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Poland Asks UN Action On Spain

**Polish Delegate As-
serts Franco Has Al-
ready Threatened
World Peace And
That Spain Is A
Haven For Nazi
Agents, Assets And
Scientists "Devising
New Methods Of
Warfare"**

New York, April 10.—(AP)—Poland asked the United Nations Security Council today to take action against the Franco regime in Spain on the ground that it has already threatened world peace and is a haven for Nazis, their assets and German scientists devising new means of warfare.

The Polish appeal, filed by Ambassador Oscar Lange with Secretary General Trygve Lie, piled up another big political issue for the peace enforcement body even before it had struggled out from the weight of the Iranian case. The next round in the Iranian case will come at 3 p. m. Monday, a secret meeting of council members decided today, when Russia will urge and the United States and Britain oppose prompt dismissal of Iran's complaints against Russia.

Lange cited as evidence of the threat to peace and of the international friction which he said were caused by Franco's government the fact that on February 26, 1946, the Spanish-French frontier was closed and next day the Spanish regime ordered the concentration of troops at the border of France.

Moreover, he said, the Spanish government has given haven to Nazi assets and personnel and to war criminals and Nazi leaders, who continue their activities from Spain. Also, said Lange's letter, the Franco administration allows and promotes scientific research by German scientists engaged in devising new means of warfare.

Lange did not say exactly what the council ought to do about it but he urged adoption of such measures as are provided for in the charter.

He took sharp issue with the official American position, as stated in State Department notes or Spain, that the situation revolving around Franco is an internal one. He sought to show that the United Nations Charter bolstered his position.

Franco, Lange argued, is a concern of all the United Nations. He said that Article 2, paragraph 6, says the United Nations should see (Continued on Page Four)

Immigrants Work To Rebuild Town

Charlotte, April 10.—(AP)—A fund of \$75,000 is being sought by Greeks of the Carolinas and Virginia to rebuild the village of Arhava, their former home which was burned by evacuating Germans March 25, 1945.

Former residents of Arhava now live in Gastonia, Charlotte, Greenville, Salisbury, Henderson and Kannapolis, North Carolina; Greenville, Anderson, Greenwood, Columbia, Chester and Rock Hill, South Carolina; and Lynchburg, Va. Other colonies of one-time Arhava residents are in New York, Chicago, Boston and Toronto, Canada.

LEWIS WALKS OUT ON COAL NEGOTIATIONS

**Declines To Discuss
Wages Until Oper-
ators Agree To Wel-
fare Fund**

Washington, April 10.—(AP)—John L. Lewis and a United Mine Workers committee walked out on wage negotiations with soft coal operators today and threatened to stay out until the producers agree to discuss a welfare fund and improved safety conditions.

The UMW president has put the fund and safety conditions at the top of the nine demands he has made in negotiations on a new contract to end the 10-day-old shut-down in the soft coal pits.

K. C. Adams, editor of the United Mine Workers Journal and union spokesman, told newsmen the UMW delegation found it "useless and hopeless" to continue negotiations under present conditions.

There was no immediate comment from the operators, who stayed temporarily behind in the conference room.

Adams added in a statement that the operators had blocked the miners' attempt to report disagreement to the full joint conference. The statement continued:

"Whereupon the miners, seeing the situation useless and hopeless and that the operators would not discuss any thing in a serious vein on the health and welfare and safety proposals, withdrew from the meeting until such time as the operators show evidence they are willing to meet and discuss these things, which are just as important as wages and hours. We are not going to let them bypass them."

BRITISH LOAN FACES SENATE

**Senate Banking Com-
mittee Votes Appro-
val; Passage Is Ex-
pected**

Washington, April 10.—(AP)—The Senate Banking Committee voted 14 to 5 today to send the proposed \$3,750,000,000 British loan to the floor for debate.

The action was announced by Senator Barkley (D-Ky.) after a closed meeting. Barkley predicted the Senate would pass the proposed credit "by a substantial majority."

He said that the bill would be called up for action the first of next week.

Members said these proposals were rejected by the committee: By Senator Taft (R-Ohio) to give Great Britain \$1,250,000,000 outright provided the money be spent in (Continued on Page Four)

The NATION TODAY

Washington, April 10.—(AP)—Take it easy with your automobile and—if you don't have a car—look out for cars.

Cars are killing people at a startling rate. It's so startling that President Truman has called a national conference to halt it.

The worst year in history for auto deaths was 1941. The score in that pre-war year: 40,000 Americans killed.

What will it be in 1946? At the present rate, the National Safety Council estimates, 38,000 will be killed this year.

In January and February, a total of 5,450 were killed, or more than 45 percent above the number killed in the same months in 1945.

At that rate, the council estimates, another 5,450 or so will have been killed in March and April.

And the injured in those four months? The council's estimate is 370,000.

Why the sudden spurt of death on the streets and highways? People have gasoline, new cars are

coming and they don't mind tearing around in their old ones.

The wartime controls, which called for slower driving and careful use of automobiles, are gone.

But the fatalities so far this year occurred in cold months when far less cars were in use than will hit the highways now with warm weather here.

As early as last December, seeing the rising death rate, President Truman took steps to save lives by the time arm weather driving started.

He said then he wanted a conference—it's called the President's Highway Safety Conference—here in Washington May 8, 9 and 10.

He named Philip B. Fleming, who is Federal Works Administrator and this boss of the Public Roads Administration, to be conference chairman.

Governors of all the states have been invited to attend the conference as heads of their state delegations.

House Calls For Quick Action To Keep Draft

**House Sets Quick Action On Bill To Keep
Draft Alive For Nine Months With No
Halt To Inductions; Senate Delays**

Washington, April 10.—(AP)—The House leadership signaled today for double-quick action on a bill for straightaway continuation of the draft until Feb. 15, 1947.

Almost as soon as the House military committee decided in favor of this nine-month extension, the measure was given a preferred place on the chamber's calendar, with debate scheduled for Friday and Saturday and a vote hoped for before the weekend recess.

The present law is due to expire exactly five weeks from today—May 15, and that space leaves Congress with comparatively scant elbow room should legislative tangles develop between House and Senate over details of the measure to be enacted.

Indications were that the bitter battle which preceded the committee's 15 to 8 extension recommendation late yesterday would be renewed on the House floor.

