

Mead Asks Probe Of Income Taxes

Request Authority To Examine Reports On Men Involved In Garsson Munition Inquiry; May's Position To Be Cited Upon For Certain Of Patient's Condition.

Washington, July 26.—(AP)—Senator Mead (D-N.Y.) said today he has asked President Truman for authority to investigate income tax data on men involved in a Senate committee inquiry into the Garsson munitions combine.

Mead traveled to the White House during a recess of the committee which he heads. Today it was to have heard Rep. May (D-Ky.) on his activities in behalf of the munitions makers, but received word instead that he is seriously ill. The committee then sought a formal medical explanation.

Mead told reporters he understood that the President had sent the tax data request on to the Department of Justice with his approval. While Mead would not name those whose returns would be investigated, he said:

"You can assume they will be involved with the Garsson munitions investigations, that they will include certain persons connected with the Garsson interests."

Replying to questions about May's illness, Mead said:

"I hope his recovery will be rapid and complete and that he will be able to resume his activities on the Hill shortly."

Mead said that Dr. Henry Lowden, May's physician, would be asked to supply the committee with a medical certificate attesting to the nature of the illness, and furnish additional details orally in a private session.

Counsel for Rep. May (D-Ky.) told the Senate War Investigating Committee today the Kentucky physician is willing to explain in private session why May is unable to testify now on his connections with a mid-west munitions combine.

One offer came from Attorney Warren Magee shortly after committee Chairman Mead (D-N.Y.) formally inquired, "Is Rep. Andrew J. May in the room?"

Magee stepped forward and said "He is not in the room."

"Would you explain why?" asked Senator Ferguson (R-Mich.), a committee member.

Magee then told the committee that he had received a telephone call from May's daughter early last night informing him that the 71-year-old chairman of the House Military Committee was "very ill, incapacitated, that he had suffered a heart attack."

Armed Party Shoot Two Men and Wives On Georgia Road

Monroe, Ga., July 26.—(AP)—A band of armed white men waylaid a white farmer and four Negroes on a secluded Northeast Georgia road late yesterday. Sheriff E. S. Gordon said today, and while holding the white man at gun point, shot the Negroes to death.

One of the Negroes, Roger Malcolm, 27, the sheriff said, had just been released from jail under \$500 bond on charges of stabbing his employer, Barney Hester, a farmer.

The sheriff identified the other Negroes as Malcolm's wife and George Dorsey and his wife.

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Explosion And Fire In Gas Plant Strike

Milwaukee, July 26.—(AP)—Many Milwaukeeans and residents of 38 nearby cities, towns and villages awoke this morning to cold coffee no toast and cold shaves as a strike of approximately 500 production and maintenance workers at the Milwaukee Gas Light Company went into its second day.

The company and the union joined in asking 200,000 consumers, including 400 industrial and commercial firms, in the area served by the firm to turn off their gas meters and conserve existing pressure in the mains so that hospitals and convalescent homes might have gas.

One disastrous explosion and fire was reported last night at a combination tavern, bowling alley and apartment house in nearby Menomonee Falls, Wis., 20 miles northwest of here.

Donald Hobson, an occupant of the building, told authorities he turned off his gas meter, as instructed, and a short time later his wife smelled gas. Investigating, he said he found gas flowing from a pipe behind the shut-off valve. Hobson snatched his two-year-old son from a crib and, with his wife, fled the building just before the explosion.

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PLAN CHANGES FOR CONGRESS THIS SESSION

Precedent - Breaking Changes In Procedures Win Wide Approval

Washington, July 26.—(AP)—Congress members, who long have grumbled that they can't live (in the style expected of them) on \$10,000 a year, wrapped up a \$3,500 rise today in a measure overhauling legislative machinery.

Action isn't final yet, but leaders say it is certain. Still in dispute is the form of the pay rise. The Senate voted a straight salary boost of \$15,000. The House decided, on \$12,500 salary, plus \$2,500 expense money.

However, the expense allowance is tax-free so that a member actually would net more money from the House bill than under the Senate version. The latter provided for elimination of the expense allowance.

The measure also would let the members qualify for a government pension.

The general policy involved got a stamp of approval from the House last night when it adopted by a 229 to 61 standing (non-record) vote the so-called congressional reorganization bill.

Carrying precedent-breaking changes in the lawmaking procedure, a similar measure passed the Senate by a 49 to 16 vote June 11.

Since there are only a few differences in the two versions, leaders said final adoption by this Congress is certain.

Normally, the two pieces of legislation would be sent to a Senate-House conference committee for adjustment of variations. Rep. Monroney (D-Okla.) told a reporter however, that it is possible the Senate may accept the House version.

