

President Speaks Tonight On Stabilization Program

Speech Will Unveil Decision On Future Of Meat Controls; No Indication Of Policy's Course; G. O. P. Labels Broadcast "Political", Demand Right To Reply

Washington, Oct. 14.—(AP)—The housewives scurrying for meat and politicians for votes cocked an ear to the White House for President Truman's decision tonight on what to do about getting steaks and roast beef back.

Hours before the chief executive's all-network broadcast set for 10 p. m., EST, the Republican Party had termed the scheduled address "political" and demanded radio time to reply.

While there was no clear-cut indication what Mr. Truman plans to say in his 15-minute discussion of stabilization and the meat problem. Whether to scrap meat controls outright, as many Republicans and some Democratic leaders have demanded, or keep them unchanged.

Or, whether to compromise on some relaxation of controls involving perhaps higher ceilings, a bonus plan to induce marketing of livestock, and possibly importation of meat.

Mr. Truman is on record as firmly opposed to removal of OPA controls. He took his stand September 26, but at a news conference last week he declined to comment when asked whether he had changed his mind.

One indication that he may have, came from a high official who is familiar with the problem. He had hinted to a reporter that top aides helping prepare Mr. Truman's own speech met at the White House last night and that decontrol of meat is in the picture.

There has been speculation, however, that Mr. Truman might deal with meat controls, too, and possibly scrap that program.

On the other hand, among those playing an active part in drafting the president's statement are OPA Administrator Paul Porter and Reconstruction Director John R. Steelman.

Porter has openly opposed removal of meat controls. Steelman, on the subject of controls generally, recently said that to "let prices go" would be the worst possible course. The GOP contention that Mr. Truman's address will be political, came from Carroll Reece, chairman of the Republican National Committee.

"Just three weeks before a crucial congressional election," Reece said in a statement, "Mr. Truman has chosen to tie up most of the nation's radio facilities with an explanation of his administration's so-called stabilization program."

Elizabeth City Bank Had Fire

PAC Group Called To Account For Spending

House Campaign Expenditures Committee Opens Hearing To Probe Roles In Current Congressional Elections

Washington, Oct. 14.—(AP)—The House campaign expenditures committee today called on two political action committees today to outline their specific roles in the current congressional elections.

Opening the first hearings since its creation, the House group set aside half the day to probing the much discussed CIO-PAC, and the other half to the national citizens PAC. Representatives of four other national groups are to be questioned tomorrow and Wednesday.

They are the AFL, the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen, the National Association of Manufacturers, and American Action, Inc., of Chicago, first called for today but later set back until Tuesday.

Chairman Priest (D-Tenn.) told newsmen no complaints have been received by the committee against any of the organizations, "despite all the furor about the CIO-PAC."

The full over that group began when the House first considered setting up the committee, a usual election year fixture.

First, Speaker Rayburn (D-Tex.) aroused the ire of southern De-

Break In Industrial Tie-Ups On Horizon

Leadership In Pittsburgh Power Strike Faces Test; Ford Workers Return To Jobs; Striking Seamen Plan Meeting

Leadership of the 21-day Pittsburgh power strike today faced three tests of its authority:

1. A back-to-work vote of 2,700 AFL street car operators and bus drivers who have absented themselves for 18 days rather than cross the independent power union's picket lines;

2. An unsanctioned rank and file meeting tonight to consider the Luzerne Light Company's offer to arbitrate the wage dispute to arbitration, and

3. Collective bargaining election tomorrow in which two AFL unions and one CIO group challenge the independent union's right to represent 1,700 of its 3,300 members.

A labor dispute which kept 900 Ford Motor Company employees idle 12 days ended, but the nation wide maritime tieup, Washington's hotel walkout and Hollywood's film strike continued with scant hope of early settlement.

This was the situation:

Ford: Open hearth foundry workers agreed to go back on the job after their CIO United Auto Workers local authorized a strike vote "on elimination of health hazards" in the plant. Ford also called back 100,000 employees laid off Thursday because of a sheet steel shortage.

Maritime: The striking AFL Masters, Mates and Pilots and CIO Marine Engineers called other AFL and CIO maritime groups to a joint strategy meeting. Stalemate negotiations between the unions and shipowners were to be resumed tomorrow. The union's demand that their members be given preference in hiring is the big obstacle to settlement.

ELEVEN NAZIS SIT OUT LAST DAYS OF LIFE

Streicher Urges Condemned To Be "Brave" In Final Forty-Eight Hours

Nuremberg, Oct. 14.—(AP)—Julius Streicher, ranting Jew-baiter number one of the Nazi regime, today urged his condemned associates to be "brave and strong" in their last 48 hours of life.

Streicher, once gauleiter of this Nuremberg area, will hang, too, on Wednesday, but he is seemingly untouched by impending doom.

