## Soviet Loses First Round Of Secret Debate On Iran

**Majority Of Committee On Rules And Procedure Hold That Case Can Be Legally Kept On Agenda; Council To Resume Debate On Controversial Spanish Question**

New York, April 18.—(AP)—Soviet Russia was reported today to have lost a strenuous battle behind closed doors to have the United Nations Security Council's procedure experts rule against further consideration of the Iranian case.

As the council prepared to meet (at 3 p. m.) the committee of experts on rules and procedure was said by informed quarters to be split eight to three, with the majority holding that the case could legally be kept on the agenda.

The council was expected to resume its debate on the controversial Spanish question at the opening of the session, while the experts completed drafting majority and minority reports expressing the committee's split opinion on the Iranian question.

Sources close to the committee said these reports, based on a study of Secretary-General Trygve Lie's opinion that there might be no legal grounds for keeping the case on the agenda, would be submitted to the council by 4:30 p. m. (EST).

This was expected to open the way for a renewed floor fight over the legality of maintaining jurisdiction over the case. The lineup in the committee of experts was the same as that during the council debate earlier this week—Russia, Poland and France insisting that the question should be dropped.

The other eight members, led by U. S. Delegate Edward R. Stettinius, Jr., have argued that the case should be kept on the agenda until May 6, the date on which Russia has promised to have all her troops out of Iran.

Meanwhile Sir Alexander Cadogan, British delegate, was scheduled to lead off in the Spanish debate with an assault on some of the arguments advanced yesterday by Polish Delegate Oscar Lange in his plea that members of the United Nations break diplomatic relations with Franco Spain.

The British position was represented as being similar to that voiced yesterday by Stettinius. That Britain wanted to see the Spanish people themselves throw out the Franco regime and (2) that it wanted this to be done without starting another civil war.

## League Ends Its Career Tonight

Geneva, April 18.—(AP)—The League of Nations expires at midnight tonight, 26 years, three months and eight days after its birth.

Only the farewell speeches and assembly ratification of some final decisions remain.

A board of nine—representing Norway, Britain, France, India, China, Bolivia, South Africa, Czechoslovakia and Switzerland—was appointed to handle the liquidation of the league's \$11,700,000 in assets.

The league's buildings and technical services will be transferred to the United Nations.

Some delegates said only one loose end was left—the mandate system. They said there was no legal way to insure that all mandates would be turned over for United Nations trusteeship.

## BRITISH LOAN GAINS FAVOR

**Informal Poll In Senate Indicates Probable Approval**

Washington, April 18.—(AP)—A margin of 12 to 18 votes in favor of the \$3,750,000,000 British loan was claimed today by administration aides in the Senate.

The claim was based on an informal and tentative count which indicated the 46 Republican members would split about even on the proposal. That estimate checked with the Republicans' own appraisal of the tally within their ranks, as debate on the big credit measure entered its second day.

However, administration forces concede privately they may have a harder task in repelling several attempts to amend the bill.

Word has come up from the Treasury and State departments which negotiated the agreement that any amendment would necessitate fresh consultations with the British. That probably would mean no loan authorization this year, in view of the expected summer-fall campaigning recess for Congress.

Amendments expected to be presented include:

1. A substitute calling for an out-

## Suits Filed Against Maj. General Short

Dallas, April 18.—(AP)—Deputy U. S. Marshall E. R. Goss said today he served a summons on Maj. Gen. Walter C. Short, former Pearl Harbor Army commander, in a suit for \$50,000 damages filed against Short and several other Army officers which alleges false imprisonment.

Goss said the suit was filed by Gunther Herbert Walther, Anna Walther and Carl Magnus Torsten Amfelt, all of Oahu, Hawaii.

The plaintiffs allege they were falsely imprisoned following the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor Dec. 7, 1941. Goss said, General Short is ill at his home here and was not available for comment.

## COALITION IS PROPOSED BY JAP PREMIER

**Shidehara's Secretary Announces Views On Tri-Party Government**

Tokyo, April 18.—(AP)—Premier Shidehara's chief cabinet secretary started political Japan tonight with a statement urging a tri-party coalition government and declaring: "In my opinion, the Shidehara cabinet must resign as a means of obtaining political stability."

The secretary, Wataru Narahashi, considered one of the cabinet members closest to the premier, announced that Shidehara would become president of the Progressive party tomorrow and would consult with Ichiro Hatoyama, president of the Liberal party, and Tatsu Katayama, Social-Democrat leader, regarding a coalition.

