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REPUBLICANS WIN HOUSE AND SENATE

Trieste Problem Pleases No One

Both Yugoslavia And Italy Protest Proposed Solution; Byrnes And Molotov Clash In Brief Flare-Up; Russian Delegate Consistently Backs Minority Side Forcing Stalemate

New York, Nov. 6.—(AP)—Both Italy and Yugoslavia blasted a proposed great powers settlement of the east-west dispute over strategic Trieste today, telling the session of the big four foreign ministers that proposed controls for the new international territory would be dictatorial and undemocratic.

Neither country substantially altered its position on the Trieste issue, which is the greatest stumbling block in the way of a final Italian peace treaty draft, and when they had finished their arguments the controversy appeared no nearer solution than before.

Yugoslavia, through foreign minister Stanjko Simic, offered two minor concessions with respect to boundary and the proposed power of a United Nations governor, but diplomatic authorities said these did not appear to advance a solution.

Italian Ambassador Alberto Tarchiani told Secretary of State Byrnes and other foreign ministers that the proposal to put the Trieste territory under the U. N. security council was unacceptable because of its human injustice, its practical inefficiency, its denial of democratic principles and its failure to carry out the hopes held forth to all nations by the Atlantic Charter.

New York, Nov. 6.—(AP)—A showdown fight between the U. S. and Russia over control of the key Adriatic port of Trieste appeared to be developing rapidly today with Yugoslavia and Italy both called to testify before the big four foreign ministers council here.

Light Vote
Yesterday's off-year election day was "just another day" in Greenville and Pitt County and the voting was extremely light.

The official returns of the election will be canvassed tomorrow and they will be printed in tomorrow's edition.

LEWIS' WAGE FIGHT NEARER FINAL STAGES

NLRB To Push Foreman Issue In Court Test; Crux Of Differences

Washington, Nov. 6.—(AP)—John L. Lewis' wage struggle with the government moved nearer the showdown stage today as the National Labor Relations Board made ready to re-open a second front in the soft coal dispute.

Here is the twin-paneled picture:
1. Negotiations between Lewis aides and officials of the Federal Coal Mines Administration were scheduled to resume after the election day recess. At issue is whether the government's contract with the United Mine Workers can be reopened by Lewis.

With Secretary of the Interior J. A. Krug about to head back to Washington from his western inspection trip, the time for a face-to-face meeting between Lewis and the top boss of the federally-scaled pits drew steadily nearer. Lewis thus far has held aloof from the preliminary skirmishing.

2. The NLRB called for final arguments tomorrow (11 a. m. EST) on the unionization of supervisors at four Jones and Laughlin Steel Corporation mines in western Pennsylvania.

This issue poses one of the most vexing differences between Lewis (Continued on Page Four)

Wallace Offers Interpretation

Washington, Nov. 6.—(AP)—Henry A. Wallace, New Dealer former vice president and Secretary of Commerce, interpreted the election results today as meaning "the Democratic party will either become more progressive or it will die."

Wallace, recently ousted from President Truman's cabinet after a controversy over policy toward Russia, said in a statement:

"Progressives must not be discouraged by the outcome of the election."
"The Republican Congress will inevitably multiply our economic problems and the American people who fundamentally are always progressive in their attitudes will then turn to leadership for help."

"As a result of this election the Democratic party will either become more progressive or it will die. I do not expect it to die."

Chinese Communists Slow Big Offensive
Peiping, Nov. 6.—(AP)—Vicious Chinese Communist counterattacks have "curtailed" the government's broad offensive in north China's Shantung peninsula, military observers said today.

They reported loss to the Reds of recently-captured Yehsien, one of the province's four major ports, and said 50,000 Communists had launched a drive against the rail line from coastal Tsingtao to Tsinan, nearly 200 airline miles inland.

BRITISH FEAR NEW POLICIES

GOP Win Called Swing To "Right", Truman Discredited

London, Nov. 6.—(AP)—The London Star, printing the first British editorial reaction to United States election, declared today "we shall see American big business attempting to exploit the Republican victory and in every way thwarting national and international efforts to get order into world affairs."

