FBI STARTING PROBE OF K. C. DEMO PRIMARY

Alleged Vote Fraud In President's Home County Under In- quiry

Kansas City, Oct. 18.—(AP)—The Federal Bureau of Investigation turned its spotlight today on alleged vote fraud in the Democratic primary election last August in President Truman's home county where a political unknown, backed by the president and the Democratic Party, defeated Rep. Roger C. Slaughter for renomination in Missouri's congressional fifth district.

The FBI began its investigation following an independent one by the Kansas City Star which resulted in a series of stories containing charges of irregularities at the polls.

The newspaper disclosed that the FBI agents had called for all the information it had obtained on the election last Aug. 6 in which Truman-backed Angus Axtell, a newcomer to politics here, won over Rep. Slaughter in the congressional district next door to the president's home town of Independence, Mo.

FBI agents here, who said orders for the investigation came from the Department of Justice in Washington, also visited the election board here but its members remained silent on the purpose of the visit. Its chairman, Ludwig Graves, merely said:

"I am giving out no statement." It was the second time in 10 years that an election here has been investigated by a branch of the government. In 1936, a federal investigation, resulted in the trial of 259 persons, mostly ward workers, and the conviction of scores of them.

Even as the FBI turned its attention to the election, two investigators of the congressional committee, J. Raymond Hov, Jr., and Arthur T. Allen, completed their investigation of the primary here with a joint statement saying:

"We have a clear picture of what took place in the August primary and are returning to Washington to make a report that will be prepared there."

The Democratic Committee of Jackson county asked the Department of Justice to make an inquiry to "determine the truth or falsity of the charges."

The Soviet's Budget

Reduction Of Military Expenditures For Coming Year Has Great Significance; Size Of Military Establishment Not Everything; U. S. An Example

The relationship of the new Russian budget to the international search for peace is more important than all of the official Soviet statements since V-E Day.

It means a reduction of more than 40 per cent in her military establishment, continued maintenance of which has been an ever-present factor in the policies of other powers.

It serves to verify the belief of those who have insisted that, regardless of what her efforts to spread Communism may lead to in the future, Russia has no intention of taking chances with war now.

It may mean a reduction of the Red Army forces which are living off occupied countries in Europe and the easing by that much of their struggle for economic rehabilitation.

It may be a verification of the widely-held opinion that Stalin puts the up-building of the Soviet Union

Meat Supply

CHICAGO, Oct. 18.—(AP)—Receipts of livestock at the nation's terminal markets dropped off heavily today in preparation for the usual weekend closing of packing plants and because of sharply lower prices on most of the grades and classes yesterday.

Although livestock has flooded the country's major stockyards since removal of price controls on Tuesday, packers said today there will be no meat on dinner tables over the weekend.

"Time and quantities of livestock needed to bring the market back to normal," the American Meat Institute said. "Meat supply lines are thin. Retail coolers are bare. Millions of people who haven't had much meat lately are clamoring for it."

As the scarcity of fresh meat continued at most of the country's butcher shops, packer spokesmen predicted conditions will show improvement soon.

NEW TEACHERS FOR COLLEGE

Two Additional In- structors Will Join ECTC Faculty

Dr. Earl N. Saucier of Mississippi City, Miss., and Robert K. Wrenshall of Pittsburgh, Pa., have accepted positions on the faculty of East Carolina Teachers College. Dr. Saucier will be a member of the English department, Mr. Wrenshall the physical education department. Both departments are adding new teachers because of increased enrollment for 1946-47.

Dr. Saucier will begin his duties at the college on November 4. He will come to Greenville from Commerce, Texas, where he has taught at East Texas State Teachers College for several years. Dr. Saucier is a graduate of Mississippi State Teachers College at Hattiesburg, and later earned the master's and doctor's degrees in English at Peabody College. His teaching experience includes work at Mississippi State Teachers College, University of Mississippi, Peabody and East Texas State Teachers College. Dr. Saucier's wife and child will arrive in Greenville shortly to make their home.