Hatoyama, under fire from some elements and under investigation by General MacArthur's headquarters to determine if he is qualified to occupy the diet seat to which he was elected last week, recently demanded resignation of the Shidehara cabinet. He said he would attempt a coalition among conservative elements with the objective of attaining the premiership for himself.

## CROWDS FLOCK TO JERUSALEM

**Holy City Scene Of Ceremonies Despite Marked Unrest**

Jerusalem, April 18.—(AP)—Through streets lined with barbed wire barricades and teeming with armed troops, thousands streamed into this ancient city today to see Christian worshippers recreate with symbolic ceremonies the last hours before Christ was crucified.

An undercurrent of tension prevailed throughout the Holy City as Palestine's three-cornered Arab-Jewish-British political controversy was complicated by a country-wide strike of 50,000 civil servants, who are demanding increased pay and better working conditions.

A three-hour walkout in sympathy with the strikers was set for today by several thousand persons employed in special wartime departments of the Palestine government.

## Automotive Pioneer Ends Life In Suicide

Sidell, La., April 18.—(AP)—Arthur Chevrolet, one of the founders of the Chevrolet Motor Company, committed suicide by hanging himself in his home here, acting Coroner H. E. Gautreaux of St. Tammany Parish reported.

The automotive pioneer, who had been despondent, Gautreaux said, took his life Tuesday. He was a native of Switzerland.

Chevrolet was the last of three brothers who formed the Chevrolet Motor Company in 1911. He was a brother of the late Louis Chevrolet who headed the company when it was organized. Gaston, a third brother, was killed in a Los Angeles speedway crash in 1929.

## President To See Fleet Maneuvers

Washington, April 18.—(AP)—President Truman will go out into the Atlantic Monday to review maneuvers of a carrier task force of the Atlantic fleet.

Press Secretary Charles G. Ross, announced today that the President is leaving the White House Sunday afternoon at 4 o'clock (EST) for a full week's cruise on his yacht, the "Williamsburg," to include a rendezvous with the Atlantic detachment.

The "Williamsburg" Ross said will proceed to Norfolk where it will be due at 6 a. m. (EST) Monday.

Two hours later Mr. Truman will board the carrier Franklin D. Roosevelt and be taken somewhere in the Atlantic to join units of the task force.

The President will witness maneuvers until Tuesday noon, and then return to Hampton Roads aboard the carrier, and reboard the "Williamsburg" at 4 p. m. to resume his "vacation" cruise, Ross told a news conference.

## Bulletins

Washington, April 18.—(AP)—Bituminous coal operators today notified Labor Secretary Schwelbensch they are going home after waiting nine days for resumption of contract negotiations with the United Mine Workers.

Washington, April 18.—(AP)—Automobile production in March jumped to a postwar peak of 97,045 cars, the Civilian Production Administration reported today.

This was nearly double the February output and exceeded the total 1945 production, the agency added.

## SHORTAGE IN COAL ALARMS C. P. A. CHIEF

**Government Carries Concern Over Strike Directly To People**

Washington, April 18.—(AP)—The government carried its concern over the 18-day coal strike directly to the people today.

Civilian production Chief John D. Small declared sternly that every citizen in the nation "has a definite stake" in the bituminous shut down because eventually the output of autos, houses, refrigerators and other scarce goods will be hit.

Simultaneously, Secretary of the Interior J. A. Krug, in his capacity as solid fuels administrator reported that 28,000,000 tons of soft coal have been lost since John L. Lewis called his 400,000 bituminous miners out of the pits April 1.

Their assertions from two key agency heads were described by one official who asked not to be named as an effort to overcome the apathy with which he said the country has accepted the complete shutdown of its soft coal mines.

Meanwhile, Secretary of Labor Schwelbensch and his aides were being put to a severe test of diplomacy and perseverance in trying to set negotiations between Lewis and the soft coal operators.

Neither side has budged from its position of a week ago when Lewis stormed out of the contract negotiations. He said it was futile to continue talking as long as the operators refused to commit themselves on his proposals for improved mine safety and a union administered health and welfare fund.

## TODAY IN CONGRESS

A Review Of Your Government In Action

Washington, April 18.—(AP)—Runaway House members squared away today and passed an OPA extension bill which stabilization this year would blast the props from under price control.

Called into session two hours earlier than the usual noon meeting time, they sent the measure on to the Senate quickly.

