'GO-GETTERS' ACTIVE GROUP

Leon Roebuck, Jr., Reviews Legion Record At Banquet

"The American Legion in North Carolina during the past year has increased its membership from 15,000 to 70,000 members, and plans are in the making for increasing the membership to 125,000," District Commander Leon Roebuck, Jr., stated at a supper meeting of the "Go-Getters" Board at Proctor Hotel last night. Bethel, Enfield, Rocky Mount, Stantonsburg and Greenville were represented at the meeting.

Roebuck gave some interesting statistics about the North Carolina Department of the American Legion. He explained that the "Go-Getters" Board is composed of legionnaires who are doing outstanding work in procuring new members. He said that Col. Paul Younts of Charlotte, vice-commander, has already begun his duties. Roebuck mentioned as some of the highlights among Legion activities; adequate hospitalization for veterans; the program for improvement of American youth; that North Carolina has three times won the Legion World Series; that the Legion now has in Washington, D. C., two members from every state in the Union and they are meeting in the National Capitol Building. The American Legion has five \$250 scholarships for North Carolina sons and daughters of deceased veterans. The National Legion has \$5,000,000 in an endowment fund, the income being used to aid orphans of veterans. The speaker pointed out that the Legion has a national oratorical contest every year and that local legionnaires are encouraged to participate and win.

After reviewing some of the Legion's achievements, Commander Roebuck said the Legion is a great association of Americans and it speaks for America and Americans. He said it is now up to the veterans of World War II to pick up the ball with the veterans of World War I and continue to carry it forward.

"There should be no 'line' marking the men of the two wars, except the enlarged 'waist-lines' of the World War I veterans."

"Maj. W. E. Spence, head of the Georgia State Police, was reached by telephone in Atlanta just after he had returned from Monroe, Ga., scene of the brutal killings.

"We're still working on the case," Spence declared. "and so far as I know, no arrests have been made."

"Another state official, who asked not to be quoted, said that the FBI had put its finger on at least three of the gang and is tying up the threads of other evidence before making arrests of the entire lynch mob."

Monroe, Ga., Aug. 9.—(AP)—Walton county officials said today they had no information of the reported identification of three members of the mob which lynched four Negroes near here July 25, and the FBI declined to comment.

Sheriff E. S. Gordon said he had heard nothing of any identifications or arrests in the case.

John F. Trost, head of the Atlanta office of the FBI, said simply that he had no comment to make on the report.

FALSE ALARM

Pauls Valley, Okla., Aug. 5.—(AP)—An early morning fire is a rarity in this little town. loans in an aggregate amount of \$25,697,000. Farm real estate loans were made to 7,669 farmers for a total of \$11,324,000. On January 1, 1946, there were outstanding in the United States \$1,100,000,000 in farm loans and \$1,100,000,000 in farm real estate loans. The Federal Reserve Bank of New York reported that the "Commodity" Credit Corporation were made by the banks to only 507 farmers for a total of only \$444,600, a considerable reduction from the amounts loaned in previous years when price-support levels were

ment bonds equal to 82 per cent of their deposits. By contrast, in 1929 country banks in this state had cash and government securities equal to less than 31 per cent of deposits. The high ratio of liquidity is one of the most promising indications for the continued financial well-being of our farm community."

Providing bank credit to meet the needs of agriculture for constructive purposes is only one of the services being rendered by the banks to their farm customers. Mr. Woolard pointed out. Working with their state association and with the American Bankers Association's Agricultural Commission, the banks have been promoting a program which will result in many benefits to the farm community.

"One aim of this program," Mr. Woolard said, "is to prevent post-war inflation. The banks are encouraging their farm customers to continue to save through purchase of U. S. Savings Bonds, and avoid going into excessive debt to buy farm land at high prices. The average price of farm land in North Carolina is now 100 per cent above the 1935-39 average. This rise is nearly as great as the rise during the World War I period to the boom peak in 1920. Bankers are watching this situation closely and are urging their customers to keep in a safe financial position."