Mr. Wrenshall, a graduate of Washington and Jefferson College, Washington, Pa., and of the University of Pittsburgh, where he received his master's degree, has had experience as an instructor of physical education both in high schools and in the navy. During the war he was "close order" drill instructor at Camp Endicot, R. I., and later worked as athletic instructor and remedial exercise advisor at Seward House Naval Convalescent hospital in Pennsylvania. He is a graduate of the Naval Rehabilitation School.

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Turkey In Reply To Russian Note

Ankara, Turkey, Oct. 18.—(AP)—A detailed reply to the Soviet Union's second demand upon Turkey for joint defense of the Dardanelles was delivered to Russian representatives today and informed sources said they were certain the Russian proposal was flatly rejected.

Turkey was reported to have turned down the Russian plan for administration of the vital strait only by Black Sea powers and to have frowned upon any bilateral conversations with the Soviet Union preliminary to an international conference. Informants said Turkey probably proposed again that an international commission determine whether Turkey had complied fully during the war with the terms of the Montreux Convention.

In her reply to the original Russian note Turkey contended some vessels passed through illegally, but said Turkey felt able to demonstrate she had acted in good faith in enforcing the terms of the convention.

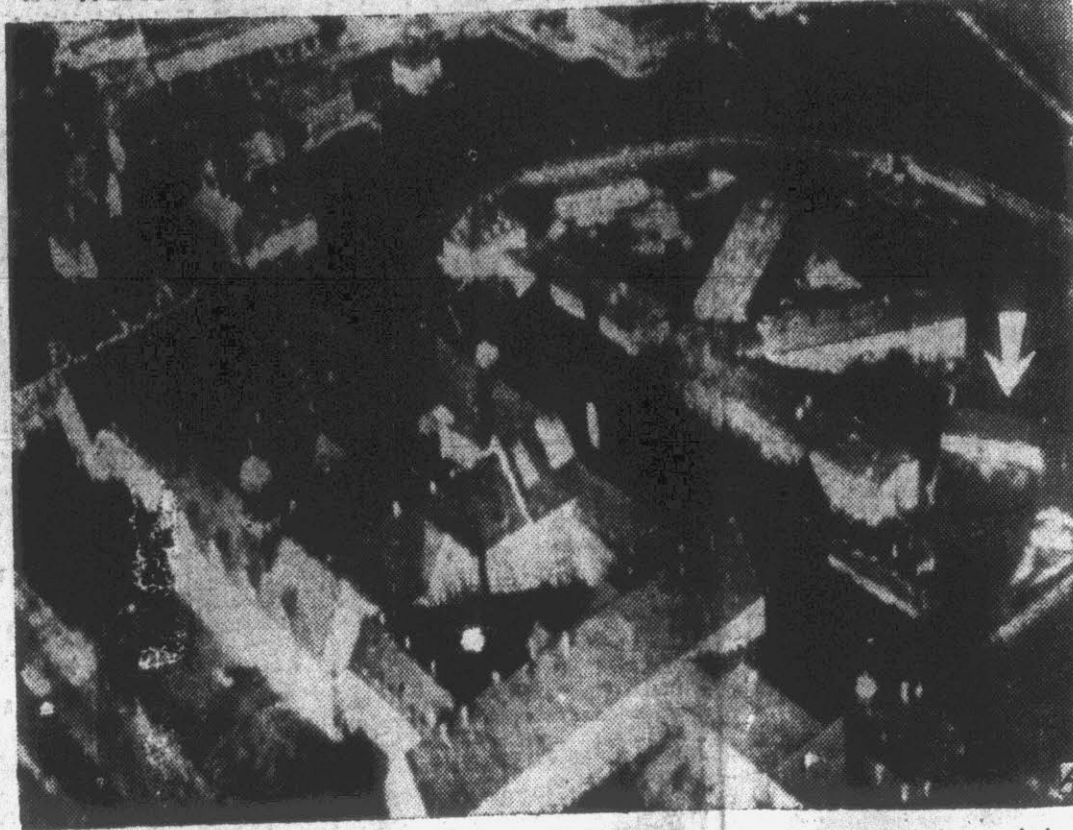

Byrnes' Talk To Cover Diplomatic Conflicts

May Answer Wallace Criticism Of Policy; Expected To Discuss State Of Relations With Soviet Union

Washington, Oct. 18.—(AP)—Secretary of State Byrnes drafted a report to the American people today on the diplomatic conflict between the United States and Russia.

