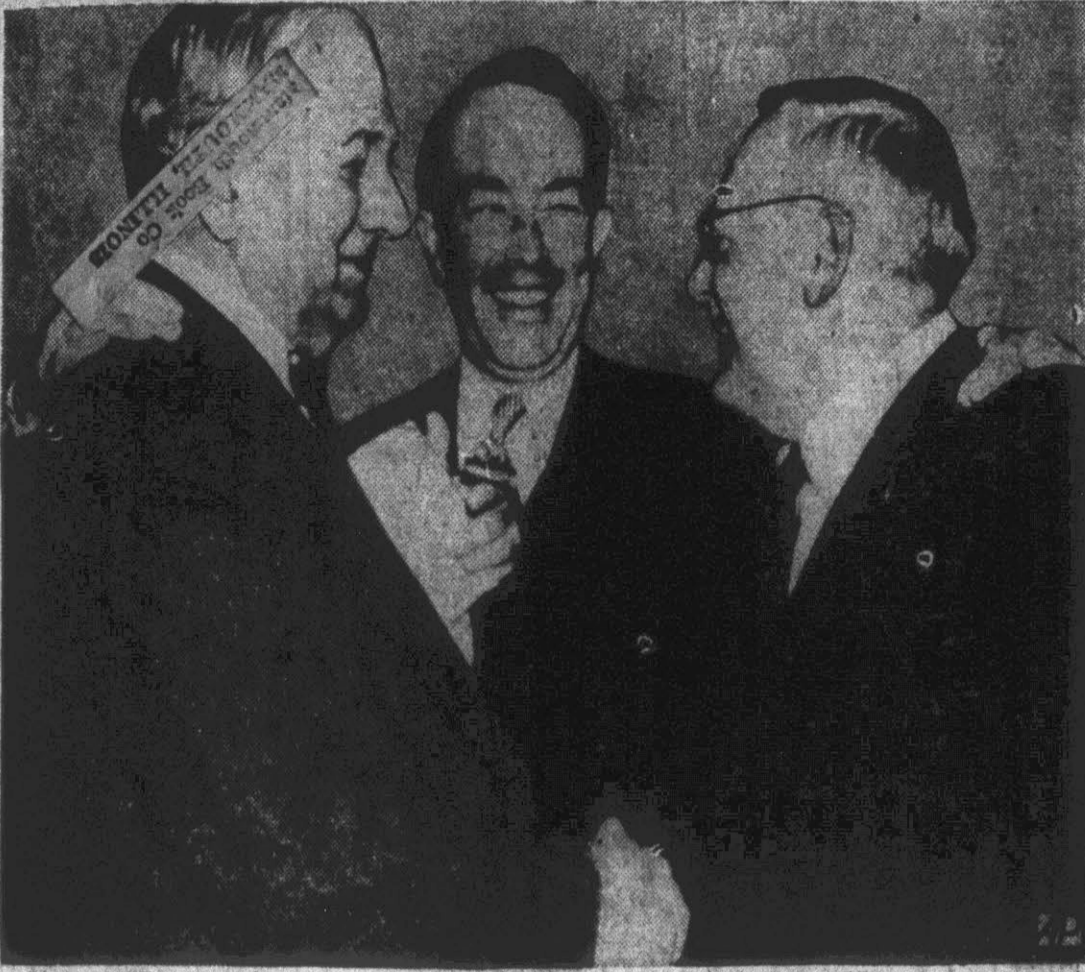

Four-Power Internationalization Plan Of Port City Appears To Be Going Through; Yugoslavia Has Real Claim On Area; Russia's Major Concession

American Plan To Be Used As Basis For Discussion; Russian Says Veto Will Not Apply To Any System Of Controls; Clears Way For UN Action

Lake Success, N. Y., Dec. 4.—(AP)—Soviet Foreign Minister, Molotov, in a conciliatory move agreed today to accept United States arms reduction proposals as a basis for discussion and declared that the big power veto would not apply to any system of controls and inspections in connection with arms limitations.

His statement was hailed immediately by British Delegate Sir Hartley Shawcross as an important concession. Australian delegate Paul Hasluck said the new Soviet stand opened the way for immediate United Nations action.

Molotov told the 54-nation political committee of the U. N. assembly that Russia was ready to withdraw her own proposals in favor of the American plan, but that Russia would press for certain amendments.

Freight Embargo Is Big Blow To Industrialists

Widespread Factory Shutdowns With Consequent Unemployment For Thousands Now Working Appears In Prospect

Washington, Dec. 4.—(AP)—A government order holding railroad freight to the most vital needs struck a staggering blow today to industries struggling to maintain operations despite the coal strike.

