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Palestine's Future
Is In British Hands

Anglo-American Committee's Report Not Binding On U. Or Britain; New Jewish Nor Arabic Factions Pleased Over Report; Arabs Warn Of New Unrest

Washington, May 1.—(AP)—The explosive-packed recommendation that 100,000 persecuted Jews be admitted to Palestine at once ticked away ominously today on Britain's doorstep.

In dropping it there, the official Anglo-American committee on Palestine held at the same time that the strife-torn Holy Land must become "neither a Jewish state nor an Arab state."

Immediate reaction to the committee's proposal for the British mandate ranged from qualified Jewish approval of the emergency plan to a blistering indictment from Arab leaders.

In Jerusalem, where there long have been repeated outbreaks of bloody violence, the Arab office said the report would intensify this strife and drive "the entire Middle East into the bosom of Soviet Russia."

The Arab statement termed the recommendations "high treason to democracy and a grave betrayal of justice."

In London, the Jewish agency for Palestine pledged cooperation with the plan to admit 100,000 Jews now but protested that the document left untouched the central problem of stateless Jews in Europe. The number of these has been placed by Jewish spokesmen at more than 1,000,000.

The problem presented by the report—which climaxed a four-month investigation—is primarily one for Britain to handle because that country since 1922 has held a League of Nations mandate over Palestine.

There was no provision in the joint inquiry committee's instructions making its recommendations binding upon either Britain or the United States. But the report's official status assured it before acceptance or rejection of full dress airing in the halls of both Congress and Commons.

The committee's action was taken against the immediate background of President Truman's request six months ago for emergency immigration of 100,000 homeless Jewish victims of Axis persecution—a request later rejected by Prime Minister Clement Attlee of Britain. The two

Spanish Exiles
Offer Evidence

New York, May 1.—(AP)—Spanish Republicans' charges of wholesale imprisonments and tortures in Barcelona, where the 1939 Franco victory monument was blown up by unidentified persons yesterday, were offered today to the United Nations Security Council's subcommittee on Spain.

As the subcommittee prepared to meet privately to tackle a pile of documents, Spanish Republican observers here produced a cable from their exiled Prime Minister, Jose Giral, alleging that 500 persons were jailed and mistreated in Andalusia.

The Spanish Republicans already have contributed documents placed before the subcommittee, which was named by the Security Council to determine from available membership files and by further inquiry whether Spain is a threat to peace.

The previous evidence from the exiled Republicans was incorporated into the long arraignment of Franco Spain by Polish delegate Oscar Lange in his original demand for an immediate U. N. breach of diplomatic relations with Madrid.

Washington, May 1.—(AP)—Palestine, in the news again, still is an open wound for Jews and Arabs. Here is an ABC explanation—a bare outline—of the problem.

Palestine, about as big as the state of Vermont, was the ancient home of the Jews.

The Jews, like the Arabs, were Semitic people, desert-dwellers. But Palestine, in that Middle-Eastern world, was as busy as Broadway and 42nd Street.

It was a highway across which the armies of ancient Egypt and Assyrians thundered. The Greeks moved in. The Romans moved in. The Jews were dispersed.

Scattered, persecuted, locked in ghettos, slaughtered, the Jews dreamed of their ancient homeland. The dream never died.

In 1897 the Zionist organization was formed—Zion is another word for Jerusalem—and then began the real fight for Palestine as a Jewish

Mrs. Keel And Mrs. Haney First Passengers From Greenville

A five-passenger Cessna Airliner left the Greenville airport this morning at 7:52 for points west and Asheville as its destination, with Capt. Bob Curry of Selma, Ala., at the controls, marking the inauguration of regular air service scheduled for Greenville.

The plane left Morehead City at 7 a. m. with a shipment of live crabs for Governor Gregg Cherry from Tony Seamon.

The first Greenville passengers were Mrs. Rufus V. Keel and Mrs. H. Glenn Haney, who were bound for Raleigh—maybe a round-trip if the two aviation enthusiasts liked air travel.

Mrs. Keel and Mrs. Haney enjoyed the flight so much they remained on their plane at Raleigh and went on to Burlington, where they arrived at 9:15 this morning. They caught the same plane at Burlington this afternoon at 4:37 for the return to Greenville.

