PROSPECT OF
RENT CONTROL
FACING CITYOPA Checks Local
Rental Increases
Following Scores Of
Complaints

J. Frank McInnis, State OPA Rent Executive from Raleigh, was in Greenville yesterday to view at first-hand the rental costs in this community. "In the last six months," said Mr. McInnis, "complaints from tenants in Greenville have been steadily mounting, until it has reached such a state that a survey is now being made to determine the actual conditions and to find out if rent controls should be established."

It was further disclosed that Pitt County's American Legion Post had endorsed a resolution calling for an investigation of Greenville rental costs, and included a recommendation that regulations be placed upon rental and sales prices of homes. In addition to the resolution, he stated that scores of letters had been received from tenants complaining that their rents were being raised to exorbitant levels; large numbers of these letters were from wives of servicemen, and veterans themselves. "Since June, 1945, OPA has received more complaints of increases in rent than at any time since 1941," he added.

"If rents are found to have gone up abnormally," he continued, "the Bureau of Labor Statistics will be asked to prepare a house-to-house survey of Greenville's rent problems; and their report will be submitted to OPA in Washington for whatever action is required. If the report indicates an abnormal rise in rental costs, the OPA will not hesitate to invoke Federal Rent Control here."

Rental surveys are now being made in Hickory and Statesville. Veterans attending school in Chapel Hill requested similar surveys. BLS has completed their survey at Chapel Hill, and their report will soon be turned in to OPA. Mr. McInnis pointed out that veterans attending school under the GI Bill of Rights are the hardest hit, because they are allowed only limited funds under this bill for their living expenses during their terms of scholastic work.

Up to the present, Greenville has had no rent controls; it was not deemed necessary. Controls were, however, established in Tarboro, Wilson, Kinston, Rocky Mount and Goldsboro, where rents were frozen as of March, 1942.

Washington, May 9—(AP)—Here are answers to questions which may have puzzled you about the critical strike.

Can the government seize the coal mines? If so, why doesn't it?

The President, under his wartime powers which he still has, can seize the mines. The government several times seized struck mines during the war. 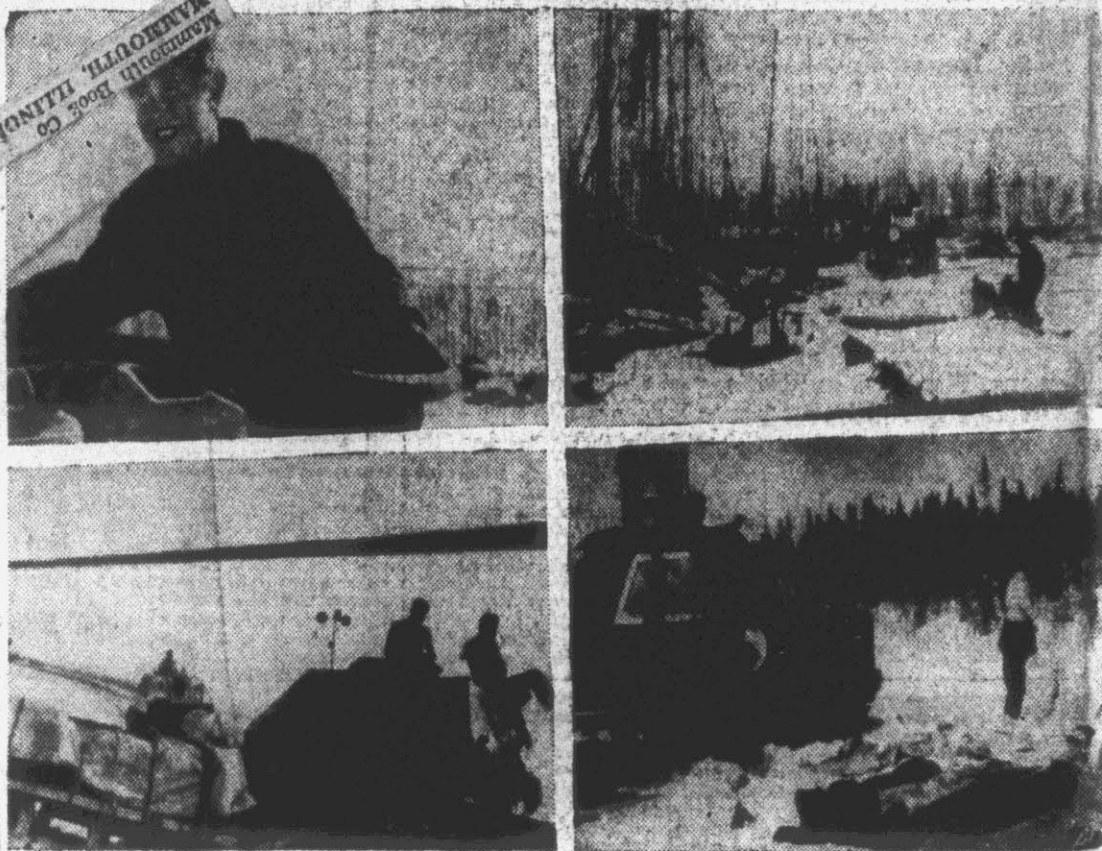
On occasion miners stayed away in wartime when the government took over struck mines.