This morning the beady eyed little man, who openly advocated extermination of Jews, told a prison psychologist to be sure to impart his message to the other ten who will die with him.

"They must not be low but must be brave and strong," Joachim von Ribbentrop's mind reverted to his wartime experiences as Hitler's foreign minister as he bent under the strain of waiting for death.

Now gray and tired, the once dapper Ribbentrop in conversations with doctors and other prison officials recalled the time he read to British Ambassador Neville Henderson the declaration that Germany was at war and had moved into Poland. He read it at lightning speed, a factor British complained about at the time and later brought out during the trial. Ribbentrop said he would do the same thing again but did not elaborate.

He also talks frequently now about Germany quitting the League of Nations and said he struggled with Hitler about that, but could not convince the fuhrer it was wrong to quit the Geneva body.

Field Marshal Wilhelm Keitel's spirits picked up over the weekend after he received two letters from his wife, who lives in the British zone.

None of the condemned have been told as yet exactly when they will hang.

SOLVE AYDEN SUGAR THEFT; ARREST THREE

Sheriff Tyson And Other Officers Recover 90 Bags In Virginia; Night Watchman Implicated

Officers are preparing for a finale in smashing a sugar-theft ring that has been operating in North Carolina and Virginia following the recovery of a major portion of 90 tons of sugar stolen in Ayden on the night of October 3 and the arrest of persons involved in the theft.

Pitt County Sheriff Ruel W. Tyson reported upon his return from Virginia Sunday the arrest of N. H. Lofton, 48, night watchman at the Domain Food Corporation pickle factory in Ayden, Sam Warren, 45, of Hickory, Va., and Johnnie C. McLaughlin, about 30, of near Ayden.

Ninety of the 100-pound bags of sugar stolen from the Ayden plant were recovered in an abandoned barn on a farm near Hickory, Va.

Officers were holding warrants today for the arrest of other persons allegedly involved in the theft of sugar in various points in Eastern North Carolina and Virginia.

Warren, said by officers to be the ring leader, was arrested Friday at his palatial home near Hickory, Va., about 18 miles from Norfolk by Sheriff Tyson, assisted by Greenville Police Chief Jim Tanner, Detective M. E. Corbett and Sgt. Lester Page. Greenville officers, assisted by Elizabeth City officers and Virginia authorities. When informed of his bond would be \$10,000, officers stated that Warren readily de-

French And Siamese Work On Border Pact

Paris, Oct. 14.—(AP)—The colonial office confirmed reports today that France and Siam are now working on an agreement for the restoration to French Indochina of disputed border areas.

Government sources said the areas involved are a tributary, Sienchreap and Siaphon in Cambodia, and Louang Prabang in Laos.

The disputed territory represents some 20,000 square miles which Siam obtained in 1941 under a Japanese negotiated treaty with the Vichy French government. The post-war French government has refused to recognize the treaty.

French Approve New Constitution In Spite Of DeGaulle's Opposition

Paris, Oct. 14.—(AP)—A constitution for France's fourth republic, providing for a powerful legislature overshadowing the president, bore the stamp of public approval today, given in the face of Gen. Charles De Gaulle's opposition.

The people of continental France accepted the new constitution yesterday by a margin of some 1,212,500 votes and a percentage of 53.6 in favor to 46.4 opposed. Voting was light, with 31.9 per cent of the registered voters staying away from the polls.

DeGaulle, wartime leader of the fighting French, had contended that the charter was inadequate because under it the executive would be too weak. He warned that the constitution would endanger France's future and urged its rejection.

But the rest of the referendum, far from being regarded as a defeat for the general, was taken rather as strong testimony to his continuing prestige. Almost single-handedly he nearly defeated the constitution despite the fact that it was backed by France's three major parties.

Demand Vets Pay Back Allowances

Raleigh, Oct. 14.—(AP)—The State Unemployment Compensation Commission had demanded that 978 World War II veterans refund a total of \$54,550 in unemployment allowances they allegedly drew while they were receiving payments for schooling or on the job training. Chairman Henry E. Kendall of the UCC has reported. So far, 227 of the veterans have refunded a total of \$12,298, Kendall said. Only a few of the veterans intended to defraud the government, he said.

There will be prosecutions where intent to defraud is suspected.

U. S. Reserves Right To Recover Weapons And Munitions Supplied Russia; Officials Plan Final Settlement

Washington, Oct. 14.—(AP)—The United States will reserve the right to recapture all weapons and munitions supplied Russia under lend-lease before writing the wartime accord closed, government officials said today.

These officials noted that such recapture provisions have been written into the lend-lease settlements concluded with seven other countries. And they added that they see no reason why American policy on this matter would be changed for the Soviets.

It is not clear when negotiations to settle the Russian account will get underway. A note to Moscow some weeks ago suggesting that a mission be sent here for the purpose reported, has gone unanswered.