"That attitude," the liberal publication added, "cuts right across Britain's policy."

Other London evening newspapers announced results of the voting in headlines such as: "U. S. Landslide to the Right."

The Star editorial was carried under the headline "Reaction."

The Star's banner head read: "Truman Is Voted Out," while the conservative Evening Standard described "a resounding call for a businessman's government," headlined: "Swing To The Right In U. S."

"If Mr. Harry Truman were prime minister of the United States instead of President," observed the Standard, "he would be out of office today. In a world turning more and more to the left, America has turned sharply and dramatically to the right."

"It is, apparently, as clean a sweep as Britain's 15 months ago though the broom has swept in exactly the opposite direction."

The French press interpreted the election results principally as a rebuke to President Truman, with headlines reading: "Truman's Ad- (Continued on Page Four)

Republicans Plan Policy-Shaping Conferences In Advance Of Convening Congress; Truman Veto Hard Nut To Crack In Effecting GOP Platform

Washington, Nov. 6.—(AP)—The swift end of wartime controls over the nation's economy and legislative proposals intended to ease management-labor friction shaped up today as the biggest issues facing the next almost certainly Republican-dominated Congress.

Forecasting a return to control of both Houses after 15 years, the GOP leadership already has slated a series of policy shaping conferences in advance of January 3, when the 80th Congress convenes.

The Republicans hold no illusion, however, that it will be easy to place their program—when finally formulated—into effect. A Democrat still sits in the White House. Hence they either must persuade President Truman to accept that program, or try to crack his vetoes when and as they come.

The bulk of Democratic votes from the fairly solid South will make the overriding of a Truman (Continued on Page Four)

DEWEY BOASTS RECORD VOTE

Staggering Avalanche Of Votes Topple Democrats

New York, Nov. 6.—(AP)—Piling up a staggering vote unprecedented in New York State, Gov. Thomas E. Dewey and the entire Republican ticket yesterday rolled to a landslide triumph over their Democratic coalition opponents.

As late returns trickled in, the 44-year-old Dewey's record smashing plurality neared the 700,000 mark over New Dealer Senator James M. Mead who had PAC support.

Irving M. Ives, GOP senate candidate, forged ahead of former Gov. Herbert H. Lehman, the vote heralding a 250,000 plurality. Ives will be the state's first Republican senator in 20 years.

Republicans picked up at least six seats in the new congress in their sweep of politically important New York State.

All state GOP nominees were successful and the Republicans boosted their majorities in the state legislature.

Roosevelt's Political Viewpoints Disclosed

(Editor's Note: Georgia's Governor Ellis Arnall has described his liberal record and his credo for America in a book, "The Shore Daily Seen," published today by Lippincott. In the following extract he tells of Roosevelt's attitude toward the fourth term and he quotes his opinions, given in 1944, of Henry Wallace and James Byrnes.)

New York, Nov. 6.—(AP)—Franklin D. Roosevelt had given me an appointment to talk politics; but he had not permitted the conversation to reach that subject.

"Mr. President, you helped me a great deal in my campaign in 1942 with advice and by talking with some of your friends I may be naïf," I had begun. "This is a national election year, and I would like to do what I can for you. Are you planning to make the race for a fourth term for president?"

He did not reply directly. Instead he spoke of Hyde Park and of his occupation as a grower of Christmas trees. It was a somewhat unusual crop, but a profitable one, and did not impoverish the land, he observed.

"Mr. President, the first time you invited me to visit you at Warm Springs, you told me about the Christmas trees at Hyde Park," I said, when he gave me an opening, "it is a very interesting story but the fourth term is more interesting."

He remembered my visit to Warm Springs. He remembered his own numerous visits to Georgia. Finally he ended and sat silent for a few minutes.

"I am very tired," he said. "My health isn't as good as in 1932, you know, and I am 12 years older."

He continued his explanation. The office was an expensive one to hold and he wished to return to Hyde Park and rest. What did the people think?

"They would like for you to stay in office, Mr. President," I told him.