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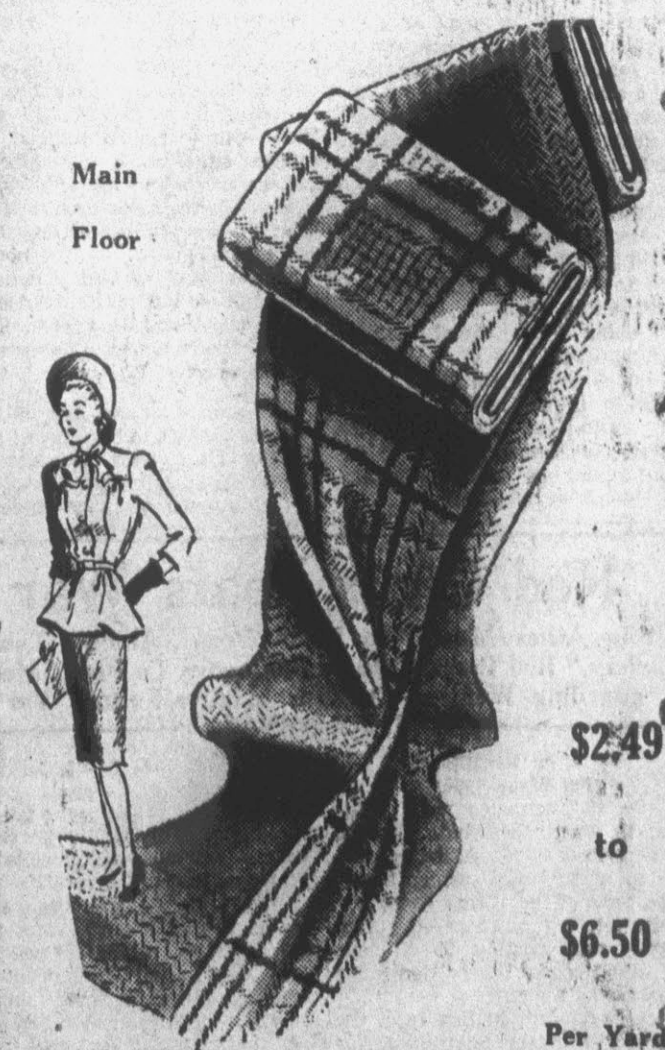
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JIGGER MORAN

mobilization and reconversion sub- mitted one business man's prob- lems to other business organiza- tions which, in turn, have the answer. The department realizes this cannot be done under the competitive con- ditions of peace time. As a substi- tute the technical advisory division will try to find answers from non- competitive sources. If they can- not be found, worthy subjects may be made the basis for research pro- jects.

Through its industrial research and development division, the de- partment proposes to sponsor in- dustrial research projects, making contracts with non-profit labora- tories. These are expected to pro- duce the better spring the mouse- trap maker needs.

Sam Thompson, the department's director of program planning, ac- knowledges that some business men have been skeptical of this program. They have asked:

1. Will the technical service in- vade the field of industrial engi- neers and others who have made a living by meeting business service needs?
2. Will the program displace such agencies as state or local resource and development boards?
3. Will Secretary of Commerce Henry Wallace use the set-up as the basis for a personal political orga- nization?

The answer in each case, Thomp- son says, is "No."

He said the department will at- tempt to assemble complete infor- mation about availability or infor- mation, materials and services.

The business man who asks for something that a private agency can supply will be referred to that agency. Or, he may be referred to local development agencies which are known to be equipped to serve him.

The federal agency will put its research program into use only where a gap appears that needs filling, Thompson said.

- Increase by 20 per cent, effective September 1, the pensions of 2,400,000 World War I and II veterans and their dependants.
- Tighten standards for on-the-job training of veterans, which Veter- an Administrator Omar N. Bradley says threatens to develop a scandal.
- Authorize the veterans admin- istration to operate canteens in hos- pitals and veterans homes and pro- vide a \$4,000,000 fund.
- Permit about 10,000 veterans who lived in enemy lands during the war to receive VA benefits if they were not disloyal to the United States.
- Give full pensions to some 40,000 veterans who were disabled while serving in peacetime.
- Provide unemployment rights for wartime merchant mariners, simi- lar to rights of those in the armed forces.
- Make \$75,000,000 available for the Federal War Administration to provide temporary additional fa- cilities at colleges training veterans under the GI Bill of Rights.

Ar- my personnel may obtain the prop- er application form at any recruit- ing office.

All payments to veterans will be at the pay rate for the enlisted grade held when discharged. Those still on active duty also will be compensated at the rate for the last enlisted grade or rating held. Payments will include an addition- al 70 cents a day for subsistence and, for master, technical and staff sergeants with dependents, \$1.25 a day for quarters.