In addition to the pay rise, key sections of the legislation include:

1. Pensions—both versions provide that members 62 or older may retire on a pension after six years' service. The amount of the pension would be determined by the amount of contributions made by the legislator to the civil service retirement fund. He would have to pay to the fund at least five per cent of his salary for five years.

2. Committees—The number of standing committees in the Senate is cut from 33 to 15 and in the House from 48 to 19.

3. Help for members—The Senate measure provides an \$8,000-a-year administrative assistant for each member and also sets up a stenographic pool upon which the legislators can draw. The House eliminated both these sections.

4. Budget—Both versions call for four major committees to meet at the start of each Congress and recommend a federal budget for the ensuing year, with a maximum amount specified which is to be appropriated.

5. Bills—Provision is made in both measures to do away with all congressional action on minor claims.

Spokesmen Rule Out New Taxes

Washington, July 26.—(AP)—Congressional leaders ruled out any tax increases today with a firmness that indicated President Truman may have to look elsewhere for the anti-inflation weapons he said must be fashioned if revived price controls fail.

Chairman George (D-Ga.) of the Senate Finance Committee told a reporter there will be no increase in taxes, despite Mr. Truman's assertion that if the OPA revival bill proves ineffective he will have to call Congress back to strengthen price control laws and act on fiscal measures.

As for the further tightening of price controls, Senator Wherry of Nebraska, the Republican whip, declared his belief that if Mr. Truman calls the lawmakers back after they have been home to talk to their constituents "they will come back and wipe the OPA off the map."

Even Senator Pepper (D-La.) who advocated revival of the pre-July 1 OPA with all its powers, said there is "not the slightest chance of getting increased taxes."

Sweden 'Test Range' For Rocket Weapons

Stockholm, July 26.—(AP)—The Swedish defense staff has received more than 560 reports so far this month from observers who say they saw flying "fire balls" skimming through the sky, Swedish newspapers said.

Some of the reports said the missiles looked like "swans without a head," "seagulls" and "jetplanes but with a sound weaker than usual." None have been recovered.

Many Swedes are convinced the launching grounds are somewhere on the eastern side of the Baltic sea. Others say they believe the missiles come from the area of Petsamo or Karelia. (All these areas are Russian-controlled.)

BETTER GRADE LEAF WANTED

Whedbee Urges Care In Handling And Grading Tobacco

Mr. W. Z. Morton and W. L. Whedbee, Supervisor of the Greenville Tobacco Market, returned last night from a three day tour of inspection over the entire Georgia-Florida markets. Points included in their itinerary included Douglas

Nashville, Adel, Hahira, Valdosta, Fitzgerald, and the Tifton markets. The farmers are very well satisfied with the prices that they are receiving for all of the better grades and good common grades of their tobacco," said Mr. Whedbee. "However, there seems to be no market for the lowest grade tobaccos, the majority of the purchases being made by warehouses."

Mr. Whedbee emphasized the fact that for the past three years the proper handling and grading of tobacco has made little difference in the price. He wished to urge all farmers to give more attention to the proper handling and grading of this year's crop; as he is of the opinion that it will materially affect the price they will receive for it this season.

Valdosta, Ga., July 26.—(AP)—An upward trend of tobacco prices which brought an average of \$4.26 a hundred pounds cheered Georgia tobacco growers today.

Reports from most of the markets indicated that prices since Wednesday have been a little higher. The reports seem to agree that the better grades are bringing much better prices than last year, although the demand for poorer grades is not so strong.

Valdosta's sales yesterday were 76,022 pounds at an average price of \$47.30 a hundred. Douglas reported sales of 667,414 at \$44.78. (Continued on Page Four)

Nazi War Crimes Trial Entering Final Stages

Nuremberg, Germany, July 26.—(AP)—Justice Robert H. Jackson demanded on behalf of the United States today that all the 22 Nazi leaders on trial on war crimes charges before the International Military Tribunal be convicted as "conspirators" to wage aggressive war.

Opening the prosecution's summation for the allied nations against Herman Goering and his 21 co-defendants after eight months of testimony and debate, Jackson declared:

"Adolf Hitler's acts are their acts. His guilt is the guilt of the whole dock and every man in it."

Jackson was followed by the chief British prosecutor, Sir Hartley W. Shawcross, who declared the prisoners were guilty of "12,000,000 murders."

He declared they participated in and directed "the cold, calculated, deliberate attempt to destroy nations and races, to disintegrate the traditions, the institutions and the very existence of free and ancient states through murder conducted like some mass production industry in the gas-chambers and the ovens of death camps."

