RAIL BROTHERHOODS CALL STRIKE

Saturday Marks End Coal Truce

Over One-Third Coal Miners Idle Despite Government Seizure; Results Discouraging To Administration; Hopes For Strike Settlement Uncertain

Washington, May 23—(AP)—With more than a third of the soft coal miners idle despite government seizure of the mines, a White House conference sought today to work out a wage contract acceptable to both John L. Lewis and coal operators. Among the conferees at the early morning meeting were Secretary of Interior Krug, federal mine boss; Secretary of Labor Schwellenbach; Dr. John R. Steelman, President Truman's labor adviser; and Reconstruction Director John W. Snyder. Vice Admiral Ben Morell, Krug's lieutenant as governor of the pits, also joined the talks.

Assistant Press Secretary Eben Ayers told reporters of the meeting, but did not say what steps had been taken toward drafting a settlement.

The picture was not rosy. The fact that Secretary of Interior Krug could offer as government mine boss was a guarded "hope" that the end of the current two-week truce Saturday would plunge all the pits back into idleness.

The first 24 hours of government seizure produced discouraging results from the administration point of view. Thousands of miners, who had gone back to work under the truce, quit their pits.

This mass return to idleness closed down an additional 243 mines, increasing the number immobilized by the bituminous dispute to more than 2,100 out of 4,500 total. The latest federal estimates are that more than a third of the 400,000 soft coal mines are now staying away from work.

With the truce's end rapidly approaching, Krug and Vice Admiral Ben Morell, who is charged with running the seized mines, weighed the newly-stated terms which Lewis submitted to the government for settlement of the two and one half months old dispute.

They asked for time to study all its particulars, after a full day of conferences with Lewis and his negotiating committee yesterday.

Representatives of the Solid Fuels Administration and Federal Social Security Board also participated in the preliminary discussions.

Lewis' chief demand is for a seven-percent levy on the operators' payroll to build up a union health and welfare fund, to be controlled (Continued on Page Eight)

Washington, May 23—(AP)—Here's an explanation of how the railroad dispute got even more snarled up.

But keep one thing in mind: Many railroad workers get paid differently from workers in other industries. They get paid on mileage and hourly rates.

This makes the whole job of paying the different classifications of railroad workers far more complex than other kinds of workers.

In the present dispute the Brotherhoods of Engineers and Trainmen made two main demands:

1. They wanted a straight wage increase of at least \$2.50 a day. For an 8-hour day this would be slightly more than 31 cents an hour.
2. They wanted changes in their working conditions, such as better arrangements for overtime pay for some workers, better overtime arrangements for men held over at a certain specified time at the end of a run when that place was not their

OVERCROWDED SHIPS CAUSE DEATH OF SIX

Infant Mortality On Brideships Mounts; Federal Investigation Starts

New York, May 23—(AP)—The death toll of babies stricken ill aboard GI brideships mounted to six today when a five-month-old girl in this country only four days, died in Pittsburgh.

The child, Vivian Smith, arrived here with her mother, Mrs. Howard Smith whose husband lives in Burbank, Calif., on the S. S. Brazil last Sunday.

The death, which physicians diagnosed temporarily as acute diarrhea and malnutrition, was the first reported among the Brazil's passengers.

Five infants who traveled on the brideship Zebulon Vance have died from a mysterious ailment which struck them as they crossed the Atlantic.

A federal investigation was begun after mothers complained of overcrowding and unsanitary conditions aboard the vessel. The ship docked here Monday after a 13-day voyage from Le Havre. Four deaths occurred at the Fort Hamilton hospital—where 15 other babies originally were taken—and one at Paris, Ill. Several ailing infants have since been transferred from the army hospital to other hospitals or their homes for private treatment.

OPA Eyes Hike In Auto Price Ceiling

Price Changes Already Effected May Be Raised Still Higher; Little Likelihood Of OPA-Ordered Reduction In Prices

Washington, May 23—(AP)—OPA, slapping foot to eight percent price hikes on top of previous increases for new automobiles, kept the door open today for a possible further boost.

At the same time chances virtually disappeared for any OPA-ordered cut in ceiling prices when the industry achieves full scale production.