Officials of the Office of Defense Transportation estimated the embargo action would reduce freight and express shipments 50 per cent.

Effects Coal Crisis Stagger All America

Unemployment Totals May Reach Levels In Midst Of Prosperity; Miner Indicates No Return To Work

Pittsburgh, Dec. 4.—(AP)—Effects of the two-week-old coal stoppage cut deeper into the life of the nation today as a fuel saving embargo on railroad freight shipments heralded unemployment totals that may reach depression-year levels.

Simultaneous with the freight embargo, set for 12:01 a. m. Friday, the country's automobile industry will come to a virtual halt.

Housing, one of the most pressing post-war problems, is dealt a severe setback by the embargo. The West Coast Lumbermen's Association said the Pacific Northwest's 1,300 sawmills that produce 125,000,000 board feet of desperately needed lumber a week, will begin closing down at once because they have no storage space.

Meanwhile, in Uniontown, Pa., a grizzled mine veteran scolded miners' reaction to word that John L. Lewis and the United Mine Workers had been found guilty of contempt of court.

UMW Is Fined \$3,500,000; Lewis Fined \$10,000 But Escapes Jail Sentence; Penalty Brings Roar Of Protest From UMW Chief-tain And Attorneys; Lewis Accuses Gov't Counsel Of Lying To Court

Washington, Dec. 4.—(AP)—Striking soft coal miners were fined \$3,500,000 and John L. Lewis \$10,000 personally today for contempt of court in ignoring an order to observe their government contract.

The fines were imposed by Federal Judge T. Alan Goldsborough after an uproarious court session in which union lawyers assailed the government's recommendations that the miners be fined \$250,000 a day for the 14 days of the walkout.

Washington, Dec. 4.—(AP)—Prospective House fights over reorganization and the Democratic leadership appeared to have dissolved today in a new harmony move on Capitol Hill.

Convicts Escape In Stolen Truck

Raleigh, N. C., Dec. 4.—(AP)—Three long-term white convicts today seized a highway commission truck, kidnapped its driver and made their getaway from the quarry in which they were working near Stokesdale in Guilford County, Prison Director Clyde R. Robinson reported.

Robinson said that the truck drove into the quarry and that the three prisoners began loading it. Suddenly they jumped into the truck cab, overpowered the driver and drove off.

Difficulties In Satellite Pacts

New York, Dec. 4.—(AP)—Diplomatic informants said today that the signing of axis satellite peace treaties, now being completed here by the council of foreign ministers, almost certainly would be delayed until early next year because of mechanical problems involved in printing final official texts.

The Big Four hope to wind up their work on the pacts for Italy, Bulgaria, Hungary, Rumania and Finland in a few days and come to grips before the weekend with the task of outlining preliminary problems involved in a German settlement.

Jackson, Miss., Dec. 4.—(AP)—Senate investigators sought official versions today of violence which Negroes said marked last July's Mississippi democratic primary in which Senator Theo G. Bilbo was renominated.

