Bowles Drives For OPA's Extension

Opens Administration's Campaign For One Year Extension For Price Controls Speech Before Senators; Predicts Of Inflationary Danger In June 1947

Washington, April 15 (AP)—Economic Stabilizer Chief Bowles told senators today that price controls stay in effect there is reasonable hope that we will be out of the woods of extreme inflationary danger by the end of 1946.

And if this happens, he testified at Senate Banking committee hearings, controls can be lifted generally by June 30, 1947, in all but the areas of acute shortage.

Bowles opened the administration drive for a one-year extension of the office of price administration which otherwise expires June 30, 1946.

Chairman Wagner (D-N.Y.) read a letter from John W. Snyder, conversion director, urging continuation of OPA without crippling change and asking continuation of subsidies to keep down retail prices.

Bowles told the senators:

"Our people are watching to see whether or not their government really means business in holding down the cost of living."

"Our 3,000,000 businessmen are watching to see if a weakened price control act will further increase their costs of production."

"Our 6,000,000 farmers are watching to see if we are to indulge in another postwar gamble with inflation such as caused 450,000 farm foreclosures after World War I."

"Our 17,000,000 industrial workers are watching to see if the present balance between wages and prices is to be maintained or abandoned."

"Our 12,000,000 or more white collar workers and people living on fixed incomes are watching to see if they are to be squeezed again between rising rents and prices and relatively stable incomes."

Army Is Charged With Lobbying

Washington, April 15 (AP)—Senator Robertson (R-Wyo.) declared in the Senate today that the Army is conducting "an intensive lobbying and propaganda campaign" for unification of the armed services.

In a prepared address, the Wyoming senator, a member of the Naval Affairs Committee, called on President Truman to extend to all branches the "muzzling" order Robertson said Mr. Truman had issued against the Navy on this question.

Expressing concern that the Navy may be placed "in a subordinate position" if present merger proposals are carried out, Robertson told his colleagues he thought it "unfortunate" that the President told his press conference last week that the Navy was expected to support the merger plan and to abandon the propaganda and lobbying in which Mr. Truman said some naval officers had engaged.

"I feel it necessary for national harmony and the future national defense that the President either rescind his order to the Navy or extend it to every other branch of the armed services," Robertson declared.

MANCHURIA ON BRINK OF CIVIL WAR

Tension Increases As Red Army Leaves; Truce Team Arrives In Mukden

Chungking, April 15 (AP)—Changchun, Manchuria's capital, was reported under martial law today with tension increasing as Russian troops evacuated the Communist-surrounded city.

A government Central News Agency dispatch said the government garrison commander inside the city had laid down strict rules, including a prohibition against public gatherings.

The dispatch also charged that Communist troops attacked Changchun's airfield for ten hours yesterday as the Soviet rear guard was withdrawing from the city. It estimated that 30,000 Communist troops had surrounded the city.

Government troops number far less, for the bulk of the American-equipped first army is some 100 miles away being resisted in its advance by Communist troops in the vicinity of Ezepeingka.

Mukden, April 14 (Delayed)—(AP)—The three-man peace commission accompanied by three commissioners of the Sino-American Executive Headquarters arrived here at noon today and immediately consulted with the senior representatives of the government, Communist and American members of cease fire teams.

With Manchuria hovering on the brink of full scale civil war, well-informed neutrals said the arrival of the Big Three was psychologically right to prolong negotiations and avert an increase of hostilities between Communist and government troops.

The mission of the group, which flew from Peiping, is primarily to gather facts and report to General Marshall when he arrives later in the week in Chungking.

Gangs Rove Streets In Sleepless Butte

Two Murder Charges Face Motorcyclist

Charlotte, April 15 (AP)—Ray Putnam, Belmont motorcycle racing driver, today was under two charges of murder in connection with a Saturday fairgrounds accident in which his machine roared into a crowd of spectators, killing two youths and injuring six others.

Henry Severs, chief of Mecklenburg County police, said warrants charging assault with a deadly weapon on six other counts also had been issued.