Top authorities suggested he may make use of the occasion to lash back at criticism of his foreign policy by former Secretary of Commerce Henry A. Wallace.

Byrnes, who returned yesterday from the Paris peace conference and received President Truman's congratulations on a most excellent job, was scheduled to broadcast for 30 minutes beginning at 10 p. m. (EST) tonight. NBC and some MBS stations arranged to carry the speech.

In writing his address Byrnes was reported to have two principal objectives in view:

1. To try to knock down Russian charges that the capitalist world is seeking to encircle the Soviet union.

2. To smash the Wallace implications that his policy toward Russia is a policy of toughness and should be softened even at the risk of actions which, in Wallace's own words, might be called appeasement.

Those in a position to know say Byrnes will reaffirm his basic idea of American-Russian relations with a declaration that the U. S. intends to stand absolutely firm on its principles where major interests are involved and yet to deal patiently with all difficult issues.

The secretary's speech thus will be not so much a report on the work of the Paris conference as a discussion of the state of relations with Russia.

Tomorrow night Senator Vandenberg (R-Mich.) intends to make a broadcast from Washington in response to believing that on the whole the Paris meeting actually made some progress toward restoring peace to Europe. Vandenberg and Senator Connally (D-Tex.) were advisors to Byrnes. Connally is returning by boat.

Byrnes spent 50 minutes with Mr. Truman yesterday, and at that time it was decided finally that the president would address the United Nations Assembly opening in New York next Wednesday.

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Ultimatum Fails To Budge Dawson

Kinston, Oct. 18.—(AP)—Judge Joe Dawson of the city-county court, ignored an ultimatum from Kinston city and Lenoir county officials that he resign his office by 11 a. m. today.

Early this afternoon, he made no official reply to the demand. In response to a reporter's inquiry, he said, "I think I'll let the situation take care of itself, and hung up the telephone."

Dawson, whose term expires December 1, 1948, was indicted by a superior court grand jury Wednesday on a manslaughter charge in connection with an automobile fatality here last Sunday.

The charge grew out of a collision of the recorder's car and one driven by Robert Bruce Johnson of Trenton, who died of injuries received in the crash.

Dawson is free on \$2,000 bond, which he posted yesterday for his appearance in superior court for trial expected to be held in December.

BERLIN HEADS TO BE GIVEN GOERING NOTE

Letter Said To Reveal Poison Secret; Na- zi's Wife Above Sus- picion

Nuernberg, Oct. 18.—(AP)—Hermann Goering in a last burst of bravado wrote a letter telling just how he proposed to commit suicide under the noses of his guards, a high source reported today.

That informant said the letter, addressed to Col. B. C. Andruss, and two more found in his cell would be submitted, probably Monday, to the allied control council in Berlin.

One of the letters, the source said, was addressed to the Reichsmarschall's widow, Emmy Goering, and the other was addressed to the German people, urging them to have courage.

Others besides Goering among the 10 doomed Nazi leaders had hoped to beat the gallows by suicide, a security official revealed. Capt. Samuel Binder said that from Jan. 1 until the execution day guards 10 times found prohibited articles in the cells of the condemned. He said any of these articles might have been used for self-destruction.

The articles ranged from a single sewing needle in the cell of Baron Constantin von Neurath to a glass vial in the possession of Joachim von Ribbentrop.

Goering told his wife in her last visit to the prison that he no longer had any of the poison with which he had hoped to cheat justice, the widow declared today. She said she did not know whether he really had the poison at the time, or whether he was afraid to tell her of it for fear she would try out in surprise.

But she said she was glad—if one might use such a word in such circumstances—of all the precautions taken to keep her separated from her husband in her visits to the prison.

"It was so terrible for me to have no touch at all with him when I visited him, and I wished 'if I

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Extend London's Jewel Hunt Over Wide Areas

London, Oct. 18.—(AP)—An intensive hunt for the thieves who stole part of the Duchess of Windsor's jewelry extended today into Europe and reached across the Atlantic as authorities proceeded on a theory the daring crime was the work of international gem thieves.