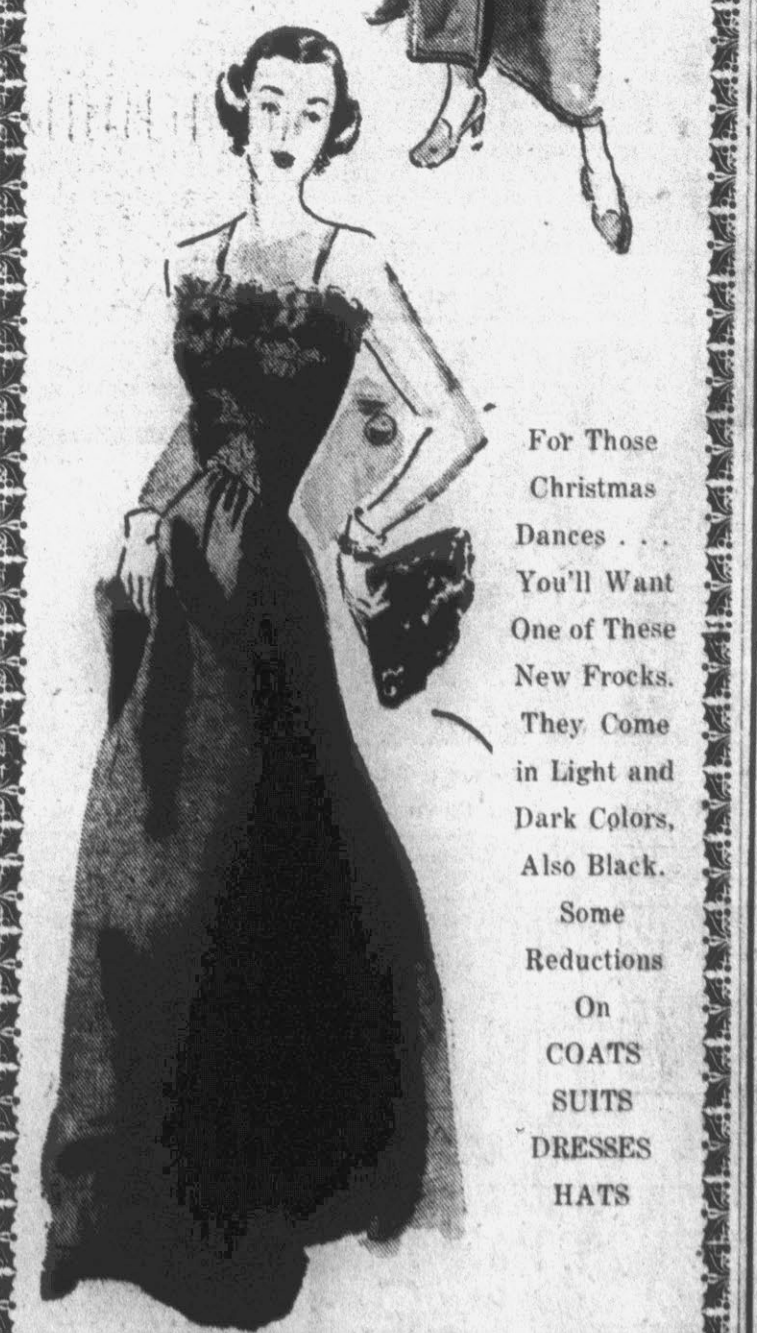
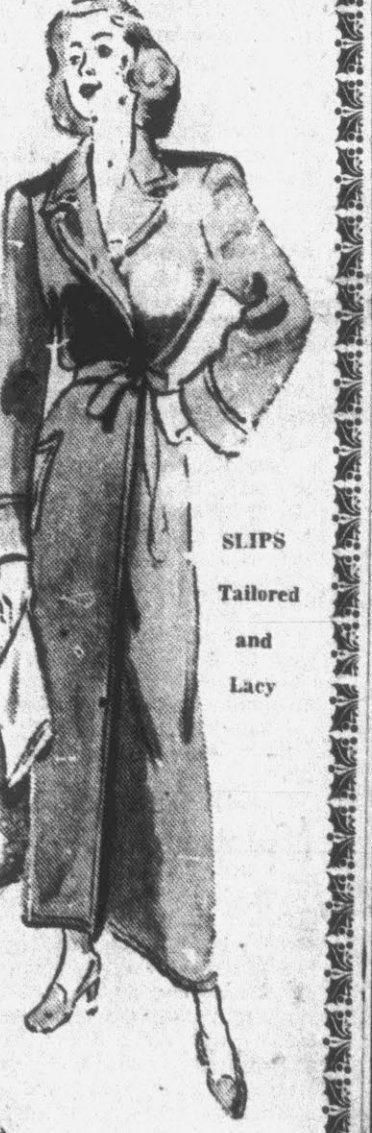