For the first time in several months, there hardly was an empty seat in the courtroom.

Rent Control

WASHINGTON, July 26.—(AP)—Two areas in North Carolina were among the eight brought under rent control for the first time last night.

OPA Rent Administrator Ivan D. Carson announced that the Chapel Hill area consisting of Orange County, and the Hickory area, consisting of Catawba County, would go under control August 1, 1946 level.

Carson said these areas had been scheduled for control beginning July 1, but that this plan had to be postponed when OPA lapsed.

FIRE PRISON CAMP OFFICER

Supt. Black Dismissed After Alleged Beating

Raleigh, N.C., July 26.—(AP)—Chairman A. H. Graham of the State Highway and Public Works Commission said today that Richmond County Prison Camp superintendent Jack Black had been dismissed following an investigation of his alleged beating of Albert Lee Boyce, 20-year-old World War II veteran who was a prisoner at the camp.

Chairman Graham released the following statement:

"On June 23, Albert Lee Boyce, a white, 20-year-old prisoner at the Richmond County Prison Camp, became involved in a difficulty with another prisoner while working with a road gang, and was carried to the camp by the gang foreman."

The Superintendent of the camp Jack Black, after hearing the complaint of the foreman, is alleged to have struck the prisoner with a blackjack. On reporting of the alleged beating, the camp was placed under investigation.

SENATE-HOUSE ATOM CONTROL PLAN FOUGHT

Advocates Of Military Role In Atomic Commission Stage Last Ditch Fight

Washington, July 26.—(AP)—Backers of a direct military hand in control of atomic energy developments planned a last-ditch fight in the House today.

Their goal is to upset the Senate-House conference recommendation that all five members of the projected five-member control commission be civilians.

Along with this victory for the administration - enforced original senate bill, the conference committee also decided that the strongly worded patents section of the senate measure should be retained in the final act.

The house had insisted that at least one of the five control commissioners be a member of the armed forces; the senate held out successfully for all civilians.

On the patents section, the house conferees backed down completely. They agreed to accept the senate's provision that inventions and discoveries in the field of atomic energy and fissionable materials shall not be patentable.

The house had rewritten the provision to allow the issuance of patents but to permit the commission to acquire them by purchase or condemnation, with the understanding the patents eventually would revert to their original owners.

On other major provisions of the legislation which were in controversy, the conferees:

1. Accepted a house amendment which many members of the chamber believe would enable the army or the navy to make atom bombs but which Senator McMahon (D-Calif.) interpreted as permitting only army-navy production of containers for atomic weapons.

The amendment allows the armed forces, with the president's approval, to obtain from the commission, or to manufacture for themselves, any equipment or device utilizing fissionable material or atomic energy as a military weapon. McMahon insisted that the commission would

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General Speaks At Celebration

Manteo, July 26.—(AP)—Any nation that commands the air of the world commands the peace of a world in which isolation is no longer possible for any nation, said Brig. Gen. Robert M. Lee, chief of staff of the army air force tactical command, yesterday at Roanoke Island's annual observance of Aviation Day.

The celebration commemorated the first flight of an aircraft which took place on Plym-crowned Kill Devil Hill, within view of the outdoor amphitheater where the exercises were held.

Melvin R. Daniels, chairman of the executive committee of the Roanoke Island Historical Association presided at the evening's exercises and Maj. John A. Walker, general manager of the Lost Colony, presented General Lee.

The 44 years that have elapsed since the first flight of an airplane and the 39 years that have passed since the founding of the army air force, the general said, have reshaped the destiny of the world and re-cast all conceptions of military tactics and strategy.

Isolation is no longer a defense and will dwindle utterly with the further progress of aeronautics and electronics, he said.

Panic Spreads In New Bomb Rumor

Jerusalem, July 26.—(AP)—Panic spread in the heart of jittery Jerusalem today from a false bomb alarm as British police continued measures against alleged terrorists and rounded up more than 200 Jews.

The panic developed from the spread of a rumor that police headquarters was to be blown up in a few minutes.

Someone shouted the Hebrew word for "bomb" and the busy streets around headquarters and the general postoffice were quickly emptied by hundreds fleeing in all directions.

The tension increased with the sudden arrival of police reinforcements in armored cars. It was some time before the excitement subsided and the announcement that the alarm was false.

The police roundup included Jews who had been released during the past 12 months and who were re-arrested today. They were rounded up in Jerusalem, Tel Aviv and Haifa and sent to Latrun detention camps.