Robert Donaldson, 12, of Charlotte, and Mickey Albert Platt, 16, of Concord, were fatally injured in the crash.

Other authorities said the vandals—including one group of about 500—were mostly women and young children.

Saturday night and again last night, gangs of men, women and teen-age boys—armed with axes and traveling by truck and automobile—roved the streets of this strike-bound copper-mining community of 40,000 and its suburbs, unloading at private homes to bash in windows and doors and throw wrecked furniture into the yards.

Two youths were wounded by gunfire—the second last night.

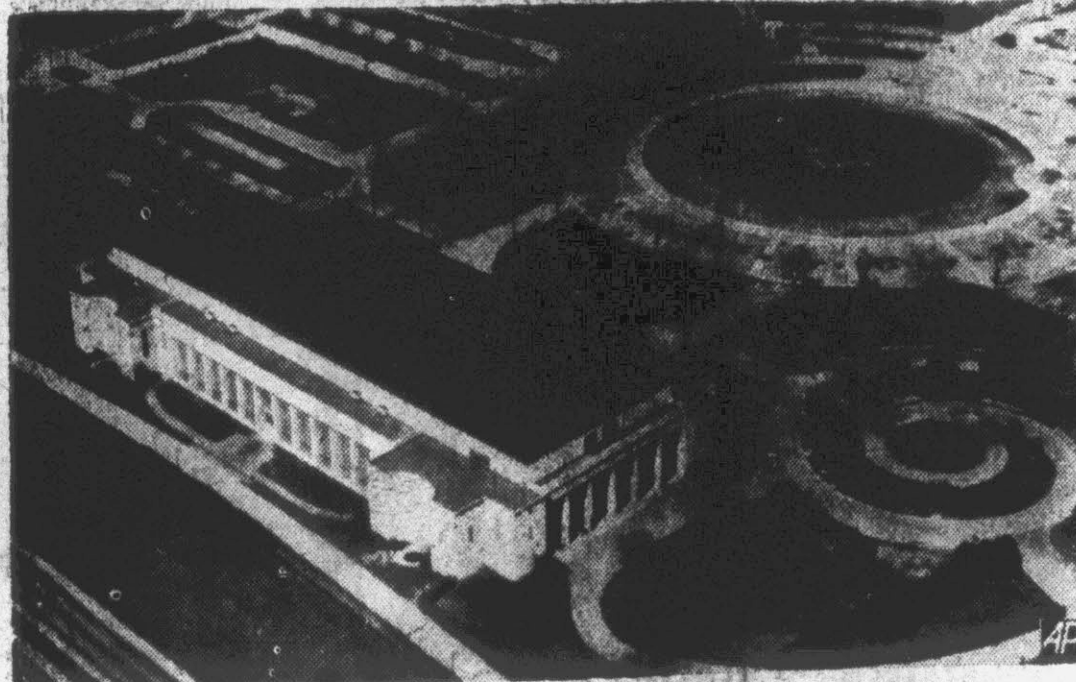
Most of the homes damaged, Police Chief Bart Riley and Mayor Barry O'Leary said, were occupied by miners who stayed on their jobs on "the richest hill on earth" after a strike of 3,500 members of the International Union of Mine, Mill and Smelter workers (CIO) began Tuesday.

The union strike committee declared that neither the union nor its members was responsible for the disorders. A statement issued by the committee called on both union members and the general public to help maintain order.

House Members Clamor For Roll Call On Draft

Smarting from Saturday's Debate, Congressmen Advocate A Recorded Vote On Passage Of Draft Extension Bill

Washington, April 15 (AP)—Recovered from a case of roll call fright, House members clamored today for a recorded vote on passage of a cut down draft extension bill.

They were still smarting from cries of "Politics" shouted Saturday during debate that preceded adoption of amendments ordering a five-month induction "holiday" and a ban against drafting teen-agers.

There were no roll call votes, on which the members are recorded individually when the bill was put in shape for final approval today.

No one asked for a roll call on banking the induction of 18 and 19 year olds, and fewer than 50 members demanded a record vote on the amendment halting all inductions between May 15 and October 15. With more than 300 members on the floor, 61 requests were necessary before the roll could be called.