The bill, bearing little resemblance to the measure asked by the administration, would:

1. Scrap government food subsidies.
2. Knock out the low cost clothing program.
3. Repeal price guaranteeing "reasonable" profits for manufacturers and distributors.
4. End "cost absorption" controls on dealers in such items as automobiles and radios.
5. Extend OPA's life only nine months from June 30.
6. Lift price ceilings as fast as output of various goods reaches 1941 levels.

Democrats held a caucus after the night session on OPA ended and named an 11-man committee to work with Democratic national headquarters, some of whose recent goings have displeased members of the majority.

## TRUMAN CALLS HOOVER HOME

**Ex-President To Tell American People Of World Famine**

Washington, April 18.—(AP)—President Truman "suggested" to Herbert Hoover today that the former President return home to lay "forcibly and dramatically" before the American people the need for food in famine-stricken Europe.

Hoover has been touring Europe as honorary chairman of the Famine Emergency Committee. He is now in Cairo and had been expected to go from there to India, China and Japan. Mr. Truman proposed in a telegram to Hoover that he return to the United States before proceeding to the Orient.

Mr. Truman and Hoover will go on the air tomorrow night at 7:00 p. m. EST, to tell the entire world of hunger conditions in other lands. The White House said this apparently would be the first time a President and former President had appeared on the same radio program. Hoover will speak from overseas.

The White House said the broadcast would be expanded from 15 to 30 minutes and that Secretary of Agriculture Anderson and Director General Fiorello LaGuardia of UN-

## State Department Sets Sights On Iran Action

**Alarmed Over Sudden Resort To Drastic Censorship, State Dept. Seeks To Learn If Soviet Pressure Is Involved**

Washington, April 18.—(AP)—Iran's sudden resort to drastic news censorship sent the State Department on an urgent two-day quest today to determine:

1. Whether the action was Russian inspired, and
2. What the United States might be able to do to get the iron lid lifted.

The possibility of a formal protest is being fully explored. Indications are that an explanation is being asked from the Iranian government of Premier Ahmed Qasbi.

## TOKYO BLACK MARKET ENDED

**Army Intelligence Smashes Ring In Shooting Fray**

Tokyo, April 18.—(AP)—One soldier was killed, a second was wounded and four were captured in the breakup of a local black market ring, the Stars and Stripes reported today.

The Army newspaper attributed its information to Capt. Michael G. Frisch of Ithaca, N. Y., chief of the Army's criminal investigation division (CID) in Tokyo. He was unavailable tonight for confirmation.

None of the soldiers involved was named. Stars and Stripes said Frisch related:

Three of the soldiers forged requisitions for clothing, jeeps, trucks and supplies and became rich from black market operations. The other three, including two who were AWOL, were with one of the black market operators when he was arrested.

The arrests were made in a geisha house, where CID officers had gone to investigate Japanese detectives regarding black market beer sales, and at a Sake house in the Ginza (business) district.

Four soldiers in a jeep drove up to the geisha house. They were warned away by a geisha girl, who said CID officers were inside. The soldiers fled, pursued by an investigating agent, who shot one and wounded another.

## OPA Administrator Says Approved Bill Will Wreck Price Control; Southern Democrats Join Republicans In Weakening OPA Extension; Bowles Warns Of Disaster

Washington, April 18.—(AP)—The House voted overwhelmingly today to continue OPA for nine months, but in a form OPA Administrator Paul Porter said would wreck price control. It was one of President Truman's worst legislative defeats since he entered the White House a year ago.

The roll call vote on passage was 355 to 42.

The House, meeting at 10 a. m., two hours earlier than usual, tossed the amendment-ridden bill over to the Senate, where the White House said today that President Truman hopes for "much better results."

Asked at a news conference if the chief executive had any comment on the House amendments, Press Secretary Charles G. Ross told reporters:

"Not for print."

Asked if the President was going to "do anything about it," Ross replied:

"He hopes for much better results in the Senate." He did not elaborate.

A bloc of Democrats, chiefly from the south, combined with Republicans yesterday to so amend the bill the Chester Bowles, Economic Stabilizer, said the House had started "a joy ride toward economic disaster."

Before the final vote was taken, Sen. Robert D. Taft, R-Ohio, chairman of the House, shouted to his colleagues:

"You have murdered OPA!" OPA Chief Porter estimated that if the agency collapses because of congressional amendments, consumer prices might skyrocket as much as 50 per cent over present levels.

On final passage by the House, 205 Democrats, 148 Republicans and two minor party members voted for the bill. Opposing were 33 Republicans and nine Democrats.

