IRON CURTAIN CLAMPED SHUT

U. S. Planes Halted From Flying Over Romania, Hungary

London, Oct. 10.—(AP)—U. S. headquarters in Europe today lifted a mysterious ban on American plane flights over Czechoslovakia but continued suspension of flights over Romania and Hungary and an American pilot said here he believed the order was linked with Russian army maneuvers.

The ban on flights over the three countries, all in the Russian sphere of influence, was clamped down suddenly and without explanation in Frankfurt, Germany. Similarly, no explanation was given why the Czechoslovak ban had been removed just as suddenly as it was imposed.

Capt. Calvin Dyer of Jackson's Heights, N. Y., pilot of a Pan-American Airways plane turned back at Prague yesterday, said, "I think the reason my plane was turned back was because the Russians are believed to be holding army maneuvers between Oct. 9 and 14."

Pan-American announced here it had halted all its service to Middle Europe pending clarification of the military order, under which the company said it could not fly over the three countries or over Russian occupied territory in Germany and Austria. However, the Frankfurt announcement said flights over the Soviet occupied German and Austrian zones were continuing.

Pan-American's statement here said that, "until further clarification of the situation, all Pan-American services to Middle Europe will be halted in Brussels."

A Genuine Gold Brick

How The U. S. Stumped Diplomats By Laying Minimum Demands On The Line In Setting Up Atomic Controls; A Gift Horse That's Too Good To Be True

The United States delegation to the Atomic Control Commission seems to be in the position of the man who tried to give away a solid gold brick—nobody's going to fall for that gag.

The spectacle of a nation laying its minimum instead of maximum demands on the conference table at the outset, seeking both to clarify the issues and avoid haggling, apparently has the negotiators stumped.

Three Nations Present Solid Front To Demand U. S., Britain And Turkey Resist Soviet Renewed Demand On Dardanelles; Greece Gets More American Financial Aid

Washington, Oct. 10.—(AP)—The United States, Britain and Turkey are presenting a solid front of resistance to Russia's renewed demands on the Dardanelles, while leaving the way open to full discussion of revised Soviet rights in the straits.

Diplomatic authorities disclosed this today as the State Department announced a \$25,000,000 credit to Greece—another troubled Mediterranean country—for the purchase of surplus army property overseas.

That announcement is in line with informal conclusions reached by the British and American governments during the Greek civil war crisis about three weeks ago that the United States would back the present Greek government with substantial economic assistance.

A similar decision is reported to have been taken in the case of Turkey.

The Greek credit raises to \$45,000,000 the total amount of financial aid granted that country by the United States for surplus property purchases. Two earlier agreements worth \$10,000,000, were authorized in May and September.

Greece, Turkey and Iran all are considered key countries in the control of the Middle East and eastern Mediterranean, around which one of the great conflicts of Russia and

Western powers has revolved for months. The Dardanelles, geographically and strategically, is at the heart of this conflict.

On August 7 Moscow sent to Ankara several demands for changes in the straits, including control by the so-called Black Sea power, which Russia dominates and joint defense of the important passage by Russia and Turkey.

With American and British backing, Turkey rejected the latter two demands, and the United States took a similar view in a note to Russia August 19.

Last month Russia sent Turkey a new note restating insistence on joint Russo-Turkish defense of the straits, defended only by Turkey and calling also for direct negotiations between Ankara and Moscow.

According to diplomatic informants here, Turkey now is replying to Moscow with another flat rejection of the joint defense proposal, leaving the way open for direct talks on the future of the Dardanelles.

Furthermore it was said that the United States is sending Russia a note reiterating its opposition to any Russian military expansion into the Dardanelles. Britain is reported to have taken a similarly flat stand although in exactly what manner was not disclosed.

Most of the United States was treated to a spectacular display of shooting stars last night as meteors, shed by the comet Giacobini-Zinner, burned across the skies in what some scientists said was the most brilliant exhibition seen in America this century.

But dense clouds marred or completely obliterated the view for many watchers of the skies in some sections of the country.

Scientists used radar and for the first recorded time reported they "saw" a display of meteors beyond fog and clouds. Observers from the National Bureau of Standards in Washington said they were sure that "pips" appearing on the radar screen represented meteors about 50

feet away.

Lobbyists Slow In Registering

Washington, Oct. 10.—(AP)—By actual count today there are only 50 acknowledged lobbyists in Washington.

At least, that is the total number who have registered with Congress since the August 2 enactment of a law requiring lobbyists to stand and be counted.

Furthermore, of the 40, only 10 have filed reports of receipts and expenses, although today is the deadline for the first such listing.

All this is true despite the fact that more than 500 individuals and groups have obtained forms prepared by congressional officials to help them comply with the law.