Further Cuts in
U.S. Food Supply

Government Posts Higher Prices For Grain To Get More Bread For Famine Areas Abroad; Allocation of Edible Fats And Oils For Home Use Is Also Slashed

Washington, May 9—(AP)—A further cut in food supplies at home was announced today by the Agriculture Department as the government posted higher prices for grain to get more bread for famine areas abroad.

The smaller allocation results, the Department said, from a seasonal drop in production—particularly of hard—and heavy shipments of margarine and shortening during the first quarter to meet foreign relief needs.

However, the Department calculated that civilians will get more hard and margarine this year than they consumed in the 1934-35 pre-war period. But there'll be less shortening and other edible oils.

The total allocable supply of fats and oils for the April-June quarter was estimated at 1,254,800,000 pounds compared with 1,408,800,000 pounds available during the January-March period. Of this, the American civilians share will be 997,100,000 pounds compared with 1,102,400,000 pounds in the first quarter.

The higher prices offered on grains are aimed at making it more profitable for farmers to market their supplies rather than holding them for livestock feeding.

The higher grain ceilings may make some increases necessary in prices of milk and dairy products, Agriculture Department officials said. They also thought it likely that price increases may have to be granted on wheat and corn sugar.

SENATE MOVES
ON DRAFT ACT

British Loan Set Aside To Extend Draft Bill To July 1

Washington, May 9—(AP)—The Senate approved unanimously today an extension of selective service until July 1.

The action came on adoption of a joint resolution by Senator Edwin C. Johnson (D-Colo.) after the Senate had temporarily laid aside the \$3,750,000,000 British loan bill.

If the measure later is approved by the House the draft act would be continued in its present form for a month and a half beyond its May 15 expiration date.

Democratic Leader Barkley noted that the extension also would keep alive until July 1 President Truman's authority, under the Smith-Connally amendment to the selective service act, to seize struck coal mines.

Barkley earlier had told the Senate this authority would expire May 15 unless the draft law is extended.

Barkley fought a move to sidetrack the \$3,750,000,000 British loan in favor of labor control legislation. The administration wants to consider the draft law extension as soon as a final vote is taken on the loan bill.

Taking the floor in opposition to a move by Senators Eastland (D-Miss), Byrd (Va) and others, Mr. Barkley told his colleagues bluntly that he does not believe the Senate now knows what kind of labor legislation it wants to pass.

He said that unless the selective service law is kept alive, the Smith-Connally act authority for the president to take over the struck mines will expire with it because that measure amended the draft law.

Mr. Truman told his news conference earlier in the day that he will cross the mine seizure bridge when he comes to it. Barkley's in-

Postal Embargo

Washington, May 9—(AP)—The Post Office Department today ordered an embargo on parcel post shipments weighing more than 11 pounds, with certain exceptions.

The Department said the embargo, effective at midnight, was ordered as a result of the coal strike and curtailment of rail service.

Four classes of goods are exempt: live day-old poultry, seeds, plants and other nursery stock; eggs, butter and other perishable food products; and medicines, drugs, surgical instruments and surgical dressings.

Parcels covered by the embargo will not be accepted for mailing if they weigh more than 11 pounds or if their combined length and girth exceed 60 inches.

Postmaster General Robert E. Hannegan said in a statement that he acted at the request of the Office of Defense Transportation and the Association of American Railroads.

UNRRA CHIEF
ASKS FOR NEW
FOOD AGENCY

LaGuardia Places Results Of His Study Before 48 - Nation Council

Washington, May 9—(AP)—Creation of a new international agency was advocated today by UNRRA Director General Fiorenzo H. LaGuardia to handle the problems of food shortages in these years of starvation.

In an address before UNRRA's 48 government council, the chief of the international relief organization also:

1. Called for swift action by member governments to bring home the approximate 1,400,000 persons—a great stockpile of human misery—in the displaced persons' internment camps within the next 30 to 60 days, provided they are cleared of collaboration charges.

2. Blamed the United States, in part, for inaction in finding new homes for the war-created exiles.

3. Urged countries with room for refugees to sit down at a table and talk over methods for bringing the refugees in.

Mr. LaGuardia's recommendations were advanced after he told the council that food allocations were grossly inadequate and appealed to nations with available supplies for help in preventing a catastrophe.

Then, speaking extemporaneously, he stressed the need for a new and stronger agency to take over the work which now is handled by the combined food board on which sit representatives of Britain, Canada and the United States.

"Some agency must be found with power to carry out decisions and implement these decisions with action," he said.

TODAY IN CONGRESS

A Review Of Your Government In Action

Washington, May 9—(AP)—The Senate refused today by a two-to-one vote to lay aside the \$3,750,000,000 British loan bill until the House considers it but an immediate effort was made to sidetrack it for strike control legislation.

By 54 to 27, the senators rejected a contention that the loan measure is a revenue-raising proposal on which the constitution requires House before Senate action.

Senator Eastland (D-Miss) moved that anti-strike legislation be taken up, but majority leader Barkley (D-Ky) said he would fight the idea and insist on finishing with the loan bill and then taking up draft extension proposals.

Senator Gurney (R-SD) said he will offer a 30-day draft extension as a temporary measure if the Senate's committee-approved bill for a year's extension is pushed aside by labor legislation. The draft law expires May 15.