Officials say that in general this country does not expect to exercise its right in any country to regain possession of items like guns, planes and tanks, but that the recapture clause was inserted as a precautionary measure.

The great bulk of the 11-billion dollars in lend lease goods furnished the Russians falls into the war goods category.

The American officials who will sit in on the settlement discussions with the Soviets said they do not think the U. S. will seek payment. For any war material destroyed or otherwise used up in the war against the Germans and Japanese.

A decision apparently remains to be made on whether to charge for weapons still in use by the Soviet army.

High Court Refuses To Oust Sen. Bilbo

Washington, Oct. 14.—(AP)—The Supreme Court today rejected a request that it bar Senator Bilbo (D-Miss.) from his Senate seat.

The request was made by James L. P. Rumble, New York City, who told the court that Bilbo had right to vote because of their "color and racial origins."

The application noted that the constitution makes each House of Congress the judge of the qualifications of its members. Rumble added that the constitution "has not clothed either of the Houses with power of being the exclusive judges of the elections of members."

The court merely noted that Rumble's petition was denied and gave no reason.

W. L. Whedbee, sales supervisor of the Greenville Tobacco Market, today announced the receipt of a telegram from F. S. Royster, chairman of the Flue Cured Marketing Committee, which authorized the extension of the selling time on the local market to four hours per day effective today, October 14.

"This means, Whedbee said, that the Greenville market will be capable of selling 1,000 more piles of tobacco daily."

FREIGHT RATE BEFORE COURT

SUPREME COURT AGREES TO RULE ON VALIDITY OF ICC ORDERS

Washington, Oct. 14.—(AP)—The Supreme Court today agreed to rule on validity of ICC orders increasing class railroad freight rates 10 per cent in the north and east and reducing them 10 per cent in the south and as far west as the Rockies.

The changes were challenged by nine northern states, governors of the six New England states, and 33 railroads.

Class rates affect principally manufactured articles. They apply to about four per cent of all rail traffic. The changes were ordered after officials of southern states and others asserted freight rates were higher in the south giving competitive advantages to northern manufacturers.

The challenging states and the 33 railroads appealed from a decision by a special three-judge federal court in Utica, N. Y., last May. The special court after upholding the orders stayed their enforcement pending action on the appeals to the Supreme Court.

The New England governors called the ICC orders "arbitrary and capricious." They said they were based on an erroneous interpretation of the law and lacked support of necessary findings of fact.

The railroads protested that ICC had made "a clean break with the principles of rate making that have applied for generations."

Indicates Many Issues Will Be Thrown Back To Foreign Ministers Council Where Decisions Must Be Unanimous; Criticizes U. S. Motives In Treaty-Writing

Paris, Oct. 14.—(AP)—Russian Foreign Minister Molotov declared today that the results of the Paris peace conference were unsatisfactory and charged that it had been dominated by the United States.

Molotov remarked that only portions of the draft treaties with Italy, Romania, Bulgaria, Hungary and Finland pleased Russia and indicated that many of the issues may be thrown back into the foreign ministers council where decisions are to be unanimous.

He accused the U. S. Great Britain and France of violating their agreements and retreating from the four-power accord in the adoption of a number of anti-democratic measures in connection with Trieste.

He spoke critically of guarantees written into Balkan treaties for free navigation of the Danube and complained that the conference had refused to fix Bulgarian boundaries as of January, 1941—an action that would have given Bulgaria some territory from Greece.

The conference of 21 nations, taking action on the final draft treaty with Finland, prepared to adjourn tomorrow. The draft treaties then must be approved finally by the foreign ministers of the U. S., Russia, Great Britain and also France at meetings in New York.

Sen. Arthur Vandenberg spoke before Molotov and demanded that the Finnish reparations bill be passed from \$300,000,000 to \$200,000,000—a move that galled Molotov's anger. The Michigan senator said:

"The U. S. will leave its motives to the verdict of history in connection with the winning of the war and the winning of a just peace. We decline to plead as defendants among allies to whom we have given every ounce of cooperation in blood and treasure of which a great nation is capable. But we shall continue to speak for the American conception of justice and fair play."

Foreign Minister Bevin of England upheld the Russian claim to \$300,000,000 from Finland.

Molotov said Vandenberg's address made an unfavorable impression both as to his consistency and his frankness. He asserted that Russia had avoided putting pressure on Finland for two years but that the western allies had not done likewise.

"We draw the attention of Finland to the difference between a true and a scheming friendship," he said.

Molotov spoke violently against criticisms of the veto power of the five leading allied nations in the United Nations Security Council, saying:

"The right of veto is not involved, but a question of whether they desire unanimity and cooperation among the great countries."

Australia, Cuba and the president of the general assembly of the United Nations has voiced recent criticism of the veto.

Molotov implied that President Spaak was under foreign influence.

