

FOES VETO
DEFEATED BY
UN'S BIG FIVEMajor Powers Agree
To Restrictions On
Use; Plan New Formula

Lake Success, N. Y., Nov. 16.—(AP)—Individual members of the big five studied today a British plan aimed at softening the use of the veto in the U. N. security council after smashing small nation efforts to eliminate or modify the veto power.

The plan was submitted to the major powers by British Foreign Secretary Bevin as a basis for big five consultations on the veto that authoritative sources said probably would begin Monday.

As a result of agreement among the big five last night to hold consultations today that the general assembly's 51 nation political and security committee suspend the hot veto debate while the big five meet to try to agree on a formula that will satisfy their opponents.

Although full details of the British plan were being kept secret, authoritative sources disclosed it made these suggestions:

1. The possibility of limiting the veto to Russia, only when the negative voting country's own vital interests were concerned. If used under such a system, the British proposed that the country applying the veto explain to the council her vital interests in the matter.

2. That abstention from voting should not be considered a veto.

3. That the council should be more of a mediation and conciliation board, making every attempt to nip disputes by direct settlement and lessen the opportunity of using the veto.

4. Define more clearly exactly what is and what is not a dispute.

The United States was expected to support Britain on these points in the consultations. The U. S. has repeatedly expressed the hope that the big five would exercise more restraint in use of the veto, although it is opposed to any change of the United Nations charter at this time.

Roanoke Rapids
Store Destroyed

Roanoke Rapids, N. C., Nov. 16.—(AP)—Roanoke Rapids commissioners today have a resolution from the local junior chamber of commerce demanding more adequate fire protection, more fire equipment and more full-time personnel.

The resolution came at a meeting yesterday following a \$40,000 downtown fire in a five-and-ten cent store.

The blaze started shortly before 8 a. m., and local firemen, assisted by personnel and equipment finally brought the fire under control about three hours later.

The store, which recently completed its stock of toys and gifts for Christmas, was destroyed. It is thought that the fire began in an upstairs stockroom.

The local fire department consists of two trucks and three full-time firemen. The jaycee resolution termed the department "grossly inadequate for a town of an estimated 15,000 persons."

FROGS AND PSYCHOLOGY

Changing Empire

British Leftists' Attack On Foreign Policy Points Up
Metamorphosis Of John Bull; Britain's Leaders Recognize Danger Of War; Recognize Own Weakness

The campaign of left wingers in the British House of Commons to force the socialist government to disavow its foreign policy from that of the United States, so as to avoid what they describe as an inevitable conflict between Russia and America, gives interesting emphasis to the metamorphosis which John Bull's empire is undergoing.

This rebellion apparently received a fillip from the announcement in the king's speech from the throne at the opening of Parliament last Tuesday that conscription for the armed forces would be continued—this being the first peace time military conscription in Britain's history. Prime Minister Attlee gave point to this in his statement that developments of modern weapons made England especially vulnerable to attack. He said the

Long Deadlock In
Big Four BreakingConcessions By Molotov
Prompts Diplomats
To Guard Optimism; Russian's
Response To Trieste
Delegation Shows Effort
To Meet Allies' Conditions

New York, Nov. 16.—(AP)—Several concessions by Soviet Foreign Minister Molotov prompted big four diplomats today to make guarded assertions that the foreign ministers council will be at the point of breaking its deadlock over Trieste.

In a three-hour informal debate among the big four foreign ministers last night, Molotov showed signs, according to persons in the meeting, of making a serious effort to meet American, British and French insistence on putting Trieste police under control of the U. N. security council.

Secretary of State Byrnes and British Foreign Minister Bevin declared repeatedly that only by having a police force independent of the locally elected government could the United Nations be sure of protecting the independence of Trieste and the rights of its two nationalities—Italian and Yugoslav.

Byrnes declared the whole issue—which is the great block in the way of an Italian peace treaty—is the question of who is to hire and fire the police force.

Molotov, responding to proposals by Deputy French Foreign Minister Maurice Couve de Murville, agreed:

1. That the proposed governor of Trieste—a direct agent of the Security Council—should have the right to appoint the police chief upon the recommendation of the local council of government.

MINERS BACK
LEWIS' STANDWorkers United Behind
UMW Head
Despite Hardships

Library, Pa., Nov. 16.—(AP)—With Christmas just around the corner, John L. Lewis' coal miners in this western Pennsylvania community aren't looking forward to a strike with pleasure, but they say, if their leaders tell them their contract is void, they will quit work.