Whether there would be sufficient demands to force a roll call today on a pending motion to recommit the bill and thereby kill it was doubtful. That motion was the only thing remaining before formal passage sends the measure to the Senate where, Army spokesmen said, they hope to remove the amendments.

The actual form of the extension undoubtedly will be decided by a Senate-House conference committee. In this connection, Rep. Sparkman (Ala.), House Democratic Whip and a member of the chamber's military committee, said that should the Senate follow the House pattern "it would be better for the President to veto it than sign it into law."

FBI TO CHECK MEAT PACKERS

Action Follows Complaints Of False Subsidy Claims

Washington, April 15 (AP)—Attorney General Tom Clark directed the FBI to investigate reports that many meat packers have attempted to defraud the federal government by falsifying claims for subsidies.

"Complaints have been received," Clark said in a statement, "that some packers are paying black market prices for live cattle thus making it impossible for other packers to secure cattle lawfully, and then are obtaining subsidy help from the government by representing that purchases were made at legally permissible prices."

A Justice Department official who cannot be named said the subsidy regulations provide that a slaughterer who bids up the price of cattle beyond the permissible maximum forfeits his rights to subsidy help from the government.

"To falsify reports of the prices paid, and to claim subsidies on the basis of such false information, constitutes a fraud on the United States," he said.

The official said the maximum permissible price for live cattle are fixed at a level designed to permit packers, with the help of subsidies, to slaughter and sell dressed beef within their legal ceiling prices.

To discourage competing packers from bidding up these prices to a point where they would have to overcharge their customers or suffer a loss, the subsidy regulations now provide that packers who pay more than allowed by regulations automatically forfeit a part or all of the subsidy, depending on the excess amount paid, the officials explained.

Munich, April 15 (AP)—American military government authorities said today that Bavarian farmers were hoarding tens of thousands of tons of needed foodstuffs while hungry German city dwellers ask larger imports from the United States.

"The German farmer's belly is full," one American food expert declared, "but because of our policy of democratization we cannot use strong arm methods and collect his hidden food."

County Surveyor F. McCoy Tripp is the only candidate for that office. (Continued on Page Four).

HUSSEIN ALA TO WITHDRAW IRAN CHARGES

Persian Delegate To UN Receives New Instructions From Tehran

Tehran, Iran, April 15 (AP)—Prince Mozaffar Pirouz, Propaganda Director, said today that Hussein Ala, Iranian ambassador to the United States, had been instructed "immediately to withdraw Iran's complaint before the Security Council."

The nation previously had made an issue before the United Nations over the continued presence of Russian troops, which Moscow now says will be withdrawn by May 6.

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Big Three Split On Iranian Issue

SOLICITORIAL DISTRICTS TO BE CHANGED

Gov. Cherry Plans Rearranging Districts After Report Of Commission

Greensboro, April 15 (AP)—North Carolina's solicitorial districts would be reduced in number from 21 to 19 under terms of recommendations by Governor Cherry's special judicial-solicitorial commission.

The commission, of which H. I. McDougall of Charlotte is chairman, will present its recommendations to the 1947 General Assembly for action. A majority of members has approved the report.

In addition to a reduction in the number of districts, the recommendations would increase the salary of solicitors from the present level of \$5,000 to one of \$7,500, so that the full time of the officials can be devoted to their public duties.

Under the proposed rearrangement of districts, Mecklenburg and Guilford counties each would compose a district—Mecklenburg the 15th and Guilford the 10th.

Other districts would have the following compositions:

First—Currituck, Camden, Pasquotank, Perquimans, Curran, Washington, Tyrrell, Dare, Hyde and Beaufort.

Second—Gates, Hertford, Bertie, Northampton, Halifax, Warren, Vance and Granville.

Third—Martin, Pitt, Craven, Greene, Jones, Carteret and Pamlico.

Fourth—Franklin, Nash, Edgecombe, Wilson and Johnston.

Fifth—Pender, New Hanover, Brunswick and Columbus.

