GOP Victory May Cut Down Strikes

John L. Lewis May Be More Cautious Because Of Strong Republican Leanings Toward More Drastic Anti-Strike Legislation

By HAROLD D. WARD Washington, Nov. 7—(AP)—The administration and the United Mine Workers, both well aware of strong Republican support, for legislative strike curbs, pitched into the critical coal situation anew today.

The top questions were: (1) Would the GOP election victory change the government's plans for coping with the implied strike threat by 400,000 miners?

(2) Would it make John L. Lewis think twice before calling an edge-of-winter walkout by the UMW to back up his demands for government concessions to the union?

As talks continued between Lewis' aides and Coal Mines Administrator N. H. Colleson, it remained to be seen whether the administration would adopt a firmer policy toward Lewis in line with earlier Republican proposals to restrict some union activities, particularly those relating to walkouts.

So far, the United Mine Workers chieftain has stood pat on his challenge to the government, insisting that he has the right to open the current union-government pact to seek higher wages and other changes. Otherwise, he declared, the contract will be "void."

Some administration lawyers sided with Lewis—at least before the election—although Secretary of Interior J. A. Krug has steadfastly insisted that the present agreement covers the duration of government operation of the mines, which last May were seized after a crippling 60-day strike.

With the Republicans due to take over control when Congress reconvenes January 3, the dilemma posed by Lewis and his miners rose to paramount importance in the field of labor relations.

Some labor leaders freely predicted an attempt to write strategic strike control legislation, noting that in the last session, the Republicans displayed somewhat more ardor than the Democrats for such action.

At the same time, however, both AFL and CIO officials said they expected the GOP leadership—with a weather eye cocked on the 1947 Presidential election—to refrain from antagonizing labor.

Two government agencies were occupied with Lewis labor disputes today: 1. The National Labor Relations Board tackled the controversy over unionizing mine supervisors. The case involves foremen at four Jones and Laughlin Steel Corporation mines in Pennsylvania.

2. The Coal Mines Administration in an effort to avert a possible new coal mines shutdown November 20 kept up its talks over the issue of higher pay.

Lewis himself has not attended any of the conferences with Colleson which began last Friday. (Continued on page seven)

Two Russian Stars

Variance Of Stalin Routine Stirs Speculation; Appearance Of Russia's Number Two Man On Speaker's Platform Is Basis For All Kinds Of Rumors

By J. M. ROBERTS, JR. Every time Stalin varies his routine, as he did yesterday by letting Andre Zhdanov occupy the rostrum usually reserved for the premier on the eve of the anniversary of the Bolshevik revolution, it stirs speculation abroad.

You can hear rumors that he is dead, that he is retiring and that his substitute has been chosen as his successor, that he is en route to the United States to confer with Truman, or that his 180-or-so odd million non-party subjects are in revolt.

A little later you are likely to hear that he was home wielding a cello spray on a sore throat like an ordinary human.

But the appearance of Zhdanov yesterday, talking like most any Moscow radio commentator who is on a "mad" against capitalism, served to remind that there are two stars in the Soviet sky which seem to be traveling converging orbits around the master's chair.

Zhdanov has been considered for six years as a fair-haired boy and because of his position as well as his flash, has been referred to as