"We are in a war, Ellis," he replied. "I will not ask for the office, but if the Democratic Party nominates me I will be a candidate. It would be as much a matter of duty as a soldier obeying orders from his commanding officer."

Stalin's Prospective Heir Raps "Atom Blackmailers"

London, Nov. 6.—(AP)—Marshal A. A. Zhdanov, chairman of the Supreme Soviet of the U.S.S.R., declared in Moscow today that "the blood of our people was not shed for imperialist expansionists and pretenders to world domination—for atom blackmailers."

Zhdanov spoke before a meeting of the Moscow Soviet on the eve of the 29th anniversary of the Bolshevik revolution. His words were broadcast by the Moscow radio.

Prime Minister Stalin had been expected to speak. Soviet sources in London said they were uncertain whether Stalin would deliver his customary anniversary-eve address later.

The celebration meeting sent greetings to Stalin, whose apparent absence was not immediately explained. Zhdanov, sometimes mentioned as a successor to the prime minister, quoted Stalin repeatedly and the audience applauded each reference to him.

"No Comment" Can Vote By Truman

Washington, Nov. 6.—(AP)—President Truman returned to Washington today without comment on the outcome of yesterday's elections.

The Chief Executive, however, promised to state his reaction at a news conference in the near future. He was met at the train by Dean Acheson, undersecretary of state, and Captain James Fosssett, the President's naval aide.

Reporters crowding around, asked his reaction to Democratic setbacks. "No comment," he replied. Then, he added that he would see the reporters in a day or two.

"At a press conference?" a reporter asked. Mr. Truman nodded affirmatively.

The Chief Executive, who remained until 2 a. m. reading election returns and listening to the radio, was smiling as he arrived at Union Station with Mrs. Truman and his daughter, Margaret. They accompanied him from Independence, Mo., where all three voted.

DEMOCRATS IN N. C. CHALK UP EASY VICTORY

Early Returns Show Little Reflection Of National GOP Trend

Raleigh, Nov. 6.—(AP)—North Carolina Democrats chalked up another victory today as incomplete returns from yesterday's off-year election showed the Republican tide that swept many sections had failed to shake the ruling party's long-held grip on this state.

The returns were not full enough to make a strict comparison but they indicated Democratic majorities were not greatly reduced below normal, if at all.

The party elected its 12 candidates for the national house, three state-wide offices, and a host of lesser offices. No reports were available to show whether Republican strength in the legislature had been increased.

Of the two proposals to amend the state constitution, the one making women eligible for jury duty was passed by the voters to amend the constitution. The legislative expense money of \$10 a day, was threatened with defeat.

The vote for the jury amendment was 49,781 in favor and 27,450 against, with returns tabulated from 673 of the State's 1,928 precincts, for the legislators' expense money of \$6,432 voted yes, while 35,329 voted no.

Supreme Court Justices J. Wallace Winborne and M. V. Barnhill Democratic incumbents piled up majorities in 377 precincts. Barnhill received 52,200 votes and Winborne 44,481 while the Republican aspirant, Herbert F. Seawell of Carthage, polled 21,863.

Columbians Inc. In Police Court

Atlanta, Nov. 6.—(AP)—Brown-shirted members of Columbians Inc., newly formed anti-Negro, anti-Jewish group, sat in police court here while a 17-year-old member of the organization was turned over to Fulton County Grand Jury on a charge of inciting to riot.

The youth, J. R. Childers, was held in \$500 bond at a commitment hearing yesterday in connection with the alleged blackjacking of Clifford Hines, Negro, on the night of Oct. 28 in an Atlanta residential section occupied by both white persons and Negroes.

The Columbians, whose members have been reported patrolling streets in some sections, have been directed to show cause by Nov. 15 why their charter should not be revoked.

In ordering civil proceedings against the group, Gov. Ellis Arnall charged it was similar to the Ku Klux Klan and conspired to "beat and terrorize" citizens. Revocation of the Klan's charter also is being sought by Arnall.

Bad News For Truman

President Has Had Tough Going Even With Both Houses Dominated By His Own Democrats; Election Results Presage More Difficulties Lying Ahead

Washington, Nov. 6.—(AP)—All the news about Congress today was bad news for President Truman and whatever plans he has for running the country in the next two years.

