

Date Is Set For Peace Conference

Foreign Ministers Reach Accord On Italian Treaty Draft; Invitations Prepared For General European Peace Conference In Paris To Be Held July 29

Paris, July 5—(AP)—The foreign ministers of the Big Four drafted invitations today for a general European peace conference to be held in Paris July 29 for debate on treaties intended to end World War II for Italy and the Axis satellites.

In a seven hour and forty minutes session which lasted into the early hours this morning, the diplomatic representatives of Great Britain, France, Soviet Russia and the United States reached agreement on Italian reparations—the final major point blocking preparations of treaty drafts—and fixed the date for the peace conference.

The deputy foreign ministers assembled (5 a. m., EST) to draw up a suggested invitation for submission to their chiefs at 4 p. m. (10 a. m., EST).

An American source said that, after approving the wording and before tackling the German treaty, the ministers probably would clean up odds and ends in the five treaty drafts—for Italy, Finland, Romania, Hungary and Bulgaria—they will submit to the conference.

The 21-nation general conference—composed of Australia, Belgium, Brazil, Byelo-Russia, Canada, China, Czechoslovakia, Ethiopia, France, Great Britain, Greece, India, the Netherlands, New Zealand, Norway, Poland, the Ukraine, the Union of South Africa, the Soviet Union, the United States and Yugoslavia—will not have the final say on the treaties.

Russia has insisted on strict adherence to the terms of the Moscow agreement of last December, under which the Big Four are to draw up the final treaties after studying the advice of the peace conference.

Secretary of State James F. Byrnes, British Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin and French Foreign Minister Georges Bidault all have indicated that they intend to press for serious consideration of the advice of the conferees when the council meets after the peace conference to complete the final treaties.

The ministers settled their last major conflict—Italian reparations. By an agreement providing that Italy must pay Russia \$100,000,000 from munitions factories, from her assets abroad and from current production over a seven-year period.

Italy was given a two-year period of grace before beginning the payments from current production, however.

DATE SET FOR SECOND TEST OF ATOM BOMB

Underwater Explosion Is Tentatively Set For July Twenty-Fifth

Aboard USS Mt. McKinley, July 5—(AP)—Vice Adm. W. H. P. Blandy today set July 25 as the tentative date for the detonation of Bikini's second atomic bomb, this one "an attack against hulls." It will be exploded slightly under the surface of the lagoon.

A full-dress rehearsal was scheduled for July 19.

The Chief of Task Force One told newsmen he had scaled down his original estimates of a 100-foot tidal wave resulting from the sub-surface blast. The wave, he said, probably would be not more than 70 feet. This would be enough to send green water over Bikini Island.

Blandy expects some form of radioactive cloud to result from the spray blown up from the underwater explosion. Contamination of ships by the spray and by solid water tossed onto the decks are expected to be a factor in delaying their return for inspection.

The admiral in a reappraisal of the airborne drop termed it a "miss of appreciable dimensions" because of wind and other uncontrollable factors but asserted, however, that "nothing went wrong with this test to prevent it from being a complete success."

As greater refinements in calculations are made, he said, the airborne bomb will be shown to be stronger than first estimated and closer to the Nagasaki bomb in potency.

"It was not just a firecracker," Blandy declared.

The admiral said the test was a success because the target fleet was arrayed to take care of the possibility of a miss. He cited ships heavily damaged as an example of how a good cross-section of a modern fleet can be affected—the battleship Arkansas, the heavy cruiser Pensacola, the light cruiser Sakawa, a submarine and transports.

In addition, the carrier Independence was damaged beyond repair and five other ships were sunk.

Capt. Shields Warren, radiological specialist, reported meantime that about 10 per cent of the 3,000 animals aboard the target fleet died from the atomic blast, radiation or drowning.

Former Ordnance Head Called In Senate Probe

Committee's Inquiry Into Illinois Munitions Deeper Into Machine Profiteering

Washington, July 5—(AP)—Digging deeper into circumstances under which an Illinois munitions combine received more than \$78,000,000 in war contracts, the Senate War Investigation Committee called in the army's wartime chief of ordnance today.