Costly Feud

Sedalia, Mo., Oct. 10.—(AP)—This city of 24,000 persons hasn't seen a local movie since last August 17 because the mayor, a self-styled country boy, and his council are standing pat in a feud with theaters over a 5 per cent municipal tax.

The city council passed the 5 per cent assessment on gross receipts because, Mayor Julian H. Bagby says, real property taxes were carrying too big a load in the city tax structure. The theater owners—two chain houses and an independent—promptly boarded their doors and nailed up signs reading "closed in protest to the city's unfair license tax."

Pittsburgh's costly power strike and the nationwide shipping walk-out appeared no nearer settlement today but a few smaller labor disputes were wiped off the board.

In Washington, striking CIO Marine Engineers held to their demands for either a national security agreement covering ships sailing out of all ports or a commitment from the Maritime Commission that it will impose east coast terms on all Pacific vessels it controls. The AFL Masters, Mates and Pilots, the sister union in the 10-day old shipping tieup, already has abandoned hopes for a national agreement and proposes for the engineers appeared dim.

On Sick List

Washington, Oct. 10.—(AP)—The United States Chamber of Commerce demanded today that Congress rip the lid off the Communist Party to end its power and influence in labor's ranks and within the government itself.

Declaring that Communists still are operating under an international-comintern bent upon world conquest, the organization added that because the party thrives upon deceit and is loyal to a hostile foreign power, it should be forced by law to reveal its membership, sources of money and all its activities.

Federal negotiators continued to seek a settlement of the strike by 3,200 employees of the Duquesne Light Company in Pittsburgh but officials of the independent union and the company said there appeared slight hope for an early end to the 17-day old walkout. A union official said settlement of a 20 per cent wage raise demand and 11 other issues must be made before he would submit other union proposals to arbitration.

The Duquesne Company said an

unattended automatic sub-station at Brentwood, a Pittsburgh suburb, had been "sabotaged," depriving 30,000 persons using 8,000 consumer outlets of power until current was given them from other sub-stations.

In Warren, O., striking CIO utility workers voted conditionally last night to recess their three-day walkout against the Ohio Public Service Co. until after an NLRB collective bargaining election, scheduled for 30 days after Oct. 3. The 150 workers quit work seeking wage hikes of 18 cents an hour, and several thousand steel workers were forced to leave their jobs.

A strike of AFL Bakers in Washington, which had curtailed the capital's bread supplies by about 50 per cent, was settled. A union spokesman said the strikers had accepted a recommendation of their negotiations committee giving them a raise of 15 cents an hour. The old pay scale ranged from 65 cents to \$1.45 an hour for both day and night workers.

Debate Danube Issue In Peace Conference

Split Between East And West Grows More Apparent As Vandenberg, Bevin, Kerdelj And Molotov Talk Riparian Rights

Paris, Oct. 10.—(AP)—The United States and Britain joined forces today in calling upon the Soviet Union and the Slav states to remove a barrier between the east and the west with positive peace conference action on opening the Danube to free commerce.

U. S. Senator Vandenberg (R-Mich.) led off the plenary session's deliberations on the Romanian peace treaty draft by declaring a "Free Danube is indispensable to the economic health and peace of Central Europe" and that failure to open Europe's most important inland waterway would be a "tragic reactionary mistake."

Vandenberg's plea brought a very prompt rejoinder from Yugoslav Deputy Premier Edvard Kardelj who attacked the majority report of the Balkans commission on two articles in the draft dealing with the Danube. He held that the conference was not "competent to deal with the Danube question" and said Yugoslavia deserved a greater Danubian role because "50 per cent of its course is through Yugoslav territory."

Vandenberg was joined in his plea by British Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin.

"The task of rehabilitating Europe is made infinitely more difficult," Bevin said, "so long as there is a barrier between the west and the east in the Danube area and the commercial interests of the west are met in Romania by a whole host of discriminatory acts."

Bevin said that the Russian proposal, which sought to restrict the use of the Danube exclusively to the countries along its banks, is not only a retrograde step but a deliberate

Balanced Budget Is Said Unlikely

Washington, Oct. 10.—(AP)—If President Truman really meant what he said a week ago about balancing the budget this fiscal year, he hasn't let his closest associates in on how he figures to do it.

That is clear today from statements by Secretary of the Treasury Snyder that:

1. With over three months gone on the fiscal year, the government still appears headed for a deficit of \$1,900,000,000 when next June 30 arrives.

2. I don't see any possibility of any general tax reduction" because high-level taxes—now at the record peacetime peak of \$39,600,000,000 a year—are necessary to "get better control of the (\$263,000,000,000) debt."

Snyder, like previous officials who spoke anonymously, saw the budget outlook differently than did the President at his news conference last week, but the treasury chief carefully avoided saying he disagreed with Mr. Truman.

