Kaiser Protests. Detail Questions

Declares Points Brought Up Which Would Take Staff Of Accountants, Engineers And Others To Answer; Probe Of Exorbitant Profits By Shipbuilders Goes Deep

Washington, Sept. 24.—(AP)—Henry J. Kaiser, West Coast shipbuilder, protested today that he could not answer on short notice "an endless number of detailed and technical questions" about five years of transactions by Kaiser Company, Inc.

He declared counsel for the Merchant Marine Committee, which is inquiring into wartime shipbuilding profits, had brought up points which "it is going to take a staff of accountants, engineers and others to answer."

The questions as to the Kaiser financial setup arose yesterday after the committee heard testimony that Kaiser shipbuilding enterprises received \$192,237,284 in profits from the government on a capital investment of \$250,000.

The committee also was told that an unrelated company in Florida ran a \$600 investment into profits of more than \$2,000,000, an item which prompted Reps. Fred Bradley (R-Mich.) and Alvin White (R-Ohio) to demand a full-scale investigation.

Kaiser, who disputed the figures relating to his company, repeatedly told committee counsel he was unable to answer some of the questions about his financial structure at the moment. The committee excused him until today.

In his statement prepared for today's session Kaiser said:

"We want this committee to understand that there isn't a single thing we aren't happy to disclose that is in our books and corporate records."

He reiterated that combined net profits after taxes of the four Kaiser shipbuilding companies were less than 10 percent of the total volume of work done for the Maritime Commission "after deducting all losses."

"Integrated operations in war production"—which included making steel for ships and guns as well as building the ships—Kaiser, Inc. "did not make a profit but in fact suffered losses."

The committee hearings, which will cover operations of companies which built ships for the Maritime Commission in government-owned shipyards, were scheduled to last only a week.

"One week won't be enough," Bradley told reporters. "This will take weeks to get to the bottom of the testimony already given shows that one company ran \$600 up to more than \$2,000,000, without any risk, and that others did the same with larger amounts."

At Jacksonville, Kenneth A. Merrill, shipyard executive and vice president of the now defunct St. Johns River Corporation, described the report as fantastic, adding:

"We did nothing but manage the enterprise and we were on a fee."

Philadelphia, Sept. 24.—(AP)—Launching an all-out investigation to uncover the cause of the break in the Sept. 3 stock market, the U. S. Securities and Exchange Commission has asked all member firms of the New York Stock Exchange to supply the SEC with data on sales that day.

James A. Treanor, Jr., director of the SEC's Trading and Exchange Division, said questionnaires asking information on every round-lot purchase of stock sale were mailed last Friday and are to be returned to the SEC's New York office by Oct. 7.

D P Problem In Europe

Current Debate In UN Over Establishment Of Vast International Relief Organization Has Unique Background; Many "DPs" Fear To Return Home

One of the great human problems growing out of the war underlies the current debate in the United Nations Economic and Social Council over the proposal to establish a vast international relief organization, with a budget of \$250,000,000 to care for some 900,000 displaced persons in the American, British and French zones of occupation in Europe.

Russia and Latin American countries have been opposing the project on the grounds that it is unnecessary, but the Soviet delegate, Nikolai Feonov, really went to the bat yesterday when he heatedly charged that the United States and Britain have been playing politics in handling the refugees. Most of these unfortunate folk, it should be noted, are in the American and British zones.

NO IMMEDIATE END TO HIGH LEVEL TAXES

Says Secretary Of Treasury Snyder; "Must Reduce Public Debt"

Chicago, Sept. 24.—(AP)—Secretary of the Treasury John W. Snyder declared today that "for our common good our present tax levels must be maintained for some time."

"This is inescapable if we are to achieve a balanced budget and a surplus to be used to reduce the public debt," Snyder told the American Bankers' Association in a prepared address.

"It is true that it is pure fantasy to expect plain democracy to talk of tax reduction and debt reduction in the same breath."

The treasury secretary told the bankers that in the present economic environment the federal government should direct its primary effort on the fiscal front to achieving a balanced budget.

