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Security Council
Is Given Report

Iranian Ambassador Declares Conditions In Azerbaijan Make It Impossible To Verify Complete Soviet Withdrawal; Future Council Actions Awaited

New York, May 7.—(AP)—The United Nations Security Council was presented with a new report today in the form of a statement by Iranian Ambassador Hussein Ala that the situation in Azerbaijan province had made it impossible for his government to verify whether all Soviet troops had been withdrawn from Iran by yesterday's deadline.

In a communication addressed to Secretary General Trygve Lie, Ala said investigation by responsible officials of the Iranian government showed that all Red army troops had left the four northern provinces of Khorasan, Gorgan, Mazandaran and Gilan as scheduled.

He added, however, that his government could not ascertain the situation in Azerbaijan because it has been unable to exercise effective authority there since November 7, 1945, due to Soviet interference concerning which Iran previously complained to the Security Council. Ala's report left in doubt the action the council will take when it reconvenes tomorrow with the Iranian case on the agenda. The absence of any further word from the Iranian government the question of whether the case should be closed out or pursued further may depend on independent information, which official British and American sources can produce concerning the situation in Iran.

Under a Soviet-Iranian agreement concluded on April 5, Russia promised to have all her troops out of Iran by May 6 and recognized the situation in Azerbaijan province as an internal problem for the Iranian government to settle. Negotiations now are proceeding in Tehran between Iranian authorities and representatives of a self-proclaimed Azerbaijan autonomous government set up during the Russian occupation of the province.

Up to this morning no report had been received from Russia as to whether she had carried out her part of the agreement by removing all troops from Iran on schedule. It was presumed that Soviet Delegate Gromyko would boycott the council session tomorrow in accordance with his statement last week after failing to have the Iranian case removed from the agenda.

The Spanish foreign office last night issued a flat denial of charges that Spain has become a refuge for German Nazis and a custodian of Nazi funds. Its statement was given to U. S. Charge D'Affaires Philip Bonsal in Madrid but it had not been received by the Security Council.

Newsmen Freed From
Changchun Custody

Mukden, May 7.—(AP)—Five American correspondents who had been held in protective custody by Communists in Changchun three weeks were flown into Mukden today in a special U. S. plane.

The five were in Changchun when that Manchurian capital city fell to the Communists and had been held there since.

AGREEMENT ON
ROMANIA PACT

Many Questions Yet Unsolved; Discussion Of Bulgarian Treaty Is Next

Paris, May 7.—(AP)—The Foreign Ministers Council agreed today to grant Romania her 1938 boundaries with Hungary and Bulgaria, but adjourned in complete disagreement on questions of Danube navigation and freedom of access to the Black Sea country, a British source said today.

The boundary decision gave Transylvania, disputed by Hungary to Romania and restored the boundary as it existed before the Hitler and Mussolini dictated settlement at Vienna during the war. The decision also restored Dobruja, dis-Bulgaria, to Romania.

But the disposition of Bessarabia which was annexed by Russia at the time of the Romanian surrender in 1944 and which, in fact, had been occupied by the Russians in an independent settlement in 1940 before Romania entered the war, was not mentioned by the ministers.

The ministers scheduled a meeting for later today to start discussion of the Bulgarian treaty, which involves that country's request for cession of western Thrace by Greece and Bulgarian access to the Aegean Sea.

What was described as a bitter argument arose between British Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin and U. S. Secretary of State Byrnes at the one side and Foreign Minister Molotov of Russia on the other when Britain and America insisted on freedom of navigation of the Danube, vital commercial artery of southeastern Europe, and on freedom of trade for all nations in Romania.

Molotov said the Soviet delegation was not interested in discussing the matters and that the meeting was postponed.

Humber Addresses
Oak City Voters

Robert Lee Humber, Pitt County's candidate for Congress in the forthcoming Democratic Primary, May 25, was introduced last night by Don E. Johnson to a large and enthusiastic audience at the school auditorium in Oak City.

Mr. Humber's speech was directed at the farmers of the First District of North Carolina. He again promised that if he is elected he will bend all his efforts to raising the farmer to the economic stature of the industrialist; that this will be his program should he be sent to Congress.

Last Friday, Mr. Humber spoke in Perquimans County at the courthouse in Hertford. In spite of a heavy rain the court-room was filled with a representative cross-section of the county's interested voters. W. G. Newby, town clerk of Hertford, and former secretary to the late Congressman Small, later said that he had heard some of the nation's finest orators, but that Mr. Humber's speech was the greatest he had ever heard in all of his life.

Jack Edwards, Greenville attorney, who was present in Hertford, his former residence, interviewed large numbers of the citizens and found overwhelming support for Mr. Humber among the voters.