Sixth—Wake, Chatham, Lee and Harnett.

Seventh—Alamance, Orange, Durham, Person and Caswell.

Eighth—Cumberland, Hoke, Robeson and Bladen.

Ninth—Sampson, Duplin, Onslow, Wayne and Lenoir.

Russia Firmly Opposes U. S. And Britain Stand In Favor Of Further Discussions Of Settlement; Form Of Action To Be Taken Against Spain Not Yet Suggested

New York, April 15 (AP)—A two-to-one split in the Big Three was expected today in the United Nations Security Council over Russia's demand that the world peace agency drop the Iranian case completely and immediately.

Nevertheless, authoritative American and British sources said Edward R. Stettinius, Jr., the American delegate, and Sir Alexander Cadogan, the British representative, would firmly oppose Soviet Delegate Andrei A. Gromyko's insistence that the council reverse its position. It was indicated the majority of the delegates would go along with Stettinius and Cadogan.

The Iranian issue has top billing on the provisional agenda. Pressing it closely for world attention, however, is the Polish charge that the government of Generalissimo Francisco Franco, of Spain, is endangering world peace and is harboring German scientists who are "devising new means of warfare" in Spain. It has been reported—and officially denied by Spain—that these Germans were working on atomic research.

Poland wants the United Nations to take action against Spain, but left open just how form this should take. It could range from a simple statement against Franco to the full weight of the world police force which is being fashioned by the Security Council.

The current Russian crisis goes back to April 4 when the council, by nine favorable votes, took Russia's word that the Red Army would be completely out of Iran by May 6 and Iran's statement that such a course would be acceptable.

It deferred action until May 6, at which time the withdrawal has been completed so the council could decide if any further action was required. (Continued on Page Six)

TODAY IN CONGRESS

A Review Of Your Government In Action

Washington, April 15 (AP)—The Senate Agriculture Committee was held today that unless something is done to correct the meat situation all legitimate slaughterers will be completely destroyed.

R. H. Haynie, vice president of Wilson & Co., Inc., told the committee that his company, operating under OPA price policy, will sell its New York and Brooklyn customers next week only about two percent of the amount of beef they bought five years ago. He expressed belief that the situation cannot be corrected under price control.

In other developments, outside Congress but related to the meat situation, the Justice Department announced that the FBI had been directed to investigate reports that many meat packers have attempted to defraud the government by falsifying claims for subsidies, and the OPA and Agriculture Department announced the imminent restoration of the wartime slaughter quote system.

With the meat industry continuing requests for removal of price control, Economic Stabilizer Chief Bowles urged the Senate Banking Committee to continue the OPA for another year. Bowles said that if price controls stay in effect there is reasonable hope we will be out

of the woods of extreme inflationary anger by the end of the year. Senator Robertson (R-Wyo.) told the Senate that the army is conducting an intensive lobbying and propaganda campaign for merger of the armed services. He called on President Truman to extend to all branches of the "muzzling" order which he said the President had issued against the navy on this question.

Senator Murray (D-Mont.) announced he would sponsor a bill to exempt from federal income taxes the payments veterans make on purchase of a House, up to a cost of \$10,000.

House members felt the draft blowing down their necks today, while senators pondered a ticklish labor problem on housing.

And more trouble is ahead for the representatives, once they get themselves on record for or against a nine-month extension of the draft act with a holiday between May 15 and October 15 on all inductions.

Right behind the draft bill, which also has been amended to put a halt to teen-age calls and when inductions are resumed this fall, is the red hot OPA extension bill. This measure, too, has been critical of some of the amendments.

Washington, April 15 (AP)—The theme of this story is: What are you doing—actively—to make Congress a better Congress?

The entire House of Representatives and one-third of the Senate comes up for election this year. Some primaries start pretty soon.

Senator Fulbright, Arkansas Democrat, said recently in an address at the University of Chicago:

"I hope that x x x I may to some degree arouse your interest in participating actively in politics."