"Better yet, it should strive to achieve a substantial surplus of taxes over expenditures to apply to debt reduction. These are the views I expressed the first day I entered the treasury; and they have the full support of the president."

He said the treasury from Feb. 23 until Sept. 14 had reduced the debt by "about 14 billion dollars as the result of heavy payoffs made on maturities of marketable securities each month."

Snyder asserted, "considering that there are certain non-cash expenditures included in the budget," the government in cash transactions "will take in more money than it spends this year."

The deficit for the current year, he continued, will be \$1,900,000,000, "a great improvement over the estimate made last January," which was \$4,500,000,000 for this fiscal year. He ascribed this to a reduction of 1,000,000 in the number of federal employees, and to the end of the war.

He reported that expenditures for national defense would be \$3,300,000,000 above last January's \$3,000,000,000 estimate, and added: "I certainly do not want to repeat the mistake that was made after the first World War."

Jap Crime Wave Has New Twists

Tokyo, Sept. 24.—(AP)—Japan's crime wave is subsiding but crime remained page one news with these astonishing twists: Pistol packing gun girls, deaf and dumb burglars and police reported between blushing, theft of clothing and other articles from two police officials.

A man reported that two girls carrying guns tried to rob him but fled. Police said that although women had ganged together to beat and rob, this was the first recorded time any had resorted to firearms here.

Police arrested two deaf and dumb youths and charged them with ten burglaries and six pocket pickings netting an estimated 100,000 yen (\$6,667).

The topper involved the Yotsu police chief and his assistant, who came here to learn more about police work.

While the chief and his aide enjoyed a bath, someone stole their clothing, wrist watches and cash. They had to borrow clothing for the return trip home.

Officers To Report On Missing Airmen

Shanghai, Sept. 24.—(AP)—Three American air force officers were expected here today from a long flight to Chengtu—the first mission to investigate reports that a number of missing airmen are living in the wilds of far western China as slaves of primitive Lolo tribesmen.

The three, Lt. Col. Herbert W. Wurtzler and Capt. Tully O'Reilly and Edward J. McAllister, left Saturday to question missionaries and U. S. Army Graves Registration teams in the Chengtu area. It was from Chengtu, a wartime B-29 base, that Ambassador L. Leighton Stuart received reports of the captives.

Officials said every possible step was being taken to locate and rescue any such captives. The army will consider any reasonable ransom demands—which probably would involve food rather than cash.

DR. COOKE IN FACULTY TALK

Dr. Dennis H. New Theory For Nuclear Physics

Princeton, N. J., Sept. 24.—(AP)—Forty-four year old Prof. P. A. M. Dirac, English mathematician tossed a theoretical bombshell into the Princeton University Bicentennial Conference today with a new conception of the nature of matter.

His proposal caused excitement because it looked promising for helping to solve the mystery of the immense forces bidding the nuclei of atoms, whose splitting makes bombs and atomic power.

Slaughter said he intends to press other witnesses for an explanation of how a mysterious memorandum was inserted in WAA records several months after the transaction occurred, noting that the sale of the trucks at \$4,500 had been verbally agreed to previously.

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Dirac proposed that the three primary particles out of which all matter is formed, namely electrons, protons and neutrons, are mere points, with no size. Giving them no size whatever is not a new idea. This idea was thought of 40 years ago, but abandoned because "mathematics failed to show it possible."

Dirac today presented the mathematics which solved this possibility.