As the final results of yesterday's elections dribbled in today it became clear to everyone that the Republicans had won a majority—and therefore control—in the House.

This Republican House victory alone—without the Republican triumph in the Senate which seemed within reach as dawn broke over Mr. Truman—was enough to box him in.

He had had tough enough going since he became president in April, 1945—with a Congress where both houses were dominated by his own Democrats.

Republicans won control of both House and Senate of the 80th Congress today in a triumphant landslide that overturned the Democrats for the first time in 15 years.

The result meant a Congress meeting in January politically divided from the White House. Tradition pointed a favorable finger too, toward GOP capture of the White House two years hence.

President Truman, who arrived by special train from voting in Missouri, declined comment on the election results.

The GOP went over the top for House control in tabulations of late returns at 11:50 a. m. (EST). A few minutes later Arthur B. Watkins, Republican candidate, won a victory in Utah which gave his party undisputed possession of the Senate.

Watkins defeated Senator Abe Murdock (D), who usually has been listed as a supporter of the policies of President Truman's administration.

In a thundering landslide that shook the Democratic Party to its foundations from coast to coast, the Republicans won smashing victories in such big states as New York where they reelected Gov. Thomas E. Dewey and set Irving M. Ives to the Senate to replace Senator James Mead. Mead lost to Dewey in the governor's race.

The Republicans also captured three governorships previously held by the Democrats, but lost one in Colorado, to their opponents. It was the first of national proportion victory scored by the GOP since it lost control of Congress in the early 30s.

The prospective upset in congressional control would mean a change of congressional officials, from the speaker to the lowliest clerk.

Republican Leader Joseph Martin (Mass) is expected to become the speaker, replacing Rep. Sam Rayburn (D-Texas) with a Republican House victory.

In the Senate, Senator Vandenberg (R-Mich) probably would be chosen as presiding officer to succeed Senator Kenneth D. McKellar (D-Tenn.). Senator Robert Taft (R-Ohio) was considered the most likely choice to succeed Senator Alben Barkley (D-Ky) as majority leader.

Vandenberg, who has been serving as an adviser to Secretary of State Byrnes, probably would replace Senator Tom Connally (D-Tex), another Byrnes adviser, as chairman of the Foreign Relations Committee in a shift which would put Republicans in all top committee posts.

Foreign Policy Fixed

U. S. Accused In Past Of "No Foreign Policy"; Developments Of Past Years Show Definite Trend; Other Nations Watchful; No Changes Are Expected

Although Europe was reported anxious because of the trends of American politics, yesterday's vote actually would seem to mean very little regarding U. S. foreign policy.

The world seldom expects British elections to have any major effect on the "traditional" empire policy, but it has been popular to speak of the United States as having "no foreign policy," and to expect her to veer with the beliefs of whichever party may be in power. But the U. S. has been developing, if slowly, a very definite foreign policy for a good many years now.

There is every evidence that it is a policy of the people and therefore mandatory on either party.

There are two great fears abroad, as expressed in the foreign press and by delegates to the international conferences now under way in New York.

Bishop William Walter Peele, general superintendent of the Richmond County area, will preside during the conference which will be concluded Sunday afternoon with the reading of appointments of preachers for the ensuing year.

The conference, which will have its headquarters at its central theme, will be formally opened tonight with the sacrament of the Lord's supper administered by Bishop Peele and the seven district superintendents. Organization will follow.
Conference officials say excellent reports as to membership gains are expected from the 778 churches of the conference, and the 256 pastoral charges are expected to make favorable financial reports.

George Franklin of Raleigh, attorney consultant of the North Carolina League of Municipalities, will come to Greenville tomorrow to discuss with city officials plans for establishing a zoning system here. Greenville is one of the few cities in the state which does not have a zoning ordinance.
Mayor Boyd said when zoning plans are mapped and completed for a city ordinance the matter will be submitted at a public hearing.

Missoula, Mont., Nov. 6—(AP)—If Missoula County has another execution, the county jail may fall down.