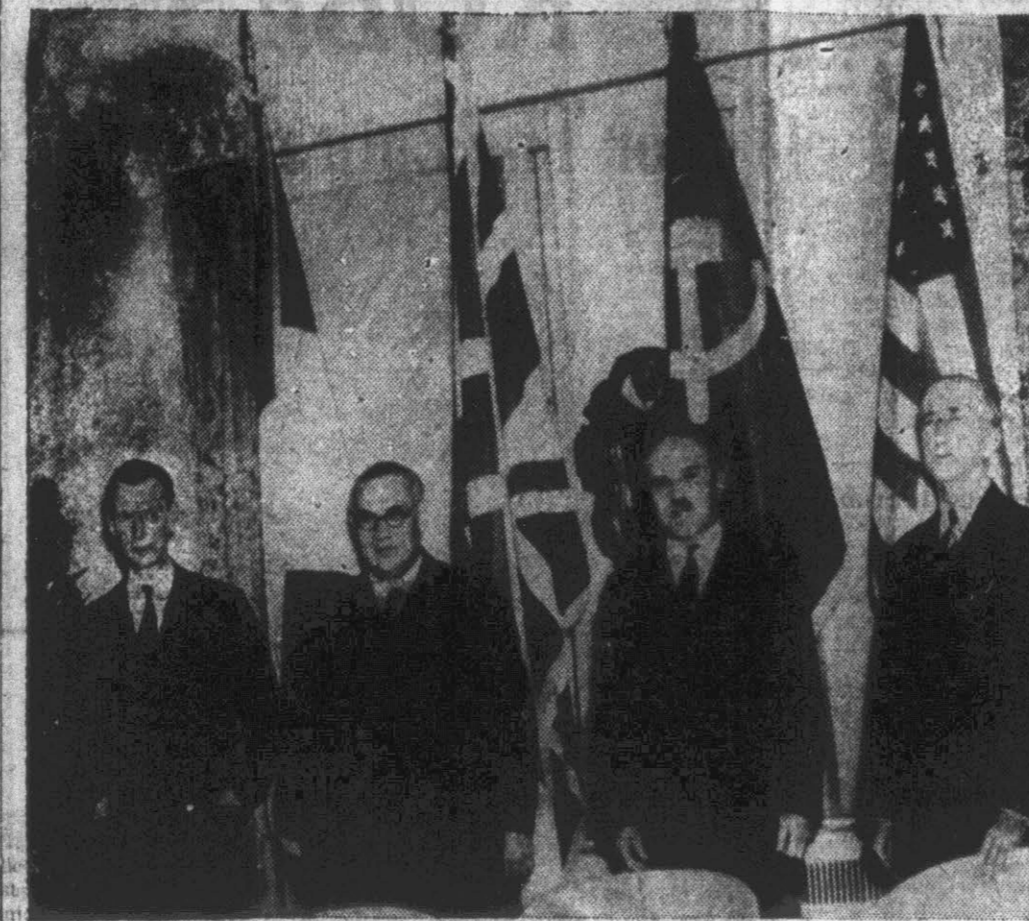
the "Gosring of the Soviet"—the No. 2 man. Starting at 16 after war service in the czar's army, Zhdanov has been climbing steadily among the Communists until now at 50, he is a member of the powerful Politbureau, secretary of the central executive committee of the party chairman of the foreign affairs commission where for years he has played a major role in nipping foreign policy, and head of the propaganda bureau.

He is a national hero as the "defender of Leningrad," and the 1939-40 war against Finland to secure the strategic position which later kept the Germans out of northern Russia was peculiarly "his" war if planning and organization. He is known as a determined nationalist looking at every problem strictly from the standpoint of what is in Russia's interest. In this respect his description is almost a carbon copy of Stalin's.

The other star among the generalissimo's younger satellites is Georgi Maximilianovich Malenkov 45, who has just been shifted from

U. S. To Reserve Rights Over Islands In Pacific

Makes Clear Intention Of Holding Sweeping Military Mandates

By MAX HARRELSON Lake Success, N. Y., Nov. 7—(AP)—The United States made it clear today that she would reserve sweeping rights, especially military, in the Japanese mandated islands which President Truman offered last night to place under United Nations trusteeship.

One delegate, who did not want to be identified, said the military rights demanded by the United States were exactly the same as she would have if she annexed the islands outright.

The U. S. terms for returning the islands—the Marshalls, Carolines and Marianas—over to the U. N. are contained in a draft agreement now being circulated among the 11 members of the Security Council and two other nations, New Zealand and the Philippines.

Disclosure of the terms gave rise to immediate speculation that Russia would almost certainly attack the proposals and might possibly veto them in the Security Council.

In the latter event, however, the islands would continue in their present status as occupied enemy territory.