ARAB-JEWISH PEACE RUMOR

Division Of Palestine Said To Be Basis Of Agreement

Paris, July 26.—(AP)—An authority said today that Jewish and Arab representatives, in direct negotiation, have formulated a provisional program for settlement of the Palestine problem calling for creation of two independent states, Jewish and Arab.

The authority, who said he had read a draft of the plan, said it called for both states to be declared permanently neutral under the United Nations.

The plan, the informant added, has been submitted to London and Washington for study.

The plan contains the following stipulations, the informant said:

1. Mandated territory, both east and west of the River Jordan, (present boundary between Palestine and Trans-Jordan) shall be declared permanently neutral territory under the United Nations.

2. Two independent states, Jewish (Jewish) and Abdullah (Arab) shall be established in that territory, with the boundaries to be

Psychiatrists Needed

Mental Health Institute To Further Training In Field Badly Neglected; Country Has Only About One-Fourth Number Of Specialists Required

(Editor's note: This is the second of two stories explaining what the government has just done to fight mental disease.)

Washington, July 26.—(AP)—Shocking stories and pictures of the treatment of patients in some state mental hospitals were printed in the past year.

Behind such stories are reasons like these:

Not enough money spent on mental hospitals and not enough trained people—like psychiatrists and attendants—to handle the patients.

The government has stepped into the field and will build, probably in about two years, a national mental health institute. It also will have \$10,000,000 a year to spend on:

Its own research into mental illness, helping with research in schools and hospitals, training young specialists, and assisting the states.

Here is a picture of the mental health problem as given by the senate committee on education and labor after studying the field:

Agency Hikes June 30 Prices On Numerous Items and Lifts Controls From Many Others; Action Was Planned Weeks Ago But Held Up By 25-Day Lay-Off.

Washington, July 26.—(AP)—Less than 24 hours after getting a new start in life, OPA today hiked June 30 prices on numerous items and lifted controls from many others.

All of the agency's actions had been planned weeks ago but had been held up by the 25-day price control coma which began with the lapse of OPA authority on July 1.

On tap were a long list of other orders governing prices on hundreds of items.

But none were in the works yet for the restoration of price ceilings on several major items in the family budget—including meat, dairy products, eggs, poultry, grains, tobacco and petroleum.

These were exempted from price ceilings, at least until August 29, by the OPA revival law which President Truman "reluctantly" signed late yesterday.

The price boosts authorized today are temporary and may be reviewed under standards set up by the new OPA law. Included were increases ranging from six to eight cents a ton on coal, coke, anthracite and similar solid fuels. Some retail shoe price ceilings were upped about eight per cent.

Stripped from the controlled list were such miscellaneous items as household television sets, rubber floor mats, umbrella frames, and certain types of clocks.

So far as today's authorized increases are concerned they are temporary and subject to revision under standards set up by the OPA revival bill which President Truman signed yesterday.

With 142 regulations scheduled for first day issuance, OPA announced that:

Coal price increases, ranging from six to eight cents a ton at retail, are being granted to offset railway freight rate hikes which became effective July 1. Ceilings are being raised on all solid fuels, including anthracite, soft coal, coke, semi-anthracite, lignite, packaged fuel and briquettes.

Retail ceilings on medium and high-priced shoes in style lines that were made during 1942 were increased approximately eight per cent. Low priced shoes in this category were increased about 16 per cent last month and no further change was made in this category today.

OPA said the footwear affected by today's and last month's order amounts to about 30 per cent of total production, and that the increases will raise the general level of shoe prices about 24 per cent.

Little Hope For Housing Measure

Washington, July 26.—(AP)—Some possibility for House passage of the Wagner-Elender-Taft national housing bill was seen today by Speaker Rayburn (D-Tex.). He earlier had told President Truman the measure was dead.

Under direct presidential prod- ding, the House Banking Commit- tee decided today to hold night ses- sions in an effort to get House ac- tion on the measure before Con- gress adjourns next week.

"Some leaders still were skepti- cal," however, that the legislative ma- chinery could function speedily en- ough for passage in the four or five days remaining before adjourn- ment.

Rayburn told his news conference that if the banking committee will bring the bill to the floor the House will act quickly.

The Senate approved measure—a long range supplement to the cur- rent homes for veterans act—is de- signed:

1. To promote the construction of 1,500,000 dwelling units a year for 10 years, largely through private enterprise.

2. To permit the government it- self to erect 125,000 low rent hous- ing units a year.

According to Gleason, the escaped men are still in possession of a navy-owned 1941 Chevrolet blue steel body truck, Navy No. 25291.