Fulbright, Rhodes scholar and former president of the University of Arkansas and now serving his first Senate term. Then said:

"Americans complain of the ineptness of their government but at the same time they are supercilious, if not contemptuous, toward those who devote their energies to its service. x x x"

"Improvement in the quality of our legislative bodies is primarily the function of the vot-

er, not the legislator."

In other words: If you want better government, get in and pitch yourself; don't sit back and hold your nose.

Do you—through disdain or lack of interest—let a politician or a political machine pick candidates for you without any say so by you?

Or do you—even though it means starting in your own voting precinct—try to take an active hand in what is done?

And—when your congressman is elected—do you let him go to Washington and there try to guess how you, back home, want him to vote?

A good example of congressional confusion over what the people want came last week in debate over extending the draft law nine months more.

There was an argument on the floor of the House over this: Should the House try to decide now whether to extend the law or should it wait till members got home at Easter to learn what voters wanted? (Continued on Page Four)

Fine Exhibit At Gallery

The public is invited to attend the current exhibit on view at the Community Art Center in Sheppard Memorial Library, which will remain here for one week.

One of the most charming of the many fine exhibitions of art that have been in this gallery, it has been shown in many important museums throughout the United States.

The twenty large water colors are by Alberta Averill Eno, well-known Ohio artist and wife of the millionaire William P. Eno. The founder of the Fairfield County Annual Rescue League. Mrs. Eno donates the funds from the sale of her art to this charity.

The collection of paintings, "Birds and Flowers," ranges from colorful and exciting arrangements of flowers through compositions of exotic birds, cockatoos, and parrots perched among complimenting flowers whose shadings subtly blend with the plumage of the birds.

Of particular appeal are the vivid studies of rare and interesting toadstools which are done with meticulous attention to scientific detail and are cleverly mounted on mats of cork which creates a feeling of affinity with the earth in which they grow. The artist has been commissioned to reproduce these and others for publications on natural science.

A bowl of bayberries against a

scarlet and grey background done in clean sharp lines suggests an atmosphere of the Orient and is one of the most distinctive of the group.

Other paintings executed with ingenuity are of iris, delphinium, lilacs, zinnias, and magnolias. A lovely spray of pink magnolia glaucous in sensitive and exquisite shading against a sky-blue background is one of the most admired.

This exhibit was arranged for by Miss Jesse Rountree Moyer while in New York last spring. Eleven years ago Miss Moyer of the Woman's Club created an original scheme to obtain a Federal Art Studio for Greenville. She planned and assisted in promoting Greenville's first Fine Arts Festival, the first of its kind as far as is known, in the state. James McLean, head of the Raleigh Federal Project, was the featured figure of this event. Some of the best art shown here since 1935 has come through her direction.

Greenville was one of only seven cities in the state to have a federal art studio. There were only one hundred cities in the United States to have art centers with federal support and North Carolina was the first state to obtain federal aid for her artists.

Miss Moyer has placed a picture of the beautiful Mrs. Eno in the gallery.