Sheriff R. D. MacLean today ordered the lumber in the gallows, last used for a hanging in 1943, to be sold against one wall of the sagging historic jail.

"I've used just about everything to prop up this building to keep prisoners from digging their way to freedom. But I never thought I'd resort to gallows," he said.

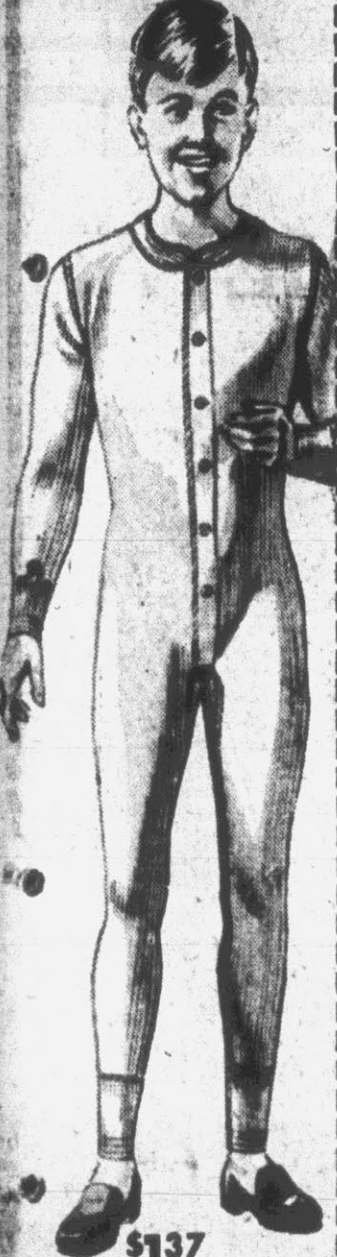

CONCERNING PROPER DIETS
As the ferry glides from the island to the mainland, leaving a smooth and shimmering expanse of water in its wake, the gulls dart back and forth looking for food.

Their natural food is fish, but in modern times the gull has come to rely a great deal upon the garbage which the cook and his helpers heave overboard several times every day. Those who know considerable about sea gulls and their habits, tell us that when the gull is no longer compelled to dive for fish but is given a prepared menu of any kind the gull grows fat and sluggish.

The scene reminds us of the unpleasant fact that there are many people who, intellectually and spiritually, live on garbage and prefer to do so. The mammoth sale of salacious books proves this. GOOD WILL AMONG THE NATIONS
By JANE EADS

Washington—Maybe the conferees at the big league peace parleys should take a leaf from the party book of the United Nations Club here.

Through table tennis, jitterbugging, bridge and quiz contests, it is doing a pretty slick job promoting international good relations.

Born in the early days of the war, the organization is going stronger than ever now. Its membership represents 51 different countries.

Meredith Howard, a statuesque and good-looking young woman, is the club's founder and president.

Members of various embassies and legations and of the Washington social set liked the good times they had when she put on a series of network radio shows, called "Embassy Day," and wanted more. So she got some of her friends together again later on the lawn of famous Dumbarton Oaks and in March of 1942 the group was incorporated as the United Nations Club.

As a group they were invited to embassies, homes and seminars about town. Three years later they got their own home—a big house at Nineteenth and "R" Sts. which was leased from Myron Taylor and later purchased from John Whyte, Ambassador to Peru.

The library is furnished with leather chairs and blue flowered drapes that Henry Morgenthau sold to the club when he left his post as Secretary of the Treasury. The books are donations of the embassies.

In his big dining room are the flags of every member nation.

The household staff is as international as the membership. The housekeeper is Scottish, Mrs. Bella MacDougall. The waiters are Filipino, the cook is Spanish, the pantry help Negroes, the secretaries are British and American and the maître d'hôtel is French.