The draft agreement not only reserves to the United States unrestricted rights to establish military, naval and air bases within the trust territory, but also provides that any or all of the islands may be declared closed for security reasons.

This means that the United States would be able to bar U. N. inspection of the entire area if she desired to do so.

Other sweeping provisions of the agreement: 1. The United States, as the sole administering authority, could bar the aircraft of any other nation from entering the area, which is 1,500 miles long and 800 miles wide and contains approximately 1,500 islands of various sizes.

2. The United States would reserve the right to give certain economic privileges exclusively to American nations.

3. The terms of the agreement could not be altered, amended or terminated without the consent of the United States.

Meyers Declares Strikes Endangering World Peace

New York, Nov. 7—(AP)—Eugene Meyer, president of the World Bank declared today that strikes in this country are threatening the world with economic starvation and thereby endangering the peace.

Meyer called present American labor relations "disastrous." He headed the Federal Reserve Board and the Reconstruction Finance Corporation under Republican administrations and resigned as publisher of the Washington Post last June to accept the bank's presidency.

Citing mining and factory production losses from strikes this year and stressing the potential effects of "a fresh stoppage of work threatened in the coal mines," Meyer asserted in a speech prepared for the annual meeting of the Academy of Political Science "I say emphatically that the crucial importance of continuous full production for our own welfare and for that of mankind the world over cannot be exaggerated.

President Truman Faces Task With New Congress

Seek To Quiet Fears Over Foreign Policy

Republicans Emphasize That Election Results Will Cause No Radical Changes In Foreign Relations

HIGHTOWER New York, Nov. 7—(AP)—Top flight Republican diplomats at the United Nations and the council of foreign ministers rallied to the support of established American foreign policy today in an evident effort to quiet jittery speculation about possible radical changes in this country's international relations.

Foreign delegations to both the U. N. Assembly and the Big Four council sessions took the election results with little show of concern but much of the foreign press viewed the Republican capture of Congress as marking a sharp American swing to the right and threatening new difficulties with Russia.

While the United Nations drove through another round of committee work today and the foreign ministers marked time until tomorrow in the dispute over control of strategic Trieste, Republican statements on the foreign policy situation were much discussed by diplomats here.

Senator Arthur H. Vandenberg, of Michigan, who is expected to become foreign relations chairman in the Republican-controlled Senate, said that his own reelection "means that the bipartisan foreign policy" which he has had a large share in developing over the last two years is added.

"I take it the national returns present a similar mandate. They mean that this policy will continue," John Foster Dulles, an alternate member of the United Nations delegation, said he was confident that a Republican Congress will not show our foreign policy into confusion, but rather will make it stronger and clearer, for the benefit of ourselves and the world."

These two men, with Ex-Senator Warren Austin of Vermont, chief of the United States U. N. delegation, make up the main Republican collaboration with the administration of foreign issues.

Many of the charter provisions and much of the American work on the European peace treaties by the foreign ministers reflect especially the ideas of Vandenberg and Dulles.

Suggestion That He Quit Post Not Considered; Spokesmen Say He Will Devote Efforts In Behalf Of Nation Without Regard For His Personal Interests

By ERNEST B. VOCCARO Washington, Nov. 7—(AP)—President Truman is not going to resign and has not even seriously considered the possibility. This can be reported today without qualification.

The suggestion that Mr. Truman appoint a Republican secretary of state and resign to permit the GOP to take over the presidency came from Senator Fulbright (D-Ark.)

It was echoed in some newspapers normally Democratic, but Rep. Sparkman (D-Ala.) asserted that such a step was not the thing to do.

The attitude around the White House today was that the suggestion should not be dignified by comment either from the president or any member of his staff.

It was known that Mr. Truman himself felt that to resign now after the Democrats crushing election defeat would be to run out on the job.

Moreover, the president is known to hold to the view that he should not change the American constitutional system by such a move.

Some political observers also are strongly of the opinion that the Republicans themselves would not want a Democrat to choose a president for them. Such would be the case if Mr. Truman followed the course Fulbright suggests.