The bill's major clauses now call for prices guaranteeing reasonable profit to all manufacturers and distributors; scrapping government food subsidies; repeal of the low-cost clothing production program, and an end to the cost absorption controls limiting prices on autos, radios and the like.

So great was President Truman's congressional set-back on economic policy that rumors swept the capital.

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## Sailor's Curiosity Brings Fire Engines

Washington, April 18.—(AP)—The sailor found out how the lever on the red box in a temporary Navy building worked today—it produced 22 fire trucks and a dozen police cars.

To a group of angry Navy officers and a huddle of scowling firemen, he explained that "I just wanted to see how it worked."

"Well, just look out of that window and you'll find out," a lieutenant roared at him, pointing at a roadway jammed with fire apparatus.

An alarm from any of the downtown federal buildings turns out everything available in the area.

An Analysis Of The News

General MacArthur, answering Russian criticism of his administration in Japan, has told the four-power Allied Council in about 30 many hand-picked words that consideration of his past actions isn't his job.

This blunt reply has been capped by Brig. Gen. Courtney Whitney, MacArthur's military government officer. Whitney declared that Russia's question of Allied occupation policy, "whether in good faith or not is a warning that success of the occupation is threatened," though the Russian delegate later said the position shouldn't be interpreted that way.

Both these statements from the American camp fit into the picture created recently by charges leveled at the United States (and Britain) by Russian publications and radio.

For example, we hear the Moscow radio quoting the magazine New Times as saying American Secretary of State Bernice states his position succinctly in a proclamation of policy on February 28 last when he said:

"We will do nothing to break the world into exclusive blocs or spheres of influence. In this atomic age we will not seek to divide a world which is one and indivisible."

That's clear enough and true. Still it's equally true that this policy doesn't relieve the United States of obligations which it incurred when it freed the Philippines from Spain half a century ago, and again when it played the major role in conquering Japan and thereby had placed upon it one of the greatest trusts any nation ever had to assume.

There is no question about the independence of the Philippines. Neither is there any doubt that the benevolent protection of the United States. Any argument about that is ended when we point to what happened to them in the war just ended.

We must recognize, too, that in the half century since the Philippines became attached to the United States the economies of the two have merged. It's natural the relationship should continue, though

## The NATION TODAY

Washington, April 18.—(AP)—Why the widespread meat scarcity? Government officials—and they have figures to back them up—say there's not actual shortage of meat in this country.

More meat—an estimated 1,000,000,000 pounds more—will be placed on the civilian market in 1946 than in 1945.

But there is a wide scarcity of meat, in some places and for some people. That these are the official reasons for that:

1. People have plenty of money. With rationing gone, they're buying lots of meat. That uses up the supply.
2. Black markets are draining off huge chunks of meat to sell to people who don't mind paying black market prices.
3. Because of the big demand and the black markets, the meat is not being distributed equally.
4. Because of this unequal distribution, many people and places are unable to get meat.

What the government people

don't say, although it seems undeniable is that meat rationing which ended last November, ended too soon.

Rationing would have been a big help in distributing the meat more equally. But there is worse news: Between now and next fall meat will be scarce because this is the season—it happens every year—when comparatively few cattle are killed.

In the midst of the uproar over the scarcity, meat industry people piled into Washington, complaining to Congress that OPA price ceilings were causing the scarcity.

The House, debating a bill to keep OPA alive after June 30, first voted late yesterday to tear off all OPA price controls over meat but a few hours later reversed this decision.

Abolishing price ceilings would make any drive against black marketeers impossible. With price controls gone, anyone could charge any price he could get, no matter how high.

**A SIGNIFICANT ANNIVERSARY.**

## WASHINGTON DAYBOOK

Washington—At 7:09 p. m., April 12, 1945, while a stunned nation

was trying to absorb the shocking news of the death of President Roosevelt, Harry S. Truman became President of the United States.

The drama of that fact was swallowed up in the tragedy of the moment.

Few men in our history have been so rapidly catapulted to such political heights, even by the death in office of our Chief Executive. Certainly none with so meager a political administrative background has ever been asked by fate to shoulder such overwhelming responsibilities to his nation and to the world.

A year before, Harry S. Truman was vaguely known to the nation as that senator from Missouri who was doing a damned good job as head of the Senate committee keeping the war industries in line.

A couple of months later, his nomination as running mate in President Roosevelt's bid for the fourth term caused about as many queries of "Who's Truman?" as statements of approval.

As vice-president for a little more than three months, he was no bumbling Throtheadbottom, but neither did he show any promise of political strength or administrative wisdom.