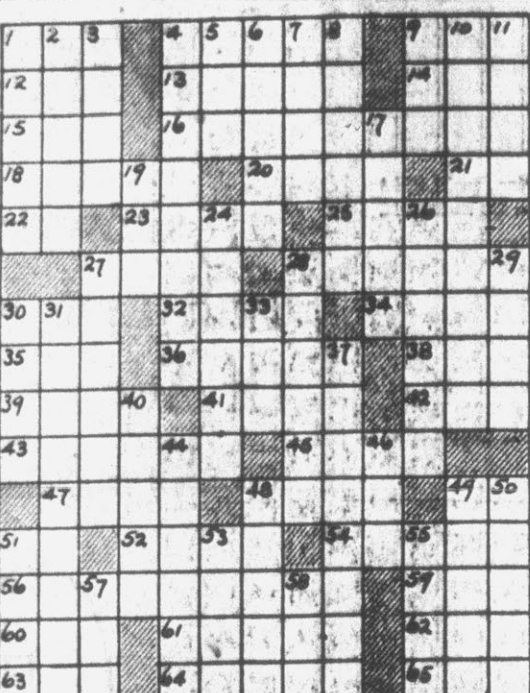
This year's social program includes a visit to an embassy every month where there may be a dance, a reception, a cocktail party or a foreign movie.

bill passed by Congress but Congress can pass it over his veto if two thirds of the members vote to do so.

Getting a two-thirds vote to override a veto isn't easy, so when a president of one party uses a veto lavishly to knock down the work of a Congress dominated by another party, they can cancel each other out.

The Republicans in Congress can be depended upon to try to get through legislation of their own somehow, because they'll be thinking of the 1948 presidential congressional elections.

Two years from now they'll be trying to capture not only House and Senate but the presidency, also. But Mr. Truman won't be the only president who has had to contend with a Congress run in whole or in part by the opposition party.

President Hoover—just as Mr. Truman now—had only two more years to go in the White House when the 1930 elections came along. As a result of these elections plus vacancies in Republican ranks which developed in 1931, the Democrats captured the House.

That left Mr. Hoover, a Republican, and his Republican Senate facing a Democratic House. It was tough on Mr. Hoover.

Then in the presidential congressional elections of 1932, the Democrats took over both houses and the presidency.

And 28 years ago—in 1918, when President Wilson, a Democrat, had only two more years in the White House—the Republicans captured both houses of Congress from the Democrats.

In the 1920 presidential congressional elections, the Republicans repeated their sweep of Congress and took over the presidency, too.

Dean M. Gillespie, incumbent Republican, in the first district congressional race there. Democrat William Lee Knous defeated Republican Leon E. Lavington for governor.

In a sweep that left only Rhode Island, and possibly Maryland and West Virginia, as Democratic islands, in the east, Pennsylvania laid claim to being the banner GOP state.

There the Republicans won nine House seats previously held by the Democrats, in addition to retaining all of the places they had held.

The State gave Gov. Edward Martin, Republican, a margin over Senator Guffy, a New Deal wheelhorse, of more than 600,000 for the Senate seat the Democrats had held since 1935.

GOP leaders joyously counted their complete control of the nation's legislative machinery.

Democratic national Chairman Robert E. Hannegan gleefully left his party's headquarters early in the morning without comment, but Ben Rayburn (D-Tex.) said in Bonham, Tex., he recalled it looked like the Democrats had lost the House in 1942 "but the next day we pulled ahead 24 seats."

"Can I tell the correspondents that when I leave?" His voice was a little flat. As if the recollections of Hyde Park and Warm Springs had gone out of it, and only the tiredness remained.

I asked him if he had a choice of his running mate on the ticket. He told me that he wished for and hoped for the renomination of Henry Wallace.

"They tell me that Henry would cost the ticket a million votes. What do you think?"

I replied that while I did not know the vice president, while I knew that he had many political enemies and was unpopular with some groups, Henry Wallace would gain more votes than he would lose for the ticket.

The president continued to discuss other possibilities for the office, discarding them one by one.

There is Jimmy Byrnes, who is a good man and a good friend," he said, "but I have talked with some of the outstanding Catholics of the country about Jimmy, because he was raised in the Catholic Church and became a Protestant. They have no prejudices themselves. But belief that his nomination would not only mean a loss of many votes but that it would arouse some bitter antagonisms over the nation. When they told me that—his eyes strayed about the room and finally found the window—then Jimmy's cheeks went out the window."