Rev. Hayes Clark, Presbyterian minister of Greenville, boarded the airliner at Greensboro this afternoon at 4:40 on its return flight. He was the first passenger from Greensboro. The airliner with the three Greenville air tourists will arrive at the airport here this evening at 6:15.

The airliner makes stops at Wilson, Raleigh-Durham, Chapel Hill, Burlington, Greensboro, Winston-Salem, Statesville, Hickory and Asheville. The airline provides cargo as well as passenger service. The planes make connections with all through airlines passing through the state.

Quota System For Packers Is Last Effort To Control Meat Black Market

Washington, May 1.—(AP)—Secretary of Agriculture Anderson said today during a discussion of meat shortage and black market conditions that if the situation is not cleared up in 90 days, he would favor removal of price controls on meat.

Anderson said, however, he is pinning hopes on the success of new slaughter quotas for packers and on the campaign against black market dealers in meat.

"This is about the last effort to see if it (meat control) will work," he told the Senate Banking Committee in hearings on OPA extension.

He added he "would hate to see" controls on meat lifted "until we have again made a serious effort."

Senator Bankhead (D-Ala.) asked what Anderson would consider a reasonable period for a fair test.

"We would have to do something in 90 days or abandon it," the secretary replied.

Anderson had said earlier that if meat ceilings were lifted now that pork might go to 70 cents a pound.

The Advisory Board of the Office of War Mobilization and Reconversion unanimously urged today that the life of OPA be extended for a period not to exceed one year.

Reconversion Director John W. Snyder released a resolution adopted by the board as Secretary of Agriculture Anderson told the Senate Banking Committee that increased farm real estate prices are "a strong argument for holding onto price control."

The resolution said termination of price control must be brought about without unnecessary delay and in an orderly manner.

But it added that it is "convicted" that to abandon price control on June 30, 1946, would leave the nation unprotected against a dangerous rise in prices in the interval before normal economic forces are working.

Another Advisory Board resolution recommended creation within OPA, at a high executive level, of an expedient committee to handle all applications on which a decision has been delayed for 30 days.

Anderson testified that a contributing factor in the rise of rural

NAVY SHIP IS
A TOTAL LOSS

Three Explosions Leave Destroyer Escort A Blackened Hulk

Earle, N. J., May 1.—(AP)—The destroyer escort Solar, its bow ripped off and twisted grotesquely over the 306-foot warship by the force of three explosions, lay blackened and a total loss today alongside the U. S. Navy's huge Earle ammunition depot pier in lower New York Bay.

Five crew members were reported missing and 150 injured, five critically, in the explosions yesterday which detonated an ammunition-laden railroad car on the pier, destroyed a pier-based warehouse, set fire to the pier itself and left a gaping hole in the concrete structure which juts two and a half miles into the bay.

The explosions occurred in rapid-fire order shortly before noon yesterday while the Solar was unloading ammunition at the pier—longest of its kind in the world. The Earle Navy ammunition depot built in 1943 on the thinly populated shores of Sandy Hook Bay is the largest naval munitions storehouse in the east.

Some eyewitness accounts said the first blast took place when a "hedgehog" went off in the hands of a seaman. (A "hedgehog" is a depth charge used against submarines and is a cylinder about 30 inches long and 4 to 5 inches in diameter.) The seaman was slightly injured but the man ahead was either killed or badly wounded, fireman Jack Horne of Charlotte, N. C., said.

Dr. Martha M. Eliot, associate chief of the Labor Department's Children's Bureau, urged to the Senate Labor Committee that Congress act favorably on national health legislation, including a compulsory insurance program.

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STALIN WARNS
OF A NEW WAR

Generalissimo Urges Stronger Armed Forces In May Day Speech

London, May 1.—(AP)—Generalissimo Stalin warned Russians celebrating their May Day holiday today against forces of international reaction which he said are hatching plans of a new war, and urged the strengthening of the Soviet's armed forces to guard the peace.

"The armed forces of the Soviet Union—our land troops, air forces and navy—discharged their duty to the country in the great patriotic war," he declared in an order of the day broadcast last night by the Moscow radio and recorded in London.

"Now our armed forces are faced with a task of no less importance—vigilantly to guard the peace which was won and the constructive labor of the Soviet people, to be the reliable bulwark of the interest of the Soviet Union."