Thomas McMonagle, who at 71 is still working a regular shift in the Montour No. 10 mines, said: "I'm not much for this striking business, but I also don't believe in working without a contract."

McMonagle, who has worked in the mines since he was eight years old and has witnessed some 25 or more strikes added:

"The operators should be running the mines, not the government. Lewis was foolish in dealing with the government in the first place."

Other Montour miners also were somewhat critical of their leaders. "Lewis got a good deal and should have left well enough alone," asserted John Snook. "I hope we do not have a strike. My pocketbook can't stand it."

"My house can't stand it, either," said a companion, George Young. "I'm having a tough time getting it built as it is. A strike would make it worse."

James Sherer said "what with the way the cost of living is going up" there's nothing else for a working man to do but try to get more money.

A veteran worker at nearby overdale No. 8 mine probably expressed the feelings of his fellow workers most succinctly.

"Lewis is the boss. We'll do what he says regardless of our personal feelings—but it will be a tough Christmas."

Romanian Voters
Said Unhindered

Bucharest, Nov. 15.—(Delayed)—(AP)—Teohari Georgescu, Romania's Communist minister of the interior, said tonight propaganda and the press had been unhindered in the campaign for next Tuesday's parliamentary election and the election itself would be free.

The 38-year-old official, at a conference for foreign newsmen, was questioned as to whether all candidates had been given equal time on the radio. He said he had not been approached on the subject since he was minister of the interior.

(The United States and Britain recognized the Romanian government last Feb. 5 on condition that free elections would be held.)

Navy Surplus Blood Plasma Is
Recovered From Chinese Buyer

Shanghai, Nov. 16.—(AP)—U. S. officials recovered today most of the 3,500 cases of American blood plasma recently sold inadvertently to a Chinese concern. The plasma at \$25 a pint which Chinese readily paid for it, would have retailed for \$1,050,000.

A tip from two Associated Press correspondents led directly to the recovery of 2,000 cases in one warehouse and indirectly to the discovery of several hundred additional cases in a second. American officials estimated the two lots represented the bulk of the plasma included in the recent sale of uninvigorated Navy surplus medical stock at Okinawa.

The Navy shore patrol placed guards over both stocks of plasma and official of the federal liquidation commission conferred with U. S. Consul General Monnett B. Davis on how to obtain a release order from Chinese authorities. The plasma eventually will be shipped to the United States for distribution by the Red Cross.

Two thousand cases of plasma were discovered in the commercial express transportation warehouse. Hundreds more cases were found by FLC officials in the former international settlement on a tip obtained at the first warehouse.

Donald B. Davis, FLC director in Shanghai, said the plasma was included in the uninvigorated sale of 10,000 tons of medical supplies to a Chinese purchaser at \$165 a ton. Each case of plasma contained 12 packages of 500 ccs each.

Discovery of the 2,000 cases was

made by Fred Hampson, Shanghai bureau chief of the Associated Press and Spencer Moosa, AP correspondent here, on a tip that trucks of a Chinese concern were preparing to load the plasma, then notified FLC Red Cross and U. S. Navy officials.

When Donald Davis and other FLC officials arrived at the warehouse, the trucks sped away, empty. Davis photographed them in flight. He said that had they succeeded in carrying away the plasma, it probably never could have been recovered.

Early in October, the original Chinese purchaser, Powell Knaoog promised to recover the plasma but FLC officials said he had not. Meantime, the plasma continued to find its way into the retail market.

Syndicate Finds
Rich Gold Stream

Sydney, Nov. 16.—(AP)—The Sydney Sun said today that a syndicate of 11 miners, mostly Italians, had discovered a "phenomenal" gold pocket in the rich Kalgoolie fields of western Australia.

The Sun's dispatch said the deposit, found at a depth of 120 feet on mountain vein lease, was expected to yield 24,500 ounces of gold. After six tons of rock had been broken out, the report said, "gleaming seams of gold one inch thick" still showed in the face of the mine.

Babson Discusses Election

Babson Park, Mass., Nov. 16.—Everyone who is interested in the welfare of the country—whether Republican or Democrat—should be happy about last week's election. This does not mean that the Republicans are any better men and women than are the Democrats. Both parties have rendered useful and patriotic services.