There also was a question as to whom the president might submit a resignation even if he had such a thought in mind.

People in a position to know said there had been very little discussion around the White House about the future course of the administration.

Mr. Truman came back from voting in Missouri with a head cold. He spent most of yesterday resting and cancelled all engagements today except an afternoon call from Foreign Minister Molotov of Russia.

Presidential press Secretary Charles G. Ross told reporters in mid-morning that Mr. Truman will not hold a news conference this week.

As far as the election is concerned, close friends said the president is more concerned about foreign reaction to the Democratic defeat than he is about his own political future.

Declining to be quoted by name, these members of the chief executive's inner circle said he will emphasize in the two years ahead the two-party support behind the nation's foreign policy voiced by Secretary of State Byrnes. This policy (Continued on Page Eight)

Burley Belts To Open December 2

Lexington, Ky., Nov. 7—(AP)—Warehousemen have set Dec. 2 as the opening date for sales of tobacco throughout the burley belt.

Meeting here yesterday, a sales committee of the recently organized Burley Auction Warehouse Association adopted recommendations for opening the markets at that time and for operating three and one-half hours a day, five days a week.

The Christmas sales season will start Dec. 20 and end Dec. 30, with suspension of sales on New Year's Day.

Warehousemen also considered a plan for an earlier opening of markets, possibly as early as Nov. 17. It was explained that the earlier opening would prevent mid-season congestion in redrying plants.

Favor British System

Some Believe Truman Should Get Out Because Republicans Won Congressional Election; Under British Plan He Would Be Automatically Ousted

By JAMES MARLOW Washington, Nov. 7—(AP)—President Truman wouldn't be President today if Tuesday's elections had been held in Britain.

He'd automatically be out as President because his Democrats lost control of Congress to the Republicans.

And automatically he'd have a Republican President, to run in double-harness with a Republican Congress, even though the people didn't vote for a President.

Some Democrats and Democratic supporters are suggesting that Mr. Truman quit now and let a Republican be president, anyway.

Because it permits this situation—a Democratic president and a Republican Congress—many people think our form of government awkward.

They consider it far less sensitive to the wishes of the voters than Britain's parliamentary system.

There, when there's doubt whether the political party in power is doing what the people want, the people vote immediately.

Like our Congress with its Senate and House, the British Parliament has two houses: a House of Lords and a House of Commons.

The members of the House of Lords is far less important than the House of Commons, are appointed by the king. They're not elected.

The people elect the members of the House of Commons, about 630 (Continued on Page Eight)

But if, on that day when it is no longer merely a sore throat for the master, if Zhdanov clashes with the horizon-eying Malenkov for the scepter, the fur's going to fly in Russia.

(Continued From Page One) of them. The leader of the political party winning a majority of seats in Commons is appointed prime minister by the king.

The Labor Party has a majority and its leader, Clement Attlee, is prime minister. The prime minister runs the show. The king is little more than a symbol or figurehead in the government.

The Laborites, with their majority of votes, are expected to be able to push through Commons what

they want. If they fail to do so on some major issue then—

Parliament immediately is dissolved, the prime minister quits and the people vote at once on a new Parliament. If they still have faith in the Laborites, they reelect. Otherwise, they put another party in control.

If a new party took over Commons, its leader would become prime minister and Attlee would be voted out only on the House of Commons, not on the prime minister. It's different here where the people can make such a complete alteration—president and Congress—only every four years.

(Continued From Page One) has been firmly endorsed by Republican Senator Vandenberg of Michigan and former Republican Senator Warren Austin, now U. S. representative to the United Nations.

Men who talked privately with the president said that while he was visibly disappointed over the Democratic setback and the defeat of some of his warmest personal allies, he was far from down-hearted.

One intimate of the chief executive said Mr. Truman will conduct

himself without heed to his own personal political future.

A particularly close friend told reporters that Mr. Truman enters upon the new political situation without obligations to any influential pressure groups.

As this man put it, the president was convinced that the Democratic defeat could be traced to votes emanating from many elements of the nation's economy.