Ferdinand Eberstadt, New York banker and lawyer and former war production board official, testified to the Senate Banking Committee against the army-navy merger bill approved by the Senate Military Committee. He said the legislation suffers from the weakness inherent in seeking unification at too low a level.

Coal Shutdown Nearing A
Strike Against Govm'tAuto Plants Forced
To Slow Production

Ford Plant Closed; GM Plants to Shut Down In Ten Days; Output Suspension Blamed On Coal Strike And Rail Embargo

Detroit, May 9—(AP)—General Motors and Chrysler Corp. announced today the impending suspension of production in their assembly plants as a result of the rail embargo.

GM reported its plants would be closed within the next 10 days and Chrysler said all passenger car assembly lines will be down next week.

Chrysler said its truck assembly lines and other operations will continue to work. It attributed the impending suspension of passenger car output to shortage of parts aggravated by the coal strike and the rail embargo.

The GM and Chrysler announcements followed closely the decision of the Ford Motor Co. Other members of the industry's Big Three to halt all output. Ford began its shutdown last night; General Motors said its assembly lines will begin to close next Monday, on a progressive basis.

Affected by the suspensions are 215,000 General Motors employees;

110,000 Ford employees and immediately 10,000 car assembly workers in the Chrysler plants. Car and truck output, which reached a post-war high of 67,585 units last week is expected to drop around 50,000 next week as a result of the complete suspension by Ford and GM and the passenger car shutdown by Chrysler.

Few of the other car manufacturers are in any better shape regarding supplies than the Big Three and additional closings are likely.

The shutdown of GM plants will begin next Monday and will be on a progressive basis, a GM spokesman said. A total of 215,000 production employees will be affected, including 30,000 in the Detroit area.

Already approximately 85,000 of the Ford Motor Company employees in the Detroit area were idled by the closing of plants for an indefinite period.

Closing of the Ford and General Motors plants will take approximately 42,000 cars and trucks out of the car industry's weekly output volume.

Churchill Pleads For
Union Of All Europe

London, May 9—(AP)—Winston Churchill, in an address to the Dutch Parliament, called today for a united states of Europe. His address was broadcast by the Netherlands radio at Hilversum.

"I see no reason," he declared, "why under the guardianship of a world organization there should not arise the united states of Europe, both of the east and of the west, which will unify this continent in a manner never known since the Roman Empire."

"It will give you prosperity, justice and peace."

His statement evoked long applause.

Administration Asks
House To Reverse
Anti-Subsidy Stand

Washington, May 9—(AP)—The administration made a final bid to break the deadlock over President Truman's emergency housing program today by asking the House to reverse its positive anti-subsidy stand.

Chairman Speace (D-Ky) of the Banking Committee told newsmen: "If the vote for approval of subsidies fails, the program to build 2,700,000 houses in two years will be blown up."

The outcome was plainly in doubt. Not only did the House reject such payments for building materials but later decreed an early end to present subsidies designed to hold down food prices.

The housing bill came back for another vote because the Senate-House conference committee assigned the task of trying to compromise different versions deadlocked on the administration's proposal for \$600,000,000 in so-called premium payments to manufacturers of scarce building materials. Described by Mr. Truman as the very heart of the legislation, these payments would be in lieu of general price increases in an effort to hold down the cost of new homes.

Pittsburgh, May 9—(AP)—Settlement of the 115-day-old Westinghouse Electric Corporation strike—longest major walkout since the war—was announced today.

A joint statement issued by the company and the striking CIO United Electrical Workers said the firm had agreed to an 18 cents an hour wage increase, with "four variations."

The firm's 75,000 striking production workers had sought a flat wage boost of 18 1-2 cents hourly, after reducing their original demands for a \$2 a day pay hike.

Twenty-three Westinghouse plants over the nation are affected.

HISTORY MADE
IN CHANGCHUN
SAYS WRITER

Battle Called Preview Of Long, Bitter Civil War Over Manchuria

(Editor's Note: Tom Masterson Associated Press correspondent who went to Changchun to report the Russian withdrawal and was trapped there 25 days, highlights some of his experiences in the following dispatch. He and four other American correspondents were flown out of Changchun two days ago.)

Changchun, May 7—(Delayed)—(AP)—Historians likely will call the storming of this Manchurian capital "the Changchun Incident"—the event that set off China's modified internal strife into all-out civil war.

To this correspondent, who watched the crack Chinese Communist army blast aside out-numbered Chinese government forces to capture this city April 18 after a blazing four-day battle, "the Changchun incident" was not only history in the making but appeared to be a preview of a long, devastating fight for Manchuria.

As we watched the Harbin-bound train carrying Maj. Gen. Feodor Karloff, the Soviet occupation commander of Changchun, pull away from the station, sounds of fighting in the outskirts could be heard. A few hours later, we were trapped when the Communists launched a drive on the airport. They captured the field—our only avenue of escape—that night.

During the first two days of battle, the government gave us freedom. (Continued on Page Four)

An Analysis Of The News

Winston Churchill calls for a faithful understanding with Russia through the United Nations to avoid war and urges the English-speaking world and the Western democracies of Europe to move together in creating a true fellowship with the Soviet Union. Few will disagree with Churchill. However, there are many points of disagreement between the Western Allies on the one hand and the Russian on the other as there are seeds in a pomegranate.