White House Scene Of Top-Level Conference, Remains Silent; Decontrol Petition Takes Issue With President's Contentions; Assert No Shortage Of Cattle

Washington, Oct. 10.—(AP)—The beef industry coupled a demand for immediate scrapping of price controls today with a promise of ample supplies of meat very soon—possibly before November's congressional elections—if the administration acts.

R. G. Haynie, chairman of the OPA beef industry advisory committee, which petitioned formally for decontrol, told reporters there are plenty of cattle and calves ready for market as soon as price ceilings are lifted.

The White House, scene of a special round of top level conferences on the situation late yesterday, remained silent.

It was learned that the President's chief advisers on political and food problems planned another series of conferences later today. Immediate decontrol, as sought by the beef industry, was reported one of the steps under active consideration.

President Truman was to see reporters at 4 p. m. (EST).

The beef industry's decontrol petition, filed with secretary of agriculture Anderson took sharp issue with the president's contention that there was a heavy slaughter of meat during July and August, when controls were temporarily off.

"Many months prior to July 1, 1946, great numbers of cattle and calves were purchased by black market operators at the farm and auction markets and elsewhere which escaped the notice of governmental agencies," the petition said.

The petition argued that there is no shortage of cattle and calves under the meaning of the price control act and said:

"Under these conditions Congress has ordered decontrol in order that the law of supply and demand may be permitted to function."

"Whether prices would rise after decontrol is wholly immaterial."

The committee said that Anderson should release all livestock and meats from controls—including also hogs and sheep—if he should find it impractical to decontrol cattle and calves only.

Discussing the industry move at a news conference, Haynie said that under the law the only question involved is supply. He said the petition showed by the governments own figures that cattle and calves now available for market are above long time average.

Anderson, however, has placed cattle and calves on an official list of agricultural products in short

Alert Troops In Fear Of Rioting

Rome, Oct. 10.—(AP)—Strong reinforcements of steel-helmeted Italian troops and police, alert to prevent a repetition of yesterday's bloody rioting, guarded all approaches to the Vittoriano place today as the Italian cabinet met in an attempt to end a threatening labor crisis.

During the night barbed wire was strung across all streets leading to the palace and dawn found tanks and mounted policemen posted at strategic points.

A government communique meanwhile announced that two persons had been killed and 141 injured in yesterday's riots, during which a crowd of 20,000 to 30,000 persons battled police and troops for three and one-half hours outside the Vittoriano. Eighteen arrests were reported.

Training Officers

Army Takes Cue From American Business; Starts Long Range Program For Teaching Personnel Management To Officers; Courses At Universities

Washington, Oct. 10.—(AP)—Some army, with the war over and some time on its hands, is trying to learn how to handle men better than it did in the war.

About 125 carefully selected regular army officers will be sent to top colleges and universities to take intensive one-year courses in handling personnel. Which means for them: Handling soldiers.

It's a long-range program, and stretching years into the future, but it starts this year. In doing this the army is taking a cue from American business.

Next year more officers will follow this year's group into the various schools until the army has enough instructors among its own people to teach the handling of personnel management. Why all this? American business, but not all American businesses, has learned

that by treating workers as human beings—in whom the firm takes a personal interest—it can get better and more work out of them.

This has been a developing realization. As more businessmen understand this, more are trying to learn the best means of handling employees.

Universities are giving courses on the subject. They're teaching businessmen and young men who want to go into business the solutions for many personnel problems.

During the war the army was criticized for fitting the so-called square peg into the round hole. For example: Making truck drivers of clerks and clerks of truck drivers. This is what the army is going to try to learn to do.

FULL ORCHESTRA
Suppose you went to an orchestra
concert and found the stage filled
with nothing but drums. Or sup-
pose there were nothing but horns
and trumpets, or nothing but
stringed instruments. No matter
how sweet the quality of any in-
strument, one can easily get too
much of it. Beautiful orchestra mu-
sic largely depends upon the variety
of the instruments which produce
the tones.

We see this same thing reflected
oftentimes in the religious experi-
ences which different people have.
For some people religion is all a
matter of drums. They must beat
the drums to call humanity to some
crusade against evil. There are oth-
ers for whom religion is largely a
matter of horns and trumpets, of
eloquent sermons and brilliant ad-

Sound religion is always diverse
and varied in its characteristics. It

There is a place in all true religion
for the stern drums, the brilliant
trumpets, and the sweet dulcet ap-
peal of gospel persuasion. It takes
all these to make a full, well-
rounded religious experience.