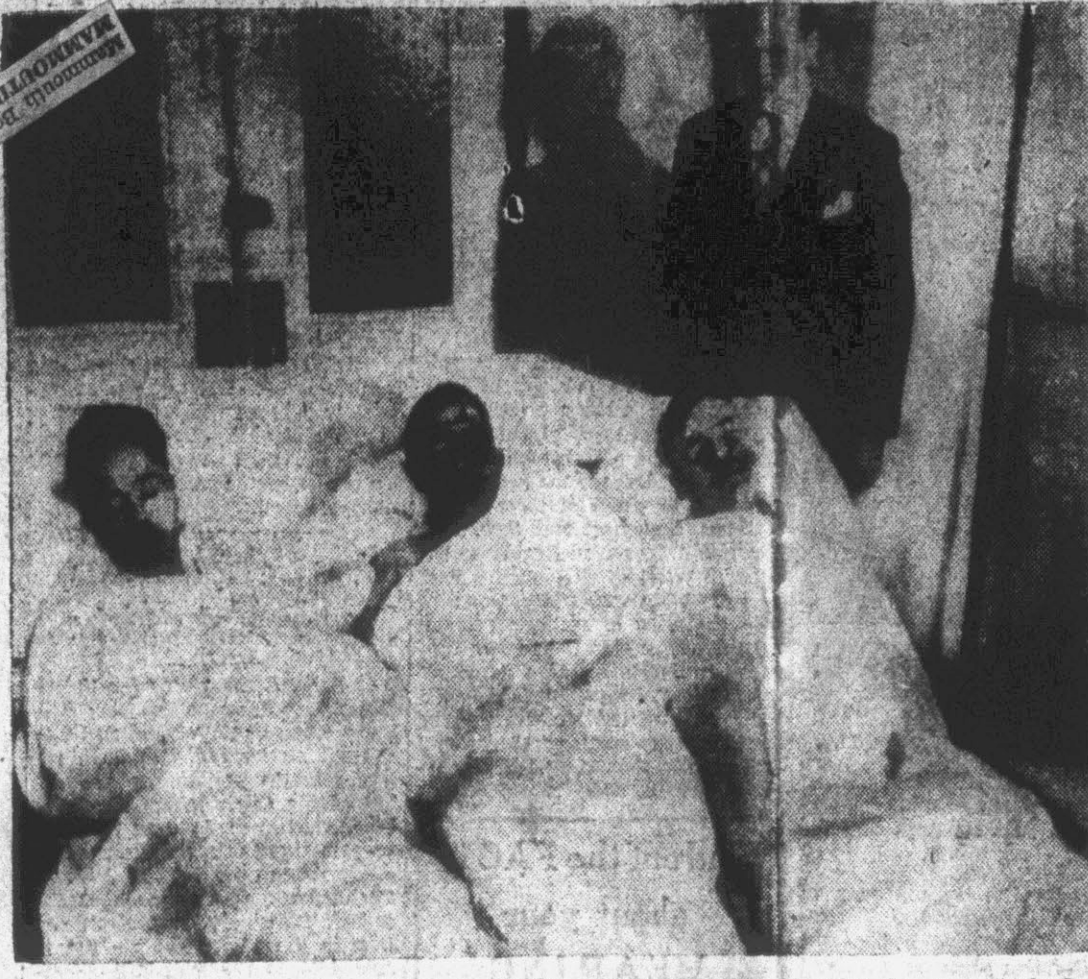

Gloomy Forecast Made
On Clothing Scarcity

Shortage In Men's Suits May Go Into 1948, Predicts CPA Head; Expects No Slackening In Demand For Many Months

Washington, May 7.—(AP)—CPA Chief John D. Small's gloomy forecast that men's suits may remain scarce into 1948 today overshadowed industry suggestions on how to increase output 10 to 30 percent.

The Civilian Production Administration slapped the government's cards on the table in observing to suit producers:

"Anything we do now can alleviate the situation and help meet the unprecedented demand for suits. However, if that demand continues it may be a year or two before the situation is normal again."

After Small made this statement to manufacturers yesterday, other CPA officials who withheld their names told reporters they expect no slackening in demand for many months.

In the face of this outlook, CPA

took time out to mull over manufacturers' recommendations for stepping up production quickly. At a meeting Thursday the agency will discuss further what to do about these problems outlined by producers.

1. An acute shortage of cotton fabric for pockets. CPA said manufacturers had reported lots of suits laying unfinished on shelves because we can't get pocket materials.

2. A shortage of rayon linings.
3. Need for more woolen and worsted cloth if full use is to be made of available manpower and machinery.

As for the latter point, CPA said manufacturers estimate they could jump suit production by two to six million suits a year if they had all the cloth they can use.

Inter-American Military System Is Asked By President

Washington, May 7.—(AP)—An inter-American military system streamlined into a closely knit and striking force appeared today to be President Truman's ultimate goal in asking Congress to perpetuate this country's wartime hemisphere role.

Such a force—entirely equipped with United States arms, its individual units organized along U. S. staff lines and led by officers trained in this country—would be ready for instant action against any future aggressor.