The trend of the Big Four conference of foreign ministers in Paris gives us a good indication of how the wind lies. The conferees have been unable to agree on any major point of the European peace treaties, and as a result Secretary of State Byrnes has proposed that the drafting of these parts be shifted to a 21-nation conference in Paris.

Well, what's the answer to all this disagreement? I believe that most of the differences arise from two main sources: these are (1) ideology, and (2) the tremendous turnover in the European spheres of in-

President Makes
Statement In Conference; Doubts Legality Of "Royalty" Payment To Union; Considers Means Of Stopping Strike; Lawmakers Angriely Denounce Lewis' Stand

Washington, May 9—(AP)—President Truman pictured the coal situation as approaching a strike against the government itself today and questioned the legality of a royalty payment to the United Mine Workers—a key in deadlocked negotiations.

A news conference which centered on the coal strike and government steps to settle it brought these statements from Mr. Truman:

1. Various ways of coping with the strike are under consideration, including a White House conference of operators and United Mine Workers.

2. As to government seizure of the mines, Mr. Truman will cross that bridge when he comes to it.

3. The President said he thought that a royalty payment to a union would be barred by a provision of the Wagner Labor Relations Act. He did not specify what provision. Coal operators say John L. Lewis, president of the UMW, is demanding a 10-cent a ton royalty on coal to finance a welfare fund for miners.

4. He would favor government seizure of the nation's railroads if that is necessary to keep trains running.

5. In discussing royalty payment, he said that while the wage stabilization board approved a one per cent pension fund payment to an AFL Electrical Workers Union, by means of a payroll tax, he thought that was a different sort of thing from a royalty.

As Mr. Truman spoke, coal shortages cut deeper into industrial production and prompted government agencies to take new steps to conserve fuel—including a dimout in the east and midwest.

Replying to a question, Mr. Truman said that he is going into the matter now as to whether he has authority to end the 39-day old coal strike without the consent of John L. Lewis, president of 400,000 striking United Mine Workers.

Nor would the President commit himself one way or another on a proposal by Senator Lucas (D-Ill) which would empower him to seize plants to safeguard the public interest and to take away seniority rights of striking workers.

Mr. Truman last Saturday called the strike a national disaster. Up to then the effect had been felt only by industry. Now, in its 39th day, (Continued on Page Four)

Origin Of Use Of Poppy Told

How the wild poppy of France and Belgium became the memorial flower of America's dead of both world wars was described by Mrs. Louis Harrison, Poppy Chairman of Pitt County Unit of the American Legion Auxiliary, as the Unit went forward with preparations for observance of Poppy Day here May 25.

"Amid the desolation of the battlefield in the first world war," said Mrs. Harrison, "the poppies were the one touch of nature's beauty that survived. The little red flowers grew along the trenches and shell holes, and over the raw earth of the battle graves. In the minds of the men fighting there, the poppies became associated with their dead comrades."

Expression was given to this sentiment by Colonel John McCrae, Canadian medical officer, in his immortal poem, with its lines: "In Flanders fields the poppies blow,"