**Strength
FOR THE DAY**

MANNERS AND MORALS
Frederick Lewis Allen, a distin-
guished historian of contemporary
events, called attention in 1931 to
what he called "The Revolution in
Manners and Morals." He noted
how the jazz age had apparently
overthrown what we may call the
age of good morality.

Since 1931 the jazz age has been
largely forgotten. First came the
sobering effects of the depression.
After that Hitler appeared on the
scene and began keeping us awake
nights. The hue and cry of well-
intentioned but short-sighted re-
formers over such things as short
skirts, bobbed hair, and lipstick
died down with the passing of time.
These questions of taste have been
settled quite apart from the efforts
of the reformers. But at the same
time, many of the really vicious
aspects of the jazz age have be-
come solidified in modern life, and
opposition to them has lessened be-
cause of the discredit cast on the
whole reform movement by the crit-
ics who were unable to distinguish
between questions of morals and
questions of manners.

Manners and customs will change
from generation to generation, and
independently of them, moral stan-
dards will rise and fall. The need
for moral reform today is just as
actual as it was in 1930. But the
reformer should learn his lesson
from the past. To be effective he
must first distinguish manners from
morals, then strike out at the moral
question and not dissipate his en-
ergy against the inevitable changes
in custom.

**WASHINGTON
DAYBOOK**

Washington—Like the business it
operates, the government's housing
setup is complicated.
At the top is the National Housing
Agency (NHA), created early in
1942 and now headed by the
aggressive Wilson W. Wyatt, former
mayor of Louisville, Ky.

NHA has these three main sec-
tions: the Federal Housing Admin-
istration (FHA), the Federal Home Loan
Bank Administration, and the Federal
Public Housing Authority (FPHA).

FPHA, in turn, has three main
activities: Low-rent housing under
the U. S. Housing Authority (US-
HA); war housing; providing 200,000
units of temporary housing for the
veterans emergency housing pro-
gram from surplus war housing
(like 35,000 trailers) and through the
conversion of old barracks, mess
halls and other structures.

Tucked away elsewhere in FPHA
are these smaller items: The sub-
sistence homestead project and "green
town" model communities built by
the Farm Security Administration;
the original slum-clearance projects
built by the Public Works Admin-
istration during the depression, and
mortgages on limited-dividend hous-
ing projects built privately with
government loans.

At this point in an interview
Philip M. Klutznick, FPHA com-
missioner, asks "are you sufficiently
confused or should I go on?"

When he does go on, it boils down
to this:
The two government housing ac-
tivities which touch the most people
are FPHA's low-rent program un-
der the USHA, and the drive for
2,700,000 new homes for veterans.
For 15 years or more before the
war we had what FPHA calls "def-
icit activity" in the home building
field. Families accumulated more
rapidly than did homes to shelter
them.
USHA, established in 1937, was
able to do a little toward catching
up with this "deficit," before the
war. It helped communities build
117,000 low-rent homes, which re-
placed about 107,000 slum dwellings.
States passed legislation in order to
take part in this program. Then the
states and communities financed
their projects with federal as-
sistance. USHA also provided tech-
nical advice and other services.
The necessary laws are on the



books in 40 states, and local housing
authorities are operating in 448
cities and 368 rural counties.

The National Housing Act re-
quires that dwellings built under
this program cost less than \$4,000
each in the cities under 500,000
population, and under \$5,000 in
larger cities. Slum dwellings must
be demolished for each low-rent
project completed.

The weekly incomes of families
admitted to the projects averaged
\$14.92 in 1940. Even after the gen-
eral wartime rise in wage levels, the
average was only \$23.83 in 1944.
Rents are set generally at the level
of slum rents in each community.
Including utilities, they range in
average from \$14.55 to \$22.34 a
month across the country.

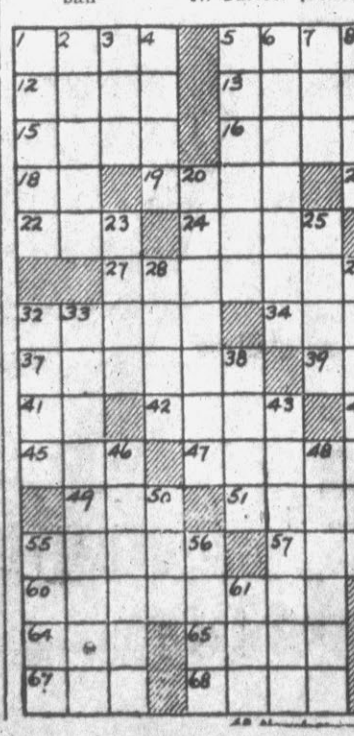
"Undergraduate training in psy-
chiatry was rated in a prewar sur-
vey as excellent in only 19 of 67
class A medical schools in the coun-
try, and psychiatric training was
considered to be substandard in ap-
proximately one-third of these
schools."

