LEGION WILL LEND ARMORY

City's Recreation Commission To Have Use Of Building

At its monthly meeting Tuesday night, American Legion Post No. 39 decided to enter into an agreement with the Greenville city recreation commission to permit the latter to use the armory at all times when not needed for Legion activities. At the present time, the Legion uses the armory only five nights a month.

This particular project designed to afford wholesome athletic and other recreational opportunity for Greenville's teen-age youth, was deemed so important by the legionaires, that they voted to grant use of the armory for all the time it was not in use by the Legion, amounting to twenty-five days and nights of each month. The action will preclude use of the armory by many other local and county groups who have been accommodated by the Legion in the past.

The City Recreation Commission, which is composed of representatives from all civic organizations, has had great difficulty securing adequate building facilities for their program. The armory is expected to provide basketball, volleyball, and other indoor game possibilities. The

building will supplement the overcrowded school athletic facilities during the winter months.

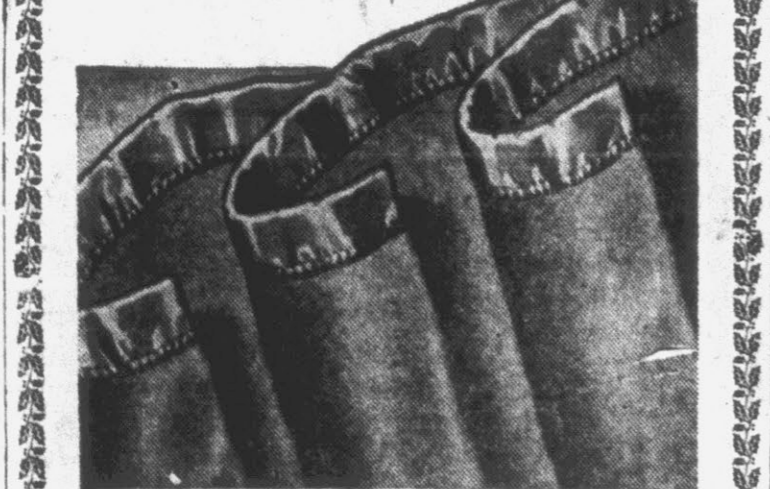

BEYOND ENERGY AND PATIENCE

We are informed that coal is so scarce in Japan today that locomotive engineers are instructed to blow the whistles. It is believed that this policy will save a considerable amount of coal. Thousands of tons of coal can be saved each year if the whistles are not blown and if the pressure is kept below the point at which steam automatically blows off. We would save ourselves considerable effort and distress if we could get into our minds the realization that we waste a lot of our energy blowing our whistles and blowing off steam. The amount of vain and unnecessary talk which carries the lives of all of us every day is stupendous. Some people go through life with the whistle open most of the time. Their conversation abounds in incidents about themselves, in disquisitions on their own desires, in boasts, in remarks designed to show us how clever they are. Patience on the part of the hearers and energy on the part of the tellers could be preserved in massive quantities if people would stop blowing their whistles. As for blowing off steam, the practice is a neurotic habit into which many of us unfortunately fall. It calls up energy in quantities and leaves one tired and dissipated as a result. The whistle and the escape valve are overlooked in many a life, with the result that much of our energy is wasted.

Army's original Manhattan engineering district. The next step is appointment by the president with commission recommendation of a general manager for the commission, the executive officer who runs the business while the commission struggles with policies and higher realm matters. The executive manager will get \$15,000 a year—and he could

do better in any private corporation of comparable size. When the managing director is picked, the commission will get along to the point of choosing directors of research, production, engineering and military application, the latter a number of the armed forces. And when all this is done the atomic energy commission will be able to get about the business of harnessing atoms to industry. The commission's advice to the agriculture products firm was based more on the complexities of research problems than on its own necessity for careful studies of economics, law, sources of fissionable material and the public welfare. The first experimental power pile a pilot plant at Oak Ridge, Tenn., isn't expected to be ready before 1948. Not even the final design has been agreed upon yet. The atomic energy act authorizes the commission to conduct research and development either through operation by government agencies or private corporations. For the present and probably for a long time to come, the research is being carried out under operating contracts. The big corporations are running the government-built plants in Tennessee and Oregon. Universi-

ties and corporations are to operate under contract, a system of laboratories now under construction.