Importance of a Change
The simple fact is that a change is always helpful after a certain number of years. The Republican party, owing to its strong hold on the people, abused its trust. A reaction was inevitable in 1932. Presidents do not make conditions, but conditions make presidents. There never was a better man than Herbert Hoover; but conditions defeated him. Even if Franklin D. Roosevelt and his friends had campaigned for Mr. Hoover, he would have been defeated just the same.

The Democratic Administration rendered valuable service. It gave Washington a house-cleaning which it greatly needed. Moreover, the "New Deal" had much in its favor and for many years it was only a fair deal. The nation owes a lot to the Democrats for their courage in giving prompt aid to England and in the waging of the war. The Roosevelt Administration was very wasteful; but a Republican Administration might have been too late in getting into the conflict and too economical when waging the war.

What of the Future?
All will not be rosy for the new Republican congress. The people demand a revision of the Wagner Act and legislation whereby labor must be subject to the anti-trust laws. Whether the Republican congress will have the courage to enact such legislation—especially over the President's veto if necessary—is uncertain. It is also unknown now as to whether labor will get into a "cyclone cellar" for the next two years, or will fight more bitterly than ever before.

Business Outlook
If labor now behaves half way decently, we ought to have a couple of more years of good business. Furthermore, I should be in the interests of the Democratic Party to have good business in 1948. On the other hand, labor leaders could easily throw a monkey wrench into the situation. If so, last week, the Republican Party may have been given a "headache" instead of a "victory." Krug Considers
Plea To MinersTEACHERS OK
PROPOSAL OF
PAY INCREASEConvention Endorses
Administration Of
N.C.E.A. Officials

Members of the Northeastern District Teachers Association last night approved unanimously an endorsement of the administrations of Charles W. Phillips of Greensboro, N. C. C. A. president, and Claude Grigg of Albemarle, vice president and legislative committee chairman. The motion followed talks by Phillips, Grigg and Paul A. Reid all of whom discussed proposed legislation for salary increases for teachers.

Also passed was a motion made by Julius H. Rose, superintendent of the Greenville city schools that the NCEA ask the legislature of 1947 to earmark a certain portion of the surplus existing in the state treasury for the purpose of guaranteeing the payment during the next biennium of the salaries of teachers.

C. W. Phillips outlined plans and projects of the NCEA and Claude Grigg explained the legislative program of the state teachers' organization. The program discussed advocates a minimum twenty percent overall increase in teachers salaries, an added increment of five dollars per month for the 10,500 teachers holding A certificates and having ten years of experience and an added increment of similar amount for the more than 650 teachers holding graduate certificates with eleven years experience. The program likewise includes the recommendation that the twenty percent overall increase be retroactive as of January 1, 1947 with the restoration of the right to ask additional increases should the cost of living increase.

Twenty six divisional and departmental meetings were held in the afternoon. The divisions of classroom teachers, superintendents and united principals held dinner meetings. Speakers at these meetings included Modile Causey, Paul A. Reid and Dr. Guy B. Phillips.

On the eastern belt quality was lower, only low lemon cutters escaping decline of \$1 to \$4. Robersonville closed sales yesterday and Kingston will close Nov. 22.

On the middle belt smoking leaf and cutters dropped \$1 to \$2, lugs were steady and red and green nondescript jumped \$3 to \$4.50.

Strong Attitude Taken By Government In Negotiations
Appears To End Period Of Useless Apprehension;
Questions And Answers On Possible Action

Washington, Nov. 16.—(AP)—John L. Lewis is asking for it—a showdown—and that seems to be what he's going to get.

Up to this point—in this case—the government has been very tough with Lewis, probably tougher than he dreamed.

He started it. He said he wanted to re-open the soft coal mining contract he's had with the government since last May. He wants to make changes.

Interior Secretary Krug, who signed the contract with him, says the contract stands as it is and can't be re-opened.

Krug is backed up by Attorney General Clark who says the contract can't be re-opened, that it stands while the government holds the mines.

May Take To Radio
To Ask For Continued
Coal Production;
Gov't Seeks
Action To Prevent
Stoppage; Walkout
Threat To All Labor;
Nation Has
Low Fuel Supply

Washington, Nov. 16.—(AP)—The administration, in a toe-to-toe showdown fight with defiant John L. Lewis, sought grimly today to hold 400,000 soft-coal miners to a government contract, the Attorney General says in binding.