His speech contrasted with an address earlier by Bevin, who said the peace conference, given the job of going over the drafts submitted by the foreign ministers' council, "has accomplished this task and accomplished it well."

Molotov said that the Americans sought definite decision regardless of whether they were correct. He said "one decision had repudiated the decision of the foreign ministers council in order to establish a simple majority rule in the conference."

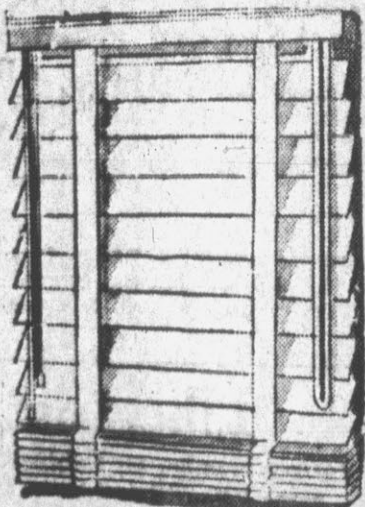

THE HARD WAY TO VICTORY

Captain John Callender was an officer of the Massachusetts militia and he played the coward at the Battle of Bunker Hill. One of the first things General Washington had to do after assuming command of the colonial troops at Boston was to deal with Callender's case. "It is with inexpressible concern," wrote Washington, "that the General, upon his first arrival in the army, should find an officer sentenced by a General Court Martial to be cashiered for cowardice—a crime of all others, the most infamous in a soldier, the most injurious to an Army, and the last to be forgiven." Callender was deprived of his rank and drummed out of the army in disgrace.

But he re-enlisted as a private. Then came the battle of Long Island when things were going tough for the Americans, and Private John Callender so distinguished himself for personal valor that Washington publicly revoked the sentence and restored Callender to his captaincy.

This story teaches two very impressive truths. The first is that it is entirely possible for one to reverse the current of his life and cover himself with honor after he has previously covered himself with dishonor. The second lesson, however, is that that is the hard way to victory, the one to be avoided if possible. It was fine that Callender came back. It would have been vastly better, however, had he exercised a bit of restraint at Bunker Hill and rendered his public disgrace unnecessary.

which will shock many of you, especially since it comes from a minister speaking from the pulpit. But I must say it. These are times when Christians have to kill—and this is one of them.

Apart from the religious and moral viewpoint, there are many people who hold that capital punishment fails as a deterrent to crime. It is pointed out that many criminals would prefer death to life imprisonment. In fact, the Nuernberg trials provide illustration in support of this thesis. Grand Admiral Eric Raeder pleaded (unsuccessfully) for death instead of the life imprisonment which was imposed on him.

That is an argument which perhaps never will be settled. In any event, a score of nations have abolished capital punishment, and several states in our own country have done likewise.

There's one sure thing to be said about execution. It certainly stops the criminal involved from further assaults on society. From this standpoint the consensus seems to be that the world will be better off when the fuhrer's captains join him. And there are few indeed, no matter what their religious beliefs, who don't believe that the Nazi chiefs should be permanently removed from society in some manner—if not by death, then by life imprisonment. They are too terribly dangerous to be free.

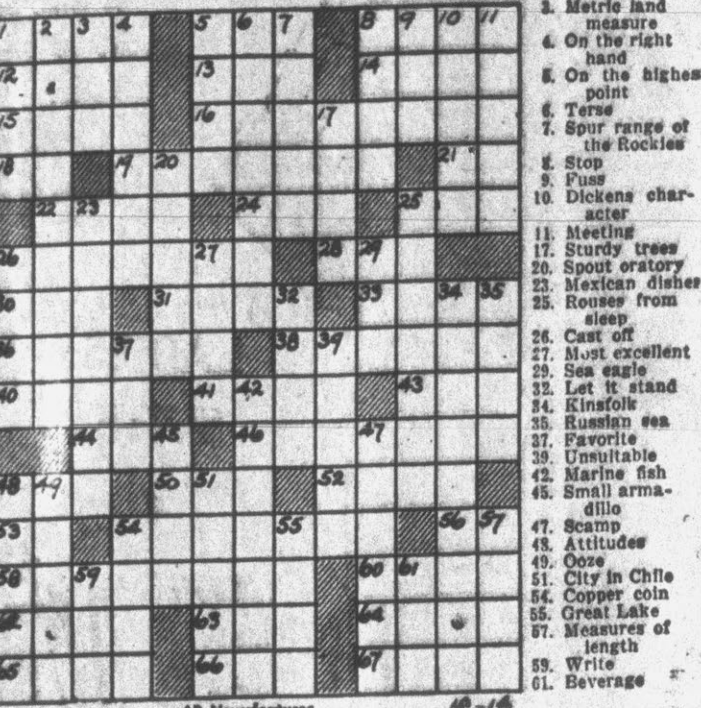