The Duke, who had come to England for a private, quiet visit, himself valued the loot at not more than \$80,000. Speaking from his temporary home at Sunningdale, where the robbery was committed Wednesday night, he told British newsmen he was deeply concerned and annoyed at "the exaggerated reports of the value of the stolen jewelry," which one British paper placed as high as \$2,000,000.

Scotland Yard, supreme headquarters of a ramified investigation, put its criminal investigation division's most astute minds to work on the case. R. M. Howe, assistant commissioner and one of the nation's foremost crime specialists, took personal charge of the hunt, which is reaching into the haunts and hideouts of known crooks in Britain and continental countries, on the theory that the thieves had tried or would try for a quick getaway from England.

The jewelry was taken from the Duchess' bedroom in the Ednam at 20,000 pounds (\$80,000) and three Lodge house of the Earl of Dudley recovered at 5,000 pounds (\$20,000).

In Surrey Wednesday night by a "cat burglar" who police said, vividly climbed an ivy-encrusted pipe to a second-story window.

More mystery was added to the circumstances surrounding the daring theft when searchers last night found a substantial quantity of the Windsors' world-famous gem collections scattered over a golf course adjoining the grounds of the lodge.

British police combed London's underworld, tightened a dragnet around airports and seaports and notified the Paris Surete and police in Amsterdam, New York City, Buenos Aires and other jewel markets to be on the lookout. Scotland Yard's senior detectives and post office, customs and coastal inspectors were on the case.

Discovery of the abandoned jewels prompted two lines of theory in the investigation: (1) that the thieves had been surprised in the act of dividing up the haul and had fled, leaving some behind, or (2) that they deliberately discarded pieces too well known to be disposed.

Scotland Yard's assessors still were examining the recovered jewelry today.

Decontrol Deadline On Food, Services, Is Set

Program Clicks Into High Gear As OPA Sets November 1 Deadline For Scrapping Majority Of Wartime Controls

Washington, Oct. 18.—(AP)—The administration's program for ridding the American economy of federal restraints clicked into high gear today with November 1 set as the deadline for scrapping a great majority of wartime price controls.

A high official said that foods, services and many commodities will be taken out from under ceilings by then—two months or more earlier than had been planned before President Truman's meat decision.

This official emphasized to a reporter that it will be "an orderly retreat" from controls and will not result in "riot or chaos."

Furthermore, for the somewhat less immediate future, he added that price lids will remain on rents, automobiles, building materials, refrigerators, furniture, basic clothing items and farm implements.

Major developments on the fast-moving decontrol front included:

1. Flour, bread and other bakery products figured in speculation as the next important food items to be freed of price ceilings.

The milling industry formally requested Secretary of Agriculture Clinton P. Anderson to lift controls from wheat flour, semolina and farina, declaring that wheat supplies are ample.

2. Coffee went off the controlled list completely. And price lids were hoisted slightly on jams, jellies, fruit preserves and men's white handkerchiefs among other things.

3. South of the border, the van-

guard of 500,000 lean young Mexican beef cattle began to move toward fattening pastures and ranges throughout the southwest United States.

The embargo on Mexican cattle was lifted at 12:31 a. m. Central Standard Time today.

4. An avalanche of meat—the biggest in 10 months—jammed the nation's livestock markets. Prices collapsed from \$1 to \$10 a hundred pounds yesterday. Butter, eggs and poultry also dropped.

5. Administration leaders, forecasting a congressional drive aimed at junking all controls (including rents and the veterans housing program), agreed that the entire OPA staff of 34,000 and its functions must be slashed to the bone before the lawmakers reconvene in January.

6. Labor members of the Wage Stabilization Board renewed their demands on the White House to kill all wage controls immediately.

7. The CIO cost of living committee assailed rising meat prices and declared that "millions of miners, railroad, steel and other workers will lack important ingredients in their diet."

8. Automotive production, still under controls slumped during September. Announcing this, the Civilian Production Administration blamed shortages in sheet steel, pig-iron, copper and lead.