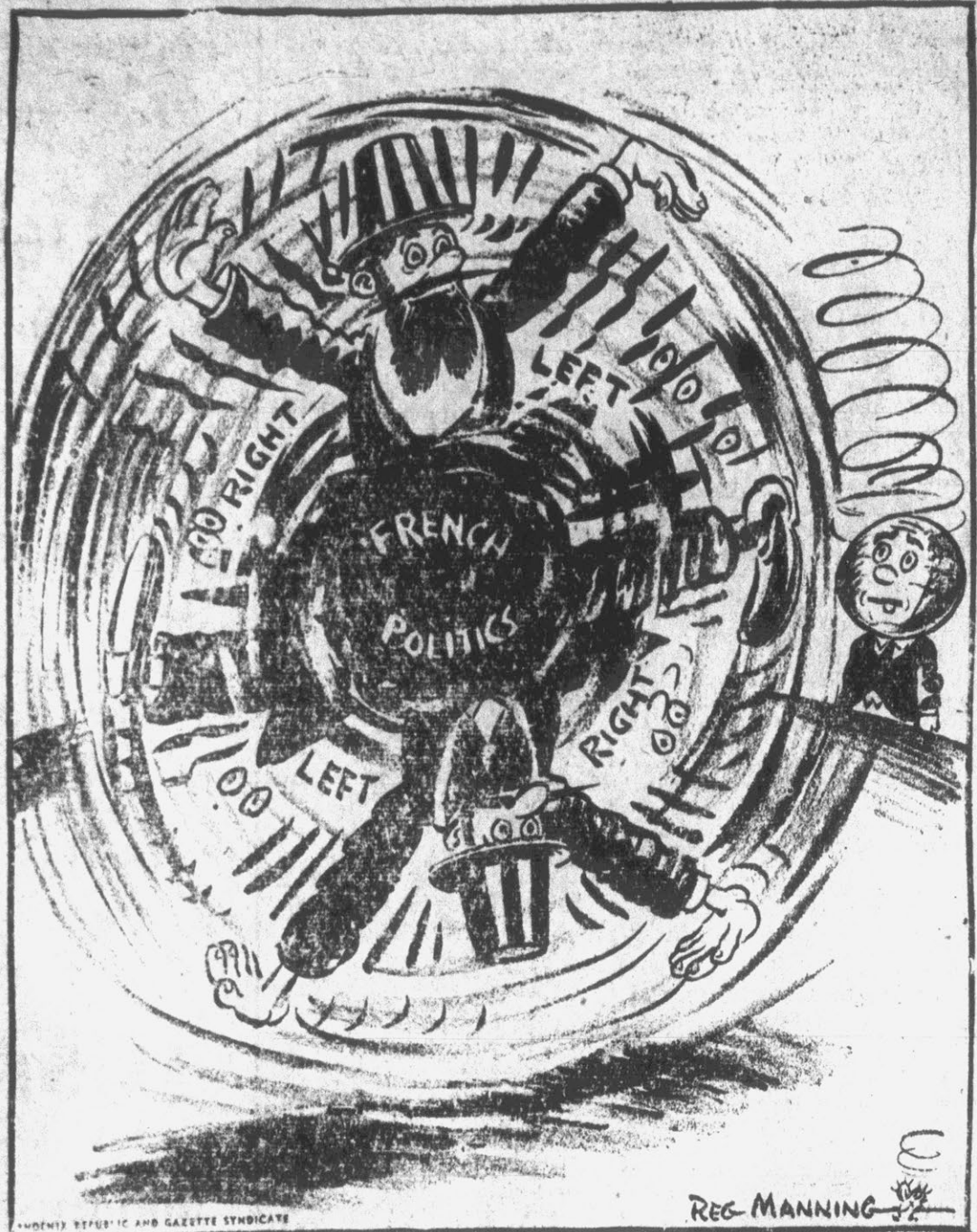

DON'T IDEALIZE THE PAST

It is always an unprofitable experience to have our idols pulled off their pedestals and broken into pieces before our eyes. Farthest fields are always present, and for that reason we look back on certain heroic periods of the past and tell ourselves that the people who lived in those days were marvelous beyond compare. Especially in these days of industrial strife, party politics, and widespread international bitterness, we look back on the colonial period in our own country and ask ourselves why we cannot have men today the equal of the great figures who dominated those days.

As a matter of fact, human beings are human beings, no matter in what age they live. A lot of our Godly forebears had no compunction whatsoever about employing slave hunters to capture African natives, as they would capture animals, crowd them into slave ships, and bring them into this country. During the 18th century the French and English were trying incessantly to assist the aid of the Indians. They had no conscience against sending these blood-thirsty savages against homesteads and settlements for the purpose of wiping them out entirely. Tory and Colonial, during the Revolutionary War, used savages in their strife against each other. Today in the land of missionary work are sometimes sacrificed for the immediate financial benefit of the strong.

The heart of man is desperately wicked—and we should never forget it.

CAPITAL EXPECTS DAR WILL SAY IT WITH CONGRESS

Washington—Local florists, who do a pretty good business anyway, are already rubbing their hands over the take when the Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR) convene their 56th congress here next May.

The congress, the first to be held in the DAR's own Constitution Hall since 1941, is expected to draw the largest delegation in its history. It will be national DAR election year, and all signs point to a red hot campaign and election. No estimates have ever been made of the money spent on flowers at DAR congress, but it will run into thousands of dollars. Officers, speakers and candidates for office often receive as many as a dozen corsages each and often wear as many as three at a time.