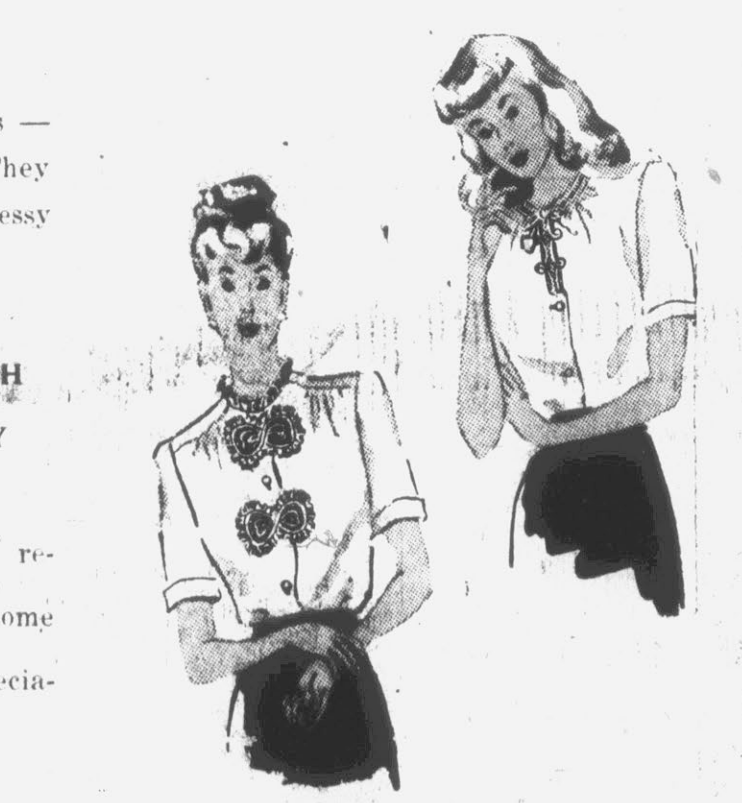

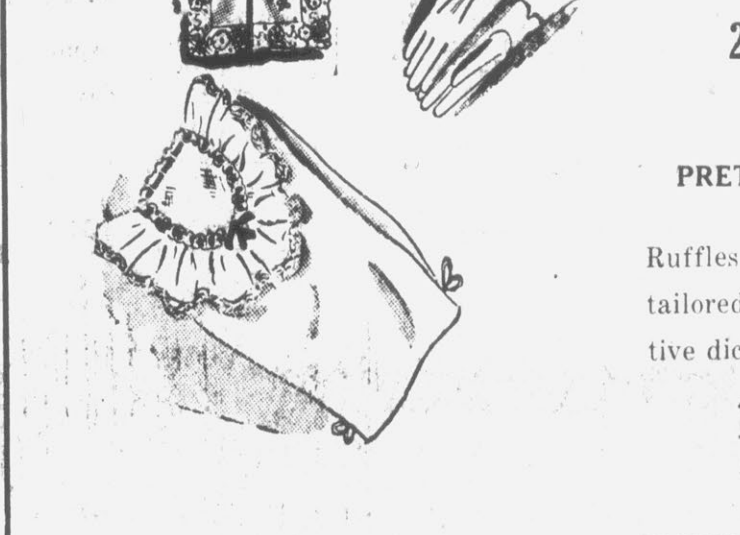

In a year when the major leagues boast the greatest array of shortstops in the history of baseball, the Boston Red Sox's Johnny Pesky stands out today as probably the finest of them all.

Boosters of Phil Rizzuto of the New York Yankees, Lou Boudreau of Cleveland, Cecil Travis of Washington, Luke Appling of the Chicago White Sox, Vern Stephens of the St. Louis Browns, Marty Marion of the St. Louis Cardinals, Pee Wee Reese of Brooklyn and Eddie Miller of Cincinnati might put up a strong argument for their favorites, but the figures prove Pesky stands all alone at the top of this brilliant cast.

The five-foot-nine-inch lad who only last Monday was stopped one hit short of tying the major league record of 12 consecutive hits, tied another standard yesterday when he tallied six times in a 14-10 slugfest won by Boston over Jimmy Skyes' Chicago White Sox.

Pesky erased the former American League high mark of five held by Lou Gehrig and Jimmy Foss among others and joined Mel Ott of the New York Giants as the only modern to accomplish this feat.

Including the four hits in yesterday's game, Pesky has garnered 39 in 91 times at bat for a .429 average to lead both leagues in batting. He also has scored the most runs—30.

With Ted Williams, Rudy York and Bobby Doerr joining Pesky in

the Boston hit parade, the American League leaders slammed four Chicago pitchers for 17 safeties to set a new club record of 13 consecutive victories, topping their 1939 skain by one.

The New York Yankees remained three and a half lengths behind the Red Sox when they triumphed over the St. Louis Browns 5-1. Spud Chandler joined Harris as the majors' only five game winners by holding the Sewellmen to three hits.

Detroit's Hal Newhouse and Cleveland's Bobby Feller, who with Chandler and Boston's Tex Hughson, are expected to fight it out for the league's pitching leadership, each hurled a masterful game with Newhouse blanking the Washington Senators, 1-0, and Feller whipping the Philadelphia Athletics, 5-2.

A triple play by the Tigers in the third inning helped Newhouse. With men on first and second, Eddie Mayo caught a liner deflected off Newhouse's bare hand, touched second and threw to first to complete the triple killing.

Don Padgett's pinch-hit home run in the 10th inning gave the Brooklyn Dodgers an 8-5 victory over the Cincinnati Reds and kept the Brooks a half game behind the National League leading St. Louis Cardinals.

With Dave Koslo besting Pittsburgh's Fritz Ostermuller in an all-lefty pitching duel, the New York Giants advanced into a fifth place tie with the Pirates by shading the Bucs, 1-0.

Phil Cavarretta, Lou Stringer and Ed Waitkus led a 14-hit attack with three hits apiece as the Chicago Cubs trampled the Boston Braves, 10-5, to move into third place in the National League.

The St. Louis Cardinals protected their first place lead with a 5-3 triumph over Philadelphia's Phils in a night contest.

Topic, "Unalterable Justice" For Sermon

Text of the sermon given on the fourth evening of the mission at St. Peter's church last night, had as its subject "Unalterable Justice." Highlights of the sermon are as follows:

"The backing of the Catholic Church in regard to the final judgment is based upon sacred scripture and tradition. The last judgment

was foretold by Christ who went on to say "heaven and earth shall pass away but my words shall not pass away." Yet in the whole realm of visible nature, there is nothing more stable than heaven and earth, and nothing more fleeting than words.

"Where, and under what circumstances this judgment will take place we know not, hence it is beyond our power to form an accurate conception of the grand scene. But who would be so foolish as to call its reality into question, merely for its inability to conceive it? Can any thoughtful mind find difficulty in accepting the truth that divine wisdom has appointed a day of judgment?"

"Man is no mere unit or isolated atom. He is a member of a family, of a community, of a state, one with all humanity. It is fitting, therefore, that man, not the individual man only, but the whole human race should stand before his judgment throne.