The act put a one-year limit on the time for applying payments. Maturity date of the bonds is five years from the date of the last sep- aration from service. They may

SIX TONS OF DISHES WASHED IN AVERAGE HOME ANNUALLY

Accelerated Salvaging of Household Fat Makes Possible Present Supplies of Soap for This and Other Household Chores

It has been calculated that every American housewife washes six tons of dishes every year! Add up the accumulation from 365 break- fasts, luncheons, dinners and in- between snacks and the total would fill six trucks, experts say.

Staggering as the task of wash- ing six tons of dishes sounds, imagi- ne how much more impossible the job would be without soap! The prospect of a soap-less life is not on the horizon, however, as long as housewives keep up their present rate of salvaging fat.

Department of Agriculture au- thorities point out that if it had not been for salvaged fat in 1945, housewives would have had 13 per cent less soap. Even so there are not enough industrial fats and oils available to meet the demand for soaps and other goods the public wants.

Help Yourself

Every time you turn in a pound of fats to your meat dealer you are actually helping yourself and your neighbors by relieving the shortage not only of soap but also of scarce items like table linen, crapes, floor coverings, even possibly some new nylon.

Food experts too are urging fat conservation! Use and reuse every drop and ounce of beef, bacon and even lamb fat when you're cook- ing, they say. Then, when you've had all the food value of your fat, turn in the drippings and scrapings for salvage.

The 800,000,000 people starving in Europe and Asia are scavenging in garbage cans for grease that many an American family washes down the drain. Fats are scarce everywhere. We, as a nation, must be careful not to waste material, which if properly used would save human lives in some other country

BLIND TO TRUTH
Here is a statement made in re-
cent years by a well-known writer
which merits considerable reflec-
tion: "The soul works in such a way
that you can't see the truth if you
give up telling it."

In other words, the Nemesis of
lying is that it makes people blind
to the truth. The liar gets to the
place where he doesn't know truth
when he sees it. He breaks down the
solid wall which divides truth from
falseness and the result is such a
churning of things true and things
untrue that for the life of him the
purveyor of falsehood cannot tell
one from the other. Mentally, the
liar loses the capacity for sound
judgment. Spiritually, he loses the
capacity to see things as they really
are.

It is not possible to have satis-

out veracity. If businessmen lie to

ing of disaster sounds out with a
foreboding. Parents who twist
the truth, equivocate, and lie on all
occasions set an example to their
children which will handicap them
in later life more than the loss of
hands, feet, or eyes. In fact, that
they do is to teach their children
to become blind, because once peo-
ple give up telling the truth, they
lose the capacity to know the truth
when they see it.

Washington—The government has
more than 2,000,000 single false rear
teeth that the War Assets Admin-
istration has declared surplus. They
were made under a lend lease con-
tract for shipment, mostly to Rus-
sia.

It looks as if the government bit
off more than it could chew, be-
cause the teeth never were sent.
And they're chattering around in
government storerooms waiting for
someone to buy them.

The government had loads of
other false teeth too. But those
were attached and in sets. They
were grabbed up by the Veterans'
Administration for use in govern-
ment hospitals.

On the other hand, WAA had no
trouble getting rid of a human
skull, declared surplus by the
Quartermaster Corps at Camp Sil-
bert, Ala. It had been used by Army
government \$15.

The Atlanta Regional office of
WAA posted it for sale:
"One adult human skull, slightly
used, but in good condition, for
only \$8.25."

American ingenuity has found
new uses for many strange items
offered for sale as government-
owned surplus to civilians.

Chester Chinn, Chinese-American
war veteran of Portland, Ore.,
wanted a noodle machine. There
was none in surplus. Chinn picked
up surplus rollers, knives and other
do-dads, fashioned his own ma-
chine. He goes to Reed College in
the daytime, makes noodles for
grocers at night.

A Texas farmer bought a portable
flame thrower to use in clearing
underbrush from his land.
Nylon material, left over from
aviation "black-out" suits, is being
reconverted into women's dress
shields.

B-24 pilot seats are being used on
a fishing boat where their low-
slung contours will be ideal.

Four hundred small engines
ready for scrap were salvaged by
a lawn mower manufacturer—to
make father's life more pleasant
in the evenings.