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Army Speeds Up Discharge Plans

Washington, Oct. 18.—(AP)—The army, suffering from a case of payrollitis, marked down 435,000 officers and men today for discharge by year's end.

But whether there still may be a return to draft calls after the current two month induction holiday expires December 31 remained unclear.

Here are the figures:

The army had a total strength of 1,750,000 on September 30.

Congress says it may not have more than 1,070,000 by next June 30.

So, to reach that figure gradually, the present number will be cut to 1,310,000 by December 31.

That will be done mainly by getting rid of the last of the men drafted in 1945. In addition the air forces must discharge 8,700 wartime officers in addition to those leaving the service voluntarily. All men in all branches who have shown "ineptitude for military service" also are to be given their walking papers.

Announcing the discharge speed-up last night, the army said frankly it was being ordered to keep with in the payroll set by Congress.

Convict Soldiers Of Black Market Sales

Yekohama, Oct. 1.—(AP)—Sixth army headquarters announced today four American soldiers and 16 Japanese were convicted of black market charges involving illegal possession and sale of American and British goods.

The Americans are Privts. Berry Vannt, Richard, S. C.; George M. Harris, Rocky Mount, N. C., and John R. Andrews, Meridian, Miss., and T-5 Robert C. Spears, Tribbett, Miss. Each was sentenced to five years at hard labor, dishonorable discharge and total pay forfeiture.

They were accused of stealing and selling to a Japanese 10 drums of American gasoline for 10,000 yen (\$667). The Japanese previously were sentenced to two years in jail,

Disposal Prevents Ac- tion By Fanatics; Council Voted Out Examining Nazi Brains; No Clues To Goering Death

Nuernberg, Oct. 18.—(AP)—A high source disclosed today that the allied control council had voted down, after a long and bitter row, a proposal that the brains of the executed Nazi ring leaders be examined for possible scientific clues as to what makes a Fascist boss tick.

The subject of examining the brains of the condemned men by the international military tribunal was raised in several sessions of the four-power council for Germany, an anonymous but thoroughly reliable officer said, but it was vetoed each time.

Investigation of the means by which Herman Goering obtained the cyanide which enabled him to cheat the gallows Tuesday night continued today.

With the ashes of the 11 dead Nazis scattered to the winds, it became apparent here that the decision to cremate the executed men, together with that of Goering, was made only a short time before Wednesday morning's hangings, because officials in Nuernberg were preparing as recently as last Thursday for ordinary, but extraordinary secret burials.

Reports circulating here indicated that discussion among the four occupying powers as to what to do with the bodies after death centered around two main factors:

1. How much criticism would be involved in cremating the 11 men—including five Catholics—inasmuch as the Roman Catholic Church prohibits cremation?

(An informed source at the Vatican said last night that the cremation of the Nazis was "not approvable" by the church but that he doubted any official pronouncement would be made in the case. He

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November Elections

Coming General Elections Are Expected By Both Parties To Be A Close Race; What It Would Mean Should Republicans Gain A Majority In Congress

Washington, Oct. 18.—(AP)—Here's what it would mean if the Republicans were to win control in either the House or Senate or both houses of Congress.

The elections in November are expected to be tight. The Republicans say they have a good chance of taking over Congress. If they do, it will end their 16-year losing streak.

The Republicans lost the House to the Democrats in 1930. They lost the House and Senate to them in 1932. The Democrats have had a majority in both houses since 1932.

Since a bill must be passed by a majority vote of both houses before it can become law, a Republican House could block anything passed by the Democratic Senate.

So a Republican majority in one House could tie President Truman's wishes in knots. A Republican majority in both houses could pretty well run the government show.

(Even though Republicans controlled Congress, they might not always vote solidly together. Some might join forces with the minority Democrats at times to defeat the wishes of the Republican leaders.)

(Southern Democrats repeatedly since 1932 have teamed up with Republicans to defeat certain aims of the majority Democratic leaders.)

Here's what a Republican majority in the House would mean:

The Republicans would elect the head man of the House. Some Republicans would become chairman of all committees. Members of the majority party are always committee chairmen. Democrats are chairmen now. These jobs are considered plums. They carry prestige and power.