During the war, bouquets were cut to a minimum. At the Chicago convention in 1942, Mrs. Henry M. Robert Jr. of Annapolis, Md., who was honorary president general, established the patriotic custom of wearing a corsage with buds fashioned of war stamps of various denominations.

However, at the congress last May at Atlantic City flowers blossomed on shoulders and bosoms in abundance.

The return of the DAR to their own hall will be marked with all the traditional ceremony and pageantry of the annual congress. It also means the usual display of stunning gowns, pages in shimmering white, the professional with flag and fervent patriotic speeches.

Next May will end the administration of Mrs. Julius Y. Talmadge of Athens, Ga., as president general. She was elected at the 1944 congress in New York City.

Two candidates for 1947 are already in the field with complete lists of candidates for other national offices. One candidate is Mrs. Stanley Thorpe Manlove of Newburgh, N. Y., at present the society's recording secretary general.

The other candidate is Mrs. John Logan Marshall of Clemson College, S. C., at present first vice president general.

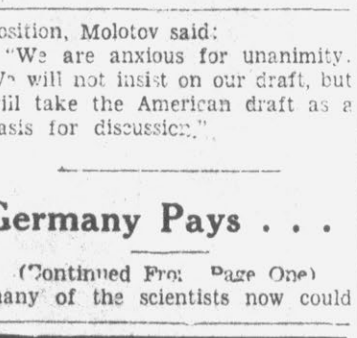

Mike Jacobs III After Collapse

New York, Dec. 4—(AP)—Michael Straus (Mike) Jacobs, the nation's foremost boxing promoter for the past decade, was gravely ill at St. Clare's hospital today after collapsing from a cerebral hemorrhage two blocks from Madison Square Garden.

Dr. Vincent Nardiello, Jacobs' personal physician and a member of the State Athletic Commission's medical staff, expressed belief that if the 66-year-old promoter showed improvement within 36 hours of his collapse late yesterday "he'll make the grade."

Jacobs, famed as the proprietor of \$1,000,000-a-year break-busting business, was reported in a semi-conscious condition during the night, but Dr. Nardiello said early today:

"He is resting as comfortably as possible now. His blood pressure has come down. His pulse is better and he can swallow again. These can be counted as encouraging signs. But he is in a grave condition, and it is now entirely a matter of waiting."

Bramham To Act As "Consultant"

Los Angeles, Dec. 4—(AP)—Forty or more presidents of minor league clubs have adopted a resolution accepting the retirement of President William G. Bramham, but are agreed on keeping the czar of little league baseball as a virtual president emeritus.

The matter, an important one in the annual major-minor meeting here, reached a semi-climax late last night, and before the minors conclude their sessions on the floor this week the entire organization will act on the recommendation of the president's steering committee.

"We want Judge Bramham continued as a consultant, and a very learned one, for the minor leagues," said Tom Richardson of the Eastern League, who presided at the presidents' banquet after Bramham retired from the closed session.

Lake Success, N. Y., Dec. 4—(AP)—A three-way fight between backers of New York, Philadelphia and San Francisco as sites for permanent headquarters of the United Nations appeared to be shaping up today, with Russia the leader of a stay-in-New York movement and Britain spearheading the drive for Philadelphia.

San Francisco was expected to draw its strongest support from Australia and China but Russia suggested, in an annex to a U. N. site sub-committee report last night, that the Presidio at San Francisco be eliminated as a recommended site. The Soviet minority report recommended adoption of the present Flushing Meadows site in New York.