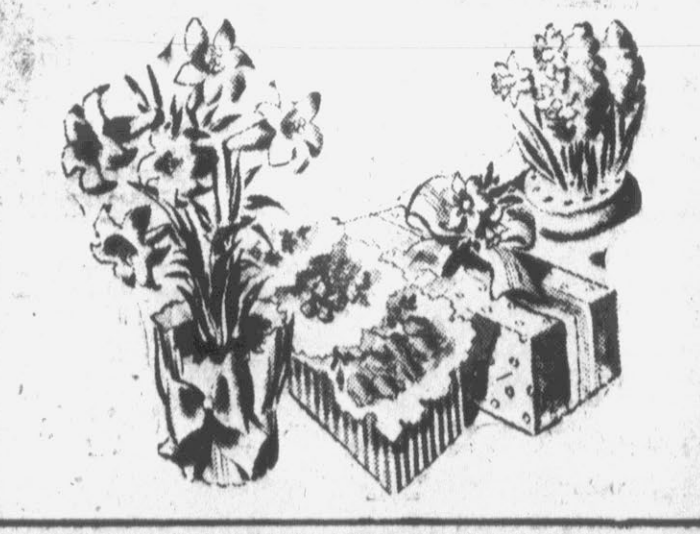

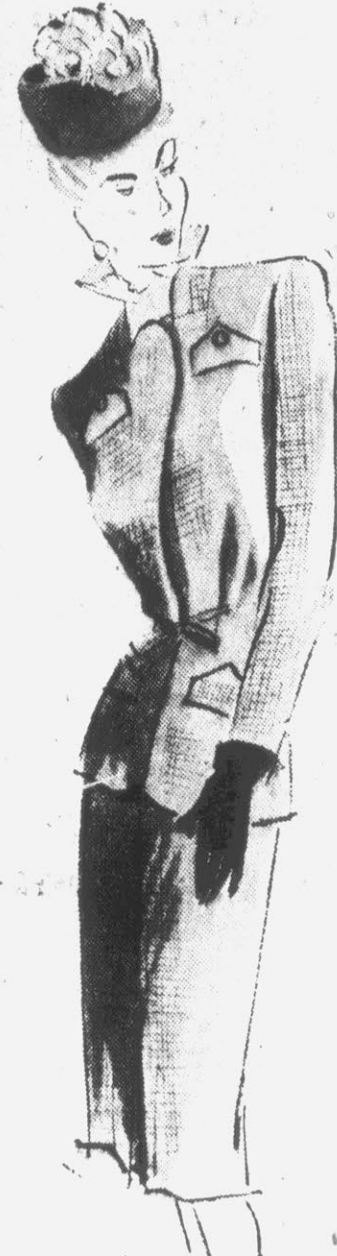

called "You And Your Congress.")

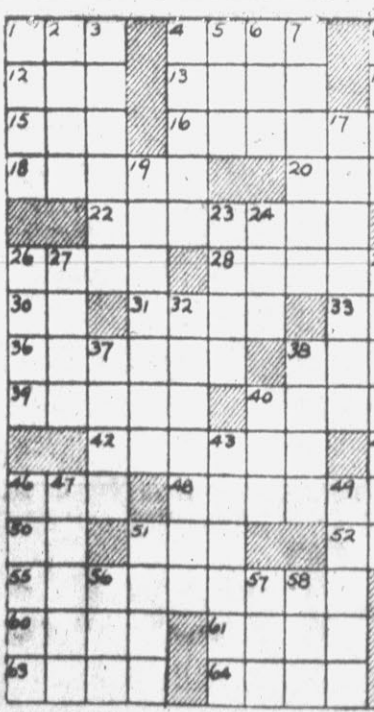

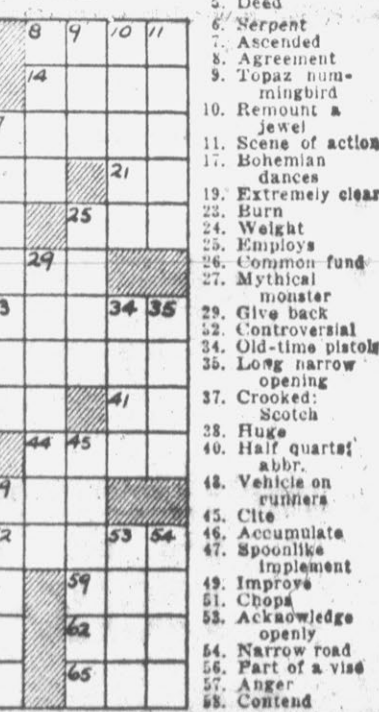

punch is gone out of most of the
stories.
The Army's Chemical Warfare
Service probably will never get out
now the full story of its use of
smoke in the war.

When we went into this war, the
Army didn't have one single smoke
generator, yet when the Anzio
beachhead was established the land-
ing forces operated behind a smoke-
screen 15 miles long and capable of
being maintained 14 hours a day.

Along the Moselle, Saar and
Rhine whole armies were moving
up behind smoke at the war's end.
Perhaps before long similar gen-
erators will be protecting millions
of acres of fruits and vegetables
from the unseasonable frosts.

