BOWLES ASKS FOR PATIENCE ON SHORTAGE

Clothing Production Said Climbing; Cites Cause Of Shortage

Washington, April 13—(AP)—Stabilization Director Chester Bowles expressed confidence today that the shortage of inexpensive clothing will have eased considerably in three months.

In a radio address (ABC network), he appealed to the public to be patient "a little while longer." Stating that production of cloth and apparel is on the upturn, Bowles added:

"Ordinarily it takes about fourteen weeks for new fabrics to show up as finished garments in your stores. This whole troublesome situation, I am confident, should be a lot better by the middle of July."

Bowles, in a review of the clothing problem, said that to date the record of getting low and moderate-priced garments on the market, "is no credit either to the industry or the government."

Discussing the shirt shortage, Bowles said a principal reason for it is "the absolutely staggering demand." The government estimates, he reported, that Americans would snap up more than 320,000,000 shirts this year.

"But in the last prewar year, 1939, far less than half that many shirts were bought and sold," Bowles said. "Just think what the millions of returning GIs would do to the kind of stocks you used to find in your stores."

"With each man wanting maybe three or four or a half dozen, the shirt industry would be kept busy for months, just supplying veterans alone."

Bowles listed these "basic reasons" for the shortage of inexpensive cotton clothing:

1. A shortage of workers in the textile mills during the last two years.

2. Failure of the government to take "more vigorous, realistic action" in the early days of the clothing scarcity. Bowles reiterated that clothing should have been rationed and that controls to curb shifts to high-price lines should have been instituted sooner than they were.

3. Removal shortly after the war of controls which required mills to make essential fabrics needed for low-cost clothing. These were restored a few days ago.

4. Rising raw cotton prices. Bowles said cotton prices are the highest in 22 years and three times as high as they were in 1939.

"And every price increase in raw cotton makes it so much harder for the mills to weave moderately-priced materials—harder for manufacturers to get the cloth they need for inexpensive clothing," he said.

Angry Democrats Talk Of Cleaning Up Party

House Democrats After Scalps At Party Headquarters For Recent Blunders; Even Hannegan's Ouster Possible

Washington, April 13—(AP)—Angry House Democrats hit the warpath today for the scalps of officials at the party's national headquarters responsible for recent mistakes which have riled legislative tempers.

One lawmaker, Rep. Cox of Georgia, even went so far as to say the expedition may culminate in an effort to oust National Chairman Robert E. Hannegan himself.

Most of the law-makers expressed doubt, however, that such drastic action would be taken. They predicted, instead, that Hannegan would merely be called on the carpet, although some of his aides would get the axe.

Cox told a reporter the whole matter probably would be discussed at an official caucus of House Democrats tentatively set for Monday. A caucus as a party meeting at which policies usually binding on members are decided.

"The caucus may draft a message requesting the President to dismiss Hannegan," Cox asserted. The Georgian was one of more

than 50 who signed a petition yesterday demanding the party meeting be held to discuss recent trouble involving some national headquarters personnel.

Most of the signers were already at odds with Hannegan and other party leaders on policy matters, but several close supporters of the administration also added their names to the list. Some said they did so because they agreed a "house-cleaning is needed" at party headquarters. Others declared they favored a caucus "so we can get this all explained and let a lot of steam blow off."

Rep. Boren (D-Okla.), who prepared the petition, told newsmen he acted as he did "because evidently there is some incompetency and inefficiency in the Democratic National Committee office x x x which must be stopped because it is injurious to Democratic harmony."

Two recent events prompted the action by Boren and his aroused colleagues.

One, disclosed yesterday, was a

Tokyo, April 13—(AP)—Prince Morisama Nashimoto, only member of the imperial family jailed as a suspected war criminal, was freed today from Sumaga Prison for lack of evidence.

Nashimoto, 72, was angry because the Japanese liaison office failed to send an automobile to take him to the charred ruins of his mansion. He readily accepted a ride in the Associated Press jeep.

