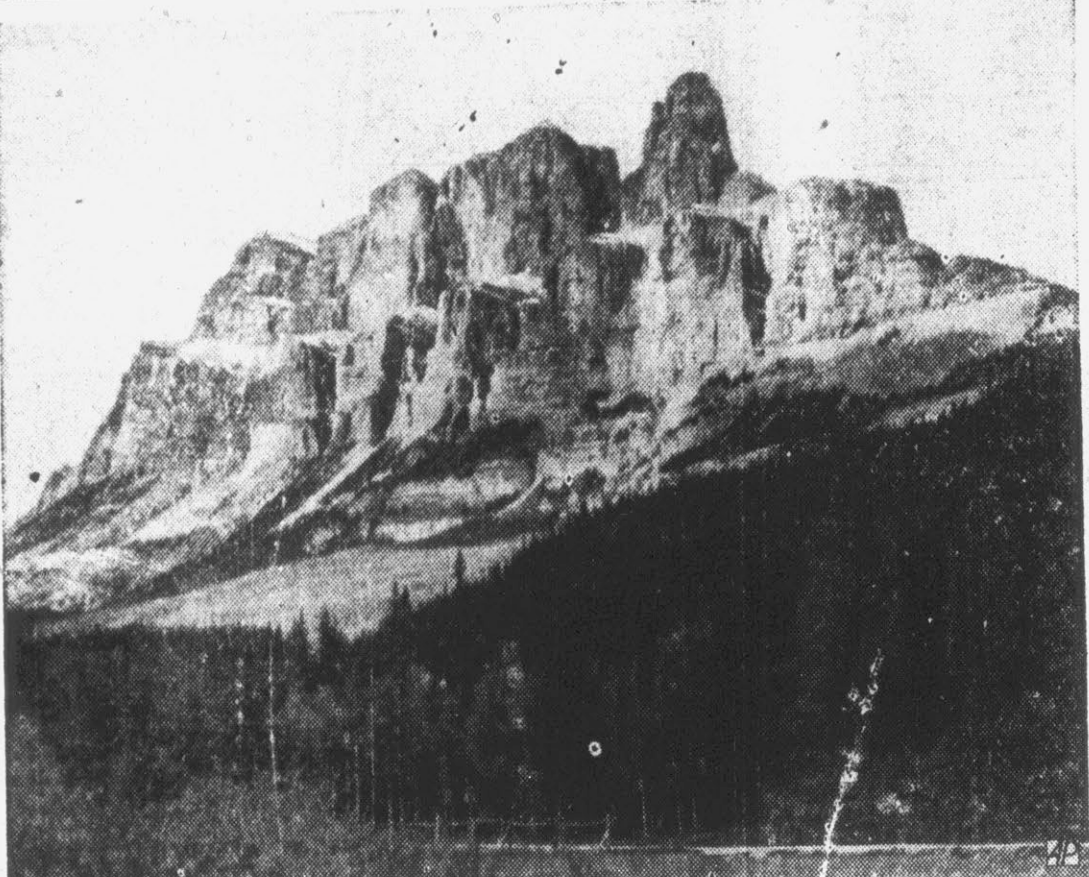

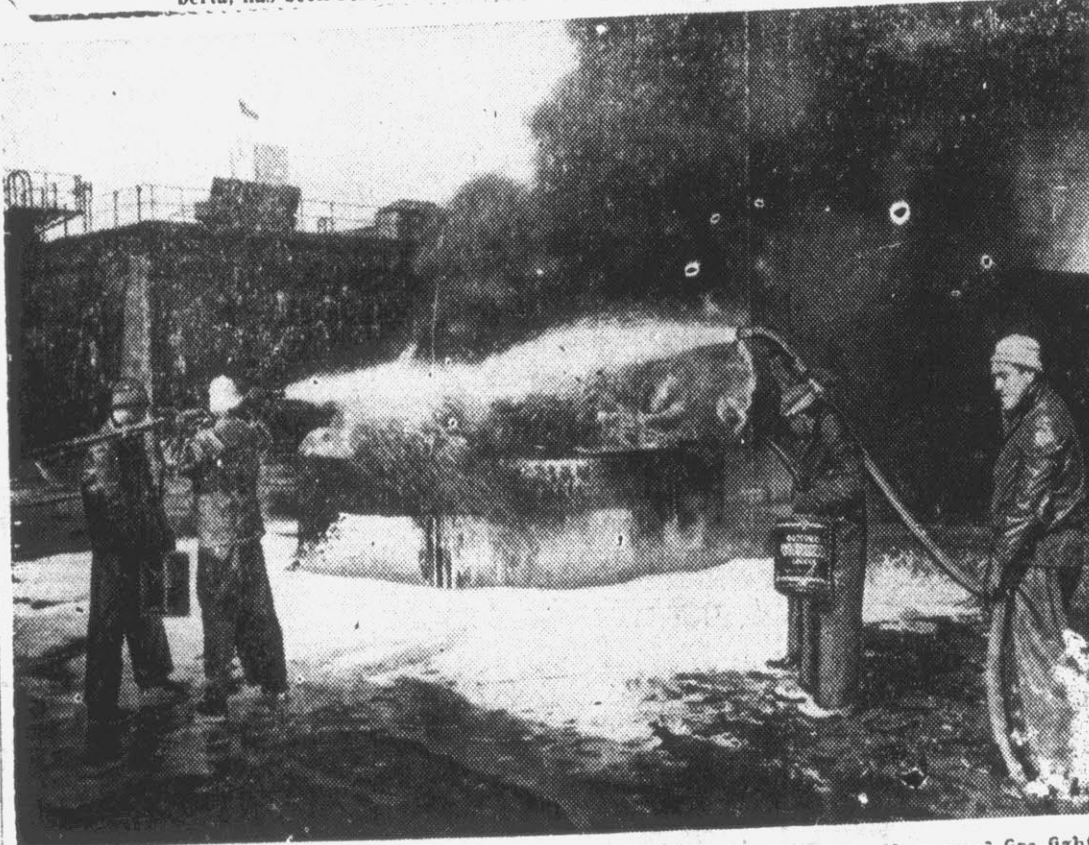
Delegates generally expressed belief in line with their public statements to the Security Council yesterday that a satisfactory settlement had been made on the Iranian case when the council accepted Russia's promise to withdraw her troops by early May. A safeguard provision was included, however, that the council may ask for a report on May 6. Meanwhile, if anything goes wrong, the case can be reopened on an emergency basis.

Removal of the Soviet forces will end the condition which Iran has contended made it impossible for her to grant an oil concession. Under Iranian law no such grant is supposed to be made while foreign forces are on Iranian soil.

The privately expressed hope of American officials is that whatever concessions are granted will be in line with normal commercial

arrangements without in any way involving special political privileges for the Soviet Union. On the whole, however, the American attitude is one of hands off the oil issue so long as it does not develop Russian demands which might give Iran new reason to appeal to the United Nations Security Council for help.

In addition to future negotiations over oil there are at least two other factors in the Iranian situation which are a cause of continuing concern here. One is the fact that during the Russian occupation dissident elements set up a self-proclaimed autonomous republic in the province of Azerbaijan.

their consumption of bread stuffs and fats, Hoover declared. The honorary chairman of President Truman's famine emergency committee said his inspection of European areas had disclosed that suffering from lack of proper diet was greatest among children and adults in urban areas.

He estimated that 5,000,000 tons of cereals in the month before harvest and additional shipments of fats were needed in Europe to avert "disaster."