The government has made it easy,
it says, for the veteran and small
business man to buy aircraft. A

Mothers Ask For Stolen Children

Berlin, Aug. 8.—(AP)—A delega-
tion of German mothers from the
Russian occupied province of Grand-
denberg has appealed to the Inter-
national Red Cross here for aid in
finding thousands of children they
said had disappeared from the pro-
vince in recent months, a spokes-
man for the Red Cross said today.

"The mothers showed us lists of
names, but we haven't yet verified
them, nor accusations that boys be-
tween the ages of 13 and 17 have
been snatched off the streets and
never heard from again," the
spokesman said.

The delegation was received by
the International Red Cross a week
ago and also visited Berlin church
leaders.

The parents maintain, according
to the British licensed newspaper
Telegraph and American licensed
Timespiegel, that the children have
been taken to Russian camps where
they are being schooled in a "new
Weltanschauung" (philosophy of
life).

The mothers asserted that local
Russian commandants referred
their appeals for assistance to dis-
trict leaders of the Russian spon-
sored Socialist Unit Party who

they said, "brusquely dismissed
them."

Schools To Get Sum For Lunch Program

Raleigh, N. C., Aug. 8.—(AP)—A
fund of nearly \$500,000 has been
allocated North Carolina schools
under the federal school lunch act
for the purchase of equipment for
lunch rooms, State Superintendent
of Public Instruction Clyde A. Er-
win announced today.

The equipment fund is in addi-
tion to a recent allocation of \$2,250,
000 for the purchase of food, Erwin
said.

The equipment will be allocated
as follows:
1. Fifty cents per child in average
daily attendance in all schools op-
erating under the school lunch pro-
grams and when they show need for
the items desired.

2. The remainder will be used
without being matched to provide
aid to school lunch rooms and to
aid in the establishment of lunch
rooms in additional schools.

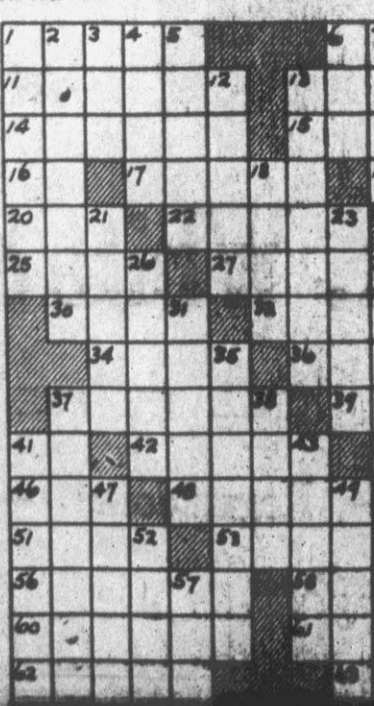

peace and that "the gap between
West and East grows ever larger."
There is no other way, the state-
ment continues, "to save millions
from certain death than to create
these cases of humanity where every
man would have the same rights
whatever his nationality and where

possibility of implementing such
programs but it is not their fea-
sibility, or even their desirability,
that makes them important. It is
the idea behind them—the situa-

dental with the cry from Switzerland:
"Save the women and children."

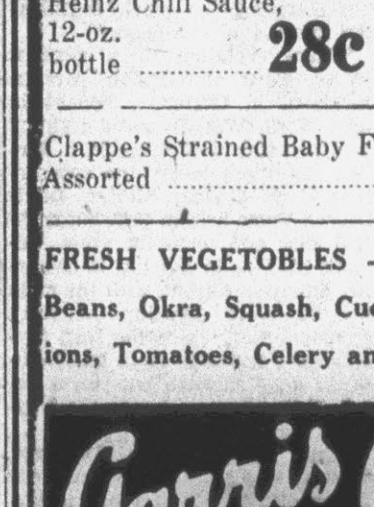

British Prepare Impose Blockade

London, Aug. 9—(AP)—The British government apparently was busy today arranging land, air and sea forces for imposition of a blockade on unauthorized Jewish immi- gration into Palestine.

A Foreign Office spokesman said Britain had requested the Russian and Romanian governments to do everything possible to stop the em- barkation of immigrants from Con- stanza and other Romanian ports. Similar representations have been made to France, Italy, Czechoslo- vakia and Poland urging them to stop the movement of Palestine- bound Jews at the source. The spokesman said one ship was now in Romanian waters waiting for a load of immigrants.