Both supporters of continuing Selective Service viewed with comfort the fact that the House vote, when it comes, probably will be a roll-call and on the sole issue of extension. Many members, they believe, are fearful of voting on the record in an election year against a proposal which army and administration have backed so strongly.

Some committee members had sought legislation extending the draft law for a year but suspending inductions for as long as six months. Had the committee recommended such a plan, the House might have avoided an actual roll-call on a straightaway extension as advocated (Continued on Page Four)

While the House committee cleared its decks of draft legislation, the Senate military committee put off until tomorrow its showdown on extension. There were strong indications, however, that the Senate group would go along with the House bill or something close to it.

TODAY IN CONGRESS

A Review Of Your Government In Action

Washington, April 10.—(AP)—Legislation to provide a \$3,750,000,000 loan for Britain was recommended to the Senate today by its Banking Committee by a 14 to 5 vote.

Majority Leader Barkley (D-Ky.) who handled the bill in the committee's hearings, said it would be called up in the Senate the first of next week and predicted that it would pass by a substantial majority. It has not been considered by the House.

As the Senate Agriculture Committee heard the American Meat Institute reiterate its contention that black markets in meat are costing housewives more than a billion dollars a year, an unofficial House committee of 69 members attacked Banking Committee amendments, written into legislation to extend OPA another year.

Rep. Forand (D-R.I.), chairman of the group, which says it was organized to protect the consumer, issued a statement which said in part:

"A price control bill with crippling amendments is, in a sense, worse than outright defeat of the bill since it can lull the people into a sense of false security. The amendments added in committee must be recognized as crippling amendments."

The House Military Committee received a recommendation from a subcommittee that pay of all personnel in the armed services be increased by \$400 annually, instead of by 20 percent, as asked by the army and navy. The full committee will be asked to vote on the matter this week, so the bill can be sent to the House before it be-

SPIKES TURNS DOWN E.C.T.C. PRESIDENCY

**Obligations To Bur-
lington Schools
Given As Reason for
Refusal**

The refusal of Dr. L. Everett Spikes, superintendent of the Burlington schools, to accept the presidency of East Carolina Teachers' College was officially presented to the Board of Trustees at a meeting at the college here this morning.

Dr. Spikes, who was not present at the meeting, in a letter addressed to Hugh Horton of Williamston chairman of a board sub-committee to select a president, expressed appreciation of the honor and confidence that the Board of Trustees had placed in him and gave as his reason for refusal of the presidency his obligation to the Burlington schools.

He said that, in order to carry out professional and building programs now in progress in Burlington, it was advisable for him to remain in his present position.

"Some will not understand this decision," he said. "Your official board may not. I do have a responsibility here, however, that takes priority at present."

Dr. Spikes denied that salary was a prime consideration in influencing his decision. "I would like," he said, "to correct one mistake that was projected by the newspapers from your meeting. Salary was not a prime consideration in the decision. I asked the school board here not to mention or discuss salary."

Copies of the letter addressed to Horton were sent also to Dr. Clyde A. Erwin, ex-officio chairman of the Board of College Trustees, and to Governor Cherry.

Dr. Erwin at the conclusion of today's meeting of the trustees announced that the committee appointed to select a president had been authorized to study the question further. Henry Belk of Goldsboro was appointed as an additional member of the group, and will serve with the present members, Hugh Horton of Williamston, chairman; F. C. Harding of Greenville, and Mrs. Charles M. Johnson of Raleigh (Continued on Page Six)

Prolonged Labor Dispute Settled

RATIONING OF FLOUR BEFORE GOVERNMENT

**Secretary Of Agricul-
ture Considers
Wheat Rationing By
Mills**

Washington, April 10.—(AP)—A flour rationing plan without coupon worries for housewives hung fire today as the government took another careful look into the wheat situation made tense by widespread hunger abroad.

Secretary of Agriculture Clinton P. Anderson said he expected to decide during the day whether to put into effect an order requiring millers to cut their sales of flour to bakers and retailers by 25 percent.

The cabinet officer disclosed to a news conference last night that he had ordered officials in his department to prepare such an order. Should it be issued, it would have the effect of rationing supplies of flour to bakers and retailers, but not to consumers.

Officials have explained that machinery for consumer rationing of these products could not be set in motion in time to help out during the current food crisis.

Anderson's decision may well hinge on a report scheduled to be issued by the department's fact crop reporting board at 3 p. m. EST today on stocks of wheat on farms April 1.

With commercial supplies at abnormally low levels, the government and millers must look to farm stocks for the bulk of all export and domestic requirements until the new crop starts moving to market in June.

Because there has been heavy feeding of wheat to livestock in areas unable to get corn, some of (Continued on Page Six)

**Thirty Thousand
Workers Of Interna-
tional Harvester
Company, Nation's
Biggest Farm Equip-
ment Manufacturers,
Make Peace With
Firm After 78 Day
Strike**

One of the country's major prolonged labor disputes, a strike by 30,000 CIO workers in plants of the International Harvester Company, the nation's biggest maker of farm equipment, was settled today.

Company and union officials, in conferences with labor department officials in Washington for the last 10 days seeking to end the work stoppage which started last Jan. 21, agreed on settlement terms today. An early ratification of the terms by the workers would enable them to return to their jobs in 11 plants and resume production of badly needed farm machinery.

Government officials hailed the settlement and expressed hope it would lead to agreements in labor disputes in other farm equipment plants. These included strikes by 7,500 workers at J. I. Case Company plants in Wisconsin, Illinois and Iowa, and by 1,000 employees of the Allis-Chalmers Company plant in Laporte, Ind.

Terms of the new agreement were not disclosed, but several weeks ago the company and union had agreed on an 18-cent hourly wage increase which had been recommended by a fact-finding board. The contract also provides a 10 percent general wage hike retroactive to last Oct. 1.

John W. Gibson, assistant Secretary of Labor, expressed pleasure over an arbitration clause in the new pact which he hoped would eliminate any unauthorized work stoppages; a liberalized vacation plan with three weeks annual leave for employees of 15 years service; and an allowance provision to compensate employees for loss of work due to equipment failures or other causes not their fault.

The company has five plants in Chicago and others in Rock Island, East Moline, and Rock Falls, Ill.; Auburn, N. Y.; Richmond, Ind.; and Bettendorf, Ia.