In asking specifically for a law to permit the U. S. to help train, organize and equip the armed forces of the American nations—including Canada—Mr. Truman emphasized yesterday that it is highly desirable to standardize military organization, training methods and

BRITISH ARMY
TO WITHDRAW

Great Britain Offers To Remove Her Troops From Egypt

Cairo, May 7.—(AP)—Great Britain proposed today to withdraw all her armed forces from Egyptian territory and entrust to the armies of King Farouk the defense of a strategic area on the lifeline of the empire which British troops have occupied since 1882.

The British embassy, announcing the offer to take all military, naval and air forces from Egypt, said the move was preliminary to negotiations for revision of the 1936 Anglo-Egyptian treaty of alliance.

The announcement, made with the concurrence of Egyptian Premier Ismail Sidki Pasha, said arrangements are to be made by the Egyptian government to make possible in time of war or imminent threat of war mutual assistance in accord with the treaty.

Withdrawal from Egypt would remove the British forces nearest the Suez Canal, a link in the British supply line to India, Australia, Malaya and New Zealand. Other British forces, however, are stationed north and east of the canal in Palestine, Trans-Jordan and Iraq. These forces include all branches of the services in Palestine, personnel serving with the Arab Legion in Transjordan and RAP bases west of the Euphrates River in Iraq.

A Review Of Your Government In Action

Washington, May 7.—(AP)—Administration criticized the administration in the House today for the coal strike deadlock.

Rep. Case (R-SD) who sponsored a broad anti-strike bill, told his colleagues that a report that the White House "says it can do nothing about the coal strike is the sorriest confession of unfitness that has come from a national administration in history." In revised form, Case's bill is pending in the Senate.

Other legislative activity:

1. The House Appropriations Committee recommended a cut of nearly 50 percent in funds for the Interior Department for next fiscal year, approving \$174,652,579.

2. A group of doctors and scientists urged the House Foreign Affairs Committee to approve legislation to provide \$100,000,000 for a government-sponsored cancer control program.

3. Treasury Secretary Vinson urged a continuation of price controls a year beyond June 30, telling the Senate Banking Committee that their early abandonment would wipe out the people's savings and bring on a "disastrous depression."

New Terms Given
To John L. LewisSites Of The Surrender To Our
Armies Observe First Anniversary

Reims, May 7.—(AP)—The city of Reims, where one year ago today Col. Gen. Gustav Jodl scratched his name on a document which sent the European phase of World War II into the archives of history, observed the first anniversary of the surrender quietly—with too few soldiers in town to hold a parade.

The citizens and soldiers observed the day mainly by visiting the surrender room in the "Little Red Schoolhouse," the former "War Room" of supreme headquarters, Allied Expeditionary Forces, which has become a French national shrine and a place where visitors may absorb a bit of the atmosphere of the historical events which occurred in it.

The room has been preserved exactly as it was at the moment of the German capitulation.

In the center of the room is a long, scarred and begrimed table where the historic surrender document was signed. Placed around it

are 13 straight-backed wooden chairs, with placards showing who occupied them.

Unless the visitor looks closely he is apt to miss a piece of paper pasted on the wall near a row of windows. The paper is the "to secret" War Room daily summary, No. 335. It reads:

"Surrender. The German government surrendered unconditionally at Reims, France, at 241 hours 7 May 1945. The instrument of surrender was signed by Lt. Gen. W. Bedell Smith for the supreme commander and by General Oberst Gustav Jodl for the German government. Maj. Gen. Ivan Susloparov signed as representative of the Russians, and Gen. Francois Sevez as representative of the French government. Hostilities officially cease at 2301 hours, Central European Time."

Outside the War Room in the red brick vocational school there is little to remind the visitor of the hustle and bustle of Allied headquarters a year ago.

Government Submits
To Soft Coal Union
Chief New Proposition
To Settle Mine
Strike; Terms Un-
disclosed; Wartime
"Brownout" Threat-
ens Cities Of Nation

Washington, May 7.—(AP)—The government submitted to John L. Lewis and soft coal operators today a proposition for settling the 37-day-old mine strike. The terms of the proposal were not immediately disclosed.

Lewis, president of the United Mine Workers, will take the proposal before the union's 250-man Policy Committee meeting at 2:30 p. m. (EST). The operators went into an immediate session to discuss the formula.

The proposal was advanced by Federal Conciliator Paul W. Fuller who declined to disclose its terms. (In New York, Edward F. McGrady, a special mediator in the coal negotiations, said he hoped there might be a settlement very shortly.)

Contract negotiations between the miners and operators were recessed until tomorrow to permit further study of the proposal.

It was reported by those inside the conference that Fuller's proposal was his own and did not originate at yesterday's White House conference of President Truman, Secretary of Labor Schwelb, Reconversion Director Snyder and White House Assistant John R. Steilman.