"The successful accomplishment of this honorable task is possible only on condition of further growth of military culture and military skill of the officers and the men of our army, our navy and our aviation."

Stalin urged Russian workers to reach and even exceed the goals set in the nation's new five-year plan.

"Developing peaceful socialist construction," Stalin's order declared, "we should not forget for a minute the intrigues of international reaction, which is hatching plans of a new war. It is necessary to remember the teachings of the

Washington, May 1.—(AP)—The proposed big four 25-year agreement to keep Germany impotent for war aroused Senate inquiries today about how long American troops are expected to remain in Europe and what future is planned for the German people.

The proposal advanced by Secretary of State Byrnes at the Paris conference met generally favorable reaction, although Senator Wheeler (D-Mont.) said he doubted substantial American forces can be kept in Germany for 25 years.

"However," he told a reporter, "if we can relieve Russia's fears of aggression on the part of Germany to the extent that the Soviets will withdraw their troops and permit independent governments to be set up in the Baltic and Balkan states it would mean a tremendous lot

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BRITISH LOAN
CALLED WORLD
WIDE W. P. A.

Loan Opponents Plan Move To Sweep Bill Out Of Senate Without Vote

Washington, May 1.—(AP)—Senator Brooks (R-Ill.) announced to the Senate today he will vote against the \$3,750,000,000 British loan, terming it a "world wide W. P. A. project that will lower our American standards of living."

The Illinois senator, a veteran of World War I, declared in a prepared speech that he expected to be called "anti-British."

"I am not pro-British," he said. "I am pro-American and I am proud of it."

Brooks' criticism of the loan legislation came as opponents planned a parliamentary move which they hoped might sweep the loan legislation out of the Senate without a vote on the bill itself.

Senator Brooks told his colleagues he was in "good company" in opposing the loan and said these had the same views:

"Jesse Jones, who loaned more money than any individual in history, Leo Crowley, able administrator of the Export-Import Bank, and Mr. (Bernard) Baruch, adviser to presidents x x x."

"I do not question the right of the Russian people to live under and support their Communist form of government," Brooks concluded. "I do not question the right of the British people to adopt and sustain a socialist form of government, but I do question the right of those entrusted to sustain our representative form of government to dissipate the resources of the American

Prolonged Occupation Program Rouses Senate Inquiries

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Big Four Refuse
Austrian Demand

MERGE CRITIC
GIVES VIEWS

Forrestal Addresses Senate Naval Committee On Defense Policy

Washington, April 30.—(AP)—Secretary of the Navy Forrestal declared today that the current proposal to merge the army and the navy into a single department of defense is based on a major promise which is false.

He told the Senate Naval Committee that the navy is solidly behind a program of practical improvement in the coordination of the armed services, but criticized sharply details of the present merger plan.

Pending legislation that the committee is considering, he said, fails to differentiate between unified command in combat areas and the planning functions at the seat of the government which require deliberation and conference.

"In other words," he continued, "it fails to differentiate between single command such as is necessary in the face of the enemy, and the democratic processes and procedures which are the basis of our government at home."

While conceding the need of coordinating research, logistics, training and intelligence functions of the army and navy, he opposed

Paris, May 1.—(AP)—Soviet Foreign Minister Vyacheslav M. Molotov and U. S. Secretary of State James F. Byrnes clashed in the question of the future allied control of Italy today as the foreign ministers' council turned thumbs down on Austria's plea for return of the Southern Tyrol by Italy.

A qualified conference source said the Soviet minister sharply opposed Byrnes' proposal for a single general commission to supervise the carrying out of the Italian treaty provisions on the ground that it would be an infringement of Italian sovereignty.

Byrnes was said to have retorted it was no more of an infringement than the treaty itself.

Molotov reversed the Soviet policy followed at last September's council meeting at which the Russians voted with their colleagues to set up only military control commissions.

At this morning's session, over which he presided, Molotov came out in favor of no commission at all.

The ministers were discussing the last of 11 points of disagreement over the Italian treaty.

The ministers decided to hold their next meeting tomorrow morning and to cancel a scheduled session this afternoon. Their deputies will meet this afternoon to set an agenda.

A conference source said both sessions tomorrow probably would be devoted to attempts to clear up minor points of difference on the Italian treaty.