Such a public act of judgment is in accordance with divine justice. God's cause has often enough been openly flouted and despised, whilst evil has openly triumphed. God owes it to himself to vindicate the justice of his dealings with all men and all nations. Then, it will be God's "day in court." The day when the just will receive their eternal reward, and the wicked the bitter fruit of their own injustice and corruption. "Depart from me ye cursed, into everlasting hell fire."

IS RELIGION UNREASONABLE?

Men often make the mistake of believing that they can cut religion down to the limits of their capacity to reason. What they really mean, however, when they say that a thing is contrary to reason is that it is contrary to their experience. The Bible tells us that Jesus walked on the water. That is certainly contrary to your experience or to mine or to the experience of anyone else. But because it is contrary to experience does not necessarily mean that it is contrary to reason.

Charles E. Jefferson, the great teacher and preacher, once said: "If I am to cut down Christianity to the dimensions of my experience, I shall not have anything left of surpassing value." Christ transcends the experience of every point. What he said runs as far beyond me as what he did.

It is amazing to observe the publicity which perplexity gets. If some great scientist comes out and renders an adverse decision against a religious conviction long cherished by believers, his pronouncement makes headlines. Yet what as a matter of fact do scientists know about religion? They deal with the facts of the material universe. Naturally, spiritual matters transcend their experience, but that does not mean that these spiritual matters are contrary to reason. No man knows enough about the nature of truth to declare anything unreasonable. The only thing he can do in all fairness is to declare that certain things are beyond his experience.

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RENT CONTROL

The Office of Price Administration has been praised and damned; . . . blessed for the speeding of industry's output . . . blamed for the slowing of industrial production . . . lauded for keeping prices within normal limits . . . cursed for permitting prices to climb to "inflation levels." It's all very confusing! We have no panacea for solving the national welfare problems . . . and in that, we may consider ourselves original . . . but what does concern us, and deeply, was the announcement that some of Greenville's "landlords" have caused such a storm of protest over their high rates of rentals that we are on the brink of rent control.

We have felt no little pride in the fact that of the larger communities in Eastern Carolina, Greenville was one of the very few whose fairness in their rental prices was unquestioned. Perhaps we were premature. We grant, and we believe that OPA will willingly admit, that a moderate increase in rental prices was in order. We base this on the knowledge that living costs have risen.

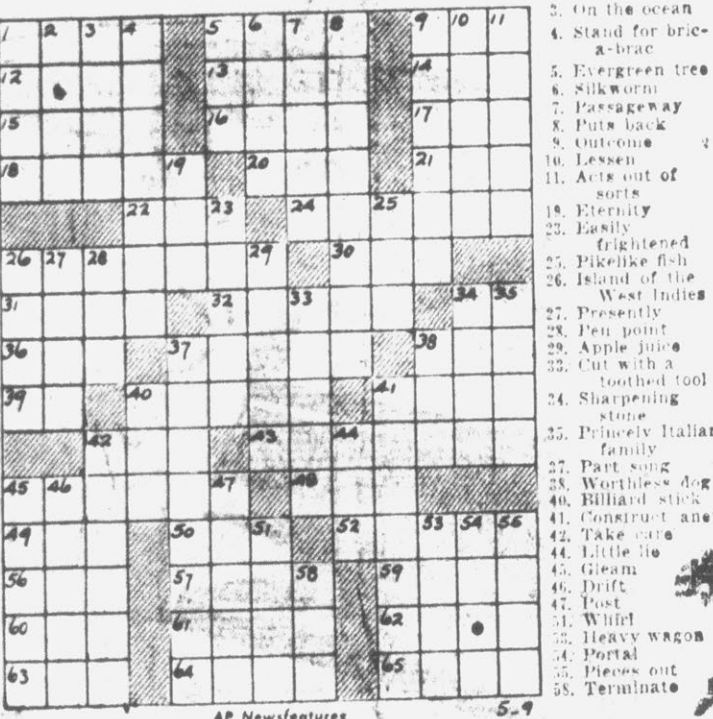

a man, is morally wrong; and such people are doing the remainder of our citizens a great disservice.

Because of the action taken by the local American Legion Post, and the hue and cry raised by protesting tenants, we anticipate a thorough survey by the Bureau of Labor Statistics . . . and we welcome it!

We do not know whether all the features of the Office of Price Administration are now needed as a solution to the nation's problem of recovery. But we are convinced that for the present, rental control in Greenville would be a blessing.

It is a sad sight to see young veterans coming to Greenville, sometimes with a wife and child; and then forced to leave because their pocketbooks are not as big as the two rooms they live in. A city's future lies in its youth; and the greed of a minority is driving young men to whom so much is owed, and of whom so much is still expected, away from our locality.

Rent control would not give us more houses or apartments, but it would make more available a few places which the young people can call "home," and there dream and plan for the day when they can build a house of their own. That's what makes little cities grow.

BOLL WEEVIL (AP)

Instead, our stay extended to 23 days, during 15 of which we were held virtual prisoners by the Communists, who did not want us to see the cleaning up following the bloody, destructive fighting.

day, it is hitting the man on the street and the housewife in her kitchen.

The Civilian Production Administration urged electric power utilities in coal burning areas east of the Mississippi and in Iowa, Missouri and Minnesota to ration electricity in progressive stages, starting with a brownout and thence to a blackout of all but essential services.