The committees are the backbone of Congress. They hold hearings on bills, they make investigations. They include those which pass on

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GANDHI TALKS ON SPREADING INDIAN UNREST

Widening Ring Of Violence And Death As Moslems And Hindus Riot

New Delhi, India, Oct. 18.—(AP)—Mohandas K. Gandhi advised women in the riot-torn areas of Eastern Bengal province tonight to commit suicide by poison or other means to avoid dishonor.

The spiritual leader of India's Hindu-led Congress party spoke briefly at a prayer meeting. Congress party sources in Calcutta reported that the spreading Hindu-Muslim violence in Bengal's Tipperah and Pashchali districts had left thousands dead.

K. N. Datta, president of the Eastern Chamber of Commerce and president of the Noakhali relief and rehabilitation committee said in Calcutta the total number affected by the riots in the two districts was "not less than 100,000 in all." He could give no estimate of the number of killed and wounded, but said 300,000 square miles were affected and 3,700 refugees thus far have arrived at five Calcutta relief centers.

The Moslem government of Bengal said casualties were not heavy, but this was denied by Surendra Moho Ghosh, president of the Bengal provincial congress committee, who estimated that at least 5,000 were dead and more than 50,000 were affected since the trouble began Oct. 10.

"The only effective way to bring the situation under control immediately is to bomb the areas where trouble has occurred," Ghose said.

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Refugee Band Is Barred From U.S.

Miami, Fla., Oct. 18.—(AP)—A gallant band of 47 Estonian and one Finnish refugee remained on their battered little fishing boats today while a guard patrolled the wharf to keep them aboard after the Justice Department said they could not enter the country.

The Justice Department's decision announced last yesterday in Washington, was a bitter blow to the refugees who had sailed from their homeland first to escape the Germans and later the Russians and sought freedom in America.

The first group arrived here Aug. 21 in the 38-foot sloop "Inanda" without visas and it was this group of 18 which the Justice Department excluded.