The cruiser Ajax arrived at Haifa harbor, Palestine, where the fate of 1,500 immigrants aboard ships was still undecided. They have not been allowed to land although they arrived several days ago. Dispatches from the island for- cess of Malta in the Mediterranean said all units of the British Medi- terranean fleet were preparing to rendezvous in Grecian waters for a "summer cruise," a maneuver that would put them in position to in- tercept Palestine-bound ships.

The British Admiralty denied knowledge of any rendezvous but a spokesman said the royal navy was "constantly on the lookout for any illegal immigrant ships."

Rumor LaGuardia Back In Politics

Washington, Aug. 9—(AP)—Flo- rido H. LaGuardia's announcement that he wants to quit soon as UNRRA chieftain spurred specula- tion today that he may become a candidate for the Democratic Sena- torial nomination in New York.

LaGuardia said in Geneva, Swit- zerland, this week that he wants to take a look at the United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation situation in China and then step down as director general.

The possibility that the name of the former New York mayor might go before the September 3-4 Demo- cratic convention in Albany if Sen- ator James Mead is nominated for governor already has been consid- ered seriously in the Mead camp here.

But even if LaGuardia makes it plain he is in a receptive mood, there is considerable doubt that he could be put over in the Democratic convention without some direct help from national chairman Robert E. Hannegan. That would be an un- usual move for a Democratic chair- man to make for a man who served in Congress as a Republican and who ran for mayor as the candidate of the American labor party, the Republicans and the liberal party.

Treble Damage Suit Against Lumberman

Raleigh, Aug. 9—A treble damage suit for \$6,803.04 has been filed in the Washington, N. C., division of United States District Court by the OPA against A. J. Barnhill and C. E. Everett, lumber dealers of Greenville, Route 4.

W. H. Yarborough, Jr., chief of OPA's lumber enforcement unit here, said that the complaint in the case alleges that during the period between January 12 and April 12, 1946, the defendants sold and delivered a total of 134,449 board feet of log run rough green lumber at \$50 per thousand feet for a total of \$2,267.68 above the legal ceiling. The agency seeks three times the alleged overcharges as damages.

The OPA also asked a preliminary

and final injunction restraining the defendants from further violations of regulations, Yarbrough said.

Pirates To Vote On Belonging To Guild

Harrisburg, Pa., Aug. 8—(AP)—Robert Murphy and his controversial American Baseball Guild took on added stature today in a quest to unionize baseball, bulwarked by a Pennsylvania Labor Relations Board order for a collective bargaining election among team members of the Pittsburgh Pirates.

The precedent-setting decision—it's the first of its kind in organized baseball—fixed Aug. 20 for the date of the election at Pittsburgh.

Thirty-one Buccos are eligible for the election, the board ruled here yesterday. Murphy has said he already holds Guild membership cards for 26 of them.

Pro Football Starts Pre Season Practice

Washington, Aug. 8—(AP)—The Washington Redskins leave today for San Diego and their pre-season pro football practicing, accompanied by this glowing evaluation from Coach Turk Edwards:

"Never, in my 15 years with the Redskins, have I seen such material."

Edwards told a reporter that a peek at the quarterback position illustrates what he's talking about. "Under the T formation," he said, "your quarterback is the key man. Well, the Chicago Bears used the T for years, but the only quarterback they ever had who amounted to much was Sid Luckman."

"We have Sammy Baugh, Jack Jacobs, and Jim Youel, and each of our fellows is as good as Luckman."

Tony Lazari, Great Ball Player, Passes

San Francisco, Calif., Aug. 8—(AP)—"Poosh-em-up" Tony Lazari, former New York Yankee ball player and one of the murderers row of hitters with Babe Ruth and Lou Gehrig, is dead at 42.

The body of the popular big league star, who started baseball as a youngster on San Francisco's sand lots and played in seven world series, six with the Yanks and one with the Cubs during the 1930's was found in his suburban home yesterday by his wife, Maye, and a brother-in-law Louie Servente when they returned from a vacation.

Investigating physicians said Lazari died either of a heart attack or the result of a fall. The body was found slumped at the foot of a staircase near the entrance of the home. He had been dead an estimated 36 hours when found at 4 p. m. (PST) yesterday.