"It should also be noted that one
of the reasons for the serious short-
age of trained psychiatrists in the
country and for the inadequate psy-
chiatric training given general med-
ical practitioners is the fact that a
great majority of the deans (of med-
ical schools) are not sufficiently in-
formed regarding the mental health
needs of the country—at least not
informed to such an extent as to
improve and expand, within the
limits of their financial ability, the
psychiatric instruction available in
their institutions."

However, to get back to Russia's
rejection of the American proposal
a spokesman for the U. S. dele-
gation says: "We will now let Gromy-
ko carry the ball for a while and

Council and the United Nations
set-up. It would retain the power

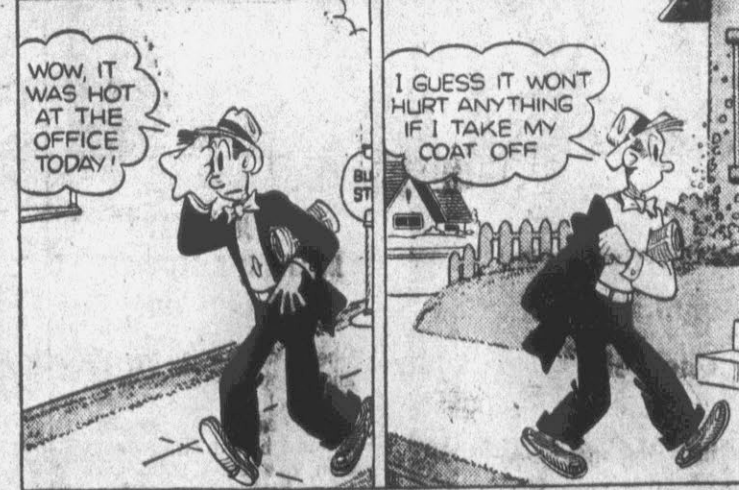

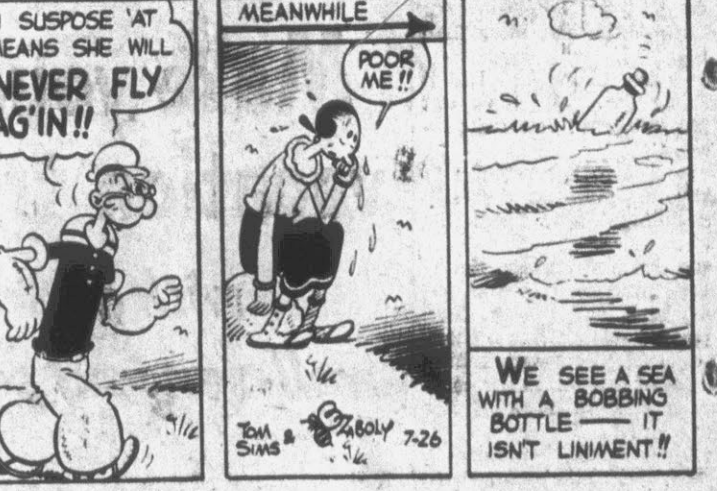

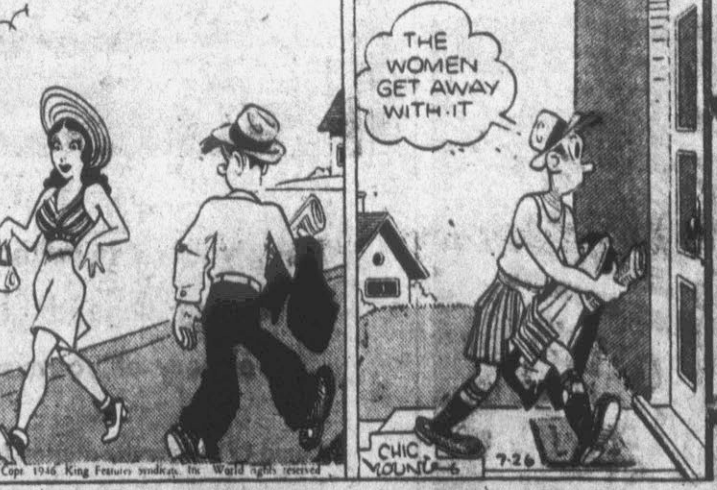

INSTRUMENT PANEL

The interior styling of the luxurious new Frazer is key-noted by the arresting beauty and modern design of the instrument panel. Its graceful curve gives an impression of greater roominess to the whole front compartment.