Jose Giral Reports On Armed Strength Of Franco Regime; Calls Spanish Army Far In Excess Of Needs For Peaceful Policy

New York, May 23—(AP)—Jose Giral, premier of the exiled Spanish Republic government, told a United Nations sub-committee investigating Franco Spain today that the Franco regime has told every Spaniard he could arm himself to defend Spain "against an attack by Russia."

Giral, appearing before the United Nations security council subcommittee in its first public hearing in the month-long inquiry, said that: "Two months ago the Franco regime decreed that every citizen could arm himself to defend the fatherland against an attack by Russia."

He did not explain his reference to "an attack by Russia."

Answering committee questions concerning the armed forces of Spain, Giral said "it is difficult to get the armed strength since the whole population is entitled, under the law, to be armed."

NAVY PARADES NEW WEAPONS

Terrific Firepower Electronically Controlled Exhibited

Washington, May 23—(AP)—The navy took the wraps off its newest shooting irons today in a demonstration of terrific firepower directed by electronic brains.

The array of guns and rocket launchers put through their paces at the navy ordnance proving ground in nearby Dahlgren, Va., ranged from weapons that saw their first action towards the end of the war to newly developed models still largely in the hush-house stage.

Pride of the proving grounds appeared to be a 3-inch automatic loading anti-aircraft gun that threw a shell every second, or twice as fast as a hand-loaded gun. Officers said it will be used in both twin and single mounts on shipboard with radar supplying its firing directions.

TODAY IN CONGRESS

A Review Of Your Government In Action

Washington, May 23—(AP)—Rep. Albert Thomas (D-Tex.) told the House today that the United States Navy has developed a weapon "far more deadly than the atomic bomb."

His statement came during debate on the 194 Navy appropriation bill. Thomas did not say what the weapon was nor would he elaborate to reporters other than to indicate it was a development of the Bureau of Medicine and Surgery. His statement to the House:

"We have something far more deadly than the atomic bomb today—not tomorrow, and furthermore it is in usable shape."

Thomas is a member of the Appropriations subcommittee which heard secret testimony of high naval officials for weeks before it wrote the appropriation measure.

Asked by reporters if the new weapon was in the nature of a death ray, Thomas declined to answer.

"I guess I've said too much already," he said.

The House is busy arguing about the size of the postwar Navy.

Members chose sides over these issues:

1. A naval committee recommendation that the fleet contain 1,079 ships—319 in active operation, 73 in a ready reserve and 687 in an inactive reserve. The House last year unanimously passed a bill favoring such a Navy, and the Navy Depart-

COURT ORDERS RESTRAINT IN MILL STRIKE

Textile Pickets Directed To Cease Coercive And Intimidating Acts

Gaffney, S. C., May 23—(AP)—Judge Thomas S. Sease today ordered 62 CIO textile union pickets to refrain from interfering with other workers and officials entering the Gaffney Manufacturing Company plant where a strike has been under way since September.

The temporary restraining order, issued upon petition of the mill management, specified that the number of pickets should not exceed four at each gate or other entrance to the mill.

It also enjoined union members from erecting or maintaining tents on mill property and from "coercing, intimidating, or seeking to deter by word or act" any of the company's officials or employees from free ingress or egress to the plant.

SENATE SHOWS MORE LENIENT VIEW OF OPA

Banking Committee Takes Up Last Provision Of Price Control Bill

Washington, May 23—(AP)—The Senate Banking Committee, in an agreement on three major provisions of the price control extension bill, pointed today toward a decision on the fourth and last.

Thus far, the committee has decided to:

1. Extend the life of OPA to June 30, 1947.
2. Provide for systematic removal of price controls in the interim.
3. End subsidy payments May 1, 1947, with \$1,100,000,000 provided for the payments until that time. (Continued on page seven)

New York, May 23—(AP)—Train crews in Grand Central Terminal left their posts at exactly 5 p. m. EDT this afternoon (4 p. m. EST) as the deadline for a nationwide rail strike arrived with no word from Washington of a postponement.

Chicago, May 23—(AP)—An announcement was made over Union Station loudspeakers shortly after 3 p. m. (Central Standard Time) today that "information has been just received that the national railroad strike is on."

Philadelphia, May 23—(AP)—The Pennsylvania Railroad's 5 p. m. train for New York did not leave the Broad Street Station as the strike deadline arrived. Trainmen were standing around in groups in the station.

Washington, May 23—(AP)—The hour for starting a strike of 250,000 railroad engineers and firemen passed today and the government clamped controls over non-rail transportation to carry essential food and mail.