Looking back beyond his senatorial years, his background was no different from that of a few million other modestly successful Americans. In fact, it was more meager than most in accomplishment until he found his place in the Senate.

This then was the man who stepped into the presidency while the United States was still fighting a global war on two fronts with a vast industry totally committed to all-out wartime production.

Politically it was a time when Congress, except on matters of foreign policy, had little love for the administration. Republicans were confident that Roosevelt would never run again and that the Democrats could bring forward no man who could beat them in 1948. They were just marking time, lining up

with insurgent Democrats whenever possible, to make the New Deal domestic program look sick.

Yet no man ever took over as Chief Executive with more wholehearted support of the nation.

And in the weeks that followed President Truman delighted the nation. Moving cautiously but with a firmness that measured up to the responsibilities heaped upon him, he marched out to carry on the program, foreign, domestic and military that he had inherited.

This doesn't mean, and never has meant, that other nations are barred from participation in trade.

Then take the case of Japan. Whether he likes it or not, Uncle Sam must assume the broad responsibility for a Nippon which has been crushed as few major nations ever have been. She is down and out, and will remain so for a great many years. She is militarily impotent—wholly incapable of striking a blow in self-defense. And she is equally broken economically.

The United States has an obligation to see that Japan is reformed, that she is rehabilitated and that she is not an object of aggression from any quarter. I suppose this means a sort of protectorate, and that sense one may say that both Japan and the Philippines are in America's "zone of influence." However, you smile when you use those words, "zone of influence," because they must be employed only in a cord sense. Uncle Sam is not establishing an exclusive bloc.

The FBI now, because there still are price controls, is investigating complaints that some slaughterers are collecting government money (subsidies) by pretending to sell at ceiling prices while actually black

marketing. OPA is investigating something else, and it's very important. It goes like this:

When meat is slaughtered and sent across state lines, it has to be federally inspected. Meat slaughtered and sold within a state doesn't have to bear this inspection.

In normal times, the amount of meat sold within a state where it is killed and the amount shipped out to centers depending on these shipments hit a balance.

But these are not normal times. Government officials say the amount of federally inspected meat shipped across state lines has dropped sharply and they say this means:

Slaughterers, with the demand for meat so great, are saving themselves trouble by selling meat close to home, within their own state even though out-of-state centers have to do without.

OPA is going to try to cut down on this practice so more meat will be distributed around the country. Here are government figures of the meat supply:

In 1945 about 24,622,000,000 pounds of meat were killed. Of that total 3,630,000,000 went to the armed forces and 1,030,000,000 went to landings and other exports. That left 19,962,000,000 pounds for civilians.

In 1946 it is estimated—23,300,000,000 pounds will be killed. Of that total, 1,700,000,000 will go to the armed forces and 1,420,000,000 will go overseas in export sales or by way of UNRRA.

That would leave 22,880,000,000 pounds for civilians, or 1,030,000,000 more than last year.

## State Department

It is known both among newspapermen and within the State Department as "being censored" because it denies correspondents the opportunity to learn what changes have been made in their censored dispatches. This may be used by an unscrupulous censor to distort the meaning of stories.

The new censorship policy as disclosed to correspondents by the Iranian ministry of posts and telegraphs was reported to Washington by the American embassy at Tehran. A State Department announcement said:

"Notification will not be given to foreign correspondents when their dispatches are suspended nor will they be given an opportunity by the ministry to make changes or to discuss such suspensions of their dispatches x x x"

The start of the censorship was so tight, the embassy told the State Department, that reporters were not even allowed to inform their

home offices. The correspondents in Iran include representatives of the Associated Press, New York Times, Chicago Tribune, United Press, Chicago Daily News and Time magazine.

Iran has been a free-news country and in the opinion of American diplomatic authorities, the steady flow of information out of that country during its continuing dispute with Russia has served Iran's interests well on the whole.

It was this fact which led to strong suspicions among these authorities that censorship may have been imposed at Russia's insistence. They fear this may have been the same kind of pressure which Russian ambassador Ivan Sadchikov is reported to have employed in the last few days to force Iran to agree to withdrawal of her case from the Security Council.

welcomed a full discussion of the Spanish question but that much stronger evidence than that presented by Lange would have to be put forward to convince him the Franco government was a serious menace to world peace.

On the other side, Mexican Foreign Minister Francisco Castillo Najera was scheduled to take the floor again to attack the position taken by Stettinius, Mexico, along with France, vigorously supported Poland's move against the Franco regime yesterday.