More and more of the nation's cities were threatened with a return to wartime "brownouts" today as effects of the 37-day-old soft coal strike forced stringent rationing of disappearing fuel supplies.

Chicago, Washington and Philadelphia already were plunged into partial darkness. Detroit was expected to brownout officially tomorrow night after City Council meets to pass an emergency ordinance dimming lights in the automobile capital.

In Virginia, the State Corporation Commission yesterday ordered rationing of electric power in the territories of the Virginia Electric and Power Co., and the Braddock Light and Power Co. effective midnight Thursday.

Virginia electric supplies territory from Alexandria to North Carolina, east to Norfolk and west almost to Lynchburg.

At the same time, an official of the Cincinnati Gas and Electric Co., predicted a brownout in the greater Cincinnati area by the end of the month if the strike does not soon end.

In New York, refrigeration company officials predicted a scandalous loss if the coal shortage causes curtailment of electric power to refrigerate 300 million pounds of perishable food stored there.

The Illinois Manufacturers Association estimated pay checks of some 1,000,000 persons would be reduced 20 million dollars and manufacturing would be reduced 10 per cent.

Business Concerns
Penalized By OPA

Raleigh, May 7.—The OPA announced today that five more North Carolina concerns had settled government trouble damage claims for overreaching charges in the sale of building materials, including shingles, cement, plaster and roofing, by paying a total of \$625 in penalties to the treasury of the United States.

Theodore S. Johnson, State OPA director, said the largest settlement was made by the Hardware Store, Incorporated, of Siler City, which paid the treasurer \$200 for total overcharges of \$20.67 on eight sales, which included plaster, cement, roofing and shingles. Other settlements:

The Cash Sales Company, of Beaufort, paid the treasurer \$150 in settlement of overcharges on three sales of cement, the penalty being at the rate of \$50 for each overcharge.

North Side Lumber Company, of Greenville, paid \$100 for total overcharges of \$13.78 on four sales which included gypsum, guaging plaster, shingles and cement.

C. E. Stephens, of Kenansville, paid \$100 representing \$50 penalty on each of two sales of cement and roofing.

The Almarance Lumber Company, of Burlington, paid \$75 penalty for total overcharges of \$13.28 on three sales of presswood.

An Analysis Of The News

The French referendum, resulting in the rejection of the leftist-supported draft of the new constitution proposed for the republic, is one of the most important of the recent political developments in Europe. It represents a major (though not necessarily decisive) battle in the war between Communists and the more conservative elements for control of France. The Reds and their allies, the extreme left socialists, have lost this engagement to the conservative "popular Republican movement" supported by right-wing socialists.

You get the real import of this clash when you pause to consider that France is one of the Big Four and that, with Germany and Italy knocked out, she is the only great power left on the continent with the exception of Russia. No wonder England, sitting just across the

channel from France and highly allergic to Communism, has her fingers tightly crossed.

She had better keep them crossed, too, for another great French political fight is in the offing. Since the constitution has been rejected, another constituent assembly must be elected on June 2 to prepare a fresh draft, and the Communists then will go all-out to capture the legislature.

How will the election go? Having spent considerable time in France recently I'm sure that any prediction would be rash. Under normal circumstances it would be safe to say that the more conservative elements would win, because basically France, with its great agricultural population, is conservative.

However, there aren't normal circumstances. France is badly hurt physically, economically and morally. Thousands upon thousands of

LT. Comdr. Williams has been attached to the decommissioning subgroup in Portland, Oregon, since November, 1945, and his wife resides at 710 Ward street, Greenville, North Carolina. He was formerly a resident of San Antonio, Texas.

Social Security

In the area serviced by the Rocky Mount office of the Social Security Board there are now 2,041 persons receiving monthly benefit checks totaling \$26,653.57, under Old-Age and Survivors Insurance provisions of the Social Security Act.

Beneficiaries in the 16 counties of this service area include: 465 retired workers and their wives who have reached age 65; 77 widows 65 years old or over; 220 widows with children in their care; 1,000 children; 9 aged parents who were dependent upon a deceased son or daughter at the time of the wage-earner's death.

Mr. Marshall H. Barney, manager of the Rocky Mount, N. C. office of the Social Security Board, explained that when a fully insured wage-earner who is 65 years old or more, files claim for his monthly old-age insurance benefits, his wife may also claim monthly benefits, if she is 65 years old or when she reaches that age. In addition, each of his children under age 16 (18, if in school) will receive monthly benefits except that the benefits, for the entire family may not be more than twice the amount of the retired wage-earner's own monthly payment.

When an insured worker dies, leaving a widow with his children in her care, monthly payments of survivors insurance are made to his widow and to his children under age 16 (18 if in school). This will be paid regardless of the age of the widow. An insured worker's widow who has reached age 65 is eligible for benefits whether or not she has a child in her care.