When the 4 p. m. deadline for the "out" was reached, the Office of Defense Transportation directed the truck and bus industries, the airlines, water carriers and those railroads still functioning to work jointly, pool equipment and dovetail schedules for maximum movement of persons and goods.

Promptly also, the Interstate Commerce Commission ordered a general embargo on railroad freight movements, but with some exceptions.

There was no word of progress from the negotiators who had been busy for hours at the White House striving to head off a strike.

Shortly after the deadline, John R. Steelman, presidential labor adviser who has been conducting negotiations between labor and management, appeared and told reporters:

"Nothing yet, boys."

At 4:12 p. m. Presidential Press Secretary Charles Ross told reporters that the President was scarcely 100 yards away from his office, attending the garden party for veterans, and was available for call any time.

"Meanwhile," Ross added, "negotiations are going on between the two committees representing both sides. They are now meeting in the cabinet room. What they are talking about I do not know."

In response to a question, Ross said an extension of the five-day truce, which terminated at 4 p. m., had not been discussed.

"I assume the strike is on. I have had no reports to the contrary."

An Analysis Of The News

The thing which impresses me most about the latest developments in the Russo-Iranian imbroglio before the Security Council of the United Nations is that Iranian ambassador to Russia Ala is either a very brave and wise man or he is mightily misguided in his handling of this explosive case.

The council yesterday voted to continue on its agenda indefinitely the question of (1) whether Moscow has withdrawn its troops from Azerbaijan province (2) whether Iran has promised, and (3) whether Russia is interfering with the internal affairs of the Tehran government. The vote was unanimous, excepting that Soviet Delegate Andrei A. Gromyko again boycotted the session.

The events which immediately preceded this vote are highly interesting, and perhaps also highly significant. Ambassador Hussein Ala appeared before the council and expressed doubt that all Soviet troops

had left Iran. He also said that he hadn't been instructed by his government to withdraw the other charge—that Moscow had interfered in Iranian affairs—and he thought it should stay on the agenda.

Now just a few hours before he made this statement, Hussein Ala had notified the council that he had received a telegram from Iranian Premier Qavam, at Tehran, saying a commission had failed to find any trace of Soviet troops in Persian soil. The premier asked that the question of withdrawal of Red troops be dropped by the council. At the same time, Prince Frouz, Iranian Propaganda Minister, let loose a blast at Hussein Ala, declaring that all Russian troops were out of Iran, and that the ambassador spoke for himself and not for the government.

Well, now what's the significance of all this? Is Hussein Ala right or is he wrong? It is so contrary to (Continued on Page Four)

(Continued From Page One) to a voluminous report on Franco Spain submitted by Girál in which the armed forces of Franco were set

at 840,000. Girál said the 840,000 figure included colonial troops.

The sub-committee is inquiring into Poland's charges against Franco's regime, which include the contention that refugee Nazi scientists are conducting atomic research inside Spain.

Girál also was expected to dwell on the size of the present Spanish army, which he estimates at 840,000.

"It is an established and indisputable fact," he said in his first report, "that the Franco military forces are far in excess of the re-

quirements of a peaceful foreign policy and of a healthy structure for a state."

Both these charges were somewhat at variance with the memorandum submitted by the United States government, which set the present strength of the armed forces at over 600,000 and said the forces "at present appear to lack the material and trained personnel to fight a modern war."

Regarding research, one U. S. government said it "has no evidence confirming rumored activities in Spain relating to the production of atomic energy."

The sub-committee, consisting of

representatives of Australia, Poland, France, China and Brazil, also has before it a report from Jose Antonio Aguirre, exiled president of the Basque people of Spain, containing statements purporting to show that the Franco regime is persecuting the "Democratic Basque clergy."