In considering the Austrian-Italian border question, the deputies decided that the Austrian request for return of the South Tyrol, ceded to Italy after the first World War, was a major frontier rectification which the council has decided against last September. The question arose at the meeting of the ministers yesterday whether the request was a major or minor border change and the matter was handed over to the deputies.

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The ministers clashed sharply yesterday on two Italian border questions, with Russia supporting a Yugoslav demand for Trieste and most of the Istrian peninsula against the opposition of Britain, France and the United States; and opposing an Austrian request for annexation of the South Tyrol.

U. S. Secretary of State James F. Byrnes, seconded by British Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin, took Austria's part with a suggestion that the conference consider as "minor" the border rectifications involved in Vienna's demand for return of

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White Hall, Ill., May 1.—(AP)—Sugar sold for \$1 a pound at a sale here of the household effects of the late Dr. George Walker, who died last month.

Six pounds of sugar, stored in two jars, were sold for \$6, approximately 15 times the market value.

Auctioneer N. B. Allen said under certain conditions OPA price ceilings do not apply to sales for disposal of personal belongings.

The round-table conference which is assembling at Simla in the Himalayas to deal with the question of India's independence from England must be counted as among the most fateful of the numerous international parleys which are trying to iron out the problems of our troubled world.

The position is so delicate that a breath would change the balance. The trail to Simla winds back through long years, and it is marked with blood. Now representatives of the warring Indian political factions—the All-India Congress (largely comprised of Hindus) and the Moslem League—are to face each other across the table. With them will sit down the envoys of mother England who has agreed to give up the brightest jewel in her imperial crown.

An amicable agreement would be a boon not only to India's four hundred millions (one fifth of the

globe's population) but would remove a menace to peace. A failure might be catastrophic.

Upon the shoulders of two aging men rests the outcome in major degree. They are Mahatma Gandhi, 78, power behind the All-India Congress forces, and his political foe, Mahomed Ali Jinnah, 76, president of the Moslem League. If they can reconcile their differences, there likely can be peace and freedom.

A compromise won't be easy, since Jinnah has been holding out for an independent Moslem state (Pakistan) and Gandhi has been equally insistent on a unified federal government. Both men are as stubborn as Missouri mules. Still the mere fact that these two old warriors finally are sitting down together gives hope—the not unlimited optimism—for previously it had been expected that Jinnah would demand the concession of Pakistan before even joining in a roundtable conference.

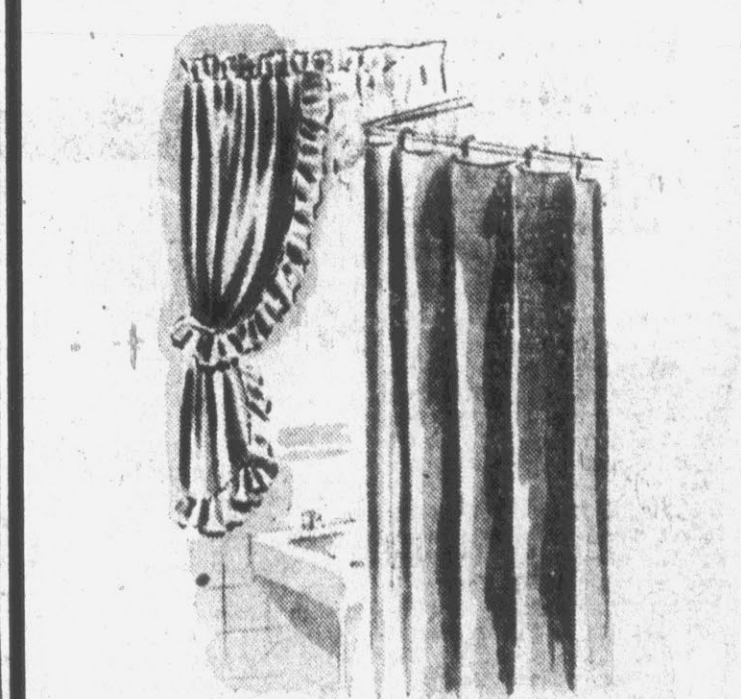

The situation became so alarming that Chief Tanner and City School Supt. June H. Rose talked with the school boys here and warned them against the man—the man is alleged to have molested him. He will be called upon to identify him.

When arrested in Wilson, Cannon was driving a grist mill truck. A Ford car he used some time ago was destroyed by fire, police said.