As a beginning, CPA suggested electric street advertisements and movie marquees be darkened just as they were in wartime.

An order readied by CPA for issuance probably today would authorize the rationing of manufactured gas—a possible blow to the many householders who cook with that fuel.

But more immediately, the government's ban on non-essential "broad freight" shipments and the 25 per cent slash in rail passenger services goes into effect at midnight tonight. To supplement this order the office of defense transportation urgently appealed to motor carriers to give priority to the movement of food, fuel and other essentials.

On Capitol Hill, meanwhile, as one lawmaker after another angrily denounced the shutdown, Senator Eastland (D-Miss) said he would seek to put aside the British loan bill in favor of the Senate version of the Case strike control bill already passed by the House. Senator Lucas (D-Ill.) said he

would have ready a bill to outlaw interruptions to public utility and health services. And Senator Byrd (D-Va.) demanded action on a measure to forbid any royalty payments to a union.

Mainly, the congressional ire was directed at one man—John L. Lewis, head of the 400,000 striking United Mine Workers.

Lewis spent yesterday in his office, and did not attend the government-sponsored conferences aimed at ending the strike.

ed before the realignment of domination has run its full course. The best one can do is pray that the turnover can be effected without another war.

The great changes have been accompanied by vast severity. That naturally has created violent suspicions—and suspicions are breeders of trouble. Report has it in Paris that the United States and Britain have been considering the idea of insisting that Russia lift the lid of secrecy from Eastern Europe so that the rest of the world can get a look. One wonders just what good that would do, for we know we should find that Moscow has consolidated the whole of that vast area, and the Balkans clear down as far as

Greece and Turkey, into the Red sphere of influence. That's a fait accompli.

So as previously remarked, it isn't easy to figure out ways of creating fellowship with Russia right now, and undoubtedly Moscow finds the problem equally difficult.

Since this is how it worked in wartime, the President probably would do it this way again:

He'd tell the Interior Department's Solid Fuels Administration—which is the government branch dealing with coal mines—to take over. No troops would be used.

The SPA simply would tell the mine owners the government was seizing the property and ask the owners to run their own mines for the government.

The owners would keep separate books while the government was in charge.

If the miners and owners finally agree to a pay raise for the workers, will that mean an increase in coal prices?

Almost certainly.

Can the owners just grant a pay raise and then raise their prices? No. If the pay raise is going to mean a price raise, the government must approve both to keep both from going too high. That's the government policy on all pay raises that mean price raises.

Can the government tell the owners how much of a pay raise to give? Only to this extent: The government can't tell the owners how small a raise to give. Indirectly—the government can put a limit on the amount of raise to be given.

That's because the higher the pay raise, the larger the price increase.

Have you ever seen a cocoon emerge from its shell and watch it grow within a few short hours from an ungainly looking grub into a gorgeous butterfly, too beautiful for description?

About twenty-five years ago, while teaching in Pitt County, a child brought a brown cocoon into my classroom. We hung him in the window where he could get the sunlight and the warm, damp breeze, and in just a short while, he began to emerge, and we watched him closely. He came out a lumbering looking fellow, amazed at the world around him, but inside him there was undeveloped possibilities and in just a short while he began to change. His body grew small, and at the same time his wings began to appear and in less than four hours he was the most beautiful, downy, grey moth with several shades of purple, blue, yellow, and green markings you ever saw. I watched him grow and I shall never forget that experience. I also have watched another growth that I would like to tell you

about.

About twenty-five years ago, Pitt County was full of farm women who were wrapped around with a little hard brown shell. They spent each day of their lives cooking, washing, ironing, sewing, sweeping yards, working in the fields, grading tobacco day in, day out. There was no glamor about their lives. They were just plain ordinary country women, who, in spite of themselves, could not seem to emerge from their shells.

Along came one with a vision, Mrs. Jane S. McKimmon. Home Demonstration work began to spread over the state and the nation under her leadership. Tomato Clubs were formed in Pitt County and these grew into Home Demonstration Clubs which have done wonders for the women of Pitt County.

The women still have their tasks to do on the farm, but they have learned new and better methods of doing things, and therefore, they have time to attend meetings, leaders' schools, parties, etc. Take cooking for instance. Not

long ago a woman was discovered in Pitt County who had been cooking all her life, yet she actually did not know how to properly fry an oyster. Through the Home agent, she learned the correct way, and now she not only can cook a delicious fried oyster but she has passed the knowledge on to others and many will benefit from it. Just one simple lesson learned among hundreds of other things.

We have learned how to hang a sheet on the line, so that it will give us twice the service, how to sew a fine seam and do it correctly.

We have also learned how to make use of what we have around us. There is a young married lady in the county who took a lovely light brown-stripe suit of her husband which he had worn for three years and made for herself an attractive suit. With matching accessories, she wore this suit for several years. Well, the war came along, and so did Junior, and since good woolen material was out of the question, why not make Junior a little suit out of the Mother-Daddy suit? No sooner the idea, than the deed, and now Junior is wearing a little coat and pants suit made from a suit that his Daddy bought long before he was married.

No longer do we sweep all the top soil from our lawns, but we have learned how to enrich the soil, plant grass, and make our surround-

ings more attractive.