As the Harvester settlement was announced, hopes faded for an early end of the 10-weeks old strike of 10,000 employees at the American Brass Company in Waterbury Conn., as negotiations between union and management broke down.

The wage conference between company officials and representatives of the CIO Mine, Mill and Smelter Workers' Union collapsed said John J. Driscoll, State CIO Secretary, because of the company's refusal of a "firm" 18 1-2 cents (Continued on Page Six)

Atom's Commercial Use May Be Denied

**Co-Discoverer Of Plu-
tonium Says "Fore-
going Commercial
Use" Of Atomic
Energy Is Alterna-
tive To Effective
Controls**

Atlantic City, N. J., April 10.—(AP)—Dr. Glenn T. Seaborg, co-discoverer of plutonium, said today that unless effective international control of atomic energy was established "an alternative lies in foregoing the commercial use of this source of energy."

Asserting that such an alternative was "a solution which it seems aptly to be forced to accept," the University of Chicago scientist told the American Chemical Society in an address prepared for a symposium on nuclear energy.

"In my opinion, atomic energy will be used in industrial peacetime applications because of the advantages which it affords, and therefore it will be necessary to solve the problem of control politically on the international front. The solution probably lies in the development of an international control system based upon inspection to prevent the conversion of the material to illegal purposes."

One of a group of atomic scientists who yesterday released a statement in Washington declaring that "denaturing" of atomic materials cannot of itself eliminate the dangers of atomic warfare, Seaborg told the chemists:

"Although the State Department has recently revealed that there exists the possibility of 'denaturing' nuclear energy source isotopes so as to render them relatively unsuitable for use in atomic bombs without appreciably diminishing their efficiency for use in atomic energy machines, there is general agreement among scientists that such steps can only slow down the conversion from useful to destructive forms of this material."

In a report to the same symposium, Dr. Milton Burton of the Monsanto Chemical Co., who was associated with the Oak Ridge atomic project, said chemists may be able to change the properties of familiar solids at will as a result of techniques discovered in the atomic bomb development.

Under bombardment by fast neutrons, he said, certain solid materials—particularly the lighter elements—are so affected that some of their atoms become dislodged from their normal positions thus imparting entirely new properties to the material.

The French constituent assembly has made the sensational move of approving a bill for the suppression of prostitution in metropolitan France, thus striking a heavy blow at one of the forces most destructive to the moral fibre of chaotic Europe, for the old world is experiencing a plague of sexual immorality and its attendant disease which far exceeds anything it ever has known before.

Immorality is a by-product of every war, but the Hitlerian conflict differed from others in that the evil Nazi teachings encouraged it both at home and abroad. The Nazi Fuehrer taught German girls that it was a patriotic duty to the fatherland to have illegitimate children to provide more soldiers. And in some conquered countries the Nazis conducted a regular campaign of interbreeding, so as to introduce German blood.

Thus we find that large sections of the populations in many parts of Europe have abandoned restraint and that even young girls who have

not yet reached their teens have joined the ranks of the professional.

France is one of the first countries to take constructive action to deal with this evil. The move is all the more striking in that legalized houses of prostitution have been permitted since 1877 and there are now some 3,000 in operation, doing a business which runs into millions. Paris alone has 6,000 registered prostitutes, who have been responsible for increasing venereal disease.

The new law not only contemplates the closing of all houses of ill repute within six months, but campaigns against white slavery, and venereal disease are to be inaugurated. Measures also are to be taken for the reeducation and rehabilitation of prostitutes. In order to make a clean sweep the law provides heavy penalties for cafe and hotel proprietors who allow their premises to be used by prostitutes.

The crusade which has culminated in the new French law was begun last autumn by Madame Marthe (Continued on Page Four)

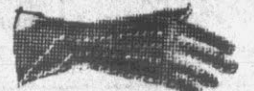

Our Farm Folks

Rural homemakers in Pitt county have been given a new slant on family life during this month. Several weeks ago Mrs. Virginia S. Swain, Extension Family Life Specialist of State College, spent two afternoons in the county training family life leaders. At the first leader school her topic was "What Makes a Good Home." Mrs. Swain opened the meeting with the poem, "The Home-maker," by Grace Noel Cromwell, as follows:

The woman who can move about the house,
Whether it be a mansion or a cabin,
And deftly lay a fire, and spread a cloth
And light a lamp
And by the magic of a quick touch
Give
The look of home, wherever she may be
Such a woman always will seem great
And beautiful to me.
What is it that changes a house
Into a home was an important question that was discussed. Mrs. Swain gave several family life illustrations which show that in a good home children feel:

1. That they are wanted and loved.
2. That they are worthwhile.
3. That parents are interested in their friends and fun.
4. That parents understand them.

The many factors which make a home were brought out in her talk. Her enthusiasm was caught by project leaders of the Home Demonstration Clubs. Family life meetings have been held in all the clubs by leaders this month. Mrs. W. R. Bullock leader of the Bethel Club, said at her meeting, "Love, fellowship, understanding and cooperation by every member of the family is necessary for a happy home." She ended her talk by giving a report of the community project in the Bethel family life program. She reported that the Family Life Council met at the school library on March 12 with Mrs. Virginia S. Swain and the home agents, Verona Lee Joyner and E. Ruth Bizzell, present. At this time it was decided that the Teen-Age Club needed more and better equipment. A list was made and the following organizations have given items on the list: Baptist and Methodist Missionary Societies, game tables; Parent Teachers Association, reading lamps; Book Club, books and magazines; Home Demonstration Club, games; Rotary Club has assumed leadership in preparing a tennis court and out-door fire place.

Mrs. Howard Barnhill held the meeting at Sweet Gum Grove Club. She presented plans for several projects and the club voted to take as a club project the "making and sending of kits for the sick." The second project was a community project—a church library.

Reports from the members of the Red Oak Club were that their family life meeting was one of the best meetings of the year. Mrs. Amos J. Evans, was the leader at this meeting and she said in opening, "There are many things that we can do to make our homes happier." She asked, "Are we as parents, setting a good example for our children?" Every club in the county has been asked to choose some worthwhile project. It was the consensus of opinion among the Red Oak women that in order to make their club house more useful and attractive to the young people in the neighborhood that they complete the kitchen, finish the walls, and add furniture that would make the club house more usable and attractive. Mrs. Evans suggested that the club have more planned "get-togethers" for the young people of the Red Oak community.