He returned to Vice President Wallace.

"Henry is a great man, though some people don't understand him. He has courage and loyalty. Nobody has been more loyal."

(Governor Arnall next described events leading up to the Democratic National Convention and the nomination of Senator Harry Truman instead of Wallace as Roosevelt's running mate. At a subsequent White House chat, the following conversation transpired between the Georgian and the chief executive.)

"I was not disappointed and I did not think Mr. Wallace was disappointed."

"However, Mr. President, I think Henry Wallace ought to have any place in the government that he is willing to accept."

"He can have any place that he would like in the cabinet, except the place of Cordell Hull as secretary of state," the president replied.

"Henry is a great friend, the most loyal man I know," the president told me that Harry Truman would grow in stature.

Problems of the greatest magnitude confront the new Congress. International understandings and misunderstandings—will shadow many a move. In that setting then

the lawmakers must make decision on such issues as:

1. Continuation of the draft, due to expire March 15. Tied in closely with this problem is the administration's insistence on a permanent compulsory military training program, certain to arouse heated debate.

2. Merger of the Army and Navy—another administration "must" item despite sharp opposition from the sea arm itself.

3. Stepping up the housing program—a major sore spot particularly for veterans.

4. Reduction of taxes from high war-time levels. Rep. Knutson (R-Minn.), senior Republican on the ways and means committee, has called for a 20 per cent reduction. General belief at the capitol is that a more modest cut finally will emerge next year.

5. Cutting governmental expenditures and balancing the budget. The Republicans will have Democratic help on this one, but interest on the public debt, commitments to veterans and necessary military and naval budgets will be hard to trim. Rep. Joe Martin (R-Mass.), likely speaker of the new House, has given No. 1 listing on his program to stripping away wartime powers from the executive branch so that "these United States will return to constitutional government."

Martin said his party will study the most effective means to "restore under absolute fairness, harmony between labor and management," but he did not go into details. There was no indication whether the Republicans would attempt to push through the Case labor disputes bill which Mr. Truman vetoed last summer. Originally labor blasted the measure as anti-union.

Martin also urged repeal of "the stifling war powers of the Chief Executive." The administration already has divested itself of big chunks of the price control program which caused the most resentment among legislators during the closing days of the last Congress.

Nevertheless it seems certain that an all-out drive would be made to repeal the OPA law long in advance of its scheduled June 3 death date. Rent control probably will be continued under some old-line government agency.

Dewey's margin—greatest ever given a Republican gubernatorial candidate—propelled him into a favorable spot for consideration as Republican presidential nominee again in 1948.

Four years ago Dewey was elected governor by a 243,381 plurality over the combined total of his Democratic and American Labor party opponents. In 1944 as Republican presidential candidate, however, he went down to defeat to the late Franklin D. Roosevelt who won by a 316,591 plurality.

In a victory statement, Dewey said "Our people want government that will serve the people without trying to become their masters."

In the congressional battle, which before the election the Republicans and Democrats shared with 22 representatives each and the ALP had one, results showed:

Vito Marcantonio, only ALP member in congress, successfully defended his 18th district post against Republican Frederick V. P. Bryan.

Adam Clayton Powell, Democrat, retained his seat in the 22nd district, defeating Grant Reynolds, Republican.

Army Skeptical Of Nazi's Story

Stuttgart, Germany, Nov. 6.—(AP)—U. S. Army agents are investigating with frank skepticism the story of a recently captured S. S. lieutenant colonel that Adolf Hitler is still alive and can be heard addressing his followers over a secret radio transmitter.

The S. S. officer is the same one who announced on his arrest near here last week that he had seen Hitler's former deputy, Martin Bormann, in late May, 1945—after the date Bormann was reported killed in Berlin.

Army officials said they placed little credence in his stories for which they can find no substantiation. Privately they are inclined to regard the officer as a "crackpot."

The German says he is Hans Joachim von Birgisdorf. Investigators can find no record of such a name in German military files. Psychiatrists reported he was not insane—"at least no crazier than any S. S. fanatic."