Still in a bad humor when he reached home, the round little man with a bristling handlebar mustache and sleepy eyes threw rocks at persistent Japanese photographers. The cameramen quickly bowed. He had brushed them off once already en route home.

PLANT TO USE ATOMIC POWER

Harnessing Of New Energy For Peacetime Use Under Way

Oak Ridge, Tenn., April 13—(AP)—Generation of power for peacetime use through the harnessing of atomic energy will be the task of an experimental plant to be established here, Maj. Gen. Leslie R. Groves, Manhattan project head, has announced.

Experimental laboratories are to be expanded at an estimated cost of \$2,500,000 and studies have progressed to the point where draftsman are ready to change technical data into engineering blue prints, the general announcement said.

Construction is expected to get under way this year and experimental operation may start early in 1947.

Design, construction and operation of the experimental plant will be controlled by Monsanto Chemical Company, and "other industrial organizations have been asked to participate in the development as consultants and to furnish technical men," Gen. Groves stated.

He named Dr. Charles Allen Thomas, vice president of Monsanto as project director, and said laboratory here will be directed by Dr. C. Rogers McCullough.

The first atomic power plant will be entirely free of danger of explosion, and will involve the design, construction and operation of a chain reaction pile and auxiliary equipment.

"Primary consideration is the need to reduce to practice some of the many ideas for power piles developed as an outgrowth of the atomic bomb program, and to supply evidence that might be of value in clarifying any international patent situation that might arise," the general continued. "Patent rights growing out of the work will be vested with the government of the United States, and Congress will determine the use to which they will be put."

Technical foundation for the experiments was laid by the metallurgical laboratories of the University of Chicago. Manhattan project

DUTCH TROOPS TO TAKE OVER IN INDONESIAN

Holland Agrees To Assume Task Of Rounding Up Japs In Indonesia

London, April 13—(AP)—Britain and Holland have agreed that British troops will be withdrawn gradually from Indonesia and replaced with Dutch forces.

A communique issued by the British government last night following a conference attended by the British and Dutch Prime Ministers and the Foreign Secretaries of both nations said:

"Views were exchanged and agreement was reached as regards the measures still necessary to liquidate the war with Japan and the gradual withdrawal of British troops and their replacement by Dutch forces."

British troops—sent into Indonesia by the allied high command to round up and disarm Japanese troops after the surrender—have clashed repeatedly with Indonesian Nationalist forces.

A British Foreign Office spokesman said British forces, mostly Indian troops, have been withdrawn as rapidly as Dutch troops became available, but, he added, "this progress has been slow."

Earlier, a British spokesman said the British wished to withdraw their troops as rapidly as possible but that the Dutch maintained the problem was not one of garrisoning the islands but of completing the

TRUCE TEAMS FAIL IN WORK

Manchurian Mission Powerless; Await Marshall's Return

Peiping, April 13—(AP)—Lt. Gen. Alvan C. Gillem, Jr., disclosed today that the Sino-American peace committee of three with substitutes having replaced all original members, is powerless to act in the Manchurian crisis.

Gillem said he has acquainted General Marshall, whom he temporarily replaced as the American member, with the seriousness of the Manchurian situation. He is awaiting instructions from Marshall, who is enplaned from Washington yesterday to return as President Truman's special envoy to China.

The committee marked time today, its fact-finding mission to Manchuria halted short of that civil strife torn territory because of its impotency.

A source close to the committee said Marshall's immediate return is vital if accomplishments thus far toward unifying China are to be preserved.

A reconnaissance plane dispatch by Sino-American peace headquarters here to the area north of Shan-hai-kuan and south of Suiching returned with photographs showing

Babson Discusses Railroads

Babson Park, Mass., April 13—War came to the rescue of the railroads. The decline in traffic and earnings which had persisted since the 30's ceased. Volume of traffic and net income reached new peaks. However, the real worth of rail securities must be judged, not on past, but on future, performance. Several things must be considered when making a decision on railroad earning power—volume of traffic, operating expenses, taxes, bond interest and rate charges.