The March meeting of the Choc club proved to be an interesting one also. Mrs. W. F. Carroll was in charge of the program. The members at this time recognized the need for a recreation room for the teen-age of the school district. Mrs. Mildred B. Venters said, "The young people need some place to go for wholesome and clean recreation." Fine meetings were held in all

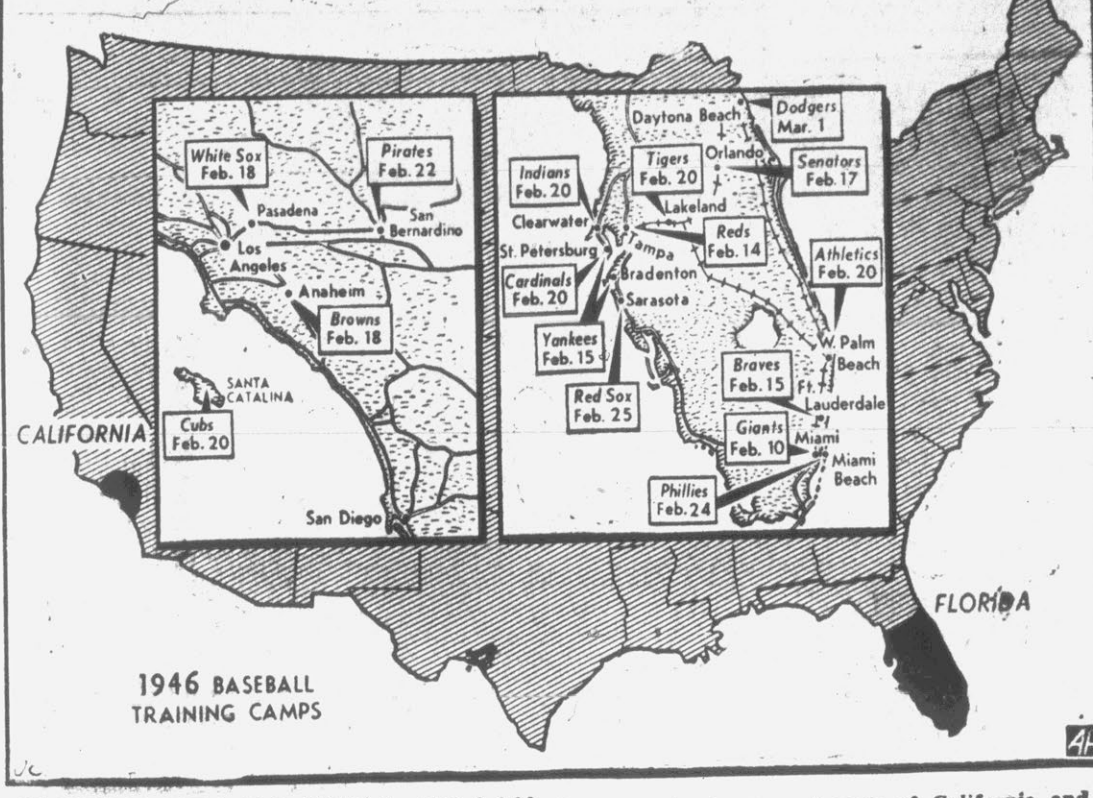

WASHINGTON DAYBOOK

Washington—This month the Veterans Administration, with the help of the Office of Education, is conducting a survey which may go a long way toward solving the critical problem of higher education for veterans under the GI Bill of Rights next fall.

Nearly 2,000 senior and junior colleges will be surveyed for educational and housing facilities for veterans.

The idea is to channel veterans seeking college education into these smaller schools. More than 40 percent of the veterans now getting higher education under the bill are attending 38 of the larger and better known colleges and universities. Many smaller schools have so few that they aren't even tabulated. Several larger universities are already so overcrowded that they have refused to take any more students until accommodations can be enlarged and facilities increased.

At the same time, the Veterans of Foreign Wars are opening a campaign to expand the nation's educational system through federal subsidies. Presumably a large portion of the funds would go to smaller colleges.

The "name" institutions, already crowded to overflowing, are looking forward with some distress to what will happen when the post-war flood ebbs. Caught with vastly increased facilities and enlarged staffs, they would face bankruptcy. Sixty to 80 students added to each of the 1,500 to 2,000 smaller colleges probably could take care of the additional veterans above normal enrollment next autumn, and even take some of the load off the big schools.

VFW points out that by the end of this year, 12,000,000 veterans will have been discharged. Certain it is that hundreds of thousands of these have become college-conscious.

The increasing number of unemployed veterans (now estimated at more than 1,000,000) is another factor. Many of these are bound to want to take education grants in the hope that they will lead to security.

The report of the VA survey of smaller colleges will be interesting if it ever is made public. The survey might show just how much of the higher education system has survived the war to carry on in the emergency ahead.

Speaking of higher education, Fleet Admiral Chester Nimitz has so many invitations to deliver commencement addresses that he can't fill them all. Nearly a dozen of them fall within date and geographical limitations that make only a few of them possible. The

Richards, a Paris municipal councillor who won fame as a spy in the first World War. On one occasion in discussing the houses of ill-fame in the French capital, Mme Richards said:

"These institutions, in which young women, most of them minors are treated as cheap merchandise are a horror for our city. I have told the council that in them girls are forced to receive 70 or 80 clients a day. I have seen such girls in hospitals, physically ruined, of course."

Mme Richards said last December that people who were interested in the operation of these houses had offered her 1,000,000 francs (about \$8,500 at the present depressed rate of the franc) if she would "drop

this whole business." But she refused to quit, and now has her reward in the new bill.

France has made a wise and timely move, but there are many other countries which will have to follow suit, and quickly, if Europe is to be saved from a lot worse than that with which she already is afflicted. The moral decay has struck deep. I myself have seen crowds of girls in their early teens soliciting on the streets of a great and normally up-right city of the war theatre. The older people of that city have been immeasurably shocked and worried—out they haven't known how to deal with the problem so long as the place was filled with soldiers.

Now France has given a lead. Of course you can't stop such immorality by legislation alone, for moral standards must be restored. Still France has made a brave beginning and set an excellent example to other countries.

sure as well, but Rep. Pace (D-Ga.) author of the proposal to include arm labor costs in computing parity prices, told newsmen he had decided against that strategy. He added it would not have general support if others make the move.