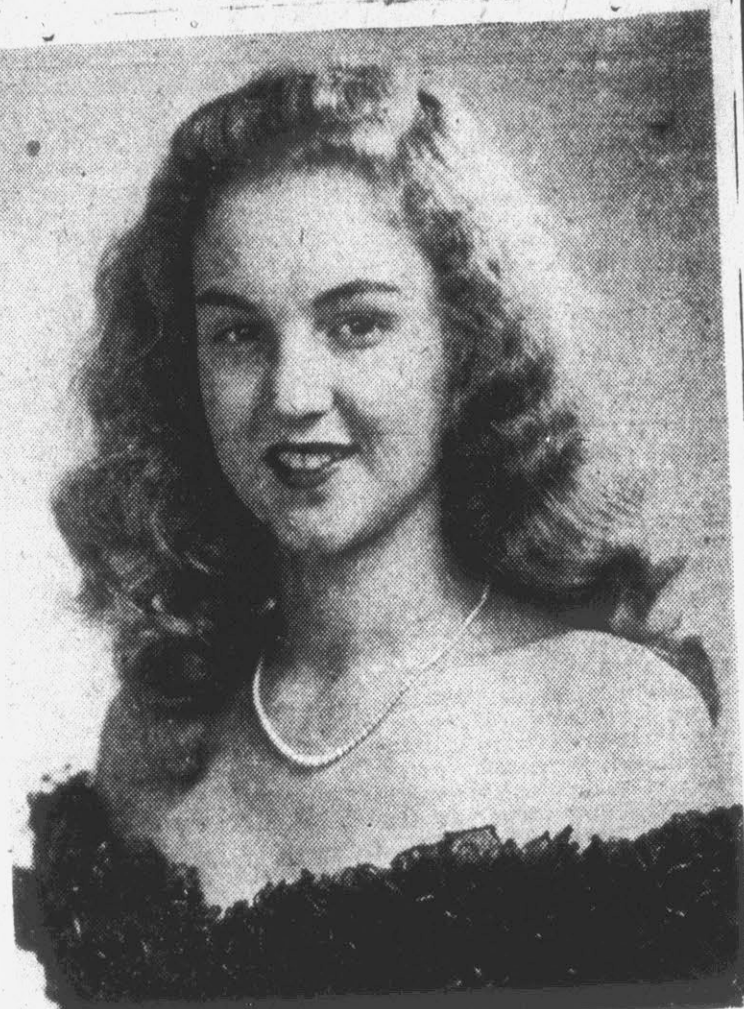

lem, and he placed the blame directly on the "highest level of military authority," which he said held "disturbing and alarming views" on the question of handling the DPs. "The Yugoslavs and Poles," he said, "have been subjected to propaganda that accounts for their resistance to returning home."

Among the main points of argument are these: The Russians demand that all DPs go back to their own countries, while the United States and Britain wish to send back only "those who want to return." Russia insists that committees visit camps throughout the German area to examine conditions and what it terms "propaganda" against the native lands of the refugees. Moscow also demands that complete lists of all persons be submitted to their home governments and contends that the U. S. and England have refused to allow this.

Well, there you have the surface currents. But what's beneath them? What's the significance of all this talk about propaganda, and the reluctance of the Western Allies to force DPs to return home against

their wills or to provide lists of their names?

I spent considerable time in the occupied areas not long ago and inquired into the DP problem. From my observation the key to the question lies in the fact that many of the displaced persons definitely do not want to return to their home lands, and in the main their reasons are two. One is that some prefer to start life anew in the Western countries where they feel post-war life is more attractive. The other and far more important is the key to the argument. It is this: A large number of the displaced persons are Jews, who fear to return to their former homes because of racial animosity which they believe they would encounter. Some others probably were involved in political activities which the present home regimes condemn. The identities of all these refugees would be learned if the Western Allies submitted lists of names to the home governments, or if committees were allowed to visit camps, as the Russians demand.

It is contrary to the code of Uncle Sam and John Bull to deny refuge to displaced persons who are not in the criminal class.

Wallace . . .

(AP) SEN. WALLACE (R-IND.) Generalissimo Stalin, replying to a British newspaperman's questions today, repeated his belief that there is no "real danger" of another war. Stalin declared the United States and Britain could not create a capitalist encirclement of Russia "even if they so desired." He also said that "monopolist possession" of the atomic bomb secret could not long continue.

Senator Walter F. George (D-GA) said the difficulty is what to believe "because only pleasant predictions come out of Russia." "My position all along," the former Senate Foreign Relations Committee chairman said, "is that no war in the immediate future between Russia and the western democracies is in the making."