Declaring that infant mortality exceeding 20 per cent a year "is an indication of slow famine," Hoover asserted that rehabilitation of children "cannot be postponed until some other day."

"The world cannot hate children, even of the enemy," he said. "Our children must live in the same world with them."

Hoover estimated that 20,000,000 children from the Russian frontier to the English Channel "are not only badly undernourished but are steadily developing tuberculosis, rickets, anemia and other diseases of subnormal feeding."

estimated that on the basis of an average \$2,000 annual salary, the government would have to discharge 200,000 employees between now and July 1 to finance the pay boost.

Supporters of the Dirksen proposal counted on the employe-firing angle making an attractive appeal in the Senate, where lawmakers have long been criticizing the number on the government payroll.

The \$400 raise would apply to all civil service employes earning less than \$10,000 (except those who would have to be fired), including those in the executive, legislative and judicial departments. It would not affect workers whose pay is set by wage boards, such as Navy Yard workers. Nor would it affect the salaries of congressmen, federal judges or postal workers.

The United Nations must surely fall, he said, unless nations renounce their sovereign right to wage war; and the U. N. international police force will be "at best but a temporary expedient." The alternative: "A totally destructive war."

and the Norfolk, Baltimore and Carolina Steamship Line will resume freight service to this city.

In 1938 the government appropriated \$325,000 to dredge the Tar River to a depth of 12 feet from here to Pamlico River at Washington, N. C., and thus connect the stream with the inland waterways now serving the eastern seaboard of the United States.