Looking ahead, the lawmakers saw a vote approaching on how long to extend the draft act. The House military committee decided yesterday on a straight-out nine-month continuance, and the bill promptly landed on a top calendar spot with debate set for Friday and Saturday.

The Senate military committee put off until tomorrow its decision on what to recommend in the way of an extension for the law which expires five weeks from today.

The long-in-writing army-navy unification bill also began its way through Congress but drew immediate comment from Senator Robert Taft (R-Ohio) that any plan to eliminate the traditional navy plan on the cabinet faces a stiff fight. Robertson is a member of the

Senate Naval Committee, which is expected soon to get a complete bill on the measure drawn by a military subcommittee calling for a single department of common defense.

to let that even non-member states act in accordance with the principles of the organization as far as they are necessary for the maintenance of international peace and security.

"The question in Spain," Lange said, "under the application of this principle is imperative."

Lange urged that February 9, this year in the London meeting, the United Nations General Assembly should have the Franco government removed from membership, sharply criticized its history and conduct and recommended that U. N. members take "no action into account in conducting their individual diplomatic relations with Spain."

"After then," Lange said, "a series of developments has made it clear that the activities of the Franco government have already endangered international peace and security."

Lange withheld filing of the Spanish case until today in order to make the Russian demand for dismissal of Iran's complaints priority. The Spanish debate this morning began until sometime next week, since the next public meeting is Monday.

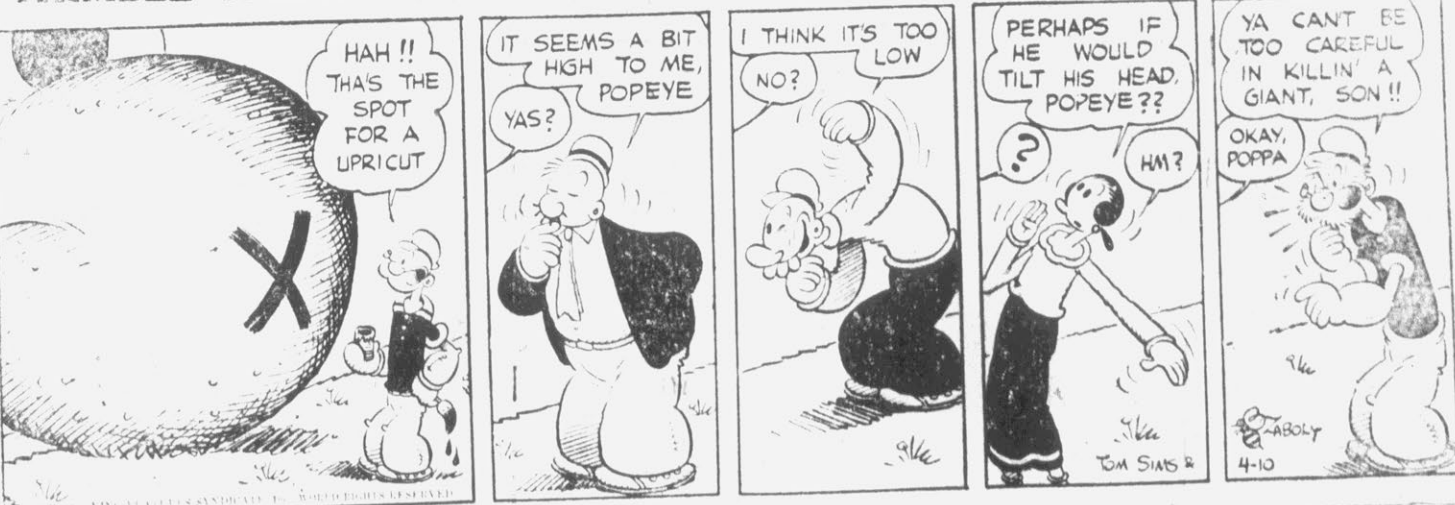

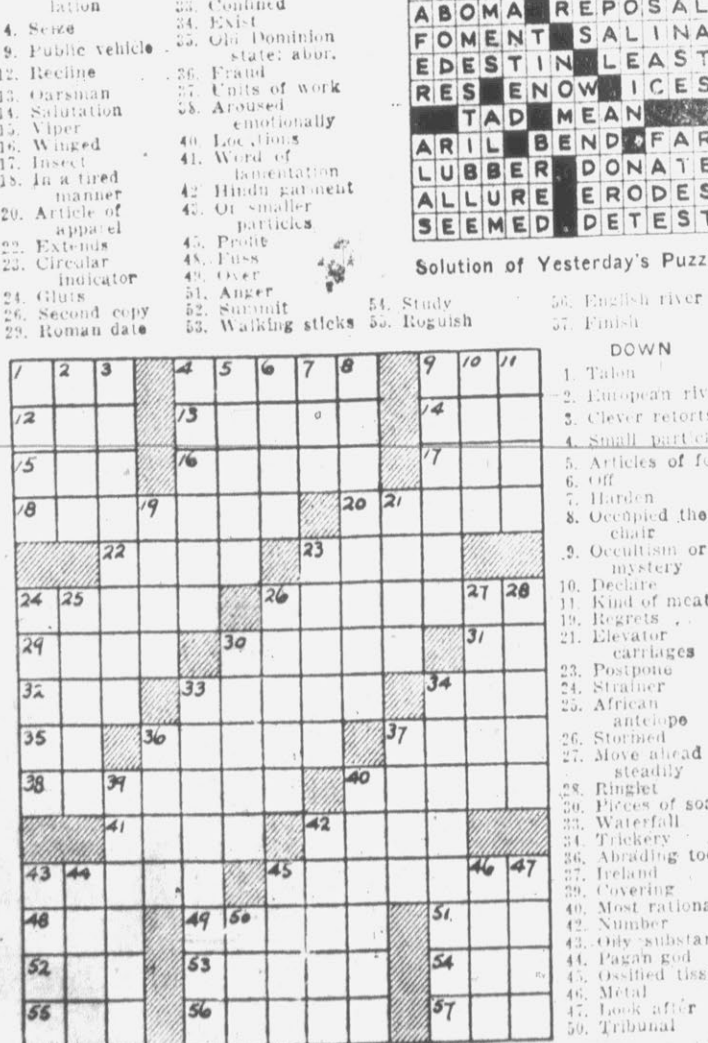

The schedule around the Tar Heel campuses today finds Washington, D. C. Marine Institute at Duke, N. C. State at Wake Forest and High Point at Catawba.