No official was telling just what will be done if Lewis persists in his contention that he can and will terminate the contract next Wednesday midnight, halting production at the 3,300 government-operated mines.

But there was talk that for a starter Secretary of the Interior Krug may take to the radio, tell the miners their chief's maneuver has no legal justification and ask them to keep on mining coal.

Although represented as determined not to put Lewis in the role of the "martyr" those concerned with the fuel crisis spoke of:

(1) Possible action under the Smith-Connally 2Act, which provides a year in prison and a \$5,000 fine for inciting a strike against the government.

(2) A special session of the jam-packed Congress to enact new laws forbidding strikes in so vital an industry as coal mining.

The Lewis position, however, is that there simply will be no valid contract in existence after the termination time he has set—and the United Mine Workers of America work without a contract.

Here he clashes head-on with Attorney General Clark, who advised Secretary of the Interior Krug yesterday the contract is binding for as long as the government runs the mines.

Underlining the gravity of the situation, the Solid Fuels Administration said the nation has only a 37-day supply of fuel on hand compared with the 42-day stock just before last spring's two-month walkout.

A proposal by Krug that Lewis negotiate with the mine operators for 60 days for a contract under which the diggings go back to private operation, meanwhile keeping the miners on their jobs, fell on deaf ears.

So did two appeals for him to reconsider—the first by President Truman in a public statement emphasizing "the desire of 140,000,000 Americans for industrial peace," and the second by Krug in a formal letter to Lewis.

K. C. Adams, editor of the UMW Journal, charged that "forces of intrigue" are seeking to stall "until such a time and under such conditions as would stage a blowup during the first days of the new Congress."

Lesnevich To Meet
Fox In Title Match

New York, Nov. 16.—(AP)—World light-heavyweight champion Gus Lesnevich will make the first United States defense of his crown in five years Feb. 28 when he meets Billy Fox, the Philadelphia flattener, in Madison Square Garden.

The Cliffsdale Park, N. J., champ and the Quaker City Negro, who has piled up 41 straight knockouts in his professional career, were signed yesterday to tangle February 21 in the Garden.

WAYS OF LEARNING

A highly educated and influential Chinese was describing the way he had been educated. Today, China is struggling to establish a modern educational system. Forty or fifty years ago, however, all Chinese boys who were educated at all were trained solely in the ethical teachings of Confucius. Six-year old children were compelled to memorize scores and hundreds of maxims. Whereas the Chinese child today has a primer very much like the primer used in our own public schools, the Chinese child of primary age was, at the turn of the century, learning to say by rote things far beyond his childish comprehension.

Everyone, including the more enlightened Chinese, feels that a great advance was made when the old method was dropped, but many middle-aged Chinese feel that they got something out of the old system which the little Chinese boy and girl do not get out of the new. Today the children of China know much more than the children of China did fifty years ago. In past times a child knew little, but when he grew to manhood he understood much. In childhood he was given something the meaning of which would be revealed to him in later years and which would build something into his life decidedly worth while.

No one wants to go back to the old method, but we need to appreciate that modern methods of education, with all their advantages, are deficient in certain respects and that the old systems in all parts of the world had, with all their faults, certain decided advantages which we may be missing.

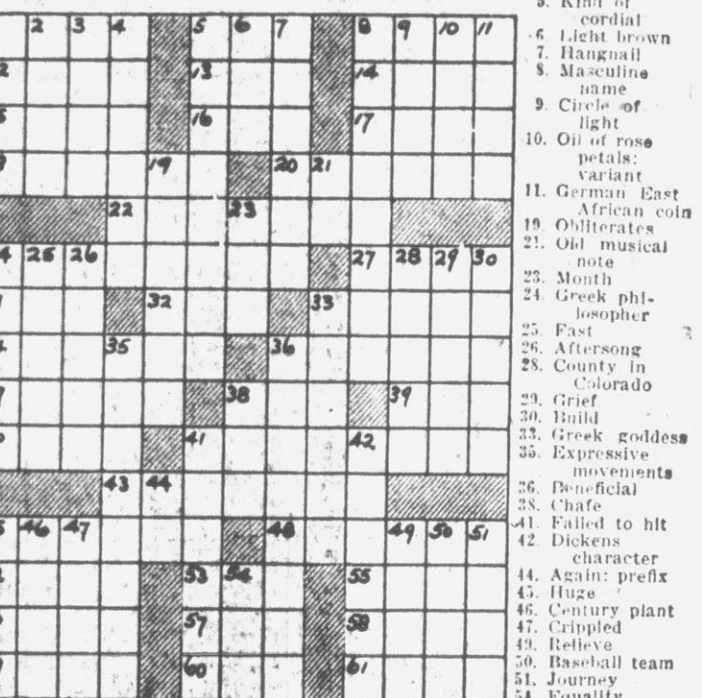

contract, Lewis says his miners will consider the contract ended next Wednesday, Nov. 20.