The Polish question was set forth by Lange in an hour long speech in which he charged that the Franco government originally was a creature of Nazi Germany and Fascist Italy, that it served in wartime as an active Axis partner and that it now has caused a state of international friction by compelling the French republic to close her borders with Spain by massing troops on the borders of France."

He declared that Franco Spain was a dangerous remnant of the Axis and that it was a definite threat to international peace.

tol that both Bowles and Porter would resign. However, Bowles went on a radio network and declared he expected to "see this thing through to the finish."

Only rent control survived the House rebellion unscathed. The chamber beat back all efforts to revise rent ceilings.

With the legislation in control of Republicans, aided by a contingent of Democrats, here's what the House has done to OPA—subject to Senate concurrence:

1. Decreed on a 209 to 189 roll call vote that OPA's new life span beyond June 30 shall be no more than nine months.

2. Ordered scrapping of the government's two billion dollar annual subsidy program, used to hold down food costs. This amendment stipulates that such subsidies must stop by January 1 and OPA must allow price increases to compensate for reductions in subsidies. The \$715,000,000 meat subsidy was ordered stopped June 30, with an equivalent rise in meat prices. OPA estimates an end to the subsidies will boost food costs eight per cent.

3. Wrote in a cost-plus plan requiring OPA to fix prices so as to guarantee each manufacturer and distributor a reasonable profit on each item produced and handled. This amendment was approved 259 to 137.

4. Wrote in a forced-liquidation formula, whereby OPA would be required to lift price ceilings on any commodities whose output attains a rate equivalent to 1941. Industry advisory committees would be given

a large voice in determining when their products should be removed from price control.

5. Repealed OPA's maximum average price order, known as MAP, by the agency requires manufacturers to produce low cost clothing. OPA said this amendment, if it becomes law, would result in a 10 per cent increase in clothing costs.

6. Prohibited OPA from interfering with normal profits or discount margins of retailers and wholesalers on "reconversion items" such as automobiles, refrigerators and radios.

Reversing itself, the House voted 223 to 172 to retain price controls on meat, after earlier voting 139 to 122 to erase meat from OPA's control list.

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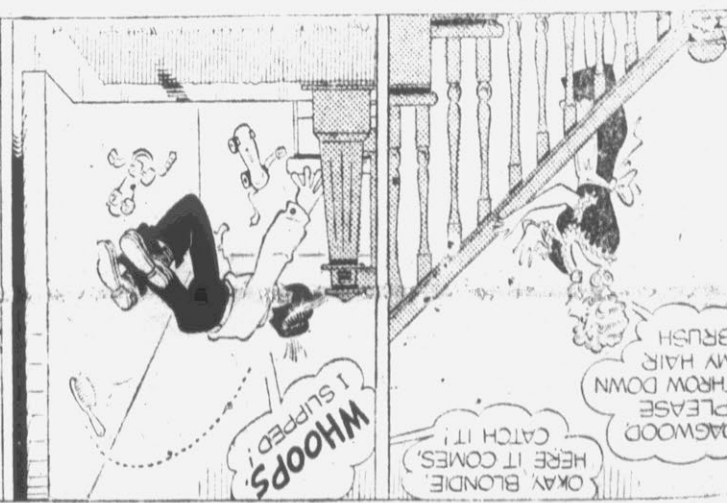

## Coastal Plains Sportswriters To Organize April Twenty-Second

The Monday, April 22nd meeting of the directors of the Coastal Plain League in Tarboro at the Community House, will also be the occasion of the formation of a sportswriters association of Eastern North Carolina primarily composed of the towns of the Coastal Plain League according to George N. Earnhart, president of the Tarboro club.

The plan also has the approval and blessing of Ray H. Goodson, president of the Coastal Plain, who recently announced from his Williamston office: "The formation of an active sportswriters' club in this circuit, by the newspapermen, will not only be welcomed but appreciated. We have long needed an organization that would function unitedly for the good of the league."

Mr. Earnhart said that Aubrey Shackell, editor of the Tarboro Southern, and one of Tarboro's baseball boosters since the organization of the Coastal Plain, had made the suggestion and that the Tarboro directors were glad to offer an invitation to the sports writers "to come to Tarboro on April 22nd and eat barbecued chicken and get set in their own sports organization. It is a fine thing and we welcome the press boys to Tarboro at any time but especially on the 22nd, the occasion of their organization."