CONSISTENCY OF LIFE

A woman missionary in India was speaking one day to a group of native women. She was describing the Christian life and specifying the duties involved. She noticed a woman slip out of the meeting and ten minutes later return. When she asked the woman why she had left, she said: "I went out to talk with the man who works in your garden. I came back when he told me that you really do the things you are urging us to do."

Lord Cecil once said, "People watch what I do six days so that they will know what I mean on the seventh." If some people who attend church were suddenly to stop praising God and instead were to disclose the things they were thinking about and the plans they had for future action, the service of worship might be turned into something far different from what a church service is expected to be.

Of course, there is a lot of hypocrisy outside the church—in fact a great deal more outside than inside. People outside the church who point an accusing finger at weak and erring church members are usually trying to conceal something in their own lives vastly worse. But it is a fact that consistency in the Christian life is a rare achievement. Christ never said or even indicated that the discipleship to which he called men is easy, but he did teach that no sincere effort ever passes unnoticed before the eyes of God.

Let us not judge—either the apparent saint or the notorious sinner.

WASHINGTON DAYBOOK

Washington—Big Four of the Republican drive to capture the House of Representatives in the November elections are Reps. Joe Martin Jr., Mass.; B. (for Brazil) Carroll Reece, Tenn., new chairman of the GOP National Committee; Clarence J. Brown, Ohio, executive committee chairman; and Charles A. Halleck, Ind., chairman of the Republican Congressional committee.

Martin is minority floor leader. For the purpose of this article it is necessary to say only that in the party and out it's considered certain that he will be Speaker of the House should the Republicans gain the necessary 27 seats next fall to give them the 218 majority.

The others are the Three Musketeers of the Republican Old Guard in the House. They are close friends politically and socially.

Rep. Halleck is a veteran of House political leadership. When Rep. J. William Ditter, Pa., died in December, 1943, Halleck was handed the Congressional campaign committee chairmanship without much argument.

Both observers and party leaders say that he could have had the Republican National Committee chairmanship if he had wanted it. Both Brown and Reece would have backed him for that post. He didn't want it.

Many of the same observers and national committee members say Brown could have won the national chairmanship if he had made a run for it. Halleck and Reece would have backed him. He refused to run. Thus, the chore fell to Reece, and Brown and Halleck were behind him from start to finish.

The reasons for Halleck's and Brown's turning it down were the same:

1. Both are politically ambitious and feel that their aims will best be served by whittling away in the House. The Republican National Committee wanted a full-time man in the chairmanship, and neither Halleck nor Brown felt the sacrifice of his House seat advisable at this time.

2. Both men are pretty thoroughly convinced that the House is going Republican next November. If it does and stays that way for some years, both may have a shot at the coveted Speakership.

were Jews. In 1944 the population was 1,765,000, of which 554,000 were Jews. Thus the Jews still are outnumbered more than two to one.

Hitler began his ferocious persecution of the Jews. World War II began. European Jews were massacred.

The Jewish desire for a refuge in Palestine became stronger. Six months ago President Truman suggested 100,000 homeless Jews of Europe be admitted immediately to Palestine. Britain's Prime Minister Attlee didn't like the idea.

So four months ago a joint American-British committee was created to study the whole Palestinian problem. It heard all kinds of witnesses among the Jews and Arabs and took a great deal of testimony here and abroad.

There was massive Jewish evidence demanding that 100,000 Jews be allowed to enter Palestine immediately and that Palestine eventually become a Jewish state.

(This couldn't be done very well until the Jews outnumbered the Arabs which would mean in time a much vaster immigration than 100,000.)

Some Jews opposed the idea of a Jewish national state, as they have for years on these grounds: that they think the Jews should be assimilated by the peoples among whom they now are living.

Some Jews living in the Middle East expressed fear that their friendly relations with the Arabs are being endangered by Zionism.

The Arabs were opposed to further immigration of Jews or any suggestion that a Jewish state be created in Palestine. The Arabs told the committee they were not anti-semitic, since they are semitic people themselves.

But, the committee says, the Arabs passionately resent the invasion of Palestine by a people who although originally semitic, now represent an alien civilization.

Besides, the Arabs say, their claim to Palestine is stronger than that of the Jews for they have occupied it

for a thousand years.