Volume of freight traffic varies in proportion to business activity. Before the war, their competitors (trucks, automobiles, pipe lines, shipping and airplanes) had cut into the railroads' revenues. However, the war helped the railroads and hurt the other carriers. The railroads, moreover, need no time to adjust themselves to peacetime conditions. A pent-up demand for goods, with the greatest cash reserves in many years, should insure good business activity and thus a large volume of freight.

Passenger traffic should also be good for a while in spite of auto and air competition. The Federal Reserve Board's index of Industrial Production shows an increase from 110 in 1929 to 171 in 1941. In line with these increases, railway freight traffic jumped to a new prewar peak in 1941 with an increase of 25 billion ton-miles carried over those of 1929. It certainly seems that the railroads could count upon at least their prewar gross traffic which gave them \$500,000,000 net in 1941.

The Department of Commerce estimates a "Gross National Product" of \$150,000,000,000 for 1947. This could produce an increase in railroad gross earnings over 1941 of 5 per cent for 1947. This is especially interesting when we note that the 1944 figure for our Gross National

Product was \$195,000,000,000. Thus we can get a 5 per cent increase in railroad earnings even with a decline of \$45,000,000,000 in total national income. Predictions, therefore, point to a greater volume of railway traffic during the next few years than in the peak peacetime year of 1941.

Higher Costs Inevitable We must, however, remember that there has been a 20 per cent increase in wages since 1941 with the wage and price controls in 1947. A price rise in items essential to the railroads, such as lumber, steel and coal, will add to the increased costs due to wages.

The greater operating efficiency attained during the war carried over into peacetime economy should help overcome the wage increases amounting to 20 per cent. We must ask ourselves, however, how much more wages will be increased during the next year or two.

Fixed Charges Lower We find that the \$500,000,000 net income of 1941 with the wage and price increases which will have occurred since that date will be highly inadequate to meet 1947 operating expenses. If railroad net income is to be maintained, business activity must remain well above the 1941 level and an increase in rates will be needed in addition. Whether the public is in a mood to accept such is any reader's guess.

The railroads are in a much stronger position now than in prewar years, since they have used \$2,500,000,000 of their war earnings to decrease their debt. Consequently, their fixed charges have perhaps declined \$200,000,000 a year. They have also increased their net working capital from a 1941 level of \$600,000,000 to \$2,000,000,000 in 1946.

Proposed "Holiday" In Draft Is Gaining

DEGREES ARE GIVEN BY UNC

Distinguished Group Awarded Honorary Degrees By University

Chapel Hill, April 13—(AP)—The University of North Carolina today conferred honorary degrees upon 39 distinguished representatives in the fields of natural sciences, social sciences, humanities, public life and business.

Secretary of State James F. Byrnes was among the recipients as the University concluded ceremonies celebrating its sesquicentennial.

The exercises were preceded by a colorful procession to historic Memorial Hall, with 400 college and university representatives and delegates from learned societies and foundations, including 62 college presidents among them, taking part in the march.

Prior to the awarding of the degrees, Cornell University President Edmund E. Day and North Carolina President Frank P. Graham na President Frank P. Graham joined in a warning "that the world headed for disaster unless the rapid scientific and technological advances of the modern age are mastered by a combination of social, political and economic devices."

Byrnes and North Carolina Governor R. Gregg Cherry were among the 26 recipients of doctor of laws

House Leaders Forced to Go Along With Temporary Induction Ban In Order To Secure Extension Of Draft Law

Washington, April 13—(AP)—Snowballing support for a draft "holiday" forced reluctant House leaders to indicate a willingness to

to go along on a temporary induction ban in order to get the draft law extended nine months from May 15.

But they prepared to fight to the last ditch an amendment prohibiting the induction of anyone under 20—an amendment Army spokesmen said privately would nullify the entire legislation.

Apparently there wasn't much they could do about either the "holiday" proposal or the teen-age ban for both rolled up heavy support when outlined yesterday during the opening of debate on the draft extension measure.

These two red-hot issues are scheduled to be disposed of one way or the other by nightfall, along with a motion to kill outright the entire extension legislation. And to allow plenty of time for a decision, Speaker Rayburn called the House into early session again today (10 a.m. EST) for the second successive day in an effort to send the bill to the Senate for a vote next week.