Another process that came out of
the war was the cheap extraction
of helium. Once helium cost around
\$2,000 a cubic foot. Now it costs one
cent a cubic foot and there are new
plants in Kansas, Texas and New
Mexico.

Among the many new uses lately
turned up for helium is its use in
oversize tires.

Incidentally, if you have seen
anything of a new "ingenious" Ger-
man machine which may revolu-
tionize the manufacture of con-
densors for radio, radar and other
electronic equipment, notify the
Army or the Department of Com-
merce. They've lost it.

Commerce recently announced that
this new machine, which turned up
in Stuttgart, Germany, was "en-
route" and soon would be demon-
strated publicly by Commerce and
the Army Signal Corps. Army called
Commerce already was "somewhere" in
this country but could Commerce
tell them where it was? Commerce
couldn't.

Until it turns up, American con-
densor manufacturers will have to
struggle along without the new ma-
chines, which Commerce says will
cut production costs up to 20 per
cent.

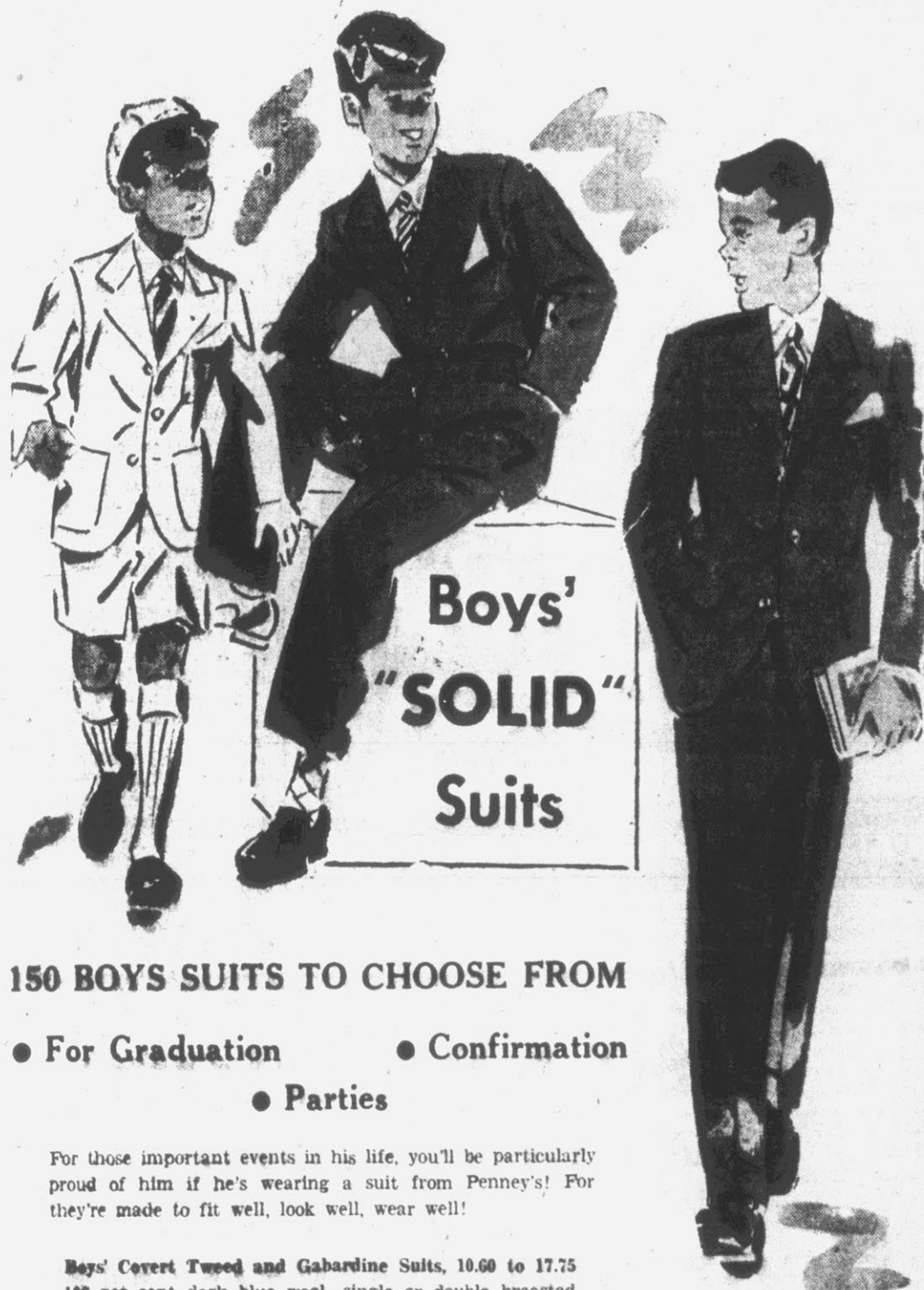

Sapporo, Japan, April 15.—(AP)—Japanese ex-servicemen on Hokkaido Island attempted to foment a resistance movement against American occupation forces, but were unsuccessful, Maj. Milton O. Lee of Boston, Mass., senior military government officer, reported today.

The people took upon the Ameri-

can occupation as a sort of an emancipation and rejected the movement, Lee said.

British Government To Further Program

London, April 15.—(AP)—The British cabinet was reported by political observers to have decided that the iron and steel industry is to be brought under government ownership. An announcement of this decision was expected by mid-week.

The iron and steel industry had been put at the end of the government's nationalization program mainly because of its complexity.

FOOD BUDGET SET BY U. S.

Huge Expenditures Planned To Feed Occupied Nations

The United States today was reported planning monthly expenditures of almost 60 million dollars to help feed occupied Germany and Japan until mid-1947.

A total of 700 million dollars has been earmarked for this purpose in the War Department's budget estimates for the 12 months beginning July 1, according to an official who withheld his name.

To make up current deficiencies food already is being shipped into the U. S.-occupied one of Germany at the rate of more than 50,000 tons a month. About 25,000 tons of rice and rice substitutes have been delivered to Japan thus far.