The oil pressure, engine temperature and fuel gauges and the ammeter are grouped each side of the horizontal speedometer on the left hand side of the instrument panel. The starter button is also located at the extreme left. The central portion of the panel is occupied by an attractive chrome radio-speaker grille, flanked by handy ash receivers. The radio controls are located on a removable panel above the grille. The controls below the grille are, from left to right, ignition switch, throttle, lights, heater, ventilator and cigar lighter. Fresh air is admitted through radiator grille and built-in intakes to each side of the dash below the instrument panel.

The smartly designed steering wheel, with horn ring, is comfortably placed and permits a clear view of the speedometer and gauges. The direction signal lever is below the wheel. Flashing lights, located near the top of the instrument panel, show when the signal is in use and the direction being signalled. A neat glove compartment occupies the right side of the instrument panel with a chrome bar carrying the name "Frazer" above.

Tommy Lee pitched all the way

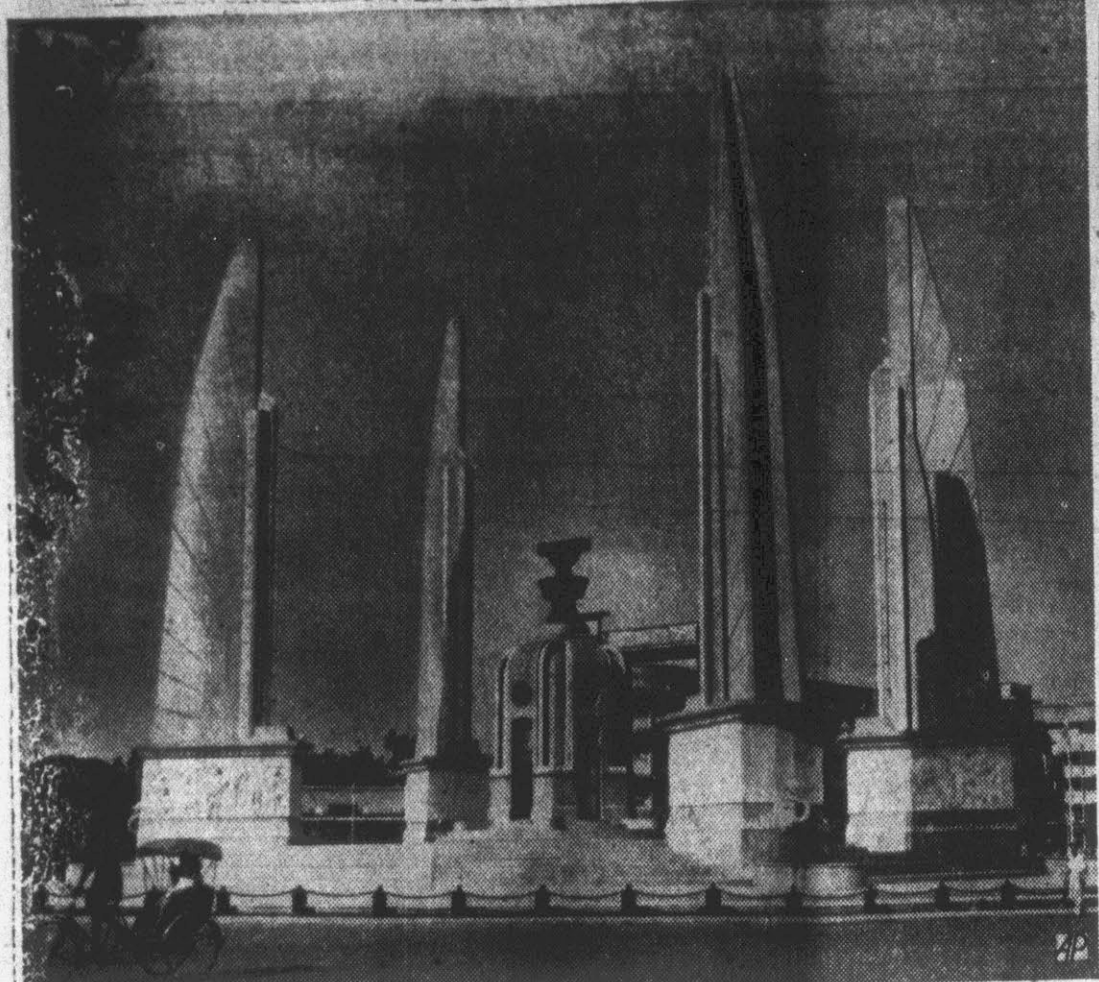
for the Greenies and was given excellent support by his teammates. Errorless ball marked the local club's performance as compared with four errors credited to the Bears.