Where the insured wage-earner dies and leaves no survivor entitled to monthly benefits, a lump-sum death payment is made to the widow or children or parents of the deceased, or to the person who paid the burial expenses.

Lump-sum payments amounting to \$12,439.83 have been made in this area from 7-1-45 through 12-31-45.

Nurses Placement Service Is Opened

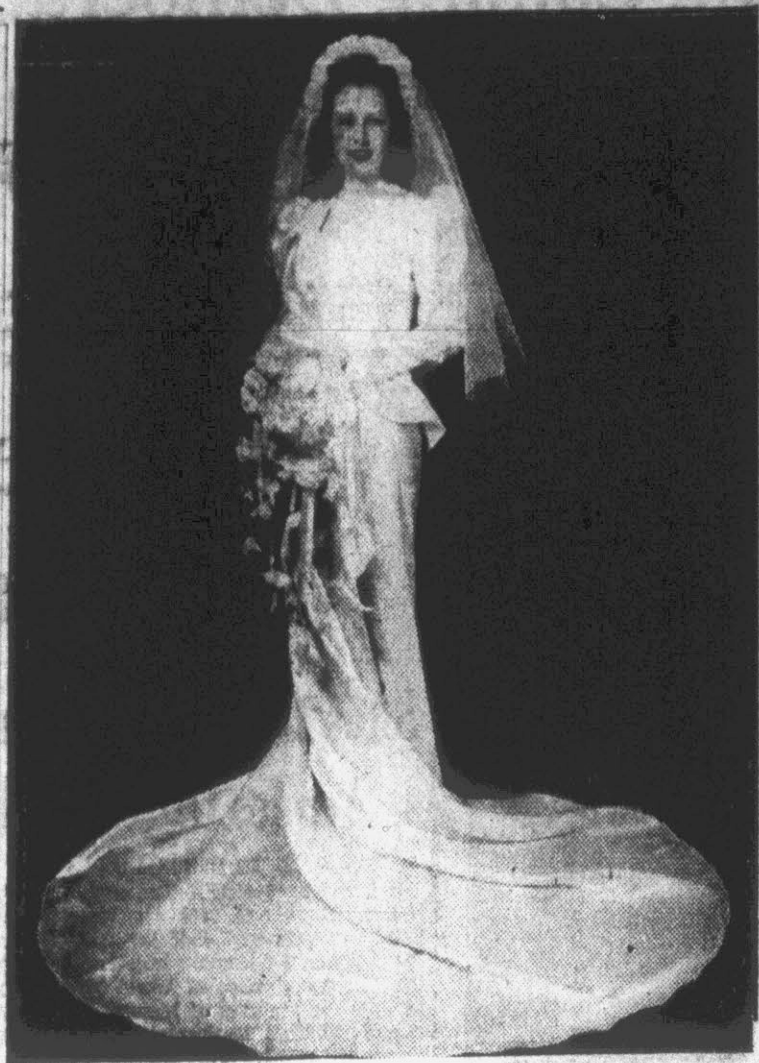

The selection of locations is based upon the location of pre-war Naval Reserve units and survey of present Naval Establishments and wartime centers of Naval interests and activity.

The factors considered in providing armories are (1) size of unit (2) navigable waters present, and (3) suitable facilities already available. For units of more than three divisions, a large type armory is proposed; for units of three or less divisions, a quonset hut type. If a small unit is on navigable water either a vessel of the inactive fleet or a dry basin vessel is proposed to take the place of an armory thus furnishing practical and realistic instruction facilities at a minimum cost. In coastal waters it is proposed that vessels of the Reserve fleet be used for underway and operational training and that vessels of the inactive fleet be used to supplement

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armory training programs. In addition, if a unit is located on navigable waters but inland or in a location where it is not practicable to use reserve fleet vessels, it is proposed that a small vessel be provided for underway and operational training.

Joe Cronin's critics must be hard up for ammunition today with the

Boston Red Sox winging away to an 11-game winning streak and topping the American League by three lengths.

Cronin's gang is the hottest thing in baseball this springtime season with the sluggers beating out a .316 team average during the victory spree and 10 of 11 starting pitchers going the route.

The letdown may be terrific later on, for the Sox haven't been far from home during the first three weeks of the campaign. However, they have proved to be a well balanced club, and have come up with a little more pitching than was expected.

Tex Hughson, Dave Ferriss and Mickey Harris were supposed to carry the pitching load but an ex-GI named Joe Dobson, generally overlooked in the early calculations, has been taking the bows with Harris on a perfect 4-0 win record.

It was Dobson who handed Hal Newhouse his first loss of the season last week and it was the same 29-year-old righthander from Durant, Okla., who kept the win streak alive by winning yesterday's 5-4 second game from St. Louis after Ferriss had taken the opener, 7-5.