Draft "holiday" support has been nowhere near as conspicuous in the Senate, whose military committee has recommended a straight-away extension of Selective Service, without any such innovation. The present odds seemed to be that the two

JAP ELECTION IS COMPLETED

One-Time Hitler Advocate Heads Winning Conservatives

Tokyo, April 13—(AP)—A conservative party whose leader once wrote a book praising Hitler and Mussolini won the most seats in Japan's postwar Diet, by count of Wednesday's record-breaking vote of nearly 26,000,000—and an influential Tokyo newspaper warned today that "Old spheres of influence still continue to be strong."

The so-called Liberal party, a rightist organization headed by Ichiro Hatoyama, finished with a slight plurality over the Social Democrats, which has both right and left factions, and the Progressives, also rightist. None won clear cut control.

The count, with all but five of 468 seats decided: Liberals, 132; Social Democrats, 99; Progressives, 98; Independents, 90; Communists, four; minority parties, 50.

Hatoyama, who acknowledged he wrote the book but insisted he later disavowed its statements immediately called for a coalition bloc to oust aging Premier Shidehara's cabinet. There was some talk of a possible early cabinet resignation.

Assessing the results of the election, in which women voted for the first time and chose at least 35 of their sex to the Diet, the influential newspaper Asahi said:

"The fact many votes were cast for old influences such as the Progressive and Liberal parties demonstrates that realities do not change at a jump. . . . We must remember that old spheres of influence still continue to be strong and that these feudalistic, conservative spheres constitute the greatest impediment to

SPAIN OFFERS INVITATION FOR UN PROBE

Franco Cabinet Asks For Commission To Tour Spain To Disprove Charges

Madrid, April 13—(AP)—The Franco cabinet, describing the latest accusations against Spain as part of a world Communist campaign, today invited the United Nations to send a commission to this country to "prove the absolute falsity" of charges that German scientists are working on the atomic bomb in Spain.

In a brief communique issued after its meeting, the cabinet also termed "false" and "absurd" charges brought by Poland at the United Nations Security Council meeting in New York that Spain was endangering world peace.

Poland also had asserted that the Franco government was harboring German scientists, and reports from Paris said that a German scientist was operating an atomic research laboratory near Toledo.

The invitation for a committee to tour Spain was limited to "those nations represented in the United Nations with which Spain maintains friendly relations." Members of the Security Council which do not maintain diplomatic relations with the Franco government are Poland, Russia, Mexico, France and China.

The text of the communique follows:

"The government discussed the world Communist campaign which culminates in a note against the Spanish nation presented by the Polish delegate to the Security Council of the United Nations, and in view of this decided:

"A. To reject as absolutely and totally false the absurd accusations formulated by the Polish delegate that the country which is giving proof of the greatest serenity and a pacific spirit, without giving even a shadow of pretext to those who provoke it, could be a danger to world peace, despite the continuous and systematic attack by international communism.

"B. To offer to those nations represented in the United Nations with which Spain maintains friendly relations full authorization for a committee of their technicians freely to circulate in our country, visiting its manufacturing establishments and experimental stations, so that they may prove the absolute falsity of accusations about alleged work on the atomic bomb which is said to be carried on by German technicians, provided that once the inaccuracy of this is proved, ample publicity be given the results of the visit.

"C. To declare once more that it opposes with all firmness any kind of interfering of foreigners in the internal affairs of Spain which are peculiar and proper to national sovereignty."

An authoritative source, meanwhile, said that there were believed to be no prominent German scientists in Spain, although there were enough technicians to form a "bothersome nucleus" for research. The technicians are working in plastics and communications equipment and with companies manufacturing Dornier and Messerschmitt planes, this source said.

Delegates Form No Immediate Decision On Acceptance Or Rejection Of Franco's Invitation; Spain May Be Allowed To State Her Case Before Council Security Council...

New York, April 13—(AP)—Members of the United Nations Security Council guardedly studied today an invitation from the Spanish cabinet asking the council to determine for itself by inspection whether refugee German scientists are engaged in atomic research in Spain.

