NO VISION

We read in the Book of Proverbs (29:18) that where there is no vision, the people cast off restraint. The word "vision" is the translation of a Hebrew word closely related to the word "prophecy," or the setting forth of divine truth. So the statement is, therefore, that where there is no setting forth of divine truth, the people cast off restraint.

The present-day increase in crime is alarming to all thoughtful people. Juvenile delinquency, acts of violence, sexual immorality, and divorce are appalling realities which shake the foundations of our society. Workers, and ministers are becoming gravely anxious.

After the causes have been examined, the lack of religious faith is found to be the greatest cause of crime and wrongdoing. The overwhelming majority of moral evils occurs among groups of people who are untouched by the Church. In these modern times we are becoming increasingly aware of the soundness of the ancient dictum that where there is no setting forth of divine truth the people cast off restraint.

Certainly the cure can be stated simply and briefly: More devotion to Church more religious training in the home better Sunday Schools, more serious use of Sunday as a religious day, and more effective Bible preaching.

formulas demands that all depreciation charges, in excess of the cost of replacements and statutory dividends, shall be deducted from the appraisal price when and if the property is taken over by the public. This means that the public is already engaged in buying these properties on the installment plan!

The Commission claims that "a utility has only three legitimate charges: (1) Operating expenses, including taxes and interest on the debt; (2) depreciation, which the Commission recognizes only as a "reimbursement for facilities actually withdrawn from service and only enough to make good any actual waste of capital; and (3) dividends equivalent to an accepted allowable rate of interest on the "net property value" which words immediately bring up many conflicting views.

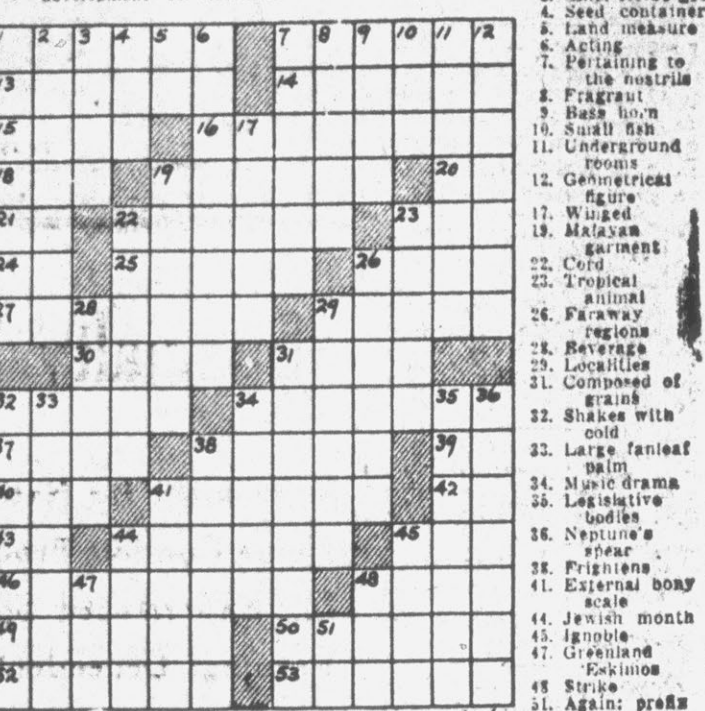
Rate Comparisons
The Federal Power Commission can show the public that rates for electricity can be very much less under public control. This, of course, is impossible to believe, so the fact is that the government can borrow money much more cheaply than a private utility; also the fact that a public owned utility need pay no federal income taxes. As these amount to over 30 per cent, it can be seen that they are a great factor. Of course this merely means that the government must collect this money from other taxpayers if the utilities are exempt from taxation. But this point is not pedaled by those who advocate public ownership.

An OPA official estimated that the revision of the cost absorption program, if finally made law, would boost automobile costs to consumers in the next 12 months by \$300,000,000. OPA has cut the retailer discount on automobiles to 18.5 percent. If the amendment remains in the bill the discount would be required to restore the discount to the prewar 24 percent level.