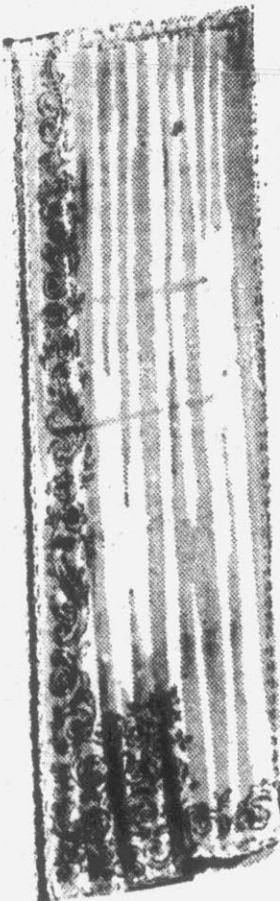

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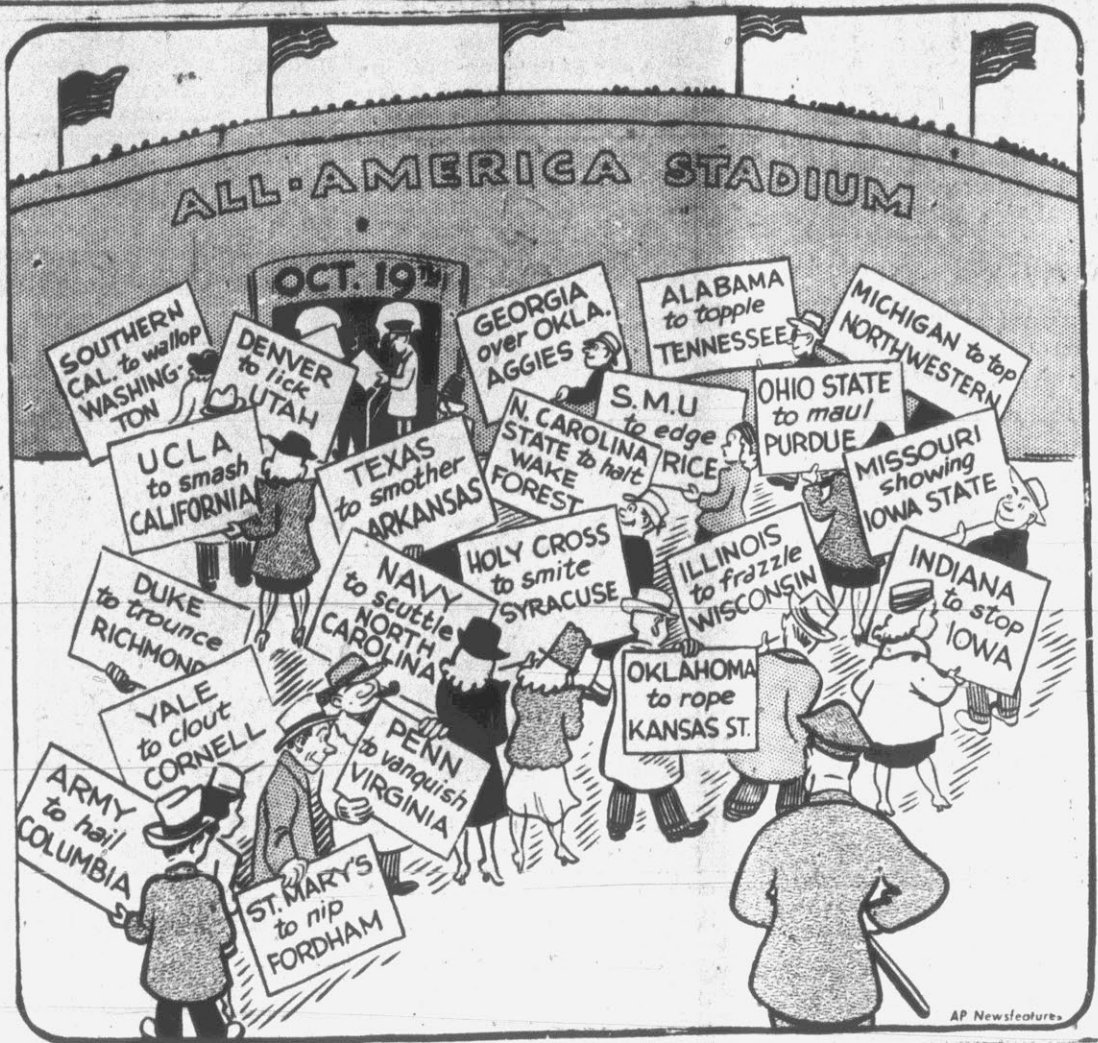

is in no danger of losing its luster this week end is Notre Dame, No. 2 in the current rankings. The Irish have an open date.

Army, back at its old stand atop the national rankings after making Michigan its fourth victim of the season and the 22nd in an unbroken string, takes on an invading Columbia team that has won its first three starts to gain the 11th spot in the countrywide ratings.

UCLA, the all-victorious No. 5 team, visits California, which bounced St. Mary's out of the unbeaten class a week ago, and Georgia, ranked eighth, catches an Oklahoma A and M team moving in to start a comeback.

Three other big nine battles will find Wisconsin at Illinois, Iowa at Indiana and Purdue at Ohio State, with Minnesota entertaining an inter-sectional opponent, Wyoming. The big six schedule sends Kansas State to Oklahoma, Iowa State to Missouri and Nebraska to Kansas.

A North Carolina team that has won two games since tying its opener moves in against Navy in the east, where such pairings as Yale at Cornell, Syracuse at Holy Cross, Dartmouth at Brown and Rutgers at Princeton will be augmented by inter-sectional games bringing St. Mary's to Fordham, Michigan State to Penn State and Marquette to Pittsburgh.

Georgia Tech will be at Louisiana State, Auburn at Tulane and Vanderbilt at Kentucky for other Southeastern Conference struggles. Elsewhere in the South it will be San Francisco and Mississippi, Richmond at Duke, North Carolina State at Wake Forest, William and Mary at Washington and Lee, Davidson at VMI and Furman at the Citadel.

There is nothing people despise more than religious hypocrisy. The church official who embezzles and goes to the penitentiary received ten times as much publicity as the confirmed criminal who is caught in one more crime and sent back to jail.