Although Cronin's managerial qualities were the subject of considerable debate during spring training, the personable Irishman has made few mistakes. George Metkovich, his choice to plug the right field gap, has been hitting hard. Rudy York, a doubtful factor at Sarasota, has regained some of his old power. Rookie Eddie Pellagrini has done a good job at third base, the third vulnerable spot in the Sox lineup.

Left fielder Ted Williams has been living up to all expectations with a .411 mark (.481 during the win streak), and shortstop Johnny Pesky leads the league with a gaudy .430. Center fielder Dominic DiMaggio and catcher Hal Wagner add their slugging to give Boston the first four hitters in the circuit.

The 11-game string is the longest since 1939 when Cronin's gang reeled off 12 in a row.

Boston gained a full game and a half on the New York Yankees who fell before Chicago's Thornton Lee, 2-1. Lee, a 38-year-old lefthander, came up with his first decision of the year on an eight-hit effort against Floyd Bevens, winning his own game with a two-run single.

Steve O'Neill of Detroit could find encouraging signs in Virgil Trucks' six-hit, 3-1 decision against Philadelphia. Jimmy Outlaw's homer helped the Tiger cause.

Walt Masterson's relief chucking enabled Washington to make 11 two straight over Cleveland 7-4, despite homers by Hank Edwards and Ken Keltner. Jeff Heath hit a two-run homer for the Nats in the fourth off loser Steve Gromek.

KIWANIANS ON MARCH AGAIN

District Governor Tells Inter-Club Meeting At Goldsboro

Kiwanians from nine Eastern Carolina towns celebrated "homecoming" night in Goldsboro last night when large delegations from clubs at Wilmington, Jacksonville, Swansboro, Kinston, Goldsboro, Greenville, Stantonsburg, Farmville and Wilson assembled at Hotel Goldsboro in the Wayne County metropolis to hear an inspiring message from Carolina's District Governor Jasper Hicks of Henderson.

Nearly 200 Kiwanians participated in the fellowship meeting which sparkled with more interest and enthusiasm than any group meeting since the war started.

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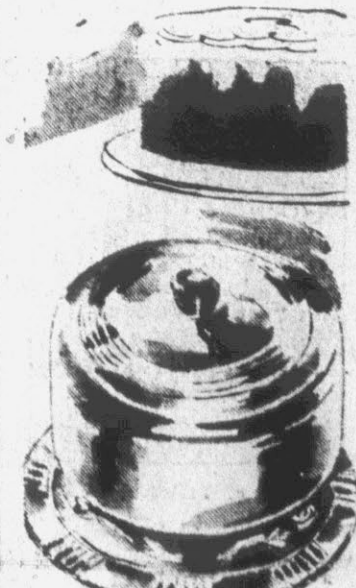

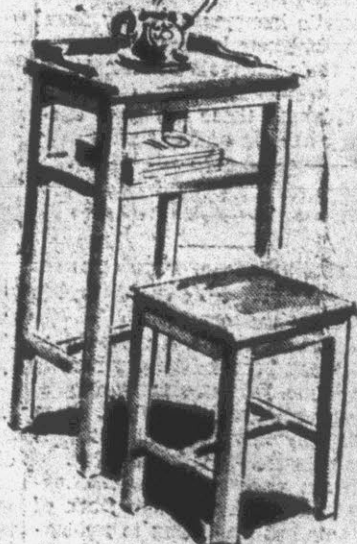

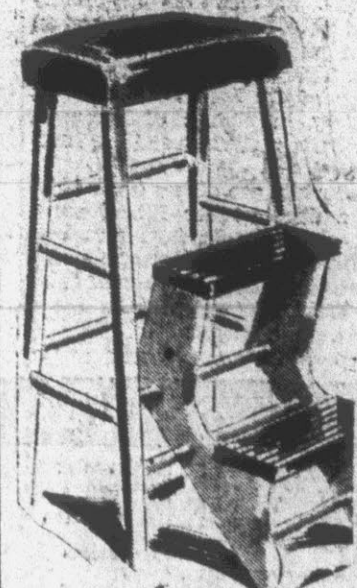

RELIGION AN INNER EXPERIENCE

Many years ago I knew an earnest young Christian who decided that the way to follow in the footsteps of Jesus was to make his life, externally as well as internally, conform to the life Jesus Christ had lived on earth. Therefore, since Jesus had been poor, this young man adopted poverty and did not hesitate to beg when he had no money to buy necessities. Since Jesus had worn sandals and probably at times had gone barefooted, this young man wore sandals and went barefooted. He learned the trade of carpentry because Christ had been a carpenter. Looking back now over thirty years, those of us who knew him are not at all sure that his life was a spiritual success. He was strong on his external conformity to the way Christ lived, but not equally firm in his internal conformity.

Have you ever tried to imagine what Jesus would have been like had he been born in these modern times? Externally, his life would have been very much like ours. He would have worn the clothes we wear, entered into most of our customs, conversed as we converse. The thing that makes Christ the Man of the Ages is not the fact that he wore long flowing garments or worked at a carpenter's bench. Externally, he was a man of his age. In the inner reaches of the heart, however, he had a greatness before which all earthly greatness appears twisted and dwarfed.