Other business transacted at the meeting included hearing petitions for curbing and gutters; a fire hydrant near the theater on Albemarle Avenue; an extra electric light between the bus station and Pitt street; hearing of committee and department head reports and paying of current bills.

The Renfrew Printing Company was given the contract to print booklets containing the re-codified city ordinances, 150 pages, for \$26.10. If the booklet makes more than 150 pages the price will be in proportion.

A report of the Police Court showed that the municipal tribunal had collected during 10 months \$12,913.65. The board authorized the employment of three additional policemen.

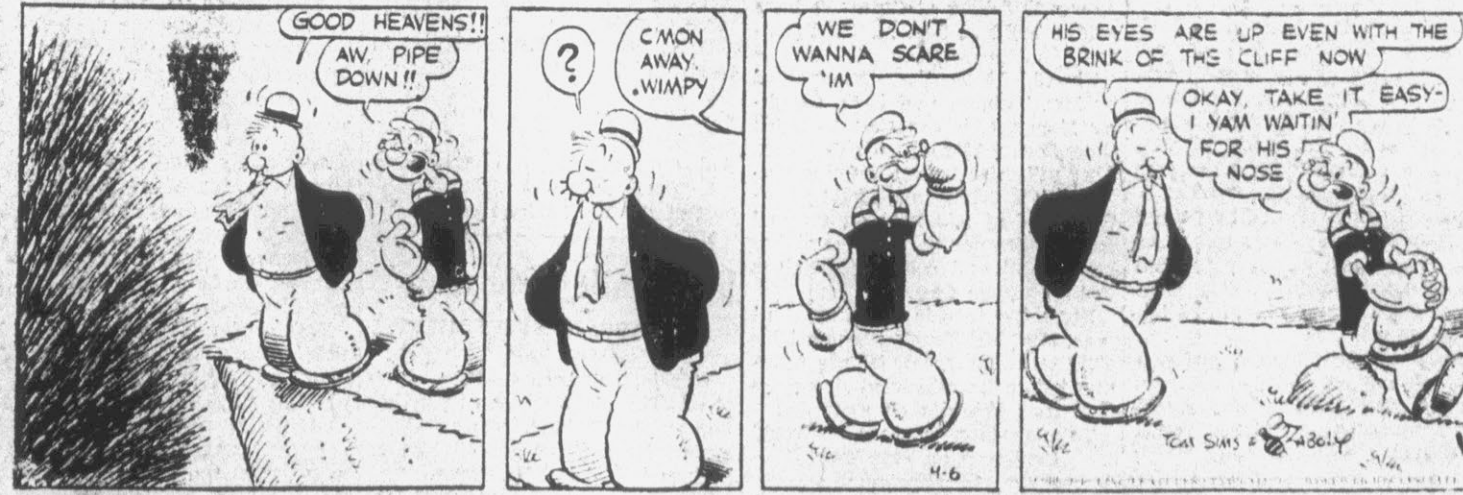

Senate Members Work Overtime

Washington, April 6 — (AP) — Majority Leader Barkley (D-Ky.) called senators back for an unusual Saturday session today with a warning that the six-day week may be a routine until a logjam of legislation is broken.

Normally the lawmakers take Saturday off but the Senate chief clerk set three objectives for them today:

First, approve and send to the White House a Senate-House compromise on legislation intended to curb the power of James C. Pettilio, head of the Musicians Union, over radio broadcasting.

Second, pass and send to the House legislation repealing the wartime federal soldiers' ballot law.

Third, clear the decks for speedy Senate action on the emergency veterans housing legislation calling for 2,600,000 homes in the next two years.

WELL IN HAND
Kansas City, April 6 — (AP) — Assistance was needed by a tipsy sailor at a downtown street intersection and he got it in very short order.

Continued from Page One) the commission would control the dissemination of scientific, technical and military information. It would draw up regulations on how this information was to be passed out and to whom.

"Willful" violation of its security regulations would be punishable by fines ranging from \$5,000 to a maximum of \$20,000 and 20 years in jail.

But Senate committee members pointed out that the commission would have to make semi-annual reports to Congress and go there for money to continue its activities.