TAR HEELS IN HIGH FINANCE

Fourth Carolinian Is Given Key Spot In Gov't Spending

Washington, July 26.—(AP)—A quartet of North Carolinians holds strong grips on the government's purse strings today.

Newest of the Tar Heel State's federal finance rulers is 39-year-old James E. Webb, appointed director of the budget by President Truman yesterday.

Webb is a wartime marine aviator, lawyer, former business executive and one-time congressman's secretary who recently became a junior executive in the treasury. In his new post he will hold perhaps the top "management" job in the government, short of the presidency.

The post pays only \$10,000 a year but all the government's departments and agencies will have to clear with Webb the multi-billion-dollar requests for funds which they submit annually to the President and Congress.

Webb is expected to work closely with his friends and fellow Tar Heels—undersecretary of the treasury (and former governor of North

Carolina) O. Max Gardner, comptroller general (and former N. C. representative in Congress) Lindsay C. Warren, and Chairman Doughton (D-NC) of the House Ways and Means Committee.

Gardner and Doughton have major voices in how the government raises its money. Gardner formulates treasury tax policy. Doughton's committee passes on revenue-raising legislation.

Warren, as top federal accountant, checks on the government's money.

Webb's appointment was a surprise in Washington and was ascribed largely to influence of Max Gardner, to whom he has been executive assistant since Gardner came to the treasury four months ago. He was in Gardner's law firm before that.

er, were en route from Monroe to Harrison's farm in adjoining Oconee county when they were waylaid at a bridge over the Apalache river, the sheriff said.

Harrison, at a coroner's inquest last night, the sheriff testified that he could not identify any member of the band which waylaid him. The jury returned a verdict of death at the hands of unknown parties.

The slayings, the sheriff said, occurred about eight miles east of Monroe, the county seat of Walton county, which is about 40 miles northeast of Atlanta.

Here is the story of the slayings as told by the sheriff after questioning Harrison:

Harrison stopped the car at the entrance to the bridge, and the armed men ordered the two Negro men from the car and proceeded down a side road. Harrison and the two Negro women were held at the automobile.

Then Harrison heard one of the men in the armed band remark that one of the Negro women had recognized him, and several of the men came back and took the women from the car.

Harrison then heard shots. After the shots, the mob dispersed, and Harrison went back two miles toward Monroe and called Sheriff Gordon from a country store.

Winston-Salem Men Pledge College Aid

Winston-Salem, July 26.—(AP)—Some 65 Winston-Salem civic leaders have pledged their support of Wake Forest College's building program if the Baptist school is moved to Winston-Salem.

They voted their support yesterday during a luncheon following talks by Dr. Thurman D. Kitchin, president of the college, and former Governor Broughton, a member of the board of trustees.

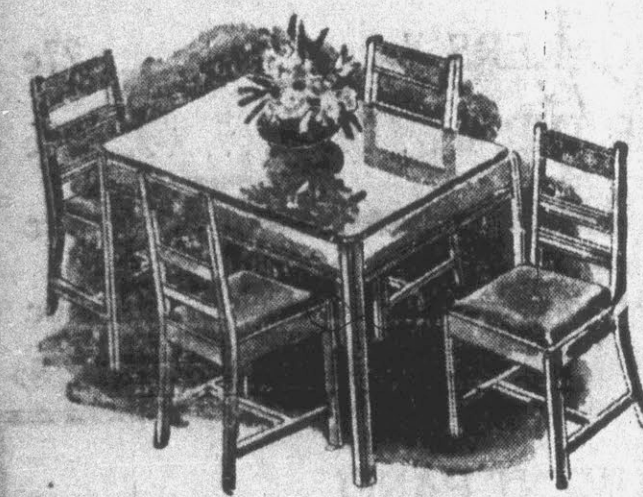

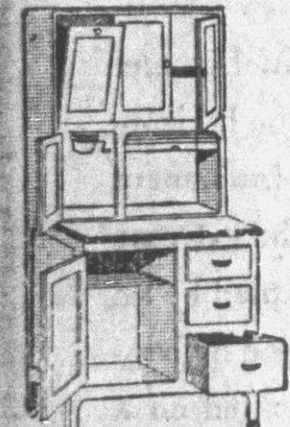

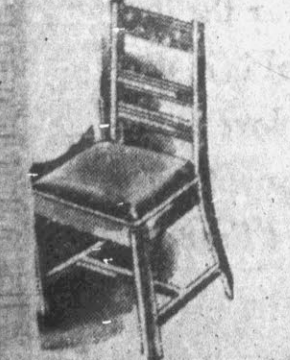