He is Maj. Gen. L. H. Campbell, Jr., whose name was brought into the inquiry earlier through the transcript of a telephone conversation between him and chairman May (D-Ky.) of the House Military Committee.

This transcript recorded May as asking Campbell to "jump on" the chief of the Chicago Ordnance District in behalf of Dr. Henry M. Garrison and associates, whose profits from their contracts have been denounced by Chairman Mead (D-NY) of the Senate committee as "war profiteering at its worst."

The committee renewed its inquiry against a background of holiday developments which included: 1. Disclosure by Attorney General Tom Clark that the Federal Bureau of Investigation has been looking into the combine's operations. Clark told newsmen an investigation has been under way for more than a week.

2. A statement by May at Pikesville, Md., that the transcript recorded May as asking Campbell to "jump on" the chief of the Chicago Ordnance District in behalf of Dr. Henry M. Garrison and associates, whose profits from their contracts have been denounced by Chairman Mead (D-NY) of the Senate committee as "war profiteering at its worst."

While innocent enough, these conversations can be made to look damaging when revived on a phonograph record later.

TOBACCO MAY ENTER CHINA

American Dealers In Shanghai Get Approval Of Shipments

Henderson, July 5—(AP)—American tobacco dealers in Shanghai have secured approval in full on their applications for leaf imports into China for the seven-month period from March to September inclusive.

Fred S. Royster of Henderson, president of the Bright Belt Warehouse Association, has received that information in a letter from Rep. S. J. Ervin, Jr., quoting a letter from Acting Secretary of State Dean Acheson.

Acheson cited a customs notification which said, with reference to tobacco imports into China: "Commodities licensed for any quarter must be imported not later than the following quarter, otherwise future applications will be liable to rejection unless there is evidence to prove that delay in arrival is due to unforeseen circumstances."

Acheson pointed out that, although stated negatively, "this is in line with the resolutions drawn up by representatives of American tobacco growers, warehousemen and exporters, the Department of Agriculture and the United States in April, which proposed that import licenses be issued to cover imports for each year rather than for a quarter of each year, but if licenses cannot be made on a yearly basis, then any import license unused during a quarter should be carried forward to a succeeding quarter, not deducted from the total amount."

Royster also had a letter written by Acting Secretary N. E. Dodd to Sen. Richard B. Russell, of Georgia, quoting the following official cable from Shanghai: "All American dealers leaf tobacco here have received authorization to import quantities and values of American leaf tobacco as applied for covering March-September seven-months period."

Royster said the Chinese import question had been threshed out at a meeting of representatives of all branches of the tobacco industry held in Washington in the spring with federal officials, and the State Department was requested to protest restrictions imposed by the Chinese government.

OPA's Foes Declare War On Compromise Extension

BRITISH FIND ARMS CACHES IN PALESTINE

Contraband Munitions Confiscated In Effort To Suppress Violence

Jerusalem, July 5—(AP)—The British army announced today that another large cache of munitions and "a large quantity of British 'atle dress' had been uncovered in the Jewish settlement of Meshej Yagur.

British troops have been searching the settlement, which is located in the Hafia bay area, since last January, and previously had reported unearthing large quantities of contraband munitions in an elaborate underground storage depot.

A British army officer, replying to Zionist charges that the Jews were being denied of their defenses, declared: "The presence of British arm-patle dress in the cache could never be considered defensive equipment."

The officer added: "I don't believe any of us like to see the Jews stripped of those things they have been so proud of, gathering at such great cost, but the thing we all object to is the presence of demolition materials."

He said the confiscation at Meshej Yagur, where a total of 29 large caches had been found up to last night, were a great loss to the Jews but asserted: "It is only common sense that we must take everything at the present time if we are going to suppress violence."