Senator Claude Pepper (D-FLA) said Stalin's foreign policy expressions seem to be "a very forthright and, on the whole, a very encouraging statement."

"It simply confirms the belief I've had all along that a sensible and honorable basis of understanding and cooperation can and must be found between the United States and the Soviet Union—indeed between Russia and the western world."

put on grain feed for several months to fatten them to heavier weights and better quality.

In discussing the small number of cattle reaching slaughterers this month officials cited several reasons, among them:

1) Some western cattlemen are holding back in the hope of higher prices, either through a hike in OPA ceilings or possible removal of price controls.

2) Corn-belt feeders have been bidding heavily against slaughterers for cattle which might go either to the slaughter pens or to feed lots. With a record corn crop in prospect and with feed prices expected to decline, feeders see a chance of making money by producing heavier-weight cattle.

3) Some cattlemen are waiting until after January 1 for income-tax purposes. Cattle sold after that date would be charged against income in 1947, which farmers expected to be smaller than this year.

Hence, they would pay less taxes than if they sold this year.

Casey told the committee the statistics for all 19 companies showed estimated profits of \$356,006,612 on total capital investments of \$22,979,275.

He added that some of the profits were before renegotiation and that some were subject to recovery through taxes. He said details would be supplied later.

Weichel, taking note of the St. Johns River figures, told newsmen: "If this one small company did that well, there's no telling how many millions of dollars were given away by the government. The profits actually amounted to gifts, because the operators ran no risks and invested nothing in the actual facilities they used. They couldn't lose."

Clifford Neece, a chef, reported he and W. W. Wormington, restaurant owner, found 60 little fish in one lot back of their restaurant yesterday after a thundersorm.

"I had looked out of the window before the rain," Neece insisted, "and the ground was dry and fishless."

The Weather Bureau said a "fish deluge" was possible but unlikely in this area. One theory was that a fisherman, disgusted by the storm, had dumped his minnow bucket in the lot.

WASHINGTON LETTER

ATOM FILMS ARE VETOED
By JANE EADS

Washington—The snafu in the method for getting pictures of the Bikini atom bomb tests released to the public has been about as colossal as the bomb itself.

Even Vice Admiral W. H. P. Blandy, who runs the \$100,000,000 show, has trouble getting his way with a security panel which sits in Washington and decides just which views of the drama the taxpayers may see. This panel reviews both official pictures and those taken by press services.

The panel is composed of 15 members. Each has a veto that carries certain death. Various divisions of the Army, Navy and Manhattan project are represented, each division having a veto.

All the pictures shipped to Washington are marked secret. Public relations officials quickly case the batch for newsworthy "shots." Then the panel members look them over. It is said that then the vetoes fly like buckshot. The result is that what the public sees is almost literally "one in a thousand."

Complaints about the handling of the atom pictures have been heard farther than the bomb. Eventually these complaints reached the ear of Admiral Blandy. He radioed to get the photos moving.

After a while Blandy sent a package of color photographs to the panel. He attached a note explaining that he personally had reviewed the pictures. He suggested they be released at once.

"I authorize and direct you to release the package of pictures," Blandy is said to have told the panel bluntly.

Again nothing happened. The board debated as to whether the Admiral had the authority to "direct" them to do anything. However, after studying the "Operation Crossroads" organization chart, they eventually were convinced they are temporarily under Blandy. The pictures may yet be released but, many feel, not before their news value has waned.

Meanwhile Blandy has under consideration a recommendation that the panel be reduced in number, which he believes might be a step toward expediting its operations.

Some critics say the trouble with

the panel is that there seems to be no clear definition of responsibility.

It is believed that the representative of a unit censors pictures only with respect to matters involving his unit. That is, an electronics expert would look at a picture only to see whether its publication would violate security in that particular field.

The panel has worked long hours staying on the job weekends and even sitting late at night, but is slow to receive suggestions for easing its task.