unorganized country through a war adopted some of the methods of the European dictatorships, but more because it didn't seem to worry about it. And because during the war when America was fighting frantically to get war material through to Chiang's armies, we were having little success in really getting it used for something after it arrived. Elliott Roosevelt quotes his fair conference that he was trying to learn "more about the war that isn't being fought, and why. Chiang's troops aren't fighting at all x x x. He claims they aren't trained, and have no equipment x x x but it doesn't explain why he's been trying so hard to keep Stilwell from training Chinese troops. And it doesn't explain why he keeps thousands and thousands of his best men up in the northwest—up on the border of Red China." At that time the Communists were fighting. Maybe they were fighting only for their own territory, and not for China. But they were killing Japanese. Now the Nationalist armies are fighting on the far western flank of what has been conceived at General MacArthur's headquarters as a world-wide front against Communism. The Chinese Communists are feared to be the spearhead of Soviet Russia. The United States seems to feel that there is still a chance of including them in a unified China and ending this threat. Something about President Truman's emphasis on our recognition of the Chiang government as representative of China, the general terror of his statement perhaps more than specific phrases, indicates that he expects the responsible government to go even more than half way if necessary.

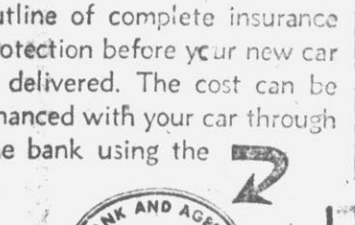

Christmas Fun Centers Around Food

ROAST TURKEY

Legislators Will Offer Anti-Bribery Measure

Washington, Dec. 19—(AP)—Rep. Ed Hebert of Louisiana declared today Congress should drive "chiselers and fixers" away from pro and amateur sports by making bribery of athletes a federal offense.

He told a reporter he will introduce bills to do this just as soon as Congress convenes Jan. 3—and don't think the penalties won't be tough.

Referring to charges that gamblers approached two New York backfield men before the Giants-Bears playoff for the National Professional Football League title last Sunday, Hebert said:

"This thing has got to stop. And the time to get this through is before the shock wears off."

One of his proposed bills will apply to the District of Columbia, the other to the rest of the nation. They will be patterned after the New York Anti-Bribery Law.

"The way I look at it," Hebert said, "sports have become big business and just as much a part of interstate commerce as cross-country trucking operations."

"Don't think I'm dewy-eyed about this. But there's a heluva lot more at stake than cracking down on a bunch of chiseling sure-thing operators."

"Maybe," Hebert concluded, "Whitney Martin of the AP put it better." He thumbed through the morning newspaper and came up with this quote from Martin's sports column:

"When you destroy the faith of kids in the integrity of sports, you are destroying the future of sports; destroying something that makes this country a great country—fairness, honesty, the square deal."

"Those," said Hebert, "are my sentiments."

**Treason Trials
To Be In Boston**

Washington, Dec. 19—The treason cases of Douglas Chandler and Robert Best, accused of broadcasting Nazi war propaganda over the Berlin radio, have been transferred to the Federal Court in Boston.

A Justice Department spokesman said a federal grand jury there will be asked to return the new indictments against the two men, who arrived in this country last Saturday from Europe.

He said the action to shift the cases from Washington to Boston was taken to avoid any question as to the legality of the charges.

The plane returning the men to

this country made a forced landing in Massachusetts before proceeding here, he explained, and under the law such cases "must be tried in the district where the defendants first land x x x."

**Judge Found To
Be Santa Claus**

Chicago, Dec. 19—(AP)—Judge Frank Donoghue took over the role of Santa Claus in women's court yesterday after he found Mrs. McHale guilty of stealing Christmas gifts for her three young children.

Tearfully, Mrs. McHale, 37, admitted stealing \$12.32 worth of clothing and other articles from a department store. She told the court her husband had been unable to work because of illness and they had no money for Christmas gifts.

"I just can't make enough to pay for their presents," Mrs. McHale sobbed.

After pronouncing sentence—a suspended fine of \$1—Judge Donoghue told her "this was not the

right thing to do but it is not a serious crime." Then he handed her a \$5 bill. Then a hat started going around to others in the courtroom and an additional \$15 was given to her.