Tension continued high despite the release of three British officers by their Jewish kidnapers and a British announcement that many of the Jews arrested last weekend in a drive to curb armed violence were being freed.

The three British officers, caged in wooden crates, were dumped unharmed from a truck in Tel Aviv last evening. They had been kidnaped June 18 by members of Irgun Zvai Lemni, Jewish underground resistance organization, and held as hostages to enforce Irgun demands for the commutation of death sentences imposed on two young Jews for shooting at British troops.

Commutation of the death sentences was announced Wednesday by Lt. Gen. Sir Alan Cunningham, British High Commissioner for Palestine.

Senators Bridges, O'Daniels, And Taft Unite In Battle To Block Extension Measure; Paul Porter Says Proposed Bill Has Several Undesirable Features

Washington, July 5—(AP)—Senator Bridges (R-NH) tried today to keep the Senate Appropriations Committee from even talking about new money for the stricken but still fighting OPA.

Bridges took the stand that OPA is legally dead. He said therefore the committee cannot even hear testimony by Price Administrator Paul Porter on a \$106,000,000 OPA appropriations bill.

Chairman McKellar (D-Tenn), Bridges told reporters, delayed an immediate decision.

Porter called on Congress to advise another bill, extending OPA for a year, to get it more closely in line with President Truman's recommendations.

His cry of dissatisfaction with the compromise measure worked out under the leadership of Senator Barkley (D-Ky) apparently disturbed its supporters.

Advised of Porter's statement, Barkley grimly told reporters: "I have no comment."

Barkley apparently had counted on the support of both Porter and President Truman for the new bill drafted as a substitute for the OPA extender Mr. Truman vetoed last week. The Kentuckian said he will attempt to bring the measure before the Senate as soon as possible. It may be delayed until next week by opponents, however.

Senator O'Daniel (D-Texas) who filibustered to delay passage of the original extension bill, said he intends to talk against the new bill at every opportunity and as long as he can.

He hopes O'Daniel said, that the continued non-existence of OPA will prove to the public that the agency is not needed.

"The bill as amended by the State Banking Committee over the protests of Senator Taft (R-Ohio), Porter said, does not go far enough. He said it contains "undesirable features."

Scientists Save A-Bomb Records

Philadelphia, July 5—(AP)—A desperate battle scientist played to keep vitally important atom bomb records from being lost in a storm-tossed army transport plane was recounted today by a Philadelphia newspaperman who said he is "still shaky" from the experience.

"At one time we thought we would have to bail out and lose the records from Bikini," said Alfred M. Klein, a staff correspondent for the Philadelphia Record. He said the huge transport ran into thunderstorm over Nebraska early yesterday.

"The storm lasted about 30 minutes," Klein said, adding in a copyrighted story:

"I saw them (the scientists) disregard the pilot's orders to take to their parachutes. They threw themselves on the heavy cases and instruments which had torn loose from their lashings. By holding down the boxes and steel cases with their bodies, they prevented them from crashing into the tail of the plane and ripping out the sides of our C-54."

Klein said the plane's flight after passing over Nebraska was "normal." The ship landed at Dayton, O., for minor motor adjustments and then continued to Washington.

Find Hoarded Wealth Of Destitute Woman

New York, July 5—(AP)—Authorities pondered today the strange case of Mary Frankerich, aged recluse who lived in an unheated \$23-a-month flat and obtained food from neighbors through complaints of poverty—but had more than \$100,000 in cash, bank deposits and war bonds.

For weeks she had refused to venture from her tenement home, other tenants told police, and night after night she had kept them awake as she piled chairs against her doors and windows, with pots and pans on the chairs, and shouted that robbers and murderers were after her.

They took her to Bellevue Hospital for observation—where attendants found \$2,558 in cash and a check for \$984 pinned to her many petticoats and undergarments, some of which were made of old newspapers.

Mrs. Mike O'Daniel said last night that her husband and Brient had engaged in verbal argument over a rent increase and that Brient had been asked to move.