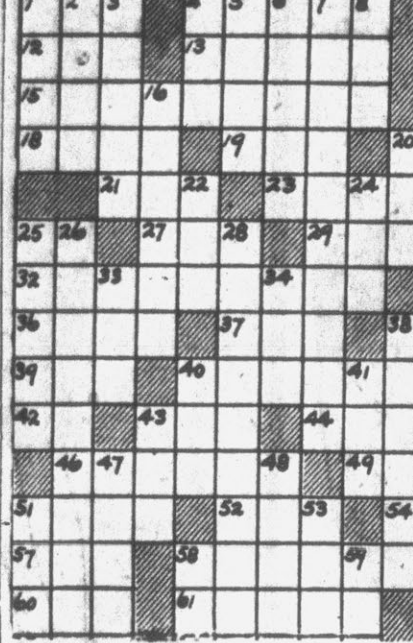

Soviet Foreign Minister Molotov

Molotov charged that the British-
American attitude was western im-
perialism in a new guise.

Molotov said there were "other
waterways," such as those which
unite oceans, and asked "why not
apply this same principle to such
waterways as Suez or Panama?"

Many states, said Molotov, were
interested in the Panama canal,
"so let's make an equal application
and internationalize that water-
way, too."
"Well, what now?" he asked. "Did
we correctly understand democratic
principles?"

miles from earth.
Other scientists boarded airplanes
to get above thick clouds for a
glimpse of the aerial fireworks and
Harvard astronomers in an "aerial
planetarium" reported seeing me-
teors at the rate of about 17 per
minute.

Joint Army Air Forces Signal
Corps observers at White Sands, N.
M., reported to Camp Evans, U. S.
Signal Corps laboratory at Belmar,
N. J., that they contacted the me-
teor showers with radar at varied
distances from 45 to 180 miles.

The display resulted as the earth
came within 131,000 miles of the
spot in space through which the
comet passed eight days ago.
The meteors were shed by the
comet and formed part of its tail.
Those seen on the earth were those
caught by the earth's gravitational
pull and consumed for the most part
as they plunged through the earth's
air shell, the friction between the
solid matter and the air causing
the brilliant burning.

Wagner Schlesinger, director of
the Adler Planetarium in Chicago,
said he counted 149 flashing pro-
jectiles in a 10-minute peak period
starting at 10:49 p. m., EST and
said the display was unmatched in
this country during the present
century.

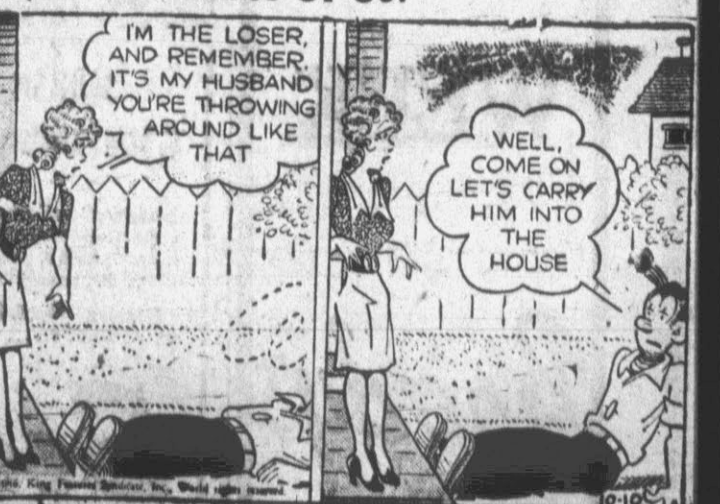

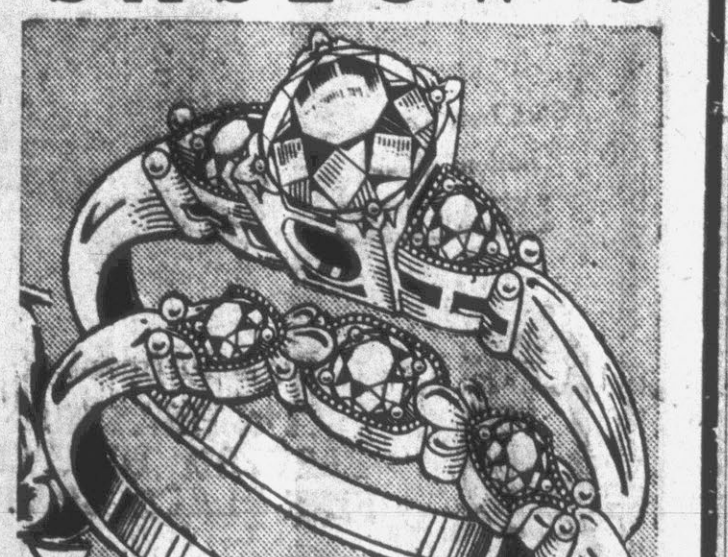

However, Secretary of Labor Schwellenbach said that charges of subversive activity had been brought by the FBI against a number of labor department employees and that an investigation has been under way for several days. Five cases already have been studied and two others are set for inquiry.