The committee, in its report which considered many things suggested that Mr. Truman suggested: that 100,000 Jews be admitted to Palestine at once.

But the committee said Palestine should not be permitted to become either a Jewish or Arab state.

This immediately infuriated the Arabs on two counts: the proposed immigration of 100,000 Jews and the ban of the Arab state.

The Jews accepted the idea of 100,000 immigrants going to Palestine now but are not abandoning their fight for greater immigration.

Britain doesn't have to follow the committee's suggestion but if it does—the Arab world may flame against Britain and the Jews and turn to Russia, seeking support there.

If Britain doesn't follow the report, Jews in Palestine may riot against the British there misery and the Jews everywhere will be resentful. This much at least seems sure.

South Tyrol. Conference informants said that in previous discussions of the Italian-Austrian frontier the ministers had agreed that there would be no "major" changes in the Austrian border, but yesterday's argument arose on the question of whether the Tyrol revision was "major" or "minor."

Over Molotov's vigorous objections, the question was referred to the ministers' deputies for study and report. Bevin and Byrnes insisted that an Austrian representative be summoned to present Austria's side of the matter.

Conference sources said there were several sharp exchanges on the snarled Italian-Yugoslav border issue before the ministers finally agreed, at Molotov's insistence, that two Italian and two Yugoslav representatives be heard on the question Friday, thus postponing a decision until that time.

The committee is considering legislation to extend price controls a year beyond June 30. Anderson endorsed this—along with continuing consumer food price subsidies.

"The whole world food situation is and will continue to be so critical that it may not be safe to remove all subsidies before come time in 1947," he said.

On the surface, at least, there appeared no likelihood that the committee's recommendations would assuage either Jewish or Arabic factions. Obviously envisioning this, the committee said that if its report is accepted, the United States and Britain should:

Make it clear "beyond all doubt to both Jews and Arabs that any attempts from either side, by threats of violence, by terrorism, or by the organization or use of illegal armies to prevent its execution, will be resolutely suppressed."

In recommending against the Holy Land's becoming either an Arab or Jewish state, the committee said "the form of government ultimately to be established, shall, under international guarantees, fully protect and preserve the interests in the Holy Land of Christendom and of the Moslem and Jewish faiths."

"Palestine," it went on, "is not, and can never become, a land which any race or religion can justly claim as its very own."

Saying that any attempt to promote an independent Palestine at this time "would result in civil strife such as might threaten the peace of the world," the committee reached this conclusion:

"We therefore recommend that, until this hostility disappears, the government of Palestine be continued as at present under mandate pending the execution of a trusteeship agreement under the United Nations."

The parliamentary attack in the offing presented an unexpected threat to the loan bill. Senator Edwin C. Johnson (D-Colo.) told a reporter that within the next day or two he will move a point of order, a parliamentary maneuver which if sustained would bring Senate consideration of the loan to an immediate halt.

Johnson said he will contend that the bill under which Congress would approve the financial arrangements made with the British is a revenue-raising measure and, under the constitution, must be approved by the House before the Senate can act.

By custom, Johnson's point of order would go to a direct vote of the Senate without a ruling by the presiding officer because a constitutional question is involved. The point might, however, be a subject to lengthy debate itself.

JAP MAY DAY CELEBRATION IS PEACEFUL

Unions Demand Leftist Government; No Trace Of Would-Be Assassin

Tokyo, May 1.—(AP)—Organized labor used its occupation won freedom to voice a May Day threat of a general strike to support its demand for a leftist government.

Meantime, Japanese police and American forces searched for the fanatic accused of having plotted to assassinate General MacArthur at the height of today's celebration by an estimated 400,000 Japanese in front of the imperial palace.

It was Japan's first May Day celebration in 11 years and it passed quietly without a single reported act of violence.

Socialist Kanji Kato, in a labor committee conference with Premier Shidehara, said a nationwide walk-

out might be called if a single party cabinet was formed by the Rightist Liberals. The Liberal Party won 138 Diet seats in the recent election but failed to gain a majority.

"The people may rise against it," Kato told the premier. "This may take the form of a general strike. In that case, who is going to take the responsibility—your?"

Shidehara, who resigned his cabinet nine days ago in an election aftermath, agreed to listen to the committee's demands—some voiced angrily—but declined to comment.