For example, when a single negative is selected from a package of 24 as newsworthy enough to justify review, the panel insists that every picture in the pack be reviewed.

Back in the summer, a request was made to the people of Greenville regarding the housing situation for the veterans who wished to return to school after having served their country in World War II. There are many of these boys through the country who will not get to attend school because they will have no place to live. Now in answer to the request, some of the people who had vacant rooms responded very quickly and notified the college so that the boys could be informed. However, no ways near the number needed was obtained. Of course there are always those in every city and every group who make it look bad for those who actually should have praise. I am speaking of those people in Greenville who saw in this request a chance to bleed the veteran of all

the money that they possibly could. This I can back by actual facts. One lady in Greenville is trying to place four boys in one room, which isn't too bad since the housing situation is bad, but she is charging each person in the room \$5 per week which amounts to more than \$20 per month for each boy and nets the lady better than \$80 per month for her one room which is more than the whole house is worth. Then there is another lady who is placing three boys in one room, two of the boys having to sleep together on a three quarter width bed, and the charge to these boys is only \$5.50 each per week, which runs up over \$22 per month for each lad and a neat plus of \$68 per month to the lady for the room. These aren't all the instances, but they are a good example of how much some people appreciate the boys going through combat for them and how quickly people forget. The veterans thank those who are trying to help them live off of their small allowance. There are those who will pay these high rental fees from necessity, but the people who live with certainty will not receive any praise.

free from the government."

Unemployment pay to a veteran is \$20 weekly. The number of weeks he can get such pay depends upon the length of his service.

Anyone with 9 1/2 months' service or more can get up to 52 weeks of unemployment pay, the limit.

So some may be entitled to only a few weeks' pay, some to the limit.

The peak for unemployment pay to veterans was reached in June when 1,800,000 were drawing it. That figure has tapered down to the present 1,600,000, which has been standing fairly steady, week after week.

About 140,000 to 160,000 go on the unemployment pay rolls every week while an equal number drop off.

The vast majority who drop off do so because they've found jobs. Only about 2,000 a week go off because they've used up their full allowance of unemployment pay.

A veteran goes about getting his unemployment pay this way:

He registers at a State Unemployment Office, says he wants a job and is available to take one, or rather one he wants.

The State Unemployment Office pays him his \$20 a week while he seeks a job or, in the case of one who is faking, pretends to seek one.

The government pays back the state whatever money it gives the veterans in the form of this unemployment pay.

The VA has asked the states to tighten up on handing out this money. But it still wants a veteran who really is looking for a job, to have plenty of time to find one.

VA officials say they want the money to go only to veterans and want work.

So far the government has paid out more than \$125,000,000 in unemployment pay.

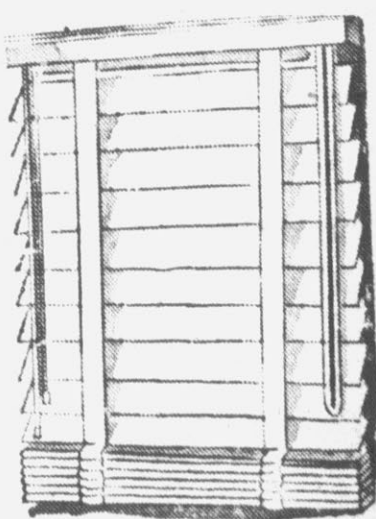

Coach Beattie Feathers of N. C. State says, "Our first game this year against Duke will be our toughest and the odds are about four to one against us. As in any football game this year we have a chance Duke will have a weight advantage but not so much as in the past."

"With a few breaks," he adds, "we will be able to give the boys in blue a good game. Duke will be

three-deep at all positions. We will be two deep in some spots."

And this is how Coach Wallace Wade of Duke feels about it: "Our opening game with North Carolina State is the toughest opener we have ever had."

The VMI squad was told by Coach Pooley Hubert to do better on the defensive if it expected to get ahead of University of Richmond in the scoring come Saturday.