Brient said he had been threatened with a rent increase of from \$70 to \$100 and later received an eviction notice.

Mrs. O'Daniel said rent increases in the 16-unit apartment building averaged 10 per cent or less.

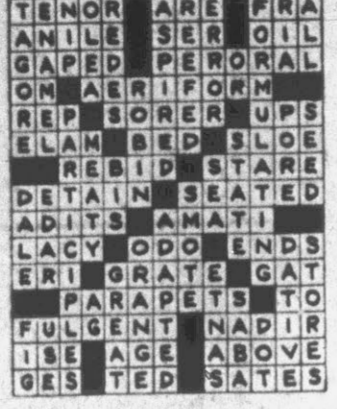
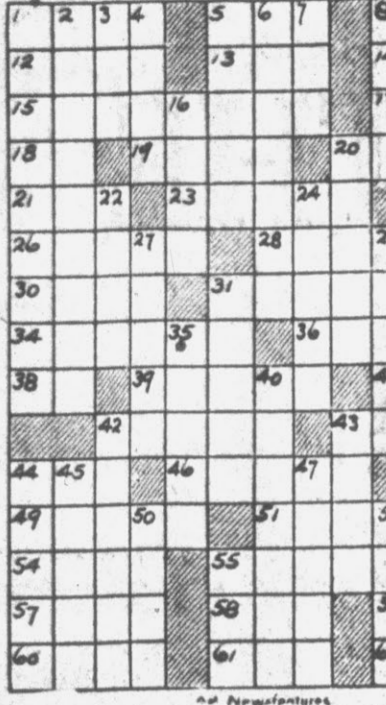

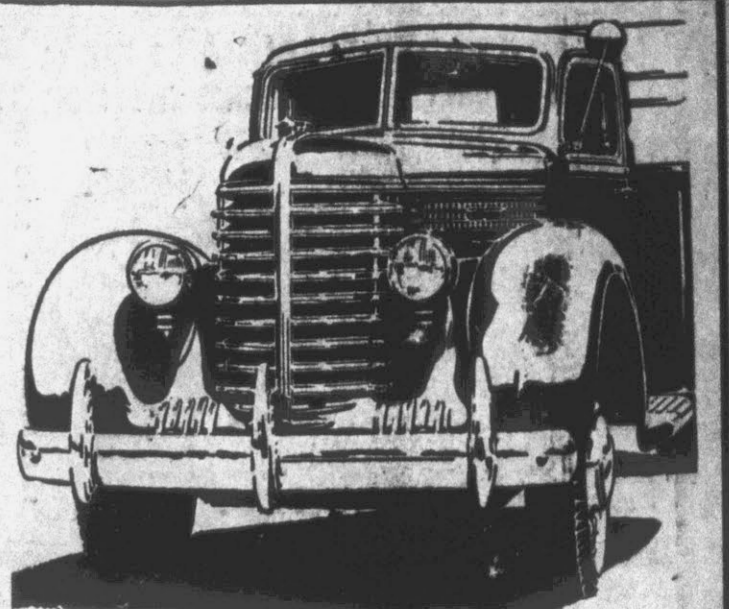

Warsaw, July 5—(AP)—At least 34 persons were reported today to have been killed and 42 wounded at the city of Kielce in Poland's bloodiest postwar pogrom, which was finally suppressed by government forces in armored cars.

British Fearful Of Arab Revolt

London, July 5—(AP)—The possibility of an Arab rebellion in Palestine, aided and abetted by Arabs from neighboring states, was advanced authoritatively today in the wake of growing concern over Britain's policy in the Holy Land.

Reports from Kielce, a farm market and industrial center of 60,000 said it was the bloodiest pogrom in Poland in years. About 800 of the city's population are Jews.

Apartments and homes of Jews were attacked by men the government described as "fascist elements." Jews were snatched from street cars and railway coaches. Mobs struck at the headquarters of the Central Jewish Committee of Kielce, but were repulsed after the Jews appealed to security police and militia for assistance.