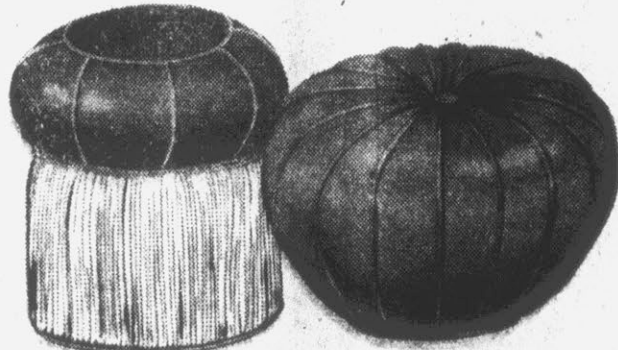
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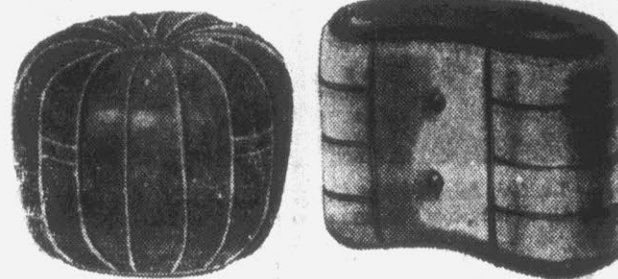

AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING \$250,000 STREET IMPROVEMENT BONDS

BE IT ORDAINED by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Greenville:

Section 1. That the City of Greenville issue its bonds, pursuant to The Municipal Finance Act, 1921, as amended, in an amount not exceeding \$250,000 for the purpose of constructing or reconstructing the surface of streets in said City, including the contemporaneous construction or reconstruction of sidewalks, curbs, gutters or drains, and including grading, at least one-fourth of the cost of which improvements, exclusive of the cost of paving at street intersections, is to be specially assessed.

Section 2. That a tax sufficient to pay the principal and interest of said bonds shall be annually levied and collected.

Section 3. That a statement of the debt of the City has been filed with the clerk and is open to public inspection.

Section 4. That this ordinance shall take effect when approved by the voters of the city at an election as provided by law.

Precinct: Wards 3, 4 and 5: Polling Place, New City Hall; Registrar, Mrs. W. W. Phelps; Judges, Mrs. Rosa Brown and Mrs. P. T. Anthony.

These are designed to hold down retail prices.

The remaining question is that of price margins.

The Senate committee in general has shown a more lenient attitude toward OPA than did the House. Accordingly, the belief is widespread on Capitol Hill that the senators will not go as far as the House. That chamber wrote in a provision that ceiling prices must reflect cost plus "a reasonable profit" to producers, processors and distributors, including retailers.

Several suggestions for handling the price margin problem are before the committee. Senator Taft (R-Ohio) has proposed that after Sept. 1 no maximum price shall be established or maintained which does not give the manufacturer his 1941 cost plus the average unit cost increase within the industry since that time. For wholesalers and retailers, he has proposed that the base period mark-ups and discounts be made mandatory in figuring ceilings.

Although Tu on Tuesday had appealed to the Communists, through General Marshall's truce commission at Nanking, to evacuate Changchun to prevent further destruction of the city there was no immediate indication why the Reds had left.

An order of Gen. Lin Fiao, commander of the Communists' Northeast Democratic Union Army, found on captured Red soldiers, demanded that the Reds hold both Kuochiatien, 20 miles north of Szepeing-kai, and Kungchuling at any cost. The order said it was vital that those cities be held to prevent Government troops from reaching Changchun.

Cheng's army made a surprisingly fast advance to Changchun once it had overcome the Communists' stubborn resistance at Szepeing-kai. Front-line dispatches said the troops averaged more than 20 miles a day to reach the capital from Szepeing-kai Sunday. Although they were American-trained and American-equipped, they had to travel much of the way over rough mountain roads.

prices after cars begin to roll from assembly lines at the pre-war rate. Manufacturing costs usually decline as production goes up. The official asserted that car makers have had a pretty tough time of it and that a price cut by OPA would be out of the question. But he added there could be another increase. Three already have been piled on 1942 auto prices. Present ceilings will stand, the official said, until the industry has been operating at the 1941 production rate for three months. It may take some time to hit that stride. The civilian production administration reported last week that, due mainly to strikes, only 433,766 passenger cars were produced in the 10 months through April. It said this was just about a normal pre-war figure for one month. When the 1941 rate is achieved

The increases announced yesterday range from \$33 to \$167, averaging about \$75 for 16 makes of cars built by Chrysler, Ford, General Motors, Hudson, Nash, Packard and Studebaker.

For the latter two companies the increases compensate for both wage boosts and higher prices for materials, principally steel, and parts. The other five firms received increases for parts and materials. Their wage boosts were offset earlier by price hikes of from \$1 to \$60 a car.