In South Carolina yesterday Newberry's Indians blanked the Wolford Terriers, 6-0, at Spartanburg, and Fort Jackson defeated Erskine, 11-3, at Fort Jackson, while at Athens, Ga., the University of Georgia walloped the University of South Carolina 19 to 3.

Montreal, April 10—(AP)—The Stanley cup emblematic of the world's professional hockey championship, again was in the possession of Montreal's fast-pitching Canadiens today following their clinching 6-3 victory over Boston's Bruins last night.

New York, April 10—(AP)—Owner Horace Stoneham of the New York Giants says he isn't interested in the "For Sale" sign that Brooklyn hung on Snor Mickey Owen but he is scouring the majors for more pitching and a utility infielder.

"We have the best catcher in baseball," said Stoneham who bought Walker Cooper from the St. Louis Cardinals for \$175,000 during the winter. "Despite all that talk about our trying to buy Owen at Columbus, we never were interested."

Peron Backers Win Congress Majority

Buenos Aires, April 10—(AP)—Col. Juan D. Peron, Argentina's president-elect, will have the largest congressional majority of any president in Argentine history, final tallies showed today, with 109 of 138 seats in the Chamber of Deputies and 26 of 30 Senate seats.

The opposition's 49 deputies number less than the one-third necessary to uphold a possible presidential veto.

Foreign Minister Juan I. Cooke, meanwhile, informed a press conference that Argentina felt it was up to the United States to withdraw charges that Argentina had not fulfilled her international commitments undertaken at the Mexico City Inter-American conference.

Azerbaijan Radio Goes On The Air

Tehran, April 10—(AP)—Radio Tabriz—the official voice of the self-proclaimed autonomous government of Azerbaijan province—began broadcasting last night for the first time, presenting the annual report of Premier Mir Sayyid Jafar Pishevari to Parliament.

The existence of broadcasting facilities in Tabriz previously had been unreported and the first announcements caught Tehran observers by surprise.

Pishevari's report, stating that the budget had been balanced for the coming year, said the cost of living had been cut by at least 40 per cent and that the annual income for the budget was estimated at more than 60,000,000 tomans (\$20,000,000).

The report, as monitored by the Associated Press, was believed by officials here to have been in the voice of Morad Ali Teymur Bayat Makou, member of an ancient Azerbaijani family, and minister of propaganda for the Pishevari regime.

Housewives Pay Huge Sum In Black Market

Washington, April 10—(AP)—The Senate Agriculture Committee was told today that meat black markets are levying tribute at a rate of over a billion dollars a year on housewives.

R. J. Eggert, associate marketing director of the American Meat Institute, said a checkup in Washington during the last week in March showed 90 per cent of the markets here selling one or more cuts at over-ceiling prices.

War Dept. Surveys Army Court System

Washington, April 10—(AP)—The War Department, aided by an American Bar Association advisory committee, tackled today a survey of military justice with a view to possible revision of the Army's court-martial system.

Following an initial meeting yesterday with Secretary of War Patterson, members of the group, headed by Dean Arthur D. Vanderbilt, of New York University Law School, started a study of miscellaneous recommendations already submitted to the Judge-Advocate General's office.

The group is concerned only with procedures, rather than individual cases.

Members of the advisory group include William T. Joyner, Raleigh, N. C., attorney.

Truce Team Held Up By Fighting

Chungking, April 10—(AP)—The truce-seeking committee of three emplaned today for Mukden via Peiping as the semi-official Central News Agency reported a school building housing pacification troops was burned in the Manchurian capital, Changchung.

Another Central News Agency dispatch, from Chungking, said Communists were making a large scale assault along the Peiping-Mukden Railroad. It reported the Reds were using artillery fire against a 40-mile stretch of the road west of Shanhaiwan. Four steel bridges were destroyed and traffic was moving only between Peiping and Shanhaiwan and between Mukden and Suichung, the dispatch said.

The committee, with substitutes replacing all three original members, will confer at truce headquarters in Peiping before flying to Mukden. Members are U. S. Lt. Gen. Alvan C. Gillem, Jr., substituting for General Marshall, who is expected to return to China soon from Washington; Communist Gen. Chen Chih-Chu for Gen. Chou En-Lai, and government Gen. Chin Teh-Chun for Gen. Chen Cheng who is ill.

Social Security

April is the month in which employer, engaged in business or industry, will file with the Collector of Internal Revenue, their Social Security tax returns for the first quarter of 1946. These reports must show the name, Social Security account number and amount of wages paid to each employee during the three-month period, January, February, and March. The employer's tax return is audited by the Bureau of Internal Revenue, and the Wage Information, contained therein, is then transmitted to the Social Security Board to be used in maintaining a wage record for each worker concerned.

Marshall H. Barney, manager of the Rocky Mount, N. C., office of the Social Security Board called attention to the fact that during recent months, industrial plants and business firms in this section have taken on new workers, some of whom have never before had Social Security account numbers. Many of these workers are approaching retirement age and some are already 65 years old or more. It is especially important that the name and Social Security account number of each of these older workers be shown on the quarterly wage report. Why? Because they may be leaving their jobs before long, and they should have credit for all wages earned in covered employment in order to insure full payment of their Old-Age Insurance benefits.

Other workers—young or old—may die, leaving dependents who are entitled to benefits under the Social Security Act; but unless employers for whom they have worked include their names, account numbers, and wage earnings in quarterly tax returns, as required by law, survivors may be deprived of benefits to which they are entitled.

"I myself am bound thither," replied the stranger; "and if I had a horse, I would be your guide."