"This certainly seems to mean a strike Nov. 20. But Lewis doesn't say his men strike. He says they can't work without a contract."

President Truman steps in. He says Krug's 63-day offer is good. He tells Lewis to think twice before taking action.

There, at the moment, the situation stands; the walkout apparently will be complete next Wednesday.

Can the government prevent the walkout by injunction?

Probably not. There's a federal law—the Norris-LaGuardia Act—which makes it practically impossible for a federal court to issue an injunction to prevent a strike.

Is there any court action the government could take?

It might be able to get a court order telling Lewis not to end his contract with the government next Wednesday.

Would this do any good?

Probably not. Lewis already has said the contract ends next Wednesday. The miners take their cue from Lewis. If he stayed quiet and the miners walked out, such a court order might not mean much.

Isn't there a penalty in the Smith-Connally (the War Disputes) Act for inducing or causing strikes in property seized by the government?

Yes. But this act didn't accomplish much even during the war. A few leaders might be jailed in a strike but the government could naturally expect to take action against thousands of workers who stayed away from their jobs. Could the President do anything to stop a mine strike?

He would call a special session of Congress to pass a special law. What kind?

Time would have to show that. It could ask for long non-strikes in essential industries, like coal, and compelling unions and management to arbitrate, which means letting someone selected by themselves or the government decide who was right.

Would Congress which refused to pass a draft-strikers law asked by Mr. Truman in the railroad case last spring—pass a special law for Mr. Truman if he called a special session?

Maybe. That special session would be dominated by Democrats. (The new Republican Congress doesn't take over till Jan. 3). But the Democrats, who refused to pass restrictive legislation after last year's strikes, saw the voters give Republican control of Congress in the Nov. 5 elections. This Congress

erica was inflamed with war fever. Just in passing we might remark that this sounds very much like the language we have been hearing from another great European capital recently.

Of course strange ideas about America still prevail in some quarters of the British Isles. I've even encountered people who believe that savage Indians still roam the plains close to Chicago. However, the average Briton is better informed about the U. S. A. than that. And he knows that we don't wage war with anybody, though we hope to have a friend—meaning America—put up a fight if it is necessary.

So far as John Bull is concerned, his position is such that it's good to have a friend—meaning America—but his policy is of preparedness and his foreign relations aren't inspired by any war fever in the U. S. His policies arise from two pressing personal situations: (1) The post-war realignment of the European spheres of influence has created a definite threat to peace; (2) The British Empire itself is undergoing a mighty change which involves an alteration in political relationships and an upheaval in its global defenses.

No, it isn't America's war fever that impels John Bull to powder dry. He has troubles of his own and finds it very comforting to be on close terms with Uncle Sam.

A letter from AAUW headquarters in Washington stating that free shipment of educational supplies will be provided by UNRRA, during the month of November, only, for Greece, Italy, Albania, Yugoslavia, Austria, Hungary, Czechoslovakia, Poland, Byelo-Russia, Ukraine, and displaced persons. Between December 15 and March 15, shipments will be made to China, Ethiopia and Korea.

"The task of educational reconstruction in the war devastated countries is one of tremendous urgency and appalling difficulty," wrote Dr. Kathryn McHale, AAUW general director. "Under its charter, UNRRA has been barred from undertaking educational activities, while UNESCO is not set up as a rehabilitation agency. To help bridge the gap, the Commission for Educational Reconstruction was organized last spring to stimulate and coordinate the efforts of leading American educational organizations in meeting the very real emergency confronting education in Europe and the Far East. The American Association of University Women is a member of this Commission."

The local branch of the AAUW is participating in the nation-wide effort to get educational supplies together in time to take advantage of the free shipments by UNRRA this month. Contributions of pencils, slates, tablets, and other basic supplies are being received not only from AAUW members but from others interested in rebuilding, as quickly as possible, the educational facilities of the world.