It is still too early to compare Bob Feller, Cleveland's great right-hander, with such pitching immortals as Walter Johnson, Christy Mathewson, Cy Young and Grover Cleveland Alexander, but at the rate he is moving along, the former boy wonder appears a cinch to be voted a place in baseball's hall of fame just as soon as his pitching days are over.

The Indians' mound master shattered a 36-year-old standard yesterday when he racked up his eighth one-hitter as he blanked the Chicago White Sox 5-0 in the first game of a doubleheader.

With just eight big league years behind him—only five of them complete—rapid Robert has two no-hit masterpieces to his credit, in addition to his eight one-hitters and has allowed fewer than five safeties in 20 other games. He holds two strikeout marks—most in one game, 18; and in two consecutive games, 28; and is one of five American Leaguers to fan six men in succession.

Although never on a pennant winner, Feller has won 24 or more games three times and appears a cinch to make it four this season with 21 victories already under his belt.

Were it not for a three and a half year hitch in the navy, Feller, barring injury, would have an outside chance of bettering Johnson's American League record of 414 triumphs. Bob owns 133 victories against only 63 defeats and has struck out 1,543 batsmen in 1,769 innings, including 351 whiffs this season.

What made Feller's latest achievement more remarkable was that only four days ago, he had been forced to leave the field at Cleveland, grimacing with pain after he had pulled a back muscle in the seventh inning against the New York Yankees. Feller asked permission to pitch yesterday despite only three days' recuperation.

Despite Feller's masterpiece, the Indians could do no better than gain an even split when the Pale Hose nine fought back to nip the Tribe 7-6 in the 10-inning nightcap.

The ed Sox prepared for their four-game series with the second place Yankees beginning today by whipping the lowly Philadelphia Athletics twice 4-3 and 10-6.

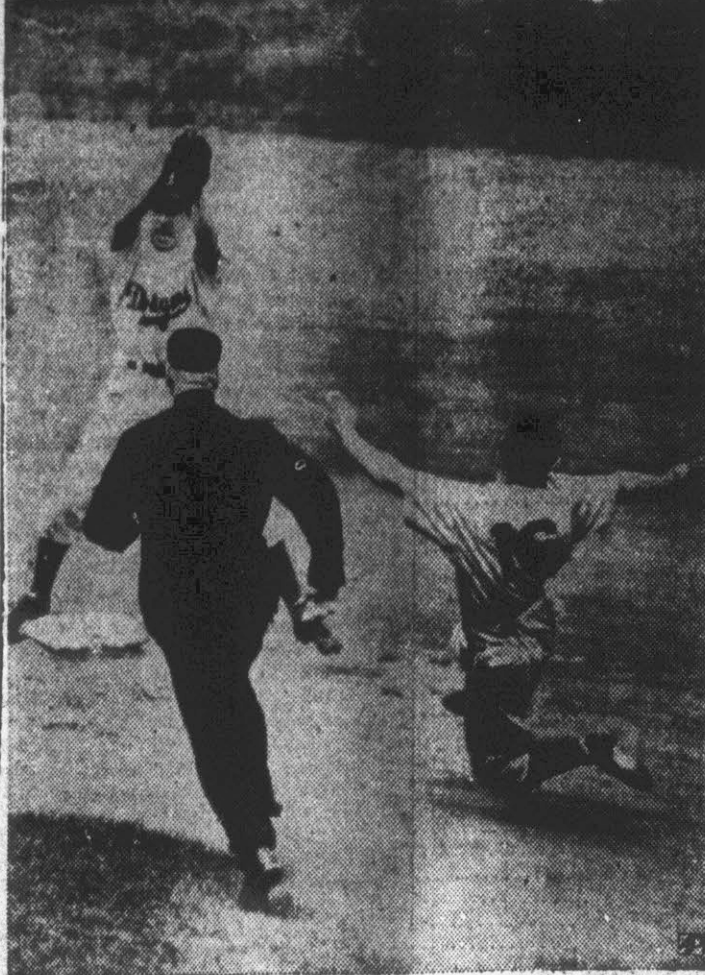

Five Cincinnati errors, two in the tenth inning, enabled the Chicago Cubs to eke out a 2-1 win over the Reds.