The port was opened for operation in the fall of 1940 and handled approximately 1,000 tons of freight per week, from the opening of the port until the spring of 1942, when the need of freighters for government service necessitated the discontinuance of this service for the duration of the war.

The government is now beginning to return to private ownership the freighters used for war service.

It is expected that water transportation will be resumed by August first.

of 2,045,001 francs (about \$17,000) to the families of Petiot's victims. The awards ranged from one franc to 800,000.

The 55-year-old, swarthy physician, in whose home police found the remains of a number of expertly dismembered bodies, had maintained he was a leader of the resistance movement and that all of those killed were collaborators and Gestapo decoys.

The prosecution charged that he operated a murder for profit scheme, collecting money from at least 27 victims whom he promised to smuggle out of Nazi-occupied France.

Defense Attorney Rene Floriot's six-hour plea to the jury was applauded even by the victim's families and was described by the press as the greatest defense summation in French criminal history. "To be sure, the defendant was not normal in the sense of people like us," Floriot cried. "He im-

chikov of Russia, he said.

The communique said complete agreement was reached on all questions and provided:

1. Red army troops to evacuate Iranian territory within one and a half months from March 24.

2. Formation of a joint Iranian-Soviet Oil Company, exact terms to be submitted to parliament within seven months after March 24.

3. The Azerbaijan problem to be recognized as a purely internal affair of Iran's.

The agreement was the result of negotiations which Qavam began on his recent visit to Moscow and which Iranian Propaganda Minister Prince Mozaffar Firooz said yesterday were continuing in Tehran.

Firooz emphasized that the negotiations were entirely independent of the question of the withdrawal of Russian military forces from Iranian soil, which he said was proceeding satisfactorily.

Under the Iranian constitution the government was forbidden to take up the matter of oil concessions with Russia as long as her troops remained in Iran.

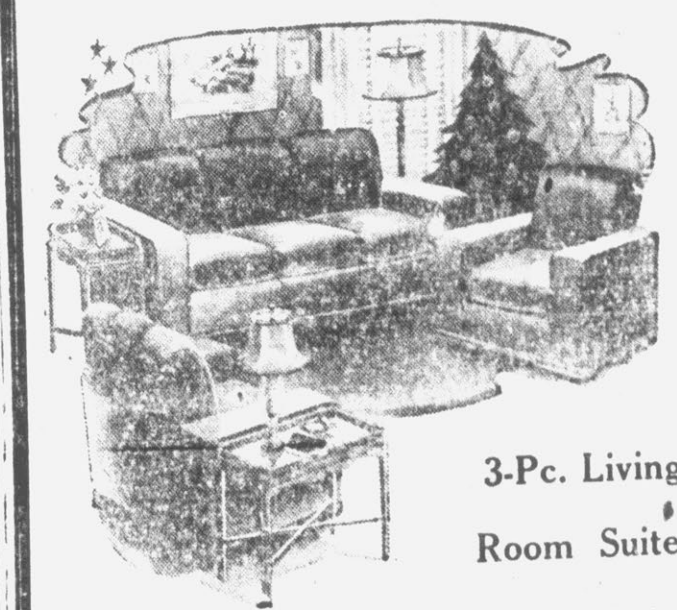

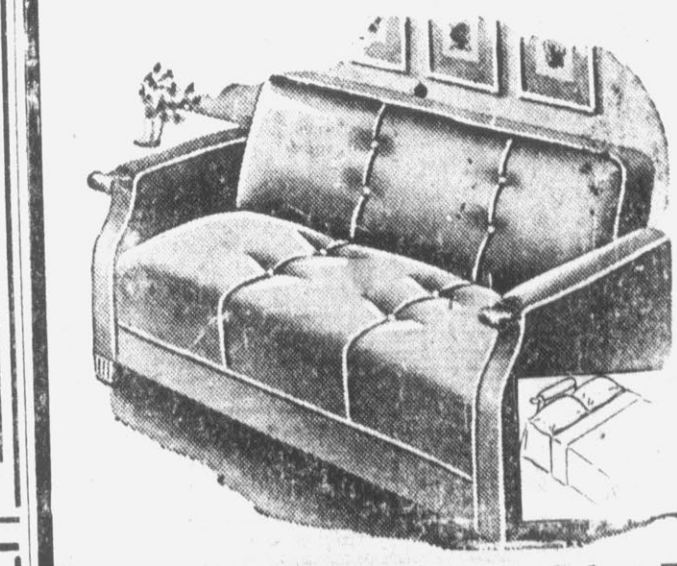