Mr. Shackell said he would extend an invitation to all the sports writers of the league, as well as the sports writers of the towns who once had a team in the league, like Williamston and Snow Hill. Once organized it is the hope of those interested in its formation that it may well spread to all towns in the eastern part of the state. Honorary memberships will be extended to state-wide sports editors.

Invitations have been sent to Jack Holland, New Bern Sun Journal; Ed Moss, Fayetteville Observer; Ed Davis, Wilson Times; Jack Strothers, Kinston Free Press; D. C. Schlenz, Greenville Reflector; R. O. Moye, of Greenville, Greensboro Daily News, correspondent for eastern North Carolina sports; Bob Weirich, Rocky Mount Telegram; Jack Horner, Durham Herald; Dan Barringer, sports photographer; Rocky Mount; Dick Herbert, News and Observer; Bill Cox, Virginia Pilot, Norfolk; Francis Manning, Williamston; Smith, Berry, Greensboro Daily News; Joe White, Charlotte Observer; Charlie B. Goldsboro News-Argus.

Dick Herbert of the News and Observer said that he would definitely attend to present a plan for the league games for his paper. He thought the formation of a sports writers league would solve many problems.

Aside from the election of officers, naming of committees, and matters to be presented include:

- (1) That the president's office release full and complete, correctly spelled names of all players of all rosters of the league teams to each newspaper, so that the correct spelling of names may be used. Previously every newspaper in the league often spelled hard to pronounce names differently.
- (2) Recommend that all statistical information be made available first to the newspapers of the league, secondly to the other papers outside the league. 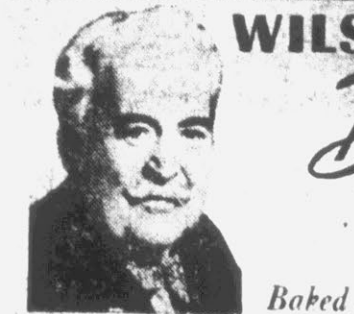

# GREENVILLE IS NOT SPOTLESS

## Clean-Up Committee Shocked Over Conditions Here

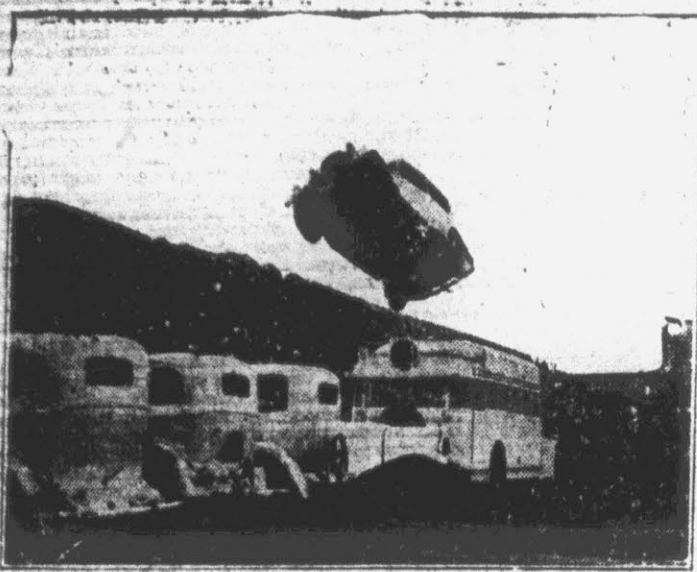

We saw Greenville from the air and it is a beautiful spot in the undulating hills of Pitt County. From a plane the city appears as a gem of attractive homes studded in an almost unending mass of greenery, bordered by miles of paved streets and highways. There is something in the picture, however, that cannot be seen from a plane—the foxholes of rubbish, garbage and debris, "adorning" private and business places. The "Land of Unending Smoke," in the northeastern part of Greenville, on a bluff overlooking Tar River, is not incense burned in honor of the dead in nearby Greenwood Cemetery. It is a disgrace to the people of Greenville, a committee of a dozen men and women representing the various organizations of the city, composing the "Clean-Up Week" Committee, agreed during a tour of inspection this morning, with a newspaper reporter attached.

The city's dump is a foul-smelling, disease-breeding, rat-infested, insect-breeding incubator, which makes its existence known a long time before one gets within bounds. Garbage and dead animals make the place a "valley of plenty" for rats and turkey buzzards, the committee observed during today's inspection.

The dump "in miniature" was found in alleys in the business section of the city and on vacant lots within the corporate limits. Waste paper and other inflammable materials litter the alleys and vacant lots, creating a serious fire hazard. At Five Points several truckloads of trash have adorned the sidewalk of West Fifth Street for more than a week, and it's not the city street department's business to move the ornament, one of the committee men said.