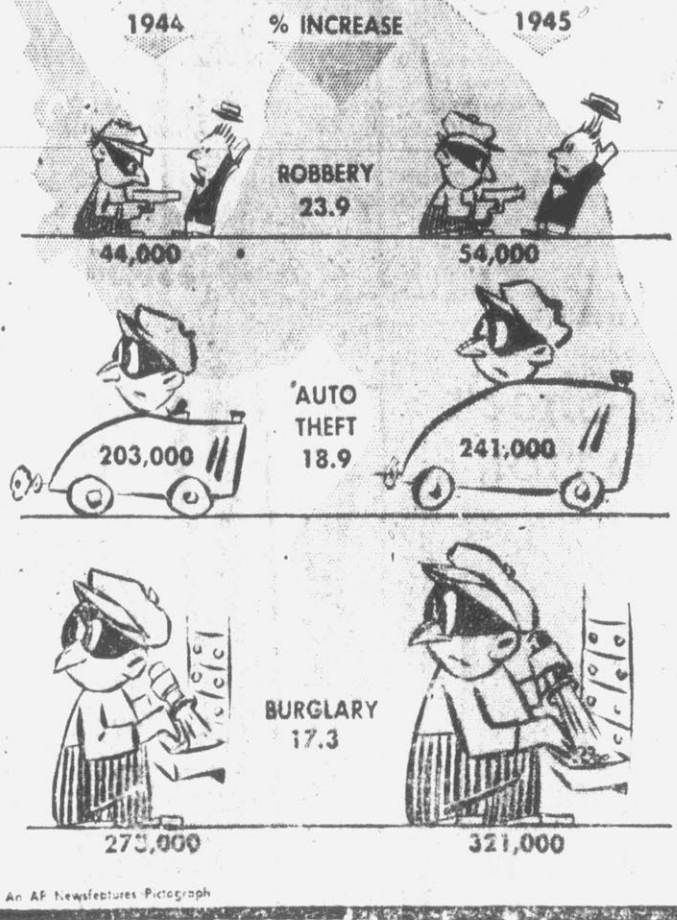
"Thou shalt have both thanks and reward, my friend," said the Prior.

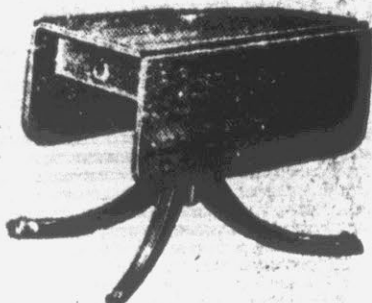

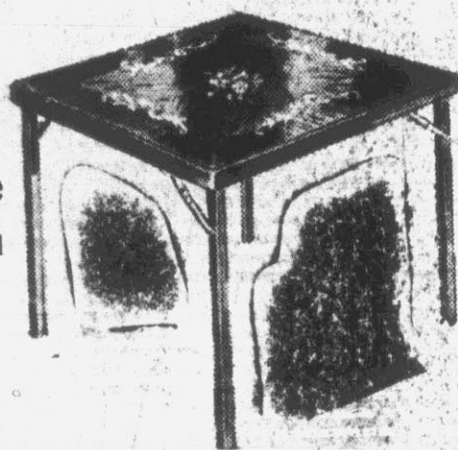

Lectured Here On Christian Science

Last night at the church edifice of Christian Science Society, Greenville, Anna E. Herzog, O.S.B., of Columbus, Ohio, presented a lecture entitled "Christian Science: The Teaching of True Realism." Mrs. Herzog, a member of the Board of Lectureship of the Mother Church, the First Church of Christ, Scientist, in Boston, was introduced by Miss Elizabeth Hyman, first reader for the local society.

The lecturer said: "Of late we have heard much about realism and idealism. The whole question of whether these are opposed beliefs, lies in our understanding of what reality is. Recently I said to a woman with whom I was engaged in casual conversation, 'You are a pessimist, aren't you?' 'Oh, no,' she replied, 'not a pessimist, a realist.' I wished that I might quote to her a statement from 'Science and Health' with Key to the Scriptures in which its author, Mary Baker Eddy, says: 'Perfection underlies reality. Without perfection, nothing is wholly real' (p.353). True realism, then, is basing one's thinking and acting on the spiritual fact that 'perfection underlies reality.'"

The speaker said: "On page 115 of Science and Health, God is defined as 'Divine Principle, Life, Truth, Love, Soul, Spirit, Mind.' The teaching of Christian Science is that the only reality is that which God knows. Jesus accepted that which is of God and nothing else. He said, 'It is the spirit that quickeneth; the flesh profiteth nothing.' Jesus refused material beliefs and held to true idealism. He realized the spirituality and dominion of true manhood."

The lecturer told her audience that Mrs. Eddy was reared in an atmosphere of religion, in which from her earliest years she was deeply interested. That through studying the Gospel records of Jesus' works she herself was healed. Later she wrote the textbook, Science and Health, and founded The Mother Church, its branches, and its many activities.

The speaker asked, "What is the relation of man to God? The Bible," she said, "calls man God's image

and likeness. John spoke of man as the 'son of God.' Mrs. Eddy used many different terms to convey the true sense of man. She called him Mind's idea, representative, reflection. The work of the practitioner is to see this real, ideal man in place of the sinner or the sick man who is presented by mortal belief for his recognition and acceptance. Christian Science practice is the constant prayer of enlightened faith. Christian Science treatment is prayer only, prayer based on a realization that God and His creations are the only facts of the universe."

The audience was told: "Whatever your business is, it is your place in which to express God, your avenue through which to manifest man's true qualities. Thus it is of utmost importance to you and to the world. Even so, your only responsibility is clearly to reflect God's qualities

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through that business." The lecturer concluded by saying: "Peace for the whole war-torn world will come permanently only as it comes permanently in the thinking of the individuals who comprise the world. As tolerance, unselfishness, spiritual understanding, and intelligent love fill individual consciousness, so these qualities will eventually fill the consciousness of the nations. In that glad day only the understanding of divine realism and idealism will remain."