This food is paid for from War, peace and unrest. Lt. Gen. Lucius D. Clay, deputy military governor, Department funds to prevent dis- explained in first announcing to the Germans the extent of American aid.

The basic ration of the 18,000,000 Germans in the U. S. zone was reduced this month from 1,555 to 1,275 calories. Officials declined to reveal the ration contemplated under the new budget estimates.

By the end of June, it was estimated that the U. S. will have supplied 350,000 tons since the German ration first was supplemented late last year. In addition, some 182,000 tons of food, largely of American origin, have been delivered thus far to the British and French zones.

The burden of supplying food deficiencies fall on the War Department as long as the army continues to administer the occupied areas. The State Department has declined to assume the occupation burden and UNRRA is responsible only for taking care of displaced persons, aside from supplying relief to liberated Allied countries.

Canadians Raise Pay Of Armed Services

Ottawa, April 15.—(AP)—A boost in the basic pay and subsistence allowances of Canadian servicemen, aimed at attracting additional recruits to the nation's enlarged peacetime active forces of 51,100 men, was announced today. The rates will become effective October 14.

Basic pay and subsistence of the lowest ranks in the army, navy and air force will be increased to \$95 a month, compared with the pre-war rate of 76.50.

At the top of the scale, the new monthly pay and allowances of vice admirals, lieutenants, generals and air marshals—ranks of chief-of-staff—were listed at \$905. The increases are proportionate with those given men in the lower ranks.

South's Building Showing Increase

Baltimore, April 15.—(AP)—The building activity below the Mason-Dixon Line has increased to a total of \$379,910,000 for the first quarter of 1946, as compared to \$18,689,000 for the first three months of last year, the Manufacturers' Record reports in its current issue.

Industrial construction for March was \$58,551,000, or over twice the figure for the preceding month and about three per cent higher than last March, the article stated.

The Madrid government previously had denied reports that German scientists have been secretly working in Spain on atomic research. The U. S. State Department also had denied any knowledge of German operated atomic bomb projects in Spain.