The conference followed the assembly which the American provost marshal estimated attracted 400,000 Japanese. The crowd, gathered just a block from MacArthur's headquarters, waved red banners, sang, and heard speeches demanding rights for workers. Then it dispersed in the rain to march through various sections of the capital while Kato's group went to confer with Shidehara.

Armed American soldiers circulated through the crowd, looking for Hideo Tokuyama, accused by MacArthur's headquarters of having plotted to kill him with grenades and pistols at the height of today's celebration. An informant now in American custody told MacArthur's aides of the plot.

MacArthur's military secretary and officers in his counter-intelligence and criminal investigation divisions reported in mid-afternoon that there were no developments in

Memorial poppies to be worn in honor of the dead of both world wars will be distributed on the streets throughout the day by volunteer workers from the auxiliary and cooperating organizations. Contributions received in exchange for the flowers will be used in relief and rehabilitation work for disabled veterans, their families and the families of the dead.

Extensive preparations for Poppy Day are being made by the Legion Auxiliary Unit under the direction of Mrs. Louis Harrison, poppy chairman. The volunteer workers are being organized into teams and assigned to locations in the downtown area. Residence and factory areas also will be covered to give everyone an opportunity to pay tribute to the war dead by wearing a memorial flower.

The poppies have been ordered from Fayetteville Hospital where they are being made by disabled veterans of both wars, working under the direction of the North Carolina Department of the American Legion Auxiliary. They are crepe paper replicas of the European wild poppy which bloomed on the battlefields of France and Belgium in both wars and which has become a worldwide symbol of remembrance of America's battle dead.

Poppies will be more generally worn this year than ever before. Mrs. Worsley predicted. "With peace restored and the men coming home," she said, "everyone will want to pay tribute to those who can never come back to us by wearing a poppy in their honor on Poppy Day."

The 400,000 soft coal miners have been on strike since April 1.

Lewis yesterday filed notice that the 75,000 Pennsylvania hard coal miners would follow suit, and for approximately the same demands in 30 days, if a contract is not written before then.

Meanwhile, with Lewis showing no signs of retreat from his demand for a health and welfare fund for his workers, two members of Congress came forward with similar bills designed to block any royalty payments by the operators to such a fund.

Reps. Robertson and Howard Smith, both Virginia Democrats said they expected strong backing from southern Democrats and Republicans who supported the recently enacted anti-Petrillo bill.

Their measures are patterned after the same measure but would be broader in scope to bring in Lewis and other labor leaders as well as the head of the American Federation of Musicians.

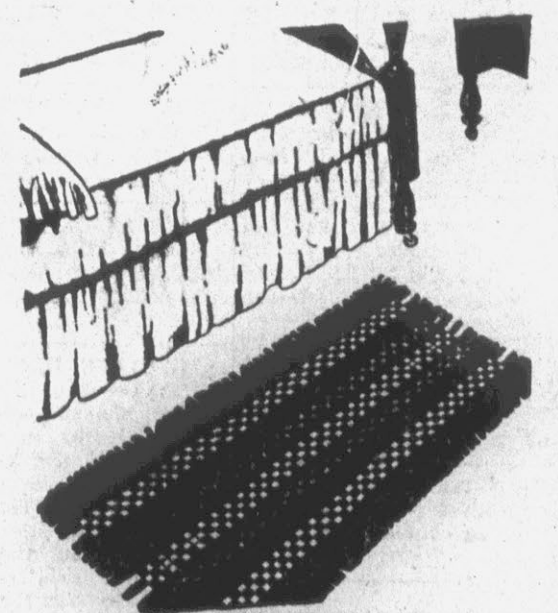

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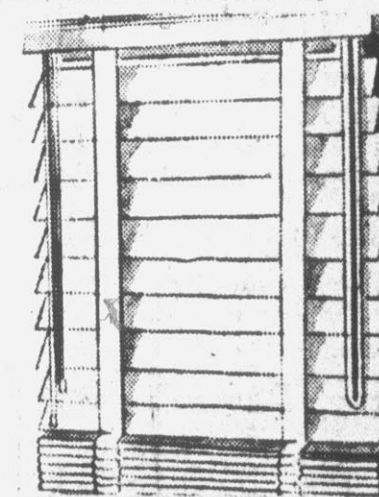
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