Council reaction was immediately lacking, but one delegation which declined to be identified had indicated previously that an invitation from Generalissimo Francisco Franco asking for such an investigation would seem a logical answer for the Spanish leader to make to Poland's charges.

While there probably will be no immediate decision on acceptance or rejection of Franco's invitation, the possibility arose that Spain might be permitted to state her case before the council.

Spanish sources said Franco might send a representative to the council, if asked, on the condition that he be allowed to speak without taking the role of defending a nation "on trial."

Some authorities suggested that the council under its elastic powers could call upon a non-voting non-member to participate in its own interests, if desired, in order that both sides might be heard.

Similarly, in its wide latitude of operation, the council could send members or delegated technicians to Spain as an investigative body if the evidence of Poland—and supporting arguments expected to be offered by Russia, France and Mexico against Spain—indicates that such action is necessary.

The post-midnight cabinet statement in Madrid included the invitation in a full denial of Poland's charges before the council that the Franco regime constituted a menace to peace because it harbored fugitive war criminals, Nazi assets and inventors "devising new means of warfare."

The statement said Poland's charges were "absolutely and totally false" and were part of "the continuous attack by international communism."

The statement contained the first official mention of allegations concerning the atomic bomb. On that score the Polish accusation had gone no further than to charge that German scientists were "devising new means of warfare" in Spain, new means of warfare "devised by the Franco regime."

United States policy on the Spanish question indicated support for the idea of a full hearing of the case, including the Franco side, with decision reserved until all the evidence has been heard.

The U. S. and Britain currently maintain that Spanish problems must be resolved by the Spanish people.

It appeared unlikely that the Spanish question would be reached on Monday. The Iranian issue is ahead of it on the provisional agenda, and even if Iran withdraws its objection to dismissal of its case against Russia, the American and British delegations are expected to argue for its retention until May 6 to look into the status of Red Army withdrawals from Iran.

The new negotiations over India's freedom from England—one of the greatest and most dangerous of the world's unsolved problems—are verging on their crucial moment.

The British cabinet delegation, which recently arrived at New Delhi with a fresh offer of independence, has had its consultations with the various Indian political parties. Now the time has arrived for those political organizations to face each other across the conference table and try to iron out differences which have existed for generations.

The London delegation—headed by Lord Pethick-Lawrence, Secretary of State for India, and including Sir Stafford Cripps, who conducted the ill-fated mission of 1942—has notified the Indian public that the time has come for "decisive consultation between Indian parties."

The statement characterizes this as "the most important phase of the negotiations" and says that "it is a phase which calls for the utmost efforts from the leading statesmen of India and from the cabinet mission to arrive at a solution acceptable to all sides."

That is indeed a moderate description of a volcanic situation which has erupted with extreme violence periodically.

The two major political parties are the All-India Congress, dominated by Mahatma Gandhi, and the Moslem League, headed by Mahomed Ali Jinnah. One of the great difficulties in the past has lain in the fact that these parties divide not only on political affairs but along religious lines. The name of the Moslem League speaks for itself—it is made up of Moslems (Mohammedans). The All India Congress claims to be non-religious, but it is comprised mainly of Hindus.

Tradition has it that these two religions are like oil and water, and each other, and certainly this has found support in the bitterness of their conflict at times. Still, having spent much time in India studying the position, your correspondent is of those who believe that Moslems and Hindus can and will mix.

Because he has seen them getting along together in greatest amity when there were no busybodies about to stir up quarrels.

Be that as may, one of the greatest difficulties between the two major parties lies in the fact that the Hindu out-number the Moslems three to one, and the latter under the powerful leadership of Jinnah are fearful of trusting themselves to such a majority. The Hindu population

TWO WORLDS AT A TIME

The naturalist Thoreau put into circulation the expression often heard, "One world at a time." The intimation is that man lives in only one world and that he will have plenty to do if he gives his attention to the things immediately before him and stops dreaming about heaven.

