Women in the Church

The fifth annual observance of World Community Day will be held in the nation's churches on Friday, November 1, 1946. It is announced by Mrs. Ruth Mougey Worell, of the United Council of Church Women, which sponsors the event. Three major emphases will be considered in programs in thousands of communities that day: the urging of the national government's acting world peace; the practice of peace on the local community level through goodwill, tolerance, and social economic and racial understanding and cooperation; and the use of religion as the basis of judgment and evaluation in all problems and departments of life.

American housewives are urged by Church World Service—general Protestant overseas relief agency—to can and preserve food supplies this summer so as to release commercially preserved foods for shipping to the needy of Europe and Asia. "Every can of fruit or vegetables that goes on the pantry shelf will release that much more nonperishable food for the hunger areas," says Dr. Leslie B. Moss of the C. W. S. "It is just as Christian to preserve food at home as it is to give money for the purchase of supplies for the starving. It indirectly, but definitely, serves the needs of humanity and extends the hand of worldwide fellowship. It should be stressed, however, that home canning is for home consumption, not for shipment abroad."

In ceremonies second in color only to the elevation of a prince of the Church a humble naturalized American citizen was proclaimed a saint of the Roman Catholic Church by Pope Pius XII recently in St. Peter's Basilica, Rome, Italy. This first American to be canonized is Mother Frances Xavier Cabrini, born in Italy in 1850, emigrant to America at the age of 39, founder of the Missionary Sisters of the Sacred Heart, who died in Chicago on December 22, 1917. Mother Cabrini, always a delicate girl and woman, had given her life to the welfare of Italians emigrating from her homeland to America, and to serve them she came to this country, extending them "a friendly hand, a sheltering refuge, relief and help." Many in America and in Italy gave testimony to her miraculous healing powers as well as to her charity and her purity of life. As St. Frances Xavier she will be remembered each December 22.

Legion Calls Off Fete For Vets

The American Legion at a regular meeting July 16 decided to discontinue plans for a veterans' home coming day which had been set for August 14 in Greenville. The American Legion regrets very much calling off this celebration, but it was found that the majority of Pitt County citizens were not in favor of backing the project. Members of the Legion feel that it would be better to discontinue plans rather than try to make the day a success with one-third the amount of money necessary.

The Legion passed a motion to send two outstanding boys of the county to Boys' State in Raleigh. Boys' State is comparable to the State Legislature in that the boys will elect a president of the House. Members of the Boys' State and House will appoint their committees and hold a session of their own Legislature, passing laws which they deem beneficial to North Carolina. The boys who are chosen to attend will have the opportunity of a full course in state government, which would be equivalent to a much longer course in some educational institution.

Pre-Engineering Is Planned For ECTC

Plans are complete for the inauguration of a pre-engineering course at East Carolina Teachers College when the fall quarter opens in September, according to Dr. Slay, dean of the college.

Dr. Slay stated that Paul E. Powell of Bowling Green, Ohio, would teach mechanical drawing, thus completing the curriculum needed for establishing the course of study in pre-engineering.

The new instructor received the B. S. degree from Ohio State University, and M. S. degree in industrial education from Stout Institute, Menomonie, Wisconsin. For the past three years, he has taught mechanical and machine drawing in the United States Navy.

Students completing the pre-engineering course at East Carolina Teachers College would be eligible to transfer as sophomores to any other state institution offering engineering.