There was a time when few of the rural women had confidence enough in themselves to stand on their feet and preside at a meeting. Now, there are hundreds of women take advantage of her chance to who are capable and are willing to act as Presidents, Secretaries, and leaders in their clubs.

Pitt County is proud of the fact that we have furnished a President for the N. C. Federation of Women's Clubs.

At a recent meeting of about five hundred farm women, a young man from Pitt County stood before that large group and gave our County report. Her attire, from her head to her feet, was perfect; radiance beamed from her face; her voice never faltered. After the meeting, one of the officers from another county came to me and asked, "Who is that young lady? I know she does not live on the farm." Yes, it is hard nowadays to tell a Home Demonstration Club lady from her city neighbors.

Home Demonstration work has literally changed thousands of women's life. Just as we have taken some old discarded chair from the attic, remodeled it, and made it into

a beautiful useful piece of furniture.

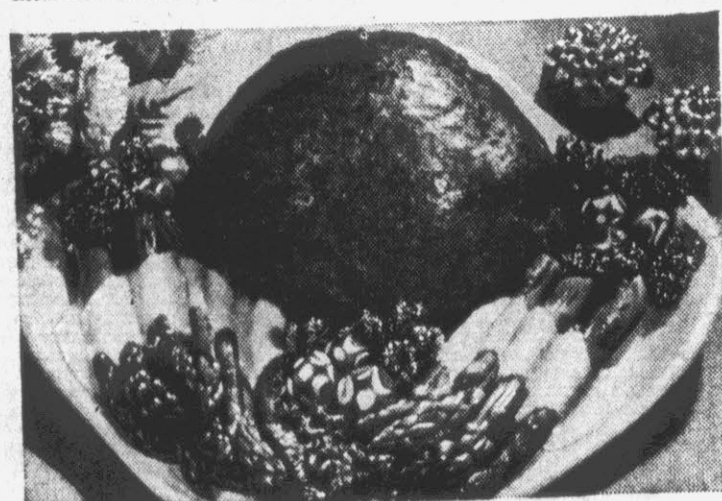

No immediate hike was looked for in the price of meats, poultry and eggs. However, if the higher grain prices produce the desired effect, there will be considerably less meat and poultry of grain feeding is expected to cause heavy marketing of fowls and animals in the months ahead.

The grain boosts, effective May 13, up corn 25 cents a bushel; wheat 15 cents; oats 5 cents; barley 9 cents; rye 10 cents, and grain sorghums 18 cents a hundred pounds. Increases also were authorized for protein feeds.

As the new grain ceilings were announced, the 48-nation UNRRA council was called into session here to receive an up-to-the-minute report from Director General LaGuardia on developments in the world food crisis and relief picture.

Before it met, Sir John Orr, director general of the United Nations food and agriculture organization, cautioned that the global food situation is apt to remain critical for four or five more years. He urged that a long-range international plan be mapped to cope with the problem.

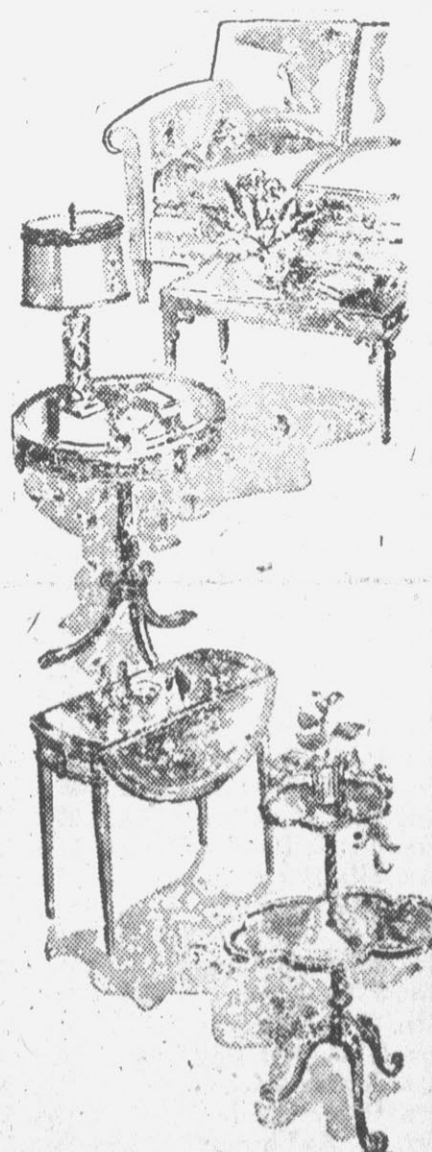

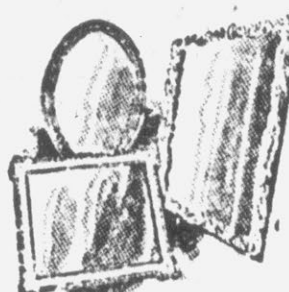

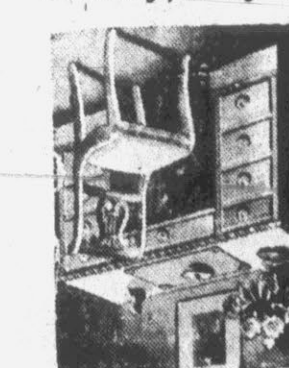