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WASHINGTON DAYBOOK

Washington — Don't make any mistake about the importance of Secretary of Commerce Wallace's suggestion that the muggumps—the party bolters—the Democrats who are blocking the administration legislative program—be read out of the party—“purged.”

Don't make any mistake about it either that any such “purge” will be attempted by the party organization. It has been tried over and over and in nine cases out of ten has been more harmful than helpful to the party cause.

What Secretary Wallace did I suspect, inadvertently, since his “purge” speech was purely impromptu before a small luncheon of the Women's Democratic Club here, and there was only one newspaper reporter in the house) was to give dramatic point to the critical state of the administration's legislative program.

He suggested that both parties apply party discipline on major issues—the British loan, full employment, atomic energy and such. It isn't a new idea at all. The LaFollette-Monroney Congressional reorganization committee has suggested that the party caucus, very infrequently used these last 20 years or so, be reestablished to give some semblance of order to partisan views and partisan votes.

The committee doesn't suggest anything like a “purge” in the case of recalcitrants. Rep. A. S. “Mike” Monroney has jumped the party fence whenever his convictions dictated, and Sen. Robert M. LaFollette, Jr., is a second generation muggump, just re-identified with the Republican party.

The late Sen. George W. Norris was an Independent in Republican Nebraska. As “father of the TVA” and long-time foe of the private power interests, he was closely identified with the New Deal in his later years.

Sen. “Young Bob” LaFollette tells the story today of how his father set out in a backboard a half a century ago to upset the Republican party machine in Wisconsin. The LaFollette party succeeded and from 1924 until the other day it sailed under its own banner as the Progressive party. It has gone back to the Republican party now, but it's a question who said: “Welcome home.” In California, party lines are so indistinguishable that there would constantly be a question of who should discipline whom. Many members of Congress, including the late

The best known muggump of our time certainly is the late Theodore Roosevelt. Repudiated by the Republicans in the 1912 convention, he and his Bull Mooseers came close to winning the presidency, but more importantly they taught the politicians of both parties a terrific lesson—that you can't read important leaders out of the party without wrecking it. That year Democratic Woodrow Wilson took over the presidency.

The complaint today is against the Democratic insurgents, mostly from the South. Their leadership is scattered; their interests diverse; their views generally speaking, conservative, although there are some outstanding liberals among them.

Braden and Dunn divide the world between them. Since their methods of operation are pretty much the same, take Dunn's section as an example of how the work is done. This is Dunn's set-up:

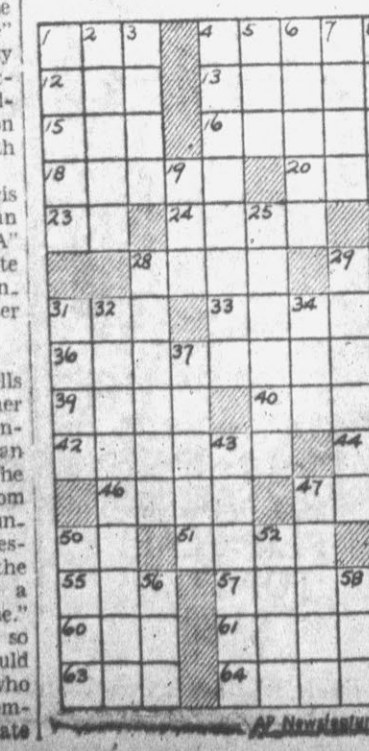
First of all, his title is assistant secretary in charge of European, Near Eastern, African and Far Eastern affairs.

Under the office of Near Eastern and African affairs are three divisions: one for Near Eastern Affairs, one for Middle Eastern affairs, and one for African affairs.

Then each division is broken down into what are called “desks.” A desk really means one man who has specialized in one country or a couple of countries.

For instance: the division of Near Eastern affairs may have a desk for Iran and another for Iraq, or a man who is well-informed on Iranian problems and another who knows Iraq.

These desk men usually are career diplomats who, after spending years abroad for the department, are brought back for perhaps four years of duty on a desk or as a division or office chief.

When a problem comes up—say a telegram from the American Ambassador in Iran telling of an Iranian dispute with Russia—copies of that telegram go to everyone in the department who might be interested.

For example: copies go to Byrnes, Acheson, Cohen, Dunn, the heads of the Near Eastern office and Near Eastern division and the desk man who handles Iran.