Lefty Oscar Judd will work for the Phils. Big George Munger is slated to face the Reds and either southpaw Johnny Vander Meer or the veteran Bucky Walters will hurl for the Red Legs.

The Cards have five games left to play, while the Dodgers have only four. If the two teams tie for the lead, a three game playoff for the championship will be held.

If any such games are played the World Series will open in St. Louis or Brooklyn Oct. 6 instead of Oct. 2 as now planned.

No other games were scheduled in the National League. In the only American League game scheduled the third place New York Yankees topped the tail-end Philadelphia Athletics 9-6.

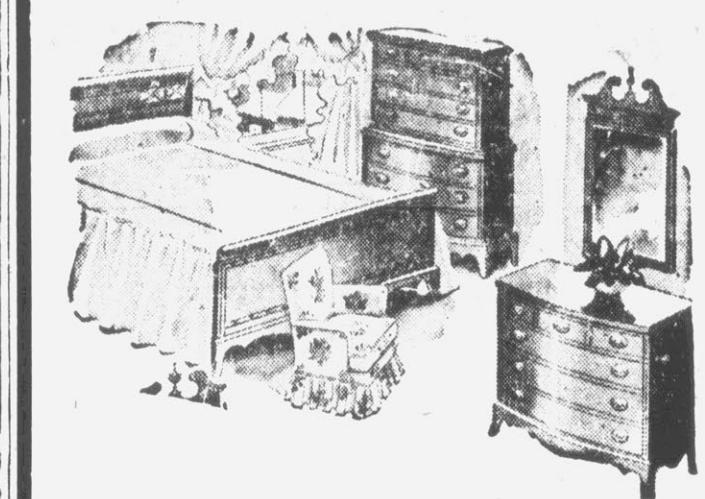
Indians To Face Major Shake-Up

Cleveland, Sept. 24—(AP)—Bill Veeck, energetic young president of the Cleveland Indians, is prepared today to trade everybody on his club, except Bob Feller and Lou Boudreau, in an effort to put his first three players into the first division next year.

Now that his "oats-feeding" three months period is ended, Veeck gained control of the Indians last June—and he has had an eye full of his playing personnel—the sandy-haired, good-natured former marine knows exactly which of his 1946 players he wants to keep.

"Naturally, I cannot tell you who is going to remain besides Feller and Boudreau, and who is going to leave," Veeck said Sunday after the Tribe lost a doubleheader to the Detroit Tigers. "Once I publicly announce who is on the market, his trading value takes an immediate nose-dive. But I certainly don't intend to stand for a sixth place

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club."

"I have my eye on several players with other clubs," he said, "but for obvious reasons, I cannot tell you who."

Replying to Werth's question: "Do you believe that virtual monopoly by the USA of the atomic bomb constitutes one of the main threats to peace?" Stalin replied:

"I do not believe the atomic bomb to be as serious a force as certain politicians are inclined to regard it. Atomic bombs are intended for intimidating weak nerves, but they cannot decide the outcome of war since atomic bombs are by no means sufficient for this purpose. Certainly monopolist possession of the secret of the atomic bomb does create a threat, but at least two remedies exist against it:

(A) Monopolist possession of the atomic bomb cannot last long.

(B) Application of the atomic bomb will be prohibited."

He did not elaborate on either point.

His answer to Werth's question as to whether he believed "the earliest withdrawal of all American troops from China" was vital to future peace was three brief words: "Yes, I do."

In answering the other question regarding Wallace's speech, "Do you believe in the possibility of friendly and lasting cooperation of the Soviet Union and the western democracies, despite the existence of ideological differences, and in the 'friendly competition' between the two systems which Wallace had mentioned in his speech?" Stalin replied briefly: "I absolutely believe so."

Responding to the first of these two queries, Stalin said any use by Russia of Germany against the western nations and the United States "would mean a departure of the Soviet Union from its fundamental national interests."

"I believe," he continued, "that the demilitarization and democratization of Germany represents one of the most important guarantees for the establishment of stable and lasting peace."