The truth is that man does not live in one world but in two. He came from God, bears the divine image, and is promised an eternal dwelling place in another world, when his pilgrimage here is ended.

When James VI of Scotland was thundering against the rising power of the people and threatening what he would do with rebels, the brave Melville dared to lay his hand on his sovereign's arm and say very sternly "Thou poor worldling, James VI and Jesus; and in the kingdom of Jesus, James is a humble subject."

In many circles it has come to be regarded as the unmistakable sign of intellectual distinction to declare for the world here and now and to discount the possibility of anything beyond. When men do this, they display not their wisdom but their littleness, not their breadth but their narrowness. "And God said, let us make man in our image, after our likeness." The creature He made lives in two worlds, and the fact that he may be conscious of only one world does not alter this profound reality.

letter sent by the National Committee to the party's chairman throughout the nation. The British contended in February, when the Soviet Ukraine complained before the United Nations Security Council that British troops in Indonesia constituted a threat to international peace, that the sole mission of the British forces there was "to liquidate the war with Japan," the same phrase used in last night's announcement.

The Ukrainian complaint was shelved when only Russia and Poland voted to send an investigating commission to the East Indies. British denied at that time Ukrainian charges that British troops were being used to suppress an Indonesian independence movement.

The Indonesians have established an unrecognized republic in the islands and negotiations now are in progress on their demands for complete independence.

Into the appendix the congressmen shove copies of poems, letters, editorials, news stories, letters, and even book reviews.

By morning the public printer has turned out 41,500 copies. Total cost for the year is about \$750,000. Every representative and senator has at least one copy delivered to his office. Senators are allowed 100 a day, representatives 68.

Many of them send these extra copies to friends who want them. The public can buy the record, \$1.50 a month. The superintendent of documents takes the subscription.

The oldest reporter—in point of service—is James W. Murphy. He's been short-handling Senate speeches 46 years. His father before him was a Senate reporter, starting in 1890 and dying in 1916.

Murphy's father's brother, Dennis Murphy, was the earliest of the Murphy family to work in the Senate. He started there as a reporter in 1848 and continued until his death in 1896.

lation is roughly 300,000,000 and the Moslem 100,000,000.

Because of this, Jinnah is holding out for "Pakistan," that is, an independent Moslem state. The Hindus, on the other hand, are standing pat for a unified India. The immediate problem, therefore, is to recognize the divergent views of the Moslem League and the All-India Congress.

When you speak of these two political parties you are talking about Mahatma Gandhi and Mr. Jinnah. That's how powerful these two great leaders are. I know both of them personally and can testify that they can be a stubborn pair.

However, with expert handling I believe India's problem can be solved. And so it is indeed encouraging to hear from the British mission that it is confident it will be possible "to reach that decision which the people of India so anxiously await and which will be welcomed throughout the world."

Today Premier Shidehara—silent and inactive during the war—paid tribute to the late President.

"On the anniversary of Mr. Roosevelt's death," the premier said, "I recall to mind the great work to which he dedicated himself in the interests of international security during the crowded, stormy days of his official career. I feel confident his memory will always live in the grateful appreciation of the whole world."

chambers would pass radically different measures, leaving the ultimate form of the draft extender to be worked out in Senate-House conference.

The House draft "holiday" plan would ban the induction of anyone between next May 15, when the present draft law is due to expire, and Oct. 15, 1946. It was offered by Chairman Vinson (D-a) of the Naval Committee.

The proposal would continue the draft law in effect until next February 15, but with an induction moratorium of at least six months to give a voluntary enlistment campaign an opportunity to fill Army manpower needs.

If enlistments proved inadequate, the President could order resumption of inductions after October 15 and until February 15.

To many members, the attractive feature of the Vinson amendment is that any actual drafting of men before the congressional elections in November would have to be ordered by the President instead of by Congress.

The Confederate Congress voted him thanks and made him Admiral and senior officer of the Confederate Navy. In a letter to President Davis, Secretary of Navy Mallory said, "The daring courage and consummate professional ability of Buchanan achieved the most remarkable victory which naval annals record."