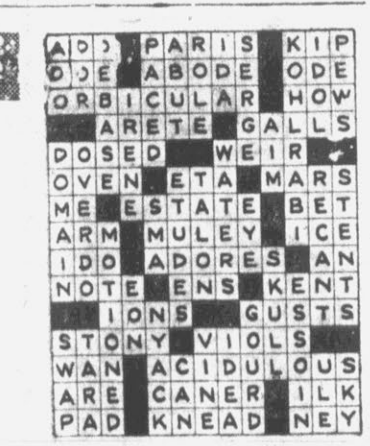
Then they start up the assembly line with recommendations and consultations—the desk man with his division chief, the division chief with the office chief, the office chief with Dunn, Dunn with Acheson, Cohen and Byrnes.

In this way they decide what this country's position will be.

Vinson also assured the committee that the government is “moving rapidly” toward a balanced budget and described the fiscal policy as “an important part of the program to fight inflation.”

“We are reducing government expenditures and paying off government debt,” Vinson said. “As a result of x x x rapidly declining expenditures and well-maintained receipts, the Treasury showed a surplus of receipts in each of the months of February and March.”

“There will be some net deficit during the remainder of this fiscal year; but the budgetary outlook for 1947 is very good.”

vide more, CPA eliminate its order which earmarks a big quantity for suits to sell at retail for \$35 or less. They said the regulation is concentrating more fabric in the hands of low-cost manufacturers than they can use and thus is curtailing out-

put of higher-priced suits.
CPA calculates current production at about 20,000,000 suits a year, as compared with a goal of 28,000,000. It says peak pre-war output was around 24,000,000 suits yearly, and that current demand is for 40,000,000.

The manufacturers also proposed revocation of OPA's maximum average price regulation as it applies to woolen and worsted fabric. This regulation requires producers to turn out about the same ratio of low to high-priced cloth as they did during a base period, usually 1943.

Wallace, May 7.—(AP)—Governor Cherry predicted here today that North Carolina's vast production of fruits and vegetables soon would be delivered to markets throughout the nation by air express, assuring wider distribution and greater profits.

He spoke at a luncheon in his honor during celebration of "Governor's Day," a feature of the sixth annual strawberry festival now in progress.

"You are depicting here today in your strawberry festival North Carolina's progress in both the diversification and improvement of agriculture," he said. "You are giving a public demonstration of what this section of North Carolina has done and is doing for the million-dollar strawberry crop."

On hand for the celebration were hundreds of mayors and officials from towns and cities throughout the coastal plains section. Farmers from several counties crowded into the festival headquarters for the event.

Commending the town for its progressiveness, Cherry said that "every community has an outstanding product and along with tobacco and truck growing you have given the state and the nation a new concep-

tion of the importance and value of strawberries."

"Today modern marketing facilities, including refrigerator trucks and railway cars, make your strawberries available to the great urban and metropolitan centers. In the days ahead planes will undoubtedly be delivering this red luscious fruit by air express."

Behind that request is the history of several Latin American nations which, over a long period relied on German and French military missions to train their armies. Some continued to use German and French equipment as well as methods.

Even the Brazilian expeditionary force which fought as part of the U. S. Fifth Army in Italy still had German artillery when it first began to train for its overseas assignment.

If Congress goes along with Mr. Truman the first result is expected to be a number of achievements with individual countries to continue the program of military assistance formerly rendered by this country under lend-lease and other wartime arrangements.

Eventually, however, the requested law would permit the U. S. to play its full role in carrying out the projected inter-American defense alliance, scheduled to be drawn up at a conference in Brazil some time this year.

Most of the 21 American republics have different ideas on the details of that alliance, but all agree on one major provision: That if one of their number is attacked, the rest will come to its assistance immediately.

Topic Of Sermon Is 'Our Worst Enemy'

The Mission held by St. Peter's Church, held its second session last night with the sermon "Our Worst Enemy" given by the Rev. James Collins. The purposes of the yearly Mission held by the Catholic Church is for the training of its own members as well as to make available to non-members an opportunity to listen, question, and observe the doctrines of the Catholic Faith.

Highlights of the sermon given by Father Collins are as follows: "Order is Heaven's first law. Order was also the first law of the universe, created by God until man, intoxicated by his own sense of freedom rebelled against this order. It may seem a little old-fashioned to call the violation of God's

law sin, but there is nothing out of date or behind the times with the consequences of sin: poverty, famine, war, sickness and death. These things we have always with us, and they march along in the vanguard of civilization's parade.

"It is no argument to say that sin does not exist. Some years before the outbreak of World War II, many of our educational institutions broke out with a rash of ultra-modern sophistication, breaking sharply and completely with the divine teaching of Scripture and Tradition. These disciples of the new modern thought denied the objectivity of right and wrong. Everything, they said was subjective; and as to demonstrate this new theory, Hitler broke out of his mountain fastness of Germany to seize, loot, occupy and steal all the surrounding countryside. Was Hitler right? Yes, sin may be old fashioned, but we still have the sinner. Stealing may belong to the dark ages,

but the thief belongs to the modern school. Adultery may be a word out of the bible, but the adulterers still thrive in the 20th century, breaking up homes and disorganizing the family and the nation. Our worst enemy today is Sin."