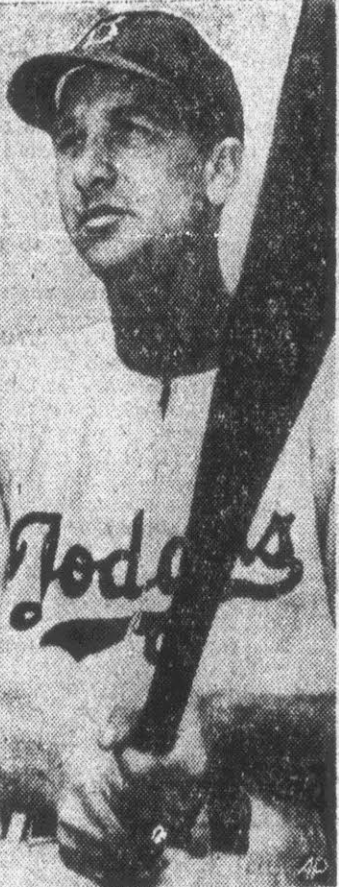

Pirates New Owners Iron Out Headaches

Pittsburg, Aug. 9—(AP)—The new owners of the Pittsburgh Pirates took a brief look today at the headache they acquired along with the club—the problem of the American Baseball Guild—and then plunged into the job of ironing out last financial details of their more than \$2,000,000 transaction.
Affable, cigar-chewing Frank E. McKinney, the Indianapolis banker who is the new president and part-owner of the Pirates, said he had "high hopes" that current negotiations between major league players and management would settle the troublesome labor union issue.
McKinney and Bing Crosby—famed movie and radio star—headed a four-man syndicate which bought the National League's last place club yesterday for a price reported to be close to \$2,225,000. The sale was made by William E. Benswager, former Pirate president. He acted as agent in the deal for his mother-in-law, Mrs. Barney Dreyfuss, now ex-chairman of the board.

He declared that when he wrote the memorandum that he was not aware that any state employees were receiving federal payments for on-the-job training. Dayton said that since then he has discovered a large number of employees are obtaining Veterans' Administration checks for on-the-job training.
Dayton said, in his opinion, the checks were legitimate, and added that he did not think any attempt would be made to discontinue their payments.

circumstances it would approve 31-2 cents of the 5-cent increase for application toward price relief. Wads said other industries had received 18 cents an hour postwar wage increases.
However, Steelman in his review noted that individual postwar wage increases had been established in industry by industry, taking into account living cost standards and other factors. There was no reason, he said, why workers in every industry should have received the same raise.
"There appear to be no special circumstances which would distinguish this case from any other when might be presented in which a full reconversion pattern had been established and approved," Mr. Steelman wrote.
All the affected lumber workers now are receiving the full postwar increase. In most cases the companies had agreed to pay the full amounts regardless of whether the government approved.
There was one exception, the Central California Pine Companies of San Francisco, which had a company with 3,897 employees. That group had made its five-cent increase contingent on government approval.

Naval Research Lab Planned In Maryland

Washington, Aug. 9—(AP)—The cornerstone of "one of the world's outstanding research centers," the new \$15,000,000 naval ordnance laboratory at White Oak, Md., will be laid next Thursday, the Navy department said today.
Secretary of Navy Forrestal will lay the cornerstone.
The new laboratory, which will be staffed by more than 1,000 scientists and engineers, the navy said will delve into projects ranging from "small simple mechanical devices to large complex mechanisms employing advance electronic designs" relating to mines, depth charges, fuses, torpedo magnetisms and other items of naval ordnance.

Convicts Buried Alive In Gravel

Columbia, S. C., Aug. 9—(AP)—Five Negro convicts at the state prison farm near Boykin in Kershaw County lost their lives about 5:30 p. m. yesterday when a deep gravel pit in which they were digging caved in on them.
Supt. A. Roy Ashley of the state penitentiary announced the tragedy, which he described as "most unfortunate."
The men were buried alive, he said, when a wall of gravel he estimated at 25 feet high suddenly toppled on them without warning.
J. M. Smith, the guard for the work detail, and a sixth Negro prisoner were also in the pit but were far enough away to escape entrapment. Ashley said the sixth prisoner was hurt slightly by flying gravel.
Smith and the surviving convict, whose name Ashley did not have, scrambled out of the pit and dashed to a nearby farmhouse, where they blew a siren for help, Ashley said.

Picks and shovels flew fast, Ashley continued, and the bodies of the five men were unearthed in about 25 minutes from the time of the accident. It was too late, however.