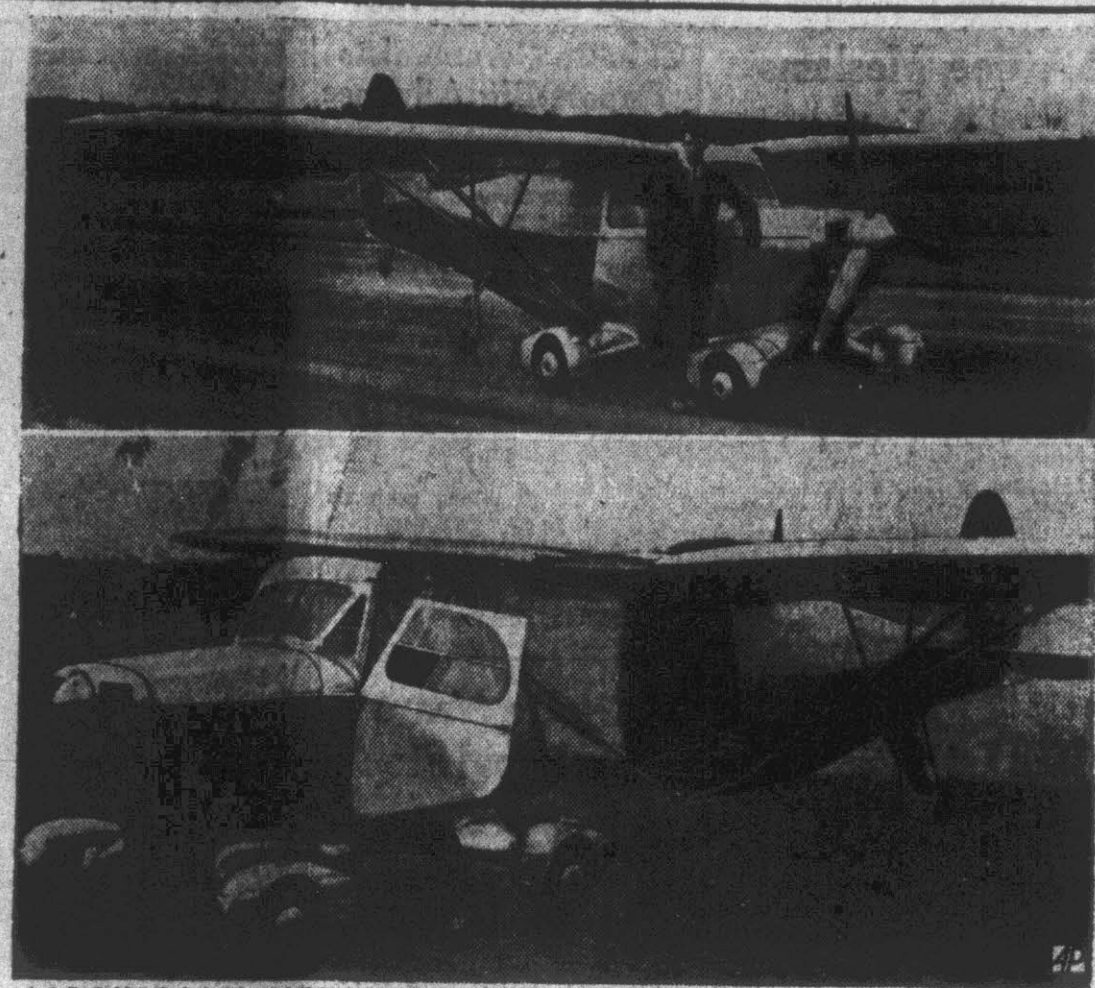

GARDNER NOW IS DIPLOMAT

Former N. C. Governor New Ambassador To Great Britain

Washington, Dec. 4—(AP)—One of the nation's highest diplomatic posts has been filled by the appointment of O. Max Gardner, undersecretary of the treasury, as ambassador to Great Britain.

News of the appointment of the former North Carolina governor was released at yesterday's White House press conference by President Truman who said that Gardner would take up his new duties at the Court of St. James as soon as possible.

Mr. Truman said Gardner's successor in the Treasury Department has not yet been selected.

Commenting on reports last night, Gardner said he would not leave until he was confirmed by the Senate "unless there is some reason I know nothing about now."

Gardner will succeed W. Averell Harriman, who was brought back

from London this fall to become Secretary of Commerce.

Appointment of Gardner, rumored in high government circles for some time, drew expressions of approval from two men who had followed him into the North Carolina governorship.

In Raleigh, J. C. B. Ehringhaus who succeeded him in January, 1933 said he was "very proud of the fact that recognition has come to him and to North Carolina. He has richly earned this high reward—and any others which may come to him." And in Shelby, Senator Clyde R. Hoey predicted a "brilliant career" for Gardner in his new post, adding that "this position will furnish the opportunity for Governor Gardner to give play to his usual abilities in dealing with our international problems."

In Virginia, Gov. William M. Tuck declaring the coal strike had precipitated a "state of emergency," created a state council of defense which was authorized to purchase coal from the operators or mines not in possession of the Federal Government and to lease and operate such mines.

Attlee, Moslems In Conference

London, Dec. 4—(AP)—Prime Minister Attlee conferred today with Moslem leaders Mahomed Ali Jinnah and Liaquat Ali Khan in an effort to break the Moslem-Congress party deadlock in India and the result apparently was not encouraging.

The Indians, an informed source said told the prime minister that the 93,000,000 Moslems never would agree unreservedly to the complete sacrifice of their political and religious identity which they believe is involved in Britain's program for Indian independence.