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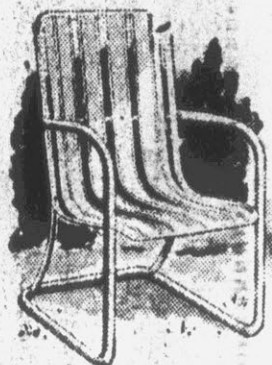
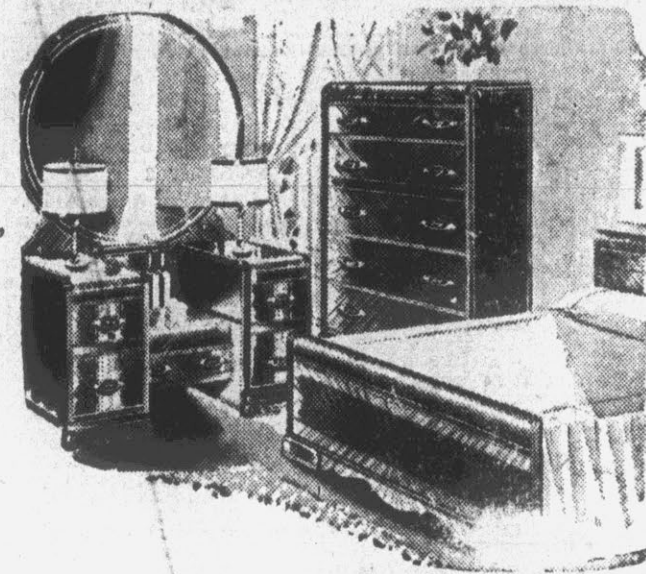
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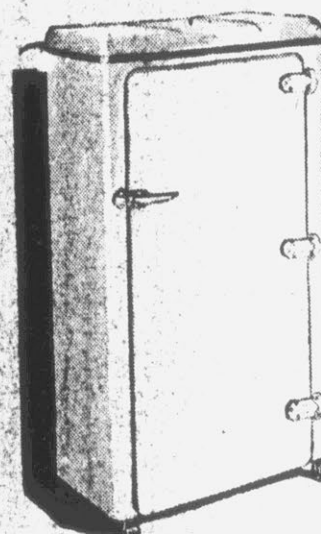
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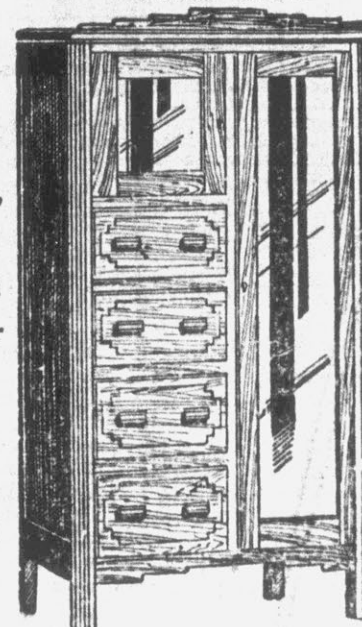
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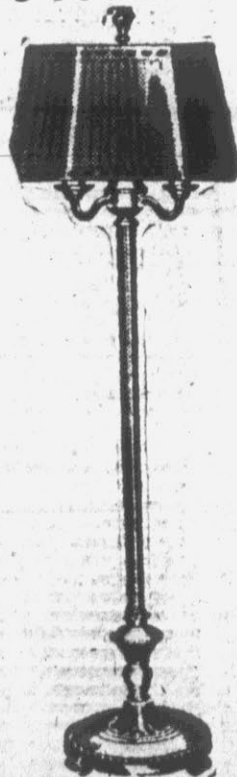
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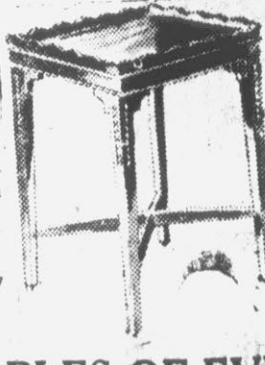
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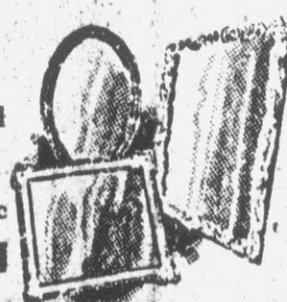
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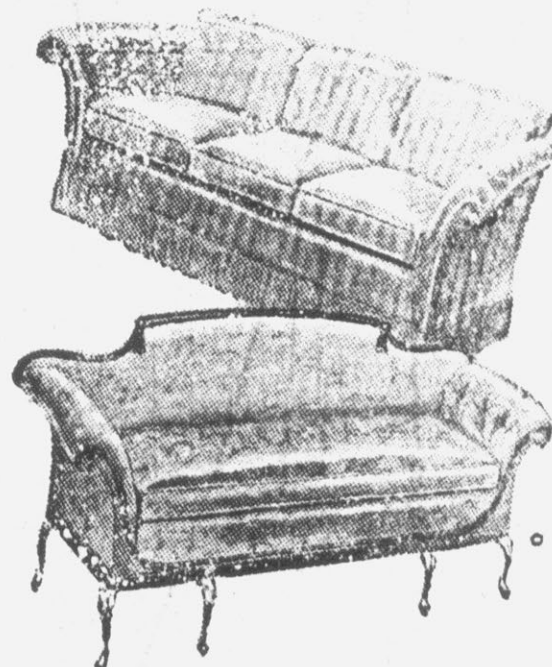
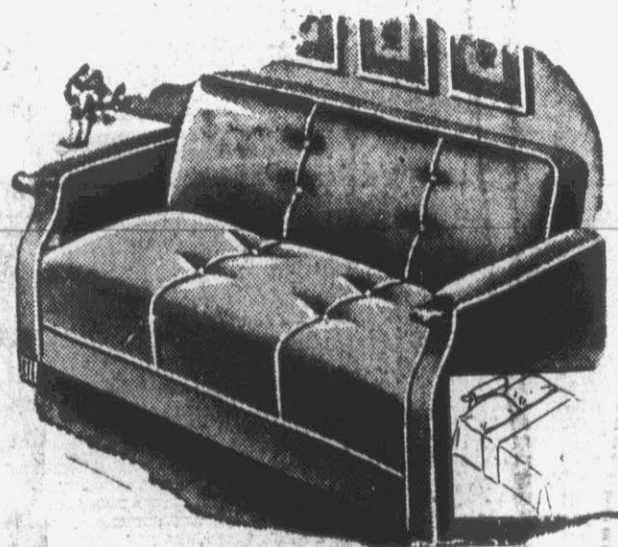
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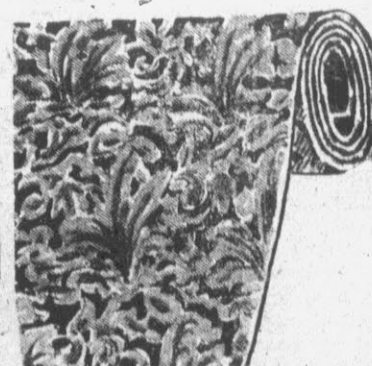
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