Yet there is a subtle hypocrisy—an unavoidable bit of religious pretense—in the lives of even the best of people. The truly spiritual realize this and are greatly distressed by it. Admirable as they may appear before the world, they know in their heart of hearts that they fall below their own high standards and below the estimation which others have of their character. A verse written a generation or two ago describes this state vividly: "No more is our religion Like Christ's in soul or deed. Than painted grain on canvas Is like the living seed."

What are we to do about the fact that down in the bottom of our own hearts we know ourselves to be unworthy of the spiritual appraisal our friends make of us. There is not much we can do about it except endure it and be humble. We can strive every day to be better, but after all our striving we shall not be so good as to please ourselves and certainly not good enough to measure up to the standards high heaven would set for us.

Besides the committee chairmanships, the Republicans would have a lot of patronage to hand out to Republicans, or friends of Republicans.

There are a number of paying jobs attached to the House. For example: Chief clerk, sergeant at arms, doorkeeper, chief bill clerk, House postmaster, custodian, and all the assistants to all those.

The people in those jobs now were put there by the Democrats, since they have the majority. Many, or maybe all of those mentioned, would lose their jobs if the Republicans take over.

As to the Senate: All that was said about the House goes for the Senate if the Republicans win there.

Here's what the Republicans need in order to win control:
There are 435 seats in the House. The Republicans now have 192.

This means they will have to pick up 243 more seats. All 435 seats are at stake in this election since all representatives run every two years. (The Democrats now have 247 seats. Two representatives of minor parties are in the House. And there are four vacancies there.)

There are 96 seats in the Senate. A majority would be 49. The Republicans now have 39. They'll need to add 10 more seats. The Democrats now have 56 senators. There is one minor party member.

Senators are elected for six-year terms. Every year one-third of them, or 32, face the voters so that in a six-year period all Senate seats will have been involved in elections.
But this year, because of vacancies, 37 instead of 32 Senate seats are at stake.

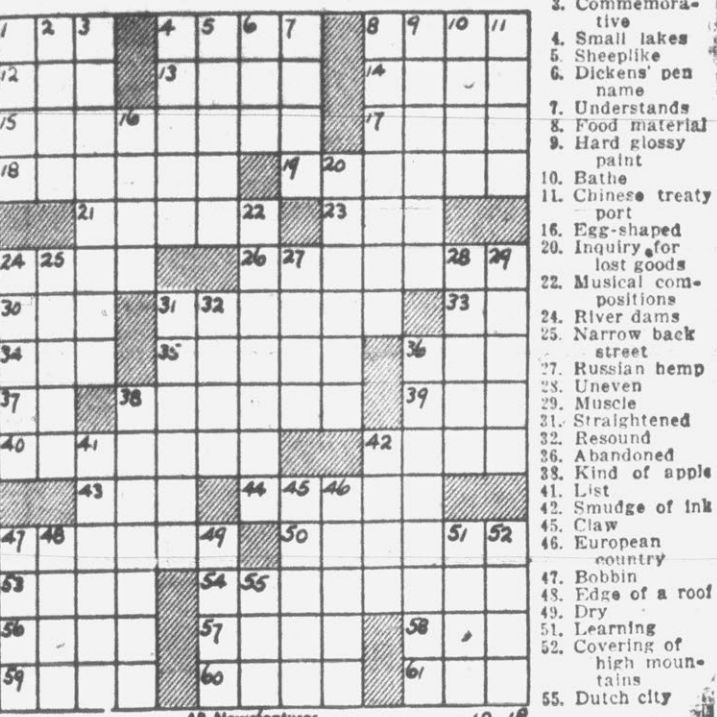

The interview in the Daily Worker described Eisler as a "slight, scholarly, middle-aged journalist" and said he and his wife had been scheduled to sail for their native Leipzig today "with State Department approval."

"But their exit permit," the story continued, "had been cancelled without reason on Wednesday after their baggage had already cleared customs and been placed aboard ship."

During the course of the interview, the Daily Worker quoted Eisler as saying:

"I have been a member of the German Communist party but I have never been a leader or representative of the Communist International during its existence."