Attlee was said to have replied that, unless the Moslems played their part in achieving political unity in India, not only their own aims but the future peace of the subcontinent, if not of the world would be threatened by fratricidal strife.

Chinese Communists Report Big Advance

Peiping, Dec. 4—(AP)—Chinese Communist forces in sweeping new gains in North China were reported moving swiftly on Yangku, capital of coal-rich Shansi Province, and the important city of Fenyang, 60 miles to the south.

In Manchuria the position of Changchun, the capital, became more precarious with Communist assaults within a 30-mile arc north and east of the city. Large Communist concentrations were reported east of Changchun.

Communists withdrawing southward on the Kwantung peninsula before Gen. Tu Li-ming's army were reported 17 to 20 miles from Dairen, which Government troops are expected to take over from the Soviets shortly.

Charlotte Nears End Coal Stocks

Charlotte, N. C., Dec. 4—(AP)—Charlotte will be a coalless city by Saturday, except for what remains in the bins of individual consumers, local coal distributors have predicted.

M. Cliff Howard, a dealer whose statement is typical, said yesterday: "The town is out of coal to all practical purposes. If the dealers went to work and filled orders on hand right now there would not be a pound of coal left in Charlotte."

Wyatt To Step Out, Ends Feuds

Washington, Dec. 4—(AP)—House Expenditure Control Committee reported today that the end of some bitter feuds within the administration but left unsettled many questions of the "housekeeping" program's future.

Friends said Wyatt decided to step out rather than accept a compromise in his demands for fuller authority to push the program on the lines he declares are necessary. His resignation has not been announced officially, but an official in close touch with the White House said it probably would be by tomorrow.

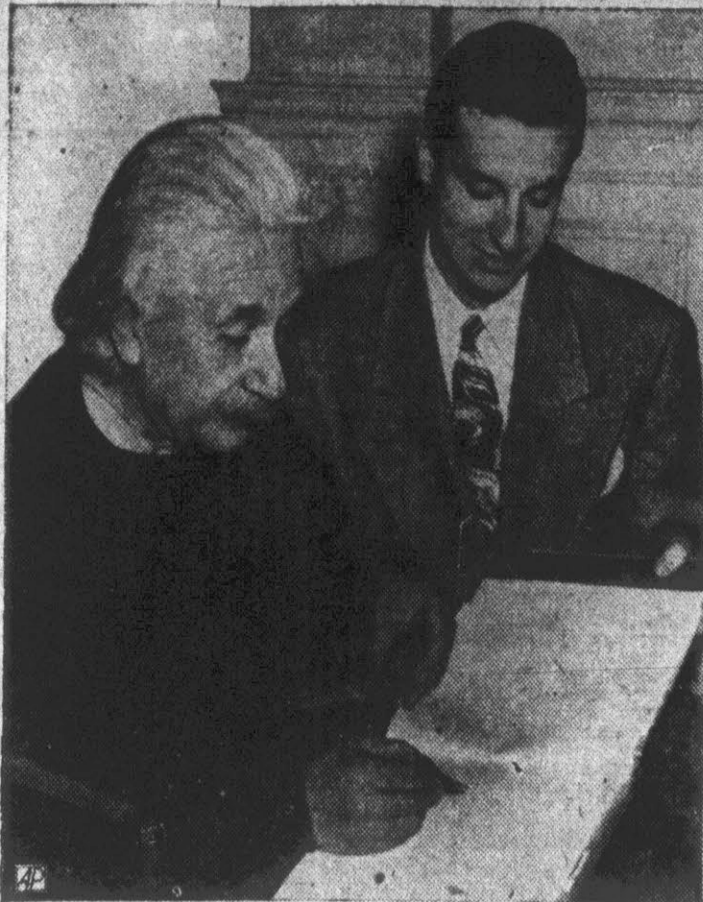

TRUMAN PLANS STRONG NOTE

Message To GOP Controlled Congress Seeks Cooperation

Washington, Dec. 4—(AP)—President Truman's promise to send the strongest possible legislative message to the new GOP-controlled Congress brought predictions from Capitol Hill friends today that fundamental changes in the labor laws will be near the top of his proposals.

Mr. Truman used the description in telling a news conference yesterday about the state of the union message he plans to send the legislators in January. He said it will deal with labor and other topics so that he and the Republicans can cooperate and get something done.

His language, in the absence of more detail, left legislators somewhat up in the air as to the general tack Mr. Truman may take.