In spite of a city ordinance requiring that separate containers be used for trash and garbage, these piles are cafeterias for rats and other rodents. And on and on, this

condition was found. On private premises and outside business places, trash and garbage are piled about the spot supposed to be occupied by a covered metal garbage container and a trash receptacle. Empty tin cans and broken jars and bottles litter some premises holding enough water to incubate a billion billion mosquitoes to pest the life out of citizens when the good old summertime comes.

Next week is cleanup week. The city authorities have pledged co-operation, and Street Supt. C. D. Mallison is doing a good job. What is needed, one prominent business man said today, is for the police to enforce the law and tag unlawful garbage and trash piles with the same diligence they tag improperly parked cars.

The County Health Department is cooperating to inspire the people who live here to take more pride and interest in keeping Greenville clean. All local organizations are taking part in the clean-up campaign.

When the individual householders used their own trash cans, Greenville will be a healthier and a cleaner city, another member of the committee said.

# BATTLE HIDES FATE OF MEN

## Fate Of Two U. S. Army Men In Fighting Zone Is Unknown

Chungking, April 18.—(AP)—The fate of an American officer and his pilot was hidden by the smoke of battle in Changchun today as Chinese Communist forces captured the Yamato Hotel, where the two had been staying.

Destroyed telephone communications made impossible a check into the fate of the two—Maj. Robert R. Riggs of Chicago, assistant military attaché, and Sgt. Clayton Pond of Portland, Ore.

News of the capture of the hotel from government forces came in a fragmentary dispatch sent from the embattled city by Associated Press Correspondent Tom Masterton, cut off there with four other correspondents.

As General Marshall, special U. S. Envoy, flew here in a supreme effort to bring peace to Manchuria, gunfire roared through many of the streets of Changchun. Communist forces threatened to overwhelm completely the small national garrison in the center of the city.

Government planes dropped urgently needed ammunition to the besieged force.

Marshall headed for Chungking after receiving reports on the Manchurian situation during a brief stopover at Peiping en route from the United States.

While Chungking awaited Marshall's first action, there was speculation among many Chinese leaders that he bore a firm U. S. demand for an immediate cease-fire pact in Manchuria.

Marshall arrived in mid-afternoon and was greeted by Madame Chiang Kai-Shek, Communist Gen. Chou En-Lai, and other leaders of both factions.

Nations Disagree On Contributions

Washington, April 18.—(AP)—A British-Canadian-American deadlock today over ways to ease the world food crisis delayed an order which will put this nation on a diet of less bread and flour.

Representatives of the three countries met yesterday at another of a long series of meetings of the combined food board. But they failed again to agree on what each should do in the way of contributing wheat and flour to famine-stricken areas.

Secretary of Agriculture Anderson has ready an order to cut American supplies of flour 25 percent, but he is withholding his signature ending further efforts of the three countries to agree on joint relief efforts.

The American government is taking the position that the major burden is falling upon this country and that Canada and Great Britain could contribute more than they have offered.

Meanwhile, as the White House announced that President Truman will discuss the food crisis in a radio address at 7:15 p. m. (EST) tomorrow night, the chief executive's family emergency committee called upon the government to adopt still more rigid food conservation measures.

AGED Veteran Takes Benefits Of GI Bill

Gulfport, Miss., April 18.—(AP)—Drew Hasty, 69, has been approved for radio schooling under the GI Bill of Rights, the American Legion service office here said, and pointed out he's served with the Army in the Philippines Insurrection in 1901, joined the Navy in 1902, and served through World War I. Retired as chief commissary steward in 1930, he was recalled to duty April 2, 1942, and served until November 2, 1944.

Justices Take Office In New World Court

The Hague, April 18.—(AP)—A new court of international justice came into being today at the seat of the old world court and José Guerrero of El Salvador, president, expressed hope that international loyalty to the principle of peaceful settlement of differences would make the new tribunal succeed.

The black-robed, white-bibbed justices, representing 14 of the United Nations, took their oaths of office in a ceremony at the peace palace at the Hague only a few hours before the League of Nations, of which the old world court was a part, was to expire at Geneva.

U. S. Agrees To Full Recognition Of Tito

Washington, April 18.—(AP)—The United States has agreed to full diplomatic recognition of the Tito government of Yugoslavia, the State Department announced today.

The announcement was made after assurances had been received from Yugoslavia that it accepts existing treaties between the two countries.