Some thought that by a strong message the President meant he would revive many of the New Deal proposals he has espoused in the past.

But others said that if Mr. Truman hopes to obtain any sort of cooperation with the Republicans—an objective he has mentioned before—he could not hope to get it that way. As a result this group looked for a more conservative trend in the message.

Oakland, Calif., Dec. 4—(AP)—In the face of a general strike that tied up the city, the Oakland City Council today declared a state of emergency and placed full police and fire power in the hands of the mayor.

There were indications that Mayor Herbert L. Beach was contemplating a "get tough" program.

He declared late yesterday, 12 hours after an AFL walkout had paralyzed the metropolitan area of a million persons, that "the city of Oakland is not going back to the jungle." He asked the city council to take today's emergency action because "no community can exist in anarchy."

New York, Dec. 4—(AP)—A 41-year old mail carrier, father of four children, died yesterday after being struck by the body of a woman who plunged to her death from the top of a 15-story apartment building.

The carrier, Alexander Cook, was returning to his postoffice after completing his route when he was struck. He died in a hospital about an hour later.

The woman, Mrs. Natalie J. Biro, 36-year-old former radio actress, died immediately. Her husband, Louis B. Biro, operator of an advertising firm, told police his wife had been ill for some time.

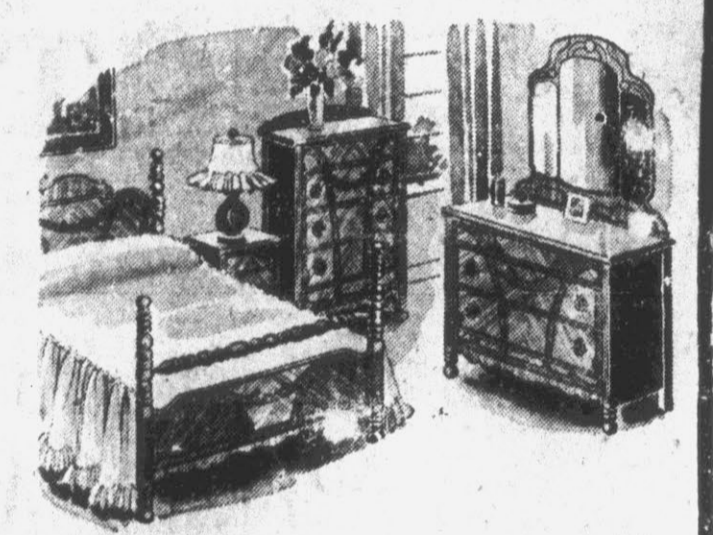

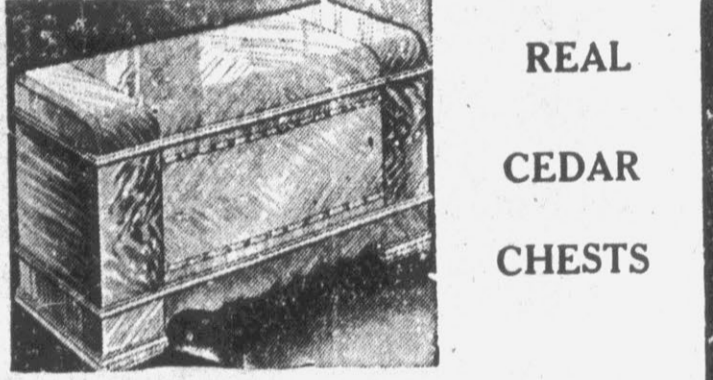

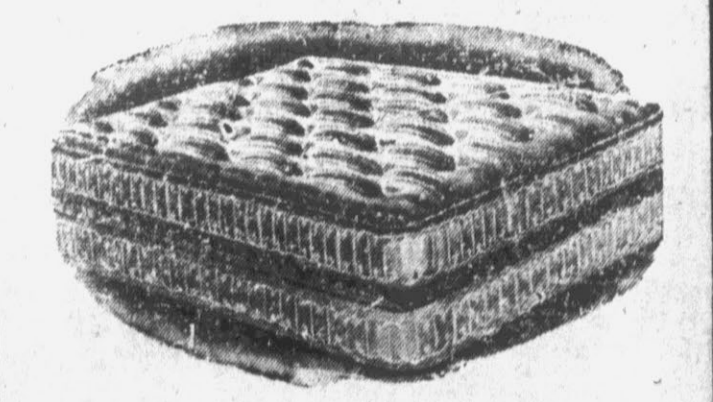
